Changes In The Miss. Employment Security Law

Prior to 1956 the Mississippi Employment Security Law covered employers that used eight or more employees in any twenty weeks in a calendar year. Beginning January 1, 1956 the law covers all employers in business for a minimum of twenty weeks in a calendar year. The tax is payable on the first \$3,000 paid of an employee in the year.

Reports are due and payable quarterly within the month following the close of the quarters. The quarters end March 31, June 30, September 30, and December 31. The standard rate of tax applicable under the Law is 2.7 per cent, or \$27.00 per \$1,000 in wages. A unit may be eligible for a reduced rate of tax provided it has been in business for a minimum of three years. To be eligible for a reduced rate in 1956 employment must have started at least in the September quarter of 1952. There are five years of experience which will be used. The Law requires that records of this employment must have been maintained by the firm and be available for inspection. The modified rate will be based on the average percentage decrease of the wages in the qualifying period. The Commission's Field Representative, M. M. Bennett, is located in the Employment office in Iuka and his work area covers the counties of Tishomingo, Alcorn, Lee, Prentiss and Itawamba. You come within the provisions of the Mississippi Employment Security Law you should contact him for information and assistance which may need in complying with the terms.

Waterfowl Work Planned For Pickwick Area

The State Game and Fish Commission will soon begin initial waterfowl development activities on Pickwick Reservoir in Tishomingo county, according to an announcement made today by Wade Creekmore, director of Conservation. The Commission has entered into a license agreement with the Tennessee Valley Authority controlling agency that permits water fowl development activities to be carried out below the 423 foot contour line on reservoir lands.

Plans are being formulated whereby the area will be developed through the use of Federal Aid Pittman-Robertson funds. Waterfowl refuge and public shooting developments will be carried out through the construction of shooting and resting ponds and some food plantings. Project acreage will be in excess of 1,000 acres with that portion of the area east of State Highway 25 designated as a refuge and that portion west of the highway developed for public hunting.

Construction plans are now being prepared in anticipation of beginning waterfowl sub-impoundment construction shortly after July 1, 1956.

An additional 90,000 doses of polio vaccine were delivered to county health departments all over the state last week, according to Dr. A. L. Gray, director of preventable disease control of the State Board of Health. This brings the total amount distributed to county health departments in Mississippi since last fall to slightly over enough for 300,000 injections.

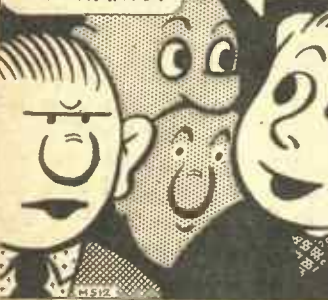

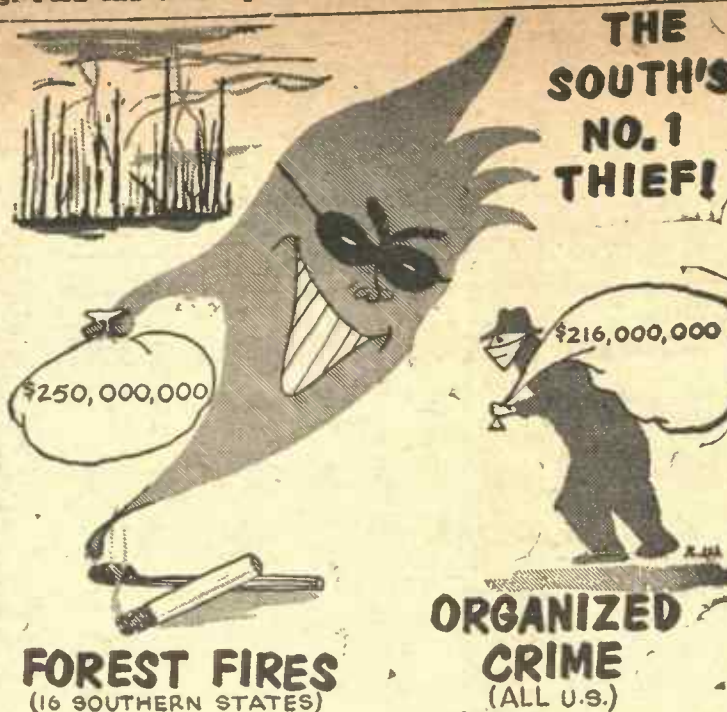

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RECORD NUMBER OF INDUSTRIES ATTRACTED TO STATE IN 1955

Industrially speaking, the year just ending was the best in Mississippi history, records of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board show.

