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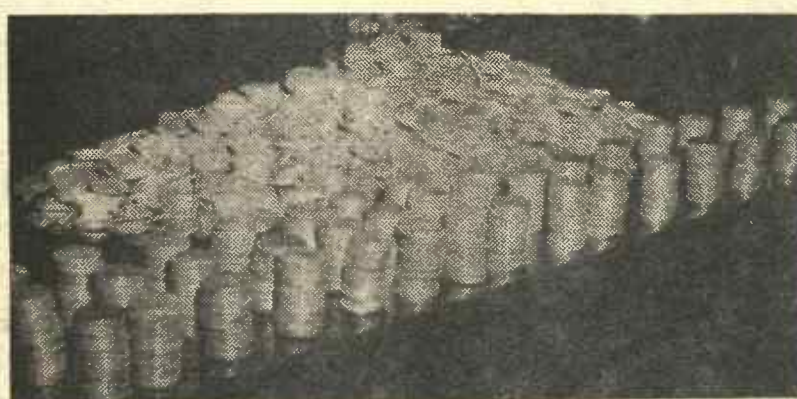

FRANCHISE GRANTED POWER ASS'N. BY INCORPORATED TOWNS

All incorporated towns in Tishomingo County on Tuesday night of this week in their regular meetings passed on an ordinance that gave to the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association a franchise to operate within their bounds. Towns giving the franchise were Iuka, Burnsville, Tishomingo, Paducah and Belmont. The franchise is for 25 years beginning with August 1, 1956. Purpose is to protect the towns and the Association. The 1956 session of the Mississippi Legislature passed the law requiring that all electric power associations acquire a franchise to operate within the municipalities which they serve with electric current.

\$2,117,667 Value Of County Crops, 1954 Census Of Agriculture Shows

The value of products sold in 1954 by operators of 1,859 farms in Tishomingo County was \$2,117,667, according to a preliminary report of the 1954 Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. The value of all crops sold was \$1,639,725 and included \$1,620,199 for field crops, \$2,449 for vegetables, \$16,717 for fruits and nuts, and \$360 for horticultural specialties. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$413,544 and included \$96,671 for dairy products, \$75,379 for poultry and poultry products, and \$241,494 for livestock and livestock products. The value of forest products sold from the county's farms was \$64,398. Information on the value of farm products sold is presented for each county in a preliminary State report, copies of which may be purchased from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., at 10 cents each.

Soil Bank Program Available To Farmers Through ASC Office

The ASC Office is now ready to explain the Soil Bank Program to any farmer who might be interested in renting ALL or part of their 1956 cotton acreage to the Government thru the Soil Bank Program. A farmer may rent to the Government by one of the following ways: (1) By underplanting your farm allotment if the underplanting was due to adverse weather conditions

or in anticipation that the Soil Bank would be past. The farmer must sign a certificate or affidavit to the effect.

(2) By the farmer plowing up any acreage of his cotton allotment planted on the farm.

The minimum acreage that can be rented must be 2.0 acres, unless your entire allotment is less than 2.0 acres.

The maximum acreage that can be rented is 10.0 acres or 50% of your farm allotment which ever is the larger.

All acreage Reserve Agreement must be signed by the farm operator by July 20, 1956.

All cotton acreage destroyed under the acreage reserve program will be considered as acreage planted to cotton for the purpose of establishing future County Allotments. This is, you will receive history for any acreage of cotton that you rent and destroy.

Any acreage rented to the Government under the Soil Bank will have to remain idle for the remainder of this year. You cannot graze or harvest any, crop from this land.

Early Winter Crops Conserve The Land

It is common knowledge that the more nearly a continuous cover

of vegetation can be kept on the land the less it will erode.

To, farmers know early fall growth of winter crops as small grain, or rye grass is most desirable. In fact, all farmers would like to be able to have an early growth of winter cover crops or small grain every fall.

Unfortunately most farmers cannot obtain a heavy sod of winter crops early in the season.

Since it is very desirable in some instances to have these early crops for grazing, it may be worth the effort to break the land that is to be planted to these crops this fall, now.

By breaking the land now and keeping it plowed more of the water that falls on it in the form of rain will be conserved. (A landowner who has an irrigation system would simply irrigate at time of planting.)

At the proper time apply fertilizer and plant the winter crop in the usual way. The moisture you have saved by FOLLOWING your land should cause the seed to germinate and the plants to grow.

We Soil Conservation Service Technicians agree with our District Soil Conservation Commissioners that, soil and water conservation practices are doing those things that helps nature do a better job.

