BELMONT GIRLS TO PLAY STATE TOURNAMENT First Game Will Be Friday Night At 8:45; Were In Fulton Finals

Having a most successful season of basketball, Belmont's girls' team will journey to Pearl High school in Hinds county this week end to participate in the state tournament. The lassies were in the finals of the northern half of the Fulton last Friday night, but failed to win only by the margin of two points, their opponents being the strong Shady Grove team. The final score was 54-56. Belmont's Etta Ray Crowe made 40 of the 54 possible points. Joyce Patterson scored 25, Shirley Yarber 6. By quarter scores stood at, first: Belmont 12, Shady Grove 12; second: Belmont 25, Shady Grove 24; third: Belmont 40, Shady Grove 38; and fourth: Belmont 54, Shady Grove 56. Belmont's first foe in the State tournament will be West Lincoln high school; next will be Agricola (last year's state champs) or Cumberland. Belmont defeated Cumberland last Saturday afternoon which put them in the finals Saturday night. If the team is still successful after this second hurdle they will, in all probability, meet Shady Grove again in the finals since the two teams are in different brackets in the state playoffs.

Before entering the north half state finals Belmont's forwards had scored 1632 points. Broken down into players this gave Etta Ray Crowe 886, Joyce Patterson 453, and Shirley Yarber 293.

The team won all other tournaments it entered this year. Tournaments and scores of both teams were: Wheeler invitational—Belmont 62, New Site 36; Iuka Invitational—Belmont 53, New Site 34;

Sheriff's Deputies And ATU Men Make Raid; 850 Gals. Whiskey, 1000 Gal. Still & Thousands Gals. Mash Seized

A one-thousand gallon still, 850 gallons of moonshine rye whiskey and thousands of gallons of mash were among the loot captured Monday night of this week in a raid performed by Sheriff Whit Wilson's deputies and Alcohol Tax Unit men. Taken into custody were Luther Luttrell and A. G. Files.

The raid was made about 8 o'clock and culminated

several hours of watching and waiting by the lawmen. Taking part were Deputies Roy Bolton, Ralph Pennington, Hub Williams and ATU Men Billy Pace and Earle Morris. At the time of the raid Sheriff Wilson was away on other important duties.

The still was located about 10 miles south of Iuka and 1½ miles east of Highway No. 25 on Luttrell's farm property. The barn in which the still and other equipment were housed was approximately 40x70 feet in size and was covered both on the sides and roof with galvanized tin. It was equipped with running water and electricity of ample amporage to pull several motors for pumps, and for lights. No farming tools or produce were in the barn.

"The still is one of the most elaborately furnished outfits we have ever captured," the ATU men stated. Included in the equipment were two Ford trucks, one had a van type body similar to those used by whole sale grocers for making deliveries. On the other truck was mounted two propane gas tanks that were connected to the gas furnaces under the still.

There were thirty-four 10-gallon kegs of whiskey and 510 gallons in one-half and gallon size glass jars—a total of 850 gallons of moonshine. Also there were nine 100-lb. bags of sugar; and a quantity of rye in a number of the hogs-heads that looked as though they were in the process of being prepared to make up a batch of mash.

Worm for the huge still was in a big vat approximately five feet wide by four feet high by 24 feet long which was filled with water. Indications on the 4-inch spout were that a large stream of whiskey had poured from it when the still was at peak production.

Destruction of the loot was accomplished Tuesday morning by Sheriff Wilson and his deputies. The furnace and cooker were so well constructed that they had to be dynamited before a truck winch could pull it out. The trucks, tanks and still are now at the county jail. The whiskey was poured out on the ground at the site of the barn.

Luttrell and Files were transferred to Aberdeen, Miss., Tuesday to await a hearing in Federal Court. The men were caught in the barn operating the still.

Officers said they had known for several weeks that the still was located in the immediate area but could not determine exactly where it was until the long watch Monday afternoon. One deputy and one ATU man went to the location about two o'clock and after approximately three hours of watching finally determined that the operation was in the barn. Others of the raiding party were notified and the raid was pulled at 8 o'clock.

Lawmen state that they estimate the still had been in operation less than three months, as the barn was only constructed in October and November of last year.

