Belmont Wins 4th Place In State Basketball Tourney

Belmont's girl's basketball team won fourth place in last week end's B-BB state tournament held at Pearl High school near Jackson.

Belmont's first defeat came at the hands of Agricola Saturday afternoon in the semi-finals. Last year's champs and No. 1 ceded team to win the state tourney beat the Belmont lassies by only two points in an overtime period.

The powerful and smooth operating Shady Grove sextet of Tippah county were triumphant over the Agricola aggregation for state honors by the tune of 63 to 58.

Belmont lost their last game Saturday night to Bassfield by 9 points, the score being 50 to 59. The local county sextet was honored to have two of their leading players chosen on the all-

tournament team. Etta Ray Crowe, who has sparked the Belmont winning streak all season, was the second forward chosen and her sister, Dorothy Crowe, was selected as a guard. There were 12 players selected on the all-tournament team.

A grand slam game between B-BB and A-AA girls and B-BB and A-AA boys will be played in Jackson this week end. Shady Grove, B-BB girls winners will be opponents of Lumberton, A-AA champs, and Mantachie B-BB boys will play Kossuth A-AA boys. A resolution was passed by the State Senate to have the playoff held at Booneville since 3 of the teams involved were within 30 miles of that college. However, officials at Jackson decided against the resolution and ruled that the games would be played in Jack-

Highway Robbery Tuesday Night

County-Wide Four-H Rally To Be Held Friday, March 9th, At Iuka Gymnasium

Highlighting National 4-H Club Week in this area will be the annual county wide rally scheduled to take place in the Iuka gymnasium on Friday, March 9.

This is a county wide event with all schools in the county participating. The talent show will begin at ten o'clock and continue until 11:45. Each school will select their own individual or group to enter the contest. Time will be limited to ten minutes.

C. H. Weaver of Tupelo, district TVA supervisor, C. T. Roberts of State Health Department and Mrs. Lillian Hicks of TVA will judge the winners. The winners will have the opportunity of participating in the district contest to be held at Tupelo on May 19. District winners will go to the State Contest to be held in Jackson on October 8 through 13.

A parade of 4-H Club members and adult leaders will be staged at 11:45 a.m., and will be led through the down town area by the Iuka school band. There are over 1,000 4-H club members in Tishomingo county.

National 4-H Club Week is designed to provide club members with special occasions to take stock of past achievements and make plans for the future. It provides the opportunity for 4-H'ers to inform the public, including parents, of the value of 4-H training, to interest other young people in enrolling in 4-H Clubs and to enlist outstanding adults in becoming volunteer club leaders.

The story of 4-H Club work at home and overseas will be told to the Mississippi public by the state's more than 100,000 4-H Club members during the National 4-H Club Week, March 3-11.

In spreading the word about 4-H Club work, boys and girls plan to use newspaper stories, radio and television program, window displays, and programs for schools and civic clubs.

Among the highlights of the past year's activity in 4-H is the expanded International Farm Youth Exchange program, in which Mississippi young people live and work on farms of other countries, and foreign youth visit Mississippi farms. In 1955 Mississippi sent Willie Hatfield of Rienzi as a delegate to the Philippine Islands, and Allen Tucker of Panther Burn, as a delegate to Greece.

Enrollment in Mississippi 4-H Clubs increased to 104,805 during 1955. Completions of projects by these club members stood at 73 percent, considerably above the five year average, 1951-55.

Club boys and girls work toward a well rounded life. They enjoy play and recreation as well as interesting and worthwhile work. The most important goals of 4-H work are character development and good citizenship.

President Eisenhower salutes the 4-H clubs of the nation during the week set aside in honor of them. Below is a message written by the president commending the clubs of the nation for their fine record in farming, homemaking, community service and other activities. The presidents statement follows:

April 15 Set As Closing Date For Farmers To Receive ASC Pasture Assistance

At a special meeting of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee held on March 1, the following pasture practices were made available to farmers of Tishomingo County.

Practice A-2; Initial Establishment of a permanent vegetative cover for Soil Protection or as a need land use adjustment.

To be eligible for Federal Cost-Sharing under this practice ONLY land that is not now in permanent vegetative cover will qualify. Seed available for this practice are as follows: Dallas Grass, Bermuda Grass seed or sprigs, Bahia Grass, Fescue, Sericea Lesp., Kobe Lesp., and White Dutch Clover. Minerals available: Basic Slag, Phosphate, Potash and nitrogen.

Practice B-1; Initial Improvement of an established permanent vegetative cover.

Federal Cost-Sharing of minerals and seed will be approved ONLY where it is thought that the adding of seed and fertilizer will bring about a desired improvement of vegetative cover.

