TELEPHONE DIRECTORYS INDICATE AN INCREASE OF 100 PHONES IN AREA

A measure of the growth of Iuka and surrounding communities is the large increase in the number of telephone directories distributed last Friday to local subscribers.

Approximately 1,000 new directories are being delivered to homes and businesses, according to W. G. Hardin, local manager for Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, said compar-

ed with 900 when the last directory was delivered.

The new telephone directory has many new and changed listings and other helpful telephone information. It is easily distinguishable from the old gray-covered telephone book by its green cover. Enough new directories have been printed to supply every subscriber and to allow for future telephone expansion.

Mr. Hardin asked that the old directory be discarded and that the new one be used when looking up telephone numbers. This helps avoid the possibility of getting wrong numbers and saves time for both the calling and called parties. "Information" should be called only when the number is not listed in the directory.

Tree Farm Additions Lengthen
State Lead Over Rest Of Nation

Mississippi has tightened hold of its national Tree Farm leadership by adding 56 new Tree Farms embracing 39,150 acres.

New certifications, said John Tyler of Canton, chairman of the Mississippi Tree Farm Committee, gives the Magnolia State 966 certified Tree Farms and 1,895,015 acres of well-managed timberlands in the nationwide movement to grow timber as a crop.

While Georgia remains the leader in total Tree Farm acreage, Mississippi holds a comfortable promargin in the number of Tree Farm properties enrolled.

Of the 56 new properties certified, 32 are farm ownerships and 22 are investment Tree Farms. Two tracts are industrial Tree Farms.

"As knowledge of the value of timber products in Mississippi spreads, the number of people who join this forest conservation program for investment reasons goes up steadily," Tyler said.

"Extra funds for future college costs, augmentation of retirement income and just plain business investment were some of the reasons cited by new tree farmers for becoming active in the pro-

gram."

Tyler reported that one property in Leake county, owned by John D. Ivy, Carthage, had not had a fire in more than 25 years.

"This shows that Mississippi's woods can be protected," he said. "Each site is somewhat different, of course, but in 25 years land can go from tiny seedlings to well-developed trees, probably with several moderate harvests during that time."

After the hard use of summer, do you find you need to replenish your towel supply? A "yes," answer brings another question: "How many do I need for an adequate supply for my family?"

The answer is have six towels for each needed size and six wash cloths for each person in the household. This allows for two towels in use, two in laundry and two on the linen shelf.

Cooking Dried Fruit:

The days of overnight soaking of dried fruit are past. Most dried fruits can be cooked without soaking; simply follow the directions on the package. If you find the word "tenderized," it means that the fruits have been slightly pre-cooked after drying. They will require a shorter cooking period.

You'll find that dried fruit sold in bulk will be drier and harder than that sold in small lots. You will need to soak this fruit in warm water for about two hours or until the fruit is plumped.

Use dried fruit uncooked as a between meal snack. Children will like it because it gives them something to chew on.

Store dried fruits tightly covered in a dry, cool place.

Keeping Milk

To keep fresh milk at its best, keep it clean, cold, covered and in the dark. Milk holds both nutritive value and flavor best when kept cold. If you store it near the freezing unit of your refrigerator, you can expect it keep good quality and flavor for 3 to 4 days and maybe longer.

Take Your Medicine

None of us likes to take medicine, but if we've been sick enough for the doctor to prescribe medicine for us, we should take it. And take it according to his directions. If he said take it right after breakfast, you should take it then—not as an afterthought just before lunch.

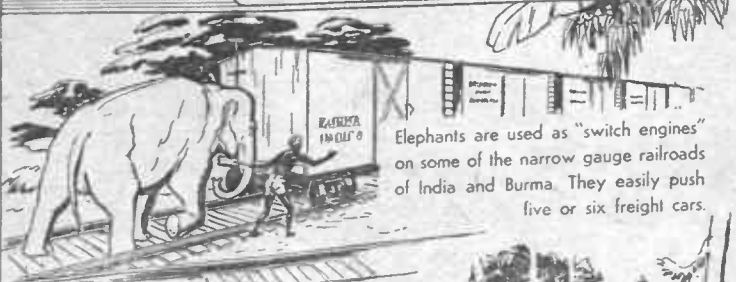
Your doctor had important reasons for telling you to take one kind of pill before meals, another right after meals or another first thing in the morning.

