Moves To
Memphis Pastorate**

Dr. J. W. Cunningham of Tupelo, formerly of Iuka, and the nephew of Miss Bama Akers, is being moved into the Memphis Conference of the Methodist Church from the North Mississippi Conference.

His appointment to be pastor of St. John's Methodist Church, one of the largest in the city, was due to have been read Sunday morning by Bishop William T. Watkins.

Dr. Cunningham is a graduate of Ole Miss, where he earned a bachelor of arts degree. He received his bachelor of divinity degree at Emory University, Atlanta, and a doctor of divinity degree at Millsaps College, Jackson, Miss.

An active, likable minister, Dr. William Jefferson Cunningham has been pastor of First Methodist at Tupelo for the past five years. Before that he was pastor of First Methodist at Greenville, where a \$250,000 new sanctuary was built during his ministry. He has also pastored the Oxford University Methodist Church.

Dr. Cunningham is the son of Dr. E. H. Cunningham, a retired Methodist minister, and the grandson of the late Elder J. J. Akers, Primitive Baptist minister of Iuka. His mother is the former, "Nina" Jessie Akers.

His wife, the former Miss Loraine Mitchell of Tupelo, is a graduate of Southwestern in Memphis.

They have three daughters, Rose, 21, senior this fall at Millsaps College; Nina, 17, who will be a senior in high school, and Sallie, 14, ninth grader.

(DUSTING)

Place dust spouts properly to get better control of cotton insects, say specialists of the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service. Move "Y's" from hand dusters, and dust one row at a time. Place dust spouts 6 inches above the cotton, blowing dust down the top of the cotton plant. Apply dust in late afternoon or the first part of the night. For tractor dusting, select the proper gear, but run the tractor motor at full throttle to give the highest wind velocity to the duster fan.

COTTON INSECTS POSE THREAT TO NINETEEN-FIFTY-SIX CROP

State College, Miss.—Abnormal large numbers of cotton insects in fields pose a serious threat to the 1956 crop prospects, declared A. G. Bennett, entomologist of the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service. General rains have greatly increased boll weevil emergence to the number one cotton enemy in Mississippi fields at this date.

Not only boll weevils, but bollworms, tarnished plant bugs and hoppers are all destroying squares on fruiting cotton. "It is vitally important that farmers make close examinations of cotton for damage to squares," he advised. "If damage is found, poisoning should be begun immediately to prevent loss of the early squares."

Where cotton is blooming, farmers should make square puncture

infestation counts.

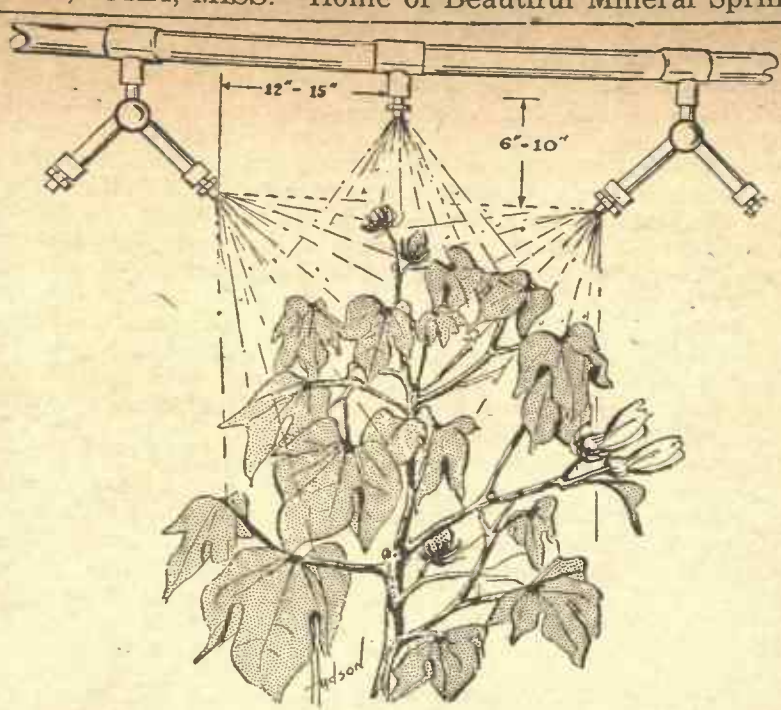
To control boll weevils and other cotton pests, proper application of correct amounts of insecticide is a must.

