S. P. Crockett To Speak At Rotary Club

The Rotary Club of Iuka on Wednesday July 18, will be host to S. P. (Bill) Crockett Governor of the 204th District of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 36 Rotary Clubs in North Mississippi and Shelby County, Tennessee.

He will address the local Club and confer with President Wayne Spinks, Secretary Hiram Jones and committee chairman on Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. Crockett is Superintendent of the North Mississippi Branch Experiment Station in Holly Springs, Mississippi, and is a member and Past President of the Rotary Club of Holly Springs. He is a native of Tate County, Mississippi, received his M. S. degree from Mississippi State College in 1939,

and has been employed by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station since that time. He was elected as a District Governor of Rotary International for the 1956-57 fiscal year at Rotary's 47th Annual Convention in Philadelphia last June. He is one of 248 District Governors supervising the activities of more than 9,100 Rotary Clubs which have a membership of 431,000 business and professional executives in 99 countries throughout the free world.

Wherever Rotary Clubs are located, President Spinks asserted in discussing the Governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Iuka because they are based on the same general objectives—developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community-betterment undertakings, raising the standard of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world. John A. Brown To Enter Med School

John Augustus Brown of Iuka has been accepted for admission to the University of Mississippi School of Medicine in Jackson. The son of Mrs. J. A. Brown, he took his premedical work at Millsaps College.

Brown is one of 80 applicants accepted by the University Medical Center for its Sept. 24 class.

The fall freshman class at the University Medical Center will be the first to reach full 80-student quota, according to Dr. David Pankratz, dean of the school of medicine and director of the center.

For the first time, the Ole Miss School of Medicine will accept a limited number of superior students who are non Mississippians. Twin brothers, Don and Walter Bryan of Birmingham, Ala., and Arie Braude of Israel are numbered among the accepted applicants. The class includes one husband-wife team, Paul and Sare Wasson Edwards of Starkville.

The 80 freshmen attended 15 different colleges and universities. Two dozen went to the University of Mississippi; 14 to Millsaps and 11 to Mississippi College. They represent 48 cities and towns and 35 Mississippi Counties.

The University of Mississippi moved into the state's new multi-million dollar Medical Center just a year ago when the 355-bed teaching hospital was opened. The first senior students in the school's half-century history will start work in their own institution this fall.

Common Bermuda Grass Good Conservation Crop

For pasture plants, it is hard to improve on Common Bermuda grass and Lespedeza. Both Common Bermuda grass and Lespedeza are native to Tishomingo County. Both of these plants grow wild on our land.

It is true that Common Bermuda is a pest on row-crop land, but as a base grass for permanent pasture it hardly has an equal in our county.

An upland pasture composed of a good sod of common bermuda in which common or Kobe Lespedeza is established, if properly managed and fertilized, will provide palatable high protein grazing for livestock as well as an excellent cover for the land.

There is very little erosion damage on soils well sodded with bermuda. And if this bermuda is well fertilized with nitrate, phosphate, and potash it will produce a high quality grazing crop. Also a high quality hay can be made from well fertilized common bermuda grass. The Soil Conservation District

Commissioners recommend the use of common bermuda grass for pasture and hay. As planning Technician for the soil conservation service in Tishomingo county I have observed that most farmers in this county are afraid that any bermuda planted in their pasture will spread to their row-crop land. For this reason very few farmers of Tishomingo county have made full use of this valuable pasture and hay plant.

Now is the season to observe how well common bermuda stands up under heavy midsummer grazing. In late summer bermuda grass does become fibrous and wirey, but an application of nitrate after mowing should, if there is sufficient moisture, cause new growth that is tender and palatable.

Among those farmers of Tishomingo county who are using common bermuda as a pasture plant are: Morrell Hatcher, L. P. Allen, Jr. Wayne Spinks and Buster Honeycutt.

Any Tishomingo county farmer

who is planning to renovate an old pasture or start a new one in 1957 should observe this summer how well common bermuda grass and lespezea can fit into a permanent pasture and soil conserving program.

Weather Records 46 Years Used in Drought Study

State College, Miss.—An average of 3.4 drought periods per growing season have occurred at State College during the last 46 years, according to records maintained by the Agricultural Experiment Station.

