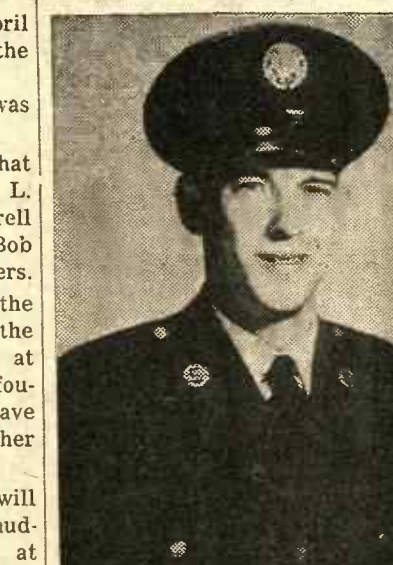

CONTRACT SIGNED FOR \$1,250,000 PLANT AT CORINTH

A contract between the Alcorn County Board of Supervisors and the Kellogg Switchboard and Supply Co., agreeing to construct a \$1,250,000 plant was signed last Friday by Clarence W. Edge, president of the supervisors, and J. M. Kellogg, president of the Company. The cost of construction and allied costs, according to the contract, is not to exceed \$1,250,000 BAWI bonds in this amount will be voted upon by the first and fourth district voters of Alcorn county. Kellogg will bear all costs by paying rent sufficient to retire the 20-year old bonds and other cost. The new plant will cover approximately 125,000 square feet on 50 acres in Corinth's new industrial area north of the Rudolph Wur-litzer's new installation. It will be completely modern in design, air conditioned, and windowless. It is expected that 400 employees will be needed to staff this organization when it is in full operation. Approximately 60 per cent of the employees will be women and 40 per cent men.

Fire Causes Death Of C. A. Smith

The neighbors called to him several times, but receiving no answer they began searching. His body was found shortly afterward by Bobby Paden and Olen Jourdan.

Miss Bernice Bostick gave an interesting and instructive program on flower arrangement. She opened her talk by saying, "Flower arrangement has come to be one of the outstanding ways in which modern American women increase the joy of every day living. It is a spontaneous method of producing beauty from materials at hand." She went on to say that the days of elaborate floral arrangements and big corsages have passed. "Except for special occasions such as anniversaries, do not create large arrangements for tables. It is not considered good taste. Good taste is better than lots of flowers in any arrangement, but especially in a gift arrangement. Beautiful simplicity will have much more appeal to the quiet person who may be receiving the gift than an extravagant array of just flowers." County Agent news

Demonstrations
This year there will be eight
demonstrations in the county show-
ing the effects and possibilities of
seed treated with Thimet in-
secticide. Thimet is a phosphate
mixed with carbon and

applied to the seed. The poison
is transmitted through the seed
coat to the seedling cotton from
all insects from 6 to 9 weeks.
In other words, any insect that
bites a plant treated with Thimet
will be killed.
The demonstrations are to be
on the following farms: Chap Fan-
cher, Golden; B. C. Fowler, Route
1, Belmont; Paul Allen, Moore's
Mill; Otha Edmondson, Paradise;
B. L. Mercer, Midway; Lamar Um-
fress, Holcut; Ferrell Skinner
Route 2, Burnsville, and Wilmer
Locke, Route 2, Iuka.

On Tuesday, May 8, Extension
personnel will conduct two bitter
weed control demonstrations us-
ing Amine 2-4-D. These tests will
be held on the W. D. Honeycutt
farm, Leedy, beginning 9:30 a.m.,
and on Milton Solomon's Farm at
1:30 p.m.

Don't Risk Your Neck
Falls, fires and machinery con-
tinue to be the top causes of farm
accidents. How do you stack up
in regard to the hazards from these
on your farm?

Watch out for falls. Make sure
that steps and ladders are in good
condition. Provide safety handrails.
Keep passageways uncluttered.

Greatest dangers from fire
come from sparks, defective flues
and chimneys, matches and care-
less smokers, and improper or
worm out wiring. Gasoline and
other fuel oil storage areas also
tend to be potential fire hazards.

"Slow down and live" is good
advice when it comes to the use
of farm machinery. Some of the
major causes of farm machinery
accidents is reckless driving caus-

ing tip overs, improper hitching
of drawbar, improper power take
off protectors, and failure to stop
and make proper adjustments.

Crop Cultivation
Why Cultivate? Answer is sim-
ple—to destroy grass and weeds
and loosen up the soil for aeration
during cool weather of early spring.

How to cultivate—use a rotary
hoe attachment with regular trac-
tor equipment as soon as crops
comes up to stand. Use of flat or
low-crown high speed sweeps with
fenders for the first cultivation
is also a good practice. Mule farm-
ers should use gee-whiz or spring
tooth harrows with fenders for the
first cultivation.

