96th Annual Session Of Tishomingo Co. Baptist Association To Convene Next Week; 21 Churches Represented

The ninety-sixth annual session of the Tishomingo County Baptist Association will convene next week at two different churches instead of one as has been the custom in previous years.

The opening session will be at Tishomingo Baptist Church on Tuesday morning, October 9. On Wednesday, October 10, the association will move to the Calvary Church in Belmont for the closing session.

Current officers of the association are Ferrell Skinner as moderator; Rev. W. C. Hamilton, vice-moderator and Rev. Raymond Buchanan, Clerk.

Twenty-one Baptist Churches from all over the county are represented in this vast organization which has a membership of approximately 4,000.

Tuesday's program will begin at 10 a.m. with Rev. J. C. Hawthorne directing the devotional. Most of the morning will be devoted to various reports, miscellaneous and the recognition of visitors and new pastors.

1956-57 Session Is Last One To Be Held Under Old Law; Must Be Re-Organized By July 1st, 1957

Dr. J. D. Falls of State College met with the Tishomingo County Board of Education and Trustees of the Iuka Separate School District in a public meeting held Wednesday morning of this week in the Courthouse at Iuka.

Purpose of the meeting was to discuss the re-organizational survey conducted over recent months by Dr. Falls. A number of interested citizens of the county and all members of the two school boards and also trustees of the various schools of the county were present.

Dr. Falls explained his findings in the survey and offered his recommendations. The meeting was opened to questions and discussions. A few questions were asked concerning schools that would be discontinued to which Dr. Falls made replies.

According to the survey as it was prepared by Dr. Falls, the

county will be divided into two administrative units—the County Unit System which will comprise the attendance centers of Belmont, Tishomingo, Burnsville, Holcut and the Negro school; and the Iuka Separate School District which will primarily consist of most of the area in the First District.

The survey recommends, for Negro students, the building of a new school plant on highway 25 north of Tishomingo. The plant will be complete with a cafeteria, a recreation room and all other necessary facilities, and will house all Colored children from grades 1 through 12. It recommends that Negro students of Iuka, Carter's Branch, and all those scattered over the rest of the county be transported to the new building.

It further recommends that since "the money follows the child" that the county should bear all costs of instruction, transportation, supplies, etc., and have administrative control of the school. For buildings and their major upkeep, the county would bear two-thirds of the costs and Iuka Separate School District would bear one-third.

There are approximately 200 Negro school children in Tishomingo county.

According to the survey, White attendance centers in the county should have, at Burnsville, 640 pupils enrolled; at Belmont, 780 pupils enrolled; at Tishomingo 530 enrolled. Iuka Separate School District should have approximately 750 school children enrolled at its attendance center.

Disposition of the Holcut school is still undetermined, all depending on what the Prentiss county board of Education finally decides to do in regard to the line school. "However," Dr. Falls said, "I see no reason why that school could not be retained as an attendance center for at least grades 1 through 8."

Under the law, each administrative unit will be allowed \$12.00 for each white child and \$15.00 for each Colored child for 20 years for building purposes. This money is to come from the state. The administrative units will be allowed to borrow three-fourths of the money allotted to each child for 20 years to apply immediately on necessary new buildings.

LAST SESSION BEFORE RE-ORGANIZATION

"This is the last session of school that can be held under the old law," W. R. Nettles, chairman of the Tishomingo County Board of Education said. "We have until July 1st, 1957, to re-organize, submit a plan to the State Educational Finance Commission, and get it into operation. It is a mountain of a task and we cannot afford to delay one minute on any one step. The public meeting held Wednesday is one of the major steps."

Farmers And Ranchers Benefited By Social Security Since 1954

If you're a farmer, chances are which became law this summer at that changes in social security affect you and your family. This

is so whether you own a farm, rent a farm, or do farm work for someone else. Today, I want to discuss a provision in the amended law which affects many persons who have farm property—either as owners or lessees.

Since 1954, earnings from self-employment as a farmer or rancher have counted toward old-age and survivors insurance. The law doesn't change that. Under the old law, however, you did not get social security credit for cash or crop shares you received as rent for your land. Income from farm land which was let out to someone else, even if on a share-farming basis, was regarded as rentals from real estate and did not count toward social security. The man who had only this kind of income from his farm was re-

a self-employed farmer.

