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Contract Let For
Paving Grounds
At Shoe Plant

The Tishomingo County Board
of Supervisors last Friday morn-
ing opened sealed bids and let
the contract for paving of the
grounds surrounding the Tisho-
mingo Shoe Co. Plant at Iuka.
Low bidder for the job was
Bowyer & Johnson Construction
Co. with \$5,996.00. Only three bids
were received, the highest one be-
ing \$8,968.00 by Oxford Asphalt
Co. The other bid was by Worsham
Bros. of Corinth, it being \$6,188.00.
Bowyer & Johnson is the concern
that has done most of the paving
in this area for the past few
years. They are at present engag-
ed in a paving project on the
streets of Iuka, having just recent-
ly completed the grading, drain-
age, and paving of the Southern
Railway underpass for highway
25. They also, in the past 2 years,
paved the streets in Belmont and
Tishomingo.
Work on the shoe plant paving
project is expected to start as
soon as gravel for grading pur-
poses is put there by Supervisors
of the first three districts which
went together and floated the
bond issue that was responsible
for the plant being located in Iuka.
There will be 12,000 square
yards of surface that will receive
a double bituminous paving treat-
ment.

Birth Certificates
Demanded Before
School Entry

All parents who are sending
children to school the first time
are warned that they will need
to present birth certificates of the
children to school authorities.
Parents who have plain photo-
stats of birth certificates need not
apply for certified copies especia-
lly if the small photostat shows a
registers file number. However,
some schools may demand certified
copies which will cost one dollar.
Also if certified copies are needed,
requests should be made at once
to the Tishomingo County Health
Office in order to avoid a rush
when that time comes for the
child to enter school.

COSTS UP \$25,000 FOR TISHOMINGO MOTORISTS

\$8.60 a year, on the average, finds
the Chamber of Commerce. The
bulk of this will come from the
added Federal tax of one cent per
gallon of gas. Other levies, such
as the 60 percent increase in tire
taxes, will make up the rest.
The auto owner's burden may
be enlarged still further at a later
time as State and local govern-
ments get into the act. They will
have added costs, too, due to the
highway development, which will
be passed on to the motorists.
Truckers will also help pay for
the new roads. In addition to the
gas levy, they will be paying more
for equipment, including tires, as
well as a new tax on trucks weigh-
ing over 26,000 pounds.
The car owners of Tishomingo
County have been spending a total
of \$2,560,000 a year, prior to the
increases, in maintenance and
operation charges, on the basis
of a study made by the American
Automobile Association. Of this
sum, \$493,000 went to the local
gas stations.
There is, however, a buch
brighter side to the picture. The
huge road program will ultimately
give the driver some relief from
traffic jams around cities and on
highways. Farm-to-market roads
will boost business. Driving time
will be reduced considerably. There
will be less of the exasperating
stop-start creeping, with a result-
ant saving in operating costs.
In dollars and cents this should
mean a saving of one cent a mile,
according to the Bureau of Public
Roads. With drivers averaging
9,400 miles a year, this would be
a cut of \$94 per car.

Results Of Winter Grazing Tests In Brown Loam Area

State College, Miss.—Three of five winter combinations proved Branch Experiment Station at Oakley in last year's study of crops adaptable for winter pastures in the state. Superintendent John B. Gill and Agronomist R. E. Coats have reported the following results.

Best returns were obtained from ryegrass and crimson clover. This combination netted \$31.45 per steer, or \$39.31 per acre planted. A combination of Atlas 66 wheat and crimson clover was second with \$27.77 per steer or \$39.40 per acre. Oats and crimson clover returned \$27.01 per steer, or \$31.51 per acre, above costs.

Two combinations involving fescue and wild winter peas were unprofitable. Wheat, ryegrass and wild winter peas grown together resulted in a loss of \$1.59 per steer and the same amount per acre as this combination carried only one steer per acre. Fescue and wild winter peas tested as a winter grazing combination resulted in a loss of \$19.17 per steer or \$15.99 per acre.

Over a three-year average ryegrass and crimson clover have produced 350 pounds of beef per acre, wheat and crimson clover 340 pounds, oats and crimson clover 306 pounds, wheat, ryegrass and wild winter peas 279 pounds, and fescue and wild winter peas 131 pounds. All the combinations ex-

cept the latter one have averaged a good return per acre when all three years results are considered. Sod seeding of wheat has been satisfactory two out of three years. In the fall of 1955 weather was not favorable for getting a stand and seeding was delayed until mid-October because of competition from summer grasses. The resulting short season reduced from this crop.

