CAL UPHEAVAL—Those who have long desired a realignment of the two major political parties may see this movement get the creeping stage before it reaches reality. It may be brought to a head by the naturalization of politics in the two parties or it may be forced by impatient electors not pledged to party—but it will surely come.

Now what the people need is a political scene. However, the promise of outright eruption is the time the political convention is over. What the outcome will be, no one can foretell.

One thing we can be quite sure of—the South will be the focus of political attacks and the attention. This is true because the South could hold, if it is the balance of political power in the next election, and it is done in the South could do much to do with determining political attitude and the fate of both parties.

It now stands, there seems considerable uncertainty in the ranks of the political parties of both parties as to whether to read the South into the party or read the South into the party. They are being whipped by factions from within the party from all sections of the country—all of which clearly up the need for realignment.

Traditionally, the "Solid South" has been within the Democratic fold, but in the 1952 election the total Democratic vote in seven states of the old Confederacy was only six percent larger than the total Republican vote in the same eleven states—and of them went Republican.

At that election, therefore, the party system was in effect in the South—and it would be expected that both parties would be to the South's desires. This is especially true of the Republican party, which got a larger vote in the South than ever before.

The Republican party sponsored a strong so-called Civil Rights measure in Congress which passed directly at the South which was nothing more nor a further infringement upon the rights of the states to govern their internal affairs, a fundamental principle upon which our government was founded and to the South has adhered most throughout the years. It is claimed they were trying to drive the Negro vote away from the Democratic party—where it has been for the past quarter-century of their program.

At the same time, top officials of the labor unions—which endorsed the Democratic platform in 1952—are particularly anxious to see the Democratic party also draw up a civil plank that would rid the country of so-called Dixiecrats who are racial segregationists, that drive the Eastlands and are out of the Democratic fold. They have warned that Democrats can't have us and the South, too.

The position taken by labor is being taken by the American Democratic Action and National Association for the Advancement of Colored People—which are aligned with the Democratic party but both of which are definitely anti-South in their program.

New School Busses Go Into Use On County Routes

Three new school busses went into use recently on county routes. They are Ford chassis with Blue Bird school bus bodies on them. Cost of the new busses was approximately \$14,000.00.

One of the new buses will be used on route No. 20 going to Belmont and will be driven by W. W. Deaton. Another one will be used on route No. seven going to Holcut; this bus will be driven by Faye Nixon. Route No. 9, going to Paden on to Tishomingo, will use the other new bus which will be driven by Dexter Loveless.

A fourth new school bus that has not yet arrived will go to the Carter's Branch colored school; it will be driven by William Southward.

There are 42 white school bus routes in the county that cost a total of \$51,137.50 in contracts to operate them; Also 3 colored school bus routes with an expenditure of \$4,200.00 in contracts.

White and colored contracts combined make a total of \$55,437.50 for operation of the school busses in Tishomingo county, plus approximately \$5,000.00 that will be added to this figure for gasoline, oil, tires, and supplies.

**OUR LAND**

The poet has said, "nothing is worth the building unless it builds the man." We can paraphrase this statement by saying that for the landowners "nothing is worth the building unless it builds the land."

For generations southern landowners have worked tirelessly building homes, barns, and fences and they have spent great sums of money for farm machinery, including tractors to cultivate sloping hillland. The chief interest has been in things other than the land itself.

Unless there were gullies on a hillside, farmers have not realized that the land was washing each year, and that sheet erosion was taking away their topsoil.

Decrease in yield is not noticeable on many farms because the operator more than balances this loss of production by applying larger amounts of high analysis fertilizer. Never-the-less the loss in yield is there, and like an internal cancer which for years is not discernable, may in the end kill its victim.

Most landowners who can afford to buy and operate a tractor on their farms are publicly considered progressive farmers. Actually

some of these tractor-owner farmers are progressive, and they do a fine job of caring for their land. Most run their rows up and down the hills which intensifies erosion and which will eventually destroy both the land and the man.

