Smith, Corinth, spike buck, 135 lbs.; Tommy Hardrick, Iuka, 8 point buck weighing 200 lbs.; Silas Marlar, Burnsville, 5 point buck, 175 lbs.; Jimmy Hathcock, Corinth, a spike buck, 120 lbs.

In the south end of the county H. O. Hollingsworth of Belmont killed a 5 point buck weighing 110 lbs.; Felix Payne of Belmont killed a 4 point buck weighing 78 lbs.; V. O. Goddard of Belmont got a 6 point buck which weighed 150 lbs.

Two other deer were killed but not found until they were already spoiled.

"Splendid cooperation was shown throughout the season," stated Warden Marlar. "Several got shots but failed to get a deer," he concluded.

YOUTH OF COUNTY URGED TO FINISH HIGH SCHOOL; FAILURE TO REGISTER AT AGE 18 INDUCES IMMEDIATE INDUCTION OR IMPRISONMENT, DRAFT HEAD SAYS

At the request of Joe E. Brown, superintendent of Tishomingo high school; J. G. Trice, superintendent of Carter's Branch high school (colored); and L. G. Phillips, superintendent of Belmont high school, Major Shed H. Weeks from State Headquarters Mississippi, Selective Service System, spoke to the high school boys November 13 on the subject of how Selective Service law will affect the high school student of today. In his talk Major Weeks clearly brought out that when Congress passed this Act they specifically authorized the deferment of high school students until they graduate or until they reach twenty years of age, whichever is sooner, so long as they satisfactorily pursue their course of instruction at high school, and urged all boys to fin-

ish high school.
Major Weeks also stated that every student who wished to go to college was entitled to certain deferments, provided he made the required scholastic standing.

He stressed the requirement of every young man registering when he reaches age eighteen, and brought out the fact that if he failed to do this, he was subject to immediate induction, or else to fine, or imprisonment, or both.

Major Weeks explained the reserve program where a young man may go into the Reserve or National Guard before he is 18½ years of age and fulfill his service obligation in this way.

In conclusion he stressed the importance of every young man registering when he is eighteen years of age and also the importance of

making a decision on whether he wants to take advantage of the Reserve or National Guard program before he is 18½ years of age.

Major Weeks paid especial tribute to the Local Board composed of public-spirited citizens serving without compensation, namely, C. R. McCulley, George F. Harris, and Garvin A. Hall; and the clerk, Mrs. Miriam W. Carmichael, who are rendering a patriotic service in our National Defense program. He stated that this board wished to assist every registrant in every way they can and advised all registrants to keep in close touch with this board at all times, keeping their own status current. He told them the local board members or clerk would be glad to answer any questions they might have.

Treatment Of Fence Posts Being Studied

State College, Miss.—How well
does fence post treatment pay?
The Mississippi Agricultural Ex-
periment Station is seeking the an-
swer to this question in a study
which has involved more than
3600 posts. Fourteen species of
trees, three methods of handling
and treatment, and three different
preservatives have been used in
the test.

The value of treatment depends
on the service life of the post,
according to Keith C. Birdsall of
the forestry department. If the
cost of a treated post is 60 cents
it should last four times as long
as an untreated one which costs
15 cents. Therefore, conclusive re-
sults of the tests cannot be obtain-
ed until the posts break or decay

and many of them continue to re-
main serviceable year after year
as the annual inspections are
made.

Some results, however, are be-
coming apparent. In the hand-peel-
ed groups both pentachlorophenol
and copper naphthenate appear to
be satisfactory, except when used
on cotton wood and willow posts.
These two species are difficult to
treat and penetrations were shall-
ow and erratic. In the "bug peel-
ed" group, red oak, white oak, and
pine appeared satisfactory but
sweetgum did not.

None of the species treated by
end diffusion in zinc chloride show
estimated satisfactory service life.
This may be due to the leaching
out of the water soluble chemical
in the soil. Hickory was heavily
attacked by termites during the
first year, decaying rapidly.

The complete report with a table
showing the estimated service life
of all species under all methods
of treatment is published in the
November issue of Mississippi

Farm Research. This publication
is available on request from the
Experiment Station at State Col-
lege.

New Signs To Be Used On Miss. Highways

The State Highway Department
announced today that a new and
different hi-way sign will be pre-
sented to the public "about Dec-
ember 1st."

For Mississippi it will be the
first additional marker in some
years, and is the latest approved
new "shape" in road signs.

The new marker is a "yield the
right of way" sign, and will be a
triangle in shape, yellow and black
in color, and used at selected in-
tersections to replace the conven-
tional "stop" sign.

Highway markers used on the
nation's highways, roads, and

streets are standardized by a com-
mittee of highway engineers with-
in the American Association of
State Highway Officials, and are
uniform in all states.

