In the 55-56 term 655 students were enrolled as compared to 627 in 54-55 with an average daily attendance of 586 in 55-56 and 520 in 54-55. In the year just recently ended 84 students dropped out of school whereas in the 54-55 term 109 students dropped out. In the 55-56 term 519 were promoted to the next grade while 485 were promoted in the 54-55 term. This year school received 33 transfers of students from out-of-state while last term only 14 were transferred. These figures, Supt. of Schools H. L. Shook said, "are indicative of the growth that Iuka is undergoing due to industrialization." The figures look good and we only hope that next year will show a greater increase in numbers.

He was given two pints of blood before being carried on to Kennedy hospital.

Mr. Myrick, about 31 and a veteran, was married to the former Christine Thornton, who survives. The body is expected to arrive today (Thursday) on Train 36. Funeral arrangements were incomplete.

Polio Vaccine Available At Co. Health Dept.

Polio Vaccine is now available at the health department for anyone under 20 yrs. of age, and to pregnant women.

Infants should be 6 mos. of age or more for best results. Pregnant women must have a request slip from their family physician. Over 3000 polio immunizations have been given to date with no reaction other than an occasional penicillin rash. The vaccine contains penicillin in small quantities as a preservative.

You may receive these immunizations at your health department on Wednesday afternoons from 1 until 5 o'clock and Saturday mornings from 8 until 12.

Site Tentatively Approved For Public Housing Project In Town Of Iuka

John B. Stormont, Jr., Executive Director of the Housing Authority of the Town of Iuka, states this week that a site for the construction of 26 units has been tentatively approved by personnel from the Atlanta Regional office of the Public Housing Administration.

In a letter to Mr. Stormont, the Public Housing Administration states further:

"We have been notified by Commissioner Slusser that he has found a current need for 26 low rent units at Iuka. Presidential approval has been obtained for a preliminary loan contract and we have been authorized to execute this contract and to process requests

for advances of preliminary loan funds for use in planning these 26 units.

"The following distribution of these units is suggested - four 1-bedroom; ten 2-bedroom; ten 3-bedroom, and two 4-bedroom-total 26."

Public Housing Commission of Iuka includes Herman Gann, chairman; H. M. Biggs, vice-chairman; E. E. Cutshall, J. L. Dean, and Leon Phillips, commissioners. Temporary officers for the commission are located in the Town Hall.

"Plans for Iuka Public Housing project are going forward as fast as possible," Mr. Gann said.

Burnsville Youth Center Provides Entertainment For Teenagers

The people of the Burnsville community are to be highly commended for the work and support they have given to the Youth Center there. It is the only one in this area.

Last year, the Burnsville P-TA had a question box. One of the questions drawn from the box, was, "How can we entertain the Youth of our community?" A P-TA committee then contacted various other organizations such as the Eastern Star in an attempt to begin the Youth Center. The town also helped to finance the Center. A Building was obtained from the Masons and a committee from each organization began to raise money for the Center. Many donations of money and materials were given to help the project. The material for the curtains was a donation but the home economic girls made and hung them.

The first open house held for the children was in July of last year. Regular nights were set aside for each age group to meet. The teenagers group meet twice a month and the primary and pre-school group meet once a month. Also the Adult P-TA committee meets once a month to plan the activities of the Youth Center.

When the groups meet, they watch television, play games or read. All are under the supervision of a member of members of the P-TA. Refreshments which are furnished by the teenagers are served at the parties. Occasionally the P-TA will furnish the food and drinks.

This year the Fourth Grade won in the P-TA membership contest and were given a party in the Youth Center by the P-TA. The center is also used for birthday parties, Christmas parties and H-DC meetings. The Training Union is planning a banquet to be held in the Youth Center in a short while.