For the farmer, his land is the most important property he owns. It is from this that he and his family will earn their living. The wife's new dress, the daughter's education, a new car for the oldest son to borrow to take his best girl friend for a ride must all come from the land. Destroy the land by permitting it to wash away and poverty in all of its hideousness will be the fate of the owner and his family.

The tractor-farmer who destroys his land by cultivating it up and down hill will find that with the passing of years he will have to cultivate more acres or buy and apply more fertilizer if he is to get the same amount of crops. At the age when he would like to work less and rest more, he must work more and rest less. This does not have to be. Attention to the proper care of our land now will improve it, and with the passing of the years, will bring higher yields at lower cost and less work.

Those of us who are employed by and work for the USDA Soil Conservation Service, through your Soil Conservation District Commissioners, suggest that more emphasis be placed on caring for our land. Let's keep our topsoil, if possible.

In the past, emphasis has been placed on the farm dwelling, barns,

fences, and farm equipment. These are very important, but you and I have seen farm homes become dilapidated because the land failed to support this home. LET OUR MAIN INTEREST BE IN OUR LAND. CARE FOR IT, AND IN TURN, IT WILL SUPPORT ALL THESE OTHERS THINGS. GOOD LAND CAN MAKE A GOOD MAN.

6% Increase In June Business Over Last Year

Iuka reported an increase of 6 per cent in business activity during June as compared with June 1955. Indicator increases were as follows: money orders issued, 3 per cent; postal receipts, 11 per cent; telephones in service, up 7 per cent; and city sales tax collections, no change.

Business activity in the Corinth district rose 6 per cent during June as compared with June 1955, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, publication of the Business Research Station of the school of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College.

District indicators showed the following increases: bank debits, up 6 per cent; money orders issued, 5 per cent; postal receipts, 1 per cent; telephones in service, 7 per cent.

Corinth reported an increase of 7 per cent in business activity during June as compared with June of last year. Indicator increases were as follows: bank debits, up 6 per cent; money orders issued, 10 per cent; postal receipts, 2 per cent; telephones in service, 6 per cent; city sales tax collections, on change.

Business in Booneville rose 6 per cent during June as compared with June of 1955. Indicators showed that telephones in service increased 6 per cent and there was no change in city sales tax collections.

Business activity in Ripley decreased 2 per cent during June

as compared with June 1955. Indicator changes were as follows: money orders issued, down 6 per cent; postal receipts, down 8 per cent; telephones in service, up 14 per cent.

August is being advertised as Sandwich Month. And it is more of a "Sandwich time of year" than others, isn't it? Just fits in with outdoor and picnic eating that are favorites during hot weather and vacation time.

Sandwiches and the plentiful foods that we listed in last week's column go hand-in-hand. Turkey and chicken sandwiches. . . hot or cold, they're naturals for summertime eating.

Lettuce, tomatoes and many other summer vegetables make cool, crisp, tasty sandwiches. And don't forget cheese, butter and other dairy foods, hamburgers, roast beef and the old favorite stand-by — peanut butter.

Remember, for the youngsters long distance hikes and all day picnics, peanut butter is always a "safe" sandwich filling. You can count on it being wholesome, no matter what the temperature or the number of hours it is exposed to the heat of the day.

Frozen Bread for Sandwiches
You will find using frozen bread for sandwiches has several advantages. It helps keep fillings chilled

as the bread itself thaws. Sandwiches made of frozen bread should be wrapped, however. Frozen bread is also more easily covered with spreads than is fresh bread. There is less crumbling and tearing.

After you've made your sandwiches for a picnic, don't pack them in the basket in wet or damp towels. Bacteria go into operation very quickly in such a warm, moist atmosphere. Prepared wrapping are foil, waxed paper or plastic bags to keep the freshness of the bread.

Leftover Sandwiches
Don't discard the sandwiches you have leftover. Why not try brushing them with melted butter and sauteing them to a golden brown on each side. You will find them delicious.

Sandwich Fillings
Barbecued Hamburger

Combine 1 1/4 pounds hamburger, - 1/2 teaspoons salt, 3/8 cup finely chopped onion and 3/4 cup chopped celery; brown in a hot skillet. Add 1 1/2 tablespoons barbecue sauce and 1 1/2 cups chili sauce and simmer for 30 minutes. Cut 6 hamburger buns in half and place 1/3 cup barbecued hamburger in each bun. Makes 6 sandwiches.