Where cotton is blooming, three nozzles per row are recommended. These will generally apply three gallons of insecticide solution per acre.

If dust is used, dosage should be increased to 10 to 12 pounds per acre, applied with the nozzle above the cotton to insure full coverage, he stated.

Mr. Bennett advises using a quick killing insecticide like benzene hexachloride, aldrin or heptachlor between showers.

If rain comes within 10 hours after poisoning, poisoning should be done over as soon as possible. If the rain comes 12 to 24 hours after application, dosage should be repeated the third day.



(SPRAYING)

Nozzle location is important when spraying to control cotton insects, say specialists of the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service. When cotton is 20 inches tall, it is time to poison with 3 nozzles to the row. Place the center nozzle 6 to 10 inches from the top of the plant, using the 6 inch height when wind is blowing. Do not spray if the wind exceeds 10 miles per hour. Raise the boom as the plant grows taller, but do not adjust the side nozzle.

Game And Fish Commission List Daily Catch

Considerable amount of confusion has arisen among the anglers of the State with reference to the creel on game fish, according to Rex McRaney, Executive Director of the Game and Fish Commission.

House Bill No. 394 passed at the recent session of the Legislature permits anglers to take 50 game fish of one kind in any day but more than 75 of all kinds in one day. However, the Game and Fish Commission deemed it necessary to reduce the creel limit, and acting under the authority vested in the Commission by Section 5848

of the Game and Fish Code, have set the limit as follows:

Black Bass, 15 per day; Striped Bass, 15 per day; Crappie or White Perch, 20 per day; Bream, Goggle-eye and all other Sunfish or Combination of all, 50 per day and Aggregate Daily Bag Limit, 75 per day.

Possession Limit: Not more than two daily bag limits, or 150 in the aggregate of all kinds.