Recently a very useful and attractive department has been added to the Center. Friday, May 25, a community library was opened at the Youth Center. This library is a branch of the Northeast Regional Library but is sponsored by the P-TA. It will be open Friday afternoon until four o'clock with Mrs. Floyd Marlar in charge. On the afternoons when the library is open the children may watch television or play or participate in any other activity that they choose. Mrs. Marlar will be assisted by other P-TA members in keeping the library open. A reading certificate will be given to the child and adult who reads the most books.

Last Friday night the Teenage group held the first party of the summer. Other groups are planning for their party which will be held sometime soon. Couples from the P-TA take turns in helping with the entertainment at the parties. Mrs. L. A. Strickland is recreation chairman for the center. She is assisted by Mrs. "Chugg" Foote, Mrs. Bill Burcham, and Mrs. Russell Bonds.

P-TA officers are Mrs. L. V. Edwards, president; Mrs. Audie Marlar, vice president; Mrs. Bill Burcham, secretary; and Mrs. J. J. Robinson, treasurer.

The regular parties and open house will continue on throughout the summer with plans for enlarging and improving the center being made.

Prec. & County Democratic Convention Dates Named

W. R. Nettles, chairman of the county Democratic Executive committee, announces that precinct conventions all over the county will be held on Tuesday, June 5 at 10 a.m. and the county Democratic convention will convene in the Courthouse on Tuesday, June 12 at 10 a.m.

These dates are set by the State Democratic Executive committee. The State Democratic Convention will be held in Jackson on Monday, July 16, at 10 a.m. in the City Auditorium.

In the county convention that is to be held on Tuesday, June 12, delegates to the state convention will be named and a county Democratic executive committee will be selected.

Governor J. P. Coleman today issued the following statement in regards to delegates to the national Democratic Convention:

1. I repeat what I have so many times already said that if I go to the Democratic National Convention as Chairman of the Mississippi delegation I will fight with all the ability and resourcefulness at my command for the best interests of Mississippi not only in the field of segregation and states rights but on all other subjects.

2. I have no objection to recessing our state convention if a sufficient number of the other Southern states join us to encourage reasonable hopes of success. If they do not join us, then I am still opposed to Mississippi being made the burnt offering for others who will not act. If we do recess, I would prefer that we reconvene after the National Republican Convention shall have adjourned. Then we shall see what our Republican friends are saying and doing.

3. All consideration of "instructions" should be deferred until the state convention meets. We can then act in the light of facts known to exist on July 16, more than six weeks from this date. I still favor, an uninstructed delegation in keeping with past precedent. This simply means that we would be left free to vote for that candidate and adopt that convention strategy which most likely would assure the success of our principles. If a delegation goes to a convention under instructions it must follow those instructions; yet the facts of August 13 could well make those instructions a great stumbling block instead of a help.

4. By no means would I ever support the candidates of men like Governor Harriman or Senator Kefauver, nor would I support a platform harmful to the South. I know from experience in past conventions that we must stay in position to do our deadliest nest to block the possibility of such unhappy events.

5. By all means, the State Convention should declare and define the principles of our party. This should be enough for the guidance of an honest delegation. Furthermore, it would have great usefulness in future state elections.

New Farm Bill Prevents State From 14% Drop In Cotton Acreage Next Year

Washington, D. C. — Mississippi will be spared a 14 per cent drop in cotton acreage next year by a provision in the new farm bill, Senator James O. Eastland said today.

In addition, another Eastland-sponsored portion of the bill is expected to greatly increase cotton shipments abroad which may eventually lead to expanded cotton acreage in Mississippi.

Those are two major items listed in a report to the state's farmers released today by Senator Eastland.

"Prevention of this loss of acres, plus the export program, offers real relief for 1958 without further deterioration for 1957," he pointed out.

He said the bill also permits the small cotton farmer to plant four acres or the highest planted for the past three years, and sets up a better price support system for dairy farmers.

The bill passed by both houses places a floor on cotton acreage reduction which means that Mississippi cannot lose more than one per cent of its acreage.

