SCHOOL DISTRICT REORGANIZATION IN MISSISSIPPI

(This is the third and last of three articles setting forth in question and answer form many of the procedures necessary for compliance with Mississippi's new school district reorganization laws and relating briefly the duties of local school authorities and the State Education Finance Commission.)

These articles have been prepared by William D. Neal, long-time county superintendent of education, former state auditor and presently director of finance with the State Education Finance Commission.)

In previous articles there has been discussed the organization and duties of the State Education

Finance Commission and the procedure necessary toward reorganization or consolidation of school districts in Mississippi. This article will deal primarily with attendance centers within new school districts and the program of state aid in the construction of school buildings.

Attendance Centers

Q. May there be more than one attendance center for each race in a school district?

A. Yes.

Q. Who determines where attendance centers shall be?

A. The county board of education and the board of trustees of municipal separate school districts. In the first case the county board would pass upon attendance centers only after they had been determined by the board of trustees of the district.

Q. Then the Commission does not specify where attendance centers shall be located when it passes orders approving a plan submitted by local authorities for the consolidation or reconstitution of school districts?

A. No. The Commission only passes upon the territory comprising the various school districts and the type of organization under which they will operate.

Q. What is the suggested number of pupils in elementary school attendance centers?

A. A number sufficient to provide at least one teacher for each grade taught. In cases where there are natural barriers, sparseness of population, or other valid reasons, this rule may not be invoked. In rural areas where long distances for bus routes are involved, community primary centers for the first three grades may be considered.

Q. What is the minimum number of pupils recommended for high school attendance centers?

A. In combination schools, grades one through twelve, there should be at least twelve teachers and twelve grades.

Q. Is any consideration given to the principle of equalizing taxable wealth of the school districts?

A. Certainly. An area with a small proportion of the children to educate should not be created in such a way as to possess an undue proportion of the taxable wealth of the county to the detriment of adjoining areas with a greater number of children but with a smaller proportion of the taxable wealth.

Q. May county lines be disregarded for school district purposes?

A. Yes. This is provided for by law. School districts should conform as nearly as possible with the natural social and economic

boundaries of a community. County boards of education of adjoining counties should meet together and work out desirable consolidations where overlapping occurs. Applications to the Commission for approval of plans for the reorganization of districts, in such cases, should be submitted at the same time so that the Commission can consider both plans together.

State Aid for School Construction

Q. Is there a definite program of state aid in the construction of school facilities?

A. Yes. This is an integral part of the new school program and by legislative mandate the administration of the building program is the responsibility of the Commission.

Q. How is the amount of state aid determined to which any school district is entitled?

A. Beginning with the scholastic year 1954-55 each school district in the state will be given credit on the books of the Commission for \$12.00 per pupil in average daily attendance. (Chapter 13, Laws of 1953). However, for the first ten years additional credit of \$3.00 per negro pupil will be given. (Senate Bill No. 1202, Extraordinary Session of 1955). School districts reorganized in accordance with law will be issued certificates of credit each year for the amount of credit which their average daily attendance has earned them for the preceding scholastic year. All districts, whether reorganized or not, will be given annual credit on the books of the Commission, so that certificates of credit may be issued immediately following the reorganization of the county.

Q. Does the fact that for the first ten years there will be given annual credit per negro pupil of 15.00 as against only 12.00 per white pupil, mean that state funds for capital improvements will be spent in that ratio as between the races?

A. Not at all. It should be remembered that the law states that "it is the intent and purpose of this act to equalize school facilities between the races, and, therefore, in passing upon and approving or disapproving applications from school districts for the expenditure of funds the Commission shall take into consideration the equality of the proposed expenditure of such funds for capital improvements for the separate races in connection with the equality and adequacy of the existing facilities for each race." Thus, in approving applications for grants of state funds, the Commission must act in accordance with the law as to equalization of facilities, regardless of the race whose average daily attendance earned the credit to which the entire district is entitled.

Q. It appears that no school district will earn a sufficient amount of credit in one year to be of much benefit in a school building program. That provision has been made to hasten the construction of school facilities where needed?

A. Any school district meeting requirements of law may be extended a grant or loan of funds in an amount not to exceed 75% of the estimated sum which will accrue to it on account of earned credits issued to it within the succeeding twenty years. This estimate of accruals will be based upon average daily attendance as verified by the state department of audit. (Section 7 of Chapter 13, Laws of 1953.)

Q. Must a school district issue bonds, or produce funds otherwise, in order to match state funds?

A. No. Grants may be made from state funds to supplement amounts raised locally, by bond issue or otherwise, or state grants may be made in an amount equal to the cost of the building projects, provided always that the amount of the loan or advance does not exceed the maximum amount to which the school district is entitled under the law.

