\$50 Million Available Through Farm Home Loans

United States Senator John Stennis said in a release to this newspaper first of the week, that the Department of Agriculture is making available \$50 million immediately to implement legislation passed this year providing for building and remodeling farm homes and other farm buildings.

To be eligible, an applicant must live on the farm and receive a substantial part of his income from farming. The Mississippi Senator pointed out that these loans will not conflict with loans made by banks and other lending agencies as they are long-term loans extending the schedule of payment beyond those ordinarily covered by regular lending agencies.

Senator Stennis urges farmers who are interested in obtaining a long-term loan under this program to make application with their County Committee of the Farmers Home Administration at the earliest date possible. He said, "I believe that these loans will provide a sound approach to the credit needs of farmers for building new homes or making needed repairs on existing homes."

"Our farm home loan program has been badly neglected, and I am hopeful that this program will serve as the first step over the years in dotting our rural communities in Mississippi with new and improved homes," stated Senator Stennis.

August term of Tishomingo Circuit Court convened Monday morning of this week for the first time in several years. Judge Raymond T. Jarvis is presiding and court will continue through most of next week.

Business of the court got underway Monday morning with the selection of the Grand Jury and Petit Jury.

In deliberations Monday afternoon the Grand Jury returned 6 indictments, but none on serious offences. One person, Leonard Moody, was indicted for assault

and battery and attempt to kill on the person of Eulas Milam; two were indicted for possessing whiskey. They are Della Harris and Dexter Clingan. Bill Bolton was indicated for driving while drunk. Eugene Boyd was indicted and charged with grand larceny. He is charged with stealing 2 batteries from Harvey Honeycutt.

The Grand Jury's report to the court on inspection of theatres, the county jail, county home and other public places shows everything in generally good order.

However, the jury did recommend replacing or repairing the cooking range in the county jail. Also it recommended that repairs be made on porches on one of the buildings at the county home and that a new sink be installed at the county jail.

Small Grain Is
Good Winter
Grazing

For years, William Armstrong, Robert Williams, Robert Epps, Williams Epps, and their neighbors have made a practice of growing small grain, oats or wheat, for winter grazing and turning it under, while green, in the spring as a green-manure crop. These Soil Conservation District Cooperators plant cotton, corn, and other crops following this small grain.

This is not a new practice they are following upon the advice of an agricultural worker. They learned through experience that this practice works, and that cotton or corn following oats or wheat that have been well fertilized, grazed, and turned under as green-manure produces as much or more than do these crops planted on land left bare during the winter.

As Farm Planning technician for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Tishomingo county, I have paid particular attention to this succession of crops. I believe this land treatment has protected these fields from erosion, and that a large amount of organic matter is being formed by the roots and crowns of this small grain, resulting in increased yields of cotton and corn following grazed oats and wheat, which were turned under while green.

In the spring 1956 edition of Plant Food Review, there is an article written by M. B. Russell entitled "All Way Back In One Year." This is an excellent article, well worth studying. Mr. Russell tells in this article about 10 experimental plots professor George E. Morrow established on the University of Illinois campus 80 years ago. In table 1 of this article I quote Mr. Russell: "Yield of corn 22 bushels on untreated plots

planted continuously to corn; yield of corn 36 bushels on untreated corn, oats plot." These are average corn yields for years 1944-55. The corn yield was 14 bushels or 68% greater where corn followed oats.

Messers Epps, Williams, and Armstrong own Bear Creek terrace soil. This land may be above average in fertility for Tishomingo county but through their good management they are keeping it productive. Anyone can drive along the road and see that these farmers are doing a good job caring for their land by following a simple practice that other landowners can do. As a suggestion, I would recommend that vetch be speeded with the oats or wheat to add nitrogen to the soil.

Wreck Responsible For Big Break When Thomas A. Bickerstaff, Talented University Of Mississippi Professor

One of the most colorful professors of the University of Mississippi got his big break to a train wreck.

Thomas Alton Bickerstaff—one of the most colorful professors of the University of Mississippi—got a chance to try his hand at teaching mathematics in his major professor was in a rail accident. Today, 30 years later, he is still in his alma mater.