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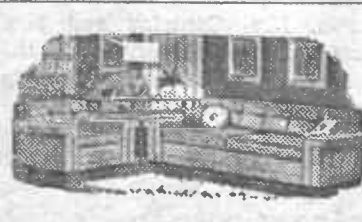

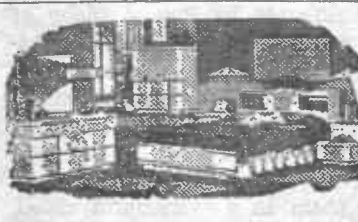

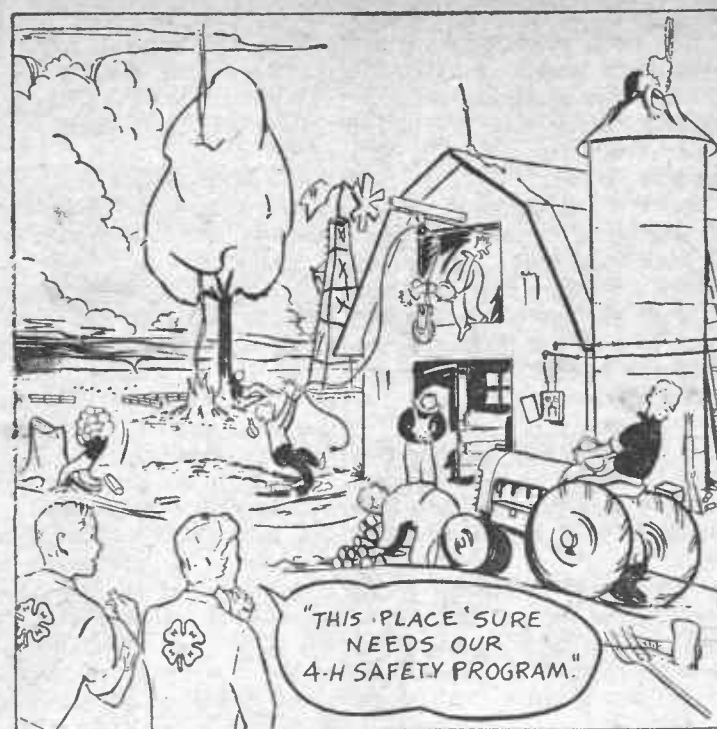

600,000 4-H'ers Hunt Hazards



SAFETY is an important crop that's being harvested on the farms and in the homes of 600,000 4-H Club members taking part in the 1956 National 4-H Safety Program.

Through 4-H projects and activities, club members in all 48 states are correcting hazards which are responsible for an annual toll of 14,000 lives and 1,200,000 serious injuries among farm residents, and an economic loss estimated to be a billion-and-a-half dollars.

4-Hers conduct surveys to locate hazards, and then correct unsafe conditions. They present demonstrations on a wide variety of topics pertaining to farm, home and highway safety, and members give talks over radio and television and before group meetings. In addition, club members build booths and displays for exhibiting at fairs and in store windows.

Realizing that motor vehicle accidents are responsible for

over 40 percent of all accidental deaths among farm people, 4-Hers are increasing their participation in motor vehicle safety.

In recognition of the outstanding safety work done by 4-H members, General Motors is again providing incentives in the 1956 National 4-H Safety Award Program. Included in the awards offered are four gold-filled medals for winners in each county; an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for the state winner; and \$300 college scholarship for the eight national winners. A Look Ahead In

Conservation

Farming

Twenty years ago much more of the land in Tishomingo County was being used for cultivated crops than is being row-cropped today. Gradually erosion took its toll, and once productive hillsides became gully scarred and unfit for growing cotton and corn. These acres were left idle and pine trees came up on the land to start again nature's program of soil building.

Today farmers know this steep land should never have been cleared. It was too steep to cultivate in cotton and corn. Today farmers also know that pine trees are a good money crop and that a pine forest, protected from fire, is an excellent reservoir for storing ground-

water. This ground-water is needed to keep our cultivated crops and pastures growing and our springs and small streams flowing.

Our back-sight tells us what has taken place; now let us visualize our future landscape under the ownership of Soil Conservation District Co-operators.

Already industry is moving into Tishomingo County, giving employment for our people, proper land-use would be very near an impossibility. Most of the people would

have to get their living from the soil and of necessity would have to misuse the land by continued use of steep hillsides for row crops.

There is every reason to believe that more industry will move into Tishomingo County or be located close enough to give employment to more of its citizens. As this occurs, there will be less and less need for landowners to misuse their land. With some member of the farm family working in a factory, the other members will need to cultivate only that part of their land suited for cultivation. They can follow in detail, the land-use plan worked out for their farm. This land-use plan will be based on a carefully prepared soil map showing the capabilities of the soil on each landowner's farm.