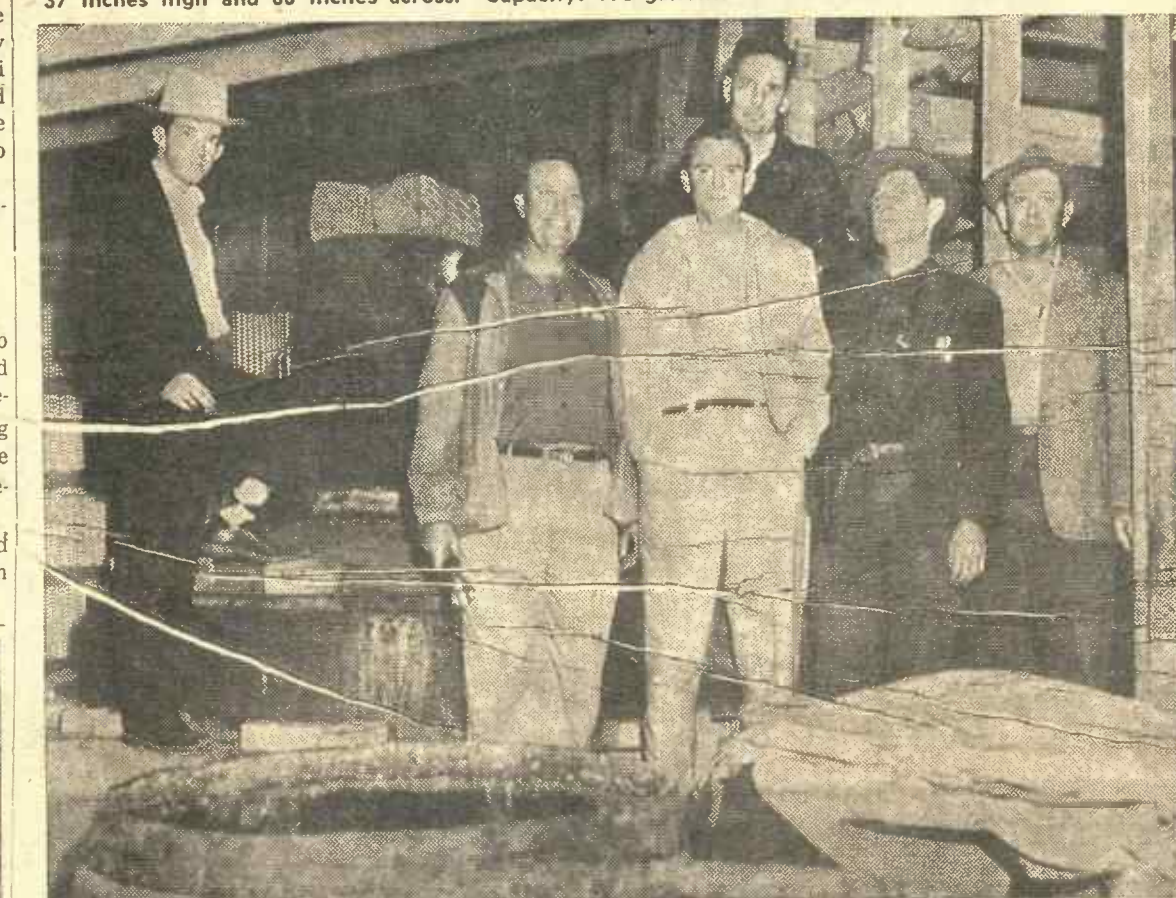
Attends Recreation Training Conf.

The conference, held at the American Legion Hut, was conducted to give training to those who might help with leading rec-