In many cases, income of this type is still excluded from social security coverage. If you simply collect rent for the land, that's still rental from real estate. Under the 1956 amendments to the law, however, the cash or crop shares a farm owner receives from a tenant or share-farmer is regarded as farm income which will be credited to his social security account if he "materially participates" in the management or production of the farm commodities.

Let's say you own some farm land, or hold farm property under lease, and return rent to someone else. If you simply collect rent for the land, that's still rental from real estate. Don't report it as self-employment farm income for social security purposes. On the other hand, if you let out the land to a share-farmer, but still take an important part in the growing of management of the production of the crop on that land under an arrangement with the renter, that's most likely "material participation." In that case, the money you realize from the transaction would not be rental income but farm income. It would count toward old-age and survivors insurance protection for you and your family.

If you have a definite arrangement with the user whereby you regularly advise and consult with him on the production of the crop or livestock, regularly inspect the operation, and have a hand in the management, this would be a strong indication that you "materially participate." Moreover, if in addition you also furnish the renter with tools, livestock, and farm equipment, or finance any of these, this would be further evidence of "material participation" on your part.

Planting
Crimson is the month to plant
Crimson, white and red

clover and winter peas make good
winter and spring grazing.

Crimson does well on cultivated
land or on sod. Covered lightly
and packed following planting, it
will do better. Crimson does well
in combination with any of the
cereals or ryegrass. However it
should not be planted on land
where lespedeza is to volunteer

back. If planted on Sericea les-
pedeza, careful management will
be necessary to prevent choking
out the Sericea.

White clover seed are available.
An ample supply of Louisiana S-1
seed are on the market this fall.
This is a good variety to plant.

Drill winter peas in Bermuda
grass sod. A better stand will be
had if seed are covered rather
than sown on top of the ground.
Twenty-five or 30 pounds of seed
drilled equals 50 to 60 pounds
sown on top of the ground. Where
winter peas are being planted on
land for the first time, seed should
be inoculated.

Red clover can be planted with
any of the cereals or drilled on
grazed down sod. If not needed
for grazing, red clover planted
with cereals or ryegrass can be
used for hay or silage next year.

Protect your pastures from burn-
ing. Fire can cost you a lot of
money in stacked hay, farm build-
ings as well as in destroying dry
grass areas you had planned to use
this winter. It will also kill young
clovers coming to a stand.

Build a fire lane between your
pastures and public roads and be-
tween wooded areas.

Cattle Lice
It is time now to re-charge that
homemade back rubber. It'll con-
trol hornflies during the remain-
der of the fly season, and will go
a long way in helping to keep
down heavy infestations of cattle
lice during the winter.

Stalk Destruction
Destroy boll weevil feed. As
soon as a cotton field is picked
out, shred those stalks. Then graze
out ditch banks and wooded areas
near cotton fields. Don't give the
boll weevil a place to hibernate.
Let's have fewer weevils next
year.

ASC Forestry Payments
The payment rate for tree plant-
ing is \$9.00 per acre for hand
planting and \$7.50 for machine
planting. 65% of seedlings must
live in order to secure payment.

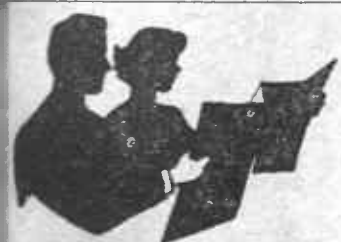

Prevent Forest Fires

Tishomingo County Industrial Growth Depicted; 690 Percent Increase

(Special to The Vidette)
New York, Sept. 26—Considerable progress has been made in the last few years in Tishomingo County in the direction of industrialization.

An indication of this hike in manufacturing comes from the U. S. Department of Commerce, which shows that the output of factories in the county increased 690 percent in "value added by manufacture."

The "value added" figure is the amount that raw materials are increased in value by being turned into useable merchandise, such as furniture, clothings, shoes, etc. Defined otherwise, it is the value of the finished product less the cost of materials, labor and the like that went into it.

