Chmn. Sanders Highlights Soil Bank Program

The long-term part of the Soil Bank — the recently announced Conservation Reserve Program — is designed to divert land regularly used for crop production to conservation uses, according to Mack Sanders, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Mr. Sanders points out that the Conservation Reserve provides two kinds of payments: (1) for Cost-Sharing Assistance to farmers in making shifts from crop production to Conservation Practices, and (2) for annual payments on the land put under the program.

Mr. Sanders emphasized that the Conservation Reserve should not be confused with that other part of the Soil Bank—the Acre-

age Reserve—which makes a short term, direct attack on surpluses of basic crops by encouraging farmers to cut production of them below acreage allotments.

"The Conservation Reserve Program will be available for 1956 to farmers who are in a position to comply with its provisions and who enter into contracts with the Department on or before October 15th," Mr. Sanders said. "It is also available up to March 15, 1957, to farmers interested in contracts beginning in 1957."

To participate in the Conservation Reserve farmers must sign contracts with the Department of Agriculture through their County A.S.C. Committee. Generally, the minimum acreage that will be accepted under the program is 5.0 acres, but it can be as low as two acres if trees are planted. Special provisions are made for small farms.

Contracts range from 3 to 10 years, depending on whether or not a cover crop is established, or possibly up to 15 years in case trees are planted.

Highlights of the program stressed by Chairman Sanders are:

(1) Cost-Sharing payments for establishing conservation practices can range up to 80 per cent of the cost.

(2) Annual payment on the land put in reserve will be figured at a per-acre rate multiplied by the number of acres. The County Average rate is \$8.50 per acre.

(3) Both payments are made the year the practice is established. Annual payments will be made for the period of the contract, so long as the farmer complies.

(4) Violations of Conservation Reserve Contracts may result in cancellation and recovery of payments made under the contract. Wilful grazing or harvesting of the reserve acres may bring a civil penalty of 50 per cent of the payment for the year in which the violation occurs, in addition to loss of any payment that year.

Community meetings are being planned for the week of September 17, to give you more information of the Conservation Reserve Program, says Chairman Sanders.

Red Bay Man Burns To Death In Truck Crash Tuesday

One Other Hurt; New Truck And Load Of Groceries Total Loss

Harvey Sartin, 23, of Red Bay, Ala., was burned to death in a truck crash that occurred Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock midway between Golden and Red Bay.

Sartin, driving a Red Bay Wholesale Co. truck, was traveling west toward Golden when a milk truck owned and driven by Charles T. Neeley of Booneville, R-4, attempted to enter the highway in front of him. Sartin veered his truck to his left in an effort to miss

Neeley but the attempt was unsuccessful. The trucks crashed, Sartin's going into a ditch on his left, the bed of the truck going over the cab. A fire, fed by gasoline from the truck tank, started immediately and Sartin, being pinned helplessly between the steering wheel and windshield, burned to death.

For a very few minutes, according to residents nearby, Sartin called for help. Someone attempted to throw a bucket of water on the burning gas inferno which only served to spread the fire. After the water was thrown no more cries were heard from Sartin.

Neeley was carried to Weatherford and Dempsey clinic in Red Bay where he remained until Wednesday afternoon when he was released. He suffered severe cuts and bruises on his head and face; also body abrasions and lacerations. A charge of reckless driving has been placed against him. The crash was investigated by Highway Patrolmen Jack Anderson and Ira Pace, Jr., and Sheriff Whit Wilson.

Officers said estimated loss of the new grocery truck was \$4,500.00 and that \$1,400.00 worth of groceries were lost. Damage to Neeley's truck was estimated at \$500.00. He had no insurance.

Neeley operated a truck picking up milk from farmers and hauling it to Kraft milk plant in Booneville.

Final services for Sartin were held Wednesday afternoon from the Red Bay Baptist church. Among the survivors are his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. William Sartin, his wife, Sue Hamm Sartin, and two children, Gary Eugene, age 5, and Carol Sue, age 2. Hismith of Russellville, directed.