"We succeeded in getting a cotton export amendment which we hope will export between 4 and 5 million bales of cotton in the next fiscal year, thus recapturing our former position in the export markets," Eastland said.

The amendment provides that the exported cotton be sold for as low as 25 1/2 cents for 15/16 middling cotton or even lower, if necessary, to meet the competition from other cotton exporting countries.

"To give an idea what this means, last week the government opened bids under the present one million bale export program and

there were bids for 648,000 bales at 25 1/2 cents and above. However, only 23,000 of these bales received a bid of 27 1/2 cents a pound, which is the current price the Secretary of Agriculture is accepting.

"Thus, if the new farm bill had been in effect more than 600,000 bales of additional cotton would have been moved, or roughly 900,000 acres of cotton production.

"In short, this one biweekly sale would have opened up for the future an additional 900,000 acres of cotton. Sales like this for the remainder of this year and up until June of next year will go a long way toward preparing the stage for an expanded cotton acreage with which we can live," he said.

Concerning the Soil Bank provision, the Senator said there is a "considerable debate" about how useful the program will be.

"However, it will be of real benefit in many cases and will help to reduce the surpluses nationwide costing perhaps less money than the present storage charges plus discount sales.

In support prices, Eastland said Mississippi will lose less than two cents a pound on a statewide basis, but pointed out that "considering the enormous loss the government is taking in its export program whereby we will gain great amounts of acreage, this is a minor consideration."

"It will likewise help to make our cotton more competitive with synthetics. Last year additional rayon expansion cost us 800,000 acres of cotton.

Cotton

Get ready to thin out the boll weevil population. If you want to set an early crop, begin poisoning when boll weevils appear in seedling cotton.

Remember, if you want to set an early crop, you will have to destroy the insects that destroy pinpoint squares.

Examine young cotton. If squar-

es about the size of a pin head are turning brown and falling off, it can usually be traced to cotton flea hoppers, thrips, bollworms or tarnished plant bugs. Three applications of insecticide applied at 7-day intervals when the plant begins squaring will help in setting an early crop. This will also help in killing overwintered boll weevils.

Recommended insecticides for early season control is Dieldrin, Aldrin, Endrin, and Toxephene.

Make cotton pay top dividends. Side dress before squaring begins. The extra shot of nitrogen given the young plants by side dressing will pay off big in higher yields

and a faster growing, more vigorous plant.

More Egg Money

Quality pays off in egg production. Rapid cooling helps maintain quality.

Eggs should be gathered at least three times a day. A wire basket makes an ideal gathering utensil and also allows the eggs to cool out fast.

After gathering, the eggs should be immediately placed in a cool moist place. Have your egg flats, fillers and crates pre-cooled so that the eggs will maintain that coolness and is vital to quality.

Candle your eggs. It doesn't take many blood spots or eggs with foreign matter in them to lose your market for you.

Market your eggs often, twice a week this time of year is necessary. In the winter, you can get by with marketing only once a week, but with hot weather on us, it has to be more often.

Houseflies

The pesky housefly season has rolled around again and outlined below gives you excellent control: For flies inside the home use a .02% Pyrethrum spray. On porches and around barns

Malathion bait gives the best control. This material can be used also in a spray.

Apply to areas where flies rest and to breeding grounds such as manure piles, garbage cans, and barn doors.

Dry baits should be applied daily until flies are under control and sprays should be applied once each week.

In using Malathion be careful about spraying fed troughs, watering containers, and Do Not Apply To Livestock.

