1956 Amendments Provides Low Income Farmers Social Security Protection

Since they were first brought under the old-age and survivors insurance program beginning in 1955, some self-employed farmers and ranchers have had an optional method of figuring their earnings for social security purposes. This optional method, however, was restricted to individual farmers who reported their income on a cash basis.

Under the 1956 amendments to

the law, this optional method of figuring farm income has been revised so that more low-income farmers can build protection for themselves and their families under social security. It now applies not only to individual farmers and ranchers but to members of farm partnerships. Moreover, farmers who figure their earnings on an accrual rather than a cash basis can now use the optional method.

This extension of the optional method was made by Congress in recognition of the fact that members of farm partnerships and accrual-basis farmers are, in the same way as other farmers, subject to the risks that are peculiar to farming in general—risks that make farm income subject to sharp fluctuations and often result in years of low income or actual net loss. Extending this optional method of figuring farm income to farm partners and accrual-basis farmers gives them the same opportunity as other farmers and ranchers to keep up their protection under old-age and survivors insurance during bad years.

For taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1956, a self-employed farmer or rancher whose gross income from agricultural self-employment is not more than \$1,800, may use for social security purposes either his actual net or 2/3 of his gross farm income. If his gross farm income is more than \$1,800 in a year but his net farm earnings are less than \$1,200, he may use either his net or \$1,200. If his gross farm income is more than \$1,800, and his net farm earnings are \$1,200 or more, he must use the amount of his actual net farm earnings.

The revised law contains other provisions which serve to clear up uncertainties about farm self-employment in relation to the social security law. For instance, the definition of a share-farmer or share-cropper as a self-employed farmer, and the status of a crew leader or "row boss" as the employer of farm workers or the employee of the farmer for whom he supplies seasonal, farm help. I shall describe these provisions in the new law in my next article.

Orchards

October is the month to treat peach trees for borers. One good method is to use Ethylene Dichloride Emulsion. Pour or spray the diluted emulsion about the base of the tree, but not on the trunk, then cover with several shovelfuls of soil.

Forest Fires

Mississippi leads the nation in numbers of out-of-control woods fires and intentionally set woods fires. This toll must be reduced. The fires cost millions of dollars each year in timber loss. Besides the timber loss, the fires often burn farm buildings, homes, stacked hay and grass pastures.

Care in woods and fields will help reduce this loss. If you must burn ditch banks and fence corners, etc., make sure you take plenty of precautions. Burn on still days, late in the evening when the moisture content of the air is high. Have plenty of men on hand to keep the fire under control.

If the wind is blowing, burn against the wind. Make fire lanes

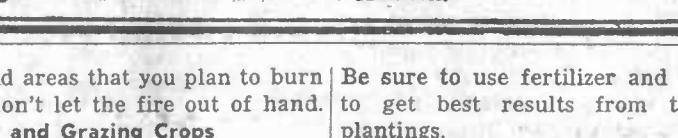

New Varieties Found Best In Canning Study

Allgold and Goldrush appear to

be the best varieties of sweetpotatoes to grow for canning in Mississippi, according to results of tests conducted by the Agricultural Experiment Station.

In recent years much of Mississippi's sweetpotato crop, has been canned for sale throughout the nation. Porto Rico has been the leading variety grown for canning, not because of its quality, but because of its yield. Newer varieties, however, have been found to yield as well and to can better.

Dr. W. F. Jenkins and his associates in the Experiment Station horticulture department summarized the test as follows:

"Four varieties—Allgold, Goldrush, Porto Rico Unit I and Australian Canner—were grown by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station in a study of the canning qualities of sweetpotatoes. "Australian Canner" was the highest in canning quality but the lowest in yield. It had better color, more firmness and a better general appearance than the other varieties when canned.

"Allgold, the highest producer in the test, and Goldrush, which was second in yield, were intermediate in canning quality. Their color was satisfactory but they were not as firm as Australian Canner.

"Porto Rico Unit I was low in canning quality and third place in yield. It lacked uniformity of color and firmness in the can.

"Consideration of yield along with canning quality points to Allgold and Goldrush as the varieties to grow in Mississippi for canning."

