Cotton Ginning Ahead Of Last Yr.

County Agent W. C. Hamilton, in his report on crops in Tishomingo county, has this to say:

"Ginning for 1956 season is running about 550 bales ahead of 1955 prior to the first of October. The cotton harvest is eighty-five percent completed and the county will make around 6,000 bales. This expected production will give the county about two-thirds bale per acre average.

"Corn harvesting has just begun with a fair yield expected. Where moisture was sufficient, some exceptionally high yields are being observed."

TO CONSTITUTION OF
STATE OF MISSISSIPPI
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESO-
LUTION NO. 10**A Concurrent resolution propos-
ing to amend Section 112 of the
Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to
authorize the Legislature to use a
different mode of assessing and col-
lecting ad valorem taxes on motor
vehicles.Be it resolved by the Legislature
of the State of Mississippi, two-
thirds of the members of each
House concurring therein, That the
following amendment to the Con-
stitution be submitted to the qual-
ified electors of the state for ratifi-
cation or rejection at an election to
be held on the first Tuesday after
the first Monday in November,
1956, viz:Amend section 112 of the Missis-
sippi Constitution of 1890 to read
as follows:112. Taxation shall be uniform
and equal throughout the state.
Property shall be taxed in propor-
tion to its value. The Legislature
may, however, impose a tax per
capita upon such domestic animals
as from their nature and habits are
destructive of other property.
Property shall be assessed for taxes
under general laws, and by uniform
rules, according to its true value.
But the Legislature may provide
for a special mode of valuation and
assessment for railroads, and rail-
road and other corporate property,
or for particular species of prop-
erty belonging to persons, corpora-
tions, or associations not situated
wholly in one county. But the
Legislature may provide a special
mode of assessment, fixing the tax-
able year, date of the tax lien, and
method and date of assessing and
collecting taxes on all motor vehi-
cles. But all such property shall
be assessed at its true value, and
no county shall be denied the right
to levy county and special taxes
upon such assessment as in other
cases of property situated and as-

"In the earlier days of our country every one worked for himself," said Mrs. Skinner. "He had no house rent, utility bills nor grocery bills. Families were clanish. When one could not make a go of it the rest of the family carried on the work. Neighbors would help with the work, help nurse the sick, and give freely of their own groceries. Today a great majority of our people work for someone else for a salary or wages.

They live in rented or installment purchased houses. When through sickness, accident, or death, the pay check stops, the people are immediately in need. In hanging on to our dollars, we cry out, "Oh, why Don't they do so and so and take care of themselves." It is not what the other fellow does or does not that helps your own soul. Someone truthfully said, "There are no pockets in a shroud." The only thing you can hold in your cold dead hand is what you have given away."

"When we speak of welfare most of us think of assistance to the needy. Many people do not believe in welfare, especially when it helps someone else. But we all believe in highways, agricultural extension, soil conservation, health ser-

vices, Rural Free Delivery of mail, Homestead Exemption, etc. These are also welfare.

"For the month of September, 1956, a total of \$26,110.00 was given to needy people. This money is spent in the county. Figuring a gross profit of 20%, that will mean a profit of \$5,222.00 for the merchants of this county. At present the Federal government matches the state money \$4 to \$1. The Welfare Department serves in many ways in addition to approving needy persons for grants."

