Everyone Urged To Be Extremely Careful Of Fire Burning This Month

In Tishomingo county, according to Area Forester J. P. Shackelford, 4 fires burned 19 acres during the month of February. This figure compares with 14 fires and 40 acres burned during February of last year.

Shackelford urges everyone to be extremely careful during the month of March, a period noted for high winds, when using fire in any way. He requests that anyone planning to burn fields, ditch banks, brush heaps, debris or anything of that nature to take the necessary precautions to prevent fire from spreading. Carelessness, he adds, could be very costly to both the person doing the burning and his neighbor. Shackelford further requests that anyone planning such burning wait until soon after a rain when the material is dry enough to burn and inform himself or the Mississippi Forestry Commission dispatching tower at

telephone 5231. He said that by giving this information it would help the dispatcher to know where to expect smoke and may mean quicker suppression of a wild fire.

The blooms of early spring bulbs are beautiful and always seem to fade and die too soon. To be sure that you have your early spring flowers next year, you must care for the bulbs.

As soon as tops of narcissus, daffodil and other spring-blooming bulbs have started to brown and die back, dig them and place in a cool dry place so they may "cure."

For blooms later in the year, divide cannas and replant, setting them 2 feet apart in rich soil.

Start planting the first row of glads in late April and plant another row in 2 weeks. By staggering plantings, you'll be assured of a good supply of flowers.

Good Eating

As you plan the meals for your family, you include each day some foods from the group of potatoes and other vegetables and fruit. They may be raw, cooked, frozen, canned or dried fruits and vegetables.

To be sure that your family gets all of the food value from these foods as you prepare and serve them, you will want:

1. To give them fruits and vegetables raw whenever possible.
2. To wash foods thoroughly, but quickly. Prepare shortly before serving. Do not let them stand in water.
3. Cook quickly in a small amount of water in a covered pan, only

4. Be sure to save juices left from cooked fruits for beverages or to use in making gelatin salads or desserts.

Heel Marks

Black rubber heel marks can be removed from floors by rubbing gently with a clean cloth dipped in wax. Use either liquid or paste wax. Then let it dry and buff lightly.

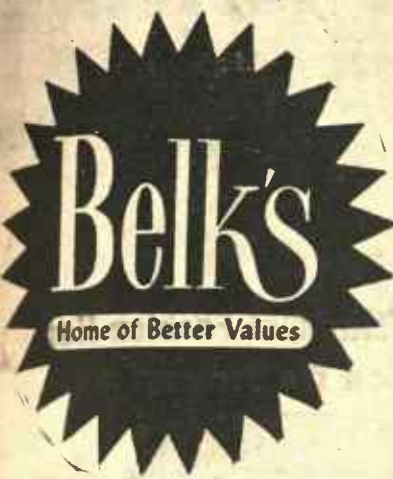

June 15 Deadline To Enter Corn Contest

State College, Miss. — Any Mississippi farmer may enter the 1956 Mississippi Five-Acre Corn Contest, which includes awards totaling \$4,600 in divisions for white and Negro farmers.

June 15 is the deadline for filing entries at county agent's office.

The program was approved early in the year by the State Agricultural Coordinating Council, representing all agencies assisting farm families. The cash awards are offered by the fertilizer mixers and the corn seed producers serving the state.

The Mississippi Bankers Association will present a certificate to each contestant averaging 75 or more bushels of corn per acre.

Dr. Clay Lyles dean and director, Division of Agriculture, Mississippi State College, announces the program at the request of the Coordinating Council and the sponsors.

"Plant adapted hybrids on good corn land, fertilize properly, and let's make 50 bushels or more per acre on every planted acre," Dr. Lyle urges.

The state's average yield for 1955 was an all-time high of 30 bushels of corn per acre.

"We must grow more of our own grain for feed if we expect to successfully develop our livestock to more nearly balance our crops production," the agricultural leader pointed out. "I'm convinced that our future agricultural prosperity is tied closely to livestock."

Corn fits well into the systems of almost all farms. It is basic in livestock rations, furnishes food for the family, and any extra can be sold.