Sod Seeding Tests Show Good Results In Loam Area

State College, Miss.—Extensive tests of the practice of seeding winter growing crops directly into permanent pasture sod have been conducted for several years since the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station developed machinery suitable for this type of planting.

Recent tests at the Brown Loam Branch Station at Oakley have shown that cross-seeding wheat and ryegrass on the same area is more productive than seeding either alone. Grown together the crops are more dependable since drought, disease or cold may not damage both crops to the same extent.

Reporting on work done at the Brown Loam Station Agronomist Robert E. Coats said:

"The sod seeding machine can be used for seeding and fertilizing most commonly used pasture grasses and legumes. Millet has

produced satisfactory grazing when seeded in a small grain stubble relatively free of crabgrass or other rapid growing grasses. Wild winter peas drilled into a Bermuda sod have shown up exceptionally well.

"Sod seeding is a good practice on land where bogging, trampling, erosion, and water runoff are problems. Seeding and fertilizing can be completed with one trip over the pasture with one sod seeding machine.

"Generally, more hazards are encountered in sod seeded crops than crops planted on a prepared seedbed. Because of unpredictable long periods without rain and because of competition between the seeded crop and the permanent pasture plants the fall crop should not be seeded until Oct. Earlier plantings are successful if moisture is available.

"Sod seeded crops are not expected to yield as much as crops planted on a prepared seedbed but sod seeding offers an excellent opportunity for getting extra grazing, hay, or grain from pastures that would otherwise be unproductive during the winter."

Mr. Walter Whitfield continues ill in the Northeast Mississippi hospital in Booneville.

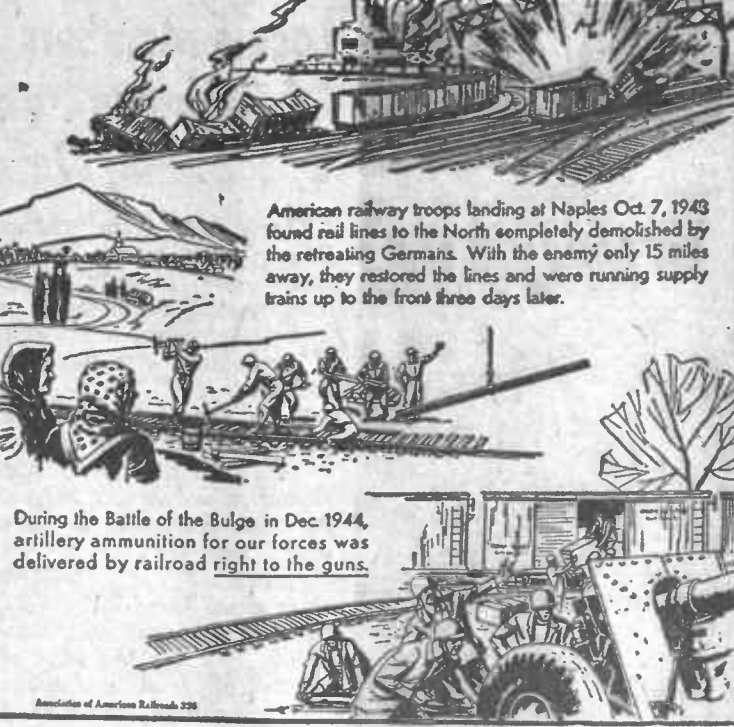

Have you discovered a short time after hanging new or freshly laundered white nylon curtains that they look greyish?

Does your plastic upholstery seem to be a constant dust catcher?

Here's one reason for this: Friction causes static electricity in synthetic fibers. This charge is slightly negative and dust has a positive charge. Thus, dust that is stirred up in a room is attracted to them, as iron is to a magnet.

Most manufacturers are solving this problem by using a permanent antistatic finish.

To eliminate the dust-catching habits of your nylon curtains or plastics that do not have this fin-

ish, add a few drops of vinegar to the rinse water when washing. The vinegar acts as an anti-static solution and eliminates the attraction for dust.