A record 94 new and expanded manufacturing plants were chalked up for 1955, and manufacturing employment of 104,900 reached a new high since World War II.

The 94 plants recorded for 1955 exceeded by 28 the number attracted to the state in 1954, which until now had been the best year since Mississippi's industrial development program was inaugurated in 1936.

The industries attracted or expanded last year represent an investment of \$35,000,000. They will, when all are in operation, provide an estimated 10,070 new jobs and annual payrolls of \$25,175,000.

Sixty-seven of the 94 were completely new industries; 27 were expansions of existing manufacturing plants now operating in the state.

Only 25 of the new and expanded plants were financed under provisions of the BAWI law, for which Mississippians approved \$4,955,000 in bonds, just 14 per cent of the total plant investment recorded for the year.

Henry V. Allen, Jr., executive director of the Agricultural and Industrial Board which conducts Mississippi's industrial development program, attributes the increase in industries to three major factors:

1. Mississippi's excellent location with respect to expanding southern markets.
 2. The state's abundant physical resources.
 3. And, its determined human resources.

The Board's reports, covering the past six years, show that a total of 325 new or expanded plants have come into being, accounting for 36,563 new job opportunities. The new jobs represent \$91,407,500 annually in new payrolls for the state.

This new employment bill is not fully reflected in manufacturing payrolls, however, since

some of the new and expanded plants are still under construction.

According to records of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission, there were 104,900 persons employed in manufacturing in November, 1955, compared to 78,800 for November, 1949. During the same period, the only decrease in manufacturing employment occurred in saw-mill, logging and planing mill operations, a decrease of 4,400. During the same period, however, 30,500 new jobs were actually filled in other types of manufacturing.

Mississippi's 1955 manufacturing payroll amounted to an estimated \$262,500,000.

Here is the record of industrial growth for the state, year by year, since 1949:

The apparel industry last year accounted for the largest number of new plants 16, and expansions, 10. Woodworking and furniture were close behind with 13 new plants, and 7 expansions.

The metal working industry built 10 of the new plants in Mississippi in 1955, and accounted for 5 expansions. Food processing and stone, clay and ceramic industries each built 7 new plants, with expansions recorded for 3 food processing plants.

The petroleum, chemical and fertilizer industries were responsible for 4 new plants and expansions of 2 existing installations. However, the petroleum industry made the largest single plant investment of \$18,000,000 for the new Black Creek Refinery at Purvis, which actually will be spent in 1956.

The 10 remaining new plants covered a wide variety of manufactured products.

Mississippi's tremendous industrial growth in recent years was reflected in business volume

for the state during the first eight months of 1955.

The 12 per cent gain registered by the state was the largest increase for all other Southern states, and was five per cent above the national average.

The business volume chart, published by Manufacturers Record, shows that Mississippi recorded a decline in only one category, as compared to the same period in 1954. Farming volume of \$217,000,000 was off three per cent. This category for 1955, however, will undoubtedly show a healthy increase.

Based on Mississippi's industrial expansion during the past six years, A. & I. Board Director Allen predicted modestly that Mississippi should have 25,000 new industrial job opportunities developed within the next five years which will add \$62,500,000 in manufacturing payrolls annually.

Types of manufacturing most likely to grow in Mississippi, according to Mr. Allen, are in the field of chemistry, wood working and furniture, metal fabricating, and textiles.

The expansion of the economy through industrialization, as reflected in last year's business volume, has had a tremendous effect on markets and marketing in the area, Mr. Allen points out.

"Growth and expansion of markets is considered a principal reason for continued growth of manufacturing facilities in an area which is rich in raw materials."

The growth of industry also will provide job opportunities for those people who already have been displaced from farming pursuits because of mechanization and diversification of agriculture.

Per capita income in Mississippi, still the lowest in the nation, increased from \$550 in 1944 to almost \$900 in 1954.

Based on this year's industrial activity and excellent crop reports, Mr. Allen predicts that per capita income will exceed \$900 for 1955.

prosperity "around the corner". With every prediction farm income takes another dip. He should learn to stay in his office, work more and speak less.