The story is told in a preliminary Federal report based on its Census of Manufactures, the first nation-wide survey of the kind conducted since 1947. The figures showing the status of American factory production were gathered in 1955 by the Department of Commerce on the previous year's operation.

Tishomingo County's manufacturing plants, it shows, contributed \$2,039,000 in value added toward the nation's economy in the year. This was a gain of 690 percent over the local 1947 production, \$257,000.

It was more of a rise than was

achieved by the rest of the country, 57 per cent.

Also covered by the census, which is termed by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce "the only comprehensive measurement of factory establishments," are employment, payrolls and other industrial data.

The census as a whole covered America's 288,200 factories, engaged in 450 industries. They added \$116 billion to our gross national product and gave employment to over 16 million people. The payroll for these workers was \$66 billion.

Almost every manufacturing category showed an advance in the seven-year period. Fastest growing was the transportation equipment industry. Only textile mill operations went behind.

Enforcement Program Initiated By State Patrol Endorsed By Governor

Mississippi Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough disclosed during a recent meeting of Highway Patrol inspectors that the "all out enforcement" program recently initiated by the State Patrol has the blessings of Governor J. P. Coleman.

"In fact, the Governor wants the present alarming highway slaughter curbed and he means business," the nine district inspectors were told.

Commissioner Scarbrough quoted to inspectors activity report summaries on individual patrol units. He expressed dissatisfaction with the report of several and warned the inspectors "to get these men on the job".

Some 40 new patrolmen were employed by the highway patrol earlier in September, bringing the present strength of the state traffic law enforcement organization up to 207 patrolmen. Present legislation permits the Commissioner of Public Safety to hire a maximum of 220 patrolmen in addition to 21 driver license examiners, 9 district inspectors, and other administrative personnel.

According to Chief of Patrol Bill Hood, the state now has more uniformed traffic officers patrolling Mississippi highways than at any other time in the 18 year history of the patrol.

The highway patrol has already stepped up its use of radar in

speed law enforcement. A radar activity report for August showed 1,688 radar arrests made. During August one year ago, 139 radar arrests were recorded by the patrol.

The Public Safety Commissioner stressed that radar will continue to be used extensively, and advised his inspectors to make certain that their radar equipment was in good working order. "If the machines you have aren't sufficient, more machines will be secured," he promised. The patrol now has nine radar machines, one per patrol district.

Periodic spot-checking of transport trucks for required safety equipment has also been ordered by Patrol officials. Unlighted farm machinery moving along state highways at night will also receive the patrolman's attention hereafter, according to the public safety commissioner, who emphasized repeatedly during the inspectors' meeting that he "meant business" when ordering the stepped up enforcement.

He singled out the patrol unit working in the immediate Ackerman area. This unit, the inspectors were told, working in the Governor's hometown area had shown the second highest activity report in the state (number of arrests) during August.

Concluded Commissioner Scarbrough: "Now, Gentlemen, when such a report is possible, you can rest assured that traffic law enforcement has the whole-hearted support of your Governor."

Attention is again called to the fact that the church meets at 7:00 p.m. Wednesday and Sunday nights instead of 7:30. Bible study is still at 10:00 and preaching at eleven Sunday mornings.

Table shows how insulation saves fuel dollars in house heating.

It costs more than twice as much to heat a house without insulation than it does to heat a properly insulated home, according to a study by the University of Illinois.

The study covered in seven cities representing most of the nation's climate areas. Engineering calculations were made for a one-story house containing 1,040 square feet of floor space. The insulated houses had a 3-inch thickness of mineral wool in the walls and 4 inches in the ceiling. The control houses had no insulation at all.

The researchers' calculations showed that winter fuel bills for the insulated houses were from a third to a half of the costs of heating the non-insu-

lated homes in the study.

Estimating the cost of insulation at \$280, it was calculated that in St. Louis, for example, the home owner would have regained this amount within three years. The annual saving in St. Louis came to \$95.

A savings also was noted in the cost of heating equipment in the insulated houses. In the St. Louis home, again, the owners would have been able to install a furnace for \$50 less than the cost of equipment required in the non-insulated house.

The study also showed that the savings in the cost of air-conditioning equipment and its operation would be considerably more than the cost of the insulation.

