RFD Patrons Requested To Locate Mail Boxes On Right Side Of Road

Every patron of any post office in Mississippi who receives mail by rural carrier is advised that all postmasters have been instructed by the Post Office Department to see that rural mail boxes are located on the right side of the road in the direction traveled by the carrier.

It is a very dangerous practice, both from the standpoint of legality and safety for the carrier to serve a box on the wrong side of the road in violation of existing regulations.

Patrons having boxes on the left as traveled by the carrier are respectfully requested to move the box so that it may be served on the right as traveled by the carrier. Patrons who live on a road on which the carrier passes in both directions, need not change locations; the box, however will be served only from the right side.

Crackdown On Autos Without Mufflers By Patrol

Audie Marlar, highway patrolman from Burnsville, and other patrolmen in the county have received orders to crack down on autos that do not have proper mufflers.

"Operators of loud and noisy cars will be fined according to the law," Mr. Marlar said. "This is a fair warning to you, if your muffler is not working right, to have it put in proper order."

Section 8251 in "Rules of the Road, State of Mississippi," says "Every motor vehicle shall at all times be equipped with a muffler in good working order and in constant operation to prevent excessive or unusual noise and annoying smoke, and no person shall use a muffler cutout, bypass or similar device upon a motor vehicle on a highway."

Penalty for operating a motor vehicle without a muffler or in violation of the above statement is a fine of not more than \$100.00 or imprisonment for not more than ten days.

Constitutional Amendment Passes In State; Rushing And South Are County School Board Members

A slightly greater interest in the Presidential election was demonstrated in Tishomingo county as the results of Tuesday's election indicate. Approximately 2250 votes were cast with the Democrats, naturally, polling the greatest number—1577—for Stevenson and Ke-fauver. The Lilly White Republicans polled 464 votes and the Black and Tans got 46. The Independent electors polled 77 votes in the county.

Congressman Tom Abernethy, seeking reelection to congress, received a wonderful vote of endorsement from the voters of the county. His take was 1583, the

greatest total registered in the entire county election. William Greene Roberts of West Point polled 1294 votes in his bid for Supreme Court Judge.

In the race for County School Board member in the First and Second districts, K. L. Rushing swamped W. E. Monroe by almost two to one. Their totals in the first district were, Rushing 443; Monroe 237. In the Second District for this office, South went in over Adams and Pharr to the tune of a 75 vote majority above his nearest opponent. The votes cast were: Adams 179; Pharr 137; and South 254.

The Constitutional amendment on the ballot received the staunch approval of the voters of the county. This is a proposition to amend the constitution of 1890 so that the Legislature may pass new laws governing the method of assessing and collecting ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles. The vote in the county was 1039 for, compared to 448 against.

Balloting over the state gave the Democrats 113,841; the Republicans 49,712. On the constitutional amendment the statewide vote was 85,911 for with 37,339 against. Thus it appears that the amendment passed by a large margin.

Nationally, President Eisenhower carried 41 states with a total of 457 electoral votes. His popular vote was over 31,000,000. Stevenson carried 6 Southern states and Missouri with a total of 74 electoral votes. Stevenson's popular vote was over 21,000,000. The six Southern states going for Stevenson were Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, and North and South Carolina.

Votes cast in the first district for county school board member were, by precincts: for Rushing, Iuka 184; North Iuka 108; West Iuka 138; and Salem 13. For Monroe: Iuka 99; North Iuka 54; West Iuka 81, and Salem 3.

Votes cast by precincts in the Second district for County School Board member were, for Adams: Burnsville 68; North Burnsville 31; West Burnsville 50; Sharp 10, and Coles Mill 20. For Pharr: Burnsville 54; North Burnsville 31; West Burnsville 37; Sharp 1, and Coles Mill 14. For South: Burnsville 43; North Burnsville 87; West Burnsville 43; Sharp 3, and Coles Mill 78.

Sherman Lambert, present member of the board, withdrew from the race several weeks before the election. However, two ballots were cast for him in Tuesday's election.

Report Of Traffic Convictions To Dept. Of Public Safety; Urgent

Mississippi Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough is urging all municipalities and court officials to report traffic convictions to the Department of Public Safety promptly.

Section 8281 of the Mississippi Code of 1942 as amended requires "every magistrate or judge, and every clerk of a court of record" to keep a full record of cases in which a person has been charged

with a traffic violation.