Under this practice a farmer may add Kobe lespedeza and minerals to his pasture provided he has one perennial grass already established. Seedbed preparation under this practice must consist of renovation by light disking to incorporate seed and fertilizer without materially damaging existing sod.

The County Committee has set a closing date of April 15, 1956

to sign up and get this pasture assistance. Purchase orders for seed and fertilizer will not be written after April 15, 1956.

If you have drainage problems on your farm your ASC program can offer you assistance in the construction of Secondary Drainage Terraces, Stock Ponds, V-Ditches and W-Ditches.

Don't fail to use the ASC program with these practices. The County Committee will have a County Office employee at Belmont on Tuesday of each week to assist farmers in signing and receiving any assistance offered by the program.

Don't forget the closing date April 15, 1956. Also remember the ASC Office is closed on Saturday.

Driver's License Renewals Cost More Under New Law Recently Passed

Commissioner T. B. Birdsong announces that under a new law recently passed by the Legislature, effective March 1, 1956, the fees for drivers license renewals is as follows:

Regular operator's license, \$2.00 per year, the license having the option of obtaining a one year or two year license; \$4.00 for two years.

Commercial license shall be \$3.50 per year with the license having the option of obtaining a one year or two year license; \$7.00 for two years.

Fee for duplicate license shall be \$1.00 which includes both commercial and regular operator's.

All licenses renewed on or after March 1, 1956 must be in the Jackson not later than March 10, 1956 for the license to be given consideration under the old fees.

All licenses received in the Jackson office for renewal after March 10, 1956 must be accompanied by fees under the new law.

No Examination Required To Renew Expired Drivers License

Commissioner Birdsong says: "Due to shortage of personnel at this time, we are having to discontinue the policy established by

this Department whereby all persons renewing their Mississippi drivers license within eighteen (18) months were required to take an examination for license.

"In the future we will renew any Mississippi driver's license, regardless of expiration date. In cases where persons have had Mississippi drivers license and have lost same (and expired) apply for duplicate and renewal."

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Now Is Good Time To Work On Woodland

On pretty days during the next few weeks most Tishomingo landowners could profitably work on their woodland.

By disk ing old roads running through their woodland, fire-breaks can be established. This should be done first, because one fire can destroy years of painstaking forestry work.

After taking all practical precautions to protect their woodland from fire, most landowners can profitably girdle blackjack and other undesirable hardwood to release young pines growing beneath them.

A great number of Soil Conservation District Cooperators are taking advantage of the ASC program, and are receiving financial assistance from the government releasing young pine seedlings by girdling worthless hardwood.

Some landowners will find it profitable to remove part of the pines from their woodland and sell them for pulpwood. This should be a thinning operation to insure more rapid growth of the pines left on the area.

More and more landowners are regarding pine trees as a crop. They realize that pines, whether obtained naturally or by planting, must be protected from fire, they should be weeded by removing competing trees, thinned and pines removed sold for pulpwood, and finally selectively cut for piling or lumber.

As Work Unit Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service I want to say again that pine trees properly cared for is one of the best soil and water conserving crops that we have. It is also one of the best old age insurance policies a landowner can have.

During this season before land preparation and crop planting time is a good time to work on your woodland.

County Students To Be Honored At State College

The following students from Tishomingo county will be among the 674 honor scholars who will receive special recognition at scholarship day program to be held at Mississippi State College on March 13. Doyce Burney, Iuka; Ellis L. Searcy, Belmont; Candler F. Stormont, Phillip Johnson, William H. Osborn, Jarjean C. Mercer, all of Tishomingo.

The students to be honored are those who maintained a grade average of "B" or higher throughout the fall semester. The program will be in honor of both the outstanding students and their parents.

The total list of honor students included 34 with straight-A averages, 181 with quality point averages higher than 2.5, and 459 who averaged two or more quality points per hour of work completed.

Form W-2 Shows Amount Of 1955 Earnings

Now that January 1956 has come

and gone, workers have received statements of their 1955 earnings from their employers. These statements, known as Form W-2, are furnished to workers as required by law, and show the worker's name, social security number, total wages paid to him in that year, amount of income tax withheld, and amount of wages reported for social security credits.

Workers who have paid wages, commissions, salaries, etc., of \$4,200 or more during 1955, should check their Forms W-2 to make sure they will receive credit for \$4,200 on their social security accounts. (Prior to 1955, the maximum social security wage credits allowable for a worker for any one year was \$3,600.)

If a worker was paid at least \$4,200 in 1955, but his Form W-2 shows FICA (or OASDI) wages less than this amount, he should immediately contact his employer or payroll supervisor to correct the amount of social security earnings reported for him. If, for some reason, the employer cannot or will not correct the Form W-2 and his social security tax returns, the worker should get in touch with his social security administration district office, where he will receive assistance to have his social security account corrected.

