Sheriff's Force Helps In Big Still Raid

COUNTY DELEGATES NAMED TO STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION, JULY 16

The Tishomingo County Democratic convention was held in the tax assessor's office in the courthouse at Iuka on Tuesday morning of this week at ten o'clock. W. R. Nettles of Tishomingo presided. After calling the convention to order delegates' names from various precincts in the county were read by J. O. Southward.

The body voted to accept the precinct delegates.

Second item on the convention's agenda was the selection of a county Democratic Executive Committee. Delegates from each Supervisor's district held short caucuses and selected members to serve for the next four years. Named to the county executive committee from the First district were John H. Allen, E. C. Holtsford and J. O. Clark. The Second Supervisor's district was not represented at the convention. Named from the Third district were Walter Wynn, D. F. Fredericks, and Lester Skinner. Named from the Fourth District were W. R. Nettles, C. L. Trimm, and Miss Effie Greene. Named from the Fifth District were Orville Bostick, W. B. Lindsey, and George Harris.

Next item for the convention's consideration was the naming of delegates to the State Democratic convention that is to be held in Jackson on Wednesday, July 16. Delegates selected were Senator D. F. Lambert, Jr., Belmont, W. R. Nettles, Tishomingo, Paul Edmondson and Cecil Summers, Iuka. The convention also voted unanimously to send the delegates to the state convention unopposed. Alternates elected were J. O. Clark of Iuka, and Orville Bostick of Golden.

State Democratic convention delegates will also attend a congressional district caucus that is to be held in Okolona on Monday, July 2, for the purpose of selecting state Democratic committee-men from the district who will also serve for the next

Also at the district caucus identical Electors names will be selected to go on the general election ticket that will be voted in the November general election.

COTTON INSECT REPORT

Thrips and Flea Hoppers are causing damage to cotton in all fields examined. Boll Weevils were found present in 50% of the fields. Weevil damage was noted in terminal buds of cotton that did not have squares.

Early season control should be practiced to kill weevils coming out of hibernation as well as kill thrips and Flea Hoppers. Recommended dust application is 5 pounds per acre for early season control and spray application should be applied with one nozzle per row. Dieldrin, Eadrin, Aldrin, Toxaphene and BHC are recommended insecticides.

**Iuka Has 6%
Increased Business
During April**

Iuka reported a 6 per cent increase in their business activity during April. Money orders issued increased 11 per cent; postal receipts, down 6 per cent; Telephone in service, up 8 per cent and city sales tax collections there was no change.

Business activity in the Corinth district increased .5 per cent during April as compared with April, 1955, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Reviews, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College. Business activity in Corinth decreased 2 per cent as compared with the same month last year. Indicators showed as follows: bank deposits, up 1 per cent; money orders issued, down 2 per cent; postal receipts, down 25 per cent; telephones in service, up 5 per cent; and city sales tax collections, no change.

Data showed Booneville had no change in business activity during April as compared with April, 1955. There was a 7 per cent increase in telephones in service, and no change in city sales tax collections.

Data showed that Ripley had a 14 per cent increase in business activity during April as compared with April, 1955. Indicators showed as follows: money orders, up 13 per cent; postal receipts, up 15 per cent and telephones in service, up 13 per cent.

**Weight Per Dozen
Important Factor
In Buying Eggs**

State College, Miss. — Most housewives buy eggs by the dozen with little or no thought as to the weight of the eggs they are buying. Eggs can be bought by the pound, too, if the buyer knows the weight requirements for the standard U. S. egg grades. Paul T. Blair of the Agricultural Economics department at the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station has recently reported a study on this subject.

Housewives generally know that eggs are classified according to size, these sizes being: peewee, small, medium, large, extra large, and jumbo. But many do not realize that there are differences in weights among the sizes.

