Ban On Beer Passed By Legislature

"Any person found possessing any beer or wine of any quantity whatsoever shall, on conviction, be imprisoned not more than ninety (90) days or fined not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or both such fine and imprisonment."

The above statement is copied from House Bill No. 153 of the current session of the Mississippi Legislature. The law was passed and signed and went into effect on the 21st day of February, this year.

If any county in the state wants legal beer an election must be ordered by the Board of Supervisors after a petition has been signed by 20 per cent of the qualified electors of the county. According to the Act, no beer of an alcoholic content more than 4 per cent by weight will be permissible in the state. Any county cannot vote on the legalization of beer, its manufacture, transportation or possession, more often than once every five years.

Stennis Makes Comments On Document Endorsed By Southern Lawmaking Group

Senator John Stennis, in a release to this newspaper, says: "For your information, here are the quotations from our 'Declaration of Constitutional Principles' signed by nineteen senators and 77 members of the House of Representatives, which I consider the strongest and most important in the statement issued here in Washington on Monday, March 12, by our Southern group."

The quotations from the document signed by the senators and congressmen condemning the action of the Supreme court in ruling against segregation in public schools follows:

"... This unwarranted exercise of power by the Court, contrary to the Constitution, is creating chaos and confusion in the States principally affected. It is destroying the amicable relations between the white and negro races that have been created through 90 years of patient effort by the good people of both races. It has planted hatred and suspicion where there has been heretofore friendship and understanding.

"Without regard to the consent of the governed, outside agitators are threatening immediate and revolutionary changes in our public school systems. If done, this is certain to destroy the system of public education in some of the States.

"With the gravest concern for the explosive and dangerous conditions created by this decision and inflamed by outside meddlers:

"We reaffirm our reliance on the Constitution as the fundamental law of the land.

"We decry the Supreme Court's encroachments on rights reserved to the states and to the people, contrary to established law and to the Constitution.

"We commend the motives of those states which have declared the intention to resist forced integration by any lawful means.

"We appeal to the States and to the people who are not directly affected by these decisions to consider the constitutional principles involved against the time when they too, on issues vital to them, may be victims of judicial encroachment.

"Even though we constitute a minority in the present Congress, we have full faith that a majority of the American people believe in the dual system of government which has enabled us to achieve our greatness and will in time demand that the reserved rights of the States and of the people be made secure against judicial usurpation.

"We pledge ourselves to use all lawful means to bring about a reversal of this decision which is contrary to the Constitution and to prevent the use of force in its implementation.

"In this trying period, as we all seek to right this wrong, we appeal to our people not to be provoked by the agitators and troublemakers invading our States and to scrupulously refrain from disorder and lawless acts."

Senator Stennis further states: "I have the following additional comment:

"Even though on previous occasions some individuals, notably Abraham Lincoln, have directed stronger criticism at the Supreme Court and its decisions, for the first time in our national history almost 100 members of the Congress have jointly signed a severe indictment of the Court for its judicial legislation and usurpation of power.

"The document is deliberately and carefully drawn.

"As a member of the Committee drafting this statement, while the statement was being prepared I personally consulted with each of the nineteen Senators signing it and I know it had the most serious consideration of each of them.

"I consider the statement highly significant in national affairs. Twice the Court is directly charged with a decision 'contrary to the Constitution.' To charge the Court with acting contrary to the Constitution is to say it went beyond its Constitutional power and brands the decision as unconstitutional.

"There is added significance in the fact that this Declaration was signed by nineteen Senators. Even though now in a minority, we can exert power as to the confirmation of any new members of the Court and will make a sustained drive against further judicial usurpation of power."

Have you ever been hungry? So hungry you dreamed about food. If you every have, you will recall that the only thing that really mattered with you at that time was to get some food. You didn't care what Congress did, nor were you interested in next years model automobile, the only thing that interested you was food.

Most of us have never been really hungry. We never give a thought to the fact that famine could sweep our land, and thousands of our people die of starvation, while the rest of us go hungry. It is difficult for us to conceive of the idea that such a thing could happen here in this United States of America. We hear much about surplus farm products that depress the market. We hear little of the truth that, even though this is at present the actual situation, it is temporary. In a relative short time it may be difficult for the farmers of this country to supply the needs of our people.

