of the electric systems are not properly

very expensive in the long run.
A system is constructed that is
adequate for the needs, it will give
many years of trouble free service.
If you are contemplating installing
a new electric system, I will be glad
to come to your place and deter-
mine for you the proper location,
type and amount of disposal field
necessary.

adequate facilities that you see him
at his earliest convenience. He
will be happy to assist you.

1937 Law Ordering Election To Ban Beer
In County Is Declared Illegal By Judge

HEMAN CHILDS CASE
IS ONLY FELONY IN
THIS COURT TERM

Herman Childs, who is charged
with the murder of Bilbo Childs,
his first cousin, is standing trial
this week. Proceedings on this
case got underway Wednesday
morning with most of the day be-
ing consumed in the selection of
a jury. By mid-afternoon State
witnesses were being heard.

The tragedy occurred on Sunday
afternoon, May 24, 1953, when
Bilbo Childs was killed with a
shotgun blast supposedly fired by
Herman Childs. Witnesses, testify-
ing Wednesday afternoon, set the
time of the murder at about 5:45
or 6 o'clock, and the place as
being in the home of Herman
Childs. Attorney Joe Byrd Mitchell
of Corinth is Childs' attorney and
J. O. Clark is assisting District
Prosecuting Attorney Sweat and

Virgil Ledbetter Acquitted On
Charge Of Possessing Beer

County Attorney Harry Rhine.
This is the only felony in this
term of court.

Court adjourned Wednesday
night about seven-thirty after hear-
ing all of the eight state witnesses
and 3 of the defense witnesses.
The case will probably consume
the greater part of Thursday.

Other minor cases heard by the
court this week was Bill Bolton
charged with possessing Whiskey,
acquitted. Eugene Boyd, negro,
pleaded guilty to a charge of grand
larceny (stealing batteries from
Harvey Honeycutt), and is await-
ing sentencing. This charge car-
ries a penitentiary sentence. Oth-
er minor cases have been heard
with pleas of guilty being turned
in on most.

CASE IS BEING
APPEALED TO
SUPREME COURT

A 1937 order of the Board of
Supervisors of Tishomingo County
came into the spotlight in Tues-
day's session of Tishomingo Coun-
ty Circuit Court.

An order of the Board in 1937
stated that an election banning
beer had been held in the county
according to law. However, it was
brought out, in the trial of Virgil
Ledbetter vs. the State of Missis-
sippi on a charge of possession of
beer by Mr. Ledbetter, that the
order of the Board of proof of
publication of the notice of elec-
tion was not adjudicated. In other
words, the final order of the Board
concerning the beer election in
1937 does not meet with rulings
of the Supreme Court which, a-
mong other things, states that the
law for properly advertising such
elections must be included in the
Board's final order.

Judge Raymond T. Jarvis, who
is holding Circuit Court in this
county this week, agreed with the
defense and ordered that the de-
fendant be acquitted by the jury.
Mr. Ledbetter repossessed his
beer which had been in possession
of the Sheriff's office since early
in the year. Defense attorney was
Donald Franks of Booneville.

District Prosecuting Attorney N.
S. (Soggy) Sweat said that the
case was being appealed to the
Supreme Court and that it would
not be settled until it was heard
by and passed upon by that author-
ity. Judge stated in open court that
it was the opinion of the court
that the situation could be remedi-
ed by a new order approved and
entered by the Board of Super-
visors in the minutes of its next
meeting.

County Schools
To Close For
Six Weeks

County schools that have been
in session for seven or eight weeks
are beginning to close for the six
weeks period that is used each
fall for cotton picking.

Tishomingo and Belmont schools
will close on Friday, August 31
and will begin the fall session
on October 15.

Burnsville and Holcut schools
will close on Friday September 7
and take up again on October 22.

Bale Of Cotton
Ginned August 17

Cotton ginning season is here

1340 lbs. of seed cotton and the

bales of cotton ginned in Iuka
this year.

The first bale ginned at Tish-
omingo weighed 451 lbs. This
was on August 25. Z. B. Osborn,
owner, received a nice premium
from the merchants of Tishomin-
go.

