80,498 Books Read In County Last Year

The first week in July, Mrs. Augusta B. Richardson, director, Northeast Regional library, met the Boards of Supervisors of the four counties, served by the Northeast Regional library organization, to report on the services rendered for the last school year. July 1, 1955 to June 30, 1956.

Mrs. Richardson's report to the Supervisors of Tishomingo county contained the following information: A total of 12,225 books were left in the county schools by the bookmobile; other services of the bookmobile include 2,756 books left in communities, 822 books checked out at bookmobile stops and a total of 1,514 regional books delivered to the branches. In addition 432 number of reserves were filled and a total of 360 new adult books were sent to the branches, making a grand total of 18,109 books in this county last year, besides the collection already in the branch libraries.

The children in the schools read 61,125 books, plus 2,756 books read in the communities, 822 books circulated through bookmobile stops and 15,795 books read in the branches, making a grand total of 80,498 books read in this county last year.

"The Northeast Regional library has been in operation five years: each year the book collection has increased and more and better services are being rendered," stated Mrs. Richardson. "A total of 5 high school libraries have been reorganized, cataloged and set up according to regulations of the State Department of Education. The bookmobile serves every school in the county every four weeks, which means an extra trip during the school term," she concluded.

YOUR NAME IN THE PAPER

How valuable is local newspaper advertising to local business people? Here's what the American Bankers Association magazine, a publication which represents a traditionally hard-headed profession, has to say: "No business man or woman in any town should allow a newspaper to go to press without his or her name and business being mentioned somewhere in its columns. This does not mean you should have a whole, half, or even a quarter page advertisement in each issue of the paper. Your name and address should be mentioned if you do not use more than a two-line space.

"A stranger picking up a newspaper should be able to tell what business is represented in a town... it's the best possible town advertiser. The man or woman who does not advertise does an injustice to himself or herself and definitely to the town."

A revival meeting will begin at Rowland Mills Baptist church on Sunday, July 22 and will continue through July 27.

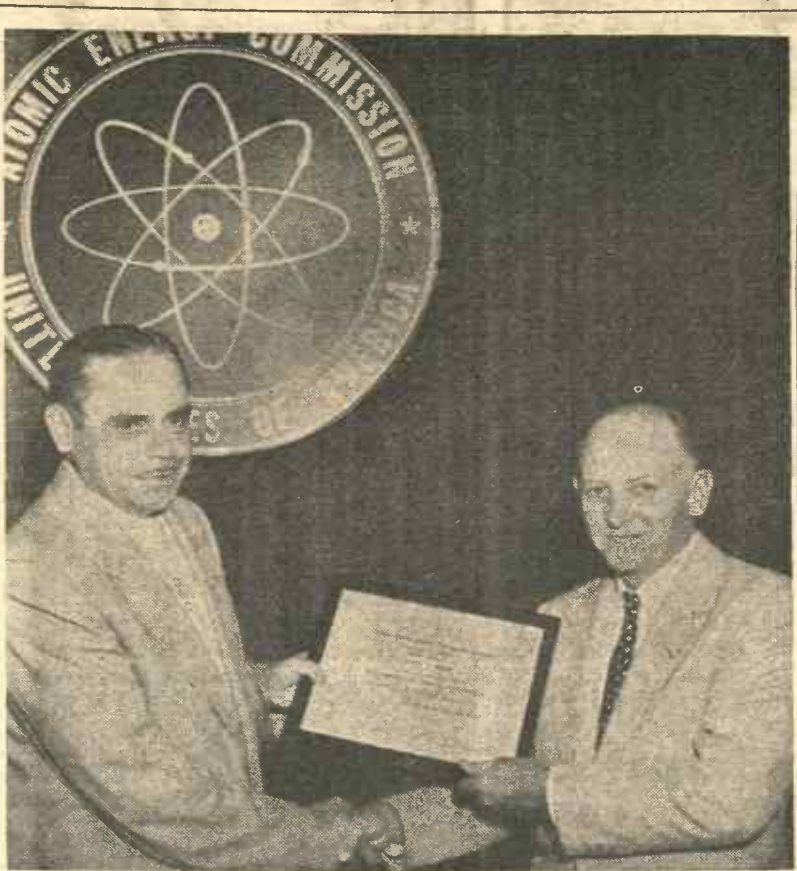

Miss. Safety Patrol School Announces Postponement

The Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol's recruit training school which was tentatively scheduled to open at the Mississippi Military District here Monday, 16 July, has been postponed.