The differences in weights break down like this (minimum net weight per dozen): peewees, 15 ounces; small, 18 ounces; medium, 21 ounces; large, 24 ounces; extra large, 27 ounces and jumbo, 30 ounces. From these figures it can be seen that one dozen jumbo eggs weigh as much as two dozen peewee eggs and almost as much as two dozen small eggs—so the weight does make a difference.

There is a definite relationship between size, price per dozen and cost per pound. For instance, a housewife goes into a store where she has a large variety from which to choose. The medium sized eggs are priced at 54 cents per dozen and the large eggs are only 59 cents. In this case she would get more for her money if she bought the large eggs at 59 cents because the cost per pound is less than it would be if she bought the medium eggs at 54 cents per dozen.

VERY few readers of this col-umn have any chance of being appointed as the ambassador of the United States to any impor-tant foreign country. It isn't that you are not good enough. You are not rich enough. Ambassadors are expected to live in a high style. (Did you ever in-quire what just one pair of striped pants, made to order, would cost you?) They are not expected to live on the salary the United States pays them. They have to live in mansions for Dr. Foreman which the mere housekeeping bill is enormous, they have to give parties and dinners costing more than you earn in a month.



God's ill-housed ambassador
Strange as it seems, the ambas-sadors of God are not usually looked after in such sumptuous style. They always have housing, of a sort; but it is seldom palatial. Indeed one of them wrote, "If we have food and clothing, with these we shall be content." Nothing said about housing. One of the very greatest of God's ambassadors to this world suffered from some-thing quite a bit worse than leaky roofs or lack of plumbing. If the Apostle Paul were to visit our town today, even people outside the church would want to have him put up at the best hotel in town, or entertained at the finest homes. Paul sometimes got this sort of treatment, but a great deal of the time, indeed for years on end, he would be actually in jail. Not only that, but he would have to wear chains on his arms and legs as if he were a member of a chain-gang. Strange to say, too, this did not make Paul unhappy or bitter. After two solid years of that sort of thing, some men might be willing to quit. But not Paul. Standing before a king, his hands weighted down so that it was hard to move, Paul said, "I would to God you were just as I am—ex-cept for these chains." He would not wish his chains on anybody; but otherwise he knew he was bet-ter off than a king, for he was still the ambassador of God. There is no higher place.

Spokesman for God
We must not blame God for the poor treatment his ambassadors receive. It is not his fault. But God's men understand this. Paul understood it, and went on speak-ing for God wherever he was. Some Christians might think that if Providence had dumped them in jail they could be expected to take a vacation from witnessing to their faith. But Paul knew that there never is a real vacation from being a Christian. There have been some peculiar characters ap-pointed as ambassadors now and then by human governments; but no emperor, king or senate ever appointed a dumb man, to repre-sent his country. There was a great convention of Chris-tian business men in Louis-ville, Kentucky, last winter. Three of these men were on their way afterwards to the airport in a taxi. What would you have done in their places? The convention was over, business and families were expect-ing you home. No time, no place, for Christian work in a taxi, sure-ly? But these men did see it that way. They talked to the driver, found he was not a Christian. Never mind the plane, they said, just drive us to your own home. There they talked with him, prayed with him, and he gave his heart to Christ. They missed the plane, but do you think they re-gretted it?

The chains still rattle
Actual iron chains do still im-prison some of God's people. There are parts of the world where it is almost a crime merely to be a Christian. But even where that is not true, the men and women who represent God have to work against many kinds of handicaps. Sometimes it is only being thought peculiar, or superstitious. Some-times it is having to work under a government which is unfriendly to religion, as is the case in some mission fields. Sometimes it is some local "industry" which is vicious and powerful and will strike back at any person, or group, religious or otherwise, that threatens to cut down their profits. Sometimes these invisible chains muzzle the mouth of a minister whose people will not let him speak up for his own Christian ideals. Well, chains may hold back God's kingdom; but they will never stop it!