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Cotton Varieties Are Compared In Mechanization

State College, Miss.—How a cotton variety responds to mechanical picking and modern ginning machinery has become a question planters consider when select-

ing a variety which will be produced under mechanization.

Studies at the Delta Branch Experiment Station at Stoneville indicate that there is little difference in the picking and ginning qualities of the better cotton varieties grown in the Delta.

From 1947 to 1951 the Delta Station conducted several variety trials under mechanized conditions. Results of this study showed that none of the varieties studied was consistently higher in picking efficiency, no one variety consistently gave higher grades in all tests, and in no tests were the grade differences between varieties significant.

In 1955 Commercial breeders announced new varieties and some of the varieties tested earlier had disappeared from the seed market. Mechanical methods, too, had changed so the Experiment Station began another 3-year study to compare 11 varieties, including the newer ones, under mechanization.

Varieties in the test are Bobshaw 1A, Dixie King, Coker 124, Delfos 9169, Deltapine 15, Deltapine Staple, Stoneville 2-B, Stoneville 7,

Stoneville 3202, Fox and Empire. First year results of this test are reported by James B. Dick, E. Buford Williamson and Harmon H. Ramey, Jr., in the April issue of Mississippi Farm Research, Experiment Station periodical.

Results in 1955 again showed no significant differences between varieties in the test. Machine efficiency ranged from 91 to 95 per cent and composite grades ran from 91 (SLM-) to 96.9 (SLMx).

Safety Tips For Power Mower Users



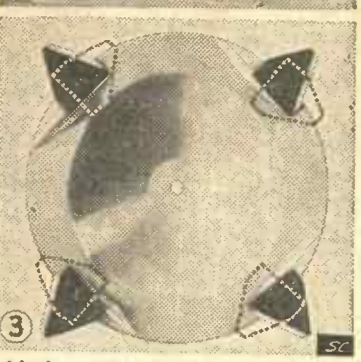
RACINE, WIS.— This season power lawn mowers will be operating on more than 10,000,000 lawns—a 2,000,000 increase over 1955. This will result in a corresponding increase in the risk of accidents to careless users, Charles A. Livesey of a leading manufacturer of power mowers here, warned.

Much progress has been made by manufacturers of power mowers in the design of equipment to provide maximum safety for operators. An illustration of a new development in safety engineering is a "suction-lift rotor" cutting unit (Picture #3) which is now standard on rotary mowers produced by Jacobsen Manufacturing company.

Elimination of a straight steel cutter bar and substituting four cutter knives on a disc reduces by 80% the possibility of picking up and throwing such objects as bones, nails, bits of glass, or stones. The rotor's four cutter knives will retract on hitting a fixed object such as a curb, sprinkler head, or iron pipe thus minimizing the chance of the knife's breaking and projecting the broken piece across the yard.

For users of all power mowers, reel or rotary types, he has these safety tips:

1. Start the mower on level ground, make sure your feet are away from the cutter bars or



blades (Picture #1). He recommends placing one foot on the mower deck, with one hand holding the handle to keep the machine firmly on the ground.

2. Learn how to stop the mower or how to put it in neutral quickly.

3. Go over the lawn before mowing to remove rocks, sticks, wire and other foreign material.

4. Be sure children and pets are clear of the machine.

5. Be careful of your footing when mowing on inclines.

6. Don't make any adjustments, remove clogging grass or sticks, or reach in front of the mower while the engine is running.

Always disconnect the spark plug wire when making adjustments and keep hands, feet and loose clothing away from moving blades, reels, motor belt, and exposed chain. (Picture #2).

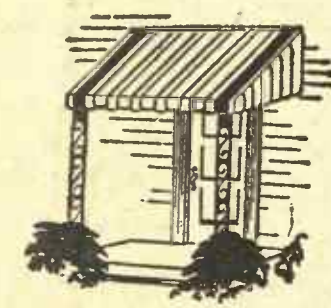

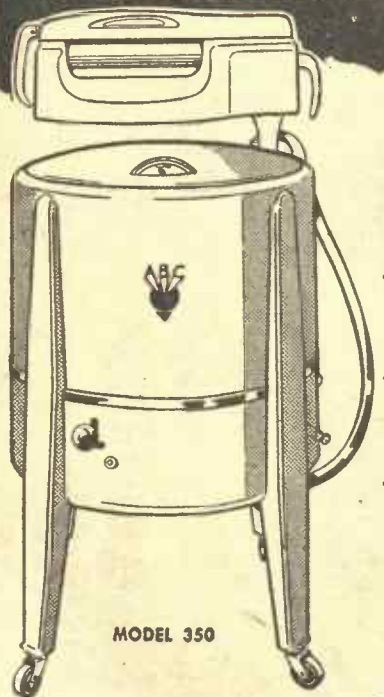

Labor Racketeers Force Payrolls Our Way

Northeast Mississippi during the past six months has experienced an unprecedented growth in industrial payrolls.