If you want an early growth of winter crops and have land you can break now and keep fallowed where you want to plant these crops, by all means do it, and save all the moisture you can for these winter crops. If you will do this your early grazing crop may be the envy of your neighbors.

The majority of the companies that operate through the mail rather than through a licensed Mississippi agent are more concerned with the collection of your premium dollar than in the payment of your claims. Do not be misled by the attractive literature sent you or the testimonials in the printed matter.

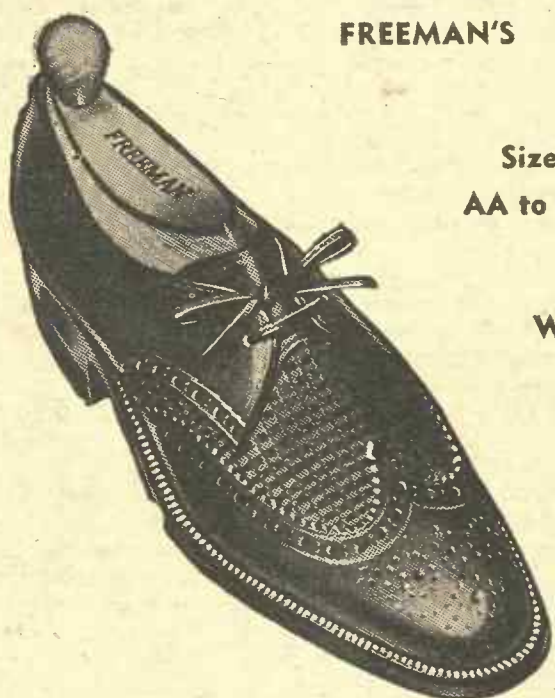

FRANCHISE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY ELECTRIC POWER ASSOCIATION AN ELECTRIC FRANCHISE IN THE VILLAGE OF PADEN, MISSISSIPPI.

Be It Ordained By The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of The Village of Paden, Mississippi, That: WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, under House Bill No. 123, at its regular 1956 session enacted into law requiring, among other things, that all electric power utilities doing business or serving electricity to any municipality should have a franchise.

WHEREAS, by the provisions of Chapter 491 of the Acts of the Legislature of the State of Mississippi of 1950, Section 85, it is provided that no municipality shall grant a franchise or renew or extend such franchise shall not be granted for a longer period than twenty-five years, and that the same shall not be exclusive, and by Section 73 of said Chapter 491 it is provided that every such franchise that is granted must be approved after passage of the ordinance granting same, by a majority of the qualified electors of such municipality voting therein in a general or special election; and

WHEREAS, the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association has asked that an electric franchise be granted to it for a period of twenty-five years from August 1, 1956, and that compensation for said franchise be fixed by this board to be paid by the association for the said franchise; and

THIS BOARD HAVING FOUND that the franchise as of August 1, 1956, but which franchise is not to be exclusive, and has likewise found that in the view of the fact that the said Tishomingo County Electric Power Association is a non-profit corporation, serving the inhabitants and business enterprises of the Village of Paden and surrounding territory who constitutes its membership, that the sum of \$150.00 is a full, fair and reasonable amount for the said association to pay for the said franchise; and

IT IS ORDERED that the same be and is hereby fixed as the amount to be paid for the franchise and the same be and is hereby ordered paid by the said association to the clerk of this board.

THEREFORE, upon the payment of the said sum to the Clerk of this Board, it is hereby ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi.

SECTION I

In consideration of the sum of \$150.00 paid to the Village of Paden, and in further consideration of the benefits that will accrue to the Village of Paden and the inhabitants thereof, Tishomingo County Electric Power Association, its successors and assigns, hereinafter referred to as the Grantee, is hereby given and vested with the right, authority, privilege, and franchise to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain, operate and conduct, in the Village a plant or plants and system for the manufacture of electric current for all purposes whatsoever.

SECTION II

The Grantee is hereby further given and vested with the right authority, easement, privilege and franchise to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain, operate and conduct in the Village a system of poles, towers, conduits, cables, conductors, transforming stations, transmission, distribution, or sale of electric current for all purposes whatsoever in, over, under, along, upon and across all streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, and public places in the Village as they now exist or may hereafter be laid out or extended, together with the further right, privilege and franchise to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain and operate such poles, towers, conduits, cables, wires, conductors, transforming stations, fittings and all appliances and appurtenances necessary or desirable to the transmission within, into, through, over and beyond the Village and furnishing, supplying and distributing to the Village and to the inhabitants and corporations, both within and beyond the limits thereof, of electric energy for lighting, heating, power and all other purposes for which electric energy may be used now or hereafter, and for the purpose of extending its lines and furnishing electric current beyond the limits of the Village.