According to Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough, the opening of the training school has been re-scheduled for July 30. He

disclosed that the postponement was requested by school directors after a larger number of applicants than anticipated filed applications for Patrol posts.

The Highway Patrol screens individually all persons applying for patrolman positions, a time-consuming task.

Each applicant is given a general aptitude test a temperament test by a Patrol examining officer. If he passes this test satisfactorily a Patrol investigator is sent to the applicant's home town and there questions Police officials, merchants and community leaders regarding the subject's moral character, family background, and standing in the community.

Applicants who check out on this investigation are then called to Jackson for a physical examination, and are then interviewed individually by a team of Patrol officers.

At each period during the screening, applicants are dropped out, so that when the training school for patrolmen is called, only about 30 per cent of the original applicants are enrolled.

According to Chief of Patrol Bill Hood, approximately 275 persons have been screened for the forthcoming Highway Patrol school. Of these 275 applicants, some 65 to 70 recruits will be accepted into the school.

Patrol school directors reveal that nearly 10 per cent of those accepted for training fail to satisfactorily complete the month-long school.

Closing date for applications is July 15.

Protect Your Woodland With Fire Lanes

The time to lock the stable is before the horse is stolen. The time to construct fire-lanes is before fire destroys your timber.

Fire can destroy in two hours pines it has taken ten years to produce. On older stands where the trees are larger, fire may not completely kill all of the big trees, but it will kill all of the young pine seedlings and injure the older trees to such an extent as to seriously slow down their growth.

Pine trees properly managed is one of the most efficient crops for soil protection and erosion control. But burned over pine woodland may offer very little protection to the soil. It has been determined by research, that erosion can be very great on burned woodland. It has also been determined by research, that the poorer the land the slower do pines grow, and that erosion makes the land poorer.

It hardly seems necessary to justify the need for fire-lanes. Yet many of our landowners say my land lies in a protected area, meaning that should fire originate on, or threaten his forest, a crew of trained firefighters will come immediately and extinguish the fire. It is also argued that a fire-lane will not stop a fire and there is little need for constructing them. It is true that fire-lanes will not stop a big fire. But they can be used by the landowner or the trained fire-fighters as points to start back fire and limit the area burned.

It has happened that several fires occurred in Tish. County at the same time making it impossible for our fine fire-fighting crew to be at all these fires at once. This could happen again and you may be the one to suffer, because you depended on the fire-fighters at a time they had, more than they could possibly do. At such a time fire-lanes (old roads disked well, or strips burned between two furrows) not more than 12 to 15 feet wide can be of tremendous importance in stopping a fire.

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They can be the means whereby the landowner can stop the fire himself by backfiring from the fire.

The Soil Conservation District Commissioners urge landowners to put their steep land in pines. As a technician for the USDA Soil Conservation Service, I want to emphasize the importance of fire-lanes in protection of these pines after they are established.

Household Workers And Social Security

If you work in a private household, the 1954 changes in the Social Security Law may bring old-age and survivors insurance protection to you and your family, even if you do not work full time. People who work regularly in one household have been covered by social security since the beginning of 1951.

The 1954 amendments to the Social Security Act, beginning the first of 1955, cover all household workers who are paid \$50 in cash wages in a calendar quarter by one employer. A calendar quarter is a three month period beginning January 1, April 1, July 1, or October 1.

What The Household Worker Should Do

If you work in a private household and are paid \$50 or more cash wages by one employer in a calendar quarter, you should show your employer your social security card so you can get social security credit for your earnings. Your employer needs both your name and social security number to show on the reports he makes of your earnings, so that an accurate record may be kept, as the amounts of your old-age and survivors insurance benefits payments are based on your earnings record.