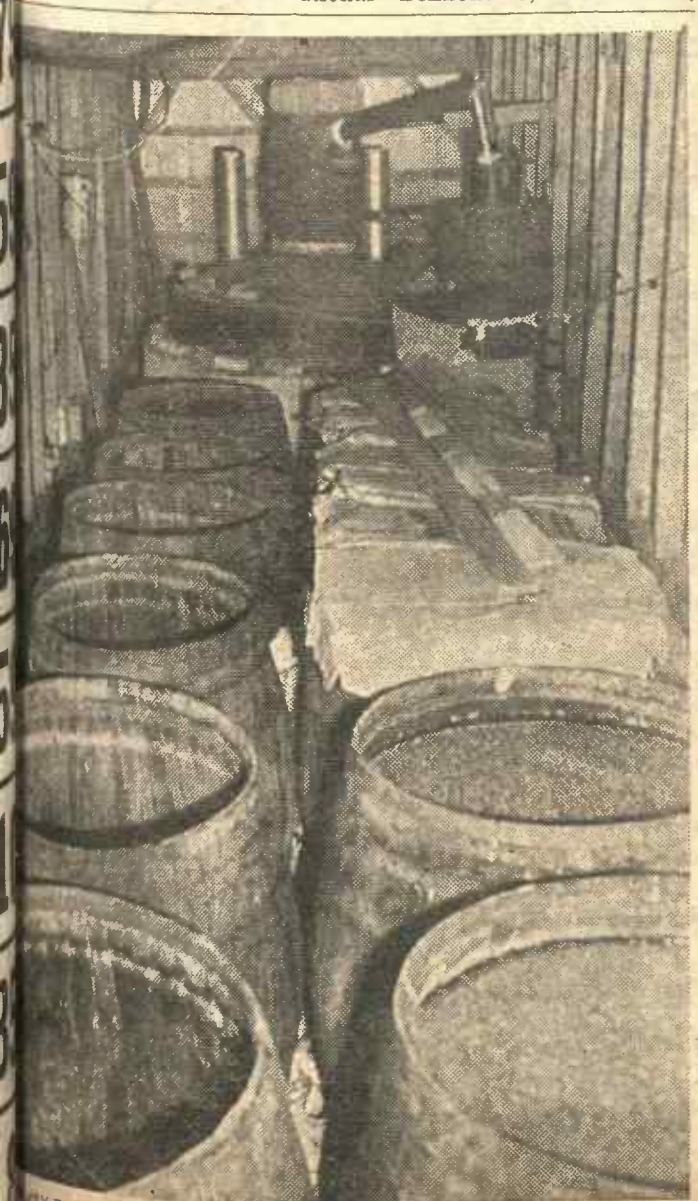

A cordial invitation is extended to the citizens of Iuka and all who are interested in this service.

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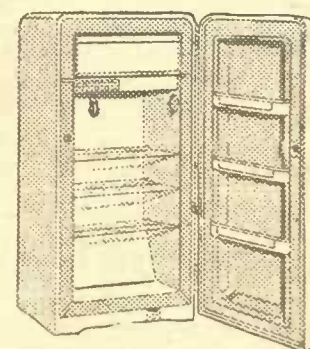

H. S. Massey Recognized For His Forestry Work

A. Jones, Work Unit Con-
servatist USDA-SCS
Mr. H. S. Massey who lives just
north of Iuka on highway 25, has
received recognition for the out-
standing work he has done in re-
storing and caring for the timb-
er on a 521 acre tract of land
near his home.

It now appears that Mr. Massey
is the Mississippi State winner in
the Forestry Division of the "Save
Our Soil" contest, co-spon-
sored by the Memphis Press Scim-
itar.

Mr. Massey entered this contest
in 1955 at the suggestion of the
soil conservation service tech-
nicians.

The forestry practices Mr. Mas-
sey started on this tract of land
about twelve years ago, and is still
maintaining, are the kind of forest-
practices the Tennessee River
Conservation District com-
missioners recommend that most
landowners establish on their
eroded land.

During the past (12) twelve
years Mr. Massey has had (360)
three hundred and sixty thou-
sand seedling set, and 79 acre

of natural pine seedlings released
on this 521 acres. There are ap-
proximately (5) five miles of es-
tablished fire lanes on this tract.
Mr. Massey has recently sold the
merchantable hardwood from a 40
acre area of this land. After this
hardwood is removed young pine
seedlings will be set, later these
seedlings will be released by
girdling the remaining hardwoods.

On Friday March 2nd Mr. and
Mrs. Massey will attend the "Save
Enrich Our Soil" meeting to be
in the Peabody hotel in Memphis.
While there they will be the lunch-
eon guests of the Memphis Press
Scimitar. After lunch prizes will
be awarded.

We certainly hope that Mr. Mas-
sey will bring home the state
prize for Mississippi offered in
the Forestry Division of this SOS
contest.

Annual Flow Of Death Benefits Increased 77%

Mississippi families received
\$11,497,000 during 1955 in death
benefits from their life insurance
companies, the Institute of Life
Insurance reports. These payments
were made under 7,067 policies.

The 1955 death payments com-
pare with \$10,847,000 the year be-
fore, under 6,788 policies.

"The annual flow of death ben-
efits in this state has risen 77
percent in the past decade," the
Institute commented. "In 1945,
they amounted to \$6,482,000, under
5,846 policies. The increase has
been primarily a reflection of the
greater amount of life insurance
owned and not a rise in death rat-
es, which nationally declined ab-
out one-fifth in these years. Own-
ership of such protection in this
state increased 166 percent betwe-
en the start of 1945 and 1955. There
has been a material gain in the
family security provided th-
rough life insurance. Many more
families are now given the means
through policy benefits of holding
together and maintaining their
improved standard of living."

Of the 1955 death claim pay-
ments in the state, \$8,361,000 was
under 2,610 ordinary life insur-
ance policies; \$2,433,000 was un-

der 1,453 group life insurance
certificates; and \$703,000 was un-
der 3,004 industrial life insur-
ance policies.

For the nation as a whole, the
1955 aggregate of death claim
payments was \$2,240,731,000 un-
der 1,660,949 policies, compared
with \$2,072,206,000 under 1,578-
100 policies the year before and
\$1,279,667,000 under 1,318,334 po-
licies in 1945. Last year's payments
were made up of \$1,379,707,000
under 489,514 ordinary life insur-
ance policies; \$591,435,000 under
242,683 group life insurance cer-
tificates; and \$269,589,000 under
928,752 industrial life insurance
policies.

