Bangs Control Offered Free To County Farmers

County Agent W. C. Hamilton states that the Mississippi Livestock and Sanitary Board in co-operating with other governmental agencies in the eradication of Bangs or Brucellosis in Cattle. This examination is a Free service offered to farmers. Mr. Hamilton says: "The State of Mississippi Livestock and Sanitary Board is co-operating with Animal Disease Eradication Branch of U. S. Government to eliminate Bangs or Brucellosis in cattle. This testing is done free of charge to the owners by accredited veterinarians. When a county accepts this program all animals in the county must be tested and calves between the age of 4 to 8 months vaccinated.

"Bangs is a costly, wide spread disease affecting cattle and swine. Humans contract the disease in the form of Undulant Fever.

"Definite diagnosis for bangs can only be attained through a blood test of animals. There is no cure for the disease once an animal becomes infected.

"Symptoms are generally absent in mature females, although some factors that may cause suspicion are these: (1) Abortions of premature fetus at around seven months, (2) Giving birth to weak calves, (3) Retained placentas or afterbirth, (4) Reduced milk production because of alteration of lactation period due to abortion.

"If you, as a cattle owner, are interested in this eradication program, contact your County Agent for further information.

Belmont Man Accidentally Shoots Self

Leonard Griffin, popular business man of Belmont, accidentally shot himself Sunday night while cleaning a .22 caliber target pistol. The accident occurred about 7:30 in a bedroom in his home. He was rushed to a hospital in Tupelo where first examination failed to show how badly he was injured. X-rays made Monday morning showed that the bullet entered his left side near the heart, struck two ribs and burst, some of the fragments hitting the left lung. However, it is thought that the lung was not punctured.

Mr. Griffin, at latest reports, was recovering satisfactorily.

\$1,500 LOAN ACCEPTED BY COUNTY CHAPTER OF NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS

A check for \$1,500.00 has been received by the Tishomingo County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to provide financial aid for local polio patients. It was announced today by E. N. Allen, Chapter Chairman.

Mr. Allen said that this county is one of nearly 500 in the Nation where local March of Dimes funds are insufficient to cover polio-fighting needs.

"The Chapter's present financial plight is the result of the assistance it has given in the past to 17 old cases and 3 new cases in 1956 who have required—and still require—costly care to give them a chance to recover their fullest capacities," Mr. Allen explained.

"In the Salk Vaccine we now have the means of bringing about the eventual control of new polio," he continued. "Age restrictions governing the use of the vaccine have now been removed. It is safe, potent, and effective and can be administered by any physician. Those who have not yet received it should begin the series of inoculations immediately to be protected against paralytic polio next year."

"However, we must not forget those victims of polio for whom the vaccine came too late," Mr. Allen emphasized. "Our job in the conquest of polio will not be finished until polio is finished as acribler of human beings and until

further mass appeals to the American public are no longer necessary to insure the care of those who have been stricken.

"Until that day comes, it is reassuring to know that the whole March of Dimes Organization stands behind our Chapter, ready to give financial assistance in case we must have it. The resolve of the National Foundation has always been to see to it that no one in our country need go without necessary care in the treatment of Polio for lack of funds."

Watch for notice of our January campaign of March of Dimes and do all you can to help in this much needed endeavor.

USDA-SCSWhitney Edwards
Says Land-
Drainage Pays

"This year I am producing 10 extra bales of cotton and 1000 bushels more corn, on 40 acres of land the soil conservation service boys helped me to drain," said Mr. Whitney Edwards.

Mr. Edwards lives up in the Northwest corner of Tishomingo County on Chambers Creek. He

said the ditching he did cost him approximately \$600.00, but it would have cost him twice this much had not Mr. Allen's office (ASC) paid about half the cost.

The Soil Conservation Service employees and the SCD Commissioners are glad the ditching Mr. Edwards has done during the past two years has proved so profitable to him.

Grain Sorghum
Makes Excellent
Yield In Tests

State College, Miss.—Experiment Station tests with grain sorghum this year indicate that this crop, with careful management, will produce excellent yields. Well adapted to mechanization, it offers a possible alternate use for land removed from cotton production by acreage control.