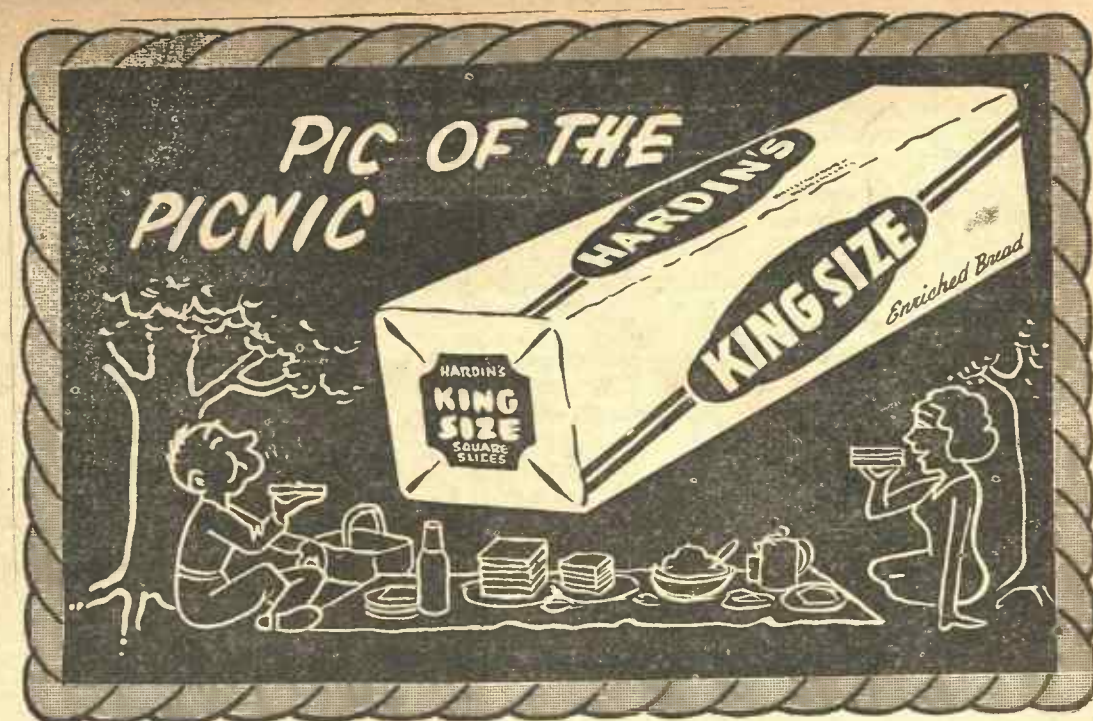

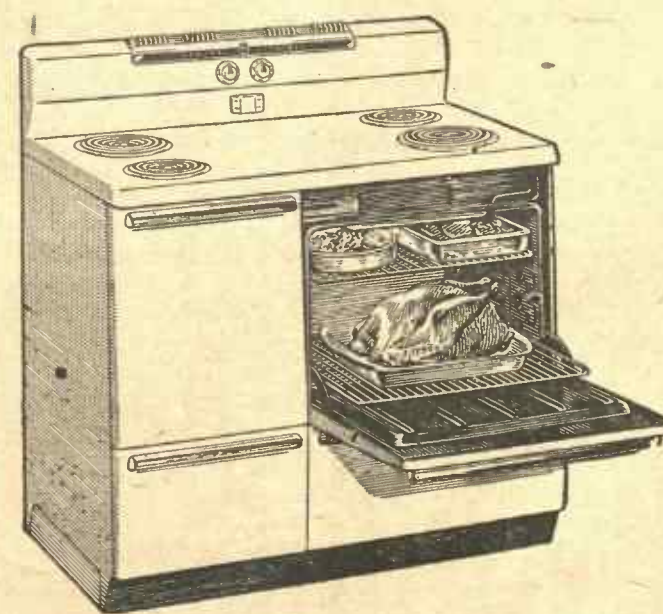

The Tennessee Valley Authority offers for sale an estimated 728,926 board feet of standing marked timber from 344 acres of land. The timber is offered under two separate sales. One sale comprising approximately 448,319 board feet on 176 acres is located on the south side of the Tennessee River in the vicinity of the White Sulphur Springs subdivision near Pickwick Dam in Hardin County, Tennessee. The other sale with an estimated volume of 280,607 board feet on 168 acres is located in Lauderdale County, Alabama, between Panther Creek and Caney Branch, eight miles downstream from Waterloo, Alabama. Amendment To Mutual Security Act Produced To Cut Off Funds Used For Increasing Foreign Cotton Production

D. C. — Senator Eastland, D., Miss., has introduced an amendment to the Mutual Security Act cutting off funds which might be used to increase foreign cotton production.

to compete with the United States. "Not only are we being asked to give away tax money, but we are also expected to provide the dollars to strangle the Southern Cotton farmer out of business dollars for our own crucifixion," he declared.

The amendment is aimed particularly at Egypt, where the proposed A swan Dam project is ex-

pected to raise farm acreage in that country at the rate of 100,000 acres a year for the next 20 years.

"We know that a lot of that additional acreage will be used for cotton," Senator Eastland said, "And even if only half is planted in cotton that will mean an additional million bales on the world market in 20 years, since Egypt produces a bale to the acre."

Egypt presently has six million acres in cultivation by using some 60 per cent of water from the Nile River. The dam project would raise irrigation water from the Nile to 100 per cent.

"In the past Egyptians have shown a tendency to reduce their wheat production in favor of more cotton if there was a chance of getting wheat from other sources," Eastland pointed out.