This same statute further requires that the court officer "within 10 days after conviction or forfeiture of bail" of any person charged with a traffic violation "shall prepare and immediately forward to the Department (Public Safety) an abstract of the record of said court." The "failure, refusal or neglect" of any judicial officer to comply with provisions of this statute constitutes misconduct in office.

Commissioner Scarbrough stresses that this court conviction information is necessary in the Department of Public Safety's dealing with problem drivers and habitual violators.

These negligent drivers considered bad traffic risks by the Highway Patrol, constitute only about 15 per cent of the motorists using the Nation's streets and highways. Yet the same 15 per cent are responsible for an estimated 96 per cent of all traffic accidents, safety authorities maintain.

"If it can be determined who these incorrigible drivers are, the Department will suspend their driving privileges until such time that they indicate they no longer constitute a menace to the traveling public and to themselves," Commissioner Scarbrough promises.

A recent recommendation of a National Safety Council representative evaluating Mississippi traffic activities called for a strengthening of driver license controls, and the broadening of a driver improvement program by the state.

Sections 8106 and 8107 of the Code of 1942 as amended already outline several mandatory revocation provisions and establishes grounds for suspensions by the Commissioner in still other cases.

However, before the controls authorized by these statutes can be affected, the Department of Public Safety must have at its disposal the traffic court conviction records of all offenders. Thus, the appeal by Commissioner Scarbrough to municipalities for support of the program.

"I know of specific instances where, if the cities and towns had filed the records of these problem drivers with this department, lives may have been saved," he said.

"Many cities cooperate 100 per cent," Scarbrough states. "But there are some court officials who do not supply the Department with the necessary court abstracts to make this program really effective."

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Winter Planting

Wheat can safely be planted until November 15 for grain. Tests show wheat planted this late does as well or better as when planted in the early fall.

Sixty to 70 pounds of seed per acre is enough for grain. For grazing, 90 to 100 pounds will be better.

If you failed to get all your oats planted earlier, don't hesitate to go ahead and plant them now. Where grain only is wanted, fertilizer should be left off until spring. The small grain can be topdressed

then with the recommended amounts of fertilizer.

Winter peas can still be planted in Bermuda grass sod. A sod seeder should be used for this planting so that the peas will be on top of the ground at this late date. If a freeze catches them as they are germinating, it will kill them.

Crimson clover can still be planted on cultivated or sod land, provided the seed are covered. Crimson clover is like winter peas, if planted on top of the ground now, it is likely to get killed by freezing.

Farmers who have not yet ferti-

lized their permanent pastures, are urged to do so this month. Care should be taken not to burn the young plants with the fertilizer. Pelleted fertilizer will seldom stick to the plants and burn them, but finely ground fertilizer should only be applied when the plants are dry.

November and December are ideal months to lime pastures. Recommendations are one ton ground limestone per acre. For specific recommendations on your particular farm, a soils test is suggested.

4-H Round-Up

Next Tuesday and Wednesday, November 13-14, are big days for

the 4-H Club boys and girls of Mississippi. These are the dates of the annual State 4-H Round-Up of Champions in Jackson. State and district 4-H winners will attend the two day affair.

Thin Pines

Those who planted some pine seedlings 10 to 15 years ago should probably check to see if the trees need thinning. Usually a stand, whether natural or planted, will need thinning in this length of time.

If the thinning is not done when needed, growth rate of the trees is slowed. It takes longer to grow a sawlog in over crowded stands.

In some cases when left too long in stands, they never reach size even after thinning because the trees become to grow at a rapid rate.

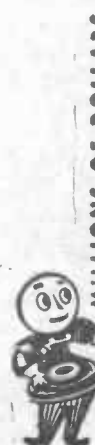

Benefits For Women Aged 62, Disabled Children Under 18, Explained

Persons who may become entitled to benefits or survivors insurance during the months following the death of a person because of recent changes in the social security law, women aged 62, disabled persons who have reached age 50, and children under 18, will not lose any benefits if they delay filing a claim until the end of that year before filing a claim for benefits, Mrs. Mary King, district manager of the social security office, declared.