For example, some capsules have "built-in" mechanisms so they can produce delayed action, repeat action or controlled release over a certain period of time. Take the capsule at the wrong time and you may throw the whole schedule off.

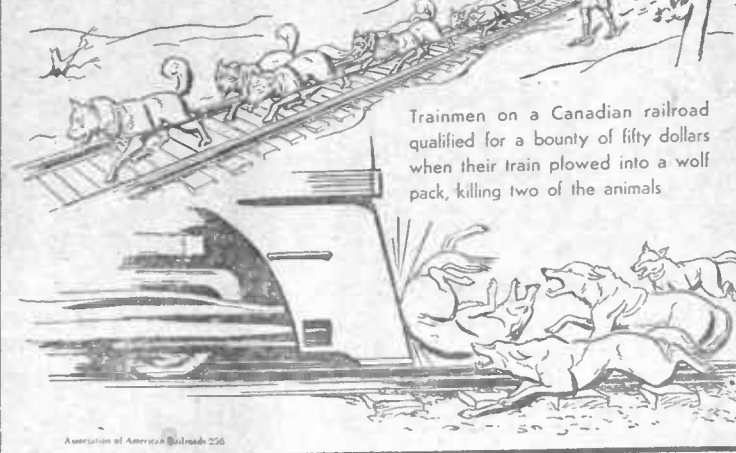
Certain drugs are more effective on an empty stomach. Others can be irritating to the stomach lining before meals—the reason the doctor specified they be taken immediately after a meal.

Benefit Payments Available To Some
Children After 18th Birthday

Under the old social security law, benefit payments to a child ended when the child reached age 18. For most children, this provision still holds. A change in the law, however, now provides for the payment of benefits under certain conditions to a disabled child after age 18 if the child became totally disabled before age 18.

To be eligible for child's benefits after age 18, the child must be unmarried, and be dependent on a parent, step-parent, or adoptive parent who is eligible for old-age insurance benefits, or who was insured for the purpose of survivors benefits at the time of his or her death. The mother of the child is also eligible for monthly benefit payments as long as she continues to have the disabled child in her care.

I say "child" because the child's benefit payments under this provision in the amended law are based

Boiled Custard Ice Cream

Whatever the time of year, ice cream is a favorite dessert. If you like to freeze your own in the refrigerator or in a home ice cream freezer, you will want to try this recipe. It makes one gallon if ice cream.

3 quarts sweet whole milk
Dash of salt
6 eggs
2-1/2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1 tablespoon vanilla
Scald milk in double boiler. Sift flour, sugar and salt together in large container. Add beaten eggs. Mix well. Gradually add milk to this mixture. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and coats spoon. Cover and cool.

On a disability which became total before the child's 18th birthday. However, the benefits continue indefinitely into adult years as long as the beneficiary remains totally disabled. Moreover, it is not necessary that the recipient of disabled child's benefits have any work record at all under social security in order to get these monthly payments.

In writing the provision for disabled child's benefits into the amended law, Congress gave recognition to a well-known fact. Disabled children are as dependent on their parents after attaining age 18 as before and therefore it was felt that it was important to fill this gap in the Federal insurance program by providing benefits for children who would not be able to support themselves.

We all realize the distressing and serious situation faced by people who have the care of a child who because of a mental deficiency never grows up, or who because of a physical impairment requires constant care throughout life. The concern of these parents is the more acute because they are constantly haunted by the spectre of uncertainty—what will happen to the child when the usual family income is cut off by the death or retirement of the family breadwinner.

Parents of children who are now disabled should get in touch with our social security office after September 1956. The first payments to disabled children 18 or over, whose disability became total before they reached age 18 will be for January 1957. However, no monthly payments for the child and for the mother with the child in her care will be lost if application for the benefits is made before the end of January 1958, because payments can go back as many as 12 months before the month in which an application is made.

In my next article, I shall describe provisions in the new law as they affect people who work and live on a farm.

Pasture Management

October is clover and legume planting month. It is also the time to sod seed oats or wheat for late winter and early spring grazing on permanent pasture sod.

In early October the second plant-

ing of small grains for winter grazing should be made on prepared land. Fertilizer should be put down at time of planting so that the oats will come up growing. Plant 100 pounds of grain and use 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

Crimson clover, white clover, red clover, winter peas and vetch can be planted during October.