When he comes to the social security office, the worker should bring with him his 1955 Form W-2.

The worker should also compare the name and social security number appearing on his social security card with the name and number shown on his Form W-2. If they are not the same, he should also tell his employer or payroll supervisor about this, so the employer's records can be corrected to show the correct information.

County Agent news

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Land Selection

Use your best land for the highest per acre income crops. This best land should be planted to cotton.

When you come to the end of the good cotton land, stop planting cotton and turn to some other crop.

A few minutes spent at this time of year in picking out land for the different crops will pay off in big dividends of increased yields and lower cost production.

Silage
Long rows make for easier harvesting of silage crops. This applies to both corn and sorghum. Longer rows enable the harvesting machinery to do a more satisfactory job.

Don't plant your silage crop too early. Sorghum should not be planted before April 15. It can be planted through May.

Plant your corn and sorghum silage on good land. Locate the crop as close to the silo as possible.

If you are planting corn silage, be sure that you pick good corn land, use an adapted hybrid and fertilize for 50 to 60 bushels of ear corn per acre. This will pay off.

Silo Covering
Use of plastic or felt covers on silos will save you money. Tests of these materials by the Agricultural Experiment Station indicate that either felt or plastic covered with sawdust greatly reduce silage spoilage.

Either of these covers on a silo 100 feet by 20 feet will save \$150 in silage above the cost of the material.

Get The Most Money From Timber

Here are some general recommendations for timber owners who want to sell some timber:

1. Get prices from as many sawmills and wood industries as possible. Local markets sometimes pay better than outside markets because of transportation savings.
2. Advertise in newspapers to secure prices from outside buyers.
3. Use a written timber-sale agreement in selling farm timber, particularly where cutting is done by buyers.
4. Before selling get a good estimate of the amount and value of timber you have for sale. Public or private consulting foresters are available in most localities.
5. Market high grade timber. Markets that pay high prices, usually buy on grade.
6. Remember, standing timber does not deteriorate rapidly, so it pays to wait for favorable market conditions.

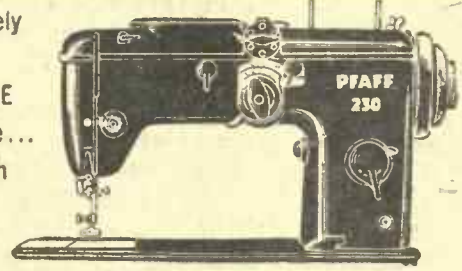
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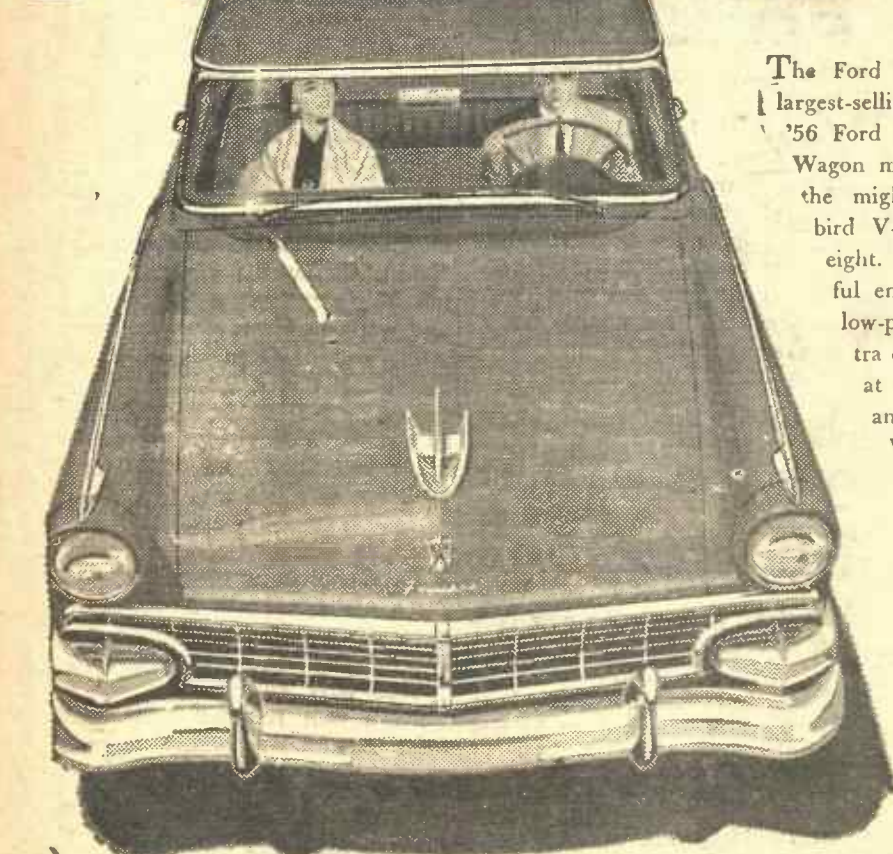
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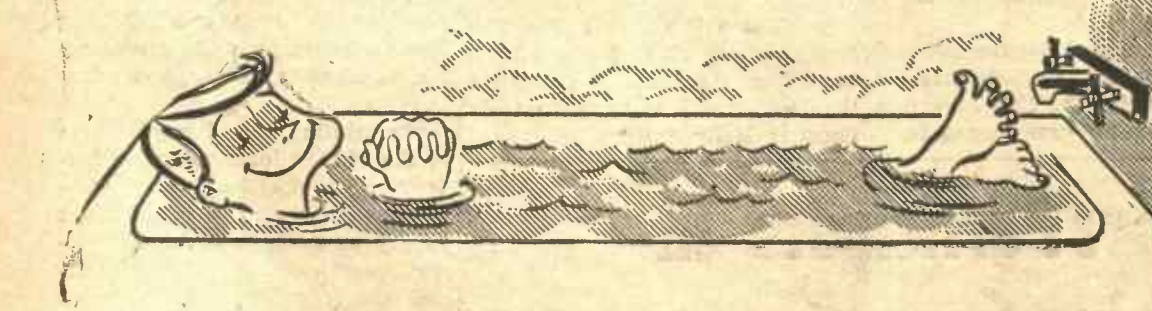