Your own great grandchild could easily be the victim of famine and perish for the lack of food. Why is this true? What is gradually and slowly bringing such a condition about? There may be many factors, but the main ones are: (1) our population is increasing enormously each year. (2) Our acres of land suited for the production of food are getting less

and less each year, and (3) on the whole these remaining acres are becoming poorer each year.

Unless there is a great war to depopulate vast areas of the world, or even our country, we can easily be in trouble within the next 30 years, and very serious trouble within the next 60 years.

The problem is national in scope. It is not a problem that can be

solved by the landowners alone. Since all the people are concerned, all should help to conserve our soil and see to it that it is used to the best advantage.

The dollars wisely spent on land-use today may keep your great grandchild from being hungry 60 or 75 years from now. Remember that stocks, bonds, and money are worthless to a starving man or woman.

There may be those who put their faith in the scientists and synthetic pills. We of the USDA Soil Conservation Service put out faith in the land and the people who farm it.

March 18th to 23rd is Land-use Emphasis week. Let's observe it. But let us determine to make every week Land-use Emphasis week, and support all who truly and earnestly want to conserve our land.

During January
Decreased Slightly**

State College Miss.—(Special) General Business activity in the Corinth district for January was down 1 per cent as compared with January 1955, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station at Mississippi State College.

District indicator changes were bank debits, down 7 per cent; money orders issued, up 8 per cent; postal receipts, down 19 per cent; and telephones in service, up 6 per cent.

Corinth reported business activity down 3 per cent, as compared with January a year ago. Indicator changes were bank debits down 7 per cent; money orders issued, up 15 per cent; postal receipts, down 24 per cent, and telephones in service, up 5 per cent.

Data from Booneville were incomplete, reporting only telephones in service up 7 per cent. Business activity in Iuka was down 2 per cent. Indicator changes were money orders issued, down 9 per cent; postal receipts, up 4 per cent; telephones in service, up 7 per cent.

Business activity in Ripley was up 8 per cent. Indicator changes were money orders issued, up 6 per cent; postal receipts, up 6 per cent; telephones in service, up 11 per cent.

1/3 cup peanut butter
2 eggs beaten

2 tablespoons melted fat

Sift dry ingredients together and then work in the peanut butter. Combine beaten egg and milk and pour into dry ingredients all at once. Add the melted fat and stir just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full and bake in hot oven (400 degrees) 25 minutes. Makes 12 large muffins.

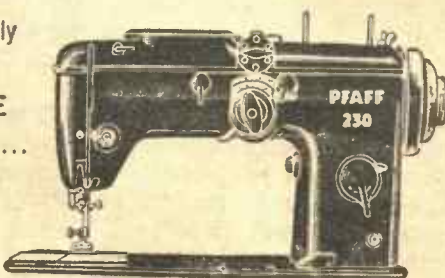

County Feed Requirements

per cow broken down in acreage in the following manner:
1. Improved permanent pasture 2½ acres per cow.
2. Temporary winter pasture ½ acre per cow.
3. Temporary summer pasture ½ acre per cow.
4. If you use sorghum for your silage .15 acre per cow.
5. Oats for grain ½ acre per cow.

6. Corn for grain 1/3 acre per cow.
You will note we counted the ½ acre for winter and summer grazing only once as we figure you can double crop this acre, thereby taking care of temporary grazing.
In addition to the pasture each cow needs 3000 pounds of silage, fifteen bushels of oats, fifteen bushels corn, 2,000 pounds of good

quality hay plus 500 pounds of concentrate.
If you will plan your feed program you will be able to show a fair profit at prevailing milk prices.
For each cow that you have in your herd you must figure on using 4.40 acres of land or else buy sufficient quantity of feed in the sack to make up for the difference.

The County PMA Committee has recently approved a pasture program for permanent pasture where you can add Kobe Lespedeza to a grass sod provided you use at least eighty pounds of available plant food per acre plus 15 pounds of Kobe Lespedeza. You can get the minimum amount required by using 1,250 pounds Basic Slag per acre. This would cost you .40c per hundred under the PMA program. I would add 100 pounds of Ammonium Nitrate to the acre in addition to the Basic Slag.
Did you know that each farmer must produce enough food and fiber to feed and clothe 18 other people. If present population rates continue, it will not be long before he will have to produce for 25 others.