SECTION III

The poles, towers, conduits, cables, conductors, transforming stations, fittings, appliances and appurtenances shall be so constructed as not unreasonably to interfere

with the proper use of the streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, sidewalks and public places in the Village and shall be maintained in a reasonably good condition and repair.

SECTION IV

When the Grantee shall cause any opening or alteration to be made in any of the streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, sidewalks, or public places of the Village for the purpose of installing, maintaining, operating, or repairing any poles, towers, conduits, cables and other appliances, the work shall be completed with a reasonable time and the Grantee shall upon the completion of such work restore such portion of the streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, sidewalks or other public places to be as good condition as it was before the opening or alteration was so made, and of material of like kind and character.

SECTION V

The Grantee shall hold the Village harmless from any and all liability or damages resulting from the negligence of the Grantee in the construction, maintenance or operation of its poles, towers, conduits, wires, cables and other appliances.

SECTION VI

The Grantee may, from time to time, declare, make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations as conditions for the sale and distribution by it of electric current to any person, firm or corporation.

SECTION VII

In the event the supply of electric energy should be interrupted or fail by reason of accident or otherwise beyond the control of the Grantee, the Grantee shall restore the services within a reasonable time and such interruption shall not constitute a breach of this franchise, nor shall the Grantee be liable for damages by reason of such interruption or failure. But this clause shall not be construed so as to relieve Grantee from damages should services be interrupted for an unreasonable length of time, or interrupted without accident or other means not beyond Grantee's control.

SECTION VIII

The Grantee shall install and maintain, free of charge, meters for measuring current and shall have free access to the premises of the customer from time to time for the purpose of reading, repairing, testing and maintaining the meters and appurtenances. Such meters shall remain the property of the Grantee.

SECTION IX

Wherever in this ordinance either the Village or the Grantee is named or referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors, successors or assigns of either, and all rights, privileges and obligations herein conferred shall bind and inure to the benefit of such successor, successors or assigns of the Village or of the Grantee.

SECTION X

The Grantee having requested the passage of this ordinance the same will be considered accepted by the Grantee unless written objections are filed thereto with the Village Clerk by the Grantee within ten (10) days from the passage of this ordinance.

SECTION XI

If any clause, provision or section of this ordinance is illegal, or is not embraced within the title hereof, or is not cognate to the subject expressed in the title, the remaining provisions hereof shall be thereby affected but shall have full force and provisions.

The Grantee shall pay to the Village Clerk the cost of publishing this ordinance, such publication to be made one time in The Vidette, a newspaper of general circulation in the Village of Paden, the same to be made as soon as practicable after the adjournment of this meeting.

The Grantee is hereby further given and vested with the right, authority, easement, privilege and franchise to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain, operate and conduct in the Town a system of poles, towers, conduits, cables, conductors, transforming stations, transmission, distribution, or sale of electric current for all purposes whatsoever in, over, under, along, upon and across all streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, and public places in the Town as they now exist or may hereafter be laid out or extended, together with the further right, privilege and franchise to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain and operate such poles, towers, conduits, cables, wires, conductors, transforming stations, fittings and all appliances and appurtenances necessary or desirable to the transmission within, into, through, over and beyond the Town and furnishing, supplying and distributing to the Town and to the inhabitants and corporations, both within and beyond the limits thereof, of electric energy for lighting, heating, power and all other purposes for which electric energy may be used now or hereafter, and for

the purpose of extending its lines and furnishing electric current beyond the limits of the Town.

SECTION III

The poles, towers, conduits, cables, conductors, transforming stations, fittings, appliances and appurtenances shall be so constructed as not unreasonably to interfere with the proper use of the streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, sidewalks and public places in the Town and shall be maintained in a reasonably good condition and repair.

SECTION IV

Whenever the Grantee shall cause any opening or alteration to be made in any of the streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, sidewalks, or public places of the Town for the purpose of installing, maintaining, operating, or repairing any poles, towers, conduits, cables and other appliances, the work shall be completed within a reasonable time and the Grantee shall upon the completion of such work restore such portion of the streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, sidewalks or other public places to as good condition as it was before the opening or alteration was so made, and of material of like kind and character.

SECTION V

The Grantee shall hold the Town harmless from any and all liability or damages resulting from the negligence of the Grantee in the construction, maintenance or operation of its poles, towers, conduits, wires, cables and other appliances.

SECTION VI

The Grantee may, from time to time, declare, make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations as conditions for the sale and distribution by it of electric current to any person, firm or corporation.