The Benson Soil Bank plan will not increase farm income in 1956. It is a scheme to pay farmers for not farming allotted acres — for doing nothing, for permitting land to lie idle, not using it even for grazing. The pay will be equivalent to the normal net income per acre based on Benson standards.

The plan will give Benson blanket authority to write the checks and fix the time for handing them out, which will probably be just before the November elections. Still some people swell when it is suggested that Ike and Benson might play politics in timing distribution of the checks. We repeat our January statement that the number one objective of the Administration's belated farm program is to influence the farm vote with Soil Bank checks. They were not alarmed until election year rolled around. Election year! Ah, how it doeth inspire.

No, there won't be any feet-dragging by the House or its Conferees. But they will insist on two concessions; ninety per cent of parity for basics, and elimination of the opportunity to play politics with Soil Bank checks. They are in a strong position to get both.

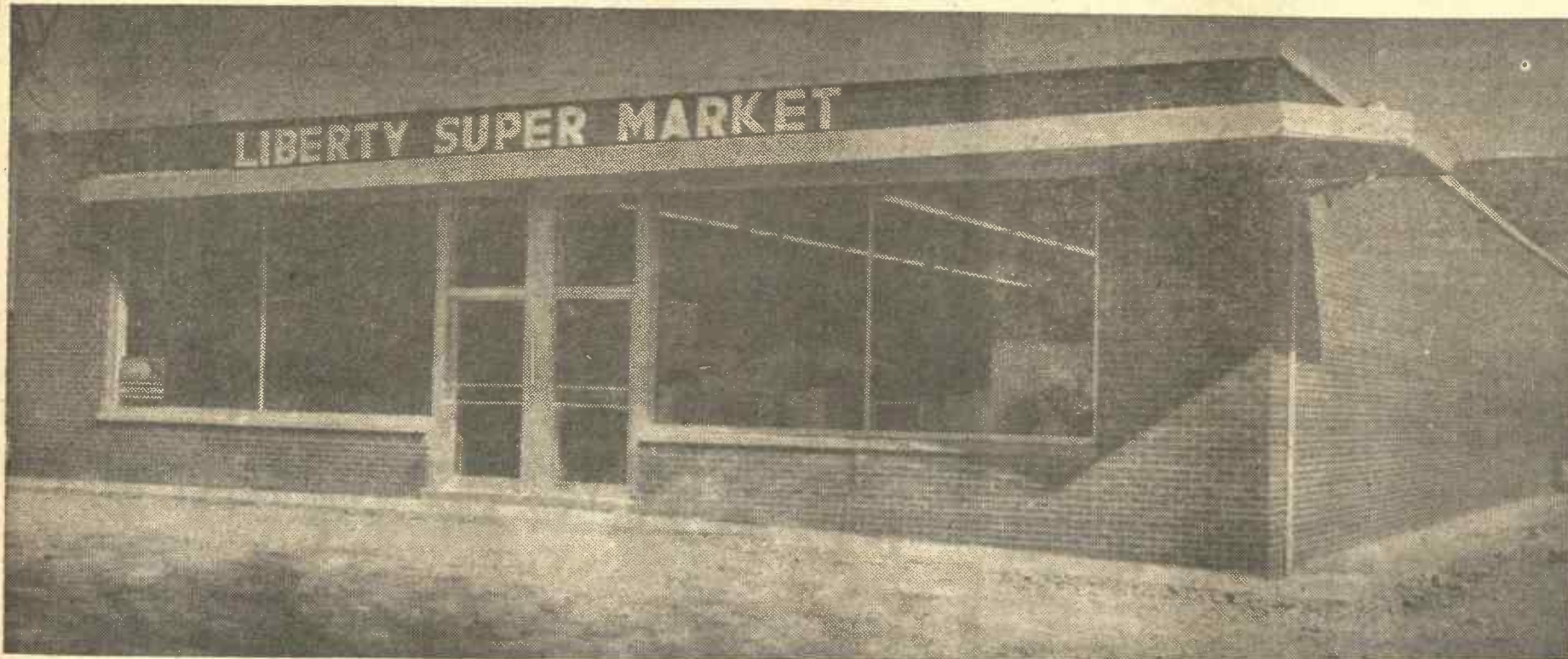

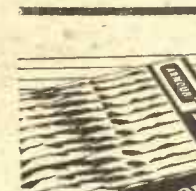

This average may not be a true picture for Northeast Mississippi since weevils were not too severe last year and there were no weevil counts taken in this area. This is an indication

Cool out eggs fast. Gathering in a wire basket will help with this.

