Contract Accepted For Digging Of Well At New FFA Camp Site On Indian Creek

Announcement is made this week by A. P. Fatheree, State Supervisor of Agricultural Education, that a contract has been accepted for the digging of a well on the new FFA campsite that is to be located on the east bank of Indian Creek where it enters Pickwick lake.

Already a roadway has been graded to the site and it is expected that the road will be graveled within the very near future. Only hold up at this point, according to Mr. Fatheree, is lack of electric

power on the project. In a letter to L. V. Edwards, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Burnsville, Mr. Fatheree said: "Soon as the power-line is completed I think we can begin some building."

W. H. Copeland is the contractor for digging the well. Galvanized pipe will be used in the well and the contract calls for a minimum of 750 gallons of silt-free water per hour.

Necessity For Reorganization Of Schools Is Clarified By State Attorney-General

In a letter to Attorney-General Joe T. Patterson, C. J. Edwards, superintendent of school of Sunflower County, Miss., asked the following question:

"What is the total penalty to a county for failure to have a school district reorganization plan accepted by the Educational Finance Commission, July 1, 1957?"

Att.-Gen. Patterson, in his reply, said: "Section 1, Chapter 12, Laws of Extraordinary Session, 1953, provides: 'All school districts in existence in the State of Mississippi upon the effective date of this act are hereby abolished, but all such school districts shall continue to exist, with all the powers, rights, privileges and prerogatives thereof, as now provided by law, until such school districts shall be reconstituted or the territory thereof consolidated with other territory as hereinafter prescribed.' Said Section further provides that: 'As soon as practicable after the passage of this act, and in no

event later than July 1st, 1957,' that the county board of education of each county, pursuant to a survey of such county, shall consolidate the territory of the county in such districts, or reconstitute existing school districts so that all the territory of such county shall then be included within such school districts as the county board of education shall deem necessary."

"It therefore necessarily follows that all school districts in the county," Mr. Patterson continues, "which fails to reconstitute or consolidate existing school districts by July 1, 1957, in accordance with said Chapter and Section, will be abolished from and after July 1, 1957, and said schools having been abolished on account of failure of the county school board to reconstitute or consolidate in accordance with said act would not be eligible for any of the benefits provided in said act."

A survey made in this county last year by personnel from Miss. State College is now under advisement. Dr. J. D. Falls of State College will meet with the Tishomingo County Board of Education, Trustees of the Iuka Separate School District, Supt. H. L. Shook of Iuka, and Cleston M. Scruggs, county superintendent of education, on the first Monday in June (Monday, June 4), to further discuss plans for reorganizing the Tishomingo schools in accordance with the law as it was passed in 1953. Plans will be published as soon as they are decided upon, Supt. Scruggs said.

Smallpox Vac. Should Be Given Small Children

Dr. James C. Totten, County Health Doctor, says that a review of the records shows that many parents are waiting until their babies reach pre-school age before giving their smallpox vaccinations. The reaction is much more severe when the child is that old. Also, the child has gone 4-5 years with no protection from smallpox. All children should be vaccinated between the 4th month and 1st year of life. At this time they get less reaction, less scar, and more immunity. They should be re-vaccinated every 5 years.

Smallpox is not extinct. It is caged up to a great extent, but it will burst out in epidemic form if given half a chance. Office hours for giving immunizations are Wednesday afternoons from 1-5 p.m. and Saturday mornings from 8 until 12.

2-Car Smash-Up Near Iuka Injures Four

One of the worst wrecks to occur in Tishomingo county in the past several months happened late Monday afternoon at 5:30 when two cars smashed into each other about three and one half miles south of Iuka on Highway 25 at the Enlow bottom.

A Mr. Enlow was going north in a pickup truck. Following several hundred yards behind was a 1955 two door Chevrolet driven by Clayton W. Tension, Paden, with Dan McAlister as Passenger. Mr. Enlow signaled for a left turn but had to stop because of the approaching automobile of Delmar Cunningham, Booneville, Route 5. Mr. Cunningham was going south in a 1954 Chevrolet with John W. Woodruff as only other occupant. Tension, seeing Mr. Enlow signal for a left hand turn, applied his brakes but only the brakes on the left side caught causing the car to skid down the road right side first. Cunningham's automobile hit the skidding car square in the side. Mr. Enlow's pickup truck was not damaged.

Mr. Cunningham, age 46, received head injuries and Mr. Woodruff, age 73, received cuts on the face and a fractured jaw and hip. Although Tension age 39, escaped with only slight bruises, McAlister, age 25, received a broken shoulder and collar bone. They were all carried to Cosby Clinic but later Mr. Woodruff and Mr. McAlister were carried to Memphis.

"Charges were preferred against Tension," Highway Patrolman Audie Marlar the investigating officer, said.

\$31,612.77 Is Low Bid For Paving Iuka Streets; 4 Firms Offered Bids For Job

W. E. Blain & Son Construction Co. of Mt. Olive, Miss., was low bidder on the proposal to pave the streets in the Town of Iuka, but as this newspaper goes to press (Wed. night) a contract be-

tween Town officials and the construction company had not been signed.

Bids for paving the streets were opened last Friday morning in the Mayor's office. The four firms making bids were Mangum Paving Co., Port Gibson, Miss., \$35,661.85; M & W Construction Co., Tupelo, \$43,134.69; Bowyer & Johnson Construction Co., Jackson, Tenn., \$32,050.40; and W. E. Blain & Son Construction Co., Mt. Olive, Miss., \$31,612.77.

