International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Acts 1-2. Devotional Reading: Acts 2:1-8.

Our Mission

Lesson for April 8, 1956

WHEN a great bomber sets off on a military mission, or when a plane loaded with leaflets takes off for a propaganda mission, no matter how good the plane is otherwise, the mission will be a failure without three essentials for success. One is gas enough to reach the target. The second is an engine that will not "conk out" going or returning, an engine that can be relied on to function under all weather conditions. The third essential is a crew that will follow instructions, competent to fly the plane and to deliver its load at the right time, at the right place.

The Mission of the Church

One of the last words Jesus uttered before his Ascension was "Go." But what is a going church? Sometimes all that is meant by that expression is simply a church that has meetings once in a while. But that is not the idea Christ had in mind. The original Christian church had meetings, and good ones they were; but it began to go after the meetings were over and the disciples scattered everywhere, bringing the Word, the good news of God's love, the good news about Jesus. The church was going when it was growing; going when it took the message to new places and to people who had never heard it before. A going church, in short, is a missionary church. Some people don't like the word "missions." It seems to carry or suggest the idea of superiority. Not at all! We do have a superior article, the Christian faith and life. But we do not have to be conceited about it. Does a salesman have to be conceited if he is selling the best line on the market? Does a doctor have to be conceited about prescribing the best drugs yet invented? We did not invent our religion, God gave it to us. He gave it to us to keep and to share; and if we do not share it we shall hardly keep it.

Power of the Spirit

Going back to that airplane a moment: Enough gas, plus an efficient engine, spells POWER. No matter how important the mission is, no matter how good the intentions are, without the power everything collapses. So it is with the church. Our mission has been set by God himself. But when the church takes off with its tanks empty, and some home-made do-it-yourself tinkered-up sewing machine in place of a good engine, it will never accomplish its mission no matter how good it is. Wanting to reach the target is not enough. Don't we all pray, "Thy Kingdom come on earth . . . ?" That is a missionary prayer. Don't most churches offer prayer for missions, and even take up offerings for missions? Yet any one who knows the church will tell you that the church's missionary responsibility is shirked and slacked. We play at missions, we leave millions on millions without a ray of Gospel. The record of many a congregation, if you looked at it, would never suggest that that church knew much or cared much about what Jesus said on his church in his solemn last words: "Go—into all the world!" The trouble is that the Church does not have the power. It could have the same power the first Christians had, the power of the Holy Spirit. Only a Spirit-filled church is going to be much of a missionary church.

Power of Testimony

The other necessity of the plane on a "mission" is personnel. Power alone is not enough. There must be men who are prepared to use that power. Now Christians individually, or the church at large cannot "use" the Holy Spirit, for no one can use God. But God's power is not poured out on just anybody (as many stories in the Bible show). His power comes to those who devote themselves to him and his cause. The early church waited for the Spirit, waited for power; but once they had received it they proceeded to carry out Jesus' directive: Go into all the world! A Christian, or a church, that wants God's power for selfish reasons, will not be given it. A Christian, or a church, that prays for God's power so as to be able to witness for him, so as to win others for him, will find that prayer answered. The power will come. If the church today is making too feeble a mark on one world, it is because the church does not seek true spiritual power for true spiritual service? with Bahia Grass

is well established. Especially is this true on areas infested with crab grass. The nitrogen will cause the crab grass to smother the bahia or bermuda, but nitrogen should be applied after the grasses are well established.

As recommended by the ASC a good seed-bed should be prepared, and at least 1250 pounds of basic slag and 100 pounds of muriate of potash; also a small amount of nitrogen applied per acre at time of seeding or springing.

Many of our farmers want pastures and the only land most of them have that they want to use for pasture are eroded, rowdy, infertile hills. Their problem is one of establishing a perennial grass that will survive and grow enough to produce grazing on the kind of land they have for pasture.

Everyone knows about bermuda grass. It will live on upland, and will grow if properly fertilized, so will Pensacola Bahia. Both Make Good Pastures.

The Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners are interested in seeing as many farmers as will plant Pensacola Bahia grass because: It is not a pest as is bermuda. It comes up from both the plant and the seed. It is a paspalum as is Dallis grass. It will grow on poorer and drier land than will Dallis grass. It appears to stand more punishment than Dallis grass. It will winter kill about the same as Dallis grass. It is not as good as Dallis grass on Dallis grass land and is not recommended for the more fertile valleys where Dallis grass and clo-

ver will grow. However, I have seen it growing on fertile bottom land where it was carrying two cows per acre. It is easy to establish.

Just remember, be fair in your judgment of it. Don't expect Pensacola Bahia or Common Bermuda grass to give the grazing on a high dry hill as does Dallis grass in a fertile bottom.

Why not plant a few acres of Pensacola Bahia grass this year? For further information contact me or Mr. R. C. Tice of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

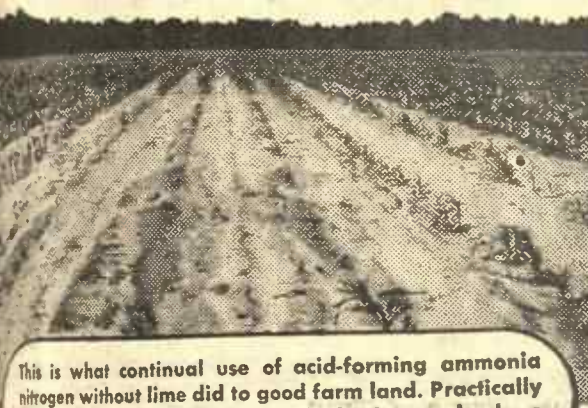

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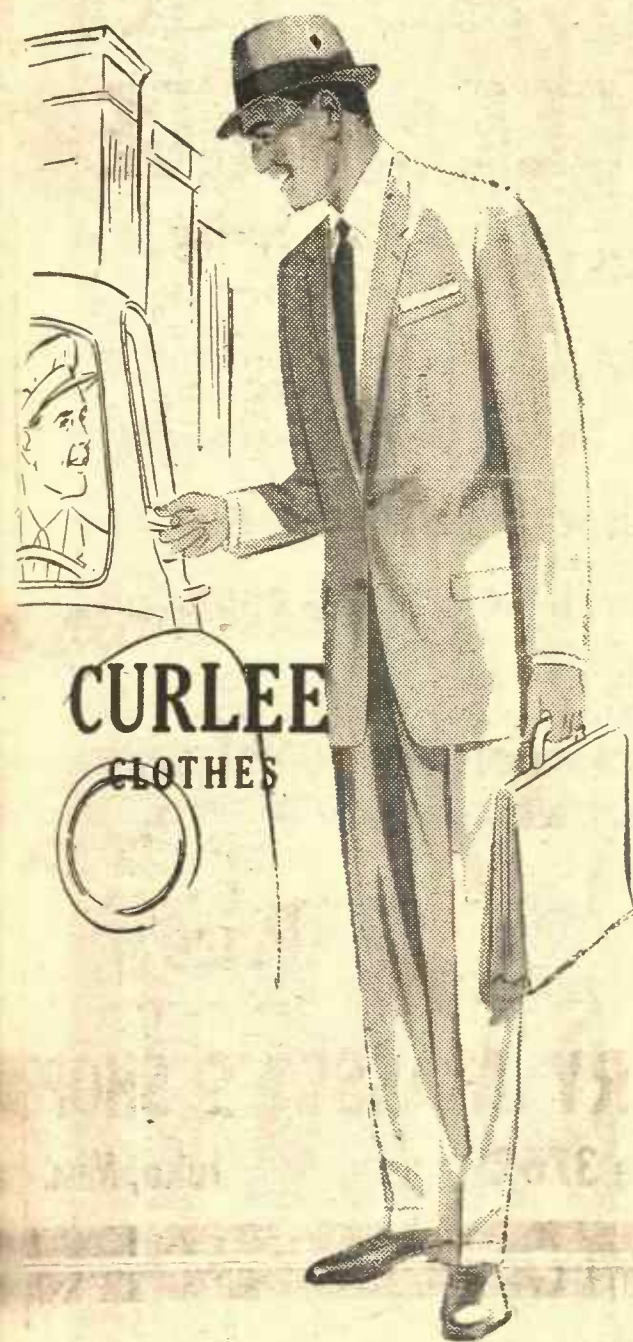