When it happened, Dr. Bickerstaff recalls, "The Oxford-to-Jackson passenger train called 'The Blue Shirt' hit a washout and overturned north of Water Valley. Professor Robert Torrey was injured in the wreck and I was asked to take care of him until he was able to resume his teaching duties. Complications set in and several months before he was able to get about. In the meantime, I accepted a graduate fellowship and kept teaching."

To Borrow Money

Bickerstaff is a native of Tishomingo. After graduating from county agricultural high school, he went to work for a lumber company as a bookkeeper and in two

years there managed to save some money, but not enough to pay his college expenses for even a year.

An older brother, Reese, who was a student at the University, finally persuaded him he should quit his job and begin his college education.

That he did, but it took some extra manipulating to provide the funds. Young Tom Bickerstaff went to the Corinth bank where he had placed his meager savings and requested a loan of \$200. "Much to my surprise, I got it!" he said.

Trip Takes 14 Hours

All of this took place nearly two weeks after the opening of the fall term in 1924 and he took the train for Oxford as soon as possible. Fourteen hours after boarding the train at Corinth he arrived in Oxford.

"That was a trip I will never forget," the math professor reminisced. "The train developed a 'hot box' and had to wait at Abbeville for hours for repairs."

He was tired and a bit discouraged upon arrival at the University, but it didn't take Reese and his friends long to make him feel at home.

"I'll never forget the friendly group of students to whom my brother and his roommate, W. C. Newman, introduced me at breakfast the next morning," Dr. Bickerstaff said.

In the group were Wilson Lyon of Heidelberg, who is now president of Pomona College in California; A. B. Lewis of Jackson, now chairman of the Department of Physics at Ole Miss; Myres McDougal of Booneville, now professor of Law at Yale University; G. M. Jones of Woodville, a bishop of the Episcopal Church in Louisiana, and Hilton Waits of Greenville, who is chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the State Legislature.

In addition, Dr. Bickerstaff's brother was to serve as representative from Harrison County for 20 years and roommate Newman is now the pastor of one of the largest Methodist churches in Paducah, Ky.

Two Become Rhodes Scholars

Two of his first acquaintances—Lyon and McDougal—later become Rhodes Scholars, for which Ole Miss has become quite distinguished. It is second only to the University of Virginia in the Southland in the number produced.

It was comforting indeed to the campus newcomer to find that he was not going to be alone in working his way through school. For example, Lyon and Lewis had departmental jobs grading papers and working as laboratory assistants. McDougal was a campus correspondent for several daily newspapers. Another fellow student, Ed Lipscomb, who is now director of sales promotion and public relations for the National Cotton Council, "did right well" picking up and delivering shoes for a local repair shop.

"Bick," as he is known to close friends, didn't make much money at first, but his willingness to work paid off in a big way. When Taylor Dunn of Oxford was appointed University postmaster he invited the Tishomingo farm boy to take a student job in the post office.

"I got only \$20 per month at the start, but it really went a long way," he declared. Later he was raised to \$50 per month.

On the job with him at the post office was H. V. Kincannon of Tupelo, who is now an attorney at Hazlehurst. "We literally had all of the girls' numbers," the jovial professor admits. "We never referred to a date by her name—just her box number!"

Natural-born Entertainer

It was not all work and no play for young Tom Bickerstaff. From the very beginning he was a campus music maker. One of his first efforts was to team with the late Bob Cox of Ripley and play novelty numbers of the square dance variety with the Ole Miss Musical Club. Their caller was Shine Morgan.

Cox later became representative of Tishomingo County and Mr. Morgan is now a well known Oxford merchant. Dean R. Malcolm, Guess, who was YMCA secretary at that time, was the music club's director.

"We made a trip over to the 'W' that year to put on a variety program," Dr. Bickerstaff laughingly recalls. "They had a high fence and a good night watchman over

there in those days and the girls went wild over any program featuring men.

"Everything went according to schedule and we received a resounding ovation after our novelty number, which pleased us to no end."

"Then it happened. When we tried to leave the stage we got lost. The exit was through a slit in the curtain and we had to fight our way all the way around to find it."

"I don't remember what took place after that, I was so embarrassed."

Only The Beginning

That was just the beginning for Bickerstaff as an entertainer. He has compiled an enviable record which is still growing.

He took time off from his post office job to sing with the Glee Club. He was a member of a quartet which included Morgan, who is now a lawyer at West Point, and Fred Walker, now head of the Biology Department at Mississippi Southern College.