Store the eggs in a cool place. Candle every egg.

Most eggs when laid are of high quality. It is up to you to maintain this quality.

Hornfly Control

Now is a good time to get ready to control hornflies on cattle. The flies will be here before long, and before they get here is the time to start taking steps to prevent loss.

In heavy infestation, hornflies will cause a loss of up to 25 per cent in milk production and one-half pound per day of beef gain.

These hornflies can be controlled at little cost and effort with a homemade backrubber. These backrubbers, made from barbed wire, gunny sacks and twine, enable the animals to treat themselves. Insecticides to use on the backrubbers are Methoxychlor, DDT and Lindane—Toxephene emulsion.

OUR MISSISSIPPI INCOME TAX LAW

Historical — Administration

Mississippi has had a net income tax law since March 16, 1912. Although many years have passed, there are many persons liable to pay income tax to the State of Mississippi who do not know that there is such a law, and who are wholly unacquainted with its provisions and requirements.

For that reason, it is necessary that an effort be made to try to inform them of the fact that there is such a law and of some of its requirements. This is being done through the generous and wholehearted cooperation of the press of the State of Mississippi, which has gladly donated space for this information which, it is hoped, will be welcomed by all present and future State income taxpayers. The Mississippi income tax law was first enacted on March 16, 1912. This early statute imposed a tax of 1/2 of 1% on the net income of every individual or corporation in excess of \$2,500.00. This law was repealed on April 1, 1924, and was replaced by a modernized statute, closely modeled after the Federal income tax law then in force, which has been changed little since that time. Exemptions and rates have been changed by ten sessions of the legislature since 1924. The other provisions of the statute are almost identical with those enacted thirty years ago.

The yield has varied greatly during this period. During 1932, our state income tax produced a total revenue of \$288,498.40. The high year was 1951, when the State collected income taxes in the sum of \$15,568,942.38. Our Mississippi income tax law is administered by the Commis-

sioner of Income Tax, who, by the provisions of the statute, is the Chairman of the State Tax Commission. The Commissioner, in his effort to serve all taxpayers as expeditiously as possible, has created and placed in operation nine district service offices. These offices are located in Senatobia, Tupelo, Greenwood, Columbus, Jackson, Meridian, Brookhaven, Hattiesburg and Gulfport. Anyone who wishes information relative to the State income tax law, or who desires help in determining his income tax liability, if such exists, will receive such assistance or advice by writing, telephoning, or calling at any of these offices. Every effort is made to make the taxpaying process as pleasant as possible. The employees of the State Tax Commission fully realize that their task of assisting the taxpayer is much less onerous than that of paying the tax which may be due. They also realize that the taxpayer is their employer, and while they will give advice when requested, returns which they may prepare for any taxpayer are, in the final analysis, that taxpayer's return, and the taxpayer is responsible for the figures and the information appearing thereon.

This is the first of a series of short discussions concerning our Mississippi Income Tax Law. Successive discussions will relate to: "Who Should File a Return"; "What Constitutes Gross Income?"; discussions of the deductibility of certain items such as business expenses, taxes, interest, contributions, et cetera, and some of the principal differences between the State and Federal Income Tax Laws.