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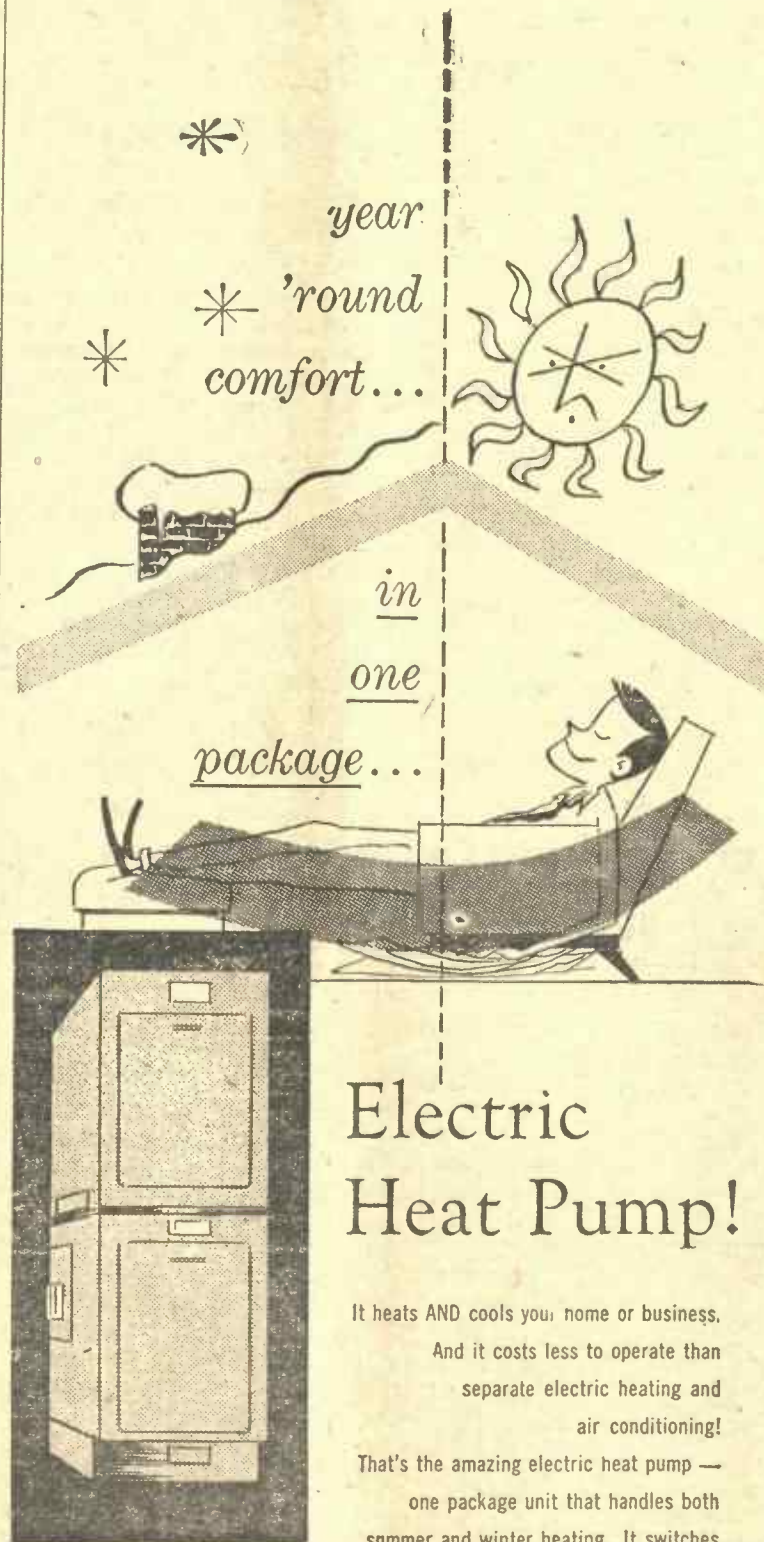

This Section Of County Well Known For Its Growing Pulpwood Industry

Few sections of the South are as well known for the pulpwood business as Tishomingo County, Miss.

One of the largest areas used as a wood lot found away from a pulpwood mill is located at Iuka. This is the wood lot northeast of town on the old Eastport road. It is operated by the Meade Corporation that has a mill at Kingsport, Tenn. This huge lot covers Xacres and is used principally to stack peeled oak wood and mixed kinds, including some gum and poplar.

