

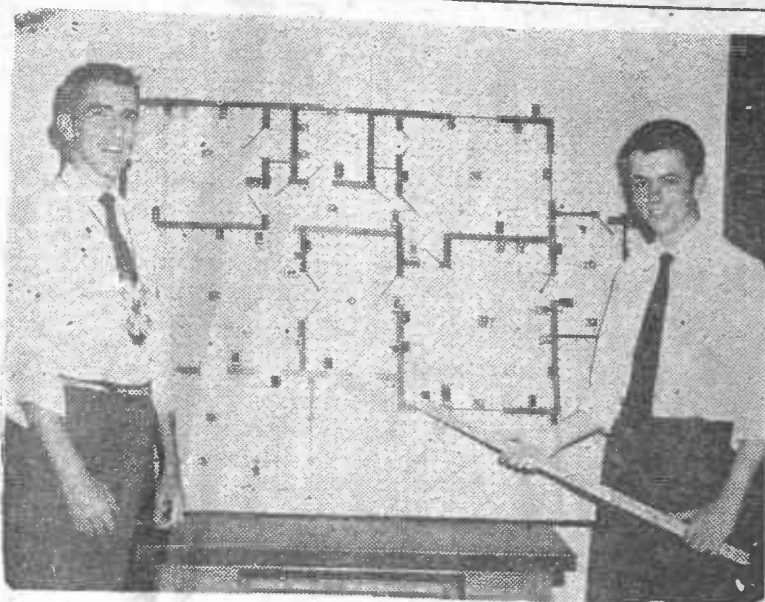

COTTON INSECT REPORT

Twenty-seven fields of cotton examined showed no weevil damage ranging from 0 to 56%, this average being 19%. Boll worm damage was also noted in 21 of the 27 fields examined.

A new hatch out of weevils is due this week. If an infestation of weevils or boll worm is to be controlled, insecticides must be applied every three or four days for three applications, states W. C. Milton, County Agent.

New Bus Line Now Serving County

A new bus service was recently instituted through this county. The name of the firm operating the buses is the Missala Stages and origination and termination points are Birmingham and Memphis with three buses daily going both north and south. Buses from Birmingham come through Red Bay, Golden, Belmont, Tishomingo, to Iuka. The scheduled run to Birmingham from Memphis is in the reverse order. Northbound buses leave Golden at 9:05, Belmont at 9:08, Tishomingo at 9:20, and arrive in Iuka at 9:40 a.m.

Persons wishing to go by bus to Belmont may leave Iuka at 11:05 a.m., and arrive in Tishomingo at 11:25 and Belmont at 11:37. By leaving Iuka at 11:05 a.m. they can arrive in Birmingham at 2:55 p.m. Other buses leave Iuka southbound at 3:05 and 8:20 p.m.

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5 Additional Streets To Get Paving At Completion Of Present Program

Project Not Included In Existing Street Paving Effort

A resolution, appearing for the first time in this issue of The Vidette, declares the intention of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Iuka to pave additional streets that will not come under the bond issue project now in process.

The additional streets are South Main street from Indian Creek bridge to the north line of Yow street; Yow street from intersec-

tion with the south line of South Main street to south corporate limits of Iuka; Fulton street south from existing pavement on Meigs to south end of dedicated street; Pleasant Hill Road from the south line of Yow street 200 feet south; and Pike street from the east line of Fulton street to the west line of Aberdeen street.

As is stated in the resolution, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen will meet on Friday, August 10, at 7:30 p.m., to hear objections to the resolution.

Monies to pay for the paving of these streets will be raised by a front foot assessment against the property adjoining the streets.

It is the plan of the engineer to have these streets ready for paving as soon as the present paving program is completed. This week final operations were started on some of the streets in the northwest section of town. Type of paving that is being used is composed of two layers of crushed limestone chips placed on compacted gravel.