Most of the streets of the Town will receive a single course treatment consisting of heated asphalt and limestone rock chips that will range in size from 5/8 inch, down-

Eight blocks in the business district will receive a rock asphalt plant mix which will leave a smooth surface. Streets on which this mix will be used are Front, Fulton, Tate and Main.

Specifications in the contract call for improving the grading and drainage on all streets where needed. Grader work is to be done on all shoulders and ditches and concrete will be used in those where it is necessary and as set forth in the engineers plans and specifications.

There are over eight miles of streets in the town that will be improved. Among them are Adams, Aberdeen, Betty Dale, Eastport, Fifth, Fourth, Fulton, Gaines, Indian Creek Road, Main, Martin, Meigs, Mill, Oak, Pike, Red Sulphur Springs Road, Rowena, Second, Seward's Drive, Stone, Third, and Tate (formerly known as Pearl) streets.

Work on paving is to begin within ten days from the date of signing the contract with the construction company.

Robert A. Scott is the engineer serving the Town on this paving project.

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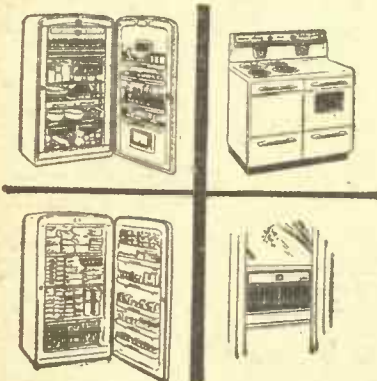

June 1 Deadline For Potato Growers Applications

State College, Miss.—(Special).—All Mississippi certified sweet potato growers who expect to sell, exchange or give away sweet potatoes or potato plants next season must make written application before June 1, to the State Plant Board at State College for the necessary inspections, sending a money order for fifty cents with the application.

This rule of the Plant Board, according to R. P. Colmer, chief inspector of the board at State College, applies to all growers, whether they have been previously certified or not. There is no charge for the inspections. The fifty cent advance deposit can be used as partial payment for sweet potato certificate tags or certificate tape. If the growers' fields should not pass inspection, the deposit will be returned.

"In requesting the inspections, the grower should give his name and address, acreage in potatoes to be inspected, and location of his farm," Mr. Colmer said.

County Agent news

By W. C. HAMILTON
Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension
While the farmers of Tishomingo County rank high in corn production and about average in the production of cotton, we are near the bottom of the list when it comes to milk production per cow. We need to double our milk production per cow if we plan to stay in the dairy business. We would be forced out of the milk or dairy business if milk allotments were set up and there is a possibility of this in the future. Here are some of the things

- that would increase milk production per cow:
1. Breed for a better herd. The Artificial Breeding Program where it is available. When you breed artificially you are not guessing, you are breeding to proven bulls.
 2. Provide for sufficient grazing spring, summer and fall.
 3. Plan on having plenty of good quality hay and silage.
 4. Feed enough grain but not too much. The rate of feed should be 1 pound to 4 pounds.
 5. Keep individual production, feed and breeding records.
 6. Milk quickly, quietly, gently and completely.
 7. Cull low producers, shy breeders and transmitters of low production.
 8. Protect from flies and other parasites.

Remember this, if you milk cows you are working for them. If you will do the things you should do the cows you now milk will double your milk check. Here is a good slogan - "Breed right, feed right and manage right."

Thrip Control

Control thrips to protect stand and speed growth of seedling cotton. Thrips control is an insurance toward a healthy, fast growing plant. Spray or dust when first pair of leaves spread. A second application 7 to 10 days later usually is needed near grain fields, ditch banks, pasture and woods. To find thrips in the field, pull a plant or two from the soil and

shake over a piece of white or a80 paper or a handkerchief. Curled in color from light bud and ragged black and are the young plants.

Household Workers Eligible For Social Security Benefits

It was a happy day for Anna Drobny when she started to work in the home of the Johnsons just three years ago. To see her busily doing the household chores or taking care of the three small Johnson boys would give you the impression that she was a much younger woman. Anna has just passed her 65th birthday.

In a lifetime filled with horror and heartbreaks, Anna survived two world wars. She spent most of her life in a small Czechoslovakian town near the border of Hungary. Both of her own sons were killed in action during World War II. Her husband died of shrapnel wounds from a bomb which destroyed their small home. The next few years were spent in displaced persons camps. Finally, the news that Anna's brother, living in this country, was able to arrange for her release and transfer to the United States was almost too good to be true.

Anna's brother had worked for many years at the plant where Bill Johnson was recently promoted to personnel supervisor. He arranged with Mr. and Mrs. John-

son to give Anna a trial work one-day-a-week. In addition, Anna's cooking provided a delightful change from the routine meals they were accustomed to.

During this visit Anna was told that the 1954 amendments brought under social security all household workers who are paid \$50 or more cash wages in a calendar quarter by the employer.

Anna makes \$6 a day from each of her five employers. Since there are 13 weeks in every quarter of the year, it wasn't hard to figure that her earnings from each employer add up to \$78 for a quarterly three-month period.

What surprised Anna even more was that, because of her age, she needed to work steadily for only a year and a half to qualify for social security benefits. She was quite stunned to learn that since her earnings add up to \$120 a month, she may become eligible for a \$62.50 monthly old-age benefit from social security.

No wonder Anna looks like a much younger woman. She can look forward to the future with confidence. She has the assurance of receiving social security benefits when she is no longer able to work or when she is unable to work as steadily as she does now.
