IT LOOKS LIKE at long last our county school systems will finally be re-organized. We believe that patience is virtue and that the local boards have done well in waiting to see what Prentiss county would do with the line school at Holcut. From all indications, the school will emerge from the re-organization with a greater number of students than it has been operating with previously.

MISSISSIPPI TRAFFIC fatalities have been reduced for the 4th consecutive month. . . . Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarborough states that the November traffic death toll dropped 26.1 per cent below the total recorded for November 1955. Sixty-five persons perished in auto mishaps one year ago. 49 died during the corresponding November this year.

MISSISSIPPI's traffic death toll for the year is still below the '55 figure. This state is one of a few going into the last month of 1956 showing a reduction in its highway carnage.

At the end of November, the year's death toll stood at 483 killed, 496 had been killed through November 1955.

Commissioner Scarborough states that the Highway Patrol's stepped up enforcement program will be continued. The Patrol has used radar extensively since October 1 and the start of "Operation-Attack." Speed law violators will continue to receive the Patrolmen's attention.

MILK DRINKERS HAVE TRIMMED FIGURES—A recent study carried on by Dr. Ereal Eppright, head of the Department of Food and Nutrition, Home Economics Division, Iowa State College, and involving 279 teenage girls points out the fact that obesity occurred almost twice the number of girls who drank little or no milk compared with those who drank quart or more daily.

After age 12, one girl in five falls into the over-weight category, only 16% of these obese girls were from the group that were large milk consumers. Many of the over-weight girls felt milk was fattening and most had generally poor diets. Significantly, almost 90% of the group who drank milk had diets that were considered excellent in every respect.

The conclusion drawn was that milk is not necessarily fattening; in fact, the study discovered that the girls with the trimmest waists were among the biggest milk drinkers.

New Markers To Be Used

Some highway markers demanding a full 'stop' at certain intersections will be taken down in the near future, Roy C. Adams, Tupelo, Highway Commission Chairman, stated here today.

Iuka Christmas Basket Fund Gets Off To Flying Start; \$289. Reported At First Meeting; Much More Is Needed

The Iuka Christmas Basket Fund got off to a flying start at a meeting held Wednesday night of this week at the Tishomingo County Electric Power Office. A total of \$289.00 was reported by individuals, churches and other organizations at this initial meeting at which all civic clubs and Federated Women's clubs were represented.

Bill Brinkley is serving as chairman of the committee this year. Others serving are: finance committee, Ruth McKnight, Wayne Spinks, and George Page; selection of needy committee, Miss Cora Lee Glenn, Mrs. Helen Pruitt, Jack Robinson and Mrs. Sparks; purchasing committee, Herman Gann and Mrs. Isaac Jackson; packing committee, Mrs. John Henry Allen, chairman; and delivery committee, Chunky Chambers, chairman, assisted by Iuka Boy Scouts.

Fate of the Holcut Consolidated School was determined Tuesday night of this week in a joint meeting of the Tishomingo County and Prentiss County school boards. The meeting was held in Booneville where it was agreed that the Holcut District would retain all pupils previously assigned from Prentiss County to that school plus an additional group from the Jacinto area near the Alcorn County line. This assures a 12-grade school for Holcut which is what this county board of education has been trying to provide in the re-organization.

According to the survey as presented by Dr. J. D. Falls of State College, the county will have, after re-organization, five attendance centers all ranging from grade one through grade 12. Plus a colored school attendance center that will probably be located on highway 25 north of Tishomingo. The five attendance centers will be the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, Burnsville, Holcut, Tishomingo and Belmont.

Also according to the survey there will be two administrative units in the county: the County unit which will include all schools outside Iuka and the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District.

The Tishomingo County School Board is scheduled to meet next Tuesday night to prepare an order setting up the County Unit system and the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District. It is required by law that this order be published 10 days prior to its presentation to the State Education Finance Commission.