If you do not have a social security card, you can get one at the nearest district office of the Social Security Administration. If there is no office in your community, get an application at the post office, fill out and mail to the Social Security Office.

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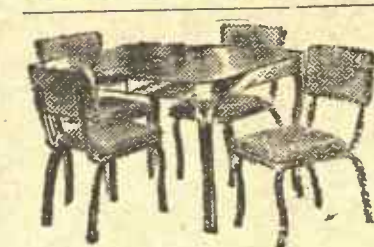

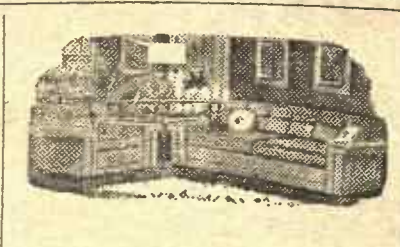

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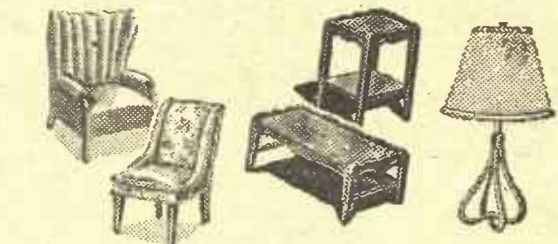

Like And Mange
and mange mites are infest-

ing a large number of hogs at the present time. These parasites irritate hogs and pigs as well as cause them to make slow gains. Gamma benzene hexachloride (BHC) will destroy both lice and mange mites. Mix pounds of 12% gamma benzene hexachloride wettable powder to 50 gallons of water. For a few hogs, use 1 cupful of the material to 3 gallons of water. Corral hogs in a close place so that they may be thoroughly sprayed and wet all over.

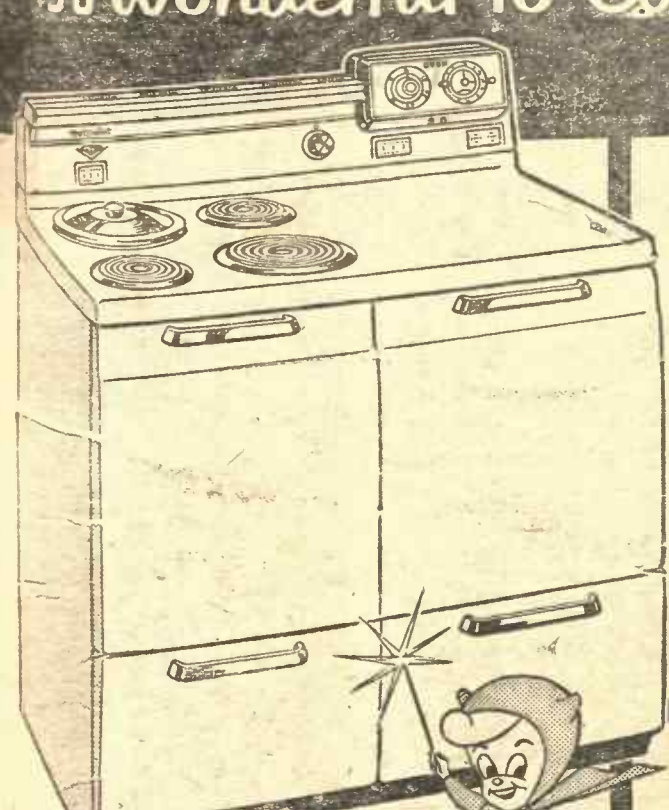

They will reduce beef gain by a half pound per day, or more, and can cause a drop in milk production up to 25 percent.

Controlling these flies is no great problem. Given a chance, the cattle will control the flies themselves. You provide a homemade backrubber, treat it in the recommended manner, place it where the cattle tend to bunch and the cows will take care of the problem themselves.

Recommended materials for treating backrubbers include 5 percent solutions of DDT, toxaphene or methoxychlor. This should be mixed with diesel fuel, fuel oil or light weight motor oil and applied to the backrubber.

For making the backrubber, all you will need are some old burlap sacks and barbed wire.