This vocal group—singing with his old novelty teammate, Bob Cox, instead of Walker—was the first quartet to sing in Fulton Chapel. That was on a summertime variety show shortly after the opening of the new auditorium back in the late '20s.

Bick also found time to play with a string band called "The Pipefitters," which performed on the campus radio station, WCBH. With him were Dean Wasson of Moorhead, Frank Erskine of Jackson, and Bill Paine of Fernwood.

The station was operated in those pioneer days of radio broadcasting as a Physics Department laboratory project. It got its call letters from the slogan "Watch Concerts Broadcast Here." Today, WCBH is still operated at Ole Miss, but by the Speech Department.

Writes Fight Song

Dr. Bickerstaff is still in the entertainment business. His latest effort is a new Ole Miss fight song, "Rebel Ramble," which made its

national debut over CBS last fall. He wrote the number and has performed it a number of times with a local quartet, composed of Dr. William H. Spragens of the Mathematics Department and two Oxford businessmen, George Bufaloe and David Neilson.

Song writing, barbershop singing, and playing in string bands are not the limit of Professor Bickerstaff's artistic talents. One of his most hilarious efforts was the 1949 authorship and production of a faculty show "Intruder At Its Wust," which was a travesty on William Faulkner's "Intruder In The Dust."

The Bickerstaff-produced "operatic" production followed by only two months the world premiere in Oxford of the movie based on Faulkner's novel.

"We had an awful night for the show, but Fulton Chapel was filled," he declared. "We had an all-star cast, which included the chancellor, four deans, coaches, professors—and even some local businessmen." Needless to say, Professor Bickerstaff was in the cast, too.

His Ole Miss stage appearances have not been limited to the show. He has appeared in leading roles of such faculty productions as "Harvey" and "Kind Lady." He had lesser roles in "Madwoman of Chaillo" and "Light Up the Sky."

He and his wife, the former Miss Lillian Russell of Gulfport, played leading parts in "Ah Wilderness" in 1952.

Entire Family Musical

Dr. Bickerstaff hesitantly admits that his entire family is musical. He is president of the local chapter of SPEBSQSA, the national barbershop quartet association, and sings lead tenor. Mrs. Bickerstaff plays the piano, and all three of their children—two boys and a girl—have been good enough instrumentalists to be chosen for the Lions Club All-State Band.

The older of the boys, Alton, who is now an ensign in the Navy,

played piano and saxophone. David, soon to be a freshman NROTC student at Ole Miss, was a member of the All-State Band four years. He plays the clarinet. He was joined this summer on the trip to the Lions International Convention at Miami by his sister, Carolyn, who will be a junior at University High this fall. She played the flute with the All-State Band and also plays the piano.

Has Had Some Good Breaks

Professor Bickerstaff admits he has had some wonderful breaks in his lifetime.

"I have been extremely lucky," he contends, citing a by-chance remark made at his home which led to his receiving trust fund financing of his doctoral work at the University of Michigan.

"I just happened to be discussing the problems I was having with finances with our county sheriff and like a bolt out of the blue he told me about this fund."

Many honors have come his way during his 30-odd years on the campus. He won the coveted Taylor Medal in mathematics his junior year at the University.

Since becoming a faculty member he advanced from the rank of instructor in 1928 to a full professorship in 1947, at which time he became head of the Department of Mathematics. He also served as registrar from 1936 to 1946 and was coordinator of the Student Training and Replacement unit of the Army Specialized Training Program during World War II.

When he took leave in 1944 to complete his doctoral studies at Michigan he also served as a special instructor in the Navy V-12 program there.

Heads Athletic Committee

Dr. Bickerstaff is well known throughout Mississippi and the Mid-South for his activities as chairman of the Faculty Committee on Athletics at Ole Miss. During his reign in this capacity Ole Miss has grown from an unknown to a national football power. He has served on that committee since 1934 and has been its chairman since 1937.

But his accomplishments do not end there. He is past president of the Louisiana-Mississippi section of the Mathematical Association of America, member of the association's Board of Governors, and was a member of the Commission on Statistics of the Southern Regional Education Board. In addition, he served for five years on the editorial board of the National Mathematics Magazine.