And in one town after another we have heard the comment: "This never has been possible for the reputation our area has for harmonious relations between employers and employees."

Just how important peaceful operations are becoming to industrial leaders throughout the country was emphasized Thursday by the making of a New York hoodlum on the problem of labor racketeering.

Victor Riesel, who within a few days was to tell a government hearing what he knew of racketeering in the field of organized labor, was blinded, permanently, when acid was poured in his eyes as he walked down Broadway after breakfast.

The attack apparently was in retaliation for Riesel's latest column in which he was warning against racketeering in half a dozen unions was being revealed by Riesel at the time he was attacked by a New York hoodlum.

How different worker-manager relations are in this area from those in older industrialized areas is indicated by some of Riesel's comments on the operation of union racketeers.

United States Attorney Paul Wilentz has branded the new combination of bigtime labor leaders and underworld criminals as "threatening a revival of bootleg era lawlessness."

And Riesel had pointed out in his latest column such examples of union racketeering as the following:

1. By threatening to delay delivery of truckloads of milk or cream until it spoils unless they get a payoff, some Teamster Union officials, says Riesel, have forced companies to pay them tens of thousands of dollars in "protection" money.

Records of such practices are on record in government files.

2. The underworld mob which has gained a dominant role in the Northeast's trucking unions, stall truckloads of eggs or deliberately drop the crates and break them unless shippers come through with a payoff to the union bosses.

3. In the garment industry, Riesel points out, the union racketeers work in a different manner. An "association" controlled by big time mobs is organized and dress manufacturers are told to join up and pay into the association treasury even though they never heard of it. If they refuse, local unions see that they don't get any work.

4. "Then there are the tough boys in the garment industry," Riesel wrote in his last column, "who move in as partners of legitimate businessmen."

"They not only move in and say they're part of the firm when they're not wanted, but they won't even let the original skilled owner get out of business."

"There's one multi-million dollar ladies' garment firm owned by an elderly man. The mobs moved in on him 20 years ago."

"They just told him they were his partner. Today the old man wants to retire. But they won't let him."

"Ignorant workers in the big cities are literally bought and sold," wrote Riesel.

"The boss of a company is forced by local unions many of them

phony, to pay the dues and initiation fees. . . . This money is taken out of workers' wages. No meeting is ever called. And no union really exists."

"The union bosses pocket the money simply because they own a union charter."

"All these," concluded Riesel, "and a hundred other rackets prosper in addition to the welfare and insurance frauds."

Not much is said publicly about such operations, Riesel points out because the businessman and industrialists are afraid to tell the government how the mobs are operating for fear they will be squeezed still harder.

Hence, we who are free of such terrorism cannot be fully aware of how fortunate we really are.

But we can be sure that hundreds of the northern industrialists are getting sick of such underworld tactics.

And they are looking for new locations where people have an honest attitude towards their jobs and where mutual respect exists between employer and employee.

In Northeast Mississippi every firm which has conscientiously tried to make friends with its employees has been rewarded with harmonious relations and productive effort.

Word of this attitude, which actually is almost unbelievable of industrialists who for years have bucked the mob rule so prevalent in the North, is slowly spreading to distant industrial regions.

And if we continue to maintain the friendly relations which exist in most of our plants, our area will find itself sought out with increasing frequency by northern industries and our people will have an even-growing list of work opportunities from which to choose, thereby enabling each person to find the job that suits his desires and capacities best.

Such a diversity of job opportunity

is the goal toward which all of us are working.

And nothing which may be done by our Industrial Committee or any other group toward obtaining new payrolls for our area is as important as development of the right attitude toward his job by the typical worker and the development of the right attitude toward his workers by the typical employer.

These attitudes of honesty, fairness and mutual respect are so vital to our community's prosperity that all of us have reason to be interested in their development and maintenance.

And when there is indication in any of our plants that the customary harmony is in danger from any cause, whatever, all of us have reason to be deeply concerned, for the reputation of our entire area is being threatened.—Tupelo Journal, April 6, 1956.