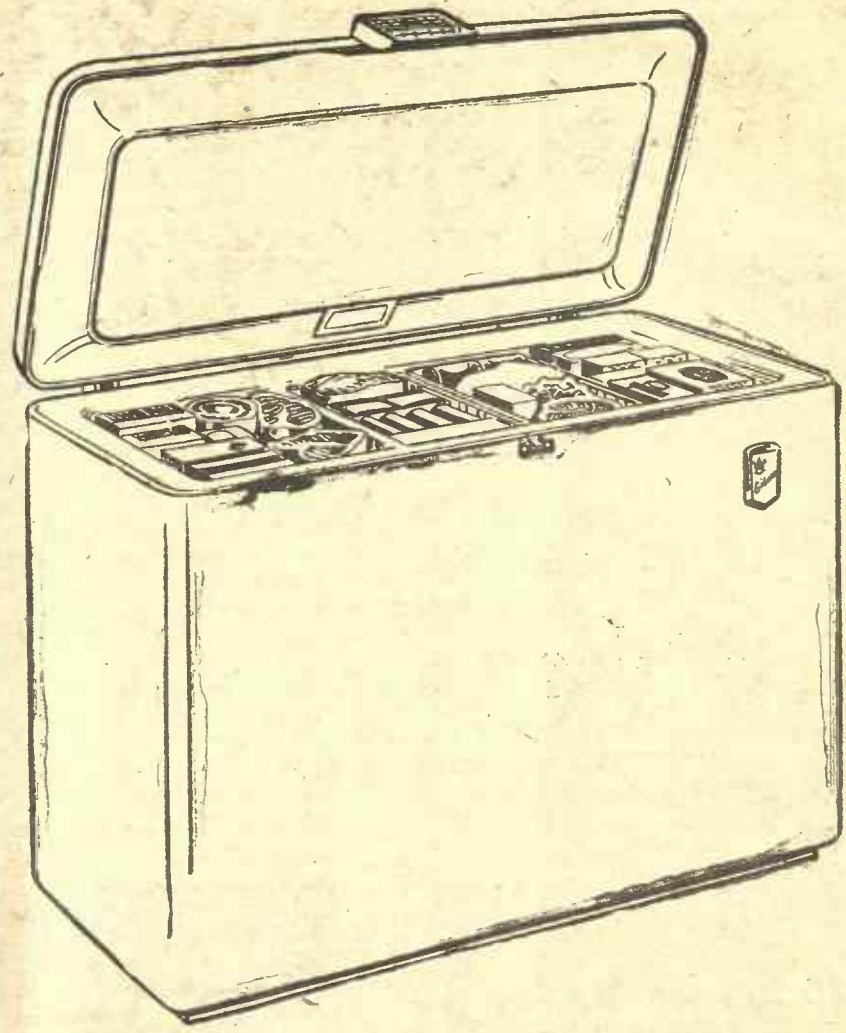

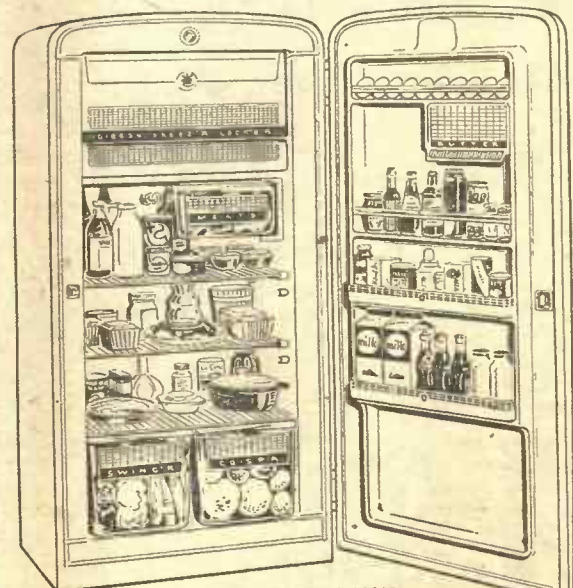

\$4.9 Billion For Foreign Aid To Cost Taxpayers \$21,870,000 MEC Estimates

The administration's proposed \$4.9 billion appropriation for foreign aid during the next fiscal year would cost state taxpayers \$21,870,000, the national affairs committee of the Mississippi Economic Council estimates.