Benefits to a woman who has reached age 62 can begin with the first payment for this November which is due after the end of that month. However, women 62 to 65, who are applying for the payment, must apply for the payment immediately. "Even if they wait a full year before filing a claim, the social security office will not until November 1957—still get any back pay," she is entitled to, Mrs. King assures them.

Disabled working person who has reached age 50 can't start monthly benefit payments until 1957. Even if he does file a claim until the end of 1957, he will get back pay for all months beginning next July. In the case of a person who became disabled before age 18, the first payments will be made in January 1957. However, claim for benefits is not due until January 1958 back pay for the 12 months can be

Temple said that many people who have read about or heard about the recent changes in the social security law stand to lose some payments to which they are entitled if they do not file an application for benefits before the end of 1957.

State College, Miss.—Southern peas, widely grown as a canning crop in Mississippi, are becoming increasingly popular for freezing. In an effort to determine the best variety for freezing, the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station conducted a study in which four popular varieties were compared. The test included Mississippi Crowder and Dixielee, the newest varieties developed by the Mississippi Station. Two older varieties, Brown Crowder and Baby Bush Purple Hulls, were also included. The peas were shelled, blanched for three minutes and frozen within two hours after they were harvested. They were then stored for five months before being thawed and cooked.

Dixielee, Brown Crowder and Mississippi Crowder were found to have essentially the same nutritive value. The Purple Hull variety had a lower ascorbic acid content, and higher starch, protein, fiber and sugar content than the other varieties. Only about one-half to one-third of the ascorbic acid in the fresh peas remained in the cooked ones and the greatest loss occurred in blanching and cooking. In a taste test conducted by a panel of judges more of these losses were found to cause off-flavors and all four of the varieties were rated about equally desirable as far as taste was concerned. "No doubt personal preferences, based on factors other than taste, causes 1 variety to be more popular than another in various sections of Mississippi," concluded Dr. W. F. Jenkins who made the study. "No one variety yet available has all the desired characteristics for canning and freezing," Dr.

Dr. James C. Totten, Health Officer of the County Health Department estimates that as many

as 100 persons afflicted with tuberculosis may be walking the streets in Tishomingo County, spreading the disease to healthy persons with whom they associate.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Micah 6:1-6
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 1:1-6

This Is It

Lesson for November 11, 1956

THREE questions are asked over and over again by who take life seriously but are groping for the answers. What is God? Is it altogether a matter of taste? Is there any that is never good and any that is always good, no matter what? Second, What does God want of us? What does it take to please him? Is there any simple ordinary way of knowing what God wants? Third, Why doesn't God speak to us as he does to the prophets of old? Doesn't God, who knows all answers, share his knowledge with us?

Country Preacher

Long ago a country preacher these questions thrown up at him. His name was Micah. He was a preacher in the regular way, he had no church, and in fact had no connection with the official religion of his country. He did speak and preach—as we know, only to his villagers; but what he said was remembered. We have it from his sermons in what we call the Book of Micah, a minor prophet (that is, shorter) of the Old Testament. Micah never preached a full-length sermon. Maybe he just stood around in the market-place, talked to any who would listen, any rate it is plain that he asked much the same questions those three just now mentioned. The country of Judah, in Micah's small town of Gath was located, was either in a prosperous condition or was in a declining one—depending on you lived. Babson Discusses War Possibilities

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 8 The situation looks serious. It overshadows the election which I will discuss next. During the 30 years that I

written this I have, however, conditions or unmake S. presidents, that U. S. presidents do not or unmake world affairs.

I feel that every citizen, shopkeeper, manufacturer, and banker should intensify study the world situation by making future plans.

The Egyptian Situation

For many years Egypt had been under the control of the British through a figurehead ruler. Years ago there was a revolution instigated by the army. Since Nasser has served as dictator, the situation has not been satisfactory to England and France, but they took action until the Suez Canal problem arose.

Because the Western Nations refused the funds to build the big dam, Nasser retaliated by taking possession of the Suez Can-

al to get his needed funds from tolls. As 70% of the steamships using the canal were British, and as the stock of the canal company was held largely by French bankers, these countries immediately became vitally interested. Although Secretary Dulles hoped to bring about a compromise program, he failed and conditions have become worse.