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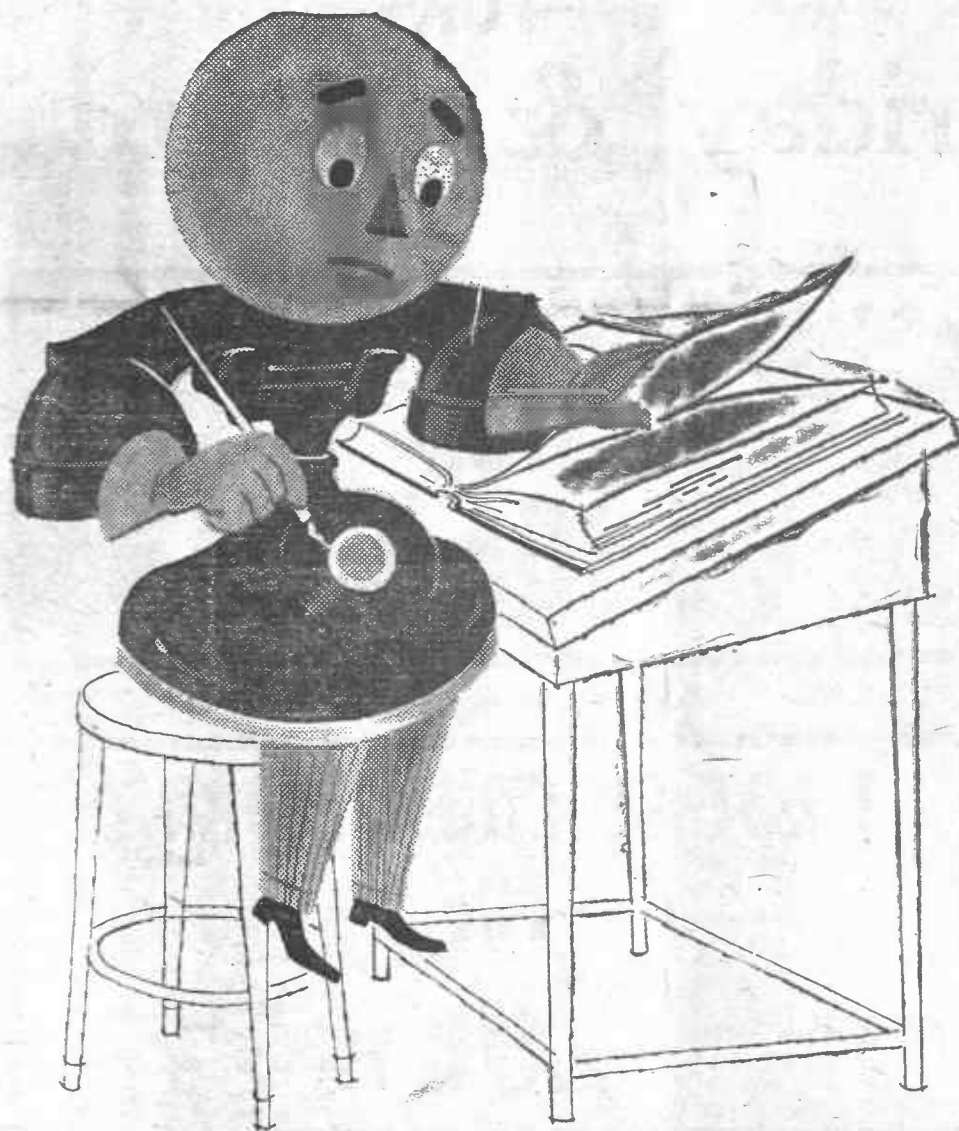

**1956 Social Security Amendments
Gives Protection To Many People**

By Mary King Temple (Manager of the Sheffield Social Security Office)

In my last article I told of self-employed lawyers, dentists, and other professional people now covered by social security. Under the 1956 amendments to the law, their earnings started to count towards old-age and survivors insurance protection for themselves and their families beginning January 1, 1956. Naturally, they want to know how long it will take them to become insured under the law.

To become insured under social security a person must have been in work covered by the law for a specified length of time. The amount of work required is measured in "quarters of coverage" which, in a general way, corresponds with a calendar quarter of work. A self-employed person gets 4 quarters of coverage for a year in which he has \$400 or more in net earnings from self-employment. The usual requirements for becoming insured are 1 quarter of coverage out of every two calendar quarters of coverage. Under the amended law, a person who works continuously after 1955 can become insured with fewer quarters of coverage. This change in the law permits self-employed professionals and others brought under social security as of the beginning of this year to disregard their years of non-coverage in acquiring an insured status under social security.