He said that in the 1955 crop harvested last year Egypt had cut its wheat acreage some 283,000 acres, resulting in a drop in wheat production of 10 million bushels.

"Then they came to the United States for wheat," Senator Eastland said.

While the wheat cultivation was dropping 283,000 acres, cotton acreage increased by 250,000, he explained.

The amendment would provide that none of the funds authorized under the Mutual Security Act shall be available to any foreign country if it "may reasonably be expected to result in an increase or expansion of the agricultural production of such country, unless otherwise expressly authorized by Congress."

So far the United States has spent about \$88,000 on an aerial survey of the A swan area in 1953, and \$376,960 was obligated by the International Cooperation to the U. S. Army Map Service for maps of the area.

In the A swan financing plans discussed by officials from the United States, United Kingdom, International Bank, and Egypt, it was estimated that Egyptian currency amounting to \$910 million and foreign currency of \$390 million would be required, giving a total of 1.3 billion dollars.

The United States officials propose a U. S. grant of \$54.6 million, using regularly appropriated ICA funds, for the first stage of construction of the dam.

The A swan project is still in the nature of a proposal, since a number of problems are yet to be settled. Among them, a division

of water with the Sudan, and the willingness of Egyptians to meet conditions laid down by the United States, United Kingdom, and the International Bank. Also, the spirit of cooperation between Egypt and the American and British governments has lessened in recent months.

The \$56.4 million proposed grant is included in the 1956-57 ICA budget. It is anticipated that the United States would furnish most, if not all, the remaining \$120 million for later construction on the dam.