Sweetpotato Seed

Don't buy "bootleg" sweetpotato plants. Look for the certified plants which will be tied in bundles of 100 and bound with an official tape (white background and purple edges.) The official tape gives the growers name, address and the grade of the plants he is selling.

If you buy "bootleg" plants, you may be buying trouble. Often such plants are diseased. They may infest the soil so that even in the future, sweetpotatoes cannot be profitably grown.

Certified plants are grown from seed that have been carefully inspected at least twice while growing in the field and at least once in storage.

The following Tishomingo County farmers are listed by the State Plant Board as having certified sweetpotato plants.

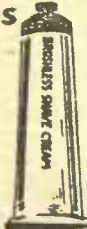

The farmers of Tishomingo county are better farmers than they were 15 and 20 years ago. They are producing more crops: Cotton, corn, silage, hay, and truck crops on less acres and with less work than they did 15 and 20 years ago.

Our county agents have brought information from our State Agricultural Experiment stations to the farmers of our county. Through the State Extension service our farmers are profiting from the use of Hybrid corn, better varieties of cotton, heavier fertilization, and proper use of more efficient insecticides and fungicides.

We live in a changing world, and farmers are progressing as are other people in different occupations. Our best farmers are our best conservationists.

The farmers who can, and does, produce 60 to 100 bushels of corn, or one to two bales of cotton per acre, is making better use of his time and his land than the farmer who produces half this amount per acre.

From the standpoint of Soil and Water Conservation the farmer who produces high yields per acre can more nearly use his land within its capability. That is, he can use his best, more level land for row crops, his sloping land for sod and pasture crops, and his steeper land for pine trees.

Not only does the farmer who produces high per acre yields of row crops have the opportunity of using his land more nearly within its capability, he is actually, by good farming practices, increasing the organic matter and water holding capacity of his good farmers' land will get richer instead of poorer as the years go by and it will repay him in higher yields, and better quality of crops because he cared for it.

The commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District commend the good work so many of our farmers are doing in the conservation of soil and water.

The local soil conservation technicians would like to see more of the farmers who produce high yield of cotton and corn per acre, shed their cotton and corn stalks and leave them on top of the ground as a mulch immediately after harvest.

A good practice would be to seed winter legumes, and then shed stalks with a "Bush-hog," or similar equipment, as soon as the corn or cotton is harvested. By doing this the land will be partially covered with these pieces of stalks and better protected from the raindrops. The cover crop will suffer less from cold, and the large amount of stalks will be a much less problem at planting time.

Game Warden Gives Laws About Fishing

C. E. Marlar, state game warden, has this to say about wholesale fish dealers and commercial fishermen:

"If you live in or are a resident of the state of Alabama or any other state and bring fish into Mississippi and sell or offer for sale, you are required to have a non-resident \$100.00 wholesale fish dealer license; or if you are a resident of Mississippi and fish and sell them you are to have a commercial fishing license and if you buy fish and sell them at wholesale you will have to have a resident Fifty-Dollar Retail Fish Dealer License.

"All non-residents to fish in Mississippi are required to have a non-resident sport & Fishing License—seven day permit \$2.25; all-season license expiring June 30, 1956, costs \$5.25 to all residents of Mississippi. Persons 14 years of age and under 65 using artificial bait are required to have state resident sport fishing license.

"It is a violation of the law for anyone to sell or offer for sale game fish of any kind."

Conservation Loans Available For Reforestation

The Water Facilities Act, as amended, provides that Soil and Water Conservation loans may be made for sustained yield reforestation on cutover timberland, as well as many other soil and water

use and conservation practices. Mr. T. B. Fatherree, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, stated that loans may be obtained by eligible applicants through the Farmers Home Administration local offices for the reforestation of cutover timberland provided security requirements can be met and satisfactory repayment plans can be arranged. He stressed the fact that any land owner, farmer or non-farmer, who can not get adequate credit elsewhere may be eligible. Plans for reforestation of cutover timberland of course must be in accordance with recommended forestry practices.

Mr. Fatherree stated that if reforestation is the only purpose for which the loan is requested and the land is not in agricultural production, the Farmers Home Administration will avoid making such loans for reforestation of tracts of land which are negligible in size. Usually loans for reforestation only will be made for not less than \$500.

Land owners in Tishomingo County who are interested in obtaining information on a loan for reforestation or other soil and water use and conservation practices should see Hays Woods, local County Farmers Home Administration Supervisor, at Iuka, who will gladly furnish full details of such assistance.