For example, Dr. Jones, a self-employed dentist, is now age 63. He had never before been in work covered by social security. Dr. Jones will reach 65 in 1958—two years after his self-employment first became covered under the amended law. If his birthday is before April first, he will need to have a quarter of coverage in each of the 8 quarters elapsing after 1955 and up to the quarter in which he reaches 65. If all these quarters are quarters of coverage, he will be insured for old age benefits if he elects to retire at that time.

If Dr. Jones' birthday occurs in the second calendar quarter of the year, he will need 9 quarters

of coverage before then; if he reaches 65 in the 3rd quarter of 1958, he will need 10 quarters of coverage before that time. If his birthday is after the end of September, 11 quarters of coverage up to that time will be required.

For death benefit purposes, however, Dr. Jones would be insured as early as April 1957 if all 6 of the quarters elapsing after 1955 and through the second quarter of 1957 are quarters of coverage. He would not then be insured for retirement benefits, as he would die at that time, survivors payments could be made to certain of his dependents, as he would have met the minimum requirement of six quarters of coverage.

Benefit amounts are based on a person's average monthly earnings in employment or self-employment covered by the law. If all the time elapsing after 1950 were used in figuring this average, self-employed professionals newly brought under social security would have 5 years in which these earnings were not covered and would count against them.

The amended law permits the dropping of these five years. A self-employed dentist, lawyer, or any other person whose work was first covered by social security this year, will not have his average earnings reduced when he qualifies for benefits because his work was not covered in the years 1951 through 1955.

In these articles, I have frequently mentioned age 65 as the earliest age at which a person can qualify for old-age payments. This has been true since the beginning of social security insurance payments. It still holds for men. The recent amendments, however, provide for the payment of benefits to women beginning at age 62. In my next article I shall explain how women may, if they choose, start getting benefit payments at age 62.

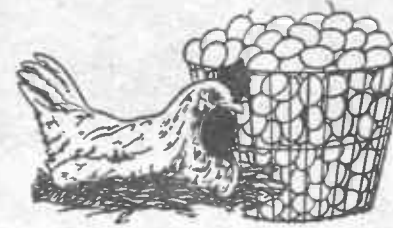

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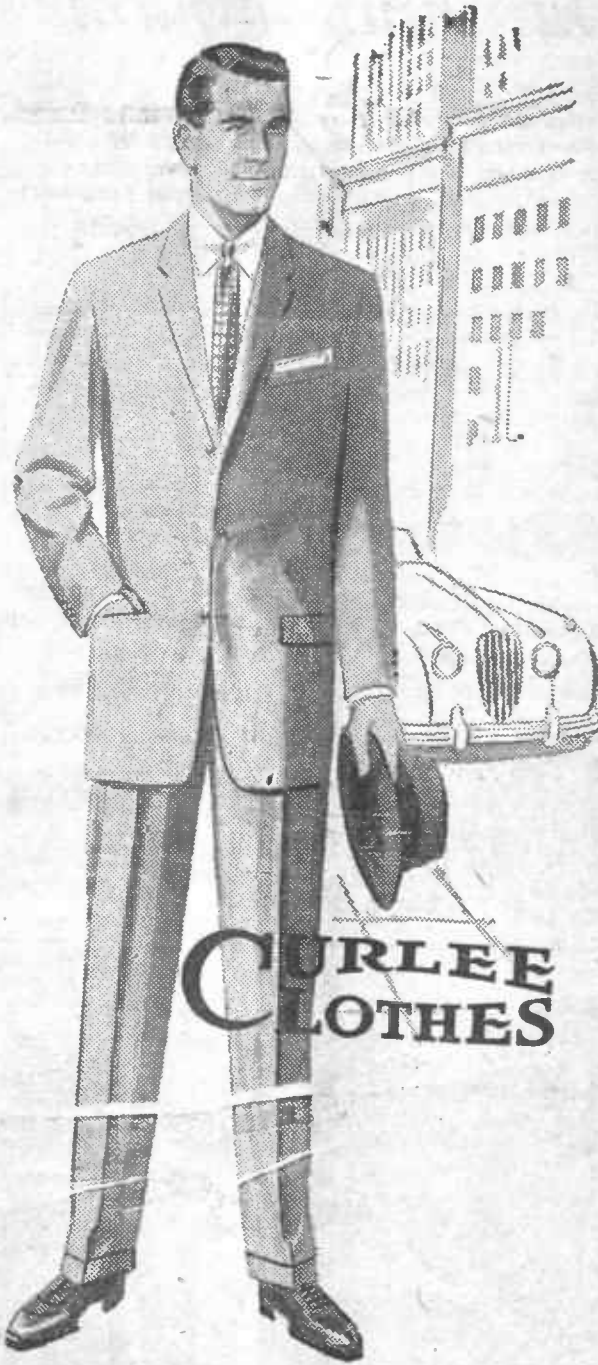