As a result of a balanced industry with agriculture, the dreams of the Soil Conservation District Commissioners and the local Soil Conservation service technician can come true. It does not mean that all the land, every acre of it, will receive the treatment it needs to conserve the soil and

water because every landowner will not be conservation minded. Balancing industry with agriculture can only give those landowners who are conservation-minded the opportunity to do the things they have always wanted to do for their land.

The practice of good land-use will spread from farm to farm as any sound agricultural practice does. The results will be steep hills covered in long bodied pines, over-flow bottom lands clothed in excellent hardwood, rolling fields green in permanent sod, and productive gentle slopes and level land producing high yields of cultivated crops. Our springs and small streams will flow with cool water again, wild life will return to the woods and registered livestock will graze on lucious pastures. This is conservation's forward look.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION TO STUDY PETITION OF TELEPHONE COMPANY FOR INCREASED RATES

The Mississippi Public Service Commission is very much concerned about the provision of the Public Utilities Act of 1956, which enables a utility to place increased rates into effect by posting bond. The Commission feels that the utility should not be able to collect the higher rates until after the Commission has ruled on the matter.

The Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company filed with the Commission on June 26, a petition asking for increased rates that, according to the company would bring them additional revenues of two and one-half million dollars per year. The Company stated these increased revenues were needed to meet increased costs of wages and materials. On July 20, the Commission suspended the increased rates, and stated that "the Commission is not convinced that the proposed rates and charges are just and reasonable and non-discriminatory or otherwise lawful."

In suspending the proposed rates the Commission further ordered a "full and complete investigation of the proposed rates and charges." The Commission further ordered that in the event the telephone company proposed to file a bond with the Commission that the bond be in the amount of two and one-half million dollars, made by a surety authorized to do business in the State of Mississippi.

On July 23rd, the company filed the two and one-half million

dollar bond, and notified the Commission of its intention to commence collecting the increased rates on July 26.

Under the provisions of the Public Utility Act of 1956, the Commission is without power to prevent the collecting of the increased rates. The Commission is entering into a full and complete investigation of the phone company's Mississippi operations, as well as its connections with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The Commission does not feel that the telephone company's finances are in such a critical state of affairs that it would impair their financial integrity to wait until the Commission has ruled on the petition. It is their opinion that no utility should be able to increase its rates until after a full hearing and a ruling by the Commission. However, the law is clear beyond a doubt that the utility has this right whether or not the Commission agrees.

Rubel L. Phillips, of Corinth, Chairman of the Commission, stated that "we want the public to know that a full and complete investigation of the telephone company, including its rate structure and standards of service will be made. We intend to employ whatever technical assistance is necessary to make this investigation complete. During the course of this investigation the Company is permitted by law to collect the increased rates. This provision

was adopted over the strenuous objection of the Commission. However, upon a final adjudication of this matter, if the petition of the telephone company is denied, each telephone subscriber will be refunded his portion of the increased rate with lawful interest.

"The Commission is aware of its tremendous responsibility in protecting the interest of the public, while, at the same time operating within the limits of the law and the Constitution which guarantees to each public utility a reasonable rate for the service rendered. We do not propose to pass judgment on any case until all of the evidence has been heard and properly evaluated. For this reason, we feel that the utility should not be able to collect the increased rate until after the case has been heard. Only after a full and complete hearing, and proper evaluation of all the evidence presented in the matter, will the Commission be able to render its decision."

Turkey in August

Yes, we think of turkey as the Dish for the Thanksgiving and Christmas season but stop now and think of it in August. A platter of cold sliced turkey, a turkey sandwich, turkey salad with crisp lettuce and sliced tomatoes.

Watch your grocery store for special buys of turkey during August. Turkey and broilers and fryers are at the top of the August plentiful foods list. If turkey doesn't suit your taste for August eating, maybe it will be economical to buy your Thanksgiving turkey now and store it in the freezer . . . but don't forget broiler, barbecued and fried chicken for good summertime eating.

Other August plentiful foods to be the look-out for at the grocery are beef, milk and other dairy products, fresh plums, Bartlett pears from the big California crop, fresh and processed lemons, a variety of fresh vegetables, peanut butter and rice.

Poultry Pies

Beginning September 1, all frozen or canned chicken or turkey pies carrying the Federal inspection

mark will include 14 percent which is equal to 25 percent deboned raw meat, according to a new requirement announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This poultry meat is in addition to any broth, fat, giblets or skin that may be used.