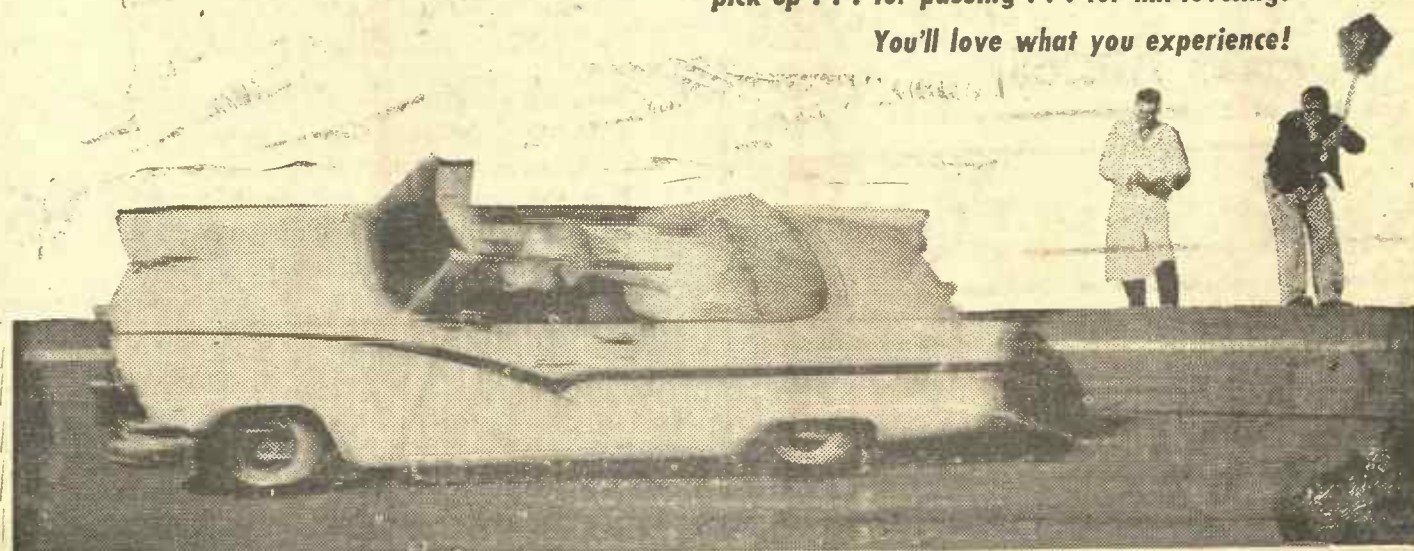
In the division of the contest for white farmers, the state is divided into three districts, the Delta, North Mississippi and South Mississippi. Nine awards are offered in each district, these being \$300, \$250, \$200, \$150, \$100, \$50, \$25, \$15 and \$10.