Under the leadership of Dr. Norman C. Merwine of State College, the Experiment Station in 1955 began breeding programs with grain sorghum, commonly called milo. Twenty-five varieties and hybrids were tested at State College and at five branch Experiment Stations in the State.

Although droughts at Raymond and Holly Springs and severe bird damage at several other locations emphasized the hazards facing this crop, some excellent yields were obtained, especially in the Delta and on bottomland land at State College.

In northern and central Mississippi the Texas hybrids made su-

perior yields and the variety Mart-in, Redbine 66, Redbine 60, Cap-rock and Plainsman made excellent crops. In south Mississippi, Combine Sagrain showed excellent promise in addition to the varieties and hybrids which produced well in other sections of the State. In the experimental area at State College, every precaution possible was taken to protect the grain so that an accurate comparison of varieties could be made. Mechanical explosive devices were used to frighten birds away. Rigid insect control was practiced and the test plots were harvested by hand. Under these research conditions, some of which probably would not be practical in the field, yields ran as high as 100 bushels per acre and averaged 77 bushels for the 25 varieties tested.

The presently used milo varieties have tight compact heads which often leads to grain mold and insect build-up. One objective of the Experiment Station breeding program is to develop a high-yielding,

open-headed hybrid or variety with the head extending well out of the leaves at maturity. A report on the grain sorghum breeding work is published in the November issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Protection Of
Disabled Children
New Concept

Protection of disabled children of all ages is a new concept under social security. Mrs. Mary King Temple, manager of the Sheffield social security office, said that disabled children over age 18 will be benefited for the first time by the new social security amendments.

Under the new amendments children who are disabled may receive social security benefits even after

they reach age 18 if they were disabled before they reached age 18, are unmarried and are dependent on a live parent who is drawing social security benefits, or who were dependent on a deceased parent who could have been entitled to social security benefits. For the purpose of these new amendments the term "parent" includes natural parent, step-parent or adopting parent.

It is not necessary that the child himself have any record of work under the social security law to be eligible for benefits as a disabled child.

Mrs. Temple said that in order to be entitled under the disability provisions disabled children must have a disability severe enough so that they are prevented from engaging in any substantial gainful activity. The disability must be medically determinable and must have existed prior to the child's 18th birthday.

If you believe that you may be eligible for benefits as a disabled

child or if you have in your care a child who may be eligible for benefits, you or someone in your family should contact your nearest social security office.

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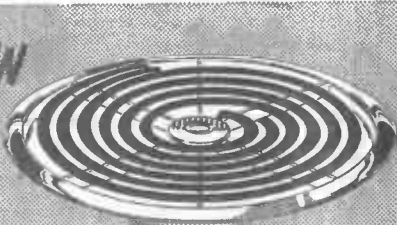

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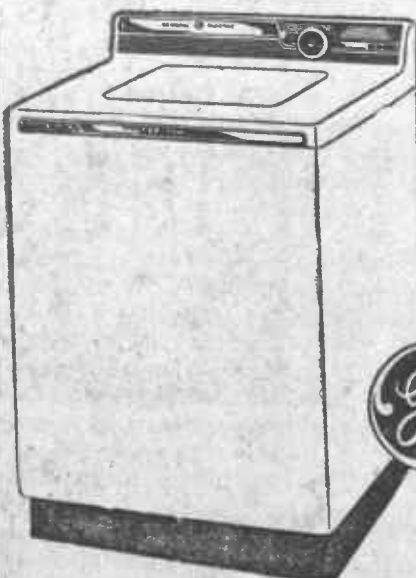

Work Makes Some Eligible For Security Beginning In 1957

The 1954 amendments changed the above test. The regularity-of-work restriction was removed and replaced by a cash wages test. Through 1956, if a farm employee is paid as much as \$100 cash wages by any one farm employer in a year, his earnings are creditable for social security purposes and should be reported by the employer to his social security account.

This year a further change has been made in the coverage test for farm employees. Under an amendment which will become effective beginning with 1957, farm work will count toward social security benefits if the worker meets either of two conditions. (1) If the farm employer pays him \$150 or more in cash during the year; (2) if he does farm work for an employer on 20 or more days during a year for cash pay figured on a time basis (that is, on some unit of time such as an hour, day,

or week), rather than on a piece-rate basis. For the \$150-a-year test, both piece-rate pay and pay based on a unit of time count and the total number of days worked does not matter; for the 20-day test, the total amount of cash pay is not a consideration so long as farm work is done for one employer on 20 or more days for cash pay.