The new requirement applies only to those processors who operate under the voluntary Federal Poultry Inspection Service. About 80 to 85 percent of chicken and turkey pies sold in interstate commerce are covered by the Department's inspection Service.

Packing Tip

As you pack your bag for that long awaited vacation, here's a tip that may save you time and help you keep your clothing wrinkle free.

Cut pieces of cardboard to fit your suitcase and put them between the layers as you pack. Then, when you're ready to unpack, you can lift out a layer without rearranging the entire suitcase.

Grease Stains and Special Finishes

Removing greasy stains successfully from washable fabrics with special finishes calls for extra time and care. Tests with cottons, rayons and linens finished with crease resistance, crispness and sheen or decorative effects show that greasy spots are more stubborn than on unfinished fabric.

One way to remove the grease spot is to work soap or liquid dishwashing detergent thoroughly into the stain, and then rinse it out with hot water. Repeat this treatment if necessary before the garment goes into the regular wash.

Another way is to sponge the spot well with ordinary cleaning fluid and let the fluid evaporate before laundering. This treatment also may need repeating.

If the fluid leaves a ring, work detergent into the fabric before putting into the regular wash.

Precaution: Fumes of the usual cleaning fluids are toxic, so be sure you have plenty of ventilation when using them. Also check the label for flammability.

County Agent news

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Fruit Trees

It is time to treat peach trees

for peach tree borer control using the DDT method.

With this method, make three treatments, one around the first of August, then the first of September and finally the first of October.

The DDT method is simple and inexpensive, yet it does the job when applied correctly and at the proper time.

Mix one pound of 50 percent wettable DDT to 12 gallons of water. Spray trunk and lower parts of large limbs, wetting thoroughly so that some of the solution will run off around the ground.

Silage Harvesting

Much of the early planted silage will be ready to harvest in August. It is ready to harvest when the seed is in the dough stage. If harvested at this period, it is not as apt to blow down as when left to get completely ripe. Most of the corn planted early will be ready to put up for silage during first half of August. When the grain is well dented, just past roasting ear stage, it is time to put up for silage. This is before the stalk and fodder has dried out.

Sudan And Millet

Clip all old areas of Sudan and millet that have been grazed down to get the part the cows left because it was not palatable. These areas can be clipped and if enough moisture is there, they will give more growth. Late planted Sudan or millet that has been grazed down should be given another application of nitrogen if moisture is plentiful.

The Volume And Value Of Timber

Forest Supervisor E. R. De Silva, announced that the volume and value of timber cut from the Mississippi National Forests in fiscal year 1956 shattered all previous records established since the National Forest was created in 1936. De Silva stated that a total of 112,865,000 board feet of timber valued at \$1,796,475 was cut during the 12-months period ending June 30, 1956. The cutting of this timber involved 1,456 separate transactions and included timber products such as sawlogs pulpwood, poles, stumpwood, crossties, and posts. All standing timber was by experienced timber markers under the direct supervision of professional foresters. The timber volume on the Mississippi National Forests is building up steadily under intensive management, and the annual cuts will continue to increase.