Joe W. Thompson, W. C. (Bus) Foote, J. R. Carson, all of Iuka, and Jim Leitch of Burnsville are the principal dealers in the county. In 1955 the dealers shipped out of the county approximately 115 carloads of pulpwood. These cars averaged 18 cords to the car and the dollar value to the county's producers was in the neighborhood of \$30,000.00.

In six months of 1956 that figure has been greatly increased. About two hundred carloads have been shipped this year by all the dealers and this transformed into dollars and cents for the farmers means that over \$49,000.00 has been released in this section to the pulpwood producers.

A boon to cutting pulpwood has been the power saw. This implement has increased in use in this section by as much as 150 percent. Many pulpwood producers who formerly took weeks to cut a few units of wood can now do it in a minimum of time with the power saw.

Farmers from as far away as Booneville and Red Bay bring their pulpwood to Iuka, and many

of the producers of the area deliver the product to the Hiwassee Land Co. dock on the Alabama side of Bear Creek. It is estimated that several hundred farmers of the county sell the wood products in this way.

One type of pulpwood bought in the area is the peeled oak that is stacked on the big lot mentioned in the beginning. This peeled wood is sold at a premium price and is only marketable during the season when rising sap will permit the peeling operation. J. C. Carson is the dealer in charge of the peeled wood.

Of course, everyone who comes to Iuka is familiar with the sight of pine pulpwood stacked on the railroad siding ready for shipment.

Timber severance tax in now 12c per unit. This is an increase over last year when the tax was 6c. This tax is paid to the state treasury and is used by the Mississippi Forestry Commission in promotion of the state's forests and their protection against fire. Thus it is, through the timber severance tax the pulpwood producers of the county help to pay for the forest protection they receive.

JUNE 1 DEADLINE FOR CERTIFIED POTATO GROWERS

All Mississippi Certified sweet potato growers who expect to sell, exchange or give away seed sweet potatoes or potato plants next season must make written application before June 1, to the State Plant Board at State College for the necessary inspections, sending a money order for fifty cents with the application. This rule of the

Plant Board, applies to all growers, whether they have been previously certified or not. There is no charge for the inspections. The fifty cent advance deposit can be used as partial payment for sweet potato certificate tags or certificate tape. If the growers' fields do not pass inspection, the deposit is returned. In requesting the inspections, the grower should give his name and address, acreage in potatoes to be inspected, and location of his farm.

Bus Drivers' Training School To Be Held At Iuka

On June 4-6; and 7-9 a Bus Drivers' Training School will be held at the Iuka School. The school will be under the direction of the county superintendent of education, Cleston M. Scruggs, and will be taught by an instructor who has had special training in school Bus Driver Education. The instructor will be provided by the State Department of Education and will be assisted by a member of the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Each bus driver is required to have a driver's license and a bus driver's certificate certifying that he has completed the training course. All drivers are required to take the course every two years. Each driver must meet certain physical requirements; he must have the use of both hands and feet and must pass a standard eye test.

The course includes general information concerning State Laws, the rules of the road and methods of protecting the children. The driving test includes open road driving, loading and unloading children and seeing them safely across the highway. The safety of the children is the main purpose of the school.

The parent's viewpoint will be discussed by Mrs. Stovall Lowrey, Clarksdale, President of the Mississippi Congress of Parents and Teachers, a former English teacher.

Following Mrs. Lowrey, Dr. Redmond will address the conference on discipline, as it is expected by the public.

