Lamber, Iuka, route 3; the eighth from Dalton Woodley, route 1, Burnsville; the ninth from W. B. Luttrell, Iuka, route 1.

Three came in the morning mail received Wednesday. One from C. A. Flurry, Tishomingo; L. B. Hill of Paden and Herb Smith of near Belmont.

Each year a free subscription for one year is given to the person bringing in the first cotton bloom. This year a subscription to The Vidette goes to D. C. Holt of Iuka, route 1. Mr. Holt is a regular subscriber of this newspaper and his time will be extended free of charge for another year. Telephone Rates Increase Plea Being Studied By Public Serv. Com.

Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company Tuesday asked the Mississippi Public Service Commission to make a thorough study of its operations in the state and to fix rates that are fair to telephone subscribers and will provide the company with a reasonable return.

Vice President and General Manager H. G. Turner said that regulation of Southern Bell's telephone rates in Mississippi has been at a standstill for several years.

"During the years since 1952," he said, "Southern Bell's telephone rates have remained unchanged, while the cost of providing telephone service went up and up."

"Since the last time the Commission set lawful rates for the company—on April 5, 1949—cost increases of over \$7,500,000 have been incurred by the company. On this total, over \$4,000,000 resulted from six wage increases and a boost in the income tax. Cost increases associated with additional investment accounted for another \$3,500,000. Materials, supplies and services have also jumped in cost.

"Rate increases totaling about \$3,600,000 have been made effective under Court order to offset part of these cost increases. The remainder of the cost increases, totaling more than \$4,000,000, has not been covered in the rate schedule.

"Despite the 1956 wage increases totaling over \$600,000 and the urgent need for \$4,000,000 of added revenues to offset this and other cost increases, the company is proposing rate schedules to provide only \$2,500,000—a stop-gap

for the period the Commission is conducting hearings and fixing final rates. The proposed rates which will be effective in 30 days will bring the earnings up from the present 4% level to only about 5 1/2%.

"Adequate earnings are necessary to keep telephone service good and to improve and expand it."

"During the past several years when telephone rates have not kept pace with rising costs of telephone growth, Southern Bell has endeavored, despite the handicap of low earnings, to meet fully its service obligations to the people of Mississippi. It carried forward, largely on faith, the greatest construction program in the State's history.

"Despite telephone expansion in the past, telephone service demands continue to be strong throughout Mississippi. We need to spend \$30,000,000 for new and expanded facilities in 1956 and 1957 alone to meet the state's growing telephone requirements. A large proportion of this amount will be spent for facilities in rural areas.

"Money for this tremendous program must be obtained not from customer payments for service but from people who are willing to put their savings in telephone property in expectation of a reasonable return. Our present return is not reasonable. It is too low—and still declining.

"That is why we are asking the Commission to make a thorough study of our revenue needs and to fix rates that are fair and reasonable."

E. N. Allen, County ASC office manager, stated Wednesday of this week. "Watch for an announcement from the local office about the date it will begin processing the agreements."

July 20 is the deadline for signing agreements to place acreage in the Acreage Reserve program. All plowing up of growing crops by farmers wishing to qualify in that manner must be completed by July 31. Further information will be available at the ASC office. The national average rates for 1956 cotton crop is 15 cents per pound.

COTTON INSECT REPORT

Cotton insect activity increased during the past week. The county average of boll weevil infestation is 30%. Fleahoppers, Tarnished and Rapid Plant Bugs continue to damage pin point squares.

A sound poison program is a must this year if an average cotton crop is to be expected.

FEDERAL GAS TAX INCREASE GOES INTO EFFECT SUNDAY; TO HELP FINANCE NATIONAL HIGHWAY PROG.

Motorists of Mississippi were reminded today that on Sunday the federal tax on gasoline will go up one cent a gallon, as part of the \$13 billion increase in federal automotive taxes enacted by Congress this year for financing the 13-year federal highway program.

Mr. C. J. Hans, Chairman of the Mississippi Petroleum Industries Committee, noted that this increase, added to the present 2-cent federal tax and the 7-cent State tax, will bring total state and federal taxes on gasoline in Mississippi to 10 cents a gallon, plus the State's 3% sales tax on the price of gasoline and the State and Federal tax - and in cities that levy the sales tax an additional 1/2%.

This, he said, is equivalent to about a 50% sales tax on gasoline. Commenting on the "amazing growth" in motor fuel taxation in this state through the years, Mr. Hans pointed out that the Mississippi gas tax, first imposed at a 1-cent rate in 1922, brought in only \$493,000 the first full year it was in effect. He added:

"Now, with this new increase in the federal tax, highway users of this state will be paying an estimated \$54 million a year—110 times as much plus State sales tax - plus city sales tax where levied."