Conwell Sykes, Greenville, chairman, said the state's share of the proposed appropriation is based on an economic index which shows the state to pay 0.45 percent of all federal taxes.

Of the total amount that would be required of Mississippi taxpayers, \$13,500,000 would go for foreign military aid and \$8,370,000 for foreign economic aid, under the administration's proposed plan.

"Using the economic index for Mississippi again, the total foreign aid program during the past 11 years has cost the state taxpayers \$293,400,000 or \$193,050,000 for economic aid and \$100,350,000 for military aid," Mr. Sykes stated.

"The Council has no stated position on foreign aid, except that all federal spending should be kept to a minimum and handled efficiently."

"The figures above are pointed out in order to show our citizens what federal spending costs state taxpayers. By using your own county's economic index of the state's share, you can bring the figure even closer home."

"For instance, Tishomingo County, according to our state's economic index, pays 43% of all state taxes. This means citizens of this county would be called to pay \$94,205.03 of the proposed aid appropriation."

The official pointed out that the House Foreign Affairs Committee is recommending a cut of at least \$1.1 billion in the foreign aid bill.

Along with hot weather comes added laundering jobs. We wear washable clothes usually and they have to be washed more often. Seasonal stains as perspiration, mud or grass stains, grease spots or picnic-food stains add to the job.

Whether your summer clothes are washed to your satisfaction depends partly on whether you give attention to pre-washing jobs. Examine the clothes for special stains. You can best remove the stains while they are fresh and always before you wash the clothes. Hot water and detergent may set stains so they never can be removed.

Advance soaking is recommended for clothes that are heavily soiled or have soil worked deeply into the fabric. You may want to soak muddy overalls in a tub of cool water before washing. But a soak in luke warm water and detergent may be more successful for the "worn in" soil on collars and cuffs of men's shirts.

Other advance jobs: Sort clothes into loads according to temperature of wash water needed, amount of soil and weight. Select water temperature, amount of detergent and washing time to suit the load and your washing machine.

Clean Rugs
If rugs and carpets are to wear well and stay attractive, they must

be kept clean. Dirt on the surface dulls the color of the rug; embedded grit wears and cuts the fibers. Damage from clothes moths and carpet beetles is less likely when rugs are kept clean. The time to spary rugs against these insects is after they have been thoroughly cleaned.

Remove anything spilled on the rug at once. Blot up as much as possible with a soft cloth or absorbent tissue. Then sponge the area with a soft cloth wrung out of a mixture of 1 teaspoon mild synthetic detergent to 1 cup lukewarm water. Use a circular motion, beginning at the outer edge and working in. Blot up the solution and rinse in clear water.

If the spot does not disappear, try a mixture of 1 teaspoon white vinegar and 3 teaspoons luke warm water. Finish by sponging with a cloth dampened in lukewarm water.

Grease spots call for a grease solvent or "cleaning fluid." Use cautiously if the rug has a rubber backing because the fluid may dissolve the rubber.