In 1954 he represented the University as guest of the Secretary of Navy on the Midshipman Training Cruise to Spain, France and Cuba. He was particularly delighted to be assigned to the U. S. S. New Jersey, for his son, Alton, was a ROTC midshipman aboard the battleship.

Civic-Minded Scientist

He is truly an example of a man who as a youngster had the courage to go out on a limb to begin his university education. Like many others, he has succeeded—and stayed in his native state to help others accomplish the same goal.

DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION ROUND-UP—STEVENSON AND KEFAUVER ARE CANDIDATES

Governor Coleman Played Big Role In Gaining Concessions For The South

Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver are the National Democratic candidates that were elected at the convention held last week in Chicago. The following story is a summary of the Mississippi delegation's activities at the convention. Cecil Summers was the only local Tishomingo countian to attend the national meeting.)

Mississippi's delegates to the Democratic national convention have returned home, disappointed and sore at heart that national party leaders—and the convention, itself—were not more considerate of the South's position, in adopting a platform and in nomination of the Stevenson-Kefauver ticket.

Despite Mississippi's treatment at Chicago, however, many feel that with the Republican party also calling for punitive civil rights measures, they would have little or nothing to gain by supporting the GOP this year.

These are thinking in terms of the seniority of their senators, James O. Eastland and John C. Stennis, and their 6 congressmen, whose committee standing among Democrats in Congress might well be jeopardized in event of another party bolt by Mississippi Democrats.

Some Demand States Rights
However, there are others who insist that the welfare of the state demands they team up with the Mississippians for States Rights, and support a slate of independent electors. The slate was announced at a meeting of the organization,

called by Circuit Judge M. M. McGowan, at Jackson last Tuesday.

Still others contend that despite the seating of Republican Perry Howard's "black and tans" at San Francisco this week, they could serve the state's interests best by following the Citizens for Eisenhower in supporting the president for reelection.

Although the South was given a distasteful civil rights plank—one that mentions the Supreme Court's integration decisions, but rejects the use of force in the "orderly" adjudication of civil rights cases, the fact remains that Dixie delegates made capital of their participation at Chicago.

Oppose Kefauver for "Veep"
Tennessee's Sen. Estes Kefauver won the vice presidential nomination over opposition of most southerners. And the Mississippi delegation voted for Sen. Lyndon Johnson, Texas, for president. They had voted in caucus, with 13 opposing, to switch to Stevenson in event Johnson was eliminated. But Governor Coleman did not get recognition to make the switch. They joined most southerners in sticking by Massachusetts' Sen. John Kennedy, who was nosed out by Kefauver for vice president.

Coleman must be credited with a superb presentation of the "Mississippi Story" before the Platform Committee. He had sat for five days as a committee member, listening to a parade of witnesses libel the Magnolia State and her

people. He answered them in a one-hour address, in which he supplied proof of the falsity of statements by Dixiecrat witnesses.

Committee members and the audience sat in rapt attention as the governor unfolded the story of the state's program to equalize educational facilities in both white and Negro schools, as he cited that in the Emmett Till case "no one said the judge... was unfair, or that the prosecuting attorney didn't do his best," and as he charged that there are more cases of racial violence in Chicago than in Mississippi.

Harmony Threat in Caucus
Harmony in the Mississippi delegation was threatened when Coleman, after excluding reporters from the first caucus, also ruled that delegates holding proxies must have them validated by the State Democratic Committee.

In one case, Mrs. Ann Kendall Hobson, Natchez, daughter of a former Mississippi national Committeewoman, holding the proxy of State Sen. Mayes McGehee, Meadville, walked from the caucus room, almost in tears. She told reporters, who were cooling their heels outside the caucus, that the governor had been "ugly" to her and "kicked" her out.

Soon thereafter, however, State Chairman Bidwell Adam cut the red tape which barred validation of 10 proxies and had the holders certified as delegates. He conferred with members of the state committee in Chicago, got their approval, declaring that proxies "would not travel 1,000 miles to present spurious papers."

Hamilton Challenge Surprise
The big surprise of the convention to Mississippians was the challenge by Charles G. Hamilton, itinerant North Mississippi minister, of the right of the Mississippi delegation to sit in the convention. The surprise was not that Hamilton issued the challenge, but that national Democratic officials would entertain it.