Beef Celery

Combine 1/2 cup ground cooked beef, 1/4 cup chopped celery, 2 tablespoons pickle relish and 2 tablespoons mayonnaise or salad dressing. Makes 3/4 cup filling.

Date-Peanut Butter Pinwheel
Combine 1/2 cups chopped, pitted dates, 1/2 cup peanut butter and 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing. Cut 2 thin lengthwise slices

from an unsliced loaf of enriched sandwich bread. Spread 1/2 cup date peanut butter mixture on each slice of bread. Cut each slice into equal halves crosswise and roll up like a jelly roll. Wrap in waxed paper; chill. To serve: unwrap and cut each roll into 6 slices. Makes 24 pinwheel sandwiches. Good Party fare.

Crisp Greens

Wrap lettuce or other salad greens for sandwiches separately so they will be crisp when eaten. Put mayonnaise in a paper cup so the picnicker or luncheon can add both when ready to eat his sandwiches; the mayonnaise won't soak the bread this way.

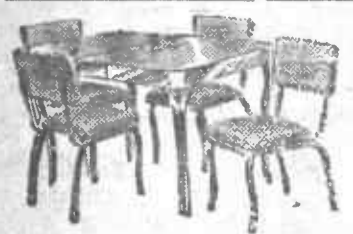

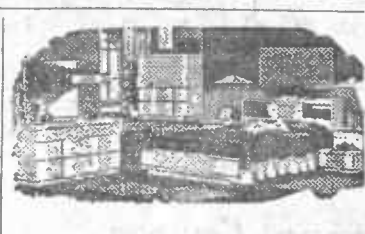
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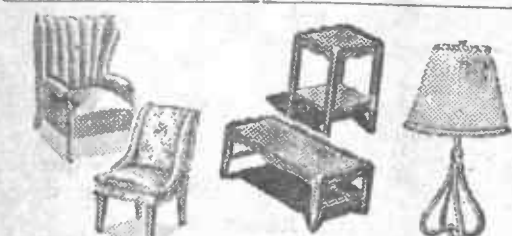

Mississippi Leads Nation In Certified Tree Farms With 910

American Tree Farm System is growing timber as a crop on lands gained nearly 2 million acres during the first half of the century, according to midyear figures announced by C. A. Gillett, director of American Tree Products Industries, the national sponsor.

American Tree Farm acreage in participating states now totals 3,795,743 acres, compared to 3,558,881 acres last Jan. 1 and 3,289,881 acres on July 1, a year ago.

Tree Farm program is an important movement to help private landowners who protect their woodlands from fire, insects, disease and destructive grazing and who are engaged in repeated crops.

With 3,795,743 acres enrolled, the program is second only to Florida with 1,014,444 acres; Alabama, 3,558,881 acres; Oregon, 3,524,931 acres; Texas, 3,289,881 acres; Arkansas, 3,289,881 acres; and Washington, 3,289,881 acres.

Mississippi leads in the number of certified tree farms: 910. Texas has 831, and Alabama has 663.

More states launched the tree farm program during the first half of this year—Vermont, Connecticut and New York. Launching ceremonies in Indiana are being held for this month.

Tree Farming not only provides regular timber harvests and scientific management, but also multiple use of the land," Gillett. "It means water and conservation, cover and food, wildlife, better streams for fishing and ideal watersheds for sports and streams. The humus in the tree farm floor enables the soil to store up water which otherwise would cause erosion, muddy streams and water losses."

He said the tree farm program is now only 15 years old, and is opening the door to new opportunities for private woodland owners

around the country. Farmers and other owners hold 61 per cent of the country's total commercial forest land. The government owns 26 per cent; industries 13 per cent.

"The 4,500,000 small woodlot owners of the country hold, to a great extent, the key to this country's ability to keep timber growth ahead of harvests," said Gillett. "It is indeed encouraging to see that more and more of these landowners are showing an interest in growing trees as a crop."