There is no universal definition of a drought period, therefore, for the purpose of this study a drought was defined as 14 days or longer with less than .25 inch of rain on any single day and the

growing season is arbitrarily taken as the period March 16 through September 15. Daily rainfall records have been maintained by the Experiment Station in cooperation with the U. S. Weather Bureau since 1910. From these records, Agricultural Engineer J. C. McWhorter has developed a chart showing the daily rainfall from 1910 through 1955 for the period March 16 through September 15. Study of the records shows that:

1. Droughts are likely to occur at any time during the growing season, but less frequently during March and April.

2. The longest drought with .25 inch or less of rain on any day

lasted for 54 days and occurred in 1941.

3. The longest drought with one inch or less lasted for 74 days and occurred in 1941.

4. On the average two drought periods of 26 days or longer with one inch or less can be expected each year.

5. On the average one drought period of 23 days or longer with .25 inch or less can be expected each year.

Mr. McWhorter says that while this study involves only one weather station, it gives an idea of what might be expected at other locations.

The complete report is published in the June issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

The success of Social Security depends upon the correct posting of millions of accounts. Mrs. Mary King Temple, manager of the Sheffield Alabama social security office said today. She urged employers and self-employed individuals to

file accurate and complete reports. These reports should show the worker's name and account number exactly as it appears on his social security card.

Social security account number much time and effort to encourage proper reporting. Verifying data on incomplete and incorrect reports involves costly correspondence and personal contact with business firms and individuals.

social security account number cards and replacements may be obtained from the Sheffield, Ala. district social security office. Application blanks for account number cards may be requested by mail. They are also available at local post offices.

Expanded social security coverage leaves few jobs today that do not require the holder to use his social security account number card, it was explained. Everyone should carry his social security card in his wallet or purse, and put the stub away with other important papers for safekeeping. A worker's future benefits depend on his social security account, Mrs. Temple concluded.

It's a good idea to check your kitchen, bathroom, bedrooms, Garage, attic, yard, basement, closets to be sure that anything harmful is:

Off the floor and low shelves. Off the tops of tables and sinks. Away from food shelves. Locked or stored away in a closet or cupboard.