This backrubber, if kept treated throughout the year, will go a long way in helping you control lice on your cattle during the winter.

Home Gardening

Not too much planting on the schedule for this month. To keep that earlier planted crop producing you will have to harvest regularly and completely.

Here are some July gardening jobs—save a supply of dry peas and beans for winter use; keep grass and weeds; shade tomatoes; water the garden as needed; keep insects under control.

Some vegetables that can be planted this month, depending on weather conditions, are pole snap beans, bush lima beans, corn, field peas, okra and tomato plants.

Correct Planting of Seed Trees will Present Erosion

As landowners we would be unhappy if someone came along and dug big holes in our land, scooped our topsoil off, and left with it. Yet, we pay little attention when a gulley gets wider and wider because we cut and burn the trees whose litter and roots were breaking the force of water striking the soil. Nature will smooth over the damage we have allowed if given just a little help by replacing, in part, the ground cover.

If someone came along and pumped our well dry without permission he would be given the severest criticism. Shouldn't we criticize ourselves for letting all the water get away before it has a chance to soak in? Besides all this, trees can grow money. Cullie only grow bigger and cost us money.

You would quickly notice what neglect, decay, and abuse do to a building, but have you noticed what they do to the woods? Many of our wooded acres, once the very finest, have been reduced by fire and thoughtless cutting to where they are really a dead load on the owner.

In the woods today we are often faced with the leftovers of former timber cuttings. Often these are only a few seed trees plus a lot of cull trees that cannot be sold. This situation can be improved. The axe and some chemicals are available to take care of trees we cannot sell and do not want. The cost of getting rid of these unwanted trees is not great; the results are very profitable. Seed trees, given a chance will do wonders towards correcting past mistakes. We can help them by keeping fire out of the woods, by eliminating the trees that compete with them and by treating, as a crop, the good trees that grow back. In some cases ASC assistance can be granted for releasing young pines by cutting, girdling, and deadening undesirable hardwoods.