The complete report, including results from Newton, Poplarville, Crystal Springs and State College over a three-year period, is published in the October issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

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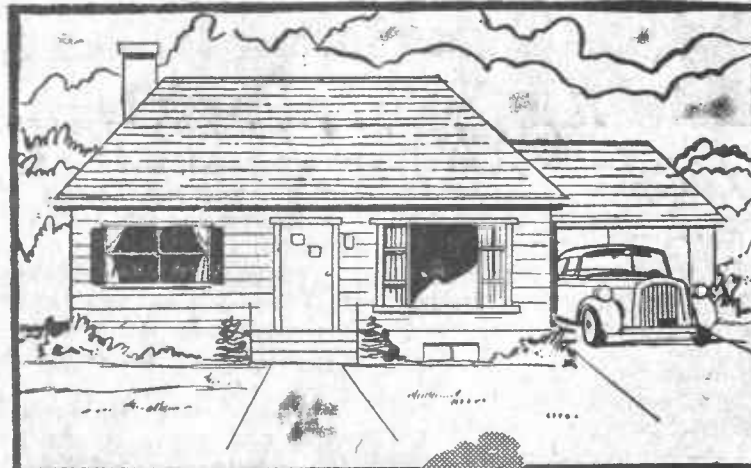
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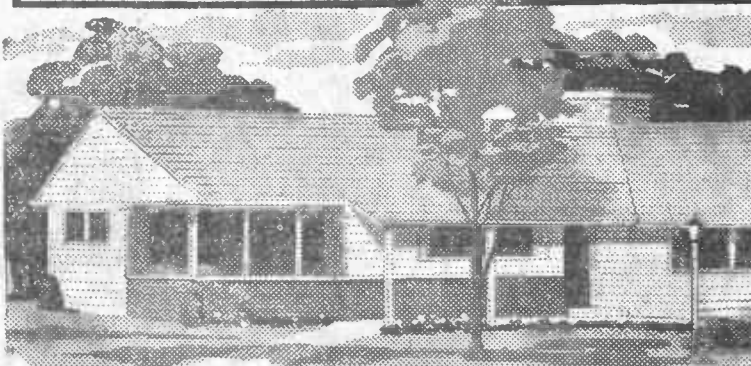

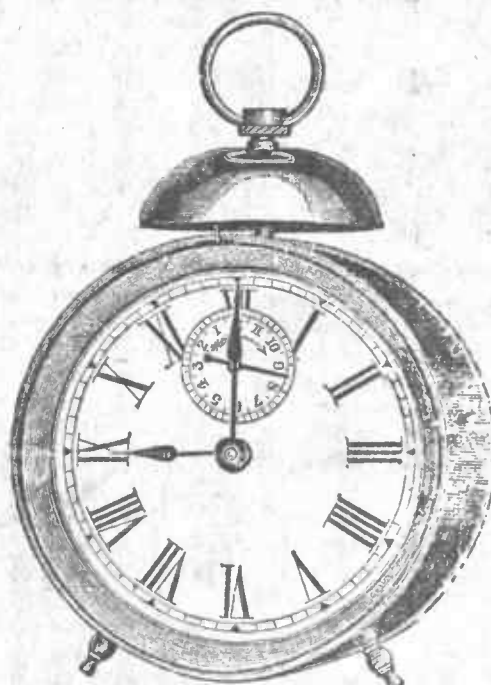
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RE THAN \$42,000,000 SPENT TO COMPLETE TRANSATLANTIC TELEPHONE CABLE; FIRST VOICE LINK BETWEEN NORTH AMERICA AND EUROPE

York, Sept. 25—A new transatlantic telephone cable system, the first physical voice link established between North America and Europe—was inaugurated today and opened to public use.

F. Craig, Chairman of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, was the first to speak from the podium at the ceremony. He said the \$42,000,000 system, which was inaugurated today, was the first of its kind to span the Atlantic Ocean. A. T. & T., the BPO and Canadian Overseas Telecommunications Corporation are partners in the historic enterprise.

The deep-sea portion of the system was laid under the supervision of the Long Lines Department of A. T. & T., the long distance operating unit of the Bell System. Engineers and scientists of Bell Telephone Laboratories designed and tested the system.