Crimson will do well drilled with a sod seeder on thin hillside sods or planted with ryegrass or oats on cultivated land. It can also be planted with small grains.

For planting in rows with a sod seeder 10 pounds of seed to the acre is the recommendation. If broadcast with cereal or ryegrass, use 20 pounds of seed.

White clover is usually planted on Dallis, carpet, Bermuda grass sods. Three to four pounds is a good seeding rate. Planted with a sod seeder in rows is better than broadcasting on top of the ground with no preparation.

Red Clover is generally planted with oats or wheat. With oats or wheat, it can be sown on top of the ground and rolled in following drilling of the cereal.

Vetch does well planted in mixture with oats. Use 100 pounds of oats and 25 pounds of vetch per acre. This makes good winter and early spring grazing. The cows can be moved and a hay crop cut in late spring.

The best place for winter peas is on Bermuda sod. This is the best legume plant to use with Bermuda. The best way to get a good stand the first year is to use the sod seeder and cover the seed. If planted on potash and phosphate deficient land, put down 300 to 400 pounds per acre of 0-14-14 or 0-20-20 at time of seeding.

Dig your sweetpotatoes before the first killing frost arrives. If dug during warm, fair weather when the soil is dry, they will be easier to cure, store and grade for market.

Yellowing of the vines is the best indication that sweetpotatoes have stopped growing and are ready for digging.

Take care in digging to prevent cutting and bruising the potatoes. For digging potatoes, a large turning plow with rolling coulter properly set on the beam to cut the vines without damaging the sweet potatoes.

A tractor drawn or direct mounted 16 inch or 14 inch bottom plow is recommended. The land of the plow should be run far enough off center to turn the potatoes out to one side and to prevent cutting or bruising.

Handle the potatoes carefully. Do some field grading. Place the

potatoes carefully in a field—never toss into a wagon bed. Remove potatoes from field within an hour

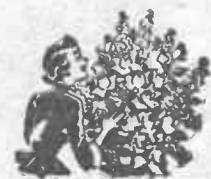

Farmers Urged To Have Proper Training On Vehicles During Harvest

Mississippi farmers are urged by Commissioner of Safety Tom Scarbrough to have proper training on moving unlighted tractors and other farm equipment along highways at night.

Scarborough, himself a farmer, cited the frequency of harvest-related mishaps involving tractors and farm implements as the reason behind his appeal. "I realize that many farmers have to work long after dark, hauling cotton to gin and corn and other crops; however, certain safety factors are not to be overlooked."

Scarborough said that farm accidents are sometimes triple, during harvest periods, statistics at the state patrol headquarters indicate a large number of these misadventures occur during fall months. According to the public safety commissioner, most could be prevented if farmer and motorist alike take a few extra precautions. "I don't want a farmer to be permitted to operate his tractor, wagon and so forth to be along state highways or on county roads at night unless the equipment is properly equipped. To do otherwise invites an accident."

Each person who operates a farm machine should be given training in handling and driving of equipment expertly although a driver's license is not required by law. No farmer should risk a novice or inexperienced hand upon the open highway alone in daytime or at night," Commissioner Scarbrough added.

It was pointed out that Mississippi law requires every farm vehicle using the highways within one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour after sunrise are required to have proper lights visible for at least 500 feet to the front and rear.

The Highway Patrol stressed that these provisions will be enforced. Mississippi's traffic death toll has already well-exceeded the 300 mark, and the grim prediction is that some 300 other persons may perish in state automobile accidents before 1956 ends.

Farm-auto accidents have contributed to this toll, although by no means are they alone responsible for the alarming increased death rate. The State Highway Patrol has already stepped up its traffic-safety enforcement program affecting truckers and motorists. The appeal for farmer cooperation only emphasizes the need for everyone's participation in the fight to curb highway accidents.

In concluding his appeal to farmers, Commissioner Scarbrough warned against the careless operation of implements in fields adjacent to highways; for instance, pulling onto the highway to turn around. This practice is all too common. No farm machine should be pulled onto a highway from a side road, or anywhere for that matter, until after the driver has looked carefully, making certain that the movement can be made safely.

Schools Flourish In Arab Countries



One of America's best exports to the Middle East—arranged without benefit of diplomats or statesmen—is its educational program, represented by fourteen colleges and schools operated by Americans throughout the Arab World.