Year-Round Gift Giving

Birthdays... showers... anniversaries... these and many more occasions make gift giving a year-round activity.

As you plan a gift, remember it doesn't have to be "store-bought" to be a good one. One that you make may fit the person lots better.

Think of the individual's occupation, personality, age and where he lives. Pieces from the scrap bag, or even the rag bag, may give you the answer to a gift problem.

Think how a child would love a stick horse made from a broom stick, with head made from an old felt hat or heavy material. Or a cloth book made from a solid piece of material. Stitch together like pages and paste on favorite pictures or textile-paint animals on each sheet.

For the person who travels make shoe bags from gingham or plastic; sewing kits from old felt hats or small pieces of leather; soft scruffs from felt, terry cloth or soft leather.

For the person who likes to cook give aprons of all kinds; a recipe box made of a decorated cigar, soap or other heavy box; a knife rack or rack to hold other utensils made of a square of peg board and finished with molding for hanging over a stove or near a cabinet.

Shut-ins like potted plants in containers you can make or decorate; a tray cloth with a man-sized bib; a scrapbook of poems, a lap-board made of plywood or a bird-feeder for outside the window.

And don't forget the gift possibilities on your pantry shelves or in your freezer.

Stain Removal

Almost any of the stains that the children get on their clothes at school or around the house can be removed at home. If you follow some simple rules for success.

1. Treat stains promptly—while they are fresh. Age, heat or both set many stains so they are hard or impossible to remove.
2. Know what fibers make up the fabric. Stain removers safe for one fabric may damage another.
3. Test the stain remover on

an inconspicuous part of the garment. A substance that takes out the stain may leave rings or fade colors.

4. Obtain reliable stain removal directions and follow them exactly.

5. Work carefully, patiently and quickly to avoid roughening or pulling the fabric out of shape.

For safety, read all information on labels of containers in which you buy stain removers and follow directions listed by the manufacturer.

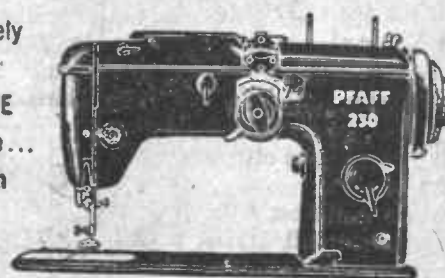

CONSERVATION RESERVE... is for ALL FARMS



All farm land regularly used to produce crops, including tame hay, is eligible for the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces. Farmers participating in the Conservation Reserve will sign contracts through County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committees to shift land from production to conservation uses. Contracts will be for 3 or 5 years if the land already is in an approved cover crop; for 5 or 10 years if approved cover must be established; and for 10 to 15 years if trees will be planted. Up to 80 percent of the costs of conservation practices may be paid by the government. In addition, annual payments on the land will be made during the life of the contract. Farmers also may participate in the Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve if they have allotments for wheat, corn, cotton, peanuts, rice, or tobacco.

200,000 Professional People Affected By Changes In Social Security

By Mary King Temple (Manager of the Sheffield Social Security Office)

In the first article of this series I outlined the most important changes in the old-age and survivors insurance program brought about by the 1956 amendments to the social security law. Today, I shall discuss the types of work brought under social security for the first time beginning January 1, 1956.

For taxable years ending after 1955, persons who work for themselves—alone or in partnership—as lawyers, dentists, chiropractors, veterinarians, naturopaths, osteopaths, and optometrists, started building old-age and survivors in-

surance protection for themselves and their families on the same basis as self-employed persons previously covered by the law. It is estimated that about 200,000 professional people are affected by this change in the social security law.

Lawyers make up the largest number of these newly-covered self-employed professionals. As long ago as 1948, it was estimated that 140,000 out of the probably 170,000 lawyers in the United States were self-employed. A great many of them came under social security as employees of other lawyers; others acquired military wage credits under social security during active service with the Armed Forces. In fact, it is estimated that at least 30 percent of all presently self-employed lawyers, at one time or another, have accumulated some earnings credits under the law.