It was learned, however, that Hamilton had the support of the ADA, NAACP, AFL-CIO leaders and other leftist groups. There seemed little doubt that the left-wingers backed Hamilton and a contesting all-Negro delegation from South Carolina for their "nuisance value."

Governor Coleman, assisted by Sen. John C. Stennis, National Committeeman Hugh Clayton, New Albany; Secretary of State Heber Ladner and Lieut. Gov. Carroll Gartin, presented the delegation's answer to Hamilton's charges.

Hamilton and his CIO attorney, L. G. Despres, Chicago, specifically mentioned Sen. James O. Eastland, Representatives William M. Colmer, Pascagoula, and John Bell Williams, Jackson; Everette Truly, Fayette; Hardy Lott, Greenwood; State Representatives Charles Jacobs, Cleveland, and James Morrow, Brandon; Birney Imes, Columbus publisher; J. O. Hollis, Carthage; Atty. Gen. Joe Patterson, former State Committee Chairman Tom Tubb, West Point; Judge Herbert Holmes, Senatobia, and Hugh V. Wall, Brookhaven.

The Coleman delegation won the contest. But there were some anxious moments on the convention floor before Speaker Sam Rayburn, Texas, chairman, "gavelled in" the Mississippians. The Credentials Committee had voted 52-to-2, to seat the Coleman-led group. But there was talk of a motion to return the report to the committee. This did not develop.

Platform Scrap "Sham Battle"
The influence which Walter Reuther, vice president of the merged AFL-CIO and president of the old CIO, wields in politics was demonstrated when the Platform Committee yielded to Reuther's demands to reconvene and hear him after the committee had adjourned.

Reuther's demands before the Platform group for a stronger civil rights plank than was recommended delayed action on the platform, at the Wednesday night session, until well after midnight.

When it was apparent that the committee would not yield, arrangements were made for a "sham battle," in which such Dixiecrats as Michigan's Gov. G. Mennen (Soapy) Williams, candidate for reelection, and California's Richard Richards, candidate for the Senate, were given the opportunity to make a fight for a stronger plank on the floor.

Then Rayburn again literally "gavelled" into approval the Platform Committee's report.

Both Sides Dissatisfied
When the so-called "stronger" civil rights plank failed, the impression prevailed around Chicago that "The South got what it wanted." That's the way most news-

papers in the Chicago area reported. Here's an example, from the opening paragraph by Jim Bishop, in the Chicago American:

"The Democrats talked the nation to sleep early today. Then they sneaked into the homes of 10,500,000 southern Negroes and stole their civil liberties."

Typical of the Dixie attitude were strong statements against the plan, which northern delegates thought the South "wanted," by Senator Eastland, Representatives Colmer, Williams and Arthur Winstead, Philadelphia. Delegates from southern states were flooded with telegrams from back home, demanding they oppose the proposed plank.

Coleman Changes Mind
When the Mississippi delegation caucused to decide on a presidential choice, State Sen. Hayden Campbell asked for a roll call. The delegates, on motion of Senator Eastland, had previously voted unanimously to back Senator Johnson on the first roll call. Campbell's request was on a proposal to shift to Stevenson when Johnson had been eliminated.

The Hinds County senator contended that since the caucus was working under House of Representatives rules, five delegates (10 percent) could obtain a roll call. Coleman ruled that House rules did not prevail, which meant a majority would be necessary to demand a roll call. Campbell then moved for a vote on the proposed record vote. On a show of hands, he lost.

Then came the non-record vote on the proposed shift to Stevenson when and if Johnson was eliminated. Stevenson was voted as second choice.

However, after conferring with Senator Stennis and other advisors, Coleman told the delegates he did not want to be misunderstood. He said he did not object to a roll call. He merely had ruled on parliamentary procedure, he insisted, and the motion for a record vote had failed.

Fred Anderson, Gloster, then made a new motion for a roll call. It carried, and the roll of delegates was called to show a vote of 31-to-13 for the shift to Stevenson.

Stage "Stop Kefauver" Drive
Governor Coleman conferred most of Thursday night with southern leaders in framing the plan to stop Kefauver. He met with the delegates the following morning to discuss the matter, told them most southerners had centered upon Senator Kennedy. The Massachusetts senator was selected as Mississippi's second choice. Her 22 votes went to Senator Gore on the first ballot, shifted to Kennedy on the second.