Cotton Fertilization
Bale per acre cotton takes out of the soil 72 pounds of nitrogen, and 48 pounds each of phosphorus and potash.

By following approved cotton production practices, one pound of nitrogen will return eight pounds of seed cotton (up to 80 pounds of nitrogen applied). \$1 invested in fertilizer for cotton returns \$4 to \$6 on the investment in six months.

Fertilizer should be placed deep in the soil, the recommended depth is 4 to 6 inches below the drill of seed.

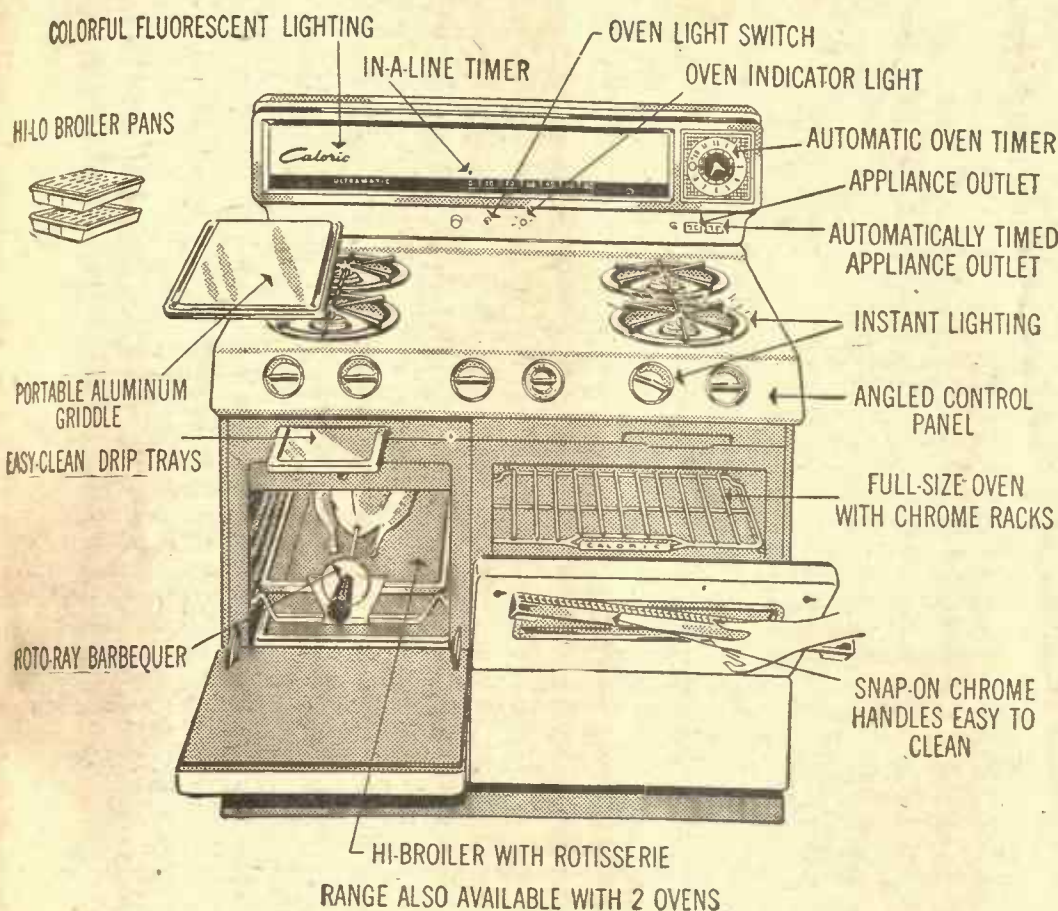
Cotton land that has acid should be limed for best results.

Cotton growers should make efficient plans for use of fertilizer, buy the fertilizer and haul it to the farm and have it ready for use. Do not wait until the last minute to check up on fertilizing and planting machinery. . . make sure it is ready to use when you need it.