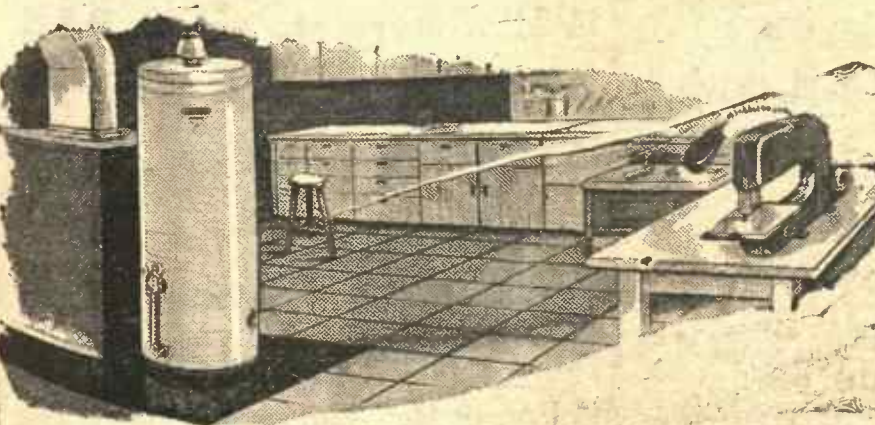

SCHOOL DISTRICT REORGANIZATION IN MISSISSIPPI

(This is the first of three articles setting forth in question and answer form many of the procedures necessary for compliance with Mississippi's new school district reorganization laws and relating briefly the duties of local school authorities and the state Educational Finance Commission. These articles have been prepared by William D. Neal, long-time county superintendent of education, former state auditor and presently director of finance with the State Educational Finance Commission.)

It has become apparent that the public in general and local school authorities in particular feel the need to be better informed concerning the laws and procedures under which the State Educational Finance Commission operates. Too, it is seen that the general public and local school authorities are in need of information concerning the duties and responsibilities of local school officials pertaining to the consolidation, reorganization and reconstitution of school districts.

Effective July 1, 1954, the schools of Mississippi began operation under an entirely new set of laws. These laws establish a definite and comprehensive program of elementary and high school education for the children of Mississippi, including state aid in the construction of school buildings.

Separation of Races Paramount
The paramount objective of the new school program is to preserve the separation of the races in the public schools of this state. In disagreements over the mechanics of the program it appears that many of its critics have lost sight of this major, compelling objective. It is the conviction of those charged with the administration of the new program that there is no way to operate the public schools of Mississippi except on a segregated basis, and that if segregation is lost all is lost.

In order that the entire program might be carried out successfully, from the standpoint of economy and efficiency in both its operational and capital improvement phases, the legislature recognized the fact that the tremendous number of small school districts in the state should be consolidated into larger units. So that there could be uniformity throughout the state, insofar as local conditions would permit, the administration of the program on the state level was vested in the State Educational Finance Commission.

At no time, however, did the legislature fail to recognize the importance and responsibility of local school authorities. Thus it is then, that every movement toward new school district planning and school building construction must originate within the local school districts.

Many of the difficulties with which the school program is faced, and much of the criticism beamed toward authorities charged with its administration, is brought about by a lack of understanding concerning the powers, duties and responsibilities of the local school authorities in whose hands the legislature with wisdom placed the initiation of every plan, order, and request for funds.

This series of articles has been prepared in the hope that the duties and responsibilities of all school officials, both state and local, may be better understood. Admittedly, not all of the questions that could be asked are covered herein. But had that been done this series of articles would have become too involved to be easily understood, and it appears that an understanding of the broader purposes of the new school program is the principal need of the people of Mississippi.