The 1954 law did not cover agricultural work performed by workers from Mexico hired under contract or by foreign workers lawfully admitted from the British West Indies on a temporary basis.

Under the 1956 amendments, service performed by foreign workers admitted to the United States on a temporary basis to perform agricultural work from any foreign country will not be covered by the law after 1956.

If you are a farmer or a rancher, or if you gain a livelihood in any kind of agricultural or horticultural work, either in employment or self-employment, the social security law as newly amended is important to you and your family. It is well to realize that this program of social insurance is now three-fold—it provides old-age benefits for men at age 65 and for women at 62; it provides survivor protection for young wives and minor children and to aged parents and dependent husbands; if provides benefits to the insured disabled worker after he reaches age 50. These and other changes in the law which affect the working population and the nation's families in general are described in special leaflets available at any district office of the Social Security Administration. Even a suspicion that a baby has been exposed to whooping cough is a good reason for taking him to the doctor immediately.

Death frequently follows the infection in a baby under six months old or the disease may damage his brain and affect his thinking and behavior. For this reason medical authorities and the state board of health stress early immunization. Practice is now to immunize infants at three months of age or earlier.

This disease is an annoying one in older children, but a deadly one for infant.

Check on Checks
Mrs. Homemaker, here are some safety rules for endorsing checks

that you will want to remember as you help with the family business.

When you place your name on the back of a check at the left end, without qualification, you are saying that you personally have received the value of that check. This is known as a "blank" endorsement.

If you endorse a check this way at home and lose it on the way to the bank, whoever finds it may get the money instead of you. To protect yourself, wait until you are ready to cash it before you endorse the check.

You can endorse a check to a specific person or firm when you are not cashing or depositing it yourself. When you write on the back, "Pay to the order of John Doe," and then sign your name below, John Doe can cash it after he places his endorsement below yours. You have transferred the value of the check to him.

Put a "restricted" endorsement on a check deposited by mail by writing; Pay to the order of Bank for Deposit Only" or "For Deposit Only."

Spell you name the same way it is spelled on the check. As you endorse the check, if it is mispelled, then write your correct name underneath.

Notify the bank at once if a check is lost. In handling a check, cash or deposit it immediately after receiving it.

Fancy French Dressing

Add cheese, hard-cooked egg or other ingredients to your French dressing and you have something extra special for your salads.

To turn it into a cheese dressing add grated hard cheese or rub soft cheese to a paste with the dressing. Make Roquefort or blue cheese dressing by crumbling the cheese into the French dressing.

To change French dressing into chiffonade dressing, just add chopped onions, peppers, pimiento, parsley and hard-cooked egg.

Vinaigrette dressing is made by adding chopped chives and chopped hard-cooked eggs to a French dressing that contains horseradish and catsup or chili sauce.

Quick Dessert

Beat a cup of whipping cream until stiff and fold in one-third cup of raspberry jam. Spread this sandwich-wise between 20 vanilla

wafers to make a long roll. Then cover the top and sides with the cream you have already whipped and sprinkle with chopped nuts. Chill four hours.

When ready to serve, take out this dessert and slice diagonally. **Fruit Cake in The Freezer**

If you're one who likes to make her holiday fruit cake at home, you may want to make it soon and keep it in your home freezer or locker.

Fruit cakes freeze successfully. The flavor of any cake heavy with fruits becomes blended and mellow during storage, and the cake stays moist because of the fruit and fat present. Fruit cakes are not likely to be mashed or dented during freezer storage since they are rather compact and sturdy.