He said the 1-cent federal increase, expected to yield more than half a billion dollars a year nationally, will bring to about \$16 million the amount of federal gas tax collected annually in Mississippi.

Paid \$154,331.67 Sales Tax To State; Averaged \$9.93 Per Person

Tishomingo County did a gross retail sales business last year of \$7,123,083.00 and paid into the state's treasury in sales tax a total of \$154,331.67. The county ranked 67th in the state, the one doing the greatest amount of business was Hinds with \$479,283,490.50 and the county doing the least amount was Issaquena with \$1,171,882.00. In the northeast corner of the state among the three counties bordering Tishomingo, Alcorn did \$29,474,012.00; Prentiss did \$12,086,039.50; and Itawamba County did \$5,600,822.00. Tishom-

ingo county did \$1,522,261.00 more than Itawamba county, its closest neighbor to the south. Total retail sales for the entire state was \$2,478,241,157.00 and the total amount of sales tax paid into the state's treasury from all counties was \$44,380,005.38.

Tishomingo County's retail sales computed on a per capita bases (population of the county is 15,544) gives \$458.25 spent by each person with an average of \$9.93 sales tax being paid by each.

In 1955 more money was spent by local county residents for autos than any other one item. The local citizenry plunked down \$1,700,984.50 for the gas buggies which averaged \$109.43 per person. Two per cent sales tax paid on these autos amounted to \$43,152.52.

Next most expensive item in the county was food. For this a total of \$1,576,677.00, or an average of \$101.43 per person, was spent. State sales tax on this amount was \$44,605.67.

For contracting, lumber and building material \$970,939.50 was spent in the county. Sales tax on this amount was \$19,603.48.

For wearing apparel and general merchandise county residents paid \$760,058.00 or an average of \$48.90 each. Sales tax on this item was \$21,825.61.

Furniture and fixtures was the next item in the county. \$124,420.50 was spent for these items in 1955 with a state sales tax of \$3,582.75 being paid. Average spending for each person in the furniture category was \$8.00.

Sales tax collections in incorporated towns in Tishomingo county in 1955 were:

Iuka (pop. 1525) \$82,541.15 (does not include 1/2% city sales tax); Belmont (pop. 814) \$38,243.67; Tishomingo (pop. 335) \$13,155.49; Burnsville (pop. 525) \$6,755.85; Paden (pop. 158) \$958.38; all others (rural) \$12,677.13.

Parents Urged To Have Children Vaccinated Against Polio Immediately

tion of teen-agers and younger children in getting started on the polio shots was pointed up today by Dr. A. L. Gray, Director of Preventable Disease Control, State Board of Health.

In the last two weeks almost one new case of polio per day has been reported in Mississippi and these were scattered over the state, was the grim warning Dr. Gray directed to parents who have delayed vaccination.

"Unfortunately," said Dr. Gray, "two of these cases resulted in the death and another is critically ill with bulbar polio."

"With polio vaccine now available for all children from 0 through nineteen years of age from both private physicians and health departments, there is no reason for any child in the state to be without this vital protection as the polio season advances," said Dr. Gray in a statewide appeal to

parents.

In hundreds of vaccination clinics set up throughout the state, public health workers are racing with time to reach as many children as possible with protection against paralytic polio before the usual summer upsurge of this crippling disease, added Dr. Gray, who is directing the all-out statewide effort which is being carried on simultaneously in every county in Mississippi. In addition, thousands are being vaccinated by private physicians.

To date almost one million injections of polio vaccine have already been given in Mississippi by private physicians and health departments, but the job is no more than one-third done, the state preventable disease director stated.

Pregnant women are included in the priority group for polio vaccine available from both private physicians and health departments.

Motorists planning to be on the highway this Fourth of July are urged by the Patrol to: (1) leave for their destination in plenty of time to avoid hurrying, (2) keep in mind that traffic will be heavy and sometimes congested, (3) pass only when safe, (4) don't "tailgate," and (5) don't speed.

\$2,960 To 4,080 Yearly Salaries Offered By Civil Service

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced examinations for filling the following positions in various Federal agencies in the Washington, D. Safety Campaign Decreased Traffic Accidents

Mississippi highway accidents decreased since the start of

Slow Down and Live, the nation's summer traffic safety campaign.