The best known of these institutions is the American University of Beirut in Lebanon, founded by American missionaries in 1866 in a rented stone house, under the name of the Syrian Protestant College. Today, the little stone house has been replaced by fifty buildings on a 75-acre campus to serve a student body numbering more than 3,000 young men and women from 51 countries and twenty different religious sects.

This institution, which became a university in 1920, now boasts Schools of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Commerce, Engineering and Agriculture. With a faculty of 359 members, the University is now the largest American educational plant outside the continental United States.

On a campus adjoining the A.U.B. is the International College, which is affiliated with the university and serves as its preparatory school. The college has an elementary division, a preparatory division and a "section secondaire" which trains for the Lebanese and French baccalaureate and entrance to the sophomore class of A.U.B. Almost 1,400 students are currently enrolled.

In Egypt, the most important American institution is the American University of Cairo, located on three acres of land in the center of the Nile capital. Like its counterpart in Beirut, it brings together young students from all over the Middle East. Incorporated in Washington, D. C., in 1919, this university has five schools: arts and sciences, Oriental studies, extension division, education and social research.

There are two other American institutions in Egypt: The American College for Girls, with a student body of 800, and the Assuit College, with 445. In Lebanon, there are five additional American institutions: the American Schools for Boys and Girls in Tripoli, Near East School of Theology, Gerard Boys School and Beirut College for Women. The latter, which started out in 1924 with three students, now has an enrollment of 400 young women from all over the Middle East and a four-year liberal arts and science course.

Syria has two U.S. institutions, Damascus College and Aleppo College, and in Iraq Americans run the Baghdad College for Boys and the American School for Girls.

With education on the march throughout the Arab World, these American schools are prize assets in an area where trained leadership is valued highly.

Kenny Foundation Broadens Work In Treatment, Research Fields

Minneapolis, Minn.—Scientists, professors and department heads of leading medical schools across the country are cooperating in the expanding medical program of the Elizabeth Kenny foundation, according to Marvin L. Kline, national executive director.

The program, he explained, includes medical research, and the sponsoring of fellows and medical seminars and scholarship grants. The medical research program which the Kenny foundation is sponsoring at its own treatment centers and a number of universities across the country is not limited to the field of polio, but includes other neuromuscular disorders of various kinds, he asserted.

"Included on the medical advisory committee and planning committee set up by the Kenny foundation to help provide greater service," Kline said, "are doctors who are affiliated with the various departments of the following schools:

"University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minn.; Stanford university, Palo Alto, Calif.; University of California, Los Angeles, Calif.; New York university, New York City, N.Y.; Columbia university, New York City, N.Y.; Ohio State university, Columbus, Ohio; Baylor university (hospital), Dallas, Texas; Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn.; College of Medical Evangelists, Los Angeles, Calif.; McGill university, Montreal, Canada; Washington university, St. Louis, Mo.; University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wis.; University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Mich.; University of Illinois, Urbana, Ill.; Herman hospital, Houston, Texas, and Marquette university, Milwaukee, Wis.

"The Kenny foundation's expanding rehabilitation program offers help to persons of all ages who have nerve, muscle or joint disabilities which our medical staff believes may be lessened by such treatment."

The program of the Kenny foundation is made possible through funds contributed by the public.

'Come!'
Lesson for September 30, 1956

THE Bible has a way of expressing the most profound and far-reaching truths in the simplest possible way. "Come!" is a word of one syllable, and even a child knows what it means. But as we find it in the book of Revelation and elsewhere, a great deal is tied up in it and expressed by it.

Journey to God
This word, as a command, suggests first of all that man is not where he ought to be. He ought to be close to God. Some are not even turned toward him and are moving farther away every day. But even those whose faces are Godward, are never as close to him as is possible to be. God is everywhere, in one sense. That is, one does not have to travel to some distant shrine, some Holy City, to find God. And yet even among human beings we often feel how far we are from those sitting in the same room with us. And though God is all about us, we are blind to him. Spiritually we are feeding swine in a far country when we ought to be at home with God and in God. There are diseases in which the patient shivers with cold even in hot sunshine. So the diseased soul shivers with cold even in the full flood of God's radiant love. A patient with mind diseased looks unseeingly into the eyes of loved ones. How near—and yet how terribly far away! In our coldness of heart, our estrangement of mind, we hear—or can we hear?—the Voice say "Come!"

