75 Guests Entertained At Fish Fry

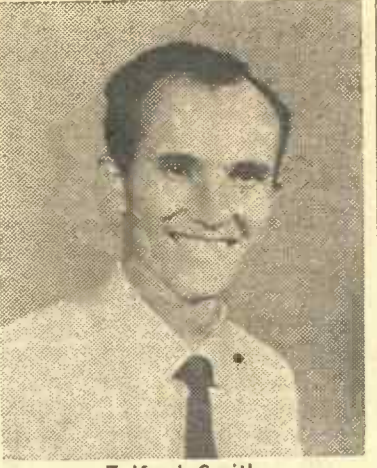

Death Benefit Not To Exceed \$255

Under the social security law, a lump-sum death benefit can be paid, regardless of whether monthly benefits are to be paid. That is, of course, if the deceased worker had worked long enough under social security to be insured.

First in line for the lump-sum death payment is the widow, or widower, if living with the insured person when the death occurred. If there is no qualified widow or widower, the lump sum will go to the person or persons who take care of the burial expenses of the

deceased. That is why many people refer to it as a "burial benefit". Actually, there is no mention of a burial benefit in the law. A widow or widower, if living with the deceased when death occurred, is the only person who can claim the lump-sum payment simply because of relationship. Any other person, regardless of relationship, can be paid the lump sum only if there is no qualified widow or widower, and then only in proportion to the part of the burial expenses paid by this other person.

Monthly benefits are paid only on the basis of relationship and dependency, and without regard as to how the lump sum is paid. A widow usually qualifies for both monthly benefits and the lump sum.

The amount that can be paid as a lump sum death benefit is three times the monthly retirement rate

earned by the deceased, but not more than \$255.00. Seldom does a person receive back an amount as large as the payment he made on the burial, and in no case can he receive more. A claim for the lump sum benefit must be filed within two years after the death occurs.

An Eleventh Commandment

The local Soil Conservation Service personnel and the commissioners of the Tennessee-River Soil Conservation District join with Dr. Walter Clay Lowdermilk, in asking our people to consider an Eleventh Commandment during Soil Stewardship Week.

Dr. Lowdermilk says and I quote his An Eleventh Commandment. "Thou shalt inherit the Holy Earth as a faithful steward, conserving its resources and productivity from generation to generation. Thou shalt safe-guard thy fields from soil erosion, thy living waters from drying up, thy forest from desolation, and protect thy hills

from overgrazing by the herds, that thy descendants may have abundance forever. If any shall fail in this stewardship of the land, thy fruitful fields shall become sterile, stony ground and wasting gullies, and thy descendants shall decrease and live in poverty or perish from off the face of the earth."

Honey Bees Needed For Production Of White Clover Seed

State College, Miss.—The number of honey bees required to pollinate white clover for seed production may not be as great as has generally been believed. Recent tests by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station have led to the conclusion that one strong colony may be adequate for 10 acres of clover although a margin should be allowed. The usual recommendation has been one colony per acre for seed production.

Entomologist H. B. Green of State College conducted the tests in a large clover field on the Moon Valley Ranch near Port Gibson, Mississippi. He placed all the bee

hives on one edge of the field and marked locations at 100 yard intervals up to 975 yards from the nearest hive.

Careful checking of the blooms per square yard, bees per 100 blooms, seed per pod, and seed per head convinced him that adequate pollination extended even to the locations farthest from the hives.

In summarizing the work, Mr. Green said:

"Cage and field tests with white clover have shown that honey bees are needed to produce seed yields harvest, but native bees seem to be adequate for reseeding of pastures.

"It does not appear necessary to have more than one strong colony of honey bees for 10 acres of clover but due to competitive bloom in an area, it would seem wise to allow a margin.

"The tests also indicate that bees disperse well, and spreading hive locations in white clover is not necessary to insure uniform coverage."

The complete report is published in the April issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station at State College.

ric will shrink, or stretch, if it is washable, the strength of the fabric, and the fastness of the color.

What about workmanship? Are the seams well sewn, hems ample, is it reinforced at strain points? How does it fit? If you are going to have to do a lot of alteration, pass it up.

Think a minute... could you make the garment for less money than you can buy it? If so, do you have time to sew, and do you enjoy sewing? If yes is the answer to all three questions, maybe you'd be better off making the dress.

Remember, buy with a plan, not by hit or miss.
Cut Flowers

Here are some suggestions for keeping cut flowers fresh longer. Cut with a sharp knife in late afternoon. Be sure that the container in which you put the flowers is clean. Copper containers work well as they keep down bacteria, which clogs stems of flowers and cuts down on water absorption.

When cutting the stems, make a slanting cut as the flowers take up water through the cut ends of the stems... this gives more area to take up the water.

Do not allow leaves to stay in the water... they soon decay and foul the water.

Keep cut flowers out of drafts and as cool as possible, especially when first cut.

Water For The Machine
One point to check when thinking of buying a washing machine is how much water it requires.