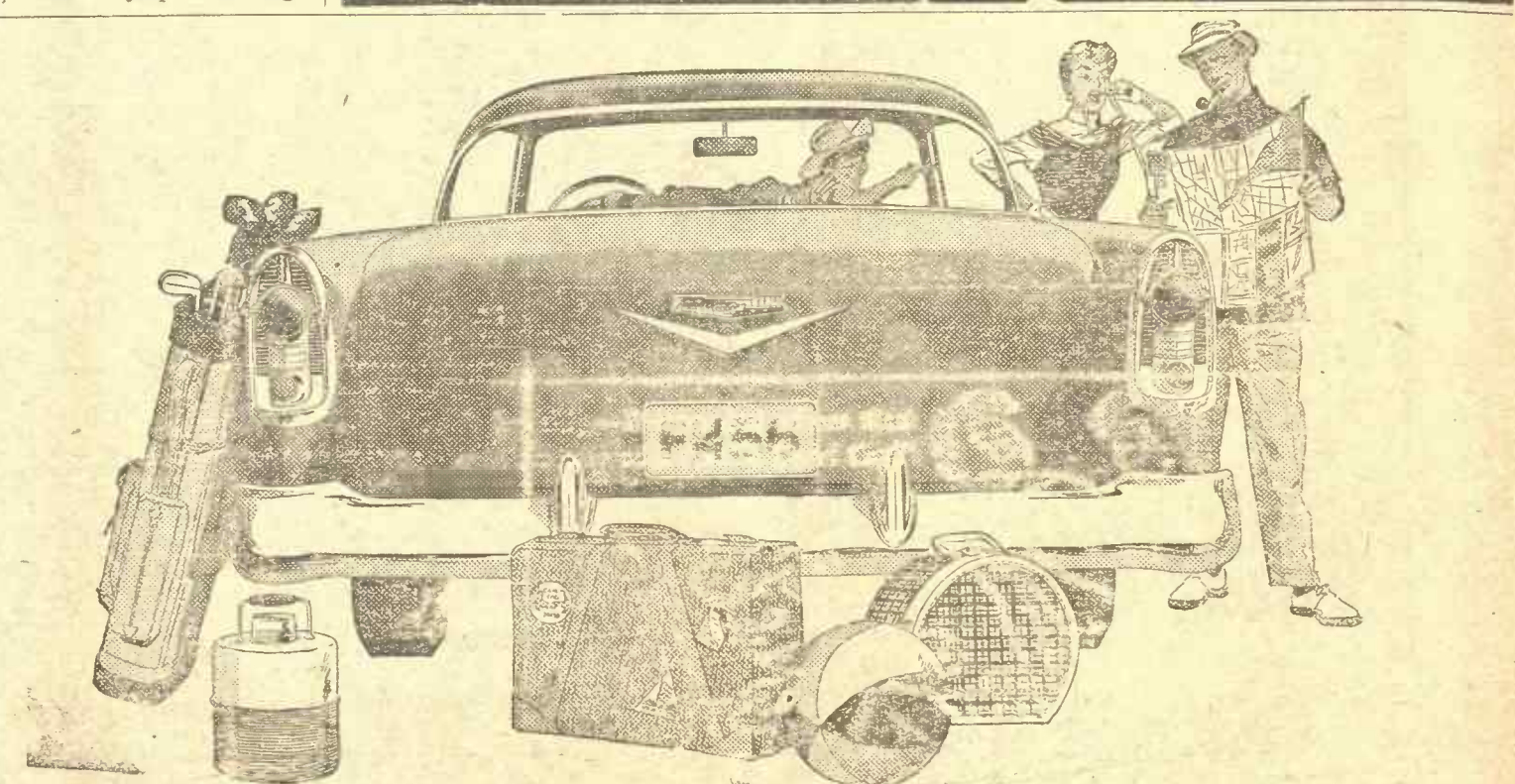

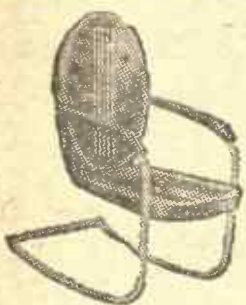

**Second Session Of
 84th Congress
 Soon To Adjourn**

By Congressman Tom Abernethy
 The second session of the 84th Congress is rocking toward ad-

journalment. Its record during the early months was unimpressive. Administration leaders, taking a cue from Harry Truman, grumbled that it was a "do-nothing" Congress. On the record as of that time, the unenviable label was very well placed.

Eventually there was a quick change. Bills began pouring from committees where the real work of Congress is actually done.

Sessions of late have grown longer and rare Saturday sessions have come on the scene. For the first time in years, departmental appropriation bills were passed and placed on the President's desk before the beginning of the fiscal year.

The President has received approval of a large part of his program. Of course, he had to take it with a Democratic tinge from a Democratic controlled Congress.

In most instances he received better numerical support from Democrats than from Republicans. This is understandable because most of his program was a mere extension and amplification of programs of previous Democratic administrations. Except for the Benson Farm Bill, he has not advocated any marked changes.

The last three weeks, usually disorderly, will see a hodgepodge of bills, many bad and some questionable, sliding through under suspension of the rules - indeed, a dangerous method of legislating. Also, politics invariably becomes the order of the day. Party leaders and Congressmen in general, both Democrat and Republican, will yell their heads off about such silly things as so-called civil rights, something they neither believe in nor practice. Eyes will be

on minority voters and November elections. The Nation's majority has some civil rights, too, but they will be ignored because the majority never seems to present an organized demand.

Many witty intellectuals have passed through the Halls of Congress. Like pictures on the wall, they have left some undying sound philosophy hanging over the cloakrooms. For instance, many years ago when a session of Congress had reached its closing weeks and found itself in a hubbub of shouting, confusion and politics, an old-time Southern Member barged into a smoke filled cloakroom, flopped into a deep chair and quipped, "The last thirty days of Congress ought to be abolished." For the good of the country, it might very well be.

May I take advantage of this

opportunity to say that I feel highly honored and am deeply grateful that you have returned me for another term without opposition. It is indeed a privilege to represent the largest and most progressive