Cross plowing is being used by
some farmers on fairly level land
that has large acreage per field.
Mule farmers can cross plow with
one-row cultivators.

Chemicals will reduce the cost
of weed and grass control. These
include pre-emergence Chloro IPC
and post emergence herbicidal oils.

How about cost? Cross plowing
requires just half as many man
hours to hand hoe cotton per acre
as did regular cultivation and hand
hoeing methods. Pre-emergence
chemicals take just a third as
many man hours as regular cultiva-
tion.

Combining use of chemicals and
the cross plowing reduces labor
requirements as much as 75 per-
cent. This lowers cost per acre.

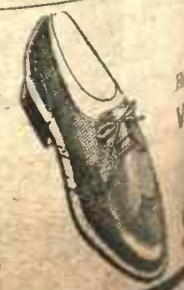

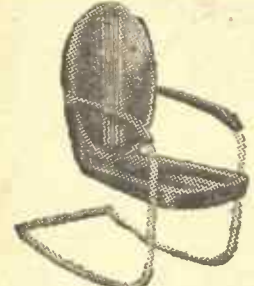

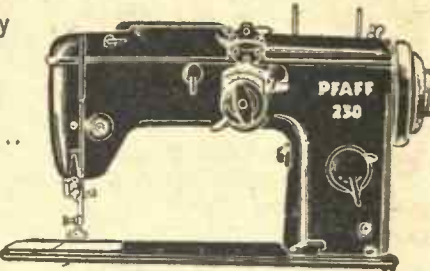

MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE NEGOTIABLE NOTES OF THE SAID TOWN IN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF THIRTY ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$31,000.00) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COST OF IMPROVING STREETS IN SAID TOWN.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, having made due investigation, find, determine, and declare that it is necessary to improve streets in said Town; that the estimated cost thereof is Thirty-One Thousand Dollars (\$31,000.00); and that there are at this time no funds available in the treasury of said Town for the payment of such costs; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and advisable and in the public interest that the sum of Thirty-One Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$31,000.00) required for the aforesaid purpose be obtained through the issuance of notes of said Town as hereinafter proposed; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town do further find and declare that the assessed valuation of taxable property within said Town of Iuka, according to the last completed assessment, is Six Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand One Hundred Twenty-Four and No/100 (\$625,124.00) Dollars; and that the total general obligation bonded indebtedness of said Town at this time is Nineteen Thousand Nine Hundred Forty-Seven, and 96/100 Dollars (\$19,947.96); and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued, namely, Thirty-One Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$31,000.00), when added to the aforesaid outstanding indebtedness of said Town, will not exceed ten per centum (10%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said Town; and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued does not exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) or five per centum (5%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Iuka has not, within a period of twelve (12) months from the date of this resolution, heretofore issued bonds or notes without an election, under the provisions of Section 7, Chapter 493 Laws of Mississippi, 1950:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, do hereby declare their intention to issue notes of said Town in the amount of Thirty-One Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$31,000.00) to raise money for the purpose of paying the cost of improving streets in said Town.

SECTION 2. That the issuance of the said notes will be authorized at a meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town to be held at the Town Hall in the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, at the hour of 2 o'clock P.M., on Friday, the 18th day of May, 1956, unless twenty per centum (20%)

of the qualified electors of said Town shall file a written protest against the issuance of said bonds on or before said date and hour.

SECTION 3. That notice be here-by given that a written protest against the issuance of said notes may be filed with the Town Clerk of the Town of Iuka at or prior to the above-named date and hour, and that if such protest be filed and be signed by twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of said Town, then an election on the question of the issuance of said notes shall be called, and held as is provided by law. If no such protest be filed, the said notes may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance of said notes.

SECTION 4. That the Town Clerk be and is hereby authorized and directed to cause this resolution to be published in The Vidette, a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Iuka and which is eligible under the provisions of Chapter 427, Laws of Mississippi 1948, and that the said resolution be so published once a week for at least three consecutive weeks, the first publication to be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date above fixed for the issuance of said bonds and the last publication to be not more than seven (7) days prior to said date.

Alderman N. C. Pruitt seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and, the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:

Alderman E. E. Murrah voted yes, Alderman J. W. Thompson voted yes, Alderman N. C. Pruitt voted yes, Alderman Eugene Wadley voted yes, Alderman W. F. Dugger, Absent.

The motion having received the affirmative vote of all the members of the Board of Aldermen present, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted, this 21 day of April, 1956.

360.2 Miles Of Road Under Jurisdiction Of State Highway Dept.

A statement marking the anniversary date of the beginning of the State Highway Department as an agency, figures released by T. C. Robbins indicated that the network of roads under jurisdiction of the department at 8,350.2 miles.