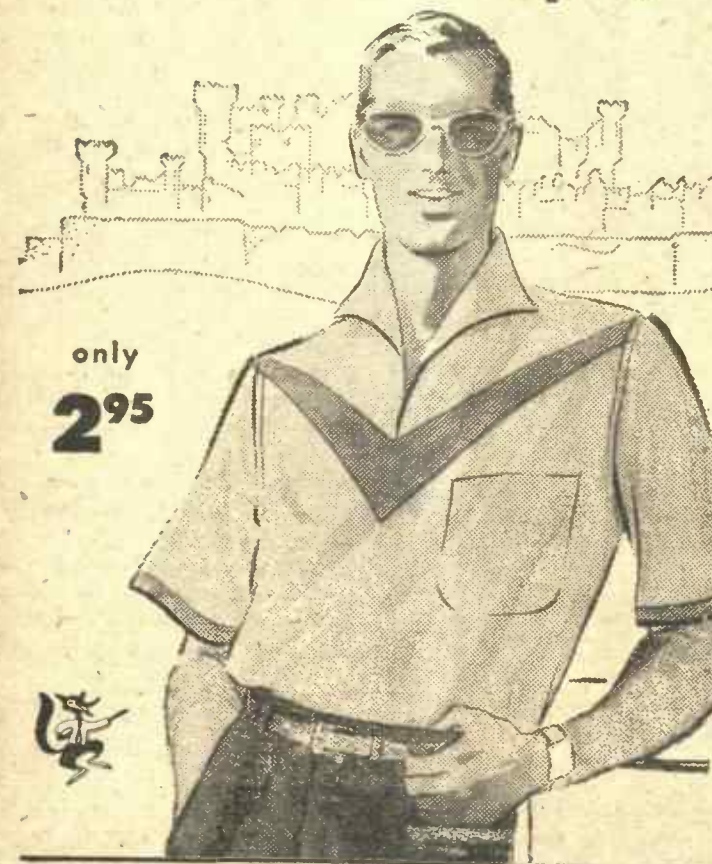

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
BIBLE SPEAK—Plunkett 2-1
Background Scripture: Luke 23:1-56.
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 53.

Christ Suffered
Lesson for March 25, 1956

WHENEVER we ask, "Why?" about anything that happens, we can mean the question in either one of two ways. Sometimes we mean both. Perhaps we mean to ask, "What were the events that led up to this one? What were the causes or forces back of this event, pushing it, so to speak, out of the Not-Yet into the Now-and-Here?" Or perhaps we mean to ask, "For what purpose did this event take place? If it was a means to an end, what was the end? Did any man, or did God, have a purpose in bringing this event to pass?"

If we ask, "Why did Christ suffer?" We can mean it in the first way mentioned just now. In that case, the answer is very easy to see, or the answers rather, for there was no one reason why he was crucified. Jesus suffered because Pilate was a coward; if the governor had stood up for what he knew was right, Jesus might have been saved from an unjust sentence. Jesus suffered because the Pharisees were jealous and had found no other way of getting rid of their most troublesome critic. He suffered because he was courageous; if Christ himself had been timid, he could have avoided Calvary simply by keeping quiet and leaving the country.

He Died for Our Sins
All such reasons it is the business of history to ferret out, and it is of some importance to know them. But the other question is not so easy. No historian, as a historian, can see it. Only the eye of faith, (which may indeed belong to historians too) can see the great pattern into which this dreadful event fits, this dreadful event of the death by torture of the best person who ever walked this earth. We could not have guessed it. We need God's Word to tell us what it means. What purpose did God have in mind? What was Jesus' own intention? We know what Jesus said the night before, to his disciples as he gave them the cup: This, he said, was the cup of the New Covenant, "in my blood," poured out "for you." We know what he had said months before (Mark 10:45), that he came to "give his life a ransom for many." Now the Bible tells of a Christ who was totally, from his soul's core, at one with God the Father. What Christ intended, God intended. Christ's death was for a purpose which God had had (as the Bible expresses it) from before the foundation of the world. It was not for his own sake, it was for the sake of his friends. Even more, it was for many who were not his friends. "While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us," Paul says (Rom. 5:8). "He is the expiation for our sins, and not for ours only, but for the sins of the whole world," John says (1 John 2:2).

How Can This Be?
Many people fight shy of this great truth. Sometimes they are slow to believe it just because it seems too much to believe. Here I am, a single human being on a small planet. Would the Creator of the Universe actually go—not to trouble only, but to agony and defeat, for my sake? Well, if a person thinks that way, we must admit to him that it is indeed a miracle, the greatest conceivable. But there is another reason why people are shy about believing that Christ could have died for our sins, for anybody's sin. How can one man's suffering atone for another man's sins? There are two answers to that, which are part of one answer. One is that Christ was not just a man, he was the Godman, "God-made-man." The other is that he identified himself with sinners, with the worst and weakest, the race of man.

His Death Was in Character
Jesus' death at Calvary was not out of line with his life. If there he "took the rap for sinners" as Dr. Horner puts it, this was not a new and sudden shift in his life-purpose. From the beginning of his service in this world he had been so closely identified with sinning men that he was called in scorn "friend of sinners" and indeed at last executed as a criminal. No wonder Paul can say, "He who knew no sin was made to be sin for us." Yet this remains all over our heads unless we too identify our own selves with him. To say "He is the Savior of the world" is not enough. The final step is to discover, "He is my Savior. For He took my place."