But Senator Gore, when he withdrew, asked the Tennessee delegation to support Kefauver. They cast reluctant votes for their senior senator, and the Kefauver victory was assured.

Old timers among the Mississippi delegates, in obvious discomfort in their seats at convention hall, remarked at the difference in the Democratic party of today, as compared with its complexion during the days of the late Senators John Sharp Williams and Pat Harrison.

They reacted in shocked anger at the declaration of Illinois Senator, who, in a convention address, said: "The blood of America has been enriched by mixture of the races in Chicago and Illinois."

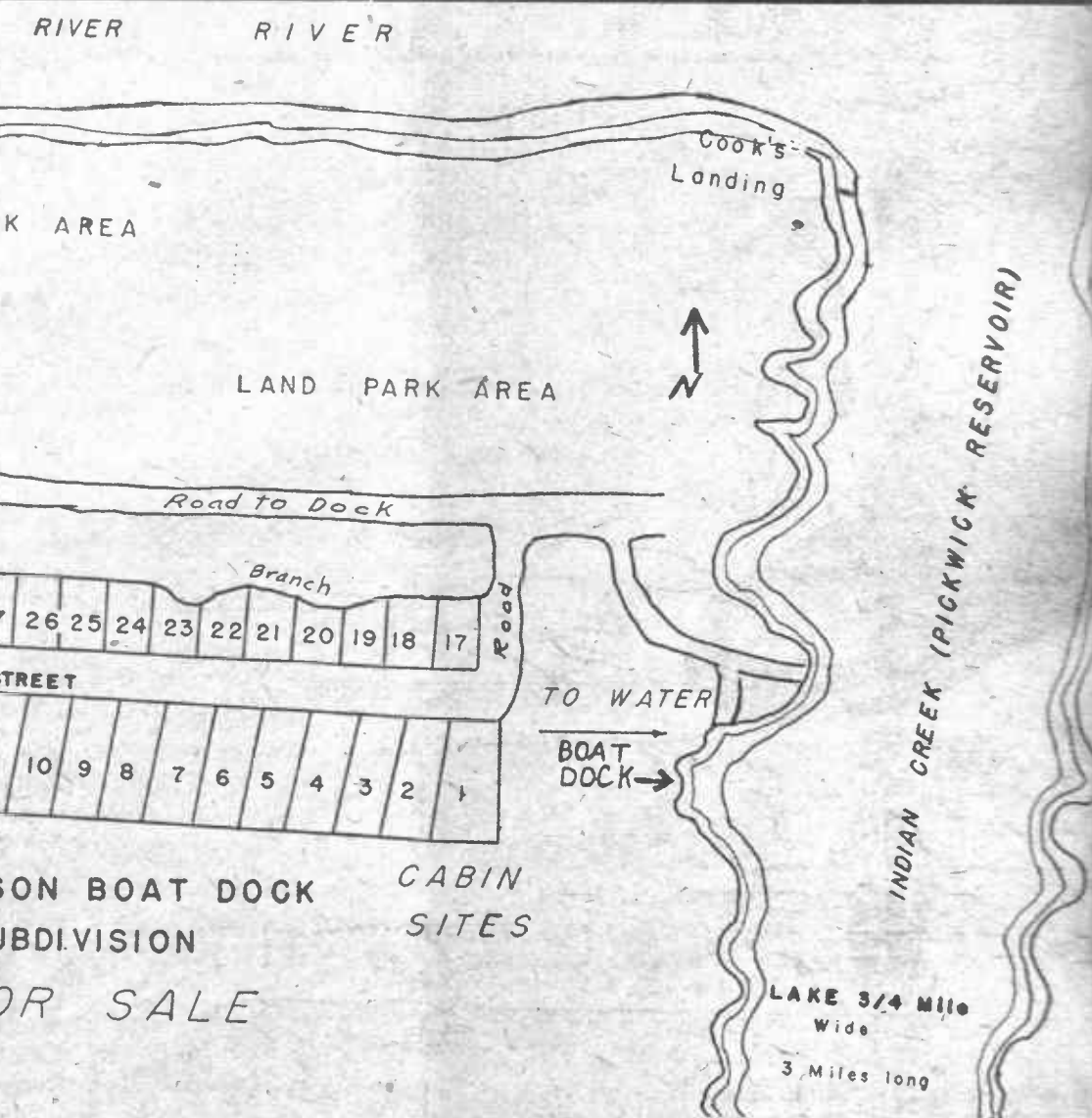

Jordan's lovely Queen

ably has the best formal education enjoyed by any queen in history. And even before her marriage in April 1955, Dina added to her formal knowledge by visiting, incognito, Jordanian villages and refugee camps and talking to leaders of the feminist movement. By the time of her marriage, she was prepared to assume not only the honors of royalty but the responsibilities of good citizenship in her adopted land.

The Queen's daily routine in the palace at Amman now reads something like a cross between the duties of an executive and a busy housewife. Up at eight, she has breakfast and goes over the local and foreign press. Then comes her mail, much of which she handles personally; and the supervision of numerous orders necessary for the smooth running of a royal household. If she has any time left before lunch at two, she reads her favorite books of philosophy and poetry, including works by Shakespeare and Gibran Khalil Gibran, the great Arab-American poet.

Lunch is usually with the King and his guests, who come from within the official circle or abroad. The meal may be followed by a walk or reception of the Queen's own visitors, particularly men and women who are working to promote progress and welfare among the people of Jordan. Dinner is at nine, again with the King; and the rest of the evening may be spent watching movies at the palace or driving to visit a hospital or charity party.