The transatlantic system can carry 36 conversations at the same time. Thus, it is able to handle about three times the traffic now transmitted between this continent and Great Britain by radiotelephone.

The deep-sea segment of the system extends 2,250 miles from Clarendville, a small village on the east coast of Newfoundland, to Oban, Scotland. From Oban, new trunk lines link the system to switchboards in London.

On this continent, newly constructed land and water sections bring the transatlantic circuits to Portland, Me., and to Montreal, where they connect to the established American and Canadian networks.

The underwater cables that represent the backbone of the system were placed by the cableship Monarch, the largest cable-laying vessel afloat.

The 8,050 ton Monarch took a total of seven months to complete laying operations. She worked only in summer, when the turbulent North Atlantic is on its best behavior.

At that, she took a battering from hurricane Ione in September of 1955, but finished her job on schedule.

Since cables of the design used in the Atlantic section of the system transmit in but one direction, two cables were needed to make a conversation possible. The two cables lie some 20 miles apart on the ocean floor; the southernmost transmitting west to east and the northern most east to west.

Both cables, which have an average overall diameter of 1-1/4 inches, were put down in three segments. In June of 1955, 200 miles of the west to east cable was placed from Clarendville to the edge of the Continental Shelf. A second segment extended this cable to a point 500 miles off Scotland and the third closed the gap. This past summer, the process was reversed.

Some 300 miles of cable was also placed across Cabot Strait in the spring of this year, linking the terminal at Clarendville to the new land line at Sydney Mines, Nova Scotia.

Successful completion of the Atlantic cable system climaxed a quarter of a century of active research in this field by communications men on both sides of the Atlantic.

The particular problem that had to be overcome was development of an underwater amplifier, or "repeater," an electrical device that would boost voice signals after they had reached the fading point along a circuit. While repeaters are relatively easy to install and maintain along land cable, the undersea cable demanded an amplifier that could: (1) be built into the cable in such a way as to be able to pass easily through a ship's laying gear without interruption; (2) withstand pressures of at least 6,000 pounds per square inch; (3) operate without attention for at least 20 years.

Bell Telephone Laboratories, after years of research, perfected such a repeater, which has been under test for 15 years and in operation in cables stretching from Florida to Cuba since 1951.

The repeaters were manufactured by Western Electric Company at Hillside, New Jersey. The submarine cable used in the transatlantic system was manufactured in both this country and Great Britain.

SURVEY SHOWS MISS. HAD 114 FOREST FIRES IN AUGUST

Atlanta, Ga. (Special)—A southern forest fire survey shows that Mississippi experienced 114 forest fires in August which burned over 435 acres.

The survey which was conducted by the Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association showed that the majority of states participating in the survey revealed that debris burning was major cause of forest fires.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission listed debris burning the major cause of fires in the State during August. A total of 34 forest fires was caused by debris burning.

Carelessness of smokers was the second highest factor listed by the Commission in causing forest fires. The Commission said 23 forest fires were attributed to smokers.

The Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association lists a number of rules that should be followed by landowners for their own protection and the protection of their neighbors when debris burning. They are:

1. Warn your neighbors who own land adjacent to yours before burning.

2. Have sufficient fire fighting equipment and manpower on hand.

3. Do not burn during a high wind.

4. Make sure your fire is completely extinguished before leaving it.

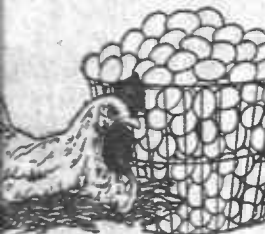

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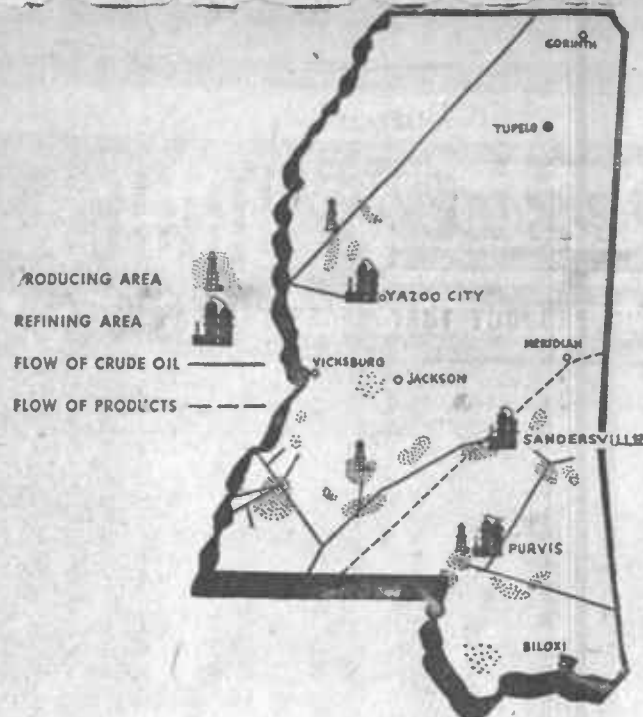

Inquiry Into Communism In New Orleans Reveals Top Communist According To Senator Eastland

(Senator James O. Eastland) Washington, D. C. Oct 10—Senator James O. Eastland (D-Miss.) said today that the inquiry into Communism in the New Orleans area revealed that top Communist Robert Thompson used the identity of a man dead 14 years when he jumped bail to avoid imprisonment on a Smith Act conviction.

Eastland, Chairman of the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, said the fact is brought out in the latest publication of the subcommittee, released today for public distribution. It contains additional testimony on Communism in the New Orleans area, and is Part 13 in the current series on Scope of Soviet Activity in the United States.

Witnesses whose testimony is included are Robert Blanchard, New Orleans television artist and his wife, Winifred Brennan Blanchard; Hunter Pitts O'Dell district organizer of the Communist Party in New Orleans who was subject of a wide-spread search by process servers before he was finally found; and three witnesses who gave testimony on Communism in the New York area—Arthur Behrstock, Cecil Lubell, and William Goldman.

Subcommittee investigation revealed that Brennan was Mrs. Blanchard's brother. Both Mrs. Blanchard and her husband, who was a commercial artist with television station WDSU-TV in New Orleans, testified in Washington after other witnesses had appeared in New Orleans.

Both invoked the fifth amendment protection against self-incrimination on questions about Communist activity, including questions about the birth certificate.

Evidence was produced that a person named Blanchard requested a copy of the Brennan birth certificate from the Department of Health of New York City on Nov. 11, 1950. The following July Thompson failed to show up to begin serving a three-year prison term.

"We do not know, of course, if Mrs. Blanchard secured the birth certificate for that purpose," Senator Eastland said, "but we were unable to discover any reason why she would ask for a duplicate of her brother's birth certificate 12 years after his death, and she gave no help. When we asked her for a reason she used her fifth amendment privilege."

He gave a similar answer to other questions on Communism. Lubell, New York men's wear consultant, also took the fifth amendment in a brief appearance before the subcommittee.

Goldman, a New York newspaperman, denied present Communist Party membership, but invoked the fifth amendment for periods in the past.

Woolford, manager of the Jackson VA Center, stated today that free college educations or free vocational educations are available for the sons and daughters of servicemen who died, or who die in years ahead, of injury or disease resulting from their military service during World War I, World War II, or the Korean conflict.

The new educational program—similar to the GI bill for veterans—is authorized by the War Orphans' Educational Assistance Act, Public Law 634, 84th Congress. Woolford stated the purpose of the educational program is to give these young people an opportunity to get the education they might have had if their parent had lived. There are approximately 1800 Mississippi children expected to be eligible for free education.

Mississippi war orphans who were under 23 years old on June 30, 1956, and who have finished high school or are about to finish high school should write the VA Center in Jackson, Miss., for more information about the program. Under the terms of the Act, Woolford said students will receive \$1100.00 a month for full-time training for a period of 36 months, the equivalent of four years' college education. The student may

Establish Vegetated Waterways Now On Land To Be Terraced Next Spring

To properly terrace land the water should be divided on the ridge and conducted to and emptied into natural or established vegetated waterways. If these vegetated waterways need to be established they should be located in the national depression and they should be made as nearly as practical to follow the natural contour of these major depression.