Mississippi leads the nation with 910 tree farms with 1,855,865 acres.

The warning from the Statistics Division of the Board of Health, which expects to be deluged with applications for certificates as schools again and the parents of the 100,000 beginners realize that state law requires each school to verify age by a birth certificate.

According to the ruling of the health department's office, the small photostatic copy sent to the school soon after the birth of a child is acceptable for school purposes, provided it has the number of the county register and/or state number in the upper right-hand corner.

Parents are urged to hunt up plain photostatic copy now, if they can't find it, or if it isn't the required notation to apply at once for a certified copy of the birth certificate. A certified copy may be secured from the Division of Vital Statistics, State Board of Health, Jackson, for \$1.00.

Delay in applying for a certificate as time for opening of school draws nearer, will mean delay in getting it. For only 300 to 500 copies can be processed at the present staff in the Vital Statistics office, depending upon how long it takes the "searchers" and the original records filed with some 4,000,000 others in the "Search room."

And to fail to furnish adequate data with the application spells delay. Approximately 20 percent of the requests coming to the Vital Statistics office can't be filled because of insufficient or inaccurate information, or because of failure to enclose the fee of \$1.00 required for each certified copy.

When applying for a certified copy of a birth certificate four items must be furnished: (1) name of the child; (2) date of birth; (3) county in which birth occurred; (4) names of parents.

Birth records are filed by years by counties and unless this information is furnished, the original record cannot be located.

And there's a word of warning to citizens who do not have birth certificates and will be needing them within the next few months: Better apply at once, for applications are processed in the order received and soon the school rush will be on.

By September the requests will be piling up by the hundreds, only to be tied in neat bundles each day. Filed away in order of date received, the bundles will be kept in a locked cabinet until the boggled down "searchers" can get to them.

For how long? Well, suppose half of the beginner school children can't find the plain photostatic copy and never have gotten a certified copy. Using the outside estimate of 500 applications processed a day it would take 100 days to take care of the beginner school children alone. One hundred days or three months.

282 Persons Killed In Mississippi Automobile Accidents During 1956

Bill Signed By President Extends WW II GI Bill Loan Deadline

The Bill signed recently by the President extending the World War II GI Bill Loan deadline also has other important provisions affecting many veterans.—Scott B. Harrington, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas said.

The new law will permit any veteran who sells residential property purchased with a GI loan to be relieved from liability to the Government under certain circumstances, Harrington said.

Previously, the veteran who sold his property and allowed the purchaser to assume his GI loan still remained liable to the Government in the event of subsequent foreclosure and the payment of a guaranty claim by the VA.

Now, Mr. Harrington pointed out, the veteran may be relieved of liability if the purchaser assumes full liability on the loan, the VA approves him from a credit standpoint, and the loan is current.

The new law also permits World War II veterans to have their GI loan entitlement restored up to January 31, 1965, if their property was taken by a governmental agency for public use, was destroyed by a natural hazard, or was otherwise disposed of for compelling reasons without fault on the part of the veteran.

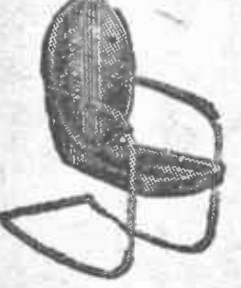

A RESOLUTION

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen took up for discussion the matter of providing for the improvement of certain public streets within the Town, as heretofore petitioned for by the owners of property abutting thereon. Following a discussion of the subject, Alderman W. F. Dugger offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING NECESSARY CERTAIN PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS ON SPECIFIED STREETS IN THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, APPROVING PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR SAID PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS, AND FIXING A DATE FOR A HEARING OF OBJECTIONS TO SAID PAVING AND IMPROVEMENTS.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That, proceeding under the authority of Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950, and in response to petitions therefor heretofore filed with the Town Clerk, it is hereby declared necessary that the public streets hereinafter designated be paved and improved in accordance with plans and specifications therefor now on file in the office of the Town Clerk, setting forth in detail the work to be done and the type of materials to be used, reference to which plans and specifications is hereby expressly made in aid of and as a part of this resolution, and with like effect as if they were spread at length herein. The improvements to be made, more particularly revealed by the said plans and specifications, are substantially the grading, draining, and paving, and work incidental thereto, on the following public streets or parts of public streets in said Town, to-wit:

PROJECT NO. 1: South Main Street from Indian Creek Bridge to the north line of Yow Street.