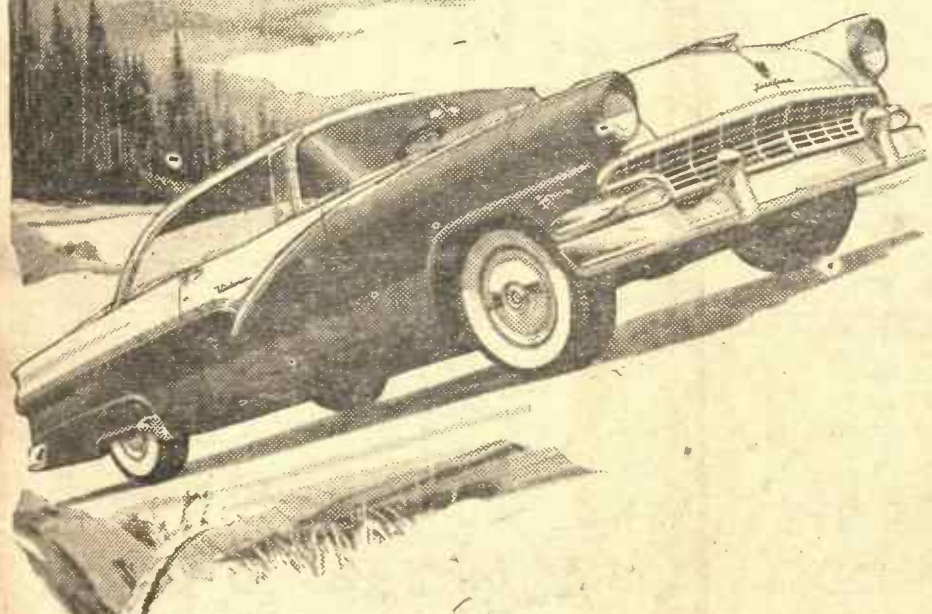

In The News

By Congressman Abernethy
The stately old Willard Hotel, a Washington landmark, was the scene of a most disgusting spectacle last week. Before a gathering of 1,500 giggling, hissing, booing, yapping delegates to the Assembly on Civil Rights, the National Chairmen of the Democratic and Republican Parties debated the question of which party had done the most for the negro.

Except for those who have the strongest of cast iron stomachs, the demonstration was positively nauseating. Applause was attuned to the degree with which each debater berated and belittled the South.

The Democrat contended that the greatest advancements of the negro were attained under Roosevelt and Truman. Delegates evidenced their approval with thundering applause. When it appeared that he had about won the point, the Republican countered with the argument that the "greatest negro advancement since Abraham Lincoln has been under Eisenhower." Again the old Willard rocked from reverberating applause. Back and forth the verbal gladiators battled, making ridiculous spectacles of themselves.

The negro audience loved every minute of it. They cheered, hissed, hooted and egged the speakers on. Seldom has any performance been matched for noise, gestures, claims and denunciations.

Actually, this was the opening of the 1956 political campaign which will be very largely geared against the South.

Kicking the South around has come to be so accepted and com-

monplace that even some southern politicians, with presidential, vice-presidential and other political aspirations, now dodge opportunities to defend their southern homeland and its traditions. The only active southern presidential candidate now embraces integrated schools and civil rights legislation and has staffed his campaign office with a former NAACP official. If the candidate has the support of a single southern Senator or Congressman outside of his home state, the fact is unknown. But he has made real progress among northern negroes.

There isn't much the South can do with Republicans. It can, however, do something within its own household, the Democratic Party. A few weeks ago we reported the absolute lack of position the South has within the ruling Republican regime in Washington. Within the ruling ranks of the Democratic Party its standing is not quite so bad; but it is far from good and certainly not in keeping with the degree of southern support.

The noisy Civil Rights can be toned down and school desegregation can be defeated if the South will do as the racial minorities do—organize, stand together and fight back. Leadership is sorely lacking in some states.

The Willard debate clearly indicates that the fight is on. The good year 1956 may very well be the last chance the South will have to make its unified power felt within the ranks of its own household—the Democratic Party.

to improve equipment for applying anhydrous ammonia.

Among the latest devices developed by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station are two new spring-tripping arrangements and a combination applicator which handles ammonia and solid fertilizers at the same time.

Normally when solid fertilizer is applied with liquid or gaseous material, two applicators are required. The solid is put down on one side of the row and the ammonia on the other. Stalks and trash bridge across the two applicators and cause trouble in the field which the new combination applicator eliminates by operating on only one side of the row.