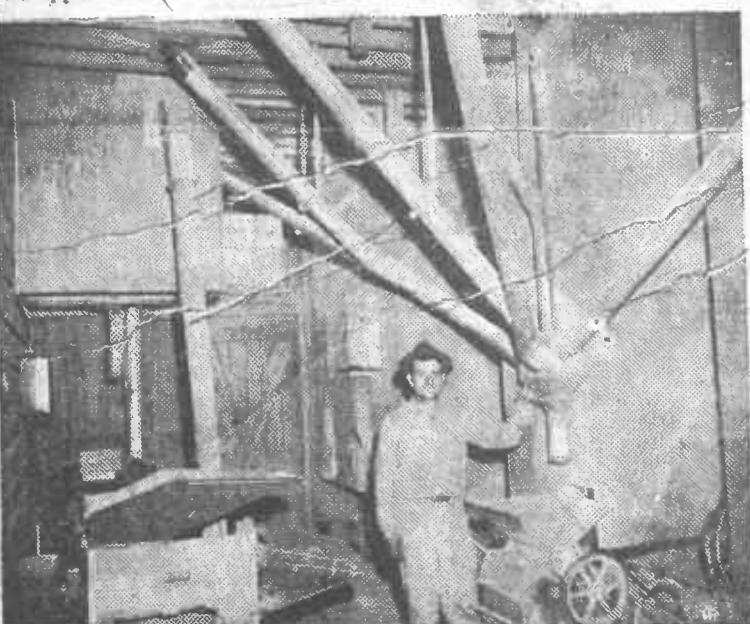

Octopus in the Farm Granary . . . Pipes, Motors Take Over Feed Problem

Gravity flow pipes connecting storage bins to electrical equipment are rapidly becoming part and parcel of many a farmer's choring setup. Fanning out in all directions, they give work areas of granaries an octopus-like appearance.

operates in conjunction with a floor dump conveyor which receives small grain from field wagons. Scooping is out because front ends of wagons are tipped up by a hoist to allow grain to flow out of end gates. Ear corn is dumped into side bins via portable elevator from outside the granary. Entry is through wall



The above picture, for example, shows a Virginia Cattle feeder who has turned over practically all of his feed processing jobs to mechanical equipment—and the ever-present pipes. Machinery and building cost him \$4,700, but they save him thousands of dollars each year in time and non-existent labor costs.

The granary has eight bins. Ear corn is stored in side bins and shelled corn, barley and oats in overhead bins. Since the floors of side bins slant toward the front, ear corn flows out of bottom gates for movement by portable conveyor to the sheller. Shelled corn is moved to one of the 500-bushel overhead bins by stationary elevator—the same elevator which also conveys barley and oats to adjacent bins. The unit



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Medical Milestones

The Four "B's" Of Old Age

In the United States today, there are some fifteen million people 65 years of age or older.

In 1900, there were only three million. Every day, seven days a week, 1,000 men and women reach this age. And when they do attain the so-called "golden years," the chances of their living a good many more are great.

Unfortunately, these later years may not be as golden as they should.

A Canadian physician, Dr. R. Ian MacDonald, recently suggested that special attention be paid to the four B's—back, bladder, bowel and brain.

When grandpa or grandma is bedridden, bedsores are a frequent complaint. They can be avoided by keeping the bed linen clean, smooth and dry, and by giving alcohol rubs and powdering the patient's back night and morning.

Sometimes it is difficult for an elderly person to control his bladder. And damp sheets and night clothing can lead to bedsores. Hence, in addition to the above measures, some physicians suggest applying one of the ointments or solutions used to relieve diaper rash in babies.

Constipation is a common problem of old people. Dr. Edward J. Stieglitz, one of the outstanding authorities on care of the aged, has said: "The senile bowel is tender, thinned and does not tolerate abuse with cathartics or roughage." To avoid this irritation, many doctors suggest an enema, now amazingly easy to give, thanks to a new unit called the Fleet Enema Disposable Unit. Nothing more than a



plastic bottle containing a few ounces of fluid and a tube, the Fleet enema is so convenient that many patients can use it by themselves.

As for care of the fourth B, the brain, there is no substitute for making the patient feel wanted and loved. Moving his bed or shifting his pillow so that grandpa no longer stares at a blank wall can improve his whole outlook. Encouraging him to participate in family life, for example, by reading stories to the children, will make him feel useful.

Attention to these four B's may soon have the elderly patient leading a happy and useful existence instead of a crotchety, complaining one.

3,493.00 Collected In Fines By County JP's

Fines and court costs collected through justice of the peace courts in the state during the fiscal year 1955 totaled at least \$1,106,000, according to an estimate by the Mississippi Economic Council.

