Money raised by the sale of these pullets will be used to purchase chicks for the members of the 4-H club poultry chain for the coming year. The public is invited to attend this sale.

FOREST FIRE CONFERENCE TO BE HELD
AT EDWARDS HOTEL, SEPTEMBER 14

Several hundred Mississippians will attend the Mississippi Forest Fire Prevention Conference at the Edwards Hotel, 10:00 a.m. Friday, September 14, to hear the facts on forest fires laid bare; to discuss developments of effective ways and means for our citizens to combat the steady and needless drain by forest fire damage on our natural resources.

The keynote of the Conference will be education of the small percent of Mississippians who were responsible for the 20,000 wild forest fires that burned over three quarters of a million acres of Mississippi timberland in 1955. Because wood-using industry cannot continue to prosper unless it has raw material, damage to growing timber must not continue every year as it was in 1955 when forest fires struck down three and three-quarter million dollars worth of

Pink boll worms were found on a cotton stalk being carried from Whorton, Texas to Illinois by a motorist, as Inspectors of the State Plant Board were checking vehicles entering Mississippi over the Greenville Lake Village bridge. Inspector L. B. Davis said it was "the first living pink boll worms we have found since the inspection went into effect." There is a quarantine against them twelve months a year, and inspectors are located at the bridge during the cotton season to check incoming cars.

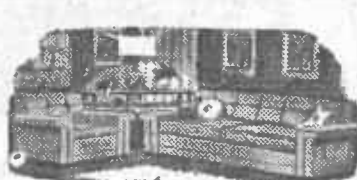

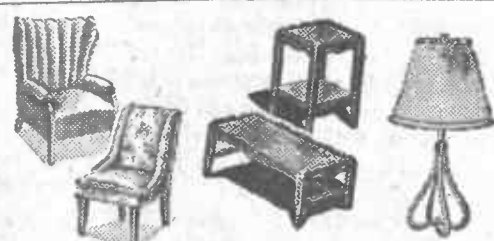

September is Better Breakfast Month.

And what more appropriate time than the month that school starts. Let's every mother in Tishomingo County make a 1956 School Resolution: My children will eat a good breakfast each morning before they go to school.

Research proves that breakfast skippers aren't as alert and efficient during the late morning hours.

Breakfast should provide a fourth to a third of the day's total food requirements and make a good contribution of most essential nutrients. It should include basic foods as fruit, cereal, milk, bread and butter. They are the foods on which a breakfast of any size may be developed.

Growing Poinsettias Indoors

A mimeographed sheet giving pointers on growing poinsettias indoors is available at your home agent's office. It was prepared by Henry J. Smith, assistant Extension horticulturist at State College.

It includes facts on use of poinsettias as cut flowers, good potting mixtures of soil, rooting and temperatures.

"No Smoking"

When cooking fat begins to smoke, it's too hot. It's breaking down chemically, and most likely will affect the taste of the food being fried.

To test the fat, drop a couple of small bread cubes into it. When the fat is just right, it will fry a small cube of bread to golden brown in 60 seconds.

That's just the right temperature for frying raw foods.

If the food already has been cooked, you want the fat hotter—hot enough to brown the bread cube in about 40 seconds.

Rice Muffins

Rice is a popular—and just now a plentiful food. If you are looking for a new or different way to use this good grain food in your family meals, here is an unusual one. It's a good way to use left-over cooked rice, too.

For 6 or 7 medium-sized muffins, you need: 1 cup flower; 2 tablespoons sugar; 2½ teaspoons baking powder; ½ teaspoon salt; 1 egg, beaten; 1/4 cup milk; 1-1/2 tablespoons melted shortening; 2/3 cup cooked rice.

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Combine egg, milk, melted shortening and cooked rice. Add milk mixture to dry ingredients and mix only enough to moisten dry ingredients. Fill greased muffin tins 2/3 full of this mixture. Bake at 375 degrees F (moderate) for 20 to 25 minutes.

These muffins, hot and buttered, are good with fruit jam or jelly. They have an unusual color and texture contrast provided by the white rice in the yellow batter.

Floor Seals

A penetrating floor seal serves as a filler and a finish at the same time. A filler is not necessary.

The seal doesn't darken wood as much as oil, is easy to apply and durable. It is especially suited to floors that will get hard wear.

Two coats—or sometimes three—are usually all needed. For best results follow the directions on the container.

NEW STATE PARK FACILITIES PROMISE TO SET NEW RECORDS

With the opening of two new parks at Grenada Lake on 15th, Mississippi's 13 state parks are expected to attract an estimated 800,000 vacationers in 1956, a 100,000 increase over 1955.