The State Educational Finance Commission When, How and Why Created

Q. When and how was the State

Educational Finance Commission created?

A. In 1953 by enactment of the Legislature of Mississippi. (Chapter 11, Laws of 1953).

Q. What purpose did the legislature have in mind in creating the Commission?

A. This is expressly stated in the laws. Section 1, Chapter 11, Laws of 1953, sets out legislature intent to be so that there should be equality of educational opportunity with respect to instructional personnel, school buildings and other related facilities and that the burden of providing such equal educational opportunity should no longer be borne by the local taxing districts, and that a program of state aid should be instituted.

Further, as set forth in Section 5, Chapter 13, Laws of 1953, legislative purpose and intent is clearly stated to be to equalize school facilities between the races.

The laws above-mentioned clearly place the responsibility of administration on the state level in the hands of the Commission and further state plainly that the Commission must adhere strictly to this legislative intent in passing upon all applications from local districts.

Q. What powers does the Commission have?

A. Only such powers as are expressly granted by the laws of the state, duly enacted by the state legislature. The powers of the Commission may be more properly referred to as duties, and some of these duties will now be discussed.

Duties of the Commission

Q. What are the primary duties of the Commission?

A. In short, the Commission is charged by the legislature with the responsibility (1) of bringing about desirable consolidation or reconstitution of school districts, and (2) of the proper distribution of state aid funds in the construction of equalized and adequate school buildings. These duties are detailed in Sections 8 and 11 of Chapter 11 and in Section 3 of Chapter 12, Laws of 1953.

It should be carefully noted that the Commission, in effecting consolidations, only passes upon the plans that previously have been approved by county and municipal school boards. Further, it should be observed that the Commission makes distribution of state school building funds only on proper applications which originate with the local board of trustees.

County Agent news

Two new sprays are now avail-

able for protecting tomatoes against early blight and wilt. The insecticides are Dithone and Dibasic Copper Sulphate. The spray should be applied after these plants are set out and have formed a good root system. Symptoms of blight and wilt are (1) Plants wilt and fail to bloom becoming yellow and sheds foliage. (2) The plants put on fruit then "throw off." If your tomatoes acted in this manner last year, the ground is infested with wilt and blight and I would suggest using one of the spray materials.

Corn Stalk Beetle

The rough-headed corn stalk beetle or sugarcane beetle does a lot of damage each year to young corn, especially on poorly drained sod land that has been broken and planted to corn.

The beetles bore into the outer wall of the corn stalk just below the surface of the ground. This makes a large ragged opening and destroys the tender growing point or bud. They will continue to attack corn until the plants are at least knee-high and sometimes taller.

Here are some ways that you can try for control measures. Use aldrin at the rate of 1 pound of technical material per acre. This should be applied in a 6-to 8-inch band into the drill of corn.

For spraying, mix a half gallon of aldrin emulsifiable concentrate (25 percent) to 15 gallons of water and apply to one acre. Attach spray nozzle in front of press wheel on planter and apply in 6-inch band to the drill. If you apply the aldrin after the corn is up to a stand, the sprayed band should be covered lightly. If you use less than the recommended amount of water in the mixture, you are likely to burn the young plants.

Five percent aldrin granules also may be used. Apply 20 pounds per acre. This can be done by hand, use of a fertilizer horn, hand crank duster or cotton tractor duster.

Dust is not satisfactory to use. You can use 40 pounds of 2-1/2 percent aldrin dust and try to get it evenly distributed along the corn drill.

It is best to cover the insecticide lightly after application. One treatment should give control for the season.

CAUTION. Wash thoroughly and change clothes after using. Handle insecticides with care and follow printed instructions.

Gardening

The time has come to plant long season vegetables in the garden. On the planting menu for April are tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, bush and pole snap and lima beans, corn and other summer vegetables.

It is still not too late to make plantings of some of the early spring vegetables including radish, turnips, leaf lettuce and mustard. Make some arrangements for

irrigating the home garden this year. ... it will pay off.

