ARTICLE in one of the Memphis dailies mentions word "neighbor" in reference to the people who live in what call the "Memphis trade." The article states that Memphis' "neighbors" enabled city's stores to report 668 million dollars in retail trade last year. Residents outside the city of Memphis accounted for about 10 per cent of that total figure. It seems to us that this neighborliness is all going in one direction. What do the people of Memphis do toward the residents of Tishomingo county that is a neighborly act? The article boosting Memphis stores did not — could not — mention one thing in return. The writer said that country merchants in the big city received courteous, personal attention. We think the merchants in this county are much better equipped to give that "courteous, personal attention" because most all of them call their customers by their names. And as far as being neighborly is concerned the merchants in Iuka and Belmont are certainly closer neighbors than the impersonal clerk in a large department store in a big city 120 to 140 miles away, who probably would never see the customer again. If a local county citizen is into destitute or close circumstances financially will he (or she) go to a big city store for assistance? The answer is no. He will go to his personal acquaintances in Iuka or Belmont and ask them to extend him the needed aid to tide him over the rough times. . . . In case of sickness or family disaster, who aids the citizen? His true neighbors are the ones in his community and merchants and business people in the trading center nearest him. . . . The sales tax the local resident pays in the larger city, both east and west, do nothing for his local town and county. . . . He goes directly into the treasury of that city or state in which he did his shopping. . . . The Tishomingo countians, citizens of Iuka, Belmont and Tishomingo included, learn to trade at the better they, their communities and their state will be! . . . V . . .

The Dollar Sense In Soil Conservation

Many farmers, landowners, and others recognize the need for soil conservation. However, they may have questions as to whether the benefits equal the costs. Many Tishomingo county farmers own small and or badly depleted and eroded farms. These farmers find it very hard to meet, from their current income, both family-living and land-improvement costs.

Establishing adequate vegetated waterway and constructing stand-

ard terraces on a field will cost the farmer money; to properly drain a potentially productive field of bottom land by cutting a drainage ditch of the proper size is expensive; to construct a diversion terrace around a field to protect it from flood water is costly; to establish a conservation crop-rotation by taking land from row crops of high value and putting it in sod crops of less market value can mean immediate financial loss to the landowner. Other examples could be sighted, but these should suffice to show why many farmers hesitate to apply needed soil-conserving practices to their land.

In Tishomingo county, those soil-conserving practices that bring immediate benefit to the landowner are the ones being established in greatest amount. Farm stock ponds, secondary drainage ditches, diversion ditches, and terraces are the mechanical practices most farmers want assistance with. These are the practices the farmers think will be of more help to them at the present time. Most

of the Soil Conservation District Cooperators are interested in their forests and many have set pine trees which they protect from fire as best they can. Very few cooperators are interested in seeding land to perennial grasses or legumes because the prices of livestock are so low they cannot utilize these plants at a profit.

The thing that would help soil conservation-minded farmers most in applying the needed treatment to their land is a good market for what they can produce.

The Soil-Bank can serve indirectly as a market and will be helpful to many farmers, but it cannot take the place of a good market where the farmer can get his fair share of the national income. It just doesn't make sense to spend money on a farm or anywhere else unless you can at least get your cost in return. Soil Conservation practices will pay if judgment is used in applying them.

As Farm Planning Technician for the USDA Soil Conservation Service I "take off my hat" to the farmers of this county for the fine job they are doing under such great difficulty.

thing was wrong with their refrigerator to cause this condensation of moisture.

But research workers say it doesn't mean your refrigerator is defective; it means it is doing the job you want it to do. The increased sweating shows that the inside of the refrigerator and its contents are colder than they were in older refrigerators—and better for keeping food.

Because the newer refrigerators are designed for temporary storage of frozen foods in the "ice-cube compartment," the temperature there is from 10 to 15 degrees lower than in older refrigerators. This lower temperature in the evaporator makes the whole storage area of the refrigerator—and everything in it—colder.

Then you open the door. The warm, moist summer air that flows in condenses when it comes against the colder surfaces and causes the sweating.

If you wrap your milk bottles closely with paper towels, you will cut down condensation on the glass. You can cut down the sweating also by opening the refrigerator door less often. Plan ahead and put in or take out several foods at a time instead of taking each out separately, opening the door each time.

Caution the children, too. They often hold the door open "just looking for something to eat or a cold drink."

Prevent Chigger Bites

The prospects of chigger bites and their resulting intensive itching, takes some of the pleasure out of backyard meals, popular these hot summer days.

You can control the pests in the barbecue or picnic areas of your yard or the places children play with easily applies insecticides. Either a spray or dust is available. The materials recommended are chlordane, toxaphene and lindane, and are effective for 4 to 8 weeks.