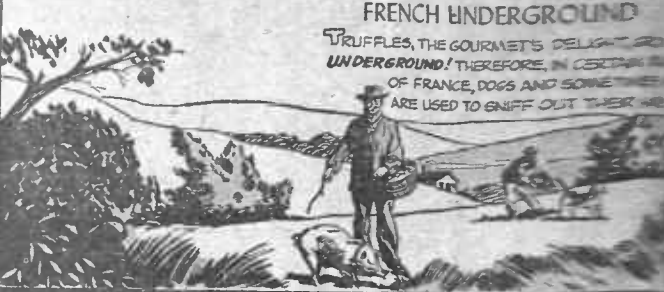

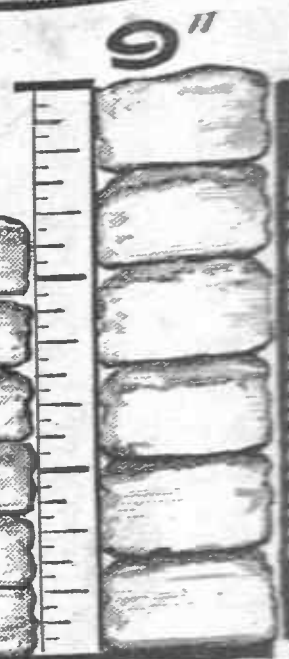

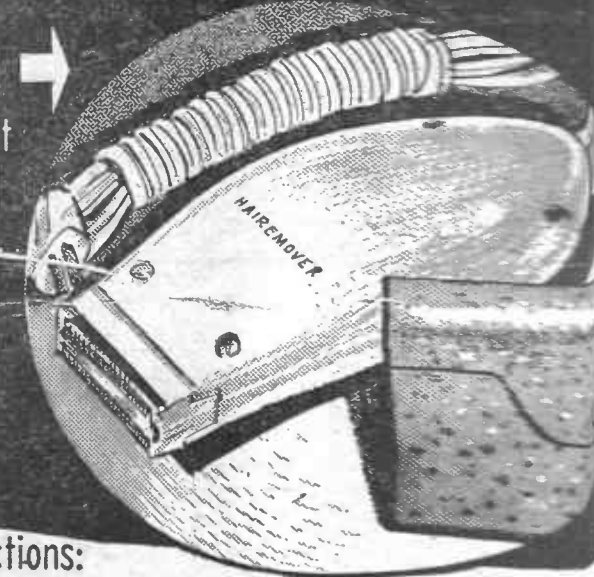

August Business Activity In Mississippi Per Cent Higher Than August 1955

Business activity in Mississippi was 7 per cent higher than August 1955, according to the latest issue of "The Mississippi Business Review," monthly publication of the Business Research Council. Business activity during August maintained levels higher than any ever reached before this month, and only slightly below the all-time high reached this year.

The largest percentage increase in August 1955 were found in the insurance sales, up 28 per cent. Small declines occurred in postal indicators and registrations.

Construction contracts were up 63 per cent from August 1955 and 70 per cent above 1956. The largest gain over previous year was in commercial and industrial construction.

Total tax collections of \$7,054, were 6 per cent larger than

in August 1955. Sales tax collections of \$4,159,418 were 4 per cent higher than for the same month a year earlier.

Collections under the oil severance tax were \$590,306, up 7 per cent from August 1955. Gas severance tax collections of \$110,072 were 31 per cent higher. Timber severance tax collections of \$55,542 were 100 per cent higher than in August 1955.

All but one of the state's sixteen trade areas had more business activity than a year ago. The increases by districts were: Biloxi, 9 per cent; Clarksdale, 17 per cent; Columbus, 7 per cent; Corinth, 4 per cent; Greenville, 5 per cent; Greenwood, 6 per cent; Hattiesburg, 11 per cent; Jackson, 7 per cent; Laurel, 4 per cent; McComb, 6 per cent; Memphis, 7 per cent; Meridian, 10 per cent; Pascagoula, 5 per cent; Tupelo, 10 per cent; Vicksburg, 7 per cent. The single decrease, 1 per cent, occurred in the Natchez district.

Sod-Seeder A Good Soil Conservation Tool

A sod-seeder is a machine that will, at one operation, open furrows, distribute fertilizer, and plant the desired grazing crop on permanent pasture or other sod.