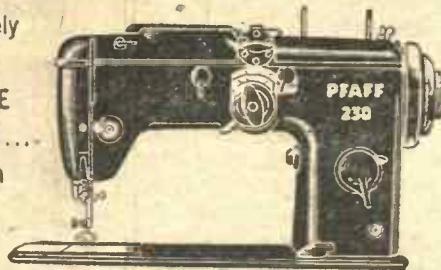

Plentiful Foods

On the plentiful foods list for March are meats, vegetables and other food items to help you, Mrs. Homemaker, as you plan and prepare well-rounded meals for your family.

For the meat dish, you have a selection of plentiful pork, beef, broilers and canned tuna in oil. Vegetables to go with the meat include potatoes, cabbage, and celery. For fruit, you can choose from grapefruit and grapefruit products, canned and frozen cherries and California dates.

And to finish out the menu, see if you don't need milk and dairy products, rice, lard, peanuts or peanut butter.

Foods in plentiful supply are usually reasonably priced. Check those in your grocery stores and see what you can save on your grocery budget.

You're Never Too Old For Meat And speaking of meat as we did on the plentiful foods list, reminds me of a note about another "exploded theory."

It was once the thought, you know, that older people had to forego the enjoyment of beef steaks, pork roasts, lamb chops and other appetizing meat. But today we know that senior citizens who eat ample amounts of meat are more alert and active and are less likely to get sick.

So whether you are young or old, you can take full advantage of current heavy supplies of meat for eral deep-down satisfaction at every meal.

Tuna Fish Rice Casserole

- 2 cups grated tuna fish or 1 13-ounce can
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 2 cups cheese sauce
- 1/2 cup buttered crumbs

Drain tuna fish, flake. Arrange tuna and rice in layers in a greased casserole, sprinkling layers with parsley and onion. Add cheese sauce. Top with buttered crumbs and a dash of paprika. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F) about 25 minutes or until browned. Makes 6 servings.

Cheese Sauce. Make 2 cups regular medium, white sauce. When sauce is thick, add 2 cups grated cheese and 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce. Stir over low heat until cheese is melted.

Home Freezer Economy

The More turnover of Frozen foods in your home freezer, the greater the economy in using this appliance. It costs more than twice as much per pound - excluding the cost of the food itself - to store 360 pounds of food for a year in a home freezer than to store and use 900 pounds from the same freezer during the year, research by the U. S. Department of Agriculture shows.

As you use more food and replace it in a freezer, storage costs are spread over a large number of pounds and cost per pound decreases.

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Luke 16:1-31; 19:11-27
Devotional Reading: I Corinthians 9:16-27

Faithful in Little

Lesson for February 26, 1956

EVERYBODY has some kind of a chance in this world. We all sometimes think we would do better if we had the same chance the next man has; but we may be deceiving ourselves. Jesus tells a story about three men each of whom had the very same chance.

Each was given the same sum of money, and told to make what he could out of it. One man increased the money ten times; one multiplied it by five; but the third Dr. Foreman man did not even try. What if he had tried? Considering the sort of man he was, a pessimist and a self-confessed coward, it can be doubted whether he would have been able to do as well as the other two did. At any rate, Jesus calls our attention first of all to the fact that even if everybody had an equal chance, not everybody would do equally well with it.

Gifts of God We call persons "gifted" when they have some remarkable talent or ability. When we say this, we mean, or we ought to mean, that a man's capacities are not his own invention, they are God's gifts. Two thoughts go together here and must not be separated: the first is that what we have to start with and the opportunities which life brings us along the way, are really gifts of God. The other thought is that God expects us to develop these gifts, take advantage of these opportunities, do something with what we have.

Caruso the famous tenor said once, modestly, that he deserved no credit for his magnificent voice. He was born with an extraordinary muscular development in his vocal cords, something possessed by few men. Most men could not be Carusos no matter how hard they try. On the other hand, if all Caruso had done was just to take his throat for granted, never learn singing, never go through the long discipline of the operatic star, the world would never have been thrilled by that golden voice. God's gifts plus our work, that is the divine plan.

Nothing Too Small

All this is simply the principle which the church calls "stewardship." It is simply recognizing that what God gives us, we are expected to use and make the most of, in his service. The trouble right here is that most of us are rather like that third man in Jesus' parable. We see these big, able people going "great guns," we see what wonderful things others are doing, and we know very well we can't do anything like that . . . so we don't try to do anything. Now it should be noted that in this little story, the returning king does not say to the second man, who made only five pounds, "You rascal, why didn't you make ten like this other man?" On the contrary he is pleased with the man, promotes him. What God really despises is not small results; what he despises is refusing to try. We are not reasonable before God for not being brighter or stronger than we are. We are responsible for what we do with such ability as we have, whether small or great.