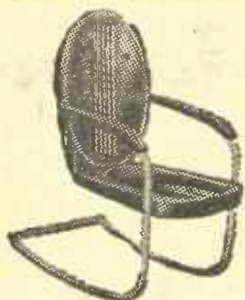

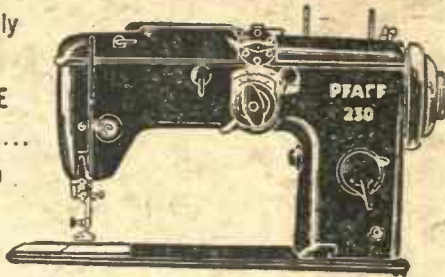

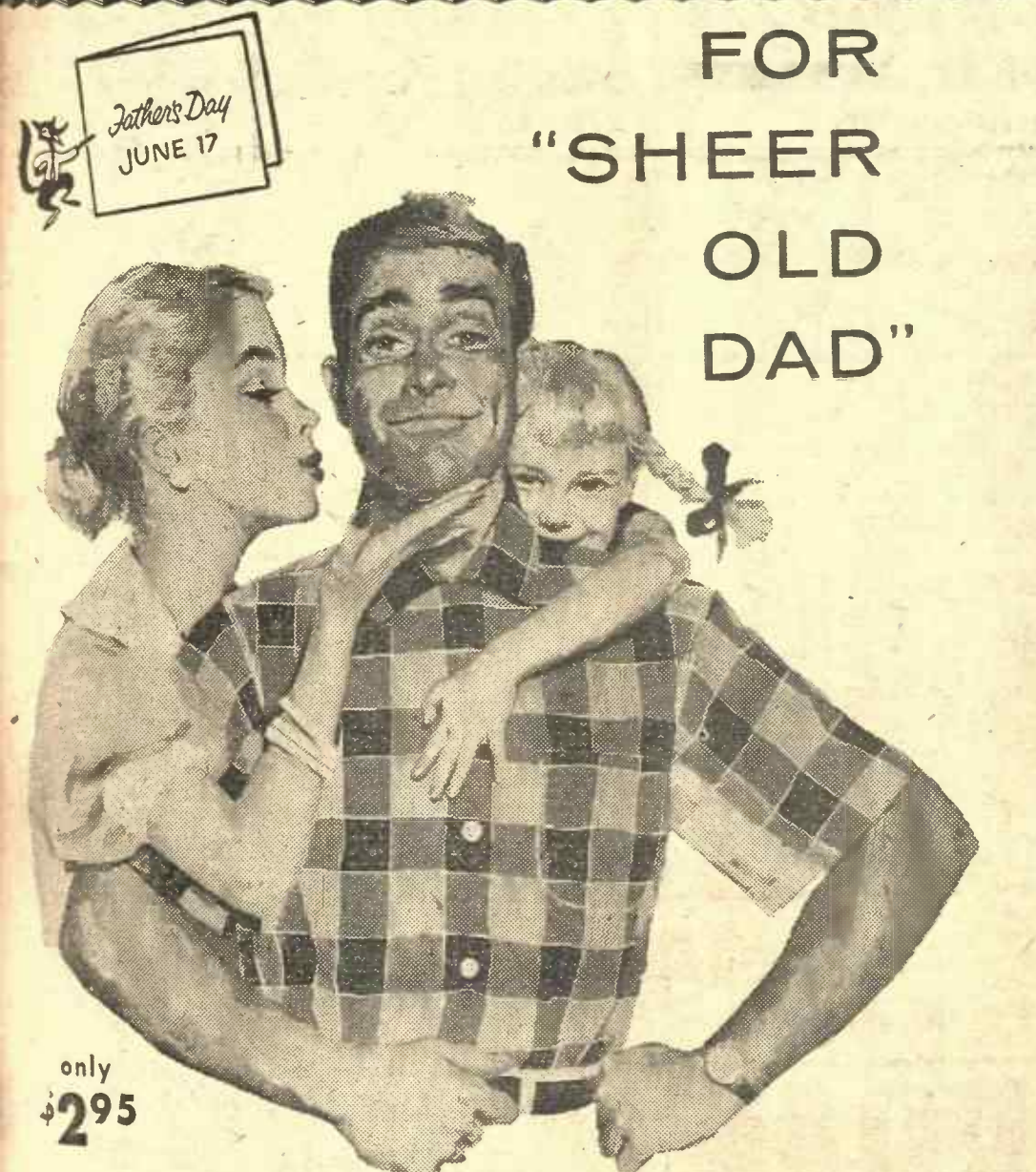

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Federal Gas Tax Refund

Forms for Federal Gas Tax refunds are available at your County Agent's Office. These forms are for claiming 2 cents per gallon Federal Gas Tax to be refunded on gasoline used on the farm for farm purposes. Not included in the refund is gas (1) used on the highway, (2) in processing, packaging, freezing or canning operations, (3) personal or non business purposes.