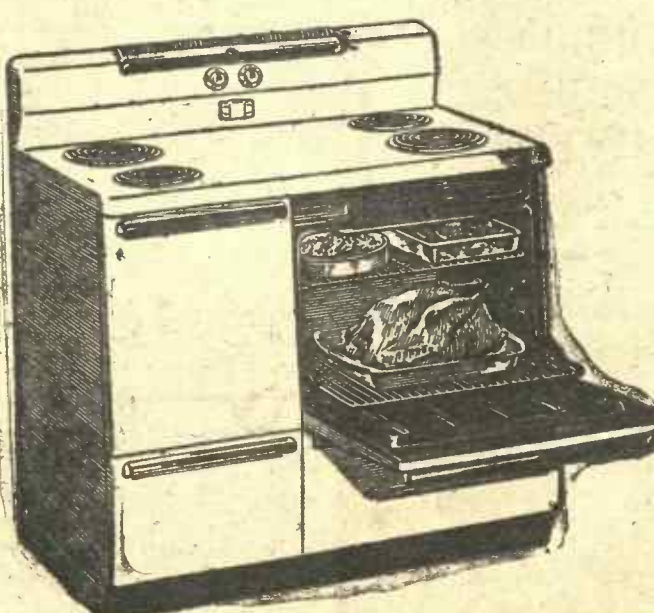

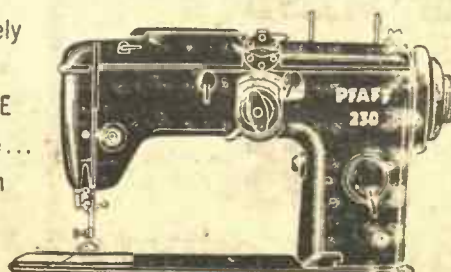

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Luke 24:1-53
Devotional Reading: I Corinthians 15:12-28

Christ Lives

Lesson for April 1, 1956

"CHRIST is risen!" The words will be said and sung many thousand times this Easter. What do they mean? Let us leave out of sight all those to whom the words mean nothing but a vestige of superstition at the worst, a picturesque symbol of something altogether different, at best. What do these words mean to those who believe them? It is possible to believe this sentence literally and firmly, and yet be as dead to their joyous meaning as if they were a weather report of 40 years ago. They Dr. Foreman portend a miracle; but yesterday's miracles may not be especially interesting. Do you feel a kind of rapture on reading about the frogs in Pharaoh's palace, the miracle-frogs? Does it help your malaria to read about the cures St. Paul did at Ephesus?

Yesterday's miracles may even be discouraging, just because they are yesterday's. The Resurrection of Christ is not in a class with any other miracle. For the early Christians it was THE event of history. The Opened Eye

It is no accident that the church says and sings, "Christ is risen" more often than "Christ rose." The Resurrection is a kind of contemporary miracle. It has many meanings, but consider three of them, in the lives of the plain people who first experienced the truth of it. Remember, the Resurrection was nothing they had been looking for, nothing they had the wit to invent. It came as a shock, it upset all their ideas, it remade their world. First of all and including everything else, the Resurrection means the presence, here and today not less than there in the dawn of Christian time, the presence of the living Christ, the present companion of all who love him. First of all, his presence there in Emmaus and indeed on the road across the hills, meant the opened eye. With him for guide, the man Cleopas and his friend saw things in the Scriptures they had never seen before. The Scriptures, like a closed gate, opened to their inward eye. Then in the supper-room as the bread was broken, again their eyes were opened, and they knew him. So the risen Christ today and always opens the eyes of men; inspired by him, we understand God's Book and God's Son as we can never do alone.

The Burning Heart

The second thing the disciples felt was a burning heart. John Calvin invented a coat of arms for himself, showing an outstretched hand and a burning heart, offered to God. It might serve as the coat of arms for all who have felt the presence of the living risen Christ. Two young men were arguing about the Resurrection, and they were greatly puzzled about it. They asked a much older man what were his reasons for believing it to be true. "Why," the old man said, "I just talked with Him this morning!"

Life gains a warmth, a flame, from contact with Christ as from no other contact possible. Jesus as a historical character excites our curiosity, our imagination. Christ as a problem in theology excites us to think. But Christ as a living presence sets life on fire. Who are the people who witness most enthusiastically about Jesus? They are the ones who will sing, "He walks with me and he talks with me..." That Jesus lived is interesting and important. That he lives, lives now, in me—that is life-changing.

The Hastening Feet

All around the world this Easter churches will be ringing with song and bright with flowers. In the most unlikely places, there are Christians. You will find that those churches in far places were started there by men and women who believed in and knew the risen Christ. If there is a church which calls itself "Christian" but does not believe in the Resurrection, its Christ is as dead as any other bygone hero. Such a church will not send many missionaries. A dead Christ hurries no man's footsteps, eases no man's burden, lights no man's hour of sorrow. Only the living Christ kindles the burning heart, opens the blind eyes, sets men's feet upon a rock, and sends them out, like the first Christians, to challenge a world in his name. The feet of the two men hastening from Emmaus were but the first of billions, eager with God's good news.