From the standpoint of soil and water conservation the sod-seeder is an excellent tool, because: 1. Fertilizer can be placed at the desired depth and seed planted above this fertilizer with minimum disturbance of the topsoil. (The land does not have to be flatbroke or disked). 2. Livestock grazing winter crops seeded with one of these machines on a permanent sod do not bag and pack the land as badly as they would on fields that had been flatbroke or disked at time of seeding. 3. Where care is taken to plant on contour with sod-seeder, the land will soak up more water. This will result in less soil erosion and more water conservation.

4. Fields commonly planted to winter grazing crops can be left unplowed and the stalks cut and left to lie on top of the land during the winter. The use of a "Bush-hog," or similar type machine, will cut and scatter corn and cotton stalks, over the surface of the land to absorb moisture and act as miniature dams for slowing down surface water runoff. This too, will slow down soil erosion and increase the intake of water into the soil. 5. The use of a sod-seeder will help in maintaining the soil organic matter. Plowing land burns out the organic matter in it.

Those of us who work for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Tishomingo County recommend the practice of planting fall and winter grazing-crops, on permanent pastures or other sod, with a sod-seeder.

Winter Grazing Crops Studied In Dairy Test

State College, Miss.—Two years results of winter grazing tests have recently been reported by the Dairy Department of the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station. Summarizing the results, Dr. J. T. Miles and his associates said:

"Winter grazing crops planted on a prepared seedbed consistently produced more milk than the same crops seeded with a grassland drill without seedbed preparation. This difference was enough to give a lower feed cost per 100 pounds of milk in spite of higher preparation cost. There was very little difference in yields between sod seeding in a Dallisgrass or Coastal Bermuda turf. Yields for crops sod seeded in the stubble of summer annual crops were intermediate between those seeded in permanent turfs and on prepared seedbeds.

"Milk production was sufficiently high and feed cost per 100 pounds milk low enough on crops seeded in a permanent turf to indicate that this practice is an excellent way to economically supplement winter feed supplies. This would be particularly true on rolling land which must be left to

turf to prevent erosion. The sod-seeded crops have the additional advantage of minimizing trampling damage in wet weather. However, earlier grazing can be expected from crops planted on a prepared seedbed.

"Anderson wheat compared favorably with Delta Red 88 oats, both on a prepared seedbed made and when seeded in the sod. The wheat produced slightly more total forage, made its growth earlier in the winter and matured earlier thus interfering less with summer grasses when seeded in the sod."

The complete report is published in the September issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Devotional Reading: Psalm 104:24-33.

Creation

Lesson for October 7, 1956

IT IS one of the tragedies of Christian history that the first book of the Bible, as well as the last, has been fought over, bitterly, from generation to generation. In spite of all the quarrels, however (and there seems to be no hope of all Christians agree here), there are certain great truths in this magnificent prose-poem with which the Bible begins, which are agreed on by all Christians. Let us pick out three of these.

"In the Beginning, God—"
The first truth is that this vast universe did not merely happen. It was intended. It is intended. God (so to speak) invented it. Why should anything be? Is a thought that has occurred to countless people. Why is there something instead of nothing, anything at all instead of nothing? Is it just a happen-so? Did the universe make itself, as it were, like a dust-storm building up in the desert or an icicle dripping itself longer day by day? Was there some blind Necessity at the beginning of all things? Or maybe did the earth and all the universe exist forever without any beginning? Not at all. That the universe is here at all is because of God who planned it and brought it into being. How long ago this started, or how many changes have taken place since the first instant of time, makes no difference with the main point: namely that the universe does not explain itself, did not cause itself, but is what it is and as it is because God willed it. Furthermore, if God created it, including ourselves, he had a reason. We cannot conceive of God working blindly or at random or for no reason.