The two new parks are the White State Park for white and the new Carver State Park for colored people, both on popular Grenada Lake in North Mississippi. The White State Park boasts modern duplex cabins with everything furnished but bath. It has a large rustic, comfortable lodge, complete with dining and conference rooms and a dance floor. The park has docks and boats for rent, picnic areas and other modern recreational facilities. Reservations already are being received by the State Board of Park Supervisors.

Carver Point Park will have a lodge of the same size and design as that at White State Park, and will have four group buildings capable of caring for 100 persons. Boats also will be available.

Both parks have access to the Grenada Reservoir for fishing and excellent fishing. The White State Park on the north shore, with 9 vacation cabins expected to be reactivated in 1956.

May every one of the parks have comfortable overnight cabins, electric refrigerators and modern ranges, swimming pools, picnic areas, play areas, nature trails. All but two group camp facilities for care of summer encampments and various other large groups.

But one of the parks have house facilities, and all but one have boat rentals and fishing. The White State Park in North Mississippi is the only park on a lake, but has a large swimming pool for bathers. One of the thirteen have centrally located lodges for meeting and group recreation. Nine have softball diamonds, four tennis courts, and one a skating rink.

Most every one of the existing parks has undergone extensive improvements in recreational facilities, and the opening of accommodations.

Clark State Park, 19 miles south of Meridian on U. S. Highway 45, a sand beach has been constructed to accommodate swimmers per day, a bathhouse has been added, and the park is being developed to provide better facilities.

Clark has 10 improved vacation cabins, a 65-acre lake, fishing, picnic areas and playgrounds.

Improvements at Holmes State Park, 8 miles south of U. S. Highway 51, a new sand beach, a new camp which will accommodate 100 boys and girls, and six table cabins, bath house, fishing, and playground.

By Percy State Park, 4 miles west of Hollandale, has a improved swimming pool, bath house, 6 remodeled cabins, a new group building to care for 80 boys and new picnic tables. The separate group camp building will accommodate 100 persons.

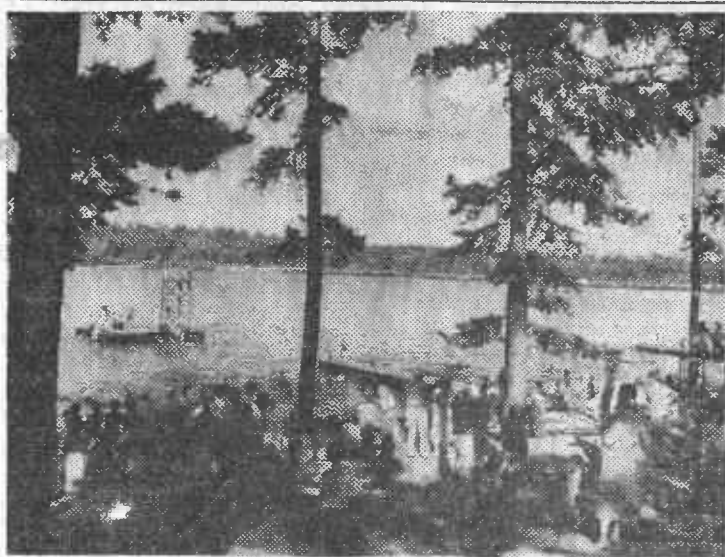
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Mississippi's 13 state parks are expected to attract an estimated 800,000 visitors during the coming year. Week-end scenes like this are becoming increasingly more commonplace.

groups of 160 people. This park has all recreational facilities except tennis courts and a skating rink.

Percy Quin State Park, 6 miles southwest of McComb on Highway 48, is Mississippi's largest and one of its most beautiful parks. It has 17 vacation cabins which have recently been repaired, a beautiful lodge, large recently improved group camp facilities for 200 people, and a beautiful 621-acre lake.

Roosevelt State Park, 4 miles south of Morton off U. S. Highway 80, has 11 newly remodeled vacation cabins, a new sand beach and access paved road to a modern bath house, two black top lighted tennis courts, and improved picnic area with new tables and fire pits. The park, with a 100-acre lake, has an excellent lodge and group camp facilities for 200 persons. The lake has been fertilized to assure improved fishing.

Sardis Lake State Park, 9 miles east of Sardis off U. S. Highway 51, was opened during the past two years and has proved one of the most popular vacation spots in the state. The park boasts 10 duplex cabins of modern design, a beautiful lodge, a sand beach, floating docks for privately owned boats, fishing boat rentals, and picnic areas. Shelby State Park, 12 miles south of Hattiesburg on U. S.

Highway 49, also is a relatively new park, having been activated since World War II. It has 12 brick vacation cottages, recently improved group camp accommodations for 300 persons, and a 300-acre scenic lake for swimming and fishing. Plans are now being proposed for a new lodge.

Spring Lake State Park, located on Miss. Highway 7 six miles south of Holly Springs, has 6 comfortable cabins, a lodge, a beautiful spring-fed lake, and excellent swimming, fishing and picnic facilities. Future plans call for organized group camp facilities.