Now Israel Comes Into The Picture

During recent weeks Nasser, the Egyptian dictator, has been stirring up trouble between Israel and Jordan. This irritation finally caused a conflict between Jordan and Israel. The latter invaded Egypt and attempted to break through to Cairo and the Suez Canal. This made the situation very serious. President Eisenhower attempted to get the "hot potato" taken over by the United Nations. But, England and France thought it would be unsafe to wait for dilly-dally action on the part of the United Nations. Therefore, they took immediate action themselves with which all readers are well acquainted through the American press.

The situation has been further muddled by Russia joining the United States against England and France. This could lead to the possibility of a three-cornered war or at least of the United States and Russia remaining neutral, which I cannot imagine as far as Russia is concerned. The situation

must be a great temptation for Russia to step in and take the "plum" which England, France, and others will be fighting over. The only thing holding Russia back would be the fear of permanently losing some of her satellites, including East Germany. A real war could probably bring about unification of Germany.

The Present Outlook For War

As I am writing this column the strategy of England and France has been to take the airfields of Egypt, drop down their parachute armies, and get in a strong position to take over the Suez Canal. But, Russia may either switch to the side of Egypt or else ignore all countries and take over the Suez Canal, the oil fields, and pipe lines herself. This would truly be a major catastrophe which we will treat in a later column as the situation develops. If Russia honestly remains neutral or sides with the United States, the situation need not be serious.

Canada has already refused to ship more airplanes or war equipment to Egypt. This action may be followed by the United States and possibly by Russia and certain other countries. If, however, there is a real war, England and France will also need airplanes and war equipment. This offers a very juicy opportunity for countries which remain neutral, and could even get into our domestic politics. Although our government is urging peace, yet it must be remembered that the United States as well as both Great Britain and France have a strong Jewish population. Many financiers in all these countries are Jewish and this may have been a factor in the recent election.

What About U. S. Business Outlook

It seems only logical that this situation will put a damper on business in the United States for the immediate future. Many expansion plans that have been made will be held up; while radical stock market movements may be expected. Unemployment could become prevalent in certain industries, although the airplanes, oils, and steels may benefit from this unfortunate situation. It seems as if the temptation will be for most of us to take a "do nothing" attitude.

Knowing Europe as I well do, there is one bright side to the picture. This is that it might miraculously bring Europe together and make the United Nations a real force for good. It might bring about an effective agreement as to the H-Bomb and accomplish many other good things which otherwise would not be settled for years.

Therefore, like every other cloud it has a "silver lining."

Are Your Pine Trees Growing?

Are my pine trees growing? This is a question most Tishomingo County farmers should ask themselves.

It may be that the pines on your land need thinning. Pines can be compared with cattle on a pasture. The person who provides three (3) acres of pasture per cow will give his cow ample grazing, but if this is reversed and he puts three (3) cows on one acre, they will not have all the pasture they need and may suffer. Likewise the farmer who sets 800 pine seedlings per acre will find that, as the years pass, most of these pines will die, because he has too many pines on the land. It is correct to set 800 pines to begin with, but thin them like you do your row crops.

It is interesting to go into the woods and find a pine tree 16 inches to 18 inches in diameter breast high, and beside it another pine tree exactly the same age 6 inches to 8 inches in diameter, breast high. The small tree is stunted because the large tree has crowded it out. This stunted tree will never get much larger, it should be removed and used by the landowner or sold for pulpwood. THE SMALL TREE IS NOT YOUNGER.

Now let us consider a clump of pines all about the same size and age, they may be 25 years old or older, but are not as large as you think they should be. By checking the growth-rings on these trees it may be found that for half their life they grew rapidly, but for the past 10 to 12 years there has been a slowing down of growth until hardly any growth is being made from year to year. All the trees on this area may be living but they are not growing.

If measurements are made between these trees it will be found that they are spaced an average of about 12 feet apart if they measure 8 inches in diameter breast high. They will be 14 feet apart if they measure 10 inches in diameter breast high. This figures 4 feet plus average diameter of tree

breast high.

In the above example there are as many pines on the land as it will support. The pines will live, but they won't grow. They need thinning.

Those of us who work for the USDA Soil Conservation Service know the soil is protected and that water is stored in the land having a maximum stand of pine, however, we want the landowner to earn all he can from every acre he has consistent with good management.

It is the thinking of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners that good soil and water conservation practices are those practices that will protect the soil from erosion, cause water to be stored in the land and return a profit to the owner.

Pine trees properly managed will do this. Be sure your pines are growing.