County Agent news

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Use Certified Seed
There is an adequate supply of good certified seed of most field crops available this year. These seeds are produced by certified seed growers in Miss. and are being sold at reasonable prices.
The biggest and best market for certified seed in Mississippi is right here at home. The cost of planting good, pure seed of known quality and origin is not high in comparison with unknown quality seed.
Mississippi certified seed can be recommended to all farmers. Mississippi certified seed growers are putting out the best seed available. They are doing a real service to Mississippi farmers in supplying dependable seed.
If more farmers would use certified seed, producers would not have to go out of state to find a market for the certified seed.
It is just good sense for a farmer to invest a little additional money in good seed. The practice of planting good seed, is as much a part of successful farming as proper fertilization, insect control, use of good machinery and good farm management.

Dairying
Most authorities agree that we have to approach 5,000 pounds of milk per cow to make dairying profitable. This can be done by following these suggestions.
First we have good cows. Then we have to keep records on these good cows, just to make sure that they are as good as we think they are. Cull heavily. Get all animals that won't pay their way out of the herd.
Then let's take care of our cows. Here are some recommendations for taking care of the dairy cows.
Feed good quality along with silage to producing cows.
Control parasites on cattle of all ages.
Make drinking water available at all times to all cows and make sure that it is fresh and clean.
Keep breeding, calving, feed and production records on all cows and feed balanced rations according to production.
Breed for fall and winter production.
If cows are grades, get the horns off. Don't let them grow on heifer calves intended for replacements.
Give plenty of bedding to protect udders and produce cleaner milk.

April 15 Deadline File Form 2031 Clergymen

April 15, 1956, is a very important date for clergymen who desire credit for their 1955 earnings under social security. Mary King Temple, district manager of the Sheffield, Alabama, office announced that is the last date for filing Form 2031 (Waiver Certificate) with the Director of Internal Revenue.

enue in order to have 1955 earnings counted for social security protection.

The Waiver Certificate is effective for a taxable year only if it is filed on or before the due date for filing the income tax report of that year. That means that those ministers or members of religious orders who want to begin earning their social security credits in 1955 must file the certificate on or before April 15, 1956.

Under the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act, duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed clergymen, Christian Science Practitioners, and old-age and survivors

insurance protection like that of self-employed persons but on an individual elective basis. This election does not involve the church or institution in any way, Mrs. Mary Temple continued.

These individuals have approximately two years after 1954 or after they have \$400 or more of net earnings, any part of which came from religious activities to decide whether or not they wish to participate in the program.

Those who do not elect to become covered by the program within the two-year period cannot later have their earnings from their religious duties covered by the law. Those who do elect to participate cannot later withdraw.

L. E. Skinner Plans To Set Coastal Bermuda

Mr. L. E. Skinner of Midway community plans to set (3) acres of Coastal Bermuda grass in the southeast corner of pasture lying across the road in front of his house.

The area to be set is part bottom, and part hill land. Most of the land involved is of above average fertility.

Mr. Skinner plans to set the coastal bermuda grass in rows and cultivate, to control other grass and weeds the first year.

Excellent results have been obtained from coastal bermuda in some sections of Mississippi, but this plant is still on trial in Tishomingo county where a number of farmers have tried it with poor success. Claims are made that under favorable conditions this plant uses nitrogen much more efficiently than do other pasture plants. There are records where more than ten (10) tons of dry hay has been produced in one season from an acre of highly fertilized, well managed coastal bermuda sod.

Efficient land-use which holds the soil and stores water is the theme of the Tennessee River SCD commissioners. A good sod of coastal bermuda will do all these things.

Mr. Skinner hopes that he will be successful in growing coastal bermuda grass on his farm. He hopes this plant will help him enlarge his farm, not be adding more acres but, by producing more pasture and hay per acre. He would like to have a pasture that will carry two (2) cows per acre instead of needing two (2) acres per cow.

Other farmers who plan to set Coastal Bermuda grass this spring are Gene Glover of Camp Ground community and Desmond Deaton whose farm is on Mackey's Creek

west of Tishomingo.

Any farmer interested in establishing Coastal Bermuda grass this spring can receive information on how to establish this plant from your local SCS technicians Farmers Co-op Building in Iuka.