Who Says "Come?"
What voice is this? Two strange words appear: The Spirit and the Bride. Who are these? Spirit is God; the Bride is the Church. The Spirit is the New Testament word for God-close-at-hand, God-in-the-heart, God moving in heart and mind of dedicated men. The voice of the Spirit is the "still small voice" the prophet heard. It is the Spirit of God and the Spirit of Jesus. Would it not be enough for the Spirit to say "Come"? No, because God graciously chooses to speak also with human voices. The Bride is the Church; and the Church too says "Come." In all her services of worship and of teaching, in all her proclaiming of the eternal Word, in all her service to mankind, the Church says "Come." A church that does not have the atmosphere of welcome is no true church. A church that puts back bars that our Lord has taken down, a church that says "Come" to a select few and says nothing at all to the masses of men,—this is not true "Bride" of Christ. "The doors of this church are as wide open as the gates of heaven," say some church bulletins. If that is not true, whose fault is it?

Is Your Name Here?
Jesus once wept over a beloved city: How often I would have gathered you . . . but you would not! Christ can say, "I would; but you would not." But such is the graciousness of God that no man dare say, "I would; but God would not." The invitation of God has on it, so to speak, the name of every man who wants to write his name there. "Whoever will" includes everybody who wants to be included. There is no sense in saying, "I never have wanted to come to God, therefore the invitation is not to me." It is to you—but only if you will. Here in Revelation it is an invitation; in some other parts of the Word it is a command (e.g. "God commands all men everywhere to repent" (Acts 17:30).
The Choice is Your Own
God can do all things. He has not done "all" the things he could have done. He could, no doubt, have made men in such a way and of such a nature that not one person could ever possibly commit a sin, not one person could turn away a hair's-breadth from God. But he did not make such men. He could have made men such that if they ever strayed away from God all he would have to say was simply "Come!" and they would come back every one. But he did not make men so. God would rather be loved by men who do not have to love him than by creatures who would love him automatically and could not help it. God gave man the power to accept; but at the same time he gave man the power to refuse. "Let him come!" God does much for you; but he will not decide for you. God made the road home; he holds the door wide open; he sends the word, "Come!" but he leaves the coming to you, to each man.

There Is A Place For Pensacola Bahia Grass On Most Tishomingo Co. Farms

A few of the Tennessee River Conservation District Coopers have, during the past four years, planted small acreages to Pensacola Bahia grass.

Some of the things learned from serving these plantings of Pensacola Bahia are: 1. If good seed practices are followed it is possible to obtain a stand of Pensacola Bahia. 2. It appears to grow well

when seeded with a minimum amount of annual lespedeza, either common or kobe. Common lespedeza may prove more desirable because it is more certain to produce seed each year. 3. During the past four years Pensacola Bahia grass grown in Tishomingo County has withstood the cold weather. It appears to be able to stand as much as Dallis grass. 4. It is one of the

last grasses to die down in the fall and one of the first to green up, and start growing in the spring. 5. All kinds of livestock seem to relish it, and eat it well. 6. The better the land the better has been the Bahia grass, however, it will survive and grow on land too poor and dry to produce Dallis grass.

7. It will take a great deal of punishment and adapt itself to hot, cold, or dry weather. Bermuda appears to be the only grass equal to it in this respect. 8. One advantage Pensacola Bahia has over Common Bermuda is the fact it is not a pest and can easily be eradicated. 9. Fair growth of Pensacola Bahia grass has been obtained in stands of Sericea lespedeza. Those who desire this mixture seem to get best results where the Bahia grass and Sericea are planted at the same time. However, some have succeeded in establishing it in old sericea stands. 10. It makes a fair grade of grass hay. Mixtures of Bahia and annual lespedeza makes excellent hay. 11. On fertile damp land dallis grass is superior to Bahia. 12. On most of our open upland pastures, Pensacola Bahia may be the grass we need. It is certainly worth trying.

13. Like all perennial grasses Pensacola Bahia does not produce much top growth the first year. Apparently the first growing season is used developing a root system. The second year there is usually enough growth, depending on the land, to furnish fair grazing.

14. Bahia will survive on land too poor and too dry to ever make a good pasture even though fertil-

Farmers Home Administration Officials Discuss Expanded Credit Program

How the credit needs of a larger number of farm families can be served by the Farmers Home Administration under recently enacted legislation was discussed at a meeting of agency officials held at Oxford on September 13 and 14th.