According to Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough, head of the state highway patrol, a decrease of 39.1 per cent in traffic fatalities was noted two weeks after the Campaign's start. A decrease of 58.33 per cent was noted at the first week period's close.

When the Slow Down and Live Campaign—aimed primarily at "in a hurry" drivers—officially got underway May 30. Memorial Day, Mississippi's traffic death toll stood at 190 killed. Two weeks later, June 12, the highway death count had climbed to 206—an increase of 16 dead.

The margin of increase, however, was less than that recorded for the first two weeks of the 1955 Slow Down and Live campaign when 26 persons died violently in traffic accidents between Memorial Day and June 12. This year's decrease is established on this basis.

Commissioner of Public Safety Scarbrough has pledged the Highway patrol's full resources in the all-out effort to reduce Mississippi's traffic toll. "Strict traffic law enforcement can be anticipated," he warned, explaining that radar will be used extensively by Patrolmen.

Slow Down and Live, directed at "speed" violations is being observed nationally. All 48 governors, including Gov. J. P. Coleman, have

pledged their states' support. The campaign's target is the "in-a-hurry" motorist too impatient to drive cautiously and carefully.

Wheelchair Society Elects Hubert Coker As Vice-President

Hubert F. Coker, Florence, Ala., formerly of Burnsville, was recently elected first Vice President of the Alabama Wheelchair Society at the annual Wheelchair Convention held in Birmingham, Ala. Mr. Coker is the first member from North Alabama to be elected to an office in the organization.

Mr. Coker, who has been confined to a wheelchair since childhood, is employed by the Harrison Insurance Service in Florence as office manager. He drives his own automobile and is among the many handicapped people who are proving every day that life for handicapped people can be full and useful.

The main object of the organization is to educate the industrial leaders and business men of the state to the usefulness of the handicapped.

Continue to make good use of garden space and not let grass and weeds take over when one crop is through producing.

Save vegetables by canning or freezing. Select young tender vegetables. A better product will be the results of canning tender vegetables.

Poultry Meat Color
You've noticed that when chick-

en is thoroughly done, some of the meat sometimes is still pinkish in color. Research scientists have found the answer for this coloring. And the pink color does not affect quality, they say.

It seems that certain substances in any heated oven or in the hot air over a wood fire or barbecue pit are the same chemically as some used in brining or smoking of meat. These substances react with traces of hemoglobin in the meat or poultry to give a pink or reddish color.

How much of the poultry meat turns pink and how deep the color become depends on how hot the flame or heater is and whether the poultry roasts in an open or covered pan or is covered with aluminum foil part of the time. Age and amount of fat also count. Young birds may have more pink coloring.

Beef Grades
You will now find a new federal grade of beef—U. S. Standard, has been added to the grades of U. S. Prime, Choice, Good and commercial.

The present Commercial grade has been divided into two grades, to be known as U. S. Standard and U. S. Commercial.

The grade name "Standard" will apply to beef from younger animals of the grade, and the name "Commercial" to beef from mature animals falling in the present commercial grade.

Flies in the Home: A knock-

down spary of at least .02% strength pyrethrum can be used to control flies in the home. It may be used on front and back porch also. Outside the Home: Malathion, diazinon, L 13/59 (Dipterex-199) are new materials now available for housefly control.

They may be applied as a dry sugar bait, as a paste and painted on surface, or sprinkled or sprayed as a residue spray.

Apply to areas where flies rest. In the barn spray light cords, rafters, pipes, electric wires, window facings. Also apply to manure piles, garbage cans, barn floors, feeding sheds and fences.

Dry baits should be applied daily until flies are under control, then apply weekly or when needed. Residue sprays or paste are effective for 1 to 3 weeks; repeat when needed. Avoid contaminating feed troughs, water, etc. Do Not Apply To Livestock. Mosquitoes

eggs in water, control begins with destroying or treating all breeding places. Remove all tin cans, bottles and other vessels that hold water. Drain shallow pools in your yard or cover them with oil. Most mosquitoes hide in homes in dark places, so that is where you should put your insecticides. A 5% DDT household spray put behind pictures, underside beds, dressers, chairs, tables and in closets will help control mosquitoes for several months. Be sure the surface is wet thoroughly, but not wet enough to cause it to run off. When the spray dries, it leaves the DDT particles that will kill the insects.

The Soil Conservation Service Technicians by working with the Soil Conservation District Commissioners has helped many Tishomingo County farmers get fish for their ponds. We want those of you who have stocked your ponds with fish to enjoy good fishing and good eating.