The Council said a survey by counties revealed that total fines and forfeitures collected by J P's and turned over to county treasuries amounted to \$790,072.44. These fines and forfeitures ranged from \$5 to \$100. Figuring that the typical or "average" fine to be \$15, the Council estimates that the JP courts handled a minimum of 52,670 cases.

"It is generally accepted that the JP court cost in a typical case averages at least \$6.00," the MEC release said. "This figure, multiplied by estimated 52,670 cases, indicates total court costs for 1955 reached at least \$316,000."

The Council's survey of Tishomingo County shows a total of \$3,493.00 was turned over to the county treasury in JP fines and forfeitures during 1955.

The MEC is on record as favoring a county magistrate system over the present JP system for Mississippi. The magistrate, as proposed by the Council, would be a licensed attorney. Before such a system could be adopted, however, the constitutional provision for local justices of the peace (Section 171) would have to be repealed.

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Small Business Depends On Big Business, Booklet Says; Predicts Increase Of Both 1976; Living Standards Will Double

Del., Nov. 17—One million new businesses will be created in America if an expanding population and high living standards are to be met, it was predicted in a new booklet, "The Business: Large and Small," published today by the Business Bureau.

The growth of the business community, the booklet points out, is the composition of the U. S. establishment today that of other elements of the varying size of its business structure is likened to the growth of the educational, military, and economic barriers to growth crumbled. As a result, since 1900 the living standards of the nation have been transformed. At the same time, it has been a period of swift business growth, with a continuing need for firms of all sizes and opportunity for each business to expand.

It has also been a time of increasingly vigorous competition because of the abundance of products and services available to the consumer. Small and large businesses, instead of competing with each other, usually complement each other's efforts. The large firms undertake the jobs that call for extensive facilities and investment, and the small ones operate in fields where their flexibility and personal services enable them to make unique contributions, the booklet points out.

"Whatever the nature of the business concerned, instances in which large compete directly with small are rare. Particularly in industry, diverse technical requirements and functions make it illogical for large and small to try to serve the same customer in the same way."

Illustrating this with a road-side diner surrounded by trucks hauling new cars, the booklet says: "Without large firms, the demands of the American motorist never could be met. In recent years, the public has bought an average of more than six million cars and 52 billion gallons of gasoline per year. Small firms alone could not have provided either. But at the same time, the motorist's needs were in large part filled by more than 190,000 service stations and 85,000 auto repair firms (three-quarters of which have 3 employees or less) and some 50,000 auto dealers. If these could not survive without big business, certainly big business could not survive without them."

"The same pattern prevails in other industries. Most of the chemical materials consumed in great bulk come from large companies. Both the technical complexities of efficient manufacture and the cost of the equipment involved call for bigness. Moreover, the cost of re-

search and plant construction is high. The industry spent an estimated \$250 million for research last year, most of it in large firms, and has \$20 billion invested in plants and equipment. But without thousands of other firms to fabricate, process, and distribute materials, consumers would have few products of modern chemistry."

"Tens of thousands of small firms do a handsome business today servicing and selling products which can be made economically and efficiently only by medium- and large-sized companies."

Typical of many is the story of a small company specializing in controlling weeds and brush. Du Pont spent 10 years and \$3 million in research and development of chemicals for this purpose, but Du Pont had no facilities for applying these chemicals. The company, therefore, sought out firms with experience in related fields and encouraged them to enter this new field. Du Pont thus depends on many small firms, while the smaller companies, for their part, rely on Du Pont as the producer of the basic material essential to their work—material which they could not themselves produce.

"For many small businesses," the portfolio continues, "the key to success, and even to their very existence, is a technical development of a large firm. From the larger firms' laboratories has come a stream of discoveries that open new opportunities to small businesses."