Burnsville Charge Quarterly Conf. Sunday, July 29

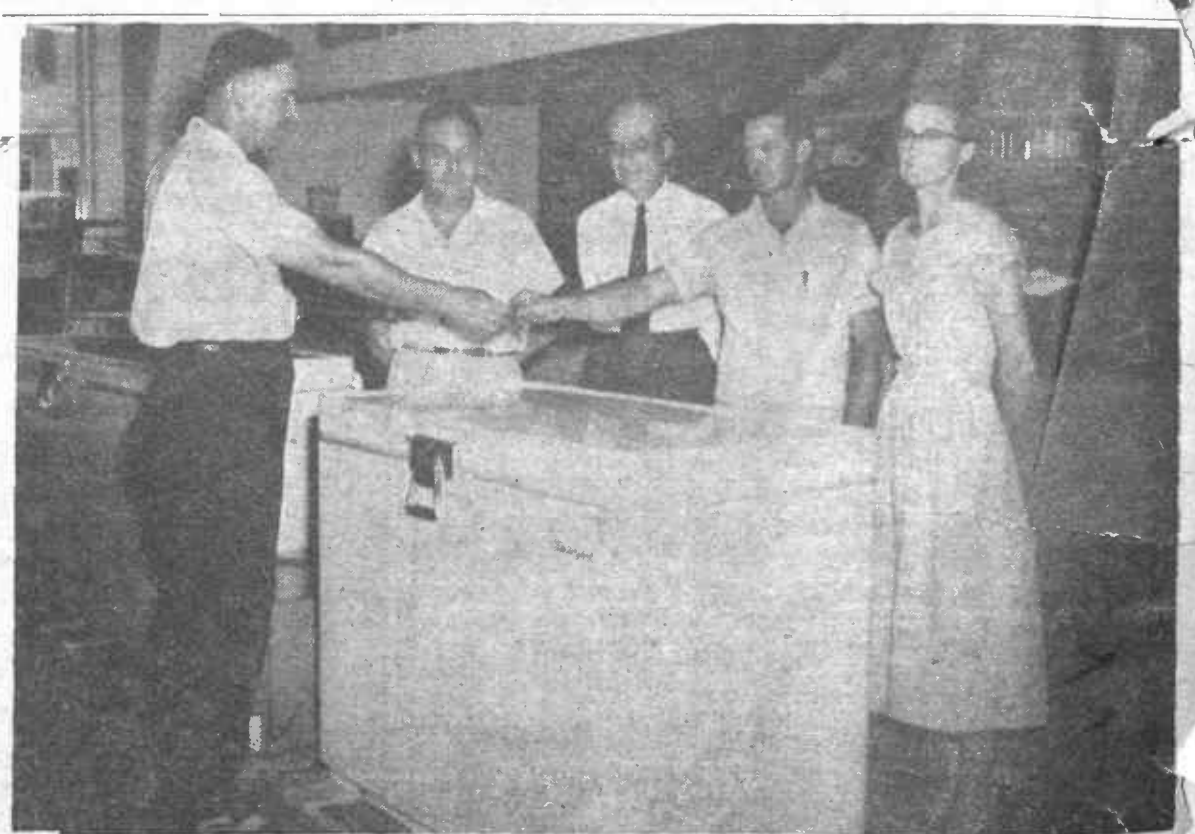

to a year ago. Increased demand
and higher supports for manufac-
tured milk are reflected in higher
prices to farmers. Milk prices should
hold up well the balance of
the year. Cash receipts from dair-
ies are running well above last
year.

A record carry-over of feed
grains is in prospect—10 percent
above last year. With good pros-
pects for production of feed grains
this year another big supply will
be on hand for the 1956-57 feed-
ing year. This could mean lower
cost feed.

Cotton production prospects ap-
pear about normal.
Later it might pay to sell early-har-
vested cotton of best quality, then
put the rest in the loan. Prices
may work down to support levels
or lower soon after harvest begins.

Later in the season, larger ex-
ports under the recently adopted
export program might help im-
prove the price situation later in
the season.

Farm Safety Week
Hope that you've gotten this
far through National Farm Safety
Week without accident. If you
have, then stop a minute and see
if you cannot fix it so that you
can make it the rest of the year
accident free.

During this year's National Farm
Safety Week (this week) July 22-
28, remember that safety pays in
all ways.
Highway safety, livestock safety,
insect poisoning safety, tractor safety,
barn safety and home safety
all should be observed carefully.

On the road, observe all safety
regulations. Do not speed. When
poisoning for insect control, al-
ways read the label on material
and note warnings and precautions.
Keep the insecticides out of reach

of children. Never smoke while
spraying or dusting. Avoid if pos-
sible spraying sprays or dusts on
your skin or clothing. If you do
spill some, remove clothing im-
mediately and wash thoroughly.
Cover feed and water containers
when applying insecticides around
livestock areas.

Keep bulls under strong fence
and keep children out of the areas
where livestock are penned. Make
sure that you store gasoline and
other fuels in safe places. Check
wiring systems: avoid over load-
ing.

Make a list of the accident haz-
ards you can remove from your
farm and home. Post this list and
the next and the next and the next.
Make this week a safe one, and
refer to it regularly.

A RESOLUTION

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen took up for discussion the matter of providing for the improvement of certain public streets within the Town, as heretofore petitioned for by the owners of property abutting thereon. Following a discussion of the subject, Alderman W. F. Dugger offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING NECESSARY CERTAIN PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS ON SPECIFIED STREETS IN THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, APPROVING PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR SAID PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS, AND FIXING A DATE FOR A HEARING OF OBJECTIONS TO SAID PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That, proceeding under the authority of Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950, and in response to petitions heretofore filed with the Town Clerk, it is hereby declared necessary that the public streets hereinafter designated be paved and improved in accordance with plans and specifications therefor now on file in the office of the Town Clerk, setting forth in de-

tail the work to be done and the type of materials to be used, reference to which plans and specifications is hereby expressly made in aid of and as a part of this resolution, and with like effect as if they were spread at length herein. The improvements to be made, more particularly revealed by the said plans and specifications, are substantially the grading, draining, and paving, and work incidental thereto, on the following public streets or parts of public streets in said Town, to-wit:

PROJECT NO. 1: South Main Street from Indian Creek Bridge to the north line of Yow Street.

