Olen R. Nixon Retires As Burnsville
Rural Carrier; Served Forty-One Years

After 41 years of faithful service
to the patrons of the rural routes
of Burnsville, Olen R. Nixon has
retired from the U. S. Postal Ser-
vice.

Mr. Nixon was presented a cita-
tion from Postmaster General
Arthur E. Summerfield Friday af-
ternoon of last week in a quiet
ceremony in the Burnsville post
office, presentation being made by
Mrs. Golda Oaks, Postmaster of
that office, in the presence of Mr.
Nixon's co-workers. Also he was
the recipient of some very nice
gifts from his co-workers. They
were a Tex-Tan tie pin and cuff
links set, a tie, shirt and socks.

These were presented to him by
Howard McLeskey, carrier for
Rural Route 2, Burnsville.

Wording on the Postmaster Gen-
eral's citation reads:

"Post Office Department, Hon-
orary Recognition is Accorded
Olen R. Nixon for devotion to
duty in the course of an honorable
career in the United States Postal
Service.

"This citation, tendered upon the

occasion of retirement from active
duty, conveys official commenda-
tion from Postmaster General and
a cordial expression of esteem
from co-workers in the service.

"Issued in Washington, D. C.,
on May 31, 1956. S/Arthur E. Sum-
merfield, Postmaster General."

In connection with the Citation
Mr. Nixon also received a letter
from the Postmaster General
which reads:

"Dear Mr. Nixon:

"It gives me a great deal of
pleasure to present with this let-
ter an honorary recognition cer-
tificate in commemoration of your
more than 40 years of postal ser-
vice. Serving the patrons of your
community over all these years
must be a source of considerable
satisfaction to you.

"The good reputation this De-
partment enjoys is built on the loy-
al, honest service of persons like
you, and I am happy to commend
you for your contribution to our
efforts for a better Postal Service.

"I wish to extend my personal
greetings and hope you will accept
this honorary recognition certifi-
cate as a symbol of my deep ap-
preciation for a lifetime of truly
commendable service.

"Good luck and happy retire-
ment. Sincerely yours, S/Arthur
E. Summerfield, Postmaster Gen-
eral."

Mr. Nixon started carrying the
mail on June 14, 1915, at the age
of 19, on Burnsville Route 1. He
received his appointment through
the late Hon. E. S. Candler, con-
gressman at that time, from Cor-
inth. Mr. Nixon is a son of the late
J. H. Nixon, a former postmaster
at Burnsville and who was serving
in that office when his son was
appointed a rural carrier. Other
children in the family were Minor
R. Nixon, banker of Iuka, Mrs.
Joe T. Meyers and Miss Leona
Nixon, both of Burnsville.

Retired Mail Carrier Nixon has
two children, Wilma A. of Burn-
sville, and Maury L. Nixon, a jew-
eler in Red Bay, Ala.

Mr. Nixon has some very inter-
esting stories to tell of his exper-
iences while carrying the mail 41
years. In the old days when roads
were in poor condition it some-
times proved a herculean task to get
the mail through. A number of
times he had to swim streams hold-
ing on to his horse. An outstand-
ing achievement of his record is
the fact that in all the years he
was on the route he didn't have
one single accident.

Burnsville post office probably
has the oldest substitute mail car-
rier in the state in the person of
James Lietch. Mr. Lietch is over
75 years old and began carrying
the mail during WWII when few
able-bodied men were available and
has been on the job since. He ser-
ves as a substitute for Mr. Mc-
Leskey on route 2.

carrier for several years, will be

old route 1.

poses. This money is to come from
the state. The administrative units
will be allowed to borrow three-
fourths of the money allotted per
child for 20 years to apply im-
mediately on necessary buildings.

Summer Tips For Poultrymen



Broilers, replacement pullets, and layers easily adjust to cool temperatures but hot weather presents a problem.

In summer an abundance of fresh, cool water helps keep hens in production and young birds growing. One hundred 8-week-old birds need at least 8 feet of drinking space and 100 layers need 7 gallons of water per day, and more when temperatures are high.