The forms are filed with the Director of Internal Revenue for this District and the period covered is January 1, 1956, through June 30, 1956.

The refund will not be allowed unless the claim is filed before October 1, 1956.

Summer Grazing

If you need supplemental summer grazing plant Millet. Millet has two advantages over Sudan. They are: (1) You can produce more grazing from Millet and have a quicker growth. (2) Rust is not as bad on Millet as Sudan.

Varieties to plant are Pearl or Cattail seeding 30 to 40 pounds broadcast or 10 pounds per acre in rows. Seeding in rows has these advantages: (1) Uses a third as many seed, (2) Uses half as much nitrate, (3) You can cultivate rows, (4) Oats or wheat can be drilled September 1 for grazing without seedbed preparation.

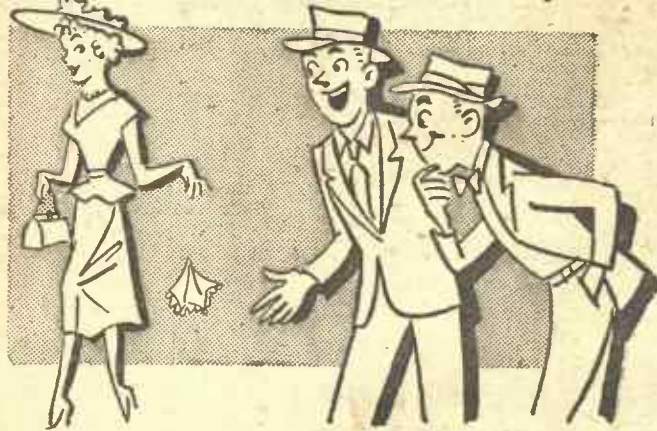

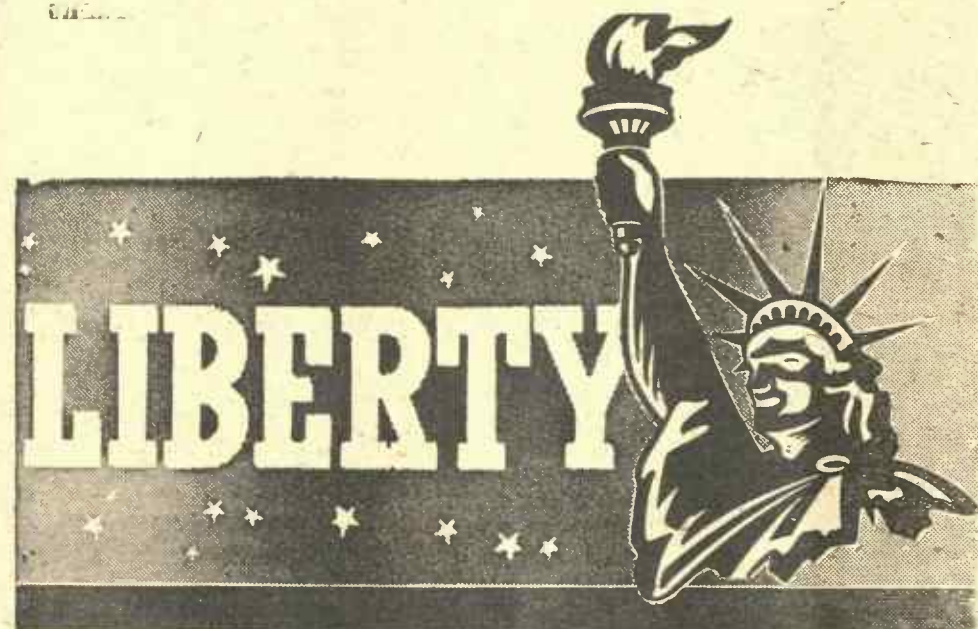