If water is scarce, expensive or difficult to pump-or if heating water is inconvenient or expensive, or the hot water supply short, then the amount of water required will be improved to you.

Washing machines vary in water use from 6 to 20 gallons for one filling of tub. Laboratory tests show no definite relationship between effectiveness of the washing and the amount of water used.

See your dealer and find out which type-non-automatic, semi-automatic or automatic is the best suited for your needs.

Vegetables For The Table
You need one green or yellow vegetable a day to build your body, make it grow and keep it in order.

Try growing your own vegetables. Those raised in the home garden have a higher vitamin C content and a better flavor than the older vegetables that you buy in a store. And if eaten raw, they contain 4 to 5 times as much ascorbic acid as when cooked.

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Gas Tax Refund

Farmers can get a gasoline tax refund of 2 cents a gallon on gasoline actually used on the farm in connection with actual farming operations.

He cannot get the refund of the Federal Gasoline Tax on gas used for family use, on public roads or for hauling livestock or produce to market.

He must file his claim with the district director of the Internal Revenue Service after June 30 and before October 1 for gasoline used during the first six months of the year. After this first filing, farmers will be expected to file claims for refunds on a yearly basis—July 1 through June 30.

Sufficient records must be kept to verify accuracy of amount of refund claimed.

Records now kept by many farmers for refunds from the Mississippi Motor Vehicle Comptrollers Office should be sufficient for claim-

ing refunds on the Federal Gasoline Tax.

Cotton Production
Thrips control is important. Last year, all 5-acre cotton contestants who made extra high yields, controlled thrips.

Cotton needs a shot of extra fertilizer too. Side dressing with some extra nitrogen is important when cotton reaches the earliest square stage.

When applying extra regular nitrogen as a solid, lower the cultivator sweep or distributor shovel two inches below regular cultivation depth. This places the nitrogen next to the moisture and where it will not be disturbed during cultivation.

If cotton is side dressed use 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre.

Kill Garden Insects
Home gardens are getting off to a good growth. Do not wait until the insects damage the plants before starting an insect control program. Have insecticide and dusting or spraying equipment ready.

There are a number of recommended insecticides but probably the best all round one is Methoxychlor. 1 1/4% Rotenone will also give good control on a number of garden insects.

Sabadilla Dust is recommended for the Harlequin Cabbage Bug Mason, in Athens, Ala.

If plant lice or spider mites cause trouble, they can be easily controlled with Malathion.