A. M. White, department safety
engineer, in announcing that the
new signs would be placed at se-
lected intersections and crossings,

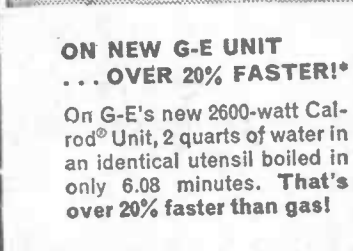

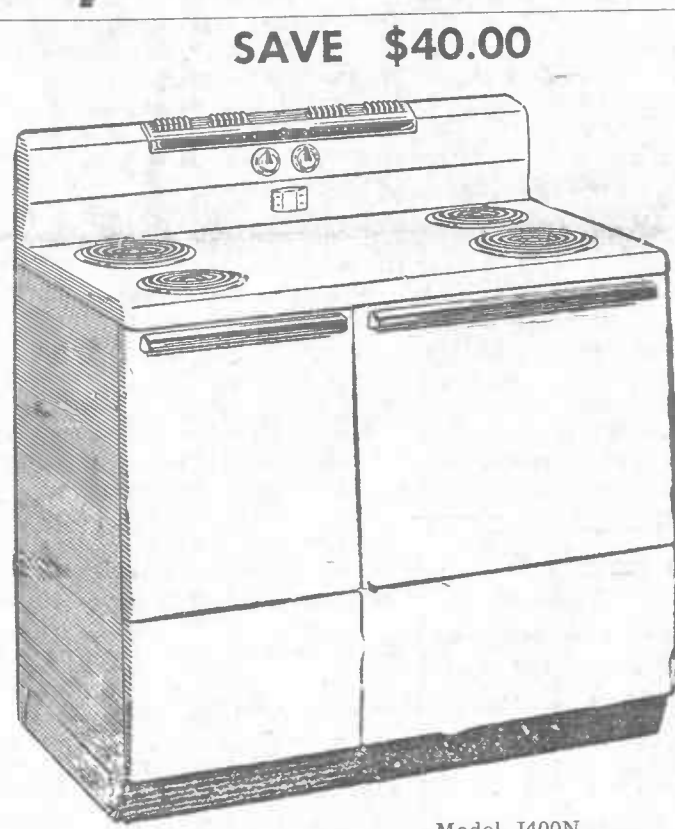

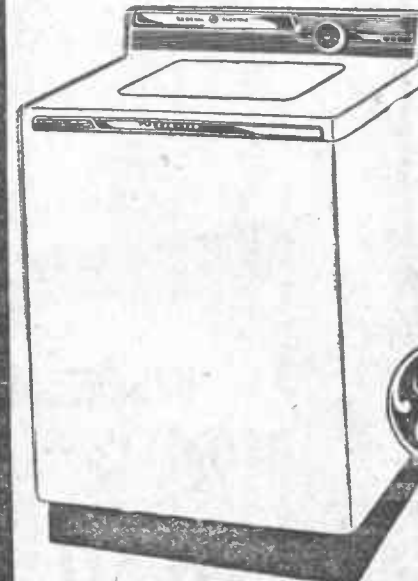

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Wild Onions

You can already look out over permanent pastures and winter grazing areas and see wild onions coming up.

On dormant permanent pastures, you can kill wild onions with maleic hydrazide. But do not use this material on winter grazing areas, as it kills all growing plants.

If you want to knock onions out of the way in winter grazing so that they won't ruin the milk & cost you money, spray from time to time with amine 2, 4-D.

The amine 2, 4-D will not damage oats or wheat, but will get the onions out of the way. This material will also kill any dock on the grazing area.

Onions, thistle and dock are three weeds you can look forward to killing this winter with amine 2, 4-D.

Home Gardening

A clean-up of old plant refuse now will help you keep down plant diseases in your home garden next year.

The most effective way to clean it up is to pile it and burn. However, when burning, take extreme caution that the fire does not get away from you.

Destroying weeds is also important. As most weeds harbor disease organisms, all weeds along the

**You May Need A
Diversion Terrace
On Your Farm**

Diversion terraces are placed around slopes below wooded or sodded areas to protect fields below from flooding.

The diversion terrace diverts the

water flowing from the top of the hill to a natural drain and away from the cultivated field.

Farmers know that the wettest land they have in their fields usually lies near the foot of the steep slopes. This is because the water flowing from the top of the hill rushes down and ponds there. Because this part of the field is wet it cannot be planted or cultivated at the time the rest of the field is planted or cultivated.

There are some important things to consider in the establishment of diversion terraces. These are:

1. Construct a crown and channel large enough to take care of all the water flowing from the hill top.
2. Vegetate or sod with perennial grass or legume the entire embankment and channel areas.
3. Vegetate with a permanent type of grass or legume all the area above the diversion terrace to the top of the hill or to the edge of the woods. It is assumed that the terrace will be given sufficient grade to cause the water collecting in it to flow, without washing, into a natural drain.

The USDA Soil Conservation Service technicians will assist any interested farmer in establishing needed diversion terraces on his farm. The local ASC office (Mr. Allen's office) will advise you how you can obtain financial help from the government for establishing needed diversion terraces.

Now is the time to build diversion terraces. They are one of the practices recommended by the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners to protect land from erosion and water damage.

1957 Amendments Clarifies Farmer And Rancher Social Security Benefits

(By Mary King Temple Manager of Sheffield Social Security Office)

The 1956 amendments to the social security law include several provisions which make it easier for a self-employed farmer or rancher to understand his rights under the old-age and survivors insurance program. One of these relates to share-farming or share-cropping.