Typical of the Queen is the fact that she greatly admires the vitality of American women, and during her teaching days she emulated her western sisters by driving her own small car alone through Cairo's crowded streets. And what will be the effect of her influence on Jordan? Her marriage was barely eight months old, when the King promised to build a new university in her honor. Further progress may surely be expected from Jordan's personable but hard-working Queen.

County Agent news

Representing Mississippi State Agricultural Extension
Crop damage resulted from wind and hail Sunday afternoon in section of the county. Corn was damaged more than any other crop as high winds leveled some of the plants.

September is the time to plant winter grazing crops. I would suggest that this planting be done now while there is plenty of soil moisture. Oats, wheat, Rye Grass and Crimson Clover planted now will offer good fall and winter grazing.

Small grains can either be planted broadcast on prepared land or drilled in sod. I prefer planting on sod since there will be less bogging when grazing. Fertilize with nitrogen, phosphate and pot-

ash at planting time. If only one form of plant food can be afforded, use nitrogen.

Rye Grass and Crimson Clover can be planted three different ways. Broadcast on prepared seedbed, drilled in sod, or broadcast on top of sod. Fertilize the same as small grains.

Seeding rates for pasture planting is as follows: Oats 4 bushels, if planted alone, 2½ bushels drilled in sod. Wheat - 2½ bushels if planted alone - 1½ bushels drilled in sod. Rye Grass - 40 pounds per acre seeded alone - 25 pounds an acre, in combination with clover. The seeding rate for Crimson Clover is 20 pounds per acre.

If bolls are not mature in your cotton, make two more applications of poison.