If your fish pond is not a success, it may be because of one or more of the following causes:

1. You may have caught out all your bass before they reproduced.
2. You may not have put sufficient fertilizer in your pond.
3. You may have far too many fish in your pond.

I hope that all of you who have stocked ponds with bream and bass are enjoying good fishing.

Good Management Found Important In Mastitis Study

State College, Miss.—A definite relationship between mastitis and the incidence of mastitis in dairy herds has been shown in a study reported by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station. Farms with only fair management definitely had more mastitis than herds in which overall manage-

ment practices were good. Adequate equipment for handling milk also was considered essential and was usually found under good management.

Occasionally, a dairy farm will have excellent equipment but inadequate management and find itself in serious trouble with both mastitis and high bacterial counts. If the management is improved, the bacterial counts usually will be brought under control; the mastitis is more difficult to eliminate, however. Recently the Experiment Station undertook a study of a dairy where this condition existed. Dr. John A. Alford reported results of the study in the June issue of Mississippi Farm Research which is available on request from the Experiment Station at State College. Dr. Alford said:

"The routine and careful use of the strip cup is probably the simplest method of detecting mastitis. If a dairyman can prevent the loss in production of a quart of milk from each of several cows, he will more than pay for the trouble involved. A point of more significance than the loss of a small quantity of milk for a day or so is reflected in the results of the tests. It is not unlikely that permanent tissue damage had occurred by the long continuation of these 'mild infections' and there was a permanent loss in productive capacity in the cow."

"It frequently has been observed that the high producing cow has more trouble with mastitis than the low producer. As dairymen continue to improve the quality of

their stock the quality of their mastitis control program should also improve if they are to obtain maximum benefit from this increased production."

Nine Letters

Lesson for July 1, 1956

THOUSANDS of Sunday schools for the next three months are going to be studying nine short but immortal letters. These letters are the forgotten parts of the New Testament, for many people. Out of the 27 "books" of the New Testament, all but five are letters. These nine—from Hebrews to Revelation inclusive—make up about 50 pages or one-sixth of the whole Testament. It would be worth the reader's while to make a special study of these letters this summer.

Letters from...

No two people write quite alike. All letters bear the mark of their writers even when they are unsigned. So it is with these nine. Some of them are signed, some are not. But the writers can be told apart without any trouble. If Hebrews and James were printed together without a break, a high school student should be able to notice the difference between them. The writer of the first letter is plainly a highly educated man, a man who is keenly interested in ritual and in the history of the Hebrew people. The writer of the second is less highly educated, but a more practical man all around. Not that his advice is any better, but he loses no time getting down to particular problems. The first man is greatly interested in theology, the second is so little interested in it that his letter has worried some people like Luther, for example, who wondered whether it really belonged in the New Testament. Or again, comparing Hebrews with the letters of Paul, the reader can see why scholars are for the most part quite certain that Paul never wrote this one. It is obviously written by a different kind of man—one who used a different vocabulary, went at problems differently, constructed a letter differently, quoted the Old Testament in a different way; indeed while all of Paul's letters are carefully signed, Hebrews is not signed at all. So one may go through the rest of these letters seeing the writers through what they wrote.

Letters to...

Letters vary according to the persons to whom they are written. A woman writing to her mother, her husband, the tax collector and her boy at school will write four different kinds of letters. So these nine letters were written to different kinds of people. To be sure, some of them were sent to a pretty wide circle of readers (Peter for instance), but even so, that wide circle had something in common. In this case, suffering and persecution. Is it too much to suggest that the Christians John has in his mind's eye as he writes his letters are much more mature than the Christians to whom James writes his plain advice? Now the interesting thing is that the various kinds of Christians to whom these letters were addressed are matched by Christian types today. That is why one Christian will sometimes get more out of one part of the New Testament, while another Christian finds more meat in another part. And yet for all the differences there are some important likenesses, and the noticing reader will find them.

Letters about...

Few if any of these Letters, or any others in the New Testament, are about "things in general." They usually speak to some particular problem, situation or trouble. The New Testament does not consist of a series of theological essays neatly arranged by topics. Rather, it consists of fairly short letters speaking to certain specific problems that had been distressing the readers. Some of these problems emerged in more places than one at the same time, just as happens today. In the short passages selected for special study in most quarterlies, two problems are highlighted, as the reader will find: false teachings, and persecution. In these times in which we live, with half the world in a ferment against Christianity, and even in the "Christian" part of the world a bewildering jangle and wrangle of sects and "isms" soap-boxing all over the place—the Christian church threatened by enemies without and "crackpots" oftentimes within, who can call the New Testament's themes out of date?