Landowners who plan to terrace land next spring should establish the vegetated waterways, needed to empty these terraces into, this fall. To wait until plow time next spring to terrace land may be all right provided, there are national outlets into which the terraces and rows can empty, but if it should be necessary to construct and vegetate an outlet, the outlet would have to be established first and the land terraced later.

Where vegetated outlets are established in the fall the field can be terraced the following spring. Where the vegetated outlets are established in the spring the land adjacent to it can be terraced. seek an educational goal such as a college degree; a professional goal such as law or medicine; or a vocational goal such as book-keeper or machinist.

There are special provisions for disabled children who are in need of special restorative training.

Iuka Had 9% Business Increase In August Compared To 1955

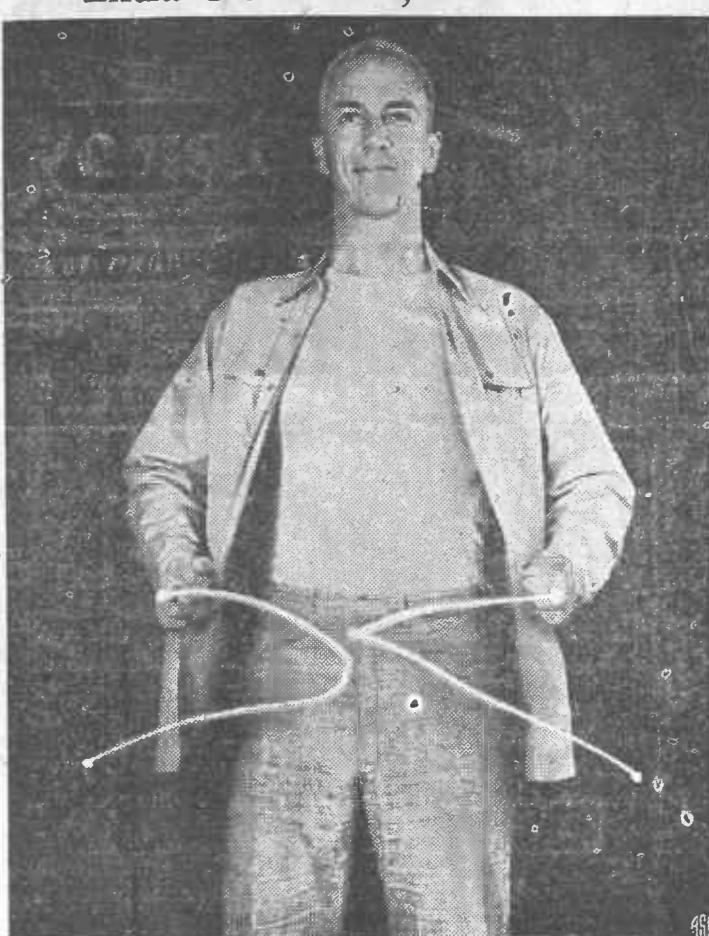
Business activity in Booneville showed that telephones in service rose 8 per cent and city sales tax collections, no charge.