Setting up of an agency to handle "roads matters" took place, under an act of the Territorial Government of Mississippi in 1899. The first State Highway Commission was organized, and Mississippi became a state,

legislative action, Mississippi highway system is divided into designated highways and non-designated highways. Those in the designated class are only placed by an act of the Legislature. Those under maintenance by the department have either been taken off the county system or were built as a new highway by the department to connect designated points set out by legislation. Only those roads which have been designated may be taken over by the department or built as state highways. The department must follow legislative description.

Considering roads and highways designated by the Legislature, the Highway Department as of the start of this year had taken over and maintains 8,352.3 miles of highways as compared to 8,151.9 miles at the start of 1955.

The recently adjourned legislative session added about 548.5 miles of newly designated state highways to the state designated system. This brings the designated mileage to 10,365.

In its 20th biennial report to the Legislature, for the period ending June 30, 1955, the Highway Department stated the average cost to maintain 8,152.9 miles of all types of highways was \$628.88 per mile per year.

Saturday morning there was a forty one mile guided tour through the city that showed both the new and old New Orleans.

There were the cemeteries, hundreds of years old, St. Louis Cathedral. The French Market, famous old French Court Yard, Praline and souvenir shop. The Gentilly Terrace nursery with its million dollar orchid farm, Audubon Park, Tulane university, the Sugar Bowl, Loyola university, The International Trade Mart, City Park, Delgado Museum, Huey P. Long bridge, Haunted House, the famous Quadroom Ballroom, the Absinthe House, the Pontalba buildings, Jackson square, homes of millionaires, the dueling oaks and many famous old French Restaurants.

Soil Stewardship Week

The week of May 7th through May 12th has been proclaimed as "Soil Stewardship week". This is a week to emphasize man's proper relationship to the soil. It is common to hear a man say, "This is my land," "I own this land." Actually he or she is privileged to use the land they call theirs for a relatively few years. To be more precise a landowner should say, "I'm the steward of this tract of land."

A steward is a person who holds some object in trust. Stewardship implies that the object held is to be passed on to someone else. The good steward takes pride in improving or adding to the object in his possession. Christ taught this in the parable of the talents.

A farmer finds pleasure in the beauty of his well-used properly treated fields, pastures, and woods. All of us share his pleasure as we drive by his acres; or when we feel the healthy soil or vigorous sod beneath our feet.

Most of us have come to feel that wise-use and treatment of the soil, as stressed by the Soil Conservation District Commissioners, is a moral responsibility—that soil is a gift of the Creator, and that all of us have a steward's responsibility for it.

The Psalmist's says: "The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof." We, all of us, are heeding the Creator's command when He placed man in the Garden of Eden "to dress it and keep it."

Each of us derive great pleasure from a job well done. The job of conserving our soil is one that everybody can take part in. It is not a job to be done solely by the Soil Conservation Service Technicians.

The proper use and conservation of our soil is of major importance because, man and the soil remain inseparable.

Separate man's spiritual being from God and his soil will perish. Separate man physically from the earth and he will die. Man still obtains his food and most of his clothing and shelter from the soil. Man's well-being depends on how well he cares for the soil.

It behooves each of us to be good stewards of the soil. Once each year it is well for us to stop, look and listen for one week and renew our relationship to the soil.

Because, truly, man is created from the "dust of the earth," and this "dust of the earth" is a wonderful composite of minerals and of living things, of decaying plants and animals.

If properly cared for, our soil will be a storehouse of abundance for present and future generations. If we of this generation prove to be unfaithful and careless stewards of the soil our children's children will suffer. It is for them, the unborn generations, that we observe Soil Stewardship week. May we all resolve to be better stewards of our soil in the future than we have been in the past.

Recent Law Change In Social Security Beneficial

By Mrs. Mary King Temple Social Security Administration Sheffield, Alabama

Beginning in 1955, a new "figure" appeared on the social security horizon—\$4,200 per year. Raising the annual earnings base from \$3,600 to \$4,200 represents one of the more important changes in law recently enacted. Millions of workers will be affected beneficially.

What significance does this change have for the average working person? It means that wage increases received by labor in recent years can now be reflected more adequately on individual wage records. Many workers will have a greater percentage, if not all, of their earnings credited for social security purposes. Thus, their future benefits will be more proportionate to actual earnings during their working lifetimes.

Not everyone will be affected by this new \$4,200 limitation. Those earning less than \$3,600 in a year will continue to pay tax and receive wage credits as before. Workers earning over \$3,600 annually will contribute up to \$12

more per year in social security tax, depending on their incomes. The maximum tax for any worker will be raised from \$72 to \$84 per year. Employers will match this increase and will have the added responsibility of continuing social security deductions from pay checks until the new \$4,200 wage maximum is reached.

What will the working man or woman gain from all of this? In

applying the new benefit formula, the inclusion of all earnings up to \$4,200 can make a difference of as much as \$10 a month in benefit payments at retirement. This is a material amount in terms of economic planning for the future.