Further, the plan is required to remain on file with the State Education Finance Commission for a period of 30 days before action is taken. In the event the Commission acts favorably upon the plan, the county school systems' re-organization will be completed.

After the Commission's acceptance of the local board's plan further steps will be taken toward repairing and improving existing school buildings and the construction of new plants where recommended by the survey.

Babson Predicts Great Future For South; Lower Cost Of Living

Babson Park, Mass., Dec. 6. This time of year I begin to think of the South. The birds are no longer here to wake me every morning but have gone to a warmer climate; and so I too hope to leave for the South fairly soon. Hence, if my good California friends will forgive me, I will this week devote my column to "The South."

California does not now need to be boomed, it is already booming. Florida holds a future both for itself and for you. Practically all of Florida is still growing in many directions. Light industries are finding the South more and more the ideal spot. Labor is somewhat cheaper and absenteeism is far less than in the North. People are healthier and seem happier in a climate like Florida.

In Florida's expanding economy there are plenty of jobs for people who are willing to work. There appears to be room for everyone. Certainly, the South is always looking for young people willing to learn some trade. The cattle and farming industries in Florida are growing. Builders and engineers are needed. In fact, most professional men can settle in the South today and have no difficulty finding work.

Older People Still Flocking South

Men and women still think of Florida as the ideal place to retire. Every year thousands go to Florida to do just this. Subsidizing retirement at 65 years of age has helped to bring people South. They know that living costs are cheaper there, and this will be especially true if the United States is going into a "cold cycle." After the North, it is a climate in which to sun and play outdoors. I do advise, however, that every Southern home provide artificial heat. Fuel bills are comparatively small and clothing is less expensive. No elaborate or expensive winter clothing is needed, although the women still want one little fur jacket! Rents are lower. One can build a very modern house that may be planned to make housekeeping light. People are finding it constantly harder to get servants and hence are using that money to go out to their local Country Club for some meals.

Long Term Future For All The South

The constantly increasing population of the United States is bound to affect the population of Florida and other Southern states. Cities will grow there very quickly. Think of your own small town where you live and you can see for yourself that since the war there has been great growth all around you. Construction companies which you knew as little concerns before the war have grown into very large operations. This will happen to many present-day small construction companies in the South as more and more year-round homes are built.

Most Southern cities will have to enlarge their airports to handle the traffic and also to make them safe for the jet age. All the South needs more parking space for cars. Taxes are low in Florida, which has no State income or inheritance tax, though it does have an "intangible" tax.

Land As An Investment

After the next stock market crash people will recognize that good real estate, especially in an inflationary era, is the best investment. I have always advised buying a small piece of property on the outskirts of a small town and sitting tight until the town grows out to you. If you should sell acreage land, hold onto the mineral rights. Often a separate and very profitable sale can be made of these rights alone later on. The oil industry has yet to hit the big jackpot in Florida and the Southeast, but it is coming some day.

Fla. and other Southern states will continue to attract tourists both winter and summer. Now that the airlines and hotels have special summer rates, the South has a whole new income undreamed of before. Remember Daytona Beach with its world-famous hard sand racing beach, Cypress Gardens, the Everglades National Park, Hialeah and its pink flamingoes, Key West with its famous deep-sea fishing, Lake Wales and the beautiful Bok "Singing Tower," and Marineland with its magnificent aquariums. Finally, if World War III should come, Central Florida should be a very safe place in which to live. It should escape bombing and also be sure of plenty of food and fuel.

know your boy so well that he'll
not take you by surprise at some-
time. That's one of the things that
makes your life with him an ad-
venture. If we could learn to ex-
pect the inevitable from that boy
it would soften the shock and dis-
appointment of parenthood.
"Take dirt. It probably causes
more frustration in parents than
anything else. That boy collects
dirt more effectively than anything
else. You might as well accept the
fact that it is unlikely that he will
keep clean during most of his
waking hours.
"But there are good reasons for
your boy getting dirty. He gets
more fun from doing the things
that get him dirty than he does
from the things which keep him
clean.