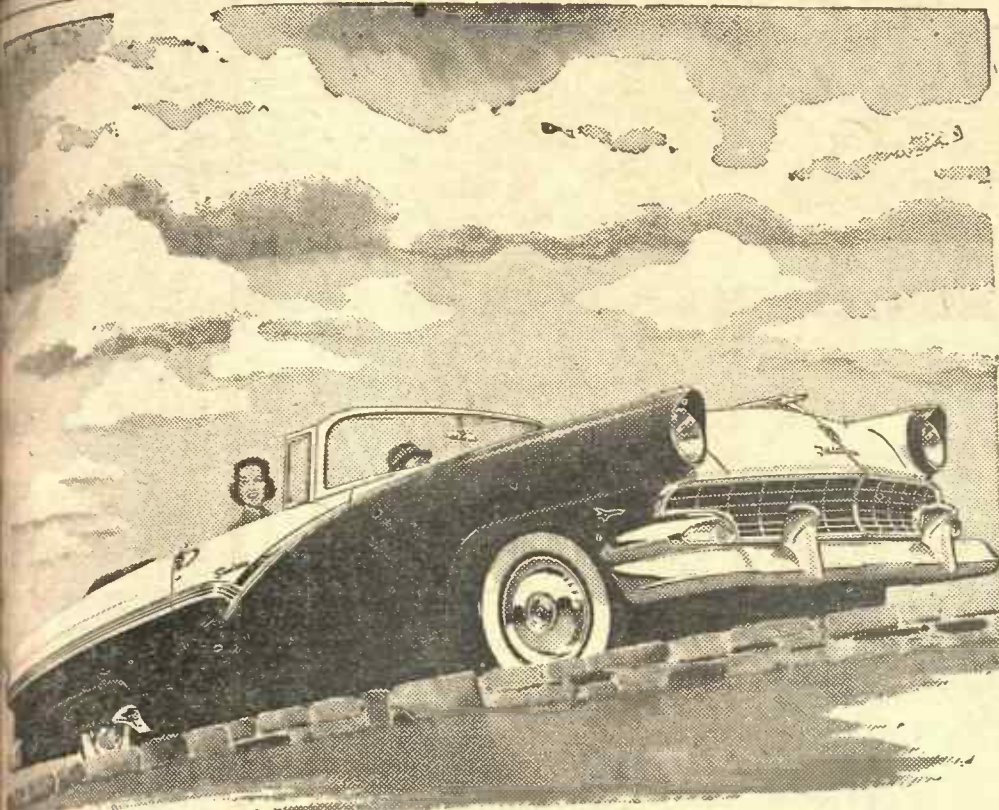

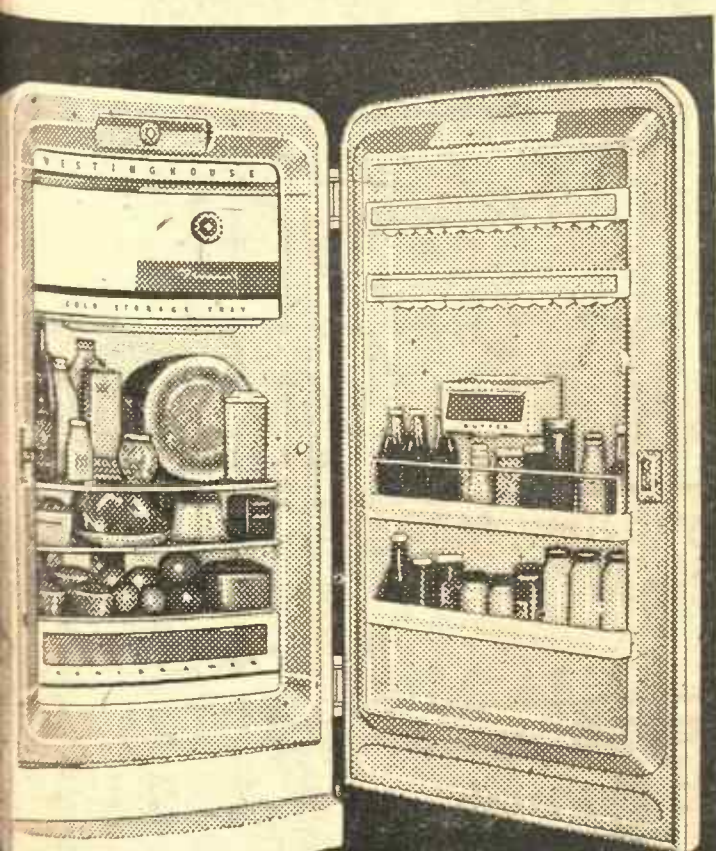

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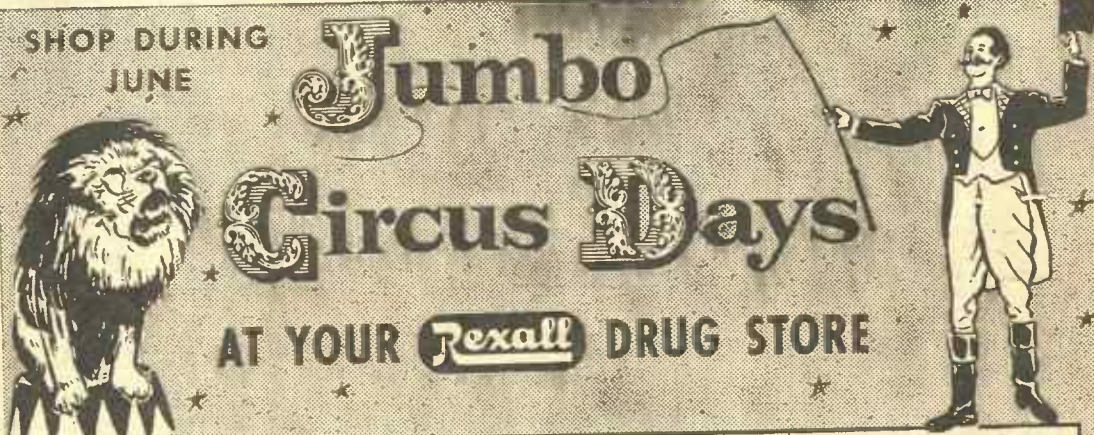