A novel feature of the combination applicator is a small wheel which prevents clogging of the solid fertilizer. As the applicator moves forward, this little wheel turns, forcing the fertilizer out at the bottom.

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scriptures: Luke 22:1-71. Devotional Reading: 1 Corinthians 11:23-26.

Lord's Supper

Lesson for March 18, 1956

CHRISTIANS are divided about many things; but they are all one in the Lord's Supper. "What?" some one will ask. "Don't some churches refuse to let members of any churches but their own partake of the Communion with them? Don't different churches have different explanations of what this sacrament means? Don't various denominations observe it in various ways? How can you say all Christians are united in the Lord's Supper?"

We Think of Him

It is true, there are seemingly endless variations in the way the Lord's Supper is observed. Even the name is not always the same, some preferring to call it the Eucharist, others Holy Communion. There are also theologians' debates about it. But plain Christians do unite here even when they may not be quite aware of it. For there are three facts that are always true of this sacred observance, however or wherever it is held. First of all, in the Lord's Supper we think of Christ. It is possible to go even to a Christian church and not hear very much about Jesus Christ on that particular day. (Jesus' own teaching was not always about himself.) But it is not possible to go into a church where the Lord's Supper is being taken by the people, without being reminded directly of Christ. Every Christian has heard the words many times—"my body," "my blood," "in remembrance of me." Here are bread and wine, but every worshiper knows that these are not simple ordinary refreshment. They are symbols and signs of Christ, his actual suffering and death on the cross. Whatever the church may be, its members always think of Christ when they take Communion.

We Find Him

There is something more than thinking about Jesus and his sacrifice, when we take Communion. In this sacrament we find Him. It is quite true, different churches have different official explanations about how we find Christ here. But from "High Church" to "Low," in "Liberal" and "Conservative," in Catholic and Protestant congregations alike, if you could ask the people as they come out of doors again, "What did that service mean to you?" It might be that some would hardly know what to say, for it is always possible to go through the motions without really thinking what one is doing. But those who had entered wholeheartedly into the service, who had come "in love and charity" and in faith, would all tell you about the same thing: "Christ came very near to me." If Christ seems just as far away after the Lord's Supper as before, then there has been something wrong about us. That is why the Roman Catholic church will not admit any one to communion if he has not been to Confession first. That is why in many Protestant churches the people are warned to abstain from Communion if they harbor malice or ugly feeling toward their neighbors.

We Share Him

If it is true that in the Lord's Supper we find the Lord himself, it should be true—and happily it is so—that afterwards life should go on at a higher level than before. The Lord's Supper is less like a doorway leading from one room to another just like it, than it is like a gateway across a boundary from one country to another. Christ comes to us in the Sacrament, but not as a fleeting guest. If we are serious as we take the bread and wine and think about all this in the quiet of prayer, we will so enter into the spirit of Christ himself that we shall re-dedicate ourselves in his service. It is a kind of parody on Christian ideas to think of Christ's sacrifice as alone and by itself. His cross must be followed by other crosses. His outpoured life must be shared by others who are willing to pour their lives out in turn. And it is this, again, which unites all the Christians who in their many varied fashions have taken this Lord's Supper with devoted hearts. For there is a family resemblance among all real Christians, whatever their church-label may be. And the resemblance goes back to the same Christ, who has shared himself with every Christian everywhere and always who has taken this Bread and Cup.

Keep Social Security Card Available

The importance of having your social security card where it is always available cannot be over-emphasized," says Mrs. Mary King Temple, District Manager of the Sheffield, Ala. Social Security office.

When money is deposited in a bank, the depositor is identified by use of a pass book and the entry of the deposit on a ledger sheet. Social Security operates in a similar way. The wage earner is identified by name and social security number. Whenever your employer sends in a report of your wages, he needs to show your name and your social security number.

If either your name or social security number on his report does not agree with social security records, you may not get credit for those earnings. Remember that the amount of social security benefits payable to you when you retire, or to your family if you die, is based on the earnings on your own account.

You should always show your social security card to your employer so that he can copy your name and number exactly as they appear on the card. If you depend on your memory, you might give a wrong number.

Although the original account number never changes, a change of name, for any reason, should be promptly reported to the social security office. You will get a new name—but the same old number.