The proposed new farm program was hastily assembled at a time when Secretary Benson was insisting that the farm situation was moving in the right direction and that the declining farm economy was actually not a decline but a normal post-war adjustment. Even with the wolves yapping at the door, there was stubborn resistance in the Department of Agriculture to admitting that the farm economy was on a dangerous slide.

Last spring Under-Secretary Morse told the House Agriculture Committee that the Department was not making plans for new legislation. He said they had what they wanted and would stand on it as "the program which would bring farmers 100% of parity at the market place" - the President's outstanding campaign promise of 1952.

With the slide growing steadily worse, Secretary Benson was coerced into action. He reluctantly came up with the Soil Bank. Only five months before he had sent messages to Congress opposing and solidly denouncing bills which would have established the Soil Bank. One of the bills had been introduced by a prominent mid-western Republican. In an act doing credit to a quick change artist,

he now says, he is for it.

The Soil Bank was submitted as a means of immediately increasing farm income. It will do no such thing, not even by one dime. As submitted by the Administration, it will return to farmers no more than the normal net income that would ordinarily be derived from crops planted on the allotted acres.

Under the Administration's program, with or without the Soil Bank, cotton farmers will receive less income in 1956 for the following reasons: first, reduced acreage allotments; second, modernized parity; and, third, the new base for calculating parity prices. All of these, which are recommended and supported by the Administration, are resigned to and will lower the price of cotton. And in addition, the Administration has the authority to and undoubtedly will further lower the prices under the flexible price formula. At every turn the Administration has provided one gadget after another for lower and lower cotton prices. We will feel the effect this fall.

Giving credit where credit is due, the Soil Bank might reduce the cotton surplus. For every allotted acre put in the Soil Bank, production will be reduced proportionately. The deposit of a substantial acreage will mean a substantial reduction in production and in turn a reduction in the surplus. No one can say now with assurance that farmers will participate to such an extent that it will work out that way, but it has possibilities. Timing is important. To have an appreciative effect on cotton plantings this year, the bill should become law no later than March 20th. However, it is not advisable for farmers to wait around; as there are a lot of snags on Capitol Hill and over at the White House.

Southern Forest Fire Conference To Convene; Topic: South's Forest Fires

The Southern Forest Fire Conference will meet in New Orleans April 13 and 14 to attack the problem of forest fires which are costing the South more than a quarter of a billion dollars a year in lost timber and income from timber, wood, pulp and other manufacture.

The Conference endorsed by Southern Governors is being held for the purpose of gathering 1,000 leading Southerners from all walks of life to review the fire problem and develop new ways of strengthening present antifire programs and campaigns throughout the South.

The South in 1954 lost 7,763,000 acres of forest in 146,016 wildfires. Here in Mississippi 1,929,055 acres of forest were lost in 28,797 wildfires. It is most important that everyone, individually and collectively, do all in their power to reduce the number of fires and the severity of fires which are literally burning up the prosperity of the South. The South is losing seven times as much forests to fire as all the other 32 states of the nation put together.