SECTION VII

In the event the supply of electric energy should be interrupted or fail by reason of accident or otherwise beyond the control of the Grantee, the Grantee shall restore the services within a reasonable time and such interruption shall not constitute a breach of this franchise, nor shall the Grantee be liable for damages by reason of such interruption or failure. But this clause shall not be construed so as to relieve Grantee from damages should services be interrupted for an unreasonable length of time, or interrupted without accident or other means not beyond Grantee's control.

SECTION VIII

The Grantee shall install and maintain, free of charge, meters for measuring current and shall have free access to the premises of the customer from time to time for the purpose of reading, repairing, testing and maintaining the meters and appurtenances. Such meters shall remain the property of the Grantee.

SECTION IX

Wherever in this ordinance either the Town or the Grantee is named or referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors, successors or assigns of either, and all rights, privileges and obligations herein conferred shall bind and inure to the benefit of such successor, successors or assigns of the Town or of the Grantee.

SECTION X

The Grantee having requested the passage of this ordinance the same will be considered accepted by the Grantee unless written objections are filed thereto with the Town Clerk by the Grantee within ten (10) days from the passage of this ordinance.

SECTION XI

If any clause, provision or section of this ordinance is illegal, or is not embraced within the title hereof, or is not cognate to the subject expressed in the title, the remaining provisions hereof shall be thereby affected but shall have full force and provisions.

SECTION XII

The Grantee shall pay to the Town Clerk the cost of publishing this ordinance, such publication to be made one time in The Vidette, a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Tishomingo, the same to be made as soon as practicable after the adjournment of this meeting.

The within and foregoing ordinance was reduced to writing and read by the Clerk at this regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen; and

IT IS ORDERED that the same remain on file with the Clerk for public inspection for at least two weeks before the final passage or adoption of this ordinance; and

FRANCHISE ORDINANCE
ORDINANCE GRANTING TO
TISHOMINGO COUNTY EL-
ECTRIC POWER ASSOCIATION
ELECTRIC FRANCHISE IN
TOWN OF BURNSVILLE,
MISSISSIPPI

Ordained By The Mayor And
Board of Aldermen of The
Town of Burnsville, Mississippi

WHEREAS, the Legislature of
the State of Mississippi, under
Bill No. 123, at its regular
session enacted into law re-
lating among other things, that
electric power utilities doing
business or serving electricity to
any municipality should have a
franchise;

WHEREAS, by the provisions
of Chapter 491 of the Acts of the
Legislature of the State of Mis-
sissippi of 1950, Section 85, it is
provided that no municipality
shall grant a franchise or renew
an existing franchise shall
be granted for a longer period
than twenty-five years, and that
the same shall not be exclusive;

AND WHEREAS, Section 73 of said Chapter
491 provides that every such
franchise that is granted must
be approved after passage of the
ordinance granting same, by a
majority of the qualified electors
of such municipality voting
thereon in a general or special
election; and

WHEREAS the Tishomingo Coun-

ty Electric Power Association has
asked that an electric franchise
be granted to it for a period of
twenty-five years from August 1,
1956, and that compensation for
said franchise be fixed by this
board to be paid by the association
for the said franchise; and

THIS BOARD HAVING FOUND
that the franchise as of August 1,
1956, but which franchise is not
to be exclusive, and has likewise
found that in the view of the
fact that the said Tishomingo
County Electric Power Association
is a non-profit corporation, serving
the inhabitants and business enter-
prises of the Town of Burnsville
and surrounding territory who
constitutes its membership, that
the sum of \$200.00 is a full fair
and reasonable amount for the
said association to pay for the said
franchise; and

whatsoever.

town a system of poles, towers,
conductors, cables, conductors, trans-
forming stations, transmission, dis-

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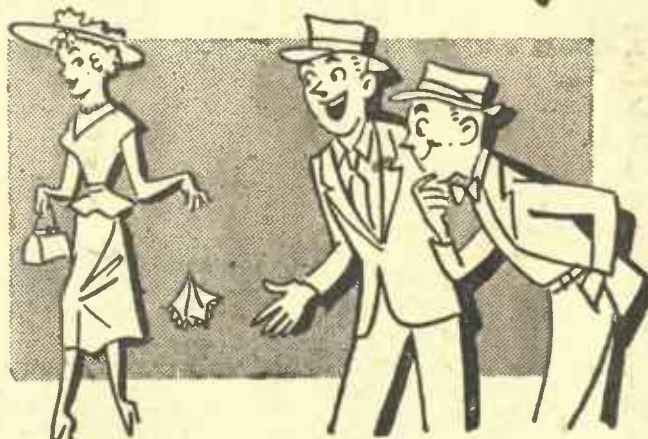