Arrange waterers so that confined birds travel not more than ten feet to the supply. Place range water pipes in furrows and cover with earth and place shades over waterers to keep the water cool. Water is the most important yet the least expensive item in poultry production.

Ventilation and insulation are key factors in beating the heat. Aluminum roofs and roofs painted white reflect the sun's rays. Open houses to provide plenty of ventilation and check it several times daily. Deep litter prevents the birds from coming in contact with cool floors and removal of part of the litter will be helpful.

To prevent wasted feed, fill hoppers not more than one-third full and keep them level with the

backs of the birds.

The hanging-type, round, tubular feeders allow the poultryman to feed once daily. Feeders are easily filled from fifty-pound multi-wall paper feed sacks which do not break over, and the feed empties out easily and completely from paper. There's no wasted feed. In addition the paper is rain repellent, an advantage when filling hoppers or spreading feed on range directly from a moving truck or trailer.

Another labor-saver is a raised platform for feeds. By building the platform near the automatic feed hopper or pen entrance, the fifty-pound sacks of feed are easily emptied directly into the hopper or feeders. The raised platform permits cats to patrol the feed room, eliminating possible damage by rats and mice.

Bare ground reflects heat more than grass-covered soil. Move range shelters frequently to encourage good use of pasture, to get birds away from possible contamination, and to keep them cool. Good range reduces the cost of raising pullets. Frequent clipping of the range stimulates growth of forage high in vitamins and minerals.

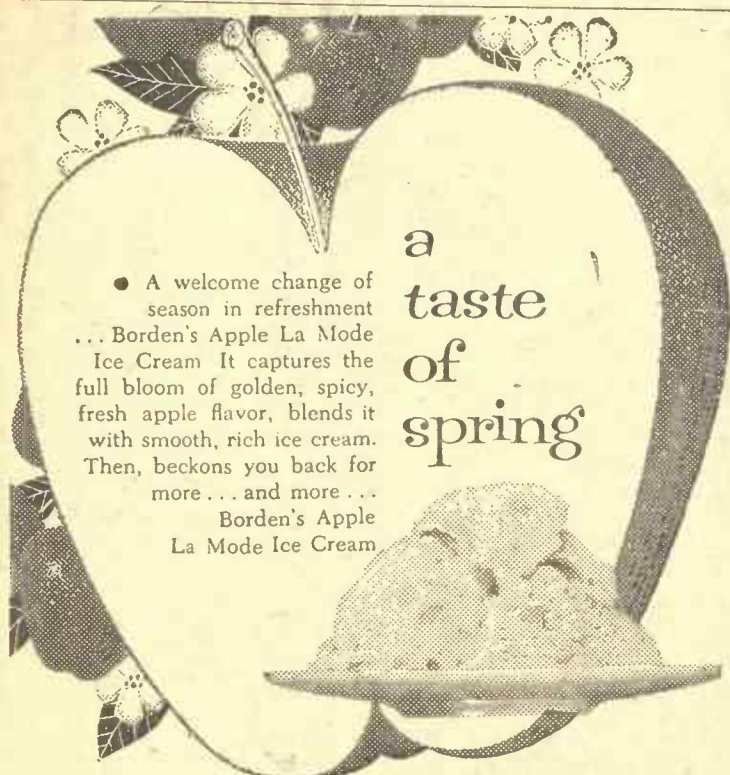
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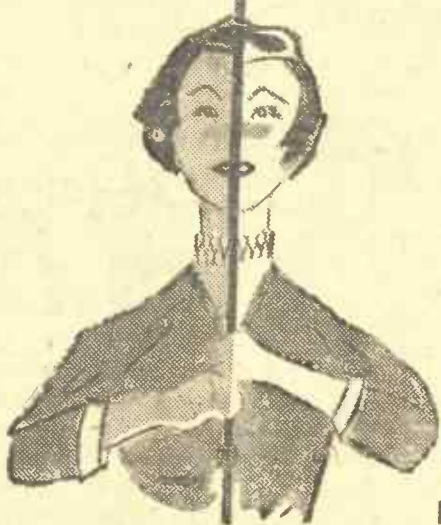

Conservation Practices Are Based On The Soil

Consult your local Soil Conservation Service technicians before hiring a bulldozer operator to fill gullies and level a washed away hillside.