Information on amounts to use are available at your home agent's office. Ask also for information on control of the dog and cat flea, that deals out misery to a large number of folks each year. Be sure you follow the "precautions" that come with the directions for use of insecticides.

Seasoning Cooked Vegetables

As much as we like the fresh summer vegetables, we do like a little change in the way they are prepared sometime. To do this, why not try some variety in seasonings?

With snap beans or summer squash, cook a tablespoon or two of minced onion, green pepper or parsley.

Put a pinch of herbs or spice in the water when you cook lima beans.

With peas, cook a few mint leaves.

But go easy with these seasonings. Their pungency easily overshadows the delicate flavors of vegetables.

Season cooked vegetables with salad oil, with lemon juice, horseradish or a whisper of garlic. If you use bacon drippings, add bits of crisply fried bacon.

Knife Care

The best knife can be ruined by improper care. Excessive heating ruins the temper, making the knife brittle; so keep knives out of direct flame and extremely hot water.

Never use a knife against a surface harder than the steel blade. Especially hard on knives are crockery and bones. Store your knives so that steel does not touch steel. An inexpensive rack or plywood separations in a drawer will

protect the edges.

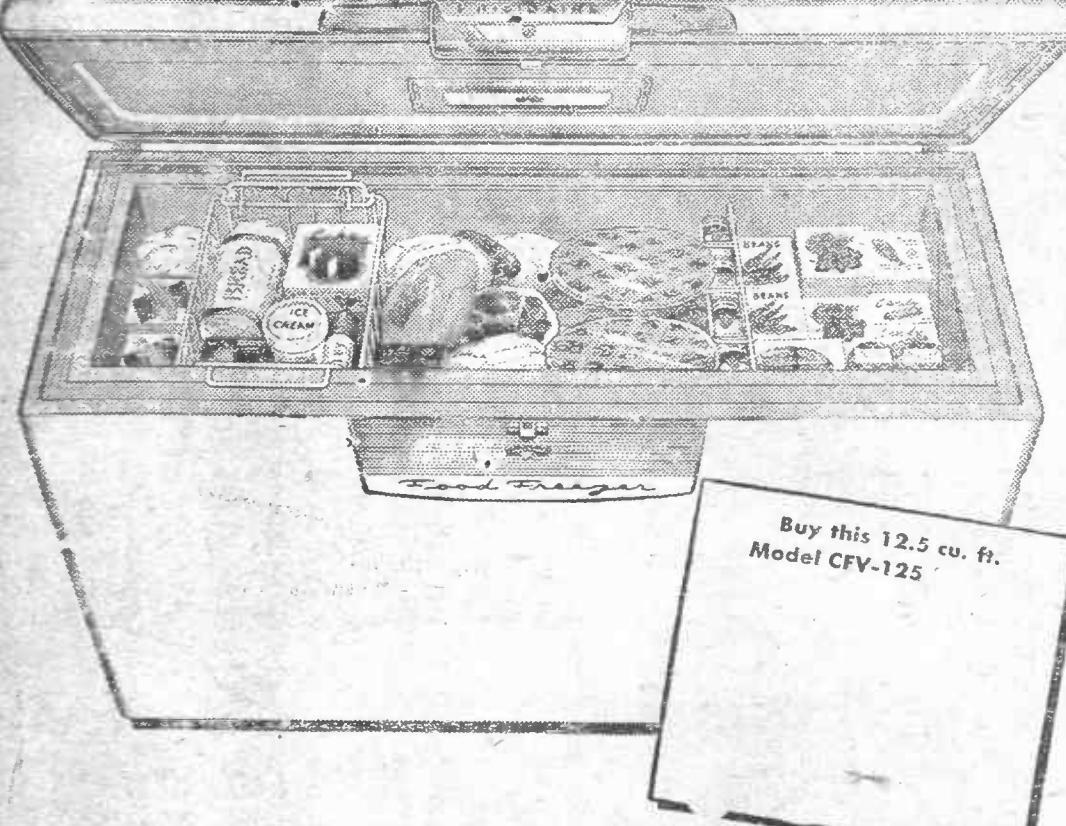

More Eligible For Social Security Under New Law

From: Mrs. Mary King Temple Social Security Administration Sheffield, Alabama

An important provision of the new social security law makes it possible for some survivors of deceased workers who were not eligible to collect benefits under the old law to receive them now, according to Mrs. Mary King Temple, district manager of the Social Security Administration. Under this new provision any worker who died after June 1940 and before September 1950 is considered to have died fully insured, provided he had at least a year and a half credit in employment covered under social security.