Tuberculosis Superstitions Attacked

Or tradition or fact? Only people get TB? TB runs in families? These and many other questions can be answered by your local association.

W. C. Hamilton, President, Tishomingo County TB Association, pointed out that the tuberculosis problem has been changing in recent years.

Nine years ago the TB problem was measured by deaths. People caught TB usually died. Today it is the living person who has TB. A steadily increasing number of 40 years of age and over are being discovered, but a strike at any age.

Superstition that TB runs in families has long been exploded. Hamilton pointed out.

It is not inherited. It is to run in families, because members in close contact with a TB patient are more likely to catch his disease than outsiders. Bank account is no barrier," she declared, attacking superstition that only people in certain circumstances get TB.

But, however, that crowded conditions and poor nutrition often go with poverty can be a resistance to TB infection. Old superstitions about TB dying out due to increased

knowledge of the facts about the disease. Mrs. Hamilton attributed this in large measure to the educational work being done by the Tishomingo County TB Association, the health department, and to the wide publicity given TB through its annual Christmas Seal Sale, sponsored by the Lucy Rowe Study Club.

R. C. Tice Returns To Iuka After Training Course

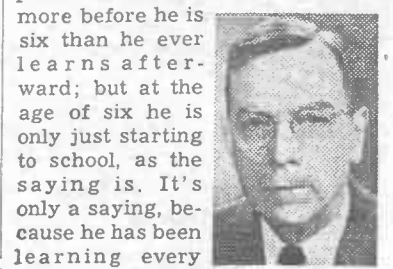
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Deuteronomy 6.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 78:1-7.

Home School

Lesson for October 21, 1956

NOT many people are born in a school-house. But most people in America move to some school-house before they are two weeks old. Because then they come home from the hospital; and home is the greatest school in the world. Experts tell us that a child learns more before he is six than he ever learns afterward; but at the age of six he is only just starting to school, as the saying is. It's only a saying, because he has been learning every minute since he first blinked at the light, and most of this he learned right at home. Learning is not just what is printed in books. The child learns to understand and to speak his mother-tongue; he learns to walk and run and eat and play. He learns a little about how to get along with other people. Among the most important things he learns are what never gets into a book—prejudices, habits, attitudes, both good and bad.

first blinked at the light, and most of this he learned right at home. Learning is not just what is printed in books. The child learns to understand and to speak his mother-tongue; he learns to walk and run and eat and play. He learns a little about how to get along with other people. Among the most important things he learns are what never gets into a book—prejudices, habits, attitudes, both good and bad.