The psychologist's view will be outlined by Dr. Herbert Sorenson, Distinguished Profes-

quite popular. To the Soil Conservation Service, Technicians, and other agricultural leaders who work with the soil the PLIGHT of the bumblebee is due for some serious thought. In nature's chain of life insects have a vital part to play. The very existence of some plants depends on insects to pollinate the flowers which bear seed for reproducing the species. Entomologist, those who study insects, tell us there is a tremendous shortage of bees in this country. According to these scientists this shortage runs into billions of bees and similar insects needed to pollinate our clover and other legumes. Because there are not enough bees and other insects to pollinate the clovers and some other legume in our county and state, farmers are continually having to buy new seed and replant their land. This is an expensive operation and is costing the farmers a great deal of money. Legumes add nitrogen to our

soil; grasses need nitrogen if they are to thrive, and the bees or similar insects make possible the natural reseedling of permanent legumes—useful insects are the key to this situation. The bumblebee is the farmer's friend. The bumblebee has a definite place to fill in soil and water conservation. In poisoning harmful insects many useful ones will be destroyed, this is unavoidable. It is well to stop and think, however, and be willing to cooperate in any program that will conserve our useful insects.

Conservation is a way of thinking and a way of living. In scope it is as broad as nature itself. The Soil Conservation District commissioners know that the only way true conservation can be achieved is through educating all the people toward that goal. The bumblebee may appear most insignificant, but the bumblebee fills a vital place in scheme of things that concerns your life and mine. It is time for the land's sake that something be done about the plight of the bumblebee.

Wish To Avoid Drowning? Then Read, Heed This

- The first fishing trips and family outings of the season may be hectic affairs, but if you think you'll be able to spare 15 minutes for hearing a way to save yourself from drowning, paste this on the lid of your tackle box or picnic basket. Now, then, to details. Say that you are suddenly pitched into the water from a capsized boat, fully clothed. Here is a step-by-step outline of what to do:
1. With lungs full, float face down. Just relax. The back of your neck will be out of the water.
 2. Move your hands up, preparing for a downward thrust in the water. Make sure your mouth is empty.
 3. Exhale through the nose while raising your face out of the water.
 4. Make the downward thrust with hands or feet or both to clear the surface with your mouth. Inhale through your mouth, and when your lungs are full, sink back into the water.
 5. You'll float again. Beginners can rest here for three seconds or so. Experts rest 10 seconds. Then start the cycle again.
- And there you are. This may have been 15 minutes well spent.

Boats Should Be Given Proper Care

Proper care of your boat is not just a question of upkeep. With most models, particularly with small boats, it's not a matter of how much scraping, calking and painting—if any—you do. It is a matter of taking the trouble to find out just what care and treatment the craft needs, and then giving it that consistently. Different size boats require different treatment, just because of their size. So do the various constructions—metal, plastic, wood covered and uncovered, aluminum, and others by the dozen. The most important item in preserving the life of your boat is not to hit any solid objects hard enough to spring the hull or crack any part of it. Or, as Willard Crandall, boats and motors editor of Sports Afield magazine, says, "drive sensibly." No boat can be used without being scratched, marred or dented.

A boatman soon learns the latest touch-up products and techniques and to take such precautions as hanging out rub fenders over the gunwales before each landing. Resale values are poor on excessively scratched boats partly because dealers and other buyers suspect a slambanged boat is one that is loosened up or cracked. To be appearance-conscious is one of the best ways to avoid real damage to your hull. If it's on your mind not to scratch and scrape your boat, you're not likely to wham it hard enough to hurt the hull. Most damage that shortens a boat's life—both the sudden kind and the slow, continuous sort—occurs when the craft is out of use, when there is no one in it. Safety in morning. There's hazard even for a boat tied to a pier involves such matters as choosing a good spot and using the right length line, so the moored boat won't hit against anything. Then, a boatman must contend with land damage. Smaller craft that can be lifted can also be dropped. A trailer can rub on a vulnerable spot. Dampness, dryness and heat can take years from the life of your boat. But if you treat your boat right, you can add years to its life—five, ten or even more.