All Conservation Practices Are Based On The Soil. On deep well-drained soils gully-filling and land-leveling can prove of great value, provided the land treated is not too steep for cultivation. But on

land having a hard pan less than 18 inches from the surface the use of a bulldozer to fill gullies and level the surface is hardly worth the cost. Those who have not made a study of soil should seek the advice of someone who has before spent his money on a project that may prove worthless.

This same principle holds true in land drainage. A landowner may go to considerable expense having a ditch dug on his property only to learn that the land he has drained is unproductive. White, cold, crawfishy land cannot be made productive by merely digging a ditch through it. Some land will drain faster internally than other land. It is internal drainage that is of most importance. Have someone who knows, to look at your land and advise with you before going to the expense of having a ditch dug.

Most all the farmers of Tishomingo county have tractors. The use of tractors have speeded up soil erosion on most farms. This is true because, most farmers want to have long straight rows on which to operate their tractors. It is not convenient to cultivate the land on the contour with a tractor.

Because of this, much more of our fertile topsoil is being washed away each year. The farmer who compromises with conservation principles loses his land.

Soil and water conservation, reduced to its simplest terms is nothing more than man working with nature, and obeying laws in applying technical knowledge and skills to the land.

The Soil Conservation District Commissioners realize the difficulty small farmers have in using their land within its capability class. They know farmers of Tishomingo county now have to cultivate land that is too steep for continuous cultivation. But in time this land will become so eroded that it will have to be put to pasture or trees. Nature is uncompromising and will break the man who fails to recognize her laws.

Remember to fit your farming practice to your soil and you will be rewarded for your wisdom.

Miss. '56 Business 57 Per Cent Above 1947-49

State College, Miss.—(Special) The business boom continued to hold its own in Mississippi during April, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station here.

In fact, the state's business activity registered 157 on the station's index, the highest point ever recorded. This means that general business activity in Mississippi on April 30 was 57 per cent above the level of 1947-49. This indicates an unprecedented prosperity in this state.

Data from all 16 of the state's business districts indicated that business activity during April averaged six per cent above the level of a year ago. The largest gains were in life insurance sales, telephones in service, and tax collections.

Unemployment, as reflected in total unemployment claims, was 1 per cent lower than in either April 1955 or March 1956.

Total construction contracts awards were down approximately 35 per cent from both April 1955 and March 1956. Residential construction and non-residential construction contract awards were higher than in the same month a year earlier but public works and utility contracts awards were sharply down for this comparison.

Total tax collections of \$11,439,507 in sales taxes were up by 7 per cent from same month in 1955 but 7 per cent down from the preceding month. The oil severance tax yield of \$584,647 was 27 per cent above that for April 1955 and 6 per cent higher than for March 1956. Gas severance tax collections of \$120,432 were up 4 per cent from April of the previous year and 4 per cent above March of this year. Timber severance tax collections of \$47,198 were 38 per cent higher than in April 1955 and 124 per cent higher than in the previous month.

Fifteen of the state's sixteen trade areas showed increased business activity over April 1955. The increases by districts were as follows: Biloxi-Gulfport, 7 per cent; Clarksdale, 8 per cent; Columbus, 7 per cent; Corinth, 5 per cent; Greenville, 11 per cent; Greenwood, 3 per cent; Hattiesburg, 12 per cent; Jackson, 3 per cent; Laurel, 4 per cent; McComb, 3 per cent; Meridian, 7 per cent; Natchez, 8 per cent; Pascagoula, 14 per cent; and Tupelo, 5 per cent. The Vicksburg district remained at approximately the same level as a year ago.

The advice is to open it the following way: Insert a sterilized needle under the skin near the blister, and bring out the point inside the blister. Then carefully press out the water. Wash the blistered area with alcohol, or swab it with iodine, before and after opening it.

Thoroughly wash your hands with soap and water both before and after working on the blister. To sterilize the needle, make the tip red hot in an open flame; then let it cool.