Easter Week Draws Christian Pilgrims To Old Jerusalem

Easter is the most important Christian festival of the Bible. Lands and Christians of many countries take this occasion to make a pilgrimage to Old Jerusalem in Jordan to visit scenes in Christ's life during the days preceding His Crucifixion and to celebrate His Resurrection on Easter morning nearly two thousand years ago.

During Holy Week the narrow cobblestone streets of Old Jerusalem are crowded with worshippers—Bethlehem women in long, white linen robes crisscrossed in red, Franciscan monks in brown cowls and sandals, Christian Arabs in black robes and turbans, farmers from neighboring villages, their flowing white headscarves held with a black cord. The focal point for everyone is the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, which shelters the place of the Crucifixion and the Sepulchre of Christ.

You pass through a small walled gate and cross a paved courtyard to enter the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Within the great rotunda, under a vast dome, stands the oblong shaped stone structure which houses the Tomb of Christ. Tall candles as high as the shrine itself burn before the tomb. Within is the tiny Chapel of the Angel, commemorating the spot where the angel rolled away the stone from Christ's Tomb and beyond is the inner shrine—the Tomb itself, which you stoop to enter. A simple marble slab marks this holiest shrine of Christendom.

Holy Week services take on new significance when you attend them on the very spot where the sacred events occurred. On Palm Sunday you may join the long procession of people carrying palm branches as they walk slowly and reverently from Bethphage, along the base of the Mount of Olives, past the Garden of Gethsemane, up the Hill to St. Stephen's Gate and into the walled city of Old Jerusalem. (Matthew 21:1-11) On Holy Thursday you may attend the Washing of the Feet ceremony, a service memorializing Christ's act at the Last Supper. (John 13:4-17). You may visit the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday, following the footsteps of Christ as he walked toward Calvary (Luke 23:26-33), or you may attend a quiet devotional Good Friday service near the Garden of Gethsemane. (Matthew 26:36-57). On Easter morning the sunrise service at the Garden Tomb, a rock-hewn sepulchre in an amphitheatre of trees and flowering shrubs, is an unforgettable way to observe Easter morning. Church bells of Jerusalem ring out early on Easter Sunday, summoning all to celebrate the resurrection of Christ in the church of their faith—be it Protestant, Anglican, or Catholic.

People Of The South Praise The Manifesto Of Southern Lawmakers

The people of the South are recognizing something that the members of the Supreme Court apparently do not recognize; namely, that final power in a free nation resides in the people. The people generally are reasonable—and this was a reasoned statement—but they know that when any one branch of the government oversteps its bounds, then they must take action to remedy the situation.

This was the situation in the case of the Southern Manifesto, when it was made clear that it was the declared intention of 102 members of Congress, representing almost one-third the people of the nation, to oppose the integration decree of the Supreme Court. That it was a reasoned statement is clearly shown when it stated that the opposition would be carried on "by all lawful means." It is expected that these lawful means will be found.

Those few dissidents in the South—in the Congress and among the people—who do not concur in the Manifesto are apparently guided by some very fuzzy thinking. For instance, they will say, "If the Supreme Court has said it, it is the law of the land and there's nothing that can be done about it. Don't you believe in abiding by the law?"

The answer is, of course, that the people of the South do believe in abiding by the law, when this law is based on all judicial precedent that has gone before it and when it does not violate this precedent by being based on sociological and psychological textbooks written by left-wing sympathizers, as was the case in the integration decree.

To say that the people should not object to such a decision as this one, however, is in violation of all sense of reason and decency. Suppose we had a president who decided suddenly to take to himself dictatorial powers! Would the people stand aside and say, "Well, he is president and we should respect our president." No, we would at the very least take "all lawful means" to oppose the establishment of a dictatorship.

Nor is it reasonable to advocate adoption of integration through moderation—not if the people of the South, as stated in the manifesto issued by their representatives in Congress, believe it is wrong. If integration is wrong, then it is no more right to adopt it gradually than it is to adopt it all at once. That is the way evil too often gains ground—piecemeal.

What we need now is a return to reason. The present strife and bitterness was all so unnecessary. It was all brought on by an unreasoned decision on the part of