Organization Of Church Sun. Subj. Church Of Christ

Organization of Christ's church according to the New Testament

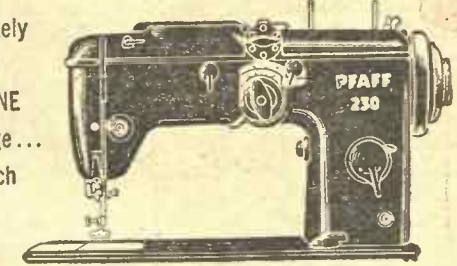

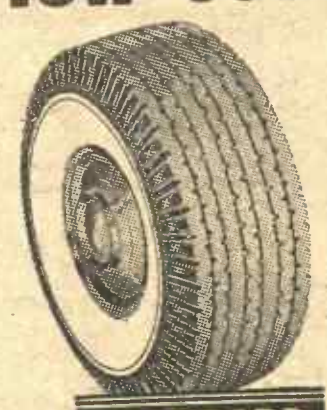

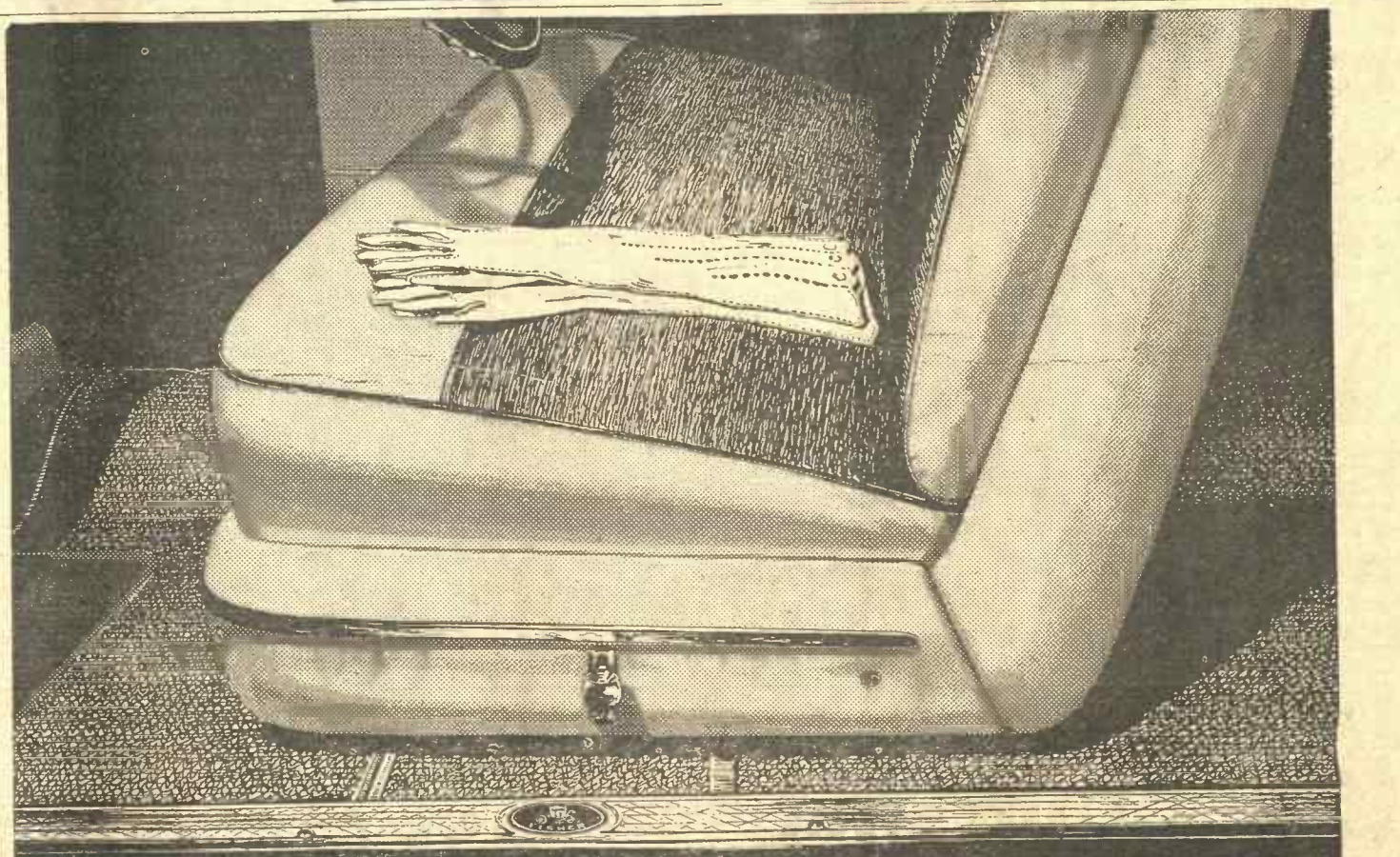

RICE-LAMB SKILLET DINNER



1½ pounds lamb shoulder
1 clove garlic, split
1 tablespoon shortening
2 tablespoons minced onions
½ cup diced celery
½ pound (2 med.) tomatoes
½ cup uncooked rice
1½ cups fresh or frozen peas
2 tablespoons minced parsley
1½ teaspoons salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
¼ teaspoon basil
1½ cups water