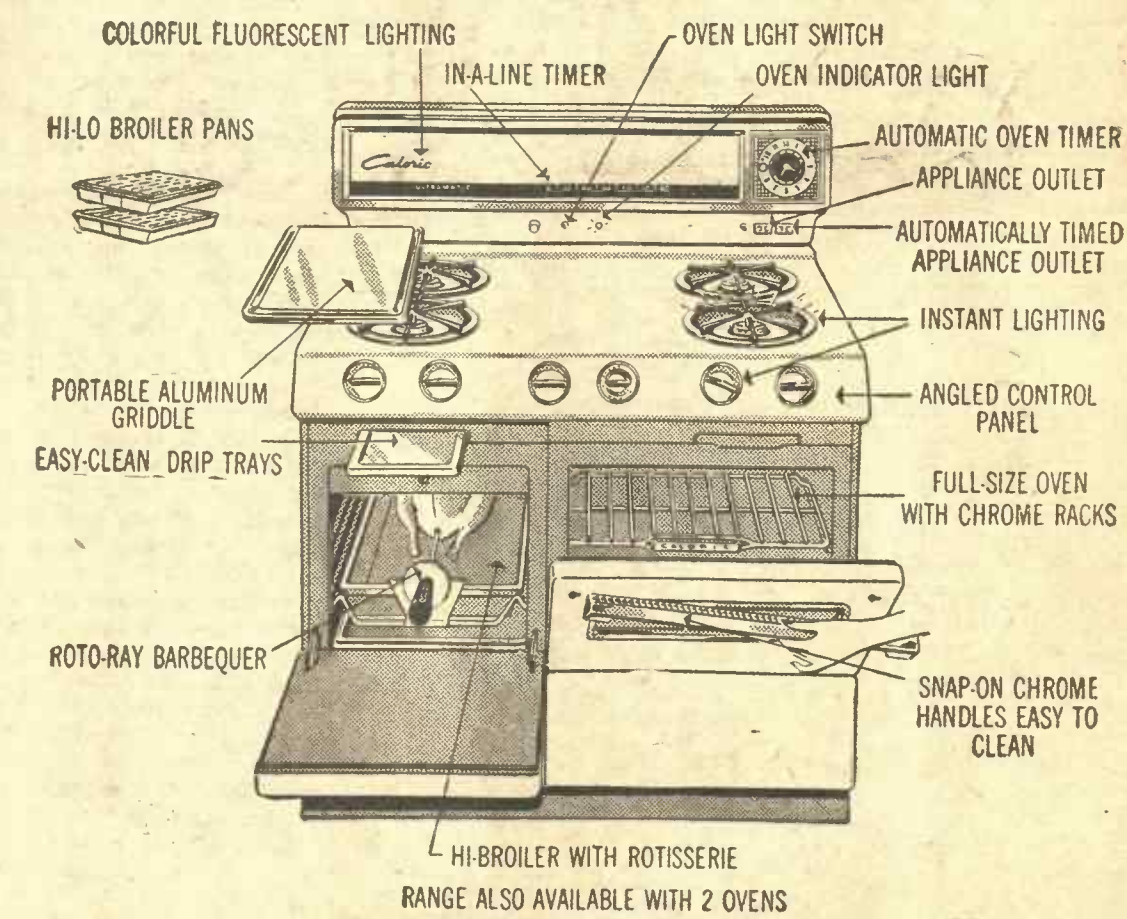

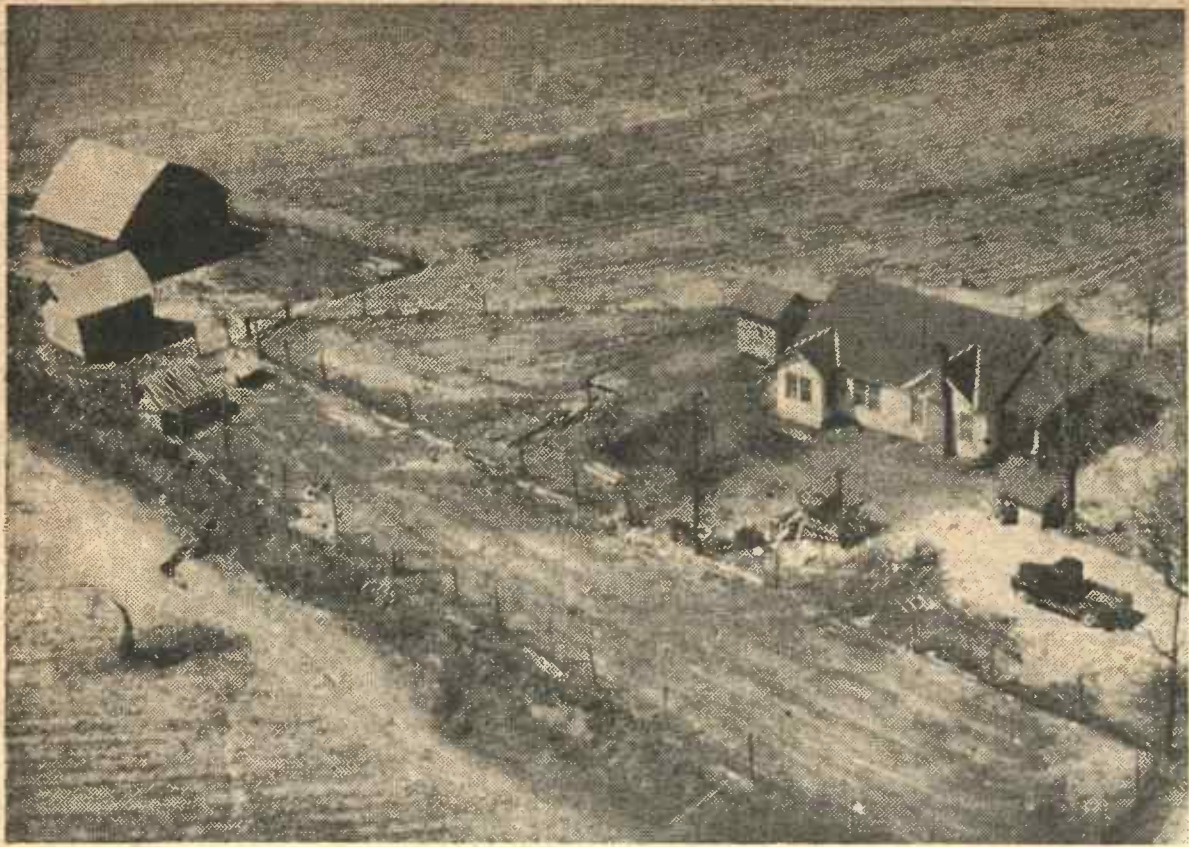

"Why I am a Volunteer Red Cross Worker"

Excerpts from an address delivered to Volunteer Red Cross Workers in Mississippi by Henry G. Turner, General Manager Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, serving as National Vice-Chairman Mississippi 1956 American Red Cross Drive.

"I simply do not have the time. Get someone else."

That was the thought that first crossed my mind when I was asked to be a volunteer worker in the 1956 Red Cross drive for memberships and funds.

However, I strongly feel that the best investment we make in this world of ours is that of unselfish service to our fellow man. We all owe something to society, a debt that very largely justifies our existence, and I am sure you will agree that we should not live in a community and take all and give nothing.

Before giving my time and money to any organization, charitable or otherwise, I must know about its services and how it operates. So I studied the Red Cross record, analyzing to get the facts, and I was impressed with what I found.

Fact: The National Chairman is a volunteer worker and receives no salary.

Red Cross offices at military installations, hospitals and chapters display official posters stating that all articles and services made available to servicemen are gifts of the American people. Members of the armed forces are asked to report immediately any instances where men have been asked to pay for Red Cross articles or services.

Remember that the Red Cross is a man-made organization. Naturally it will have some faults.

But for every speck of criticism, I can show you a yard of good deeds. If we look for perfection in any organization or if we look for perfection in our friends we find only disappointment. There is but One Who is Perfect.

The Red Cross in Mississippi.