Tishomingo State Park, one of the most scenic in the state, is located on Miss. Highway 25 south of Iuka. Its accommodations include 12 cabins, a group camp which has recently been refurbished to care for 100 to 120 persons, a large swimming pool and picturesque nature trails and picnic areas with new picnic tables.

Tombigbee State Park, 6 miles southeast of Tupelo, on U. S. Highway 78, has a 100-acre lake surrounded by 10 modernized vacation cottages, a group camp, a new decorated spacious lodge, a picnic shelter, and excellent swimming and fishing. Future plans call for paved roads, improved and developed playgrounds, and additional cabins and a lodge dining room.

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Both parks have access to the Grenada Reservoir for fishing and excellent fishing. The White State Park on the north shore, with 9 vacation cabins expected to be reactivated in 1956.

Record Enrollment At Iuka Schools For First Four Days Of 1956-57 Yr.

In the elementary grades, 292 students are enrolled with 35 in the first grade; 67 in the second; 53 in the third; 45 in the fourth; 51 in the fifth and 41 in the sixth.

In the high school 285 students are enrolled with 30 in the seventh grade; 50 in the eighth; 72 in the ninth; 51 in the tenth; 42 in the eleventh; and 40 in the twelfth.

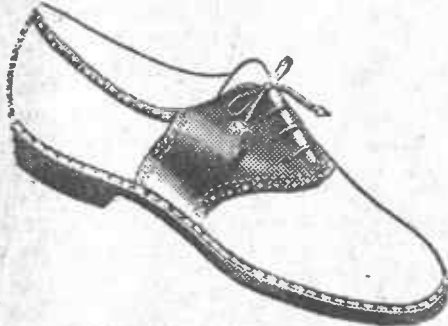

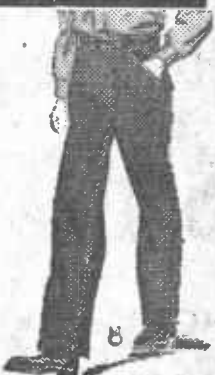

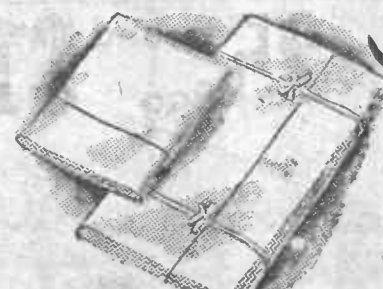

Why Men Fight
Lesson for September

S. Official Explains Child-Labor w Applying To Farmers

When the new Fall school term begins in September, every commercial farmer and grower whose crops move in interstate commerce directly or indirectly, will be subject to the child-labor provisions of the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act.

The complete change in the legal status of employment of children in agriculture the day local schools open was explained here today by Louis F. Provine, supervisor of the U. S. Labor Department's Wage and Hour Division in Mississippi.

"This law exempts growers of agricultural and horticultural products from its \$1.00 minimum wage and overtime provisions, but it specifically prohibits employment of children under 16 years of age in agricultural occupations during hours school is in session in the school district in which they reside while working," Mr. Provine said.

"In other words, children of any age may be employed on the farm by the grower in the planting, cultivating, harvesting or handling of agricultural products during

vacation periods, on weekends and before and after school. The grower may use his own children in agricultural work at any time and at any age on his own farm.

"Please note the fact that these are federal restrictions. Each of the 48 states now has a child-labor law of its own. Growers should consult with state officers, local school attendance officials or study these laws to determine their provisions. When the State child-labor standards are higher than those of the federal law, the State law should be observed.

"The federal regulation requires that each grower subject to it have on file for each employee under 18 a record showing his full name, date of birth, the home address and the local address if the minors are employed on days when school is in session."

Primary purposes of both federal and state child-labor laws, according to Mr. Provine, are the protection of our children from exploitation and to encourage them to stay in school and obtain the education that will make them better citizens of tomorrow.

Here are the steps Mr. Provine said the commercial grower should take to protect himself from unintentional violations:

1. Learn the requirements of both state and federal child-labor laws.

2. Do not employ or permit children under 16 to work in or about the farm or hothouse during hours school is in session.

3. Make sure the youth is of employable age and keep the required records for at least three years.

Mr. Provine emphasized that the federal law applies to all children, whether they reside in the area or are members of migrant worker families; also that the grower himself is held liable for any violations even though the underage children were hired and paid by a labor contractor or processor or others.

County Fair

Groom the best calf, select the best stalks of cotton and corn, encourage the housewife to bring out the best can of canned goods and exhibit them at the county fair. It's the showplace for farmers, help make it a success by doing your part.