Remove bone and excess fat from meat and cut into small cubes or slices.

Brown meat and garlic in heated shortening in large skillet. Remove garlic. Add onions and celery and cook 5 minutes longer, stirring frequently to prevent overbrowning.

Remove skin from tomatoes and cut into small pieces. Add to meat. Bring to a boil. Lower heat; cover and simmer slowly for about 30 minutes, or until meat is tender.

Add remaining ingredients in order listed. Again bring mixture to a boil and lower heat. Cover and simmer about 20 minutes, or until rice and peas are tender. Yields six servings.

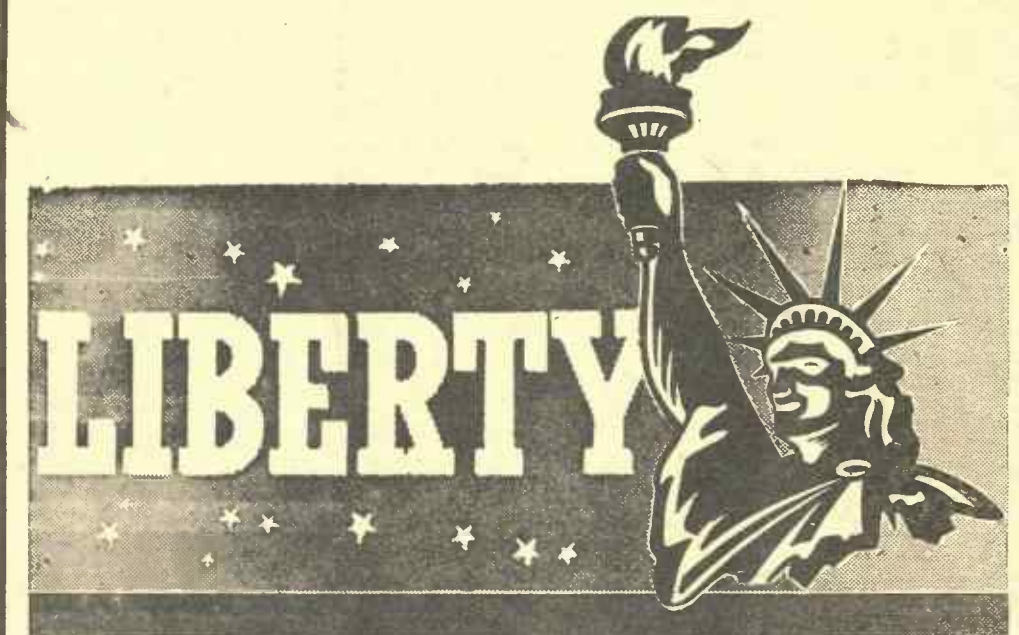