PROJECT NO. 2: Yow Street from intersection with the south line of South Main Street to south corporate limits of Iuka.

PROJECT NO. 3: Fulton Street south from existing pavement on Meiggs to south end of dedicated street.

PROJECT NO. 4: Pleasant Hill Road from the south line of Yow Street 200 feet south.

PROJECT NO. 5: Pike Street from the east line of Fulton street to the West line of Aberdeen

street.

All as shown on plans and specification heretofore prepared by the Engineer for said Town and now on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

SECTION 2. That the aforesaid plans and specifications heretofore prepared by Robert A. Scott, Engineer for said Town, and now on file in the office of the Town Clerk, covering the proposed improvements referred to in Section 1 of this resolution, shall be and the same are hereby adopted and approved as and for the plans and specifications for the construction of the aforesaid improvements.

SECTION 3. That the grades upon which the said improvements are to be constructed and the materials with which the manner in which the said improvements are to be constructed shall be those set forth and contained in the aforesaid plans and specifications.

SECTION 4. That the cost of making the aforesaid improvements requires an unusual outlay of expense for which the General Improvement Fund of the Town of Iuka is not sufficient and for which purpose the said Fund should not be used. Therefore, the entire expense and cost of the aforesaid improvements shall be assessed against the property upon which the said improvements abut, in accordance with and in proportion to the entire frontage thereof, and shall be paid by the owners of such abutting property, all as provided by Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950. In computing such costs, each street or portion of street involved shall be considered separately and as a separate project.

SECTION 5. That the cost to be so assessed against each of the respective lots abutting on streets or parts of streets to be so improved is less than the benefits which will accrue to each of said lots, respectively.

SECTION 6. That the proportionate share of the cost to be assessed against the abutting property and to be paid by the owners thereof may be paid in either of the methods provided for by said Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950.

SECTION 7. That the Town of Iuka proposes to issue its Special Street Improvement Note under the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950, and from the proceeds of the same to pay the total cost of the aforesaid improvements as such costs are hereafter determined in

the manner provided by law. The full faith, credit, and resources of the Town of Iuka shall be pledged to the payment of the principal of and the interest on said note, and there shall annually be levied a tax upon all taxable property in said Town sufficient for said purpose, and the special assessments to be levied against the property abutting on the said improvements shall also be pledged to the payment of said note. The said note shall mature within ten (10) years from the date thereof, as provided by law.

SECTION 8. That a meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, shall be held at the Town Hall in said Town at 7:30 o'clock p.m., on Friday, the 10th day of August, 1956, for the purpose of hearing any objections or remonstrances that may be made to the aforesaid improvements. At said meeting, or at a time and place to which the same may be adjourned, any person aggrieved may appear in person, by attorney, or by petition, and may object to or protest against the said improvements or any part thereof. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen shall consider the objections and protests, if any, and confirm, amend, modify, or rescind this resolution, and shall determine whether the said improvements shall be made and how the cost thereof shall be paid.

SECTION 9. That all proceedings herein had and hereafter to be had in connection with the aforesaid improvements shall be had in accordance with the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 495, Laws of Mississippi, 1950.

SECTION 10. That the Town Clerk of the Town of Iuka be and the said Clerk is hereby directed to give notice of the declared intention of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town to make the aforesaid improvements, which notice shall be given by publishing this resolution in its entirety for three (3) successive publications in the Town of Iuka and being qualified to publish legal notices, the first publication to made not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date specified in Section 8 hereof.

SECTION 11. That this resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.

Alderman J. W. Thompson seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and, the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:

Lesson for August

THE United States has more drug addicts than other western nations—sixty thousand. In the years the Federal Bureau of Investigation has compiled a list of addresses of 30,000 addicts, and the list is growing.