Learning Religion at Home

If it is true that our relation to God is more important than any other relation of life, then it is true also that the religion learned in the home is more important than anything else learned there. Suppose a child's home-school teaches everything except religion, how much hope is there that religion will become real to him? There are 168 hours in every week. Take out 56 for sleeping (it would really be more for a child) and you have left 112 waking hours. Let us suppose that little Johnnie Doe, Jr., is sent off to Sunday school by Mr. and Mrs. Doe, who take him and fetch him afterwards, but never, no never go to Sunday school or church themselves. That makes one hour of religion per week, 111 hours of no-religion. How much of anything is a child going to learn if he has less than one per cent of his time to put on it? If all the religious homes of America stopped teaching religion, the churches and synagogues would soon fold up.

But Can Religion Be Taught?

At this point someone may catch us up. "Can religion be taught? Isn't it 'caught, not taught'?" Quite so. The genuine spark is kindled only on the invisible altar of God. But in your car engine, the spark does not come to life in an empty chamber. There has to be there the right mixture of gasoline vapor and air. Without that, the sparks shine for a brief instant and go out—and nothing happens. When a gardener plants vegetables, he knows that if the seed is not fertile his work is useless. Everything depends on a germ he did not and cannot create. But that does not give him leave to quit his job. The gardener's job is to prepare the seed-bed in which the living seed will sprout and not die. So the home prepares the seed-bed in which the living seed of God's grace can bring forth a harvest. Speaking without parables, the home can teach a great many things about religion which can't be learned by inspiration or absorption. The Bible is high among these; in the home begins the work of filling the storehouse of the mind with treasures from the Word of God.

"When Your Son Asks You . . ."

The great sixth chapter of Deuteronomy is perhaps one of the most often quoted chapters of the Bible. In it, father and mothers are commanded to be teachers. God knows that rabbis and priests and preachers are never enough. But we find in this chapter also (among many others) this further thought: Children will not always understand all they are taught. They will ask "Why?" So, when (in the words of Deuteronomy) your son asks, What is the meaning of the testimonies and the statutes and the ordinances . . . ? The father and mother are not to dodge such questions. There is nothing meaningless about true religion; on the contrary, religion discovers life's central meaning. True religion is not a set of "scruples" as an unsympathetic sociologist has put it,—not a collection of senseless "Don'ts." A great phrase in Deuteronomy put a great deal in a few words: true religion, all the commandments of God, everything we ought to believe and be and do, is "for our good always." But father and mother must learn that first before they can teach it.

County Agent news

It pays to feed hay the year round to dairy cows. Feeding hay will pay right now especially in helping to prevent a fall slump in milk production.

Feed racks or troughs are a practical way to keep hay available to the cows all the time. When pastures get short, the cows will make up the difference by eating more hay.

If you don't have a suitable rack

that can be used for hay feed, plan carefully before building one.

It will pay to do a sturdy job of building. For feeding in bad weather, the rack will need a roof with large hinged doors. By protecting hay from weather spoilage, it will pay for itself in a short time.

A good rack must be movable. By moving the rack to different locations, the cows will spread their manure more evenly and prevent excessive trampling of any part of the pasture. Wheels on the rack also make it easier to take to the barn for refilling.

Woods Fires

October and November are dangerous forest fire months. Since rainfall generally this year has been below normal, special care is needed to prevent a serious outbreak of fires.

Fires can start within a few hours or a day after a moderate

rain. Once started, a fire creates its own wind. Be extremely careful with matches, cigarettes and when burning trash or fence rows. Take all precautions.

Tractor Care

Increase the life of your tractor and cut operating expense by properly caring for it. The air cleaner on the tractor does a vital job. If the air cleaner functions properly, it must be in top condition. Service it regularly.

Neglect of the air cleaner results in wear of bearings, pistons, rings and other moving parts. These cause excessive oil consumption, loss of power and waste of fuel.

When servicing the air cleaner, check for worn air hoses, loose connecting clamps, and crushed or broken air lines. Remove the oil cup from the cleaner and pour out the dirty oil. Wash the cup in fuel oil or kerosene, refill and

replace.