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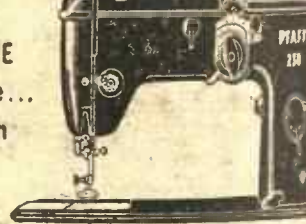
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THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union
Sunday School Lessons

DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Scripture: Matthew 3:13-17
Reading: John 14:1-11

Son of God

Lesson for July 8, 1956

...the Christian church has believed from the beginning that Jesus is divine. Now the Bible says that in those words, "I am the Son of God," it is the Bible way of saying that Jesus is called Son of God. The Bible has written volumes of what it says about Jesus. It is impossible to look at the Bible and not see that there is a Son of God here. The first thing we are told here is that God, who has been speaking to men for thousands of years in many ways, has at last spoken in a Son. Jesus Christ is the answer to man's questions, the answer to man's call for God. He is God calling to us. Men longed for the sky were not content. They wish they could see the face of God. Well, God has given us his last best word. And this word is in the form of a textbook, not the form of an answer-book for the riddles of existence. God's message to man is not a creed, but a good life. His message is in a Person, a Life. We are to know what God thinks. We are to say something. Well, he has said... and what he says is Jesus Christ.

...the line that divides all things into two different kinds of things, the first and most important line, is not the line dividing spirit from matter. The real line is that which runs between Creator and Created, or to put it in another way, the line between God and everything else. When you take time to think about it, you can see that God can be on the creator-ship of creation. God alone, of all that exists, is because he is and because something or someone else made him be. Every man must say to himself, "If it is not for such and such a person or such and such an event, I would not be here." But God could truly say a thing like that. He does not depend on something or someone else for his very existence, as we do. It is by his good will that we are in the universe at all. It is here for us to be in. Now the Bible declares that Jesus Christ is God's active agent in creation. In the simple words of the writer, we read that through Jesus, God created the world. Under the early church soon after that this puts Jesus on the side of that line dividing Creator from Created. This is part of what we mean when we say that Jesus is divine.

...the part of what we mean is expressed in those two words "creation" and "stamp." The old Bible had a story about a creature called a Gorgon, with snakes for hair, so horrible that the very sight of her turned the beholder to stone. Only when a brave man went directly at her but into a cave, was any one able to enter her presence and live. In quite the same way, God is not too horrible, but too holy, for mere men to gaze at. We too need a mirror to reflect the unbearable glory of God. Christ is that reflection. He is the "stamp" of God's image. He is as it were God's signature, his handwriting, his personal seal.

... Closer Attention

...the divinity of Christ, of which sentences in the Hebrew are a few of the New Testament, was never thought of, those clear early days of the church, as a mere doctrine in a man's mind. It meant and means something intensely practical. If Jesus is really divine, then, we cannot take him or leave him. If he is God's Son he is no more opaque than God is. Deciding for or against him is the most important thing in life. What he tells and is not "one man's opinion" is the voice of God.

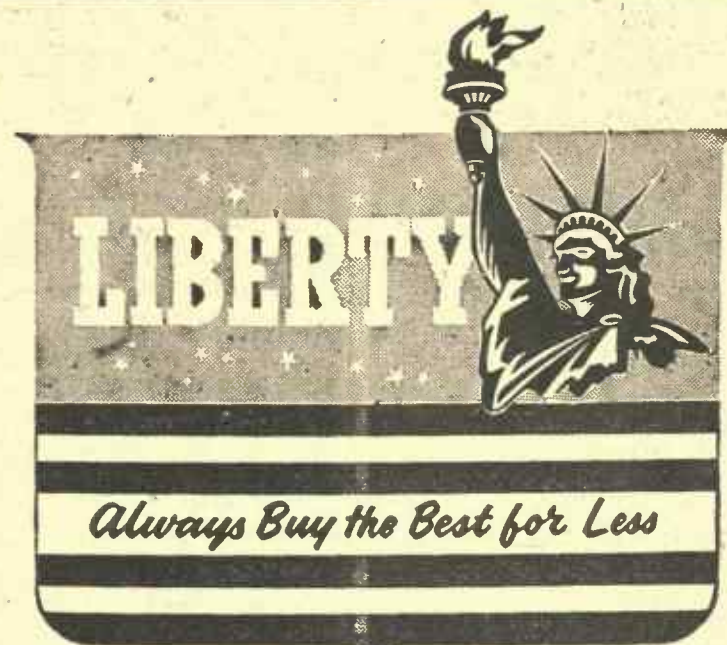