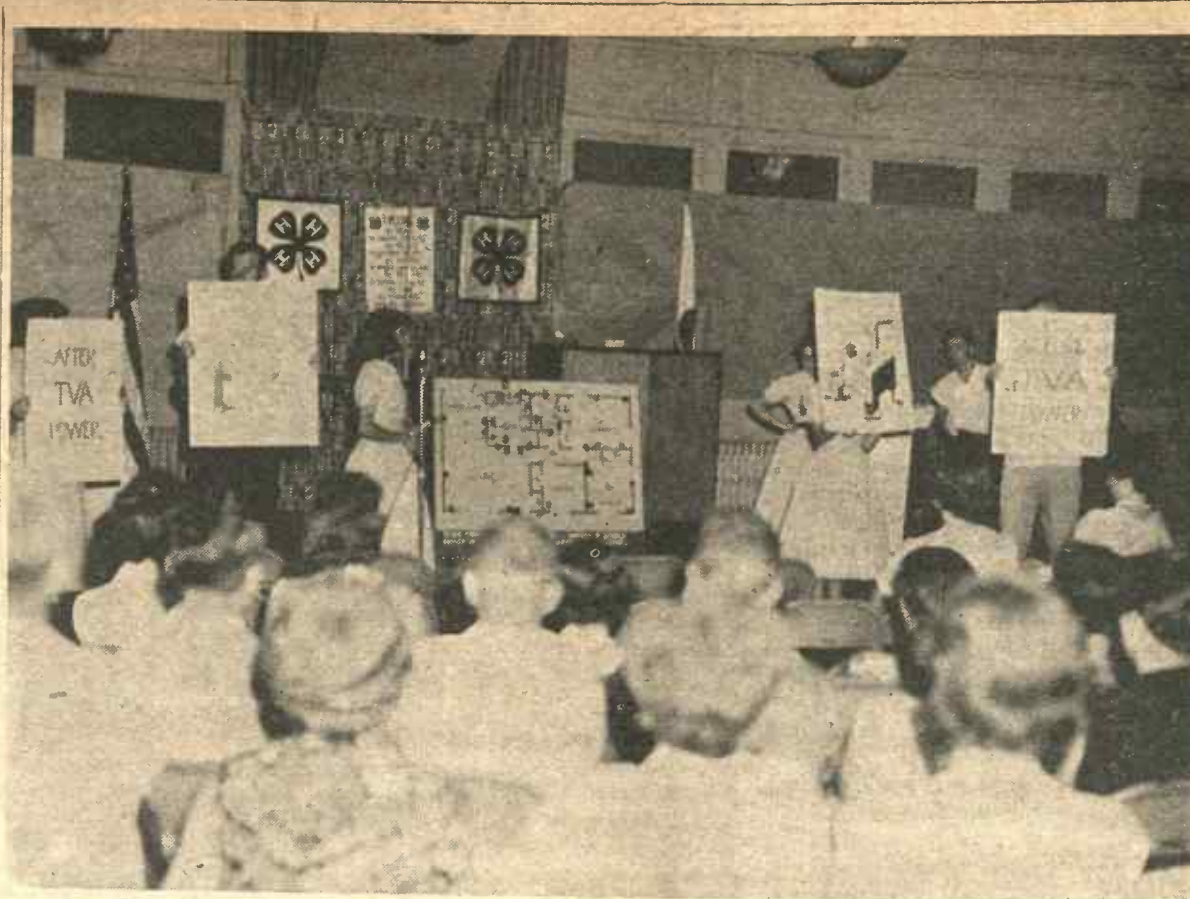

BIBLE SPEAKS

Scripture: John 4:39-42;
Reading: John 3:14-21.

SAVIOUR OF MEN

Lesson for July 15, 1956

Bible does not say that Jesus saves men from hell. It says that he saves men from sin. This is much more important, for suppose a man were to be saved from hell but not from sin, such a man would carry his own hell with him through the gates of heaven. The Bible says that Jesus is the Saviour of men here and now, not men here and there alone, but men in the living world. In the living world, Jesus means, "I am the light of the world," and Christ is the rescuer of men.

How does Christ rescue men? The Bible suggests, and the church answers. Let us look at three. Christ rescues men by saving their souls. As a Christian writer (Hordern) says, "He who is saved from sin is saved from hell." In a long-ago battle between the forces of good and evil, the story of the front-line soldier who saved many of the enemy's soldiers as he could gather in his arms, and forced himself on them, thus making by his death a way through which his fellow-soldiers poured to victory. In North America, when the United States government was about to punish the Cherokee Indians for an alleged crime, their chief, Junaluska, offered to give his own life if the government would let his people go. He was killed, and his people were freed. These are imperfect illustrations of what Jesus Christ does for sinners, as self-giving love. He "tasted death for every one." That does not have to be done twice.

Another way in which Christ saves is by just being himself. There was a school-room in which the small boys and girls learned a courtesy, a gracefulness of manner, which children in other rooms did not learn. One who wondered how the children did it, and who knew how it was to teach some children the ABC's of politeness, asked one of the boys how the teacher did it. "She don't teach us all," the small boy said. "She just walks around, and we feel as if we are anything." A well-known spiritual singer, "I want to be like Jesus, in my heart." Jesus saves men from their sins by so teaching them that they know there is nothing better than to be like Him. If you are learning to play the piano, you don't learn by listening to poor pianos played. You learn by listening to a master-pianist, a real artist. Now there is an easy way of understanding this matter of saving us by his example: let us suppose that we must every day compare him with ourselves, and keep (so to speak) a chart on our "spiritual progress." It is recorded every day—20% like Jesus in 1955, 25% in 1956, and so on. It is absolutely the wrong way to do it; all you become is a Pharisee. The right way is to keep our hearts fixed on Christ, so to love him in sincere earnest, that we grow more and more like him. One may say almost without exaggeration that true saints are not self-conscious.

Guest

Once Jesus invited himself to dinner at the house of a very famous character named Zacchaeus. After dinner Jesus said, "Salvance has come to this house," and the people who knew that Zacchaeus began to be a different man from that afternoon. In the last book of the New Testament a picture is drawn of Christ standing outside a closed door. "If any one hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in," he says. So Christ saves men by their permanent unseen presence, by being the Inner Companion whose very presence is a saving power. Christ is Saviour, not by what he does for men, but by what he does in men. Being "saved" is more than knowing or believing; being saved is becoming, by his invitation, host to the presence of all.

