Rural Mail Box Improvement Week

For the past sixteen years, one week in May has been set aside as Rural Mail Box Improvement Week. This year the week of May 21-26 has been selected.

Rural boxes improperly erected or in unserviceable condition retard delivery of mail and expose it to the weather. The Department wishes to encourage rural patrons to provide suitable receptacles, erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility, presenting a neat appearance, and affording protection of the mail. Rural Patrons of the County are urged to cooperate in this program of improvement.

All rural boxes will be checked and holders notified of necessary repair to meet Postal regulations. Here are some of the qualifications your mail box should meet: your box should be an approved box, conveniently located with a door; it should be waterproof with your name printed in black or other dark color letters about one inch in height; your box should be on the right-hand side of the road as traveled by the carrier and the approach to your box should be filled and properly graded and kept unobstructed at all times; the box should face the road and should have a signal; the post for your box should be painted white and the box painted with either white or aluminum paint.

Rural areas of this county can be improved if everyone will cooperate in Rural Mail Box Improvement Week.

A RESOLUTION

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen then took up for consideration the matter of the issuance of Thirty-One Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$31,000.00) Street Improvement Notes of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, and after a discussion of the subject, Alderman Joe W. Thompson offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE NEGOTIABLE NOTES OF THE SAID TOWN IN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF THIRTY ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$31,000.00) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COST OF IMPROVING STREETS IN SAID TOWN.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, having made due investigation, find, determine, and declare that it is necessary to improve streets in said Town; that the estimated cost thereof is Thirty-One Thousand Dollars (\$31,000.00); and that there are at this time no funds available in the treasury of said Town for the payment of such costs; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and advisable in the public interest that the sum of Thirty-One Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$31,000.00) required for the aforesaid purpose be obtained through the issuance of notes of said Town as hereinafter proposed; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town do further find and declare that the assessed valuation of taxable property within said Town of Iuka, according to the last completed assessment, is Six Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand One Hundred Twenty-Four and No/100 (\$625,124.00) Dollars, and that the total general obligation bonded indebtedness of said Town at this time is Nineteen Thousand Nine Hundred Forty-Seven, and 96/100 Dollars (\$19,947.96); and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued, namely, Thirty-One Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$31,000.00), when added to the aforesaid outstanding indebtedness of said Town, will not exceed ten per centum (10%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said Town; and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued does not exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) of five per centum (5%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Iuka has not, within a period of twelve (12) months from the date of this resolution, heretofore issued bonds or notes without an election, under the provisions of Section 7, Chapter 493 Laws of Mississippi, 1950: NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, do hereby declare their intention to issue notes of said Town in the amount of Thirty-One Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$31,000.00) to raise money for the purpose of paying the cost of improving streets in said Town.

SECTION 2. That the issuance of the said notes will be authorized at a meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town to be held at the Town Hall in the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, at the hour of 2 o'clock P.M., on Friday, the 18th day of May, 1956, unless twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of said Town shall file a written protest against the issuance of said bonds on or before said date and hour.

SECTION 3. That notice be hereby given that a written protest against the issuance of said notes may be filed with the Town Clerk of the Town of Iuka at or prior to the above-named date and hour, and that if such protest be filed and be signed by twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of said Town, then an election on the question of the issuance of said notes shall be called and held as is provided by law.

Alderman N. C. Pruitt seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:

Alderman E. E. Murrah voted yes, Alderman J. W. Thompson voted yes, Alderman N. C. Pruitt voted yes, Alderman Eugene Wadley voted yes, Alderman W. F. Dugger, Absent.

The motion having received the affirmative vote of all the members of the Board of Aldermen present, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted, this 21 day of April, 1956.

Your Garden
Is in good shape... from weeds, with everything and producing rapidly? There are still a lot of May gardening chores to do,

if you are going to reap the kind of harvest you hope for. Here are some of the jobs... prune and stake early tomatoes, side dress the April planted vegetables, keep your "bug gun" handy, and use it when necessary. Where you have removed early vegetables like onions or cabbage, set tomato, eggplant or pepper plants in the skips. For later tomatoes, plant some seed in hills. Set the "suckers" you pruned from the tomato plants.

There are quite a number of vegetables that can be planted through this month and up into June.

Come by the office and get your copy of the Garden, Fruit and Flower Guide and a copy of the Year-Round Home Garden booklet. Both are free.

In June, remember to harvest regularly... control grass and weeds, continue planting, keep bugs out of your garden... and at the same time protect some of your beneficial bugs and toads... some of the insects that help you keep the bad ones out of the garden are lady bugs, praying mantis, dragon flies; then toad frogs and lizards also feed on insects.

How About Cabbage?
Cooked, or raw, cabbage is good. Its good for you too. It is also a "quick cook" vegetable, and saves you time.

For cooked cabbage, boiling in salted water, flavored with bacon drippings is good. For variation, you might like to use milk and butter instead of the water. Another angle on cooking cabbage is to "pan" it.

Here is how. Shred the cabbage and place it in a heavy skillet containing two or three tablespoons of melted fat. Toss shreds about

constantly so each piece is covered with fat. Cook until tender but crisp.

Want to change the color of your cabbage? For a bright red cabbage, add a little vinegar or lemon juice to the cooking water.

For salad, cabbage is especially good. It combines well with green peppers, carrots, apples, pineapples, bananas or marshmallows. For the salad to be at its best, the cabbage should be crisp, shredded carefully with a sharp knife and served quickly to avoid loss of vitamin C.

Plus the fact that cabbage is plentiful and costs little, it all adds up to good eating.

Care of Heart Attack Victim
The increasing frequency of people having heart attacks means that more folks are going to need to know what to do when a heart attack strikes.

Here are the rules: Call a doctor at once. Help the patient take the position in which he finds it easier to breathe, this is usually halfway between lying down and sitting.

Do not attempt to carry or lift the patient except under a doctor's supervision. Loosen tight clothing, such as belts and shirt collar.

See that the patient does not get chilled, but don't pile on so many blankets that he starts to sweat. Do not give him anything to drink before the doctor arrives.

Annual Report Must Be Filed If Income Is \$1200

Many students take occasional part-time work during vacation periods. If they are receiving social security benefits based on a deceased or aged parent's social security account, they should know about the retirement test which became effective in 1955. This new test increases the amount of money one can earn while receiving benefits checks for all months in a year. The amount of monthly earnings is no longer considered, provided annual earnings do not exceed \$1200. However, all earnings must be counted, whether or not the work is covered by social security.

If a person earns more than \$1200 in a year, he is required to file an annual report with the Social Security Administration by March 15th of the following year, whether they were from wages and/or self-employment, list the months in which earnings were more than \$80 or substantial services were rendered in a trade or business, and indicate whether it is expected earnings will amount to more than \$1200 in the year the report is submitted. Report forms are mailed to anyone who reported earnings during the previous year. If you earn more than the \$1200 in 1956 and did not receive this form, or if you need help in completing the form, you should contact your nearest social security district office. The nearest social security office is located at 101 W. Third Street, Sheffield, Alabama.