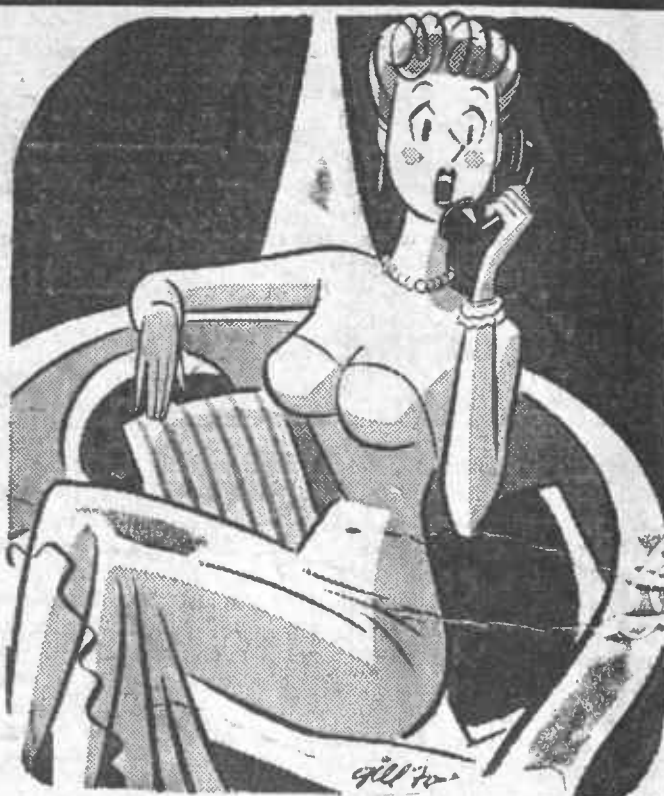

Commissioner Scarbrough Calls For Better Performance From Force

Commissioner of Public Safety Scarbrough in an assembly of the Iuka Highway Patrol Thursday called for better performance from every member of the force and expressed confidence in the public stood solidly behind the Patrol's all-out enforcement effort.

Scarbrough said the state too much to operate these Patrol cars and demand top performance, "and the Patrolmen were told that each man being watched closely. It was pointed out that although overall activity had increased tremendously since July 1, the Patrol was lagging behind the recommended "national average" in enforcement.

Commissioner Scarbrough cautioned the assembled Patrolmen in District Four (New Albany) to not become "ticket happy" and to give tickets only when warranted and keep on the road."

According to Scarbrough, only a few men on the Patrol still indicate laxity in their enforcement effort. He praised the men of the New Albany district, pointing out that their performance record was the third highest in the state during August. "There are some of you however," he added, "who are falling short of what I expect. The state has been wiped clean as of now. I expect all of you to give your best to your job from now on."

The state's present death toll is 21 deaths above that recorded last year. Curbing death toll was called the Patrol's challenge.

"You have better cars, a little more pay, new equipment, and the taxpayer and I expect better results in return," the Commissioner said.

Commissioner Scarbrough's meeting with Patrolmen at New Albany, Thursday noon, was the first such district meeting held by the new Patrol head. Plans to hold other district meetings have been voiced.

Did You Drink Your Milk?
To make a hundred on a milk drinking test, a child needs to drink from one and 1/2 pints to a quart of milk each day. Teen-agers need a quart or more. And grown-ups should have at least a pint.

Mrs. Homemaker, better check on the milk-drinking habits of yourself and your family.

If they "just won't drink milk," camouflage it in the other foods you prepare. One good way to add more milk to the daily diet is to serve it with cereal.

From soup to dessert, milk used generously in cooking can add greatly to the nourishment in meals. The mainstay source of calcium in our food supply is milk. And when families in this country are not well fed, the nutrient they most often lack is calcium.

Scalloped Ham with Noodles
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
3 tablespoons flour
Salt to taste
3 cups hot milk
2 cups cooked noodles
3 cups ground cooked ham or Shoulder
1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

Melt butter or margarine, blend in flour and salt; gradually add milk and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Make alternate layers of noodles and meat in a shallow baking dish, pour on the sauce, sprinkle bread crumbs over top. Bake at 375 degrees F (moderate oven) about 20 minutes. Makes 6 servings, with 1/2 cup milk per serving.

Chocolate Pancakes
2 cups pancake mix
2 1/2 cups chocolate milk
1 egg

2 tablespoons melted butter
Add chocolate milk, egg and butter to pancake mix, stirring lightly. Bake on hot, lightly greased griddle, turning only once. Fold pancakes in half. Serve with vanilla, chocolate, peppermint or chocolate chip ice cream.

Nonfat Dry Milk
The wise and thrifty homemaker uses nonfat dry milk in her cooking.

Nonfat dry milk is sweet milk in powder form with the water, fat and Vitamin A taken out. It has the same food value as whole milk after the cream has been skimmed off.

You can use it when fresh fluid milk is hard to get, when you want to add extra food value to dishes that do or do not already call for milk, when you do not have a refrigerator handy to keep fluid fresh, and when you must cut food costs but want to keep meals high in food value.

Use it mixed with water and then use in drinks or dishes with milk, or in the dry form when making breads, cakes or puddings. Your favorite recipes for biscuit, pancake and cake mixes like-

ly call for this nonfat dry milk. Several "mix" recipes are available from your home agent's office.

Dried Milk for Whipped Toppings
If you are a calorie watcher, you will find a whipped topping made of nonfat dry milk lower in calories than whipped cream.