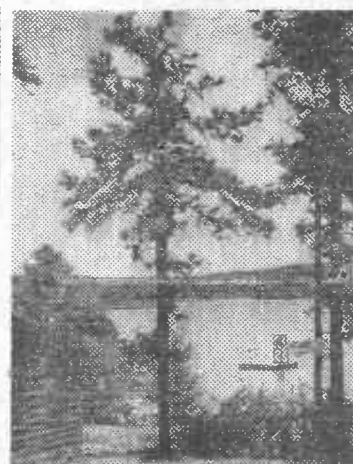

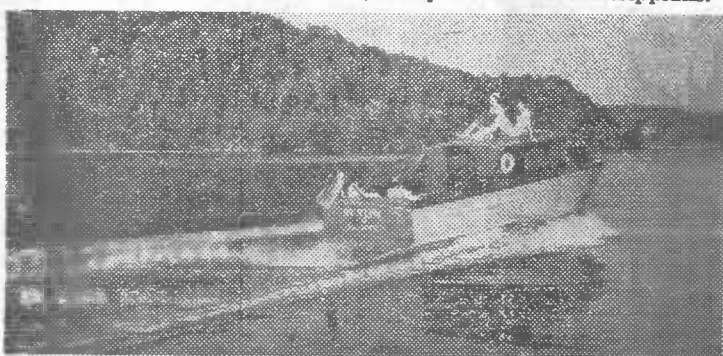

A RESOLUTION

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen took up for discussion the matter of providing for the improvement of certain public streets within the Town, as heretofore petitioned for by the owners of property abutting thereon. Following a discussion of the subject, Alderman W. F. Dugger offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING NECESSARY CERTAIN PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS ON SPECIFIED STREETS IN THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, APPROVING PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR SAID PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS, AND FIXING A DATE FOR A HEARING OF OBJECTIONS TO SAID PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That, proceeding under the authority of Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950, and in response to petitions heretofore filed with the Town Clerk, it is hereby declared necessary that the public streets hereinafter designated be paved and improved in accordance with plans and specifications therefor now on file in the office of the Town Clerk, setting forth in detail the work to be done and the type of materials to be used, reference to which plans and specifications is hereby expressly made in aid of and as a part of this resolution, and with like effect as if they were spread at length herein. The improvements to be made, more particularly revealed by the said plans and specifications, are substantially the grading, draining, and paving, and work incidental thereto, on the following public streets or parts of public streets in said Town, to-wit:

PROJECT NO. 1: South Main Street from Indian Creek Bridge to the north line of Yow Street.

PROJECT NO. 2: Yow Street from intersection with the south line of South Main Street to south corporate limits of Iuka.

PROJECT NO. 3: Fulton Street south from existing pavement on Meiggs to south end of dedicated street.

PROJECT NO. 4: Pleasant Hill Road from the south line of Yow Street 200 feet south.

PROJECT NO. 5: Pike Street from the east line of Fulton street to the West line of Aberdeen street.

All as shown on plans and specification heretofore prepared by the Engineer for said Town and now on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

SECTION 2. That the aforesaid plans and specifications heretofore prepared by Robert A. Scott, Engineer for said Town, and now on

file in the office of the Town Clerk, covering the proposed improvements referred to in Section 1 of this resolution, shall be and the same are hereby adopted and approved as and for the plans and specifications for the construction of the aforesaid improvements.

SECTION 3. That the grades upon which the said improvements are to be constructed and the materials with which the manner in which the said improvements are to be constructed shall be those set forth and contained in the aforesaid plans and specifications.

SECTION 4. That the cost of making the aforesaid improvements requires an unusual outlay of expense for which the General Improvement Fund of the Town of Iuka is not sufficient and for which purpose the said Fund should not be used. Therefore, the entire expense and cost of the aforesaid improvements shall be assessed against the property upon which the said improvements abut, in accordance with and in proportion to the entire frontage thereof, and shall be paid by the owners of such abutting property, all as provided by Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950. In computing such costs, each street or portion of street involved shall be considered separately and as a separate project.

SECTION 5. That the cost to be so assessed against each of the respective lots abutting on streets or parts of streets to be so improved is less than the benefits which will accrue to each of said lots, respectively.

SECTION 6. That the proportionate share of the cost to be assessed against the abutting property and to be paid by the owners thereof may be paid in either of the methods provided for by said Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950.

SECTION 7. That the Town of Iuka proposes to issue its Special Street Improvement Note under the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950, and from the proceeds of the same to pay the total cost of the aforesaid improvements as such costs are hereafter determined in the manner provided by law. The full faith, credit, and resources of the Town of Iuka shall be pledged to the payment of the principal of and the interest on said note, and there shall annually be levied a tax upon all taxable property in said Town sufficient for said purpose, and the special assessments to be levied against the property abutting on the said improvements shall also be pledged to the payment of said note. The said note shall mature within ten (10) years from the date thereof, as provided by law.

SECTION 8. That a meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, shall be held at the Town Hall in said Town at 7:30 o'clock p.m., on Friday, the 10th day of August, 1956, for the purpose of hearing any objections or remonstrances that may be made to the aforesaid improvements. At said meeting, or at a time and place to which the same may be adjourned, any person aggrieved may appear in person, by attorney, or by petition, and may object to or protest against the said improvements or any part thereof. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen shall consider the objections and protests, if any, and confirm, amend, modify, or rescind this resolution, and shall determine whether the said improvements shall be made and how the cost thereof shall be paid.

SECTION 9. That all proceedings herein had and hereafter to be had in connection with the aforesaid improvements shall be had in accordance with the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950.

SECTION 10. That the Town Clerk of the Town of Iuka be and the said Clerk is hereby directed to give notice of the declared intention of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town to make the aforesaid improvements, which notice shall be given by publishing this resolution in its entirety for three (3) successive publications in The Vidette, a newspaper published and having general circulation in the Town of Iuka and being qualified to publish legal notices, the first publication to made not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date specified in Section 8 hereof.

SECTION 11. That this resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.