County Agent news

Hornflies

Hornflies are taking their toll from dairy and beef cattle. This insect is easy to control. But if not controlled, and the infestation is heavy, it can cost you up to a half pound per day in beef gain and cut your milk production by 15 to 25 percent.

For control spray your animals, or build a homemade backrubber and let the animals treat themselves. See your county agent for detailed plans and recommendations for controlling hornflies.

Study Effects Of Storage On Sweet Potatoes

State College, Miss.—Some sweet potato varieties gain in carotene content during storage while others lose it. These results were found in tests of three sweet potato varieties made by W. S. Anderson, head of the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station horticulture department.

The three varieties tested were: Porto Rico, Allgold and Goldrush. All three were similar in that they lost weight during the storage and curing periods, but, while the Porto Rico variety gained carotene, a vitamin important to the human body, the others lost significant amounts of the vitamin.

The carotene content of the Porto Rico variety increases slowly. During the total storage season the gain may approach 10 to 15% of the original amount of carotene. This means that this variety use-

ually has a more intense orange or yellow color after storage than at harvest.

It was also found that varieties differ in the way carotene changes take place after harvest, despite the fact that all varieties lose weight in approximately the same proportion. Both Allgold and Goldrush actually lost carotene in significant amounts. In the case of Allgold the total was 17%, and in Goldrush, the total loss amounted to 13% of the original carotene content.

These results indicate that any new selection or variety should be tested in order to be certain of what the changes in carotene are after harvest. They also show that in studying carotene of sweet potatoes, comparisons should be made on the absolute content basis rather than unit weight basis.

The complete report may be found in the May issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Honor Famous Scientist

Leading scientists of the country who have recognized the contribution of enrichment to the improved health of mankind are paying tribute to the man whose work made it possible. This year marks both the twentieth anniversary of the synthesis of the vitamin B-1, thiamine, and the fifteenth anniversary of its application in the enrichment program of this country.

Dr. Robert R. Williams—of New York—was the first to determine the chemical structure of thiamine, and the first to synthesize it, making possible its manufacture in quantity. Through a quarter of a century of research, culminated by the synthesis of the important B-1 vitamin, and subsequently through service to many countries where enrichment programs are in operation, Dr. Williams has made a major contribution to better nutrition and to the welfare of mankind.

Following the synthesis of the vitamin it was added to widely consumed foods; flour, bread, rice and corn meal. This enrichment has resulted in the control and prevention of thiamine deficiency symptoms. Pellagra, of which there were thousands of cases in the United States each year, has disappeared. For his work on thiamine and for his extensive service in enrichment programs in the United States, Cuba, Puerto Rico, Newfoundland, the Philippines, and other countries, Dr. Williams has received world wide recognition. Seven colleges and universities have given him honorary degrees. Scientific, civic, and nutri-

tion groups have given him their highest awards.

Among the scientists who are paying tribute to Dr. Williams and to enrichment is the eminent Dr. Russell M. Wilder of the emeritus staff of the Mayo Clinic at Rochester, Minnesota.

He said recently that it is due chiefly to the personal effort of Dr. Williams that the enrichment movement in addition to widespread adoption here has spread to other lands.

Early in 1940 through the encouragement and endorsement of medical and research groups the large commercial bakers and the major millers of the United States were enriching their white bread and family flour.

The compulsory war time enrichment of bread was followed by legislation at state levels. Twenty-seven of the 48 states, as well as Hawaii and Puerto Rico, now have compulsory enrichment laws. It was fifteen years ago that Dr. Russell M. Wilder the baking and milling industries began enrichment of bread and flour on a voluntary basis. They have continued on that basis, says Dr. Wilder, whether there are laws or not, so that every person in this country has been able to buy this better bread, regardless of whether his residence is in one of the 27 states or not. The average diet, after enrichment of bread and flour became general, contained, according to Dr. Wilder, almost twice the amount of vitamins—thiamine, niacin, and riboflavin it had before, and also additional iron. The resulting gains in health have been conspicuous, and the frank deficiency diseases, beri-beri and pellagra, have almost disappeared.