Order and Law

The more men study the universe, whether the great and immeasurable universe around us, in which our sun is no more than a mediocre star nowhere near the center of things, or the marvelous tiny universe discovered by the microscope—the more men study all this the more they discover that it is a universe of law. If the sun rises at all tomorrow, astronomers know precisely when it will rise. They can know it years beforehand. Men used to be surprised by eclipses. Now we can calculate the time of every eclipse that will take place, or that has taken place since before the time of man. Even that most unpredictable of things, the wind, can be forecast better than once it could. Men once had to take hurricanes as they came. Now they can be warned of them and their tracks are mostly known. Man in discovering such things is simply "thinking God's thoughts after him." As one astronomer remarked, the universe seems more like a great Thought than a great Machine. In these universal laws, in their regularity and dependability, we can read the will of God. This does not mean that we understand everything—far from it. Mystery surrounds us still. But no science at all would be possible if we could not count on a world that "makes sense" from the smallest atom to the mightiest star.

God Created No Evil

The story-poem of Creation in Genesis ends with the joyful note—God saw all he had made, and it was very good. If anything God has created seems bad, it is either because we do not know how to use it, or we have barged in where we do not belong, or because we ourselves have made it bad. St. Thomas Aquinas once compared this world to a tool-shop full of well-sharpened tools. It is not safe to turn a child or lunatic loose in there; but a master-workman will not get hurt. So as men are learning about the universe they are finding out how to use the materials that the Creator has set at our disposal. But much that is evil in the world is of our own making. Most dust storms, for example, are made by man's greed and stupidity to begin with, in digging up soil that was never meant for cultivation. The whole race of man now stands in terror of death, for though we have discovered how to harness the power in the atom—power our fathers knew was there but had no idea how to reach—we have put more effective thought into using it for destruction than for man's help. But all man's mistakes of God's creation must not make us forget that when God first looked it over, he saw that it was good.