County Agent news

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension

Dairy cattle need supplementary feed when pastures begin to slump. That summertime drop in milk production can usually be traced to lower nutritive quality of grazing.

Although pastures are still green, they just don't have the same nutritive value that they did in early spring.

To keep that milk production up where it should be, provide some additional dry feed during the entire pasture season, so they will not suffer when permanent pastures lose feed value.

Temporary summer grazing will also help greatly in preventing the summer drop.

Soil Bank-Acreage Reserve

Deadline for filing intention to participate in the acreage reserve part of the soil bank program is July 20. The time is short. See your local ASC Office now and file your intent.

If plowing up of crops is to be done, July 31 is the deadline for competing the job.

Cotton

Watch that cotton. Keep your cultivations shallow so that you won't plow off feeder roots and cause the plant to shed squares.

Keep down insect infestations. Don't let Mr. Boll Weevil harvest your crop for you.

Get on a poisoning schedule and stick to it. Make sure that you are properly applying the insecticide materials. You must get adequate coverage of the plants, if you are going to control the insects. Use at least ten pounds of dust per acre on cotton knee high.

Hogs

Meat-type hog production is a money making proposition. This type is larger for their weight in terms of bone and muscle. This makes them efficient users of feed.

Meat type sows are prolific and raise large litters. This cuts down on the cost of raising each pig.

To regain the loss in consumer demand for pork, producers are going to have to produce what the customer wants—that is more lean meat and less fat. Remember, lard is a by-product. Hog productions means growing meat.

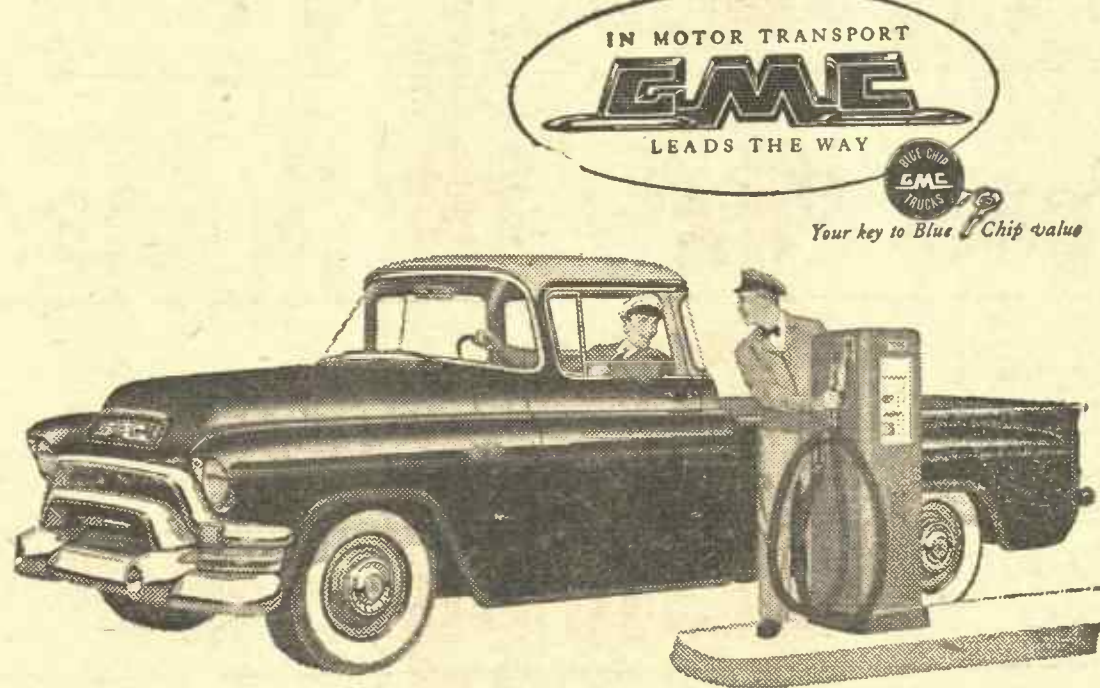