The new law provides broader authority to assist family-type farmers with loans to improve and operate their farms. It also authorizes, as a part of the rural development program, loans for operating and developing farms where the farmer has part time employment off the farm. Included in the broader authority are loans for refinancing existing debts, and an increase in the maximum amount that can be advanced for operating loans.

All of the present loan services of the Farmers Home Administration which include loans for the operation, development and purchase of family type farms, farm housing, soil and water conservation, and loans to meet emergency credit needs will continue to be available.

The loans to refinance existing debts will be available until June 30, 1959, to owners of farms no larger than family-size. These loans will help farmers who have adequate real estate security and who are otherwise in a sound position but who are unable to meet their present credit obligations and need credit on more favorable terms and conditions than is currently available from other lenders.

When debts are refinanced by the FHA the payments will be scheduled according to the ability of the borrower to repay. In the past, the agency has only refinanced existing debts when the refinancing was incidental to the making of a real estate loan for purchase or improvement of family type farms. There is a limit of \$50,000,000 a year on the amount of this type of credit that can be extended on an insured basis.

ized. Yet like bermuda it may prove a good practice to plant it, under certain circumstances, on such land because in favorable years it will furnish some protection to such land all the time. 15. Pensacola Bahia is a good pasture grass and it definitely has a place on most Tishomingo County farms. 16. The time to seed Pensacola Bahia grass is in the spring about early cotton planting time. It seems that 25 to 30 pounds of seed per acre gives best results. Don't cover it too deep.

Some one in your community may have a patch of Pensacola Bahia grass, if this is true go look at it. Then try some of it for yourself.

Insured loans are made by the FHA from funds provided by private lenders. The loans will bear 3½ percent interest plus a 1 percent insurance charge.

Initial operating loans under the new law may be made in amounts up to \$10,000 to one borrower with a limit of \$20,000 on the amount any one borrower can owe for this type of credit. In the past the limit on the initial loan was \$7,000 with a \$10,000 limit on the total amount of debt that could be incurred. No more than 10 percent of the annual appropriation for operating loans can be used to make loans which would cause a borrower's indebtedness to exceed \$10,000.

The operating loans are used for the purchase of equipment, livestock, fertilizer, seed and other farm and home operating expenses needed to carry out efficient farming operations on family type farms. The interest rate remains at 5 percent. For the fiscal year 1957, \$165,000,000 plus a contingency fund of \$15,000,000 to be used if necessary, has been appropriated for operating loans.

The increase in the maximum limits of these loans will enable the agency to serve farmers and ranchers in areas where heavy investments in machinery, livestock and farm operating expenses are necessary.

Operating loans are repayable over periods up to 7 years. Under the former law, no new credit could be extended to borrowers who have been continuously indebted for 7 years. The new law increases from 7 to 10 years the period during which additional credit can be extended in hardship cases when the inability of the borrower to repay his indebtedness within 7 years is due to causes beyond his control.

Loans will also be available for operating and development on less than family type farms, if the applicants are established bona fide farmers who have historically resided on farms and depended on farm income for their livelihood, and who are conducting substantial farming operations and spending a major portion of their time farming. Such operators must have dependable sources of outside income. The primary objective of these loans is to help farmers who live in areas designated for the Rural Development Program, who are unable to obtain enough land resources to develop full-time farms.

The interest rates and terms on these loans for operating and developing less than family-type farms will vary depending upon the purpose for which the loan is obtained. Loans for operating expenses will be repayable over

periods up to 7 years at 5 percent interest. Loans for real estate development will bear charges of 4½ percent and will be repayable over periods up to 40 years.

These loans will only be made when the applicant's income from his farm and other sources appears adequate to enable him to meet living and operating expenses and to repay his debts.

The new act also extends until June 30, 1959, the authority for special emergency loans and increases from \$15,000,000 to \$65,000,000 the total amount that can be advanced for these loans. Special emergency loans are made in areas designated by the Sec'y of Agriculture and to enable farmers to maintain their operations when they are unable for a temporary period to obtain needed credit from other sources.

All of the new loans, like the loans already available from the Farmers Home Administration will be made only to applicants who are unable to obtain adequate credit from other sources. With most types of loans, supervision in the development and carrying out of balanced systems of farming will be provided.