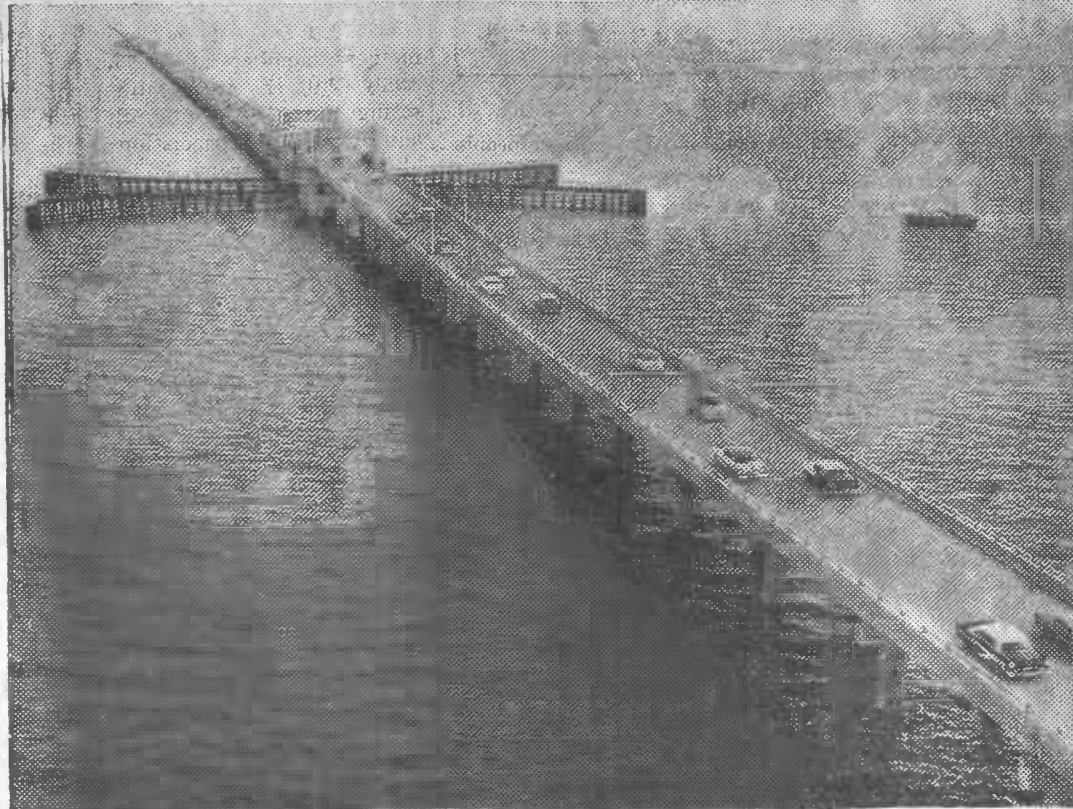

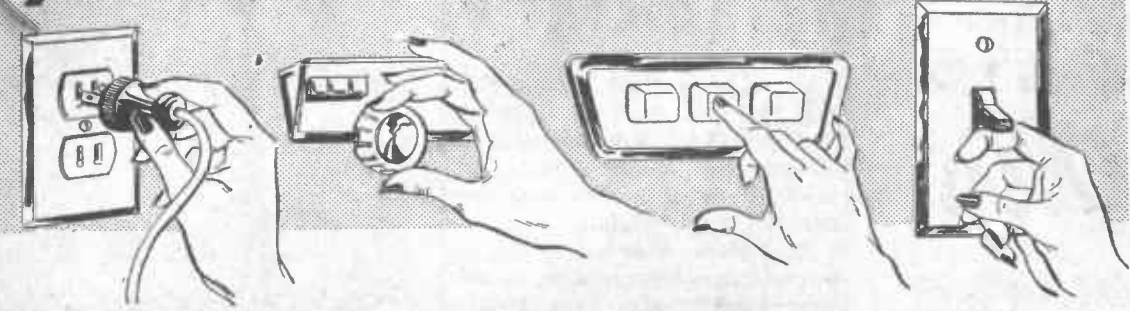

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FORE

Background Scripture: Luke 15
Devotional Reading: Psalms 137

Two Sons

Lesson for November 25, 1956

WHAT does the word "wasteful" mean? Ask your day school class that, and you be surprised at how many guesses you hear. Actually, the name simply means "wasteful" as never named his parable. Sometimes the names the church has given them fit, and sometimes not. The parable of the "prodigal son" might be better named "The Two Prodigal Sons" or "The Forgiving Father."