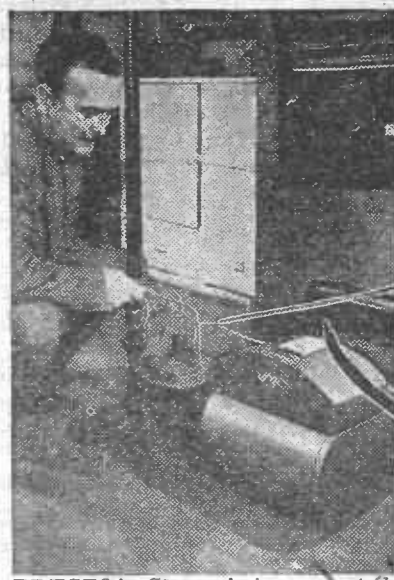

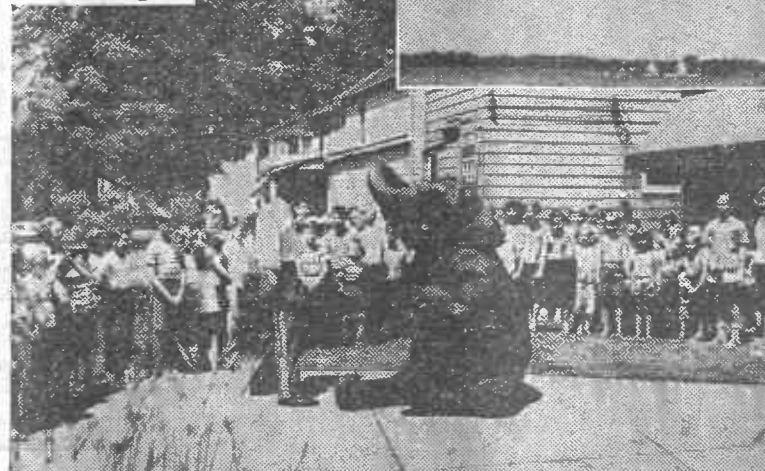

Syrian Women Voters Important Force In Democracy



Thirty years ago, shortly after American women won their long fight for equal rights, a young Syrian girl named Adla Beyhum startled her country's conservative male citizens by demanding similar rights for the women of Syria.

In a letter addressed to the editor of the Beirut magazine AL-FATA AL-ARABI, this determined young lady declared that she could see no reason why Syrian women should not participate in public life while maintaining their status as housewives and mothers.

"Emancipation does not mean that a woman will neglect her family," Syria's Susan B. Anthony said. "Our movement aims at restoring the traditional prestige of the Arab woman, adopting only those changes necessary for modern times."

These words, uttered by the daughter of a noble family, struck like a thunderbolt at conservative thinking of the times. However, Adla Beyhum's voice struck a responsive chord in women from Damascus, Aleppo, Hama, Homs and other Syrian cities. Soon men, too, were persuaded by the logic of her arguments and the status of Syrian women underwent a drastic change. Today these women not only enjoy the right to vote, but they are equal partners in business, industry, education, the professions and other fields.

In addition to Mrs. Beyhum, now president of the Feminist Union in Syria, the country boasts of such outstanding feminine leaders as Asma Khouri, president of the Feminist First Aid Society; Souad Mardam, president of the Awakening Syrian Woman Society; Nahiha Hourania and Wisal Bakdash.

These women, like their American counterparts in the League of Women Voters, are energetically urging their fellow-countrywomen to take a greater share in political affairs by teaching Syrian women about their rights and responsibilities in a democratically developing nation.

Lunch From The Freezer

September school days are just around the corner. . .

And with them come lunch making for those mothers whose children go to schools that do not have a school lunch program.

Until the school bells ring, and most any time during the year, it's time for a picnic or an outdoor or indoor meal with sandwiches.

You can prepare sandwiches the night before or even weeks in advance of their need—by using your freezer. In fact, you can prepare a whole lunch.

Wrap such luncheon foods as sandwiches, cookies and fruit, separately in individual servings and store in the freezer until time to pack the lunch. To avoid mixing flavors, package each item individually.

Food taken from the freezer for the lunch box in the morning will be thawed by noon. And it may actually taste better than food

prepared and packed fresh in the morning and kept in a warm place for several hours.

Sandwich fillings suitable for freezing are meat, poultry, cheese spreads of all kinds, egg yolk mixtures, peanut butter and other nut pastes. Fillings that don't freeze well are those with raw vegetables, hard-cooked egg whites and fruit jellies.

Raw vegetables—celery, carrots, cabbage and others—can be put in the lunch in the morning. Lettuce or tomatoes, wrapped in wax-paper and carried in the lunch box, can be added to the sandwiches at lunch time.

The frozen foods in the box act as a refrigerator to keep the vegetables crisp and cooling the lunch box itself helps to keep foods cool and fresh-tasting.

Register Promptly At 65 For Old Age And Survivors Ins.

A delayed birth certificate is not necessary for older persons to establish age in order to receive old-age and survivors insurance benefits, states Mrs. Mary Temple,

manager of the Sheffield, Alabama, social security office.

Many people who attain age 65 do not contact the social security office to file a claim for benefits because they do not have a birth certificate.

Mrs. Temple explained that any person who believes he is eligible for benefits should come to the office as soon as he reaches 65 in order to find out about his rights under the law. In some cases a person may lose benefits by waiting more than 12 months after he attains age 65.

The Social Security Administration requires that the correct date of birth be established. In general, the older the evidence the more valuable it is.