Most self-employed people are now entitled to social security credit, if earnings are at least \$400 in a year. These earnings are reported for social security purposes on the regular income tax return. But if the social security number is left off, they cannot be credited to your account.

Your social security card is the key to your old-age and survivors insurance account. If you lose it, be sure to see your nearest social security office right away for a duplicate.

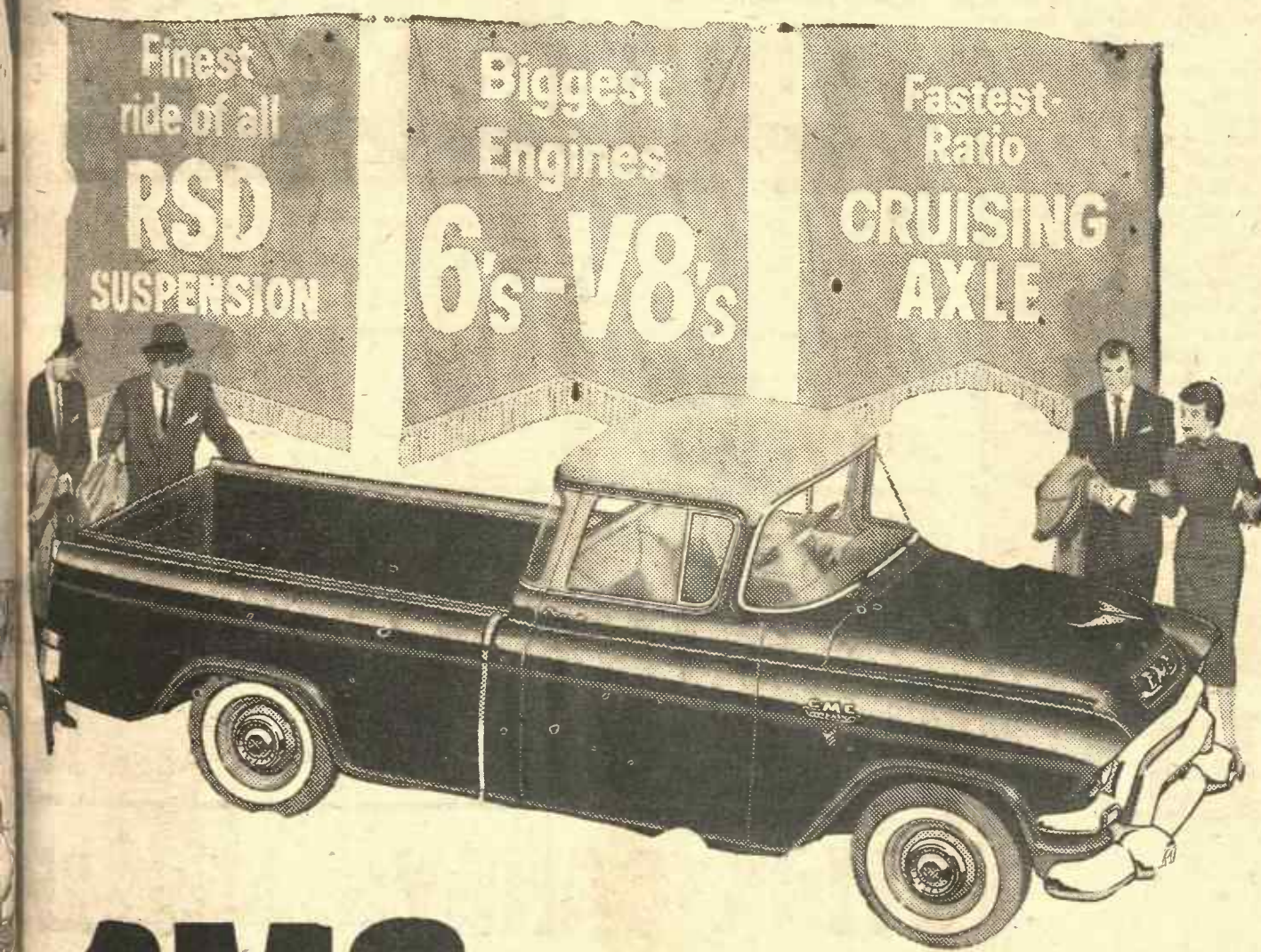