Unto Death

Lesson for April 22, 1956

WHY do people get killed for being Christians? It seems incredible, and it hasn't happened to most Christians. But it does happen. Christianity was perhaps only a few months old when the first martyr, Stephen, met his death at the hands of a mob. Now the peculiar feature of that mob was that it was so respectable. Not a hoodlum in the lot. They were all civic leaders, men high in religious circles. In fact, it was the high court that adjourned and became the stone-throwing mob. They would not have said that Dr. Foreman they murdered Stephen. They would have said they executed him. But that makes it all the more of a puzzle. A hoodlum might shoot down a good Christian just for meanness, but why should men of distinction kill a man for no other crime than being a Christian?

Blood of the Martyrs

Before trying to answer that question, we might glance through history and see a few other cases. Circumstances vary, but the kind of martyrdom that was Stephen's is always essentially the same. No one ever brings the killers into court. Who would have brought suit against the Sanhedrin for killing Stephen? They were the court. Who could arrest the Emperor Nero for burning the Christians alive in his gardens? Who could have written a letter to the paper (if there had been one) complaining about the mass murders, by great emperors like Diocletian or Marcus Aurelius, of innocent Christians? So it was when Joan of Arc was burned at the stakes, or when "Bloody Mary" was running wild against the Protestants, or when the Russian revolution caused the death of no-body knows how many hundreds of priest, or when the Chinese

revolution has brought death to Christians again in our time. The persecutors may be bishops, and arch-bishops, heathen emperors, "people's governments," or African chiefs, they always have the law on their side, and what is more serious, they have public opinion. When the early French missionaries to the American Indians were tomahawked, as so many of them were, does any one suppose that their scalps were buried to destroy traces of the crime? Not a bit of it,—some Indian warrior wore the scalp and was the envy of everybody in his village. Always the murder of the Christians is done with public knowledge.

Persecution Can Be Avoided

We can move a little closer to our question by remembering that the church has not always been persecuted. Sometimes it has been highly praised, welcomed, honored. It may even succeed in running the country. Nobody would dream of persecuting it,—in fact, it may turn the tables and persecute other people. Oh—you say at once—when that happens, it isn't the church of God any more; the true church will always be persecuted, and when it isn't, it is a sign it is no longer the true church. —There is some truth in that, but it is saying too much. A church may be free from persecution and still be largely Christian. However, you can set it down as a rule: Whenever the church, and the people in it, do just what everybody else does and think what every one thinks, then it will not be persecuted.

"I Had a Higher Fuehrer"

Martin Niemöller is a case in point. He was a hero of World War I who later became a minister. When Hitler took over Germany, Pastor Niemöller went along with what Hitler did, or at any rate he said nothing, for a long time. And all that time, Martin Niemöller went right on with his church work undisturbed. Then finally Hitler was too much even for Niemöller's strong stomach, and he defied Hitler. "I had a higher Fuehrer," he said years later, a higher Leader. So the police came and marched that minister off to jail, one morning after church. You see? The church is never persecuted when all it says to the world around it is "Yes, yes, we agree!" The church has been persecuted, and will be persecuted here in America even, if and when—like Stephen of old—it dares to set above public opinion, custom, "mores," respectabilities, authorities and powers, the Higher Leader.

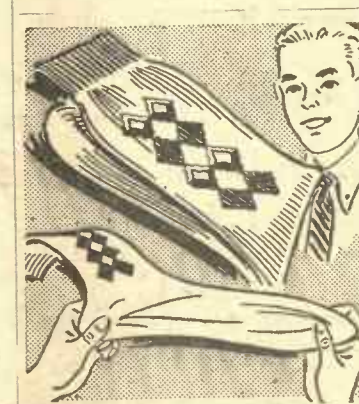

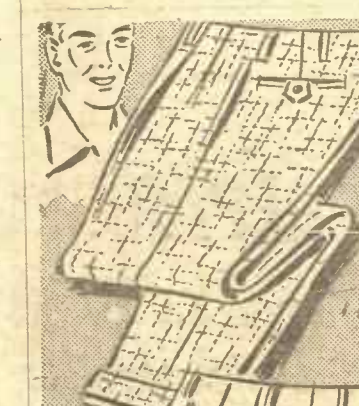

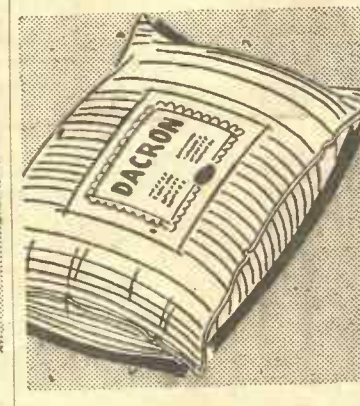