Local Men Named On MEC Committee

Six major projects of the Mississippi Economic Council's public administration and taxation committee will be reviewed at a meeting in Jackson on September 28th, according to H. V. Watkins, Jackson, chairman.

Mr. Watkins said the general committee will be asked to take action on three of the Projects, while progress reports will be made on the others.

Recommendations are to be on the subjects of legislative reapportionment creation, of a state legislative council, and the constitutional amendment to be voted on November 6th with reference to assessment and collection of property taxes on motor vehicles. Progress reports will be made on the educational programs favoring the county unit road system and substituting a county magistrate system for the present justice of the peace system, and small loan legislation.

County Minister's Association To Meet

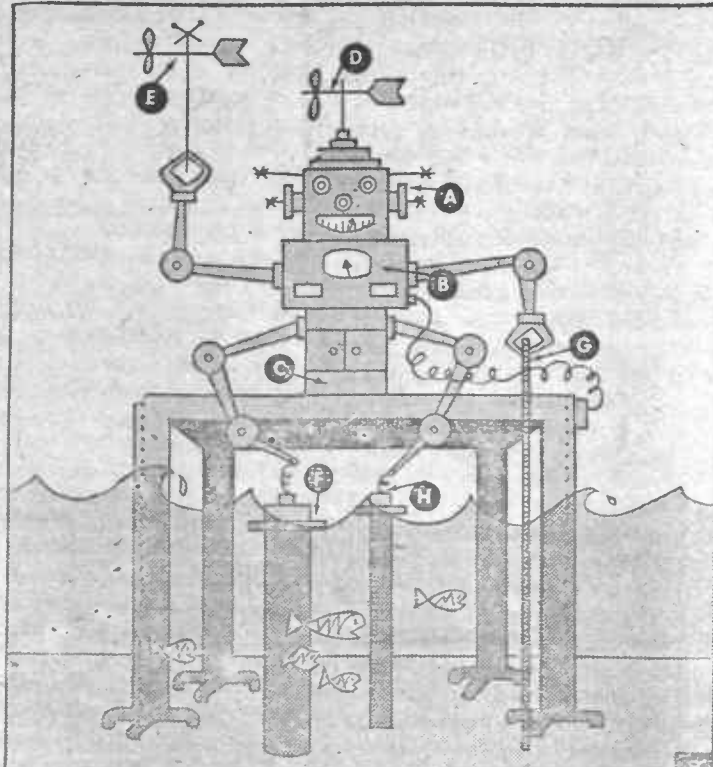

Meet The "Hurricane Inspector!"

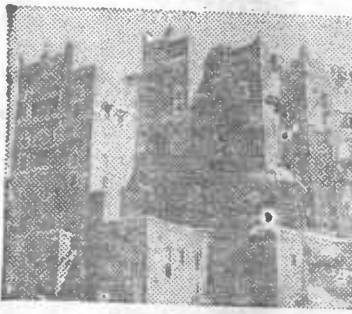

2,000 YEAR OLD SKYSCRAPER



Long before Manhattan Island was purchased from the Indians—at a time when the word "skyscraper" had not yet been coined—a magnificent twenty-story palace dominated the skyline of Yemen's capital city of San'a.

This regal structure, known as the Palace of Ghamdan, was as great a tourist attraction two thousand years ago as New York's Empire State Building is today. Many historians have described the wonders of the famed palace, which had a ceiling of transparent alabaster so clear that its inhabitants reportedly could distinguish the species of different birds as they alighted on the roof or flew overhead.

Because of Ghamdan and other palaces which once towered twenty to thirty stories in the air, the Yemenites can fairly claim that they were the first people to erect skyscrapers. Only traces of the palace of Ghamdan remain in present-day San'a, but the capital contains many seven- and eight-storied buildings with the same type of original architecture. Even today the upper windows of some Yemenite palaces are made of translucent alabaster instead of glass, and the lower stained-glass windows beam forth at night in multi-colored splendor.

Although San'a is situated on a flat plateau, some of its buildings are so tall that from a distance it seems as though the city is built on elevated land. The average Yemenite, accustomed to climbing his country's rugged mountains, is undaunted by long flights of stairs and instinctively seems to prefer tall buildings. Foreign visitors have noted with amazement that the Yemenite of the plains, when unable to live on high ground, erects a tall house—and chooses the top floor to live on!