Two Ways of Wasting

There are two ways of being prodigal or wasteful. One is to build up and destroy what might have been saved. If you let good machinery sit around in the till it rusts, you are wasting money. If you use expensive materials for a job a little better than you do just as well, you are wasting the butter. If you are a good and order a useless animal which thousands of men need to lose their lives, you are wasting man life. All these wastes, great and small, are done in the same way, essentially by being away or spoiling what might have been saved and used. Another way of wasting is just not to use it. There is to use, something you do not use now you will have the chance to use again. Example of this is water. The river flows on its way, hoping so many horsepower every mile; if these are not today, tomorrow the horsepower today's horsepower will be gone. You waste water power not by destroying it but by failing to use it.

The Younger Son

Now in Jesus' famous parable the two sons were both wasteful but in opposite ways. The younger one: Give me... and off he went. A young man was in his hands; but he was away, he was through with it was through, "period," in fact.

There was something else wasted; his father's love and confidence. He virtually treated it as if he were already dead. This younger son is, of course, the type of the reckless spender who wastes his health, strength, and perhaps money too. It is of man who is called a "wasteful" or "waster." The time, life, and that such a man wastes can be brought back again. You can go down to Skid Row or to the hospital for drug addicts and meet them every one; but you never give them back the love the locusts have eaten. Jesus gives such men, as the father's story forgave the prodigal; but just as the father that story could not recall the four winds the wasted forces the wasted years, so not ever turns the clock or the dial back.

The Older Son

But that older boy—he too was a waster. Only he wasted in a way, not by destroying but by using. There seems to be a simple saying: "Son, you are always with me, and all that is yours." This was true—the son had made it untrue—he was always with me—so he was yet so far away. None of them's spirit had penetrated the boy's mind. He was physically home yet spiritually a stranger, too, in a different way. Every man was open to him a father's sympathy, a father's love, but he never took the younger boy there was by destruction, for the older was waste-by-neglect. Does he forgive this son too? He does not say. The impression people get is perhaps what he intended to suggest: The father was ready to forgive each of the younger son was forgiven because he had "come to his senses" (so the story takes us) forgiven. these countries if there is no oil to take through it.

Will Russia Remain Neutral?

Thus far Russia has refused to do so and is threatening to help Egypt and the Arab World by contributing to Egypt airplanes, munitions, and "volunteers," as she helped the North Koreans some years ago. This could result in the United States remaining neutral for the present at least. Eisenhower does not want another "Korean" war. If we can long remain neutral, I repeat that United States business in 1957 should be excellent and that most stocks should now be held rather than sold; especially hold the oils.

I cannot now foresee Russia and the United States joining forces even to bring about real world peace. Russia does not want stable world conditions unless she is the "top dog". To this President Eisenhower would never agree even though—as a General—he realizes the hopelessness of any nation winning another war; in fact, he believes all nations engaged there in would lose. Russia surely will not engage in war directly, for fear of losing the satellites.

On the other hand, I can understand why President Eisenhower would be willing to see England

and France worry for a while. They refused to take the advice of our President and Mr. Dulles. These men both urged England and France to refrain from using force in Egypt. Furthermore, our President is disappointed in the way Western Europe has failed to co-operate in his plans for an economic and military union. He feels that a scare might do them good. Don't Forget The Arabs

Remember that Eisenhower knows and likes the Arabs, having become acquainted with them during the course of World War II. He knows that their desert lands need only water to be the most productive in the world. He hopes to give them atomic power to irrigate and get this needed water. He knows, too, that the Arabs are fairly close to the Belgian Congo, which is the largest producer of uranium in the world.

In closing, let me say that one real goal of Russia and England and the United States is to keep open the Middle East oil fields and retain the good will of the Arab World. I forecast that France is now out of the picture and will lose all of North Africa. Neither Russia nor England can win except by force; but Eisenhower hopes to win by negotiating and by helping Egypt and her Arab friends, through economic aid, to become strong and to build her dam and secure atomic power. The Arabs should know by this time that Russian promises are no good.