Cotton Picking

Increase income by harvesting cotton the right way. Do not pick or gin cotton when damp—it lowers the grade, also income. This also applies to cotton that is harvested green. It will pay to wait until the cotton boll is full open before picking.

Have your ginners to cut samples for free Smith-Doxey Classing, whether you use the loan or not.

Timely Hints:

Now is the time to plant fall gardens; turnips, mustard, radishes, carrots, etc.

Put up sorghum silage when it reaches the dough stage.

Worm the hogs with cadum Oxide.

Spray the cows for lice. Clean and treat the corn crib for weevils.

Get rid of rats by using Warfarin.

Worm the hunting dog—it's not long till hunting season.

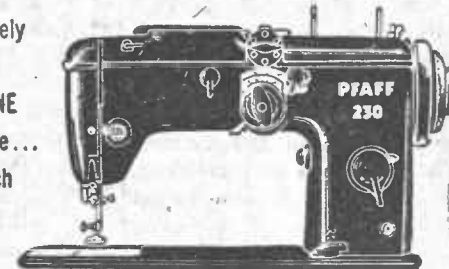

The man who carries the world on his back is the farmer. The farmer produces the basic commodities of life without which man cannot survive. We are all dependent upon the soil and its workers for our very lives.

Much has been written and said about farm surpluses. Without thinking many of us find ourselves believing that it would be a fine thing if there were, no farm surpluses. The truth of the matter is that our very civilization is a product of farm surpluses. Without farm surpluses there would be no cities. If those who till the soil never produced more than just enough food and fiber to meet the need of his family then everyone would have to till the soil.

Seventy-five years ago, 80 farmers with their new steel plows and reapers could provide for 100 persons. This made it possible for 20 to live in the cities. Today 17 farmers with their modern equipment can provide for themselves and 83 people who live in the city.

These surplus farm products are transported, processed, packaged, warehoused, wholesaled and retailed. They are the source of 40 per cent or more of all our commerce.

It is time we as Americans stop wailing and sobbing over our farm surpluses, and spend part of our time thanking our Creator, for having let us live in a land where

it is possible for them to exist.

Perhaps our captains of industry, our political leaders, our financiers, our economist in fact all our learned men and women would do well to turn their attention on the problem of distributing these so-called farm surpluses. Distributing them to the millions of poor and needy who are to be found in every nook and corner of America. Research may provide more and better paying jobs for these millions. Provide these poor with money to spend earned through fruitful labor, and they will spend it for food and clothes they badly need. If all Americans were properly fed and properly clothed would there be any farm surpluses? If all the rest of us were doing as good a job as the farmer America would be a lot better place in which to live. Let us determine now to stop howling about farm surpluses, rather let us all turn our attention to the use of these so-called surpluses in a way to make better citizens and further strengthen our economy.

The farmer was first and he must remain until the last in this land of ours. The land he tills supports us all. Each of us are dependent on it. For this reason we all share in the responsibility of caring for the soil. The District Commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District need your support as they direct a soil and Water Soil and Conservation program in Tishomingo county.

All the agricultural workers in Tishomingo county need your support, by all of us working together we can help ourselves by helping the man who stays on the land.

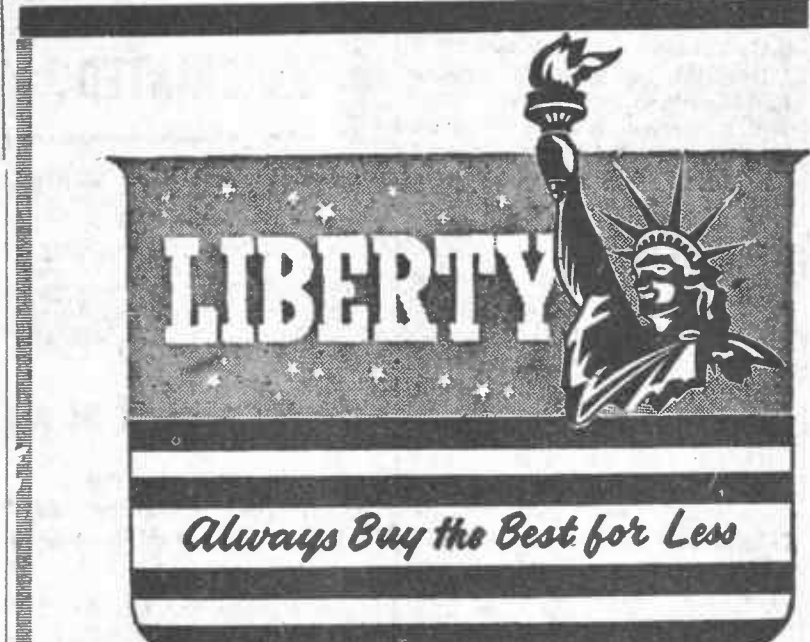