O. M. Hodges of Leedy was the
first to have a bale ginned at
Burnsville. This bale was finish-
ed on August 29.

Becoming Effective September 1By Mary King Temple (Manager
of the Sheffield Social Security
Office)

Some important changes have been made in the old-age and survivors insurance program as a result of the Social Security Amendments of 1955 which President Eisenhower signed into law on August 1st.

All of the changes, directly or indirectly, affect our people as a whole. Working persons—employed and self-employed—need to know about them; their families need to know about them. I realize that it is part of my job as district manager for the Social Security Administration in this area to explain these changes in the law. I hope to achieve this in part through this series of articles.

In the articles to follow I shall describe the changes singly and in detail; today, I shall restrict myself to a summary of the three most important changes designed to strengthen this Federal insurance system which provides par-

tial protection against loss of earned income upon the retirement or death, and now—under certain conditions—upon—the total disability of the worker.

Effective with September of this year, benefits will become payable to women when they reach age 62. Survivors benefits for widows and, in certain cases, mothers of deceased workers will start with a payment for November which will be received early in December. The amount of the monthly payment will be the same that would have started getting at age 65 under the old law. Beginning with November 1956, retired insured women workers and wives of retired insured workers can start getting benefit payments at age 62. In these cases, the amount of the payment will be some what less than the amount that would have been payable at age 65 under the old law.

A change has been made in the total disability provision in the law. While the "disability freeze" provision which protects the

social security insurance rights of workers is continued, monthly cash benefit payments beginning with July 1957, will be made to totally disabled workers when they reach age 50. Beginning with January 1957 monthly benefits are now payable to a disabled unmarried child, even after the child has reached age 18, if the child was disabled since before he reached 18 and is the dependent child of a retired or deceased parent, step-parent, or adopting parent who is eligible for old-age insurance benefits under social security, or was insured for the purpose of survivors benefits at the time of his or her death.

Other important changes in the law affect farmers, both employed and self-employed. While there have been no changes in old-age and survivors insurance benefits rates, there are changes in the way benefits can be figured and the time necessary to become insured for payments. The latter provision is of special importance to persons whose kind of work is now covered by social security as of January 1, 1956. Newly-covered groups are lawyers, dentists, chiropractors, veterinarians, naturopaths, osteopaths, & optometrists. Other recent legislation provides for the extension of social security on a permanent contributory basis after 1956 to members of the armed services on active duty.

Some of the changes I have mentioned are retroactive to the beginning of 1956, others will become effective as of November of this year; still other changes will not go into effect until January 1, 1957; and one does not become effective until July 1, 1957.

In my next article I shall discuss the newly-covered professional groups and explain the steps they must take to have their earnings curity credit under the amended correctly reported for social security.

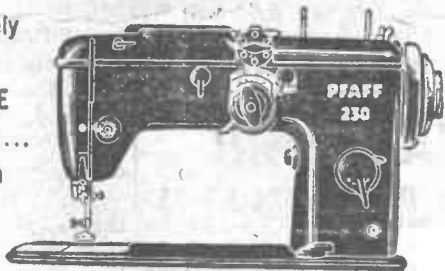

ANALYSIS OF 1956 DEMOCRATIC PARTY PLATFORM

Candidate Planks Often Discarded Or Forgotten Following The Election

Political platforms, of course, designed primarily to get votes of the balmy days of the New Fair Deals.

Big "Give-Away" Promised
If it is implemented within the next four years, the nation could experience what is perhaps would be the biggest governmental "take" and "give-away" in history.

Here is a rundown of the major issues, and how the platform would resolve them:

Civil Rights—Force is eschewed, but the party would have the federal government take whatever action might be deemed necessary to "de-segregate" public schools. It would also seek to guarantee

"full rights" to vote, and to engage in gainful occupations, and pledges elimination of "illegal discriminations of all kinds."

The plank does not go as far as Mixiecrats would like. Neither is it acceptable to most southerners. It commits the party to a policy of increasing interference in the domestic affairs of the states.

Pledges Taft-Hartley Repeal

Aid To Education—The party is committed to federal aid for school construction. The plank says it would be done without federal control, but Mississippians and other southerners know the history of such efforts. Again, the platform asserts the "rights" of access to publicly supported institutions, regardless of race, national origin or place of residence.