PROJECT NO. 2: Yow Street from intersection with the south line of South Main Street to south corporate limits of Iuka.

PROJECT NO. 3: Fulton Street south from existing pavement on Meiggs to south end of dedicated street.

PROJECT NO. 4: Pleasant Hill Road from the south line of Yow Street 200 feet south.

PROJECT NO. 5: Pike Street from the east line of Fulton Street to the West line of Aberdeen Street.

All as shown on plans and specification heretofore prepared by the Engineer for said Town and now on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

SECTION 2. That the aforesaid plans and specifications heretofore prepared by Robert A. Scott, En-

gineer for said Town, and now on file in the office of the Town Clerk, covering the proposed improvements referred to in Section 1 of this resolution, shall be and the same are hereby adopted and approved as and for the plans and specifications for the construction of the aforesaid improvements.

SECTION 3. That the grades upon which the said improvements are to be constructed and the materials with which the manner in which the said improvements are to be constructed shall be those set forth and contained in the aforesaid plans and specifications.

SECTION 4. That the cost of making the aforesaid improvements requires an unusual outlay of expense for which the General Improvement Fund of the Town of Iuka is not sufficient and for which purpose the said Fund should not be used. Therefore, the entire expense and cost of the aforesaid improvements shall be assessed against the property upon which the said improvements abut, in accordance with and in proportion to the entire frontage thereof, and shall be paid by the owners of such abutting property, all as provided by Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950. In computing such costs, each street or portion of street involved shall be considered separately and as a separate project.

SECTION 5. That the cost to be

so assessed—must each of the respective lots abutting on streets, or parts of streets to be so improved is less than the benefits which will accrue to each of said lots, respectively.

SECTION 6. That the proportionate share of the cost to be assessed against the abutting property and to be paid by the owners thereof may be paid in either of the methods provided for by said Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950.

SECTION 7. That the Town of Iuka proposes to issue its Special Street Improvement Note under the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950, and from the proceeds of the same to pay the total cost of the aforesaid improvements as such costs are hereafter determined in the manner provided by law. The full faith, credit, and resources of the Town of Iuka shall be pledged to the payment of the principal of and the interest on said note, and there shall annually be levied a tax upon all taxable property in said Town sufficient for said purpose, and the special assessments to be levied against the property abutting on the said improvements shall also be pledged to the payment of said note. The said note shall mature within ten (10) years from the date thereof, as provided by law.

SECTION 8. That a meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi,

shall be held at the Town Hall in said Town at 7:30 o'clock p.m., on Friday, the 10th day of August, 1956, for the purpose of hearing any objections or remonstrances that may be made to the aforesaid improvements. At said meeting, or at a time and place to which the same may be adjourned, any person aggrieved may appear in person, by attorney, or by petition, and may object to or protest against the said improvements or any part thereof. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen shall consider the objections and protests, if any, and confirm, amend, modify, or rescind this resolution, and shall determine whether the said improvements shall be made and how the cost thereof shall be paid.

SECTION 9. That all proceedings herein had and hereafter to be had in connection with the aforesaid improvements shall be had in accordance with the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950.

SECTION 10. That the Town Clerk of the Town of Iuka be and the said Clerk is hereby directed to give notice of the declared intention of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town to make the aforesaid improvements, which notice shall be given by publishing this resolution in its entirety for three (3) successive publications in The Vidette, a newspaper published and having general circulation in the Town of Iuka and being qualified to publish legal notices,

the first publication to made not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date specified in Section 8 hereof.

SECTION 11. That this resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.

Remove hazards and avoid risk to reduce accidents in farm work. A few safety reminders around the home are:

1. Use a ladder - don't climb on chairs.
2. Use frequently used utensils on lower cupboard shelves where they can be reached easily.
3. Do not pour water into the steam iron when it is hot.
4. Place electrical equipment where it cannot be readily reached from the tub or lavatory.
5. Avoid scatter rugs on slippery floors.
6. Make certain that children's electrical toys have underwriter's seal of approval.
7. Never stand on top of a step ladder.

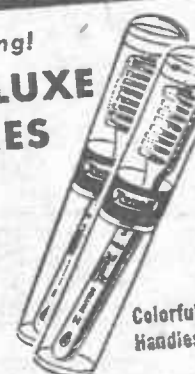

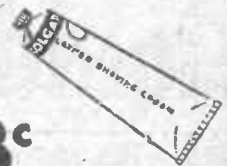

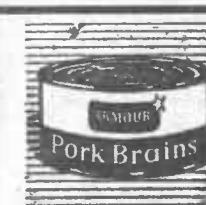