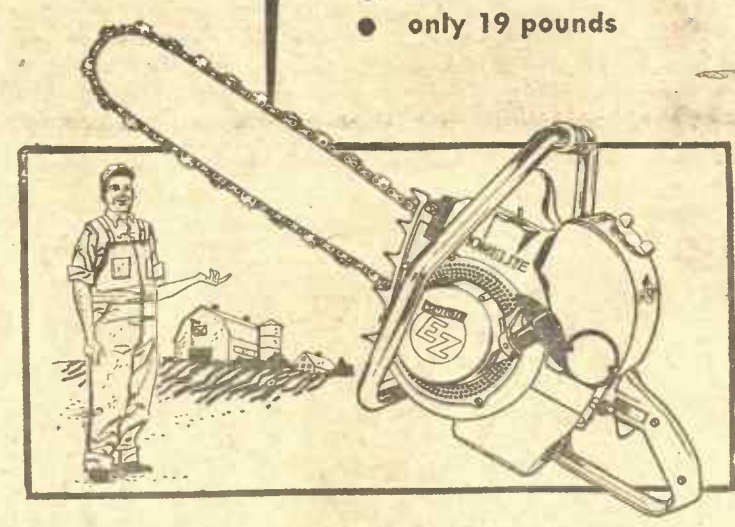

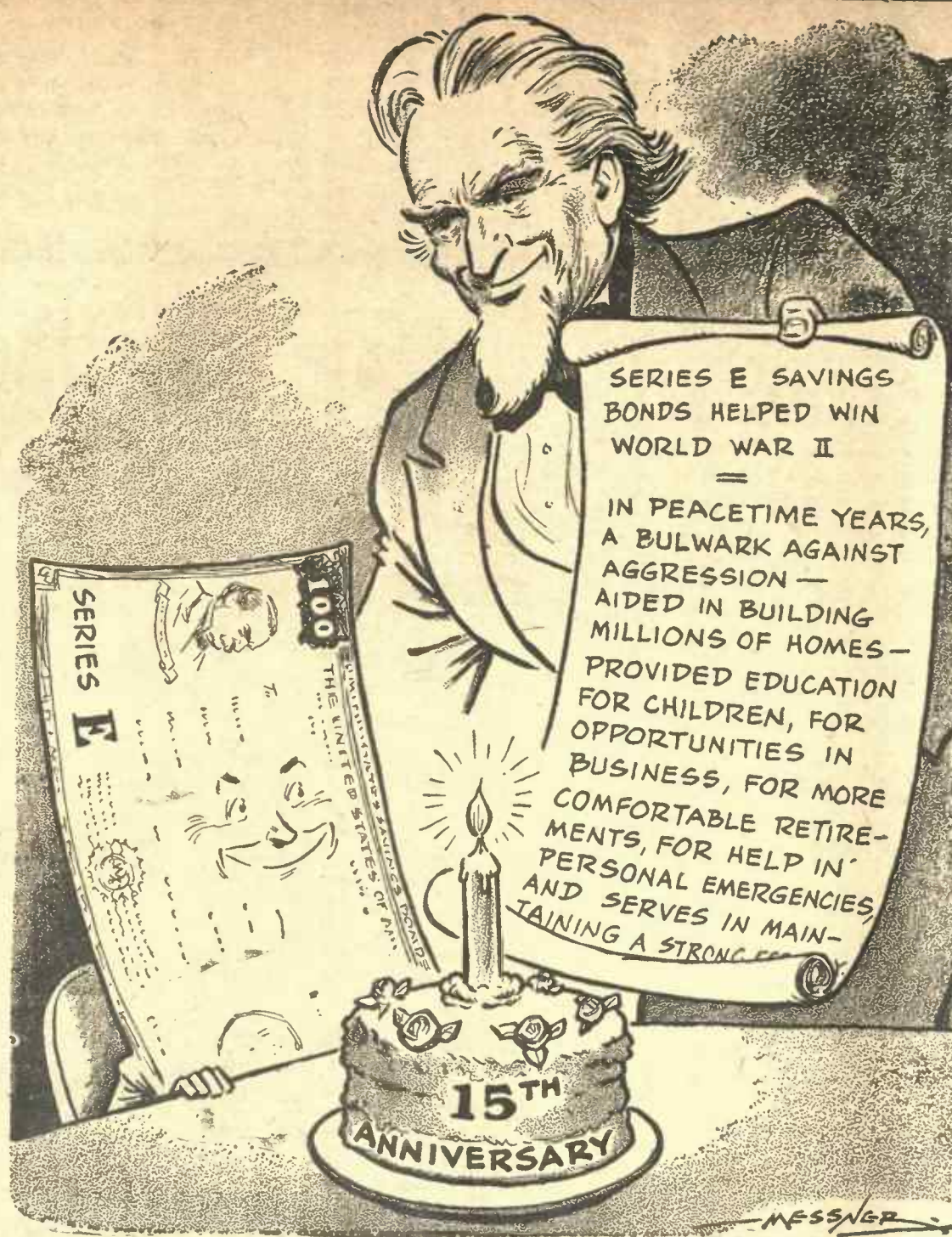

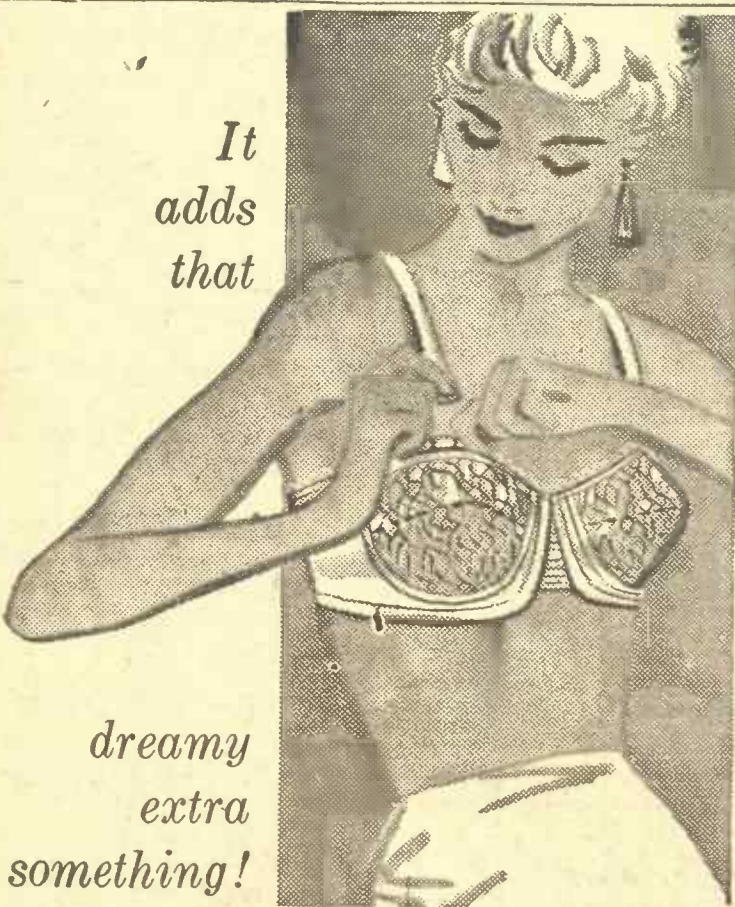