Farmers Earning \$400 Must File Report By April 15

All farm operators, tenants and sharecroppers who had net earnings of \$400 or more from their own farming operations are required to report their farm income and pay social security tax to the Internal Revenue Service not later than April 15.

Mrs. Temple, manager of the Sheffield, social security office, said these returns must be filed and the social security tax paid even though no income tax may be due.

Self-employed farmers, including tenants and sharecroppers, have an option in reporting their income. If the farmer grosses between \$800 and \$1800 he has the choice of reporting and paying the tax on half of his gross or on his actual net earnings. A farmer grossing over \$1800 must compute his net earnings, but if he has less than \$900 net he may claim \$900.

Farmers having income in cash rent or crop shares on farm land they own or rent should not report such income for social security purposes, Mrs. Temple said.

Farmers who do not have social security cards should immediately file applications for cards with the social security office. The farmer's personal social security number identifying his individual account is called for on Federal income tax forms. Farm income must be reported on Form 1040 and Schedule F, which may be secured from Internal Revenue Service offices.

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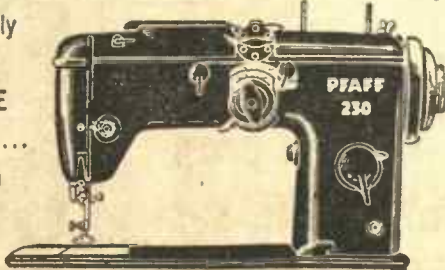

Experiment Station Tests Broccoli As Crop For Freezing

State College, Miss. — Broccoli tests at the Truck Crops Branch Experiment Station indicate that this crop may be grown profitably

in the Crystal Springs commercial vegetable producing area. Mississippi growers are becoming increasingly interested in producing crops for the quick-freezing industry and broccoli fits into this pattern.

Six varieties of broccoli were grown at the Station last fall and green heads were harvested seven different times between September 23 and December 12, with the bulk of the harvest in mid-October. Texas No. 107 and Green Mountain were the leading varieties in the tests, according to W. O. Thomas, Experiment Station horticulturist who conducted the experiment.

Mr. Thomas said, "For fall production, seed should be planted August 1 to 10 and set in the field by September 10. Setting the plants at this time will cause them to develop during cool weather, producing a compact head of green flower buds 3 to 6 inches in diameter."

"In order to market high quality broccoli the heads should be harvested before any of the flower buds begin to open. When broccoli is to be grown as a spring crop the seed should be planted in the coldframe around the last week

in October to November 10. Young broccoli plants are more susceptible to frost and cold than cabbage, and should be protected during the early growing season. For early spring production the plants should be transplanted to the field in January. This will insure a crop before hot weather begins."

Details of the test are published in the March issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College. Okra variety trials, which produced long-season yields, are also reported in the publication.

Luncheon Of Farm Bureau To Be Held At Peabody, 23

"Agriculture in the Political Arena" will be the subject of the speech Charles B. Shuman, President of the American Farm Bureau, will give at the opening luncheon meeting of the American Railway Development Association Convention at the Hotel Peabody in Memphis, Tennessee, April 23.

Mr. Shuman is a stock and grain farmer near Sullivan, Illinois. He holds Bachelor and Master degrees from the University of Illinois College of Agriculture and was President of the Illinois Agricultural Association before being elected to the presidency of the American Farm Bureau in 1954 following the retirement of Allan B. Kline. Since graduation from college Mr. Shuman has served as president of a rural electrification cooperative, executive committee member of a wheat control association and director of a livestock shipping association as well as actively participating in school and church activities.

Because of the current political interest in the farm problem, his speech will be of particular interest to the agricultural, forestry, land settlement, industrial and real estate railway officers who make up the membership of the American Railway Development Association. This convention will be the Golden Jubilee of the American Railway Development Association which was formed in 1906

to foster industrial, agricultural, land settlement, real estate and forestry development activities of the North American Railroads. The American Railway Development Association will hold its annual convention meeting jointly with the Railway Development Association of the Southeast in Memphis, April 22 to 25.