There were 15 disasters last year in Mississippi. More than 800 families were assisted by the Red Cross at a cost of \$178,408.

The Red Cross assisted 7,544 members of the Armed Services, including financial aid amounting to \$73,258. There were 28,000 cases involving assistance at home to servicemen, veterans and their families.

I went to Keesler Field at Biloxi and reviewed the records and got the facts on what the Red Cross is doing for servicemen. They have 10 paid employees who work in the hospital, recreation rooms, and Red Cross office. Between 600 and 700 emergency personal problem cases involving financial aid of over \$6,000 each month are also handled. They render heartwarming services to the men and their families.

Last year, 1,000 women completed home nursing courses and were awarded Red Cross certificates. More than 7,000 certificates were awarded for first aid and water safety.

During the Vicksburg tornado in 1953, the Red Cross spent \$167,039 helping Mississippians. The services and relief provided during times of disaster cannot be evaluated in terms of dollars. These services are only a small part of the humanitarian

work the Red Cross carries out through your membership and contributions.

In order to carry out their services in Mississippi in 1956, the 85 chapters estimate they will need \$600,000. This is where you and I as volunteer workers fit into the organization—as members of the National Board, Chapter Chairman, Board and Committee members, Fund Raisers, Instructors and in other jobs.

There are 100 volunteer workers for each paid Red Cross worker.

The Need is Great

The Red Cross is a well-run organization the same as any other successful business. A \$90,000,000 corporation will not run itself; it has to be done with executives and clerical forces. Unselfish volunteer workers such as you and I help keep the expenses down.

Expenses of bloodmobiles, doctors, nurses, blood processing, shipping and correspondence must be taken care of.