These and other facts were brought to light last January by a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee after seven months seeking the facts. Illegal dope traffic, they found out, has trebled since World War II. Whereas at the time there was one addict to every 10,000 persons, now there are one every 3,000. Approximately all crime in the nation is traceable to drug addiction.

How Does It Start?

The narcotics evil, like the hol evil, like most social evils, begins with the young people. 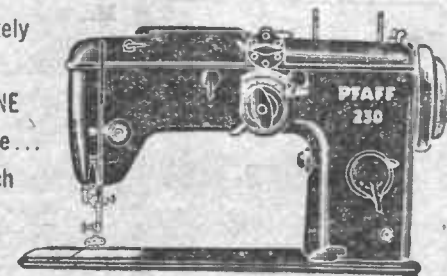

Research Shows Time Important In Defoliation

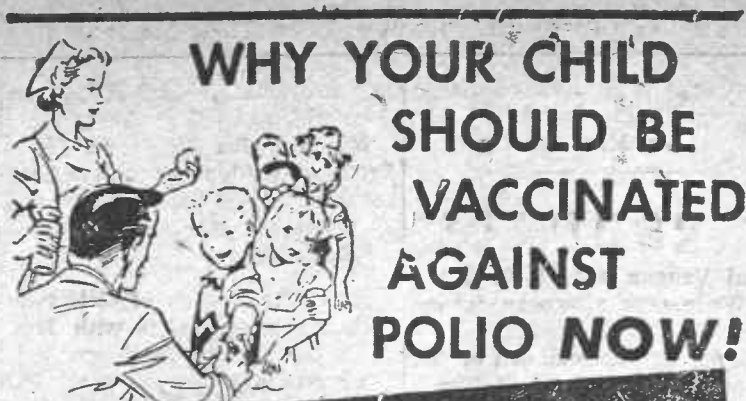
Research indicates that cotton growers should delay defoliation until 55 to 60 percent of the bolls are open. In tests at the Delta Branch Experiment Station at Stoneville defoliation at the proper time has permitted harvest of more than 80% of the crop within two weeks.

Dr. R. O. Thomas, Department of Agriculture physiologist working at Stoneville, said:

"In August, 1955, several Delta growers attempted to reduce losses from boll rots by using ground machines to confine early applications of defoliant sprays to the bottom leaves. Results were variable but generally in accord with those obtained at the Delta Station. Where upper foliage was densely overlapped, bottom defoliation often failed to dispell the humid condition underneath and damage from boll rots continued. Where plants were more open, the drier weather of early September checked boll rots and bottom defoliation was of no particular benefit.

"Timing of the defoliant application may well be the key which determines its benefits. Some growers defoliate certain fields early in order to start picker operations as soon as possible. In this case the disadvantages of generally damage to immature bolls must be weighed against the advantages of an earlier harvest schedule.

"Research has shown that a boll should be at least 35 days of age to avoid loss in quality of fiber and seed resulting from leaf removal. At this stage of maturity the boll is usually firm to thumb pressure; the fiber is thicker so that the boll is difficult to cut through with

Social Security Provides Old Age Benefits To Many

Income is important to everyone at all ages. However, in old age it becomes especially meaningful when the capacity or opportunity to work and earn a livelihood is limited. Federal Old-Age Insurance benefits under the social security law are intended as a partial replacement of earnings lost due to retirement.

The following example will serve to illustrate this point.

Mr. John Doe had worked nearly all of his life in lumber mills. He was forced to quit working when he was 66 years old, as the work was becoming too strenuous for him. During the 15 years before retirement he had worked in the plywood division of one of the larger wood products firms. This particular firm had a pension plan for retired workers. Mr. Doe found that he was eligible to a company pension of \$46.00 per month based on his years with the firm. Many years earlier, as a young man, he had purchased an annuity from a private insurance company. The policy was paid up several years ago, and, when he reached the age of 65 he began receiving \$22 per month. Upon retirement Mr. Doe applied for his Federal old-age retirement benefits, and found that he would receive \$82.50 per