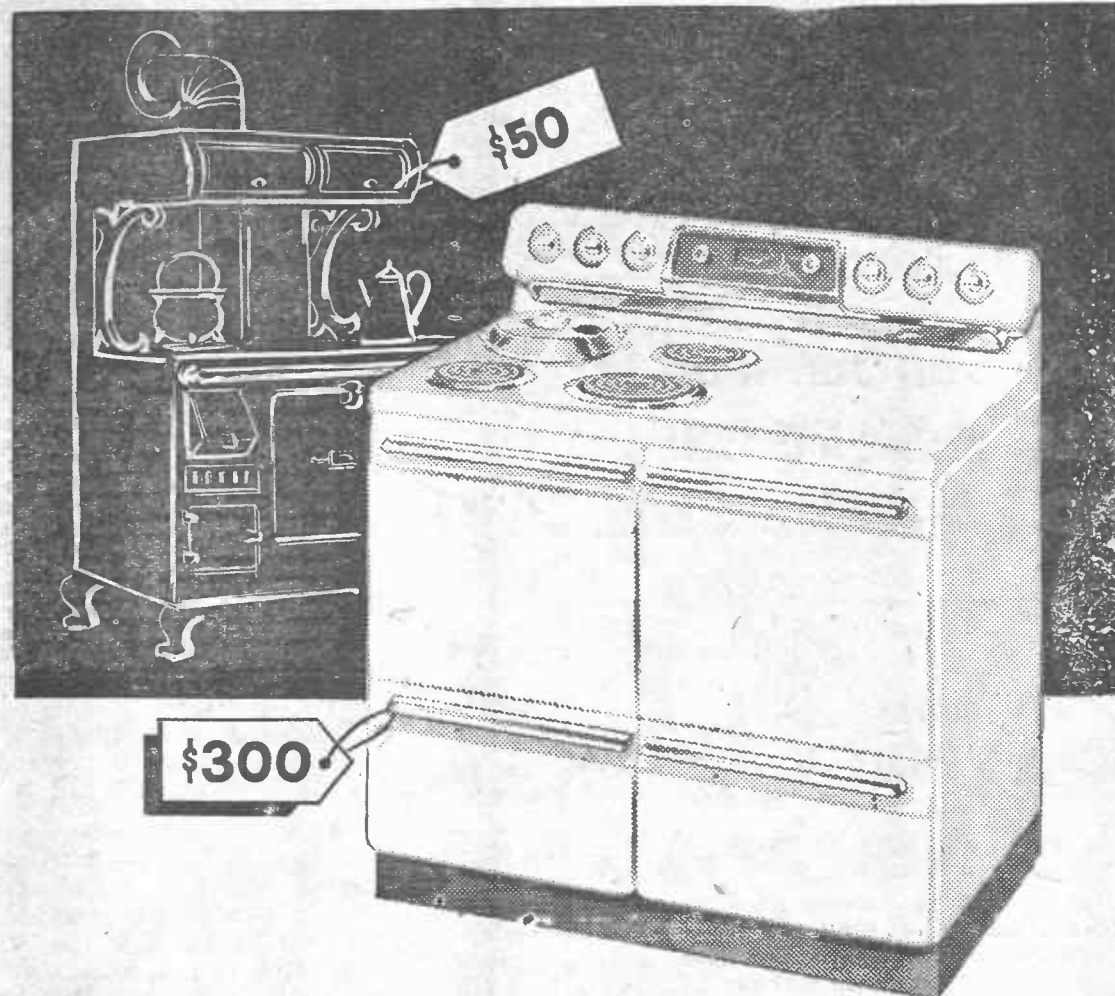

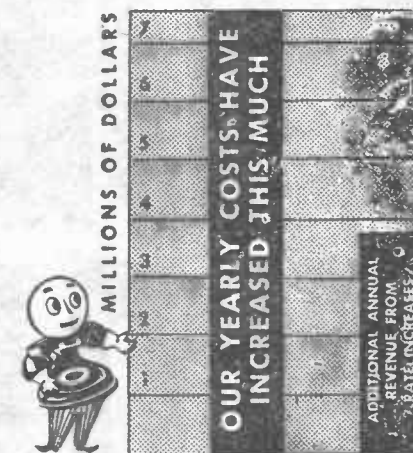

You're an unusual homemaker if you aren't looking for ideas on "What am I going to cook today." Look over the list of October plentiful foods and see if you don't find a good food idea and a good buy, too.

In abundance this month are broilers, and fryers, turkeys, pork, beef, eggs and cheese. Young chickens may be your choice for quick cooking, turkeys for week ends or company meals. You may find best turkey values in the big toms, but there will be hens and smaller turkeys, too.

Best values in beef probably will be in the economy grades and cuts. Other foods continuing as plentiful

are cheese, milk and other products, rice, peanut butter, frozen orange juice and potatoes.

Look for lots of cabbage. Fresh cabbage slaw, relish or salad makes good company for any of the main dish items.

Cheese Festival Time

During Cheese Festival Time—the Month of October, why not try combining plentiful cheese and ground beef for a Cheese Meat Loaf. This recipe will make 25 servings. It was prepared for those with freezer space who want to save time on future meals. Why not follow this recipe and make up enough of the mixture for several meals, or reduce the amounts to fit one meal for your family.

2-1/2 pounds ground beef
1 cup chopped cheese
3 tablespoons chopped green pepper.

2/3 cup chopped onion
3 eggs, beaten
2-1/2 cups dry bread crumbs
1 tablespoon salt
1/2 small bay leaf, crushed
1/4 teaspoon thyme
Dash of garlic salt
2-1/2 cups tomato puree

Mix beef, cheese, green pepper, onion, crumbs and seasonings thoroughly. Combine eggs and tomatoes and blend into meat mixture.

To serve immediately, place meat mixture in loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees F moderate oven) for about an hour.

Cheese meat loaf may be frozen baked or unbaked.

Rice Facts

With the exception of wild rice, which has to be washed, all rice is ready to use as it comes from the package. Rice is a convenience food. There is no peeling, scraping, dicing or cutting. It is ready to use as you buy it.

Rinsing rice after it is cooked causes loss of food value and may make the rice gummy. Cook rice in only "enough" water. Pouring off excess water takes with it some of the food value. A good rule is to follow the cooking directions on the package.

For extra fluffy rice, remove the saucepan from the heat after the recommended cooking period and leave the lid on until ready to serve—at least 10 minutes. You must use the proper proportion of rice to water. The steam in the saucepan fluffs the rice, gets it drier and keeps it hot.

Most rice you buy is milled white rice. Brown rice and parboiled rice are specialty items and cost more. Long grain rice is more expensive than medium or short. Broken rice for soups, meat loaves and desserts is economical, but not always available on local markets.