Also brought under social security as of January 1, 1956, are an estimated 78,000 dentists actively engaged in private practice. This protection should be of special importance to a young dentist who is head of a family. Because of the length of time required to complete his professional training, his earning capacity in many cases does not commence as early in life as that of the average non-professional individual. Moreover, in starting his practice, he must furnish his office with expensive equipment and thereafter go through a period of low income before he is able to realize a reasonable return from his practice. If he has a wife and family, he is in need of the survivorship protection social security affords to a young widow and minor children during those years.

In my next article I shall explain the provision in the amended law which permits self-employed professionals and others brought under social security this year to disregard their years of non-coverage after 1950 in acquiring an insured status.

Business Activity Rose 10 Per Cent In Iuka During July Compared To 1955

Business activity in Iuka rose 10 per cent during July as compared with July 1955. Indicator changes were as follows: money orders issued, up 21 per cent; postal receipts, down 12 per cent; telephones in service, up 9 per cent; and city sales tax collections, no change.

Business activity in the Corinth district rose 11 per cent during July as compared with July 1955, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review (monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the school of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College).

District indicators showed the following increases: bank debits, 31 per cent; money orders issued, 5 per cent; postal receipts, 21 per cent; telephone in service, 8 per cent.

Corinth reported an increase of 10 per cent during July as compared with July 1955. Indicator changes were as follows: bank debits, up 13 per cent; money orders, issued, down 3 per cent; postal receipts, up 27 per cent; telephones in service, up 6 per cent; and city sales tax collections, no change.

In Booneville telephones in service increased 7 per cent during July as compared with July of last year.

Ripley reported an increase of 15 per cent in business activity during July as compared with July 1955. Indicator increases were as follows: money orders issued, 15 per cent; postal receipts, 14 per cent; and telephones in service, up 13 per cent.

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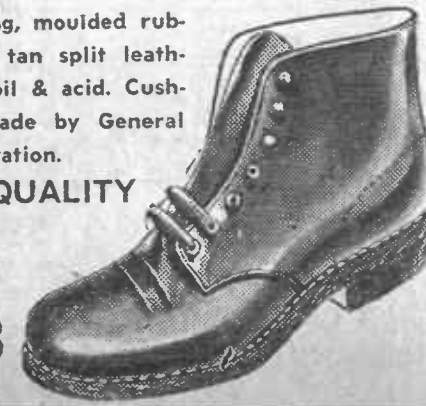
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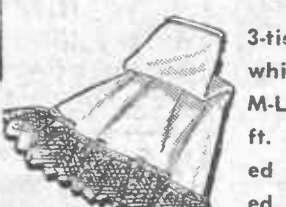

Persons Died In Auto Accidents Aug. 56 Compared To 51 In Aug. 55

Mississippi's August traffic toll was down, the second consecutive month that a decrease in deaths has been reported by Highway Patrol.

According to Commissioner of Safety Tom Scarbrough, 38 persons died in automobile accidents during August. Fifty-one killed in August 1955.

Accident records at headquarters show, however, that Mississippi's 1956 traffic toll continues to exceed the 1955 toll despite the decrease in deaths. The toll recorded in July and August, 1956, was 86 deaths, compared to 82 in July and August, 1955.

The toll stood at 326 killed, severe injuries and property damage in August 1955. The toll for August 1956 stands at 326 killed, severe injuries and property damage.

Officials still express hope that the death rate can be curbed. Traffic law enforcement has been ordered, and 40 new patrolmen have been employed by the Department of Public Safety to the Patrol up to its legal complement of 220 men.

Way Patrol district inspectors (the Patrol has 9 districts) have been told individually by

Chief of Patrol Bill Hood to step up enforcement in their respective districts. Emphasis was not restricted to a particular offense. "All hazardous violations" were cited by the Chief of Patrol.

Mississippi traffic accidents killed 547 persons during 1955, a near-record highway slaughter.