Last year, 2,210,000 blood donations were made to the Red Cross. The cost was \$4.80 a pint, or a total of \$10,608,000. This amount included collection and processing. The Red Cross neither buys nor sells blood. Hospitals usually charge for blood transfusions.

During the past year, the Red Cross provided care to 91,000 persons affected by major disasters. Long-term rehabilitation was given to 14,400 families.

This does not include the thousands of families affected by the New England, California and Oregon floods. Expenditures in the New England flood will exceed \$18,000,000. The recent California-Oregon flood will cost between \$7,000,000 and \$8,000,000. We never know where disaster may strike. We should always be prepared.

Last year servicemen, veterans and their families received financial aid of \$12,625,000.

It is interesting to know that foreign countries voluntarily sent more than \$400,000 plus supplies to help provide relief to victims of the recent New England flood.

75 Years of Service
The American Red Cross has been the back-bone of success during times of need in America for over 75 years, and will be so in the future if we will continue to support this organization that has meant so much to our fellow man.

Disaster service during 1955 cost over \$27,000,000, the highest in the 75-year history of Red Cross. The New England, California, and Oregon floods have practically depleted the disaster resources. It is necessary that all chapters fully subscribe their 1956 quotas so that the services for which we are responsible can be carried on in the high tradition that the country has been led to expect. All of the sympathy in the world will be of no avail unless we have funds available to meet the need.

When you are asked to give to the Red Cross, please respond from the heart and do your part.

Room Should Be Dimly Lighted When TV Is On

Television in an unlighted room violates a basic principle of good vision, the Mississippi Optometric Association said today in a statement issued for Save Your Vision Week (March 4-10).

"The television screen is about ten times as bright as a motion picture screen," Dr. May, president, said "This bright light tends to make the pupils of the eye contract. Darkness surrounding the set tends to make the pupils open. This conflict and constant readjustment causes fatigue."

Rules for home lighting and television recommended by the association are:

Light the television room to about half the brightness needed for reading.

Local Dentist Refutes Claims Made In Advertisements Of Some Dentifrices

The great amount of misleading and confusing advertising that is being shoved at us daily concerning dental health and the value of Crest and other fluoride dentifrices has prompted me to write this. I wish to remind you that according to the American Dental association there is no adequate evidence that any fluoride dentifrice is effective in preventing tooth decay, although we certainly hope they may prove to be of some value.

Due to the large number of inquiries about Crest with Fluoristan, Dr. Harry Hillenbrand, secretary of the A. D. A. issued a statement which I quote in part: "The American Dental association is not aware of evidence adequate to demonstrate the claimed dental caries prophylactic value of Crest. Although clinical tests of the dentifrice are in progress, adequate information concerning its value may not be available for a year or more."

Published evidence to support the usefulness of adding a fluoride

in other dentifrices is even less convincing. The association therefore believes that all fluoride dentifrices are being marketed prematurely.

About one milligram of fluoride ion is provided by the dentifrice at each brushing procedure. It is expected that nearly all this fluoride will be discharged by rinsing.

Small children, however, might swallow an appreciable portion of the dentifrice, thus contributing to the possibility of dental fluorosis—especially where adequate or excessive level of fluoride are present in the drinking water (Iuka does not have an adequate level of fluoride in its water supply) since the crowns of permanent teeth are largely calcified by the age of six, the period before this age is one of greater susceptibility to dental fluorosis. (That is mottling of the enamel from excessive ingestion of fluoride) present labels of fluoride dentifrices, therefore, are required to carry a statement cautioning against the

use of the dentifrices by children under six.

The evidence accumulated in the past twenty years to support community water fluoridation is overwhelming in comparison to the amount of clinical data to support the usefulness of fluoride dentifrices. It would be a disservice to the dental health of the public if the promotion of fluoride dentifrices should lead to the misconception that their use is an adequate substitute for the controlled fluoridation of municipal water supplies."

Please remember that the rules for good dental health are the same as for good general health. Of particular importance is a balanced diet avoiding excessive amounts of sweets. Daily you see attractive advertisements to "brush your teeth with chewing gum." However these advertisements fail to tell you that there is one half teaspoonful of sugar in each stick of chewing gum. Now, no one would tell you brush your teeth with chewing gum unless their main interest was simply to sell chewing gum.

Most everyone will agree that to be clean favors good health. This applies to the mouth and teeth also, both natural and artificial dentures. I have never seen a child's nose or ear rot off because it was not kept clean but children's teeth do rot off and decay because they are not kept clean. But parents continue to give a child a tooth brush and paste and let him be responsible for the cleanliness of his mouth and teeth while the parent still gives the child his bath and sees that his nose and ears are clean. A good rule for parents that are interested in their child's dental health is to clean the child's mouth for him at least three years after the child is able to bath himself satisfactorily alone. At least check and see if the child is doing a good job of cleaning its mouth and teeth.