Labor—Complete repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act is urged. This would sweep away the provision under which Mississippi and 15 other states now have right-to-work laws.

Minimum wages for workers in firms engaged in interstate commerce would be increased from \$1 to \$1.25 per hour. The party advocates a return to the Wagner Act and the Norris-La Guardia Anti-Injunction Law, under which the power of unions expanded during New Deal days.

Public Power—In essence, the platform decries any effort to restrict an expanding system of public power. It urges construction of more hydroelectric and

steam-generating facilities for the Tennessee Valley Authority and would "preserve and strengthen the public power yardstick in power developments under TVA, REA, Bureau of Reclamation, Bonneville, Southeastern and Southwestern Power Administrations."

100 Percent Farm Parity

In addition, the party would have the government build more atomic power plants to promote "the widest possible use of electric energy at the lowest possible cost."

This can be interpreted to mean that the national Democratic party, if returned to control in November would embark upon a program of reserving to Washington the development of atomic power in quantity for both civilian and military use.

Agriculture—The platform promises the farmer will have little or nothing to worry about. The goal is 100 percent of parity for basic commodities. This, of course, is a vote-getting plank with some merit, because it's fact that agriculture is the only major segment of American life that does not have the economic protection, under law, that is given labor, such as wage-hour provisions and industry, as in import restrictions.

Moreover, under the platform's natural resources plank, the farmer would have access to more governmentally-manufactured fertilizers. He would be given an opportunity to joined governmentally-sponsored, tax-free cooperatives. He would get more credit and be insured such services as rural electricity and telephones.

Public Welfare—This plank was originally captioned, "Human Rights." Extension of social security with increasing benefits more unemployment insurance, federal financing of medical services, more public housing for middle-income families and aged persons—there and many other so-called "benefits" are promised.

Pledge Small Business Aid

Free Enterprise—The platform's emphasis is upon turbing of "big business" and restrain upon "monopolies." For example the free enterprise plank attacks the size of unidentified "giants" in the automobile industry, and promised to protect 40,000 automobile dealers from big manufacturers.

Free enterprise in the platform is equated with small business. The party promises small business men tax relief, long and short-term credit at reasonable rates, and an arbitrary sward of more military procurement and government contracts.

Veterans—In a word, more money is promised for veterans. More and better hospital facilities, pensions for disabled and economically-distressed veterans and extension of the current law to enable veterans to buy homes and farms through the federal loan program are pledged.

The party also promises, if rewarded in November, to spend on a variety of activities, from recreational facilities to conservation of land, water, energy and minerals.

Without doubt, these planks mean more government spending and further exercise of federal power and control.

The financial policy plank recognizes that all these services will cost money, but contends "a fully expanding economy" can yield adequate tax revenues to finance the spending.

Termed Federal "Obligations"

In any event, the plank implies, the government cannot escape what it calls the "obligations of government."

As far as tax matters are concerned, the platform is brief and vague, calling only for "realistic tax adjustments." These are inferentially defined as lower taxes for small, independent businesses and small individual taxpayers. That and nothing more, except the corresponding inference of the corollary that taxes on big business and the big individual taxpayer must be higher.

In the field of foreign policy, the platform denounces the Republicans for a "drifting" policy which assertedly has cost the U. S. world leadership, weakened the United Nations and our friendship abroad.

Yet the plank offers few new suggestions, merely contending, in effect, the Democrats can handle foreign relations better than the Republicans. It pledges more support for the UN, development of regional alliances, such as NATO, within UN framework, support for "effective" disarmament, more production to offset communist capacity, more economic and technical assistance and freedom for captive nations.

On the specific side, the Democrats urge self-determination for Cyprus (but not at the price of Western exclusion from the island), economic assistance for both Israel and the Arab states, "suitable" international control of the Suez Canal, defensive weapons for Israel to offset Communist arms for Egypt, and elimination of immigration policy which admits aliens to the U. S. under quotas based upon national origin.

Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver, the Democratic standard-bearers, view the 1956 platform as one which they can successfully stand.

In retrospect, away from the heat and passions of the convention, it appears designed more to provide room for almost everybody under the Democratic tent, except conservatives—and they, too, might find room if they are willing to accept the sugar-coating on the bitter pills offered them.