Mrs. Temple explained that a surviving child, an unmarried widow of any age with a young child of the wage-earner's in her care, an unmarried widow of any age with a young child of the wage earner's in her care, an unmarried widow over 65 or an

aged dependent parent may be come entitled to monthly benefits. Such survivors of workers who died before September 1940 and who were not eligible for social security benefits before, may now be eligible. This is true even though application was not made earlier, or application was filed and disallowed.

Mrs. Temple urges all survivors who think they are eligible to inquire now. Dependent parents have until September 1956 under the new law to prove dependency on a deceased child who may be deemed to have died insured. No lump sum payments may be made under this special provision.

Unless application is filed, an eligible survivor may not collect benefits. Application may be made at the Sheffield, Ala., Social Security Office, 101 W. Third Street, Monday through Friday.

Mrs. Temple emphasized that workers who died without having

worked under social security at least a year and a half would not be considered insured and survivors would not be eligible for benefits.

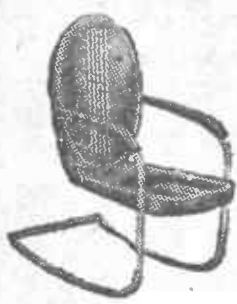

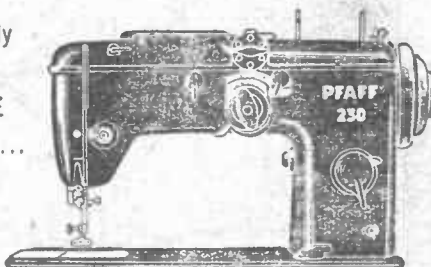

All the crops were planted on October 10 last year and grazing began on all paddocks on December 2 with two steers per paddock. A third steer was added at all oat, wheat and rye-ryegrass paddocks on December 16, and to the ryegrass-crimson paddocks on February 24.

Early maturity of wheat shortens the grazing season in the spring, limiting the use of wheat to fields where it is to be followed by another crop such as silage, corn or soybeans.

"If winter pasture is grown for maximum returns in South Mississippi, oats should be planted on well drained soils and ryegrass on poorly drained soils," according to Agronomist Clyde Blount who conducted the tests.

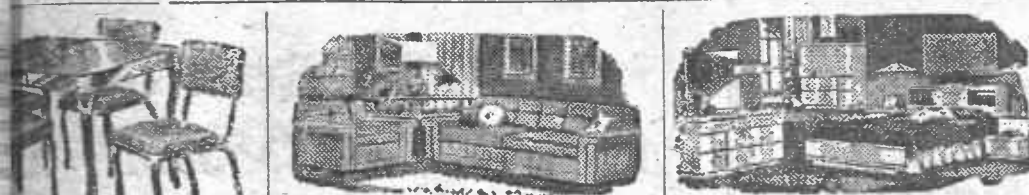

Oats Lead In South Mississippi Grazing Tests

Mississippi Branch Experiment Station continue to show good profits per acre and per steer, with oats the most profitable of four crops tested. The tests were conducted at the McNeill substation in Pearl River county.

During the 1955-56 winter grazing periods oats returned \$28.36 above costs per steer or \$42.54 per acre. Comparable figures for wheat were \$11.66 per steer or \$21.37 per acre; for rye-ryegrass combination \$24.09 and \$40.15; and for ryegrass and crimson clover \$25.70 per steer or \$42.83 per acre.

A three-year average of returns above costs for the 1954-56 period shows oats have averaged \$60 per acre per year, wheat \$36 and the

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Boll Weevil

Boll Weevil migration is in full swing. Weevils are leaving old cotton and invading late cotton. Each field is an individual problem. Some plots continue to need poisoning, others not. A good rule of thumb to follow in determining poisoning is this: Count on 10 feet of row the number of tender bolls, (ones that can be cut in half with pocket knife) and if 20 or more are found, it will pay to make two or more applications. Usually 12 big bolls per foot of row equals a bale of cotton per acre.

Alfalfa
There is a good number of acres in Tishomingo County that will grow Alfalfa. Good, deep, well drained cotton land will do. Alfalfa is a high yielding, high value crop, especially for dairy cows. Alfalfa hay has no equal.

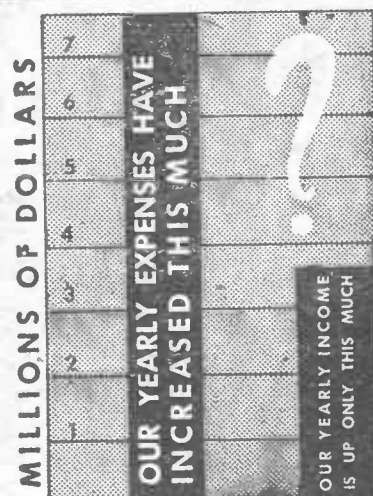