Again let me remind you not to be misled by advertising. If proof is found that a product will improve the health of the public your governmental agencies and ethical medical and dental associations will endorse and support these products and their use.

Emergency Loans Limited To \$15,000 For Farmers

The United States Department of Agriculture has authorized the making of special emergency loans to farmers in all counties in Mississippi. These loans are available to farmers whose credit needs cannot be met through conventional sources and are in need of operating capital for 1956 expenses.

M. H. Woods, County Supervisor, stated that the loans are limited to \$15,000 with repayments being made when the crops are normally harvested. The loans can be made for any normal recurring farm operating cost to family-type farmers, as well as those who operate on a larger scale.

4-H Club girls throughout Mississippi are taking part in a new demonstration this year - on the use of corn meal. They have recently been presenting their demonstrations at district meetings and showing how to use corn meal in tasty and nutritious dishes suitable for breakfast, dinner, supper and between-meal snacks.

Here is one of the recipes that is being used - and one that the 4-H girl who presented it in her demonstration said never failed. She has made cookies by the recipe many times. The cookies retain their crisp, crunchiest in storage.

Corn Meal Cookies

3 cups flour, sifted
1 cup corn meal
1 cup shortening
2 eggs
1½ cups sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon lemon extract
1 teaspoon nutmeg
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup raisins

Cream shortening well. Add sifted and measured sugar and beat until creamy. Add eggs and beat until light and fluffy, then add lemon extract and blend. Sift flour and measure. Combine all dry ingredients and sift into creamed mixture. Add raisins; roll into balls the size of a walnut. Place on a greased cookie sheet.

Dip bottom of small glass into cornmeal and flatten tops. Bake 10 to 12 minutes in 400 degree F. oven until edges are golden brown.

New, Clean Paint Brush

Bright, warm spring-like days bring on the urge to get the garden planted, to work in the flower beds and to refinish home and furniture with clean new colors. If painting is one of the jobs you plan, here's an idea for preparing a new paint brush.

You know a new paint brush almost always has a few loose hairs. These should be removed before you use it. The best way to do this is to rub the bristles back and forth across the hand to remove both dust and loose hairs.

Then wash the new brush in a cleaning fluid and you will start the job not only with a new brush but an entirely clean one.

Serve Foods Artistically

You hear a lot about serving nutritious foods to your family. And every homemaker has to consider the economy of foods to keep in her food budget.

But don't let your only considerations be for a meal that is only nutritious, economical and good to eat. It must have eye appeal as well as taste appeal.

Choose foods that contrast in color, size and shape. Serve crisp and soft foods at the same time. Be sure that hot foods are served hot and cold foods served cold.

Prune Flowering Shrubs

Crepe Myrtle, vitex, butterfly bush, althea and anthony waterer spirea should be pruned now. They will still flower this summer if you prune and shape them at this season. Any spring-flowering shrubs may be cut back and shaped just as soon as the flowers fade.

Broadleaf and narrowleaf evergreens may be pruned during March. Use orchard pruners or hand pruners to cut back evergreens. Leave plants as natural looking as possible.

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Nearly \$50,000 Back Wages Paid By Mississippi Firms, Is Report

Jackson, Miss., March 5.—Figures released here today reveal that 80 Mississippi employers agreed to pay back wages totaling \$49,271 to 683 employees in order to correct underpayments found during Wage-Hour investigations made in the 8-months' period just ended.

Homer E. Krog, Regional Director of the U. S. Labor Department's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions, made the information available. He said the principal cause of the payments was failure to comply with the overtime provisions of the Federal Wage and Hour Law which applies to employees engaged in interstate commerce and in the production of goods for commerce.

Total payments of this type for the Southeastern region of the Wage and Hour Division were \$467,284, made by 777 employers to 5577 employees. States in the region are South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama and Mississippi.

The new \$1 minimum wage, in effect since March 1, may cause back wage payments to rise rapidly, according to Krog. He said there was an increase of 857 per cent in the number of Mississippi employees due money for minimum-rate violations in the first full fiscal year after the 1950 increase from 40 to 75 cents. Payments due workers here jumped \$58,785 in the same period.

"As we have found most violations are caused by misunderstanding or honest misapplication of the law's requirements," he stated, "we have gone to great lengths to furnish the public with complete information on the new dollar minimum."

"Investigators and other officials have met with civic and business clubs to discuss coverage and exemption problems. Virtually all covered employers have been furnished with Wage-Hour posters which tell about the new rate and the law's general provisions."

Another step taken to promote compliance with the new minimum is the increase in Mississippi investigators from 7 to 11, he said. Information about the law can be secured from the Jackson field office, 145 E. Amite Street.