Reasons For Revocation And Extension Of Drivers License Listed

Commissioner of Public Safety Scarbrough today warned that under the new law calls for the extension and suspension of drivers licenses for several offenses including drunk driving.

The following convictions result in mandatory revocation of driving privileges: (1) manslaughter or negligent homicide resulting from the operation of a motor vehicle, (2) driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or a narcotic drug, (3) any felony in the commission of which

a motor vehicle is used, (4) failure to stop and render aid as required under the laws of the state in event of a motor vehicle accident resulting in the death or personal injury of another, (5) perjury or wilful making of a false affidavit or statement under oath to the department under this act or under any other law relating to the ownership or operation of motor vehicles, and (6) conviction, or forfeiture of bail not vacated, upon three (3) charges of reckless driving committed within a period of twelve (12) months."

Commissioner Scarbrough stressed that conviction on any one

of the above violations necessitates mandatory revocation. He added suspension in that the latter is not necessarily mandatory but that action is left to the discretion of the commissioner.

Section 8107 as amended authorizes the commissioner to suspend the license of an operator without preliminary hearing upon a showing by its records or other sufficient evidence that the licensee:

- (1) Has committed an offense for which mandatory revocation of license is required upon conviction.
- (2) Has been involved as a driver in an accident resulting in the death or personal injury of another or serious property damage.
- (3) Is an habitually reckless or negligent driver of a motor vehicle.
- (4) Has been convicted with such frequency of offenses against traffic regulations governing the movement of vehicles as to indicate a disrespect for traffic laws and a disregard for the safety of other persons on the highways.
- (5) Is incompetent to drive a motor vehicle.
- (6) Has permitted an unlawful or fraudulent use of such license.
- (7) Has committed an offense in another state which if committed in this state would be grounds for suspension or revocation.

Operation of a motor vehicle has been held to be a privilege, not an inalienable right. Each driver owes to society the safe operation of his vehicle; failure to respect the safety and well being of others denies to the negligent operator the privilege to drive, Commissioner Scarbrough points out.

To revoke or suspend a person's driving license might seem a drastic step to some; however, traffic rules and regulations must be observed if Mississippi highways are to remain safe.

"The irresponsible driver," he concluded, "must be dealt with. He must realize, as do all conscientious citizens, that for the sake of all, each of us must drive carefully."

20,000 Miss. Drivers Licenses Expiring Between March And June 1956 Have Not Been Renewed

The Mississippi Highway Patrol drivers license division reveals that more than 20,000 Mississippi drivers licenses which expired in March through June of this year have not been renewed.

According to Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough, many persons holding invalid operators licenses may be doing so unaware that their licenses have expired.

It is urged that all drivers periodically check the expiration date recorded on the front of each license, and renew the license prior to its expiration date.

L. E. Birdsong, director of the Patrol drivers license division, states that notices of expirations are mailed to all motor vehicle operators prior to expiration. He pointed out, however, that many persons change addresses frequently, and some expiration notices are returned by postal authorities.

Mississippi law requires that no person will operate a motor vehicle upon the public streets and highways of the state of Mississippi without first securing an operator's license. This permit must be renewed promptly; any person operating a motor vehicle without a valid operator's permit in his or her possession is doing so in violation of the law.

Alfalfa Products Good Hay Yields In Station Tests

State College, Miss.—Alfalfa has proved to be a dependable hay crop in tests conducted at the Brown Loam Branch Experiment Station at Oakley.

Robert E. Coats, agronomist at the Station says:

"Alfalfa makes good growth during the late winter and spring months, affording several good hay crops before crabgrass begins to invade the crop. It is more dependable than most of our grasses and legumes because most of its growth is made early before summer droughts. Alfalfa requires a higher level of fertility than most hay crops. High rates of lime (on acid soil) phosphate, potash, and possibly borax are essential for maximum production and maintaining a stand. Alfalfa hay is of highest quality and can be sold at a premium."

No additional seed have been required to maintain the stand during the three years since the test was established. While only one harvest was made the first year, three were made each succeeding year.

Among the varieties tested Buffalo led in 1955 with 4 1/2 tons of dry hay per acre followed by Narragansett and Dupuits. Leading varieties in '56 were Williams-