Congress realized that there was need for clarification of the status of the share-cropper as a self-employed farmer for social security purposes. Persons who farm another person's land on a share arrangement often have some characteristics of employees and some characteristics of self-employed persons. The amended law makes it clear that, where social security is concerned, in the general share-farming arrangement they are self-employed farmers if their share depends on the total amount produced, even in cases where the landowner has a lot to say about the way the farm is run.

Another amendment will help clear up questions about crew leaders ("labor contractors" or "row bosses") in relation to short period workers they furnish to farmers for the harvesting of fruits and vegetables or the picking or chopping of cotton. These farm workers may be covered by the social security law, but in the past it has sometimes not been easy to tell whether the employer of the members of the crew was the farmer who was having the work done or the crew leader (or "labor contractor" or "row boss"). The amended law makes it easier to tell who is the employer.

If you are a crew leader, the crew members you furnish and pay are your employees unless you and the farmer have entered

into a written agreement which shows that you are his employee.

If you are a farm operator using crew workers, and you have entered into a written agreement with the crew leader which shows that he is your employee, then the crew members are also your employees. This provision is effective for work performed after December 31, 1956.

Because members of a farm crew move from farm to farm and area to area, a greater part of this cash farm wages will be covered by social security where the crew leader is the employer, as these shortperiod workers generally work for the same leader longer than for any single farm operator. Moreover, where the crew leader is the employer, the farmer is relieved of the responsibility of record keeping, social security tax withholding, and reporting, and the obligation of getting information about each of the workers with whom he may have only a brief vague contact.

Having only one employer instead of several different employers in connection with doing the same work, they will more easily meet the \$150 cash wage and 20-day time tests which apply to their

farm work for each employer.

In my next article, I shall explain how the amended law has changed the social security coverage rules for all farm employees and how, beginning with 1957, it will work to the advantage of both employers and employees for whom farming or ranching is a means of livelihood.

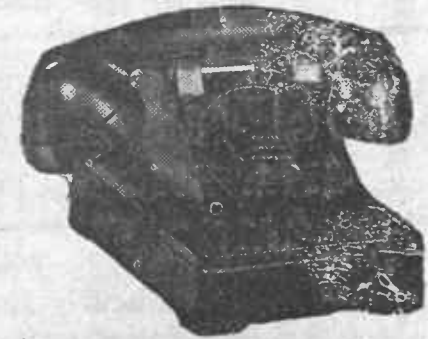

Itinerary

Home Demonstration Council Meeting, December 1, Home Agent's Office, 10:00 a.m.

With the Christmas Holiday Season fast approaching we're all interested in ideas for food and gifts.

For food suggestions, you will do well to check your grocery store for young chickens, potatoes and canned corn, as you plan your December menus. They are the headlines on the plentiful foods lists for the coming month.

Broilers and fryers are expected to be even more plentiful than last year when the supply was very heavy.

December markets will have plenty of turkey and pork and beef. Heavy turkeys will continue to be best buys. Pork is expected to be most plentiful and lowest in price the first two weeks of December.

Vegetables in good supply include cabbage and onions. As for fruits, grocery shelves will have lots of purple plums, winter pears, dates and prunes.

Milk and other dairy products and peanut butter will continue in ample supply.

Cranberry-Sweetpotato Casserole
5 medium-sized cooked (or canned) sweetpotatoes

2 cups basic cranberry sauce
5 tablespoons brown sugar
1 cup coarse bread crumbs
3 tablespoons melted butter
1 teaspoon salt

Cut potatoes into thick slices. Arrange layer in well-greased casserole; spread with layer of cranberry sauce. Mix together remaining ingredients and spread a thin layer over cranberries.

Repeat to fill casserole, finishing with crumb layer on top. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 40 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Trees and Shrubs

These are ideal days for transplanting all trees and shrubs. Take care to dig hole larger than the root system and set plants at same level they are growing.

Azaleas and camellias should not be planted at deep level as their root systems are shallow.

A publication on "Foundation Shrubs" is available at your home agent's office.

It gives advice on selection and grouping shrubs for small homes and large buildings, doorways, porches, windows and corners.

Fruit Trees

We are in the midst of the best time of year for setting out peaches, apples, plums, pears, pecans and grapes.

Even if you have only a small amount of space around your home, look it over carefully and see if you don't have room to grow some of your own fruit.

Be sure you order and plant only the varieties that are recommended for your climate. A list of recommended varieties is available from your home or county agent's office.

Stains on Dark Fabrics

Stains on dark-colored tablecloths and doilies often "hide" until too late to remove successfully.

It pays to look these over carefully and if you spot a stain, remove it before folding the cloth away or putting it in the regular laundry. Launder a fast-colored tablecloth in lukewarm water with plenty of detergent.

If the color prevents you from using water hot enough to remove grease stains, treat the stain with a grease solvent or cleaning fluid.

If you don't remove greasy stains, they may show up when the article is ironed, and the heat of the iron may set the stain.