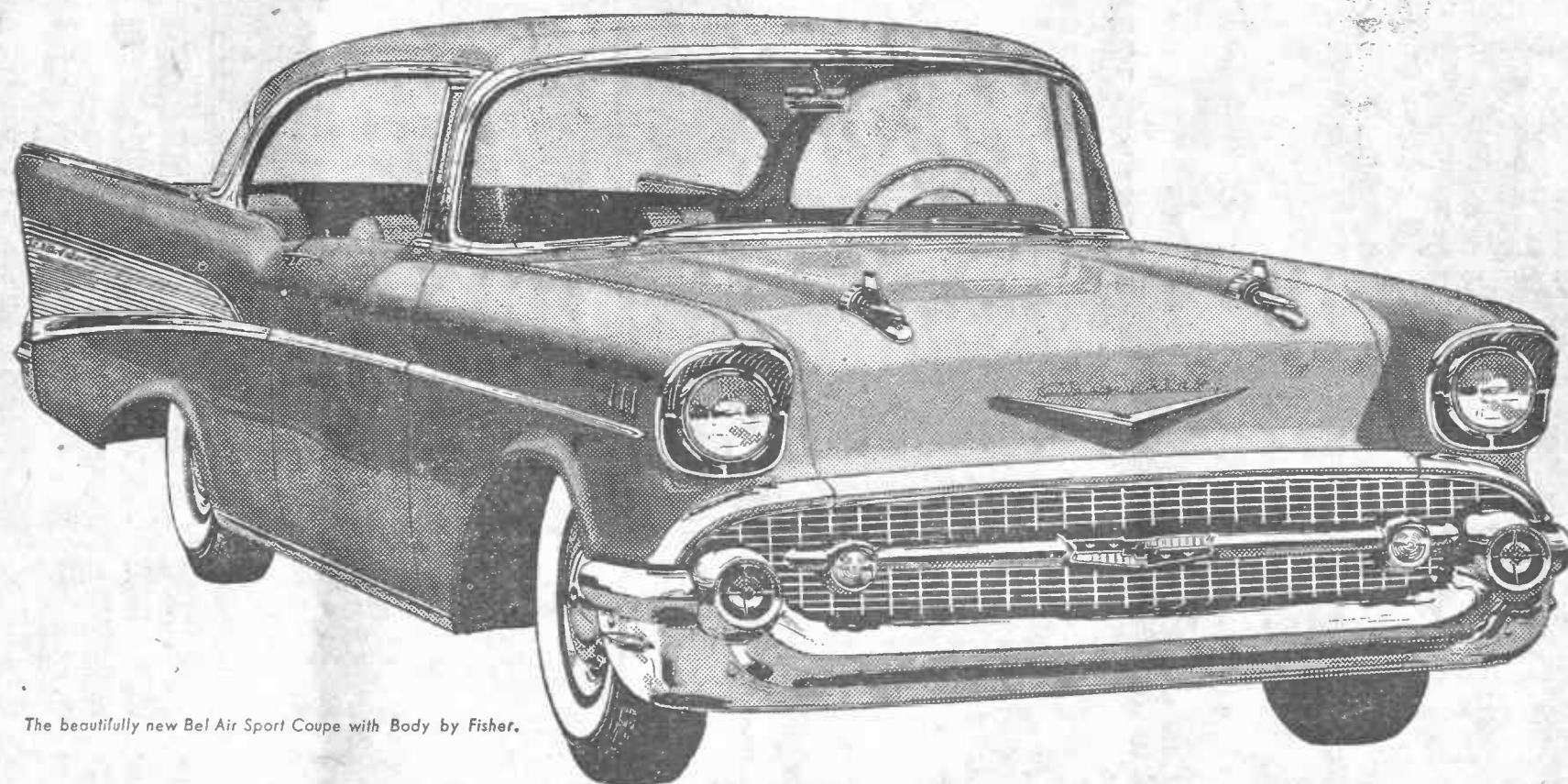