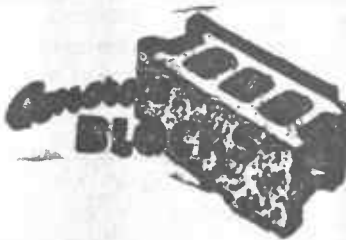

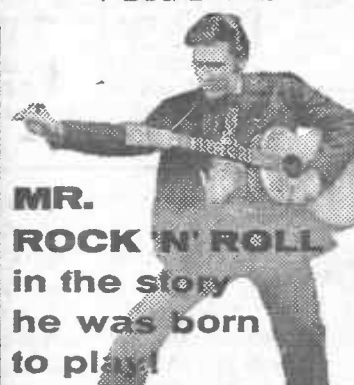

Nov. 30 Final Date To File 1956 Conservation Reserve Contracts

Mack Sanders, chairman of Tishomingo county ASC Committee, issues this statement to further remind farmers of Tishomingo county that the final date for accepting 1956 Conservation Reserve Contracts has been extended to November 30th. To date there has been one farmer in the county who has signed a contract for 1956.

Mr. Sanders states that the information in regard to the 1956 Conservation Reserve Program is available at the County ASC office located in Iuka, and if there is any farmer who thinks he would be interested in participating in this program to be sure and contact the office personnel and get information before the closing date. Previous to this announcement a number of community meetings were held in the county explaining the program. News articles were printed in the local papers, setting forth information about the program.

Acreage Reserve Program
The Acreage Reserve Program for 1956 is over for this year. We had thirty contracts signed by farmers in county. These 30 contracts covered a total of 95.7 acres which the farmers received compensation of \$3,864.24.

The 1957 Acreage Reserve Program (renting your cotton acres) will be under way by the latter part of December. Any farmer who wants to record his cotton history with the office may still do so. Bring your gin tickets or certified record from your gin for cotton produced in each year beginning with 1951 through 1955, to the County Office.

As soon as the county office received instructions on establishing

the yield group your farm will fall in, they will be able to tell you in dollars and cents what you can rent your cotton acres for.

For further information see the Tishomingo County ASC committee or contact local ASC office.

The County Committee has set the closing date for receiving ACP Cost-Shares for Practice D-1, planting cover crop, as November 15 (today).

Applications received after the date mentioned above will be disapproved.

The 1957 cotton allotments for farmers of the county are being prepared and will be mailed from the county office on November 30. Small farms which had an allotment of less than 4.0 acres in 1956 will receive 4.0 acres or the highest planted in the last three years, but in no case above 4.0 acres.

All farms with allotment other than the small farms probably will be reduced some this year.

The allotment received on November 30, 1956, will be final as there will not be any released cotton this year. Any farmer that will not plant his allotment will in all probability rent it to the government.

Attending the 4-H club Round-Up in Jackson were Bettye Coker and Eddie Edwards.

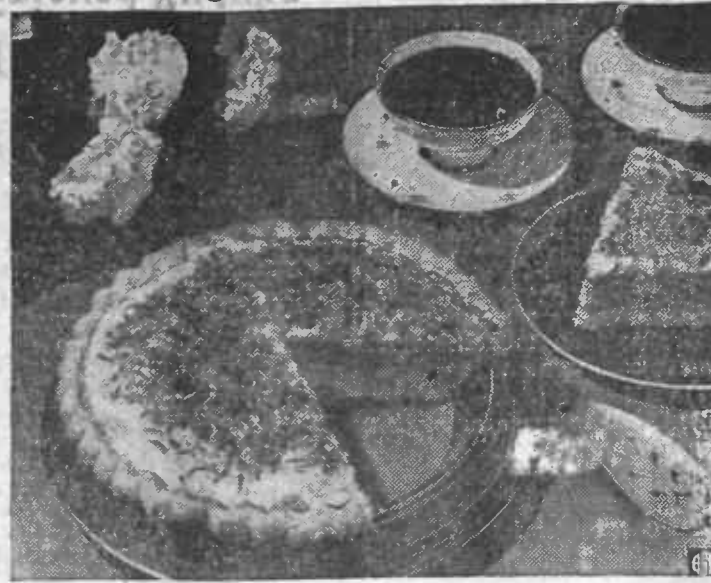

New Visitation Area Established At Wilson Lock

According to a joint announcement today from the Nashville District, Corps of Engineers, and the Tennessee Valley Authority, the lock walls at Wilson Lock, Tennessee River, are closed to visitation until further notice. In order to provide an area for visitors to view lock operations and construction activity, an overlook has been constructed at a site accessible from the dam.

Visitors may park in the parking area above the existing lock and reach the overlook over a guarded walkway across the dam to the location of the new lock now under construction.