"So what do you do about dirt?
Should you stop trying to teach
your boy the importance of clean-
liness? No. But you can learn to
expect a certain amount of dirt as
a part of growing up. You see, it's
not the dirt that causes frustra-
tion—but expecting your boy to
keep clean.
"A boy is a natural experiment-
er. The only way he can discover
how much noise he can make is by
making too much. He builds it up
until you can take no more. If
you tell him to stop and he de-
tects a little of a "yes" in that no
he is going to keep on. If it pro-
duces a sympathetic look in moth-
er's eyes he will make a little
more noise. If you tell your child
no, stick by your "guns". Avoid
making issues of the little things,
but once you make that issue,
stand by it. Try to do it pleasantly
if you expect him to respond in
that fashion.

"There are some boy urges and
characteristics with which you
must learn to live. You will find
that these are just a few of them:
"The first one is noise. Noise
and a boy are natural companions.
Where you find one you'll usually
find the other. Boys shout more
often than they talk. They run
more often than they walk. They
throw things down more often
than they lay them down. They
slam doors more often than they
close them.

"You can attempt to correct all
these noisy habits, but it's best
that you know in advance that you
are not likely to succeed. There-
fore, the only realistic conclusion
to which you can come is that you
must learn to live with a certain
amount of noise while your son is
growing up.
"Second, we have Destructive-
ness. A boy rarely sits in a chair.
They fall or jump into them.
Boys are not satisfied merely to
look at things. They must squeeze,
turn them over, or shake them.
Boys eight or nine are naturally
clumsy. They drop things, back
into them, knock them over with
their elbows.

"When too many accidents oc-
cur, ask the boy to help repair the
damage. He might come to the
conclusion that accidents end in
work. The accidents may decrease
a bit.
"Third, we have Neatness. One
of the most difficult things for
your boy to learn is keeping his
things in order. He must have a
reason for doing this. If you tell
him to brush his hair the first
thing he wants to know is "where
are we going", "nowhere". Then,
"who's coming", "nobody"—"Why

do I have to brush my hair." A
boy must have a reason.

"Fourth comes Manners. A boy's
only objective at the table is to
get the food where it's supposed
to go. When he's hungry, he finds
it difficult to eat slowly and take
small bites. Don't nag until a meal
becomes unpleasant to him. Start
with only the most offensive of
his eating habits. When he does
something nice, compliment him.
One compliment will go further
than several scoldings.

"Laziness. Your son is lively
most of the time that you may
think he never gets tired. Actual-
ly just growing is tiring, and that's
what he's doing a lot of at Cub
Scout age. Many times when your
boy seems lazy, he's simply tired.
"Summing this all up the most
important factor in the develop-
ment of proper attitudes in your
boy is your own attitude toward
him.

"Most of all, remember that the
day will soon come when you will
miss his boyish reactions and ur-
ges. You'll never have a chance to
help him work himself through
this period again. Make the most
of it."

Protect Your Land By Cutting Stalks Now

A standing corn or cotton stalk
protects the land very little from
heavy winter rain. Cut these stalks

in a way to scatter them over the
land, and they give a great deal
of protection against heavy winter
rains.

Why is this true? How does a
cotton or corn stalk cut in many
pieces and Left On Top of the
ground prevent erosion? Actually
it protects the land in two ways,
which are: 1. Each piece of cotton
or corn stalk acts as a miniature
dam. Everyone of these little dams
slows down the water. The slower
water moves off the land the less
it erodes the land. 2. Cotton and
corn stalks cut and left scattered
on the surface of the ground forms
a partial cover. Soil lying under
these stalk leaves, and branches
is protected from the beating effect

of the raindrops. The soil particles
under this litter are not dislodged,
and do not wash away.

Have you ever noticed a piece
of gravel on top of a little hill?
Raindrops had churned up the soil
and it had washed away leaving
the ground high beneath the gravel.
Cover the land so the raindrops
can't hit it and it will not wash
away.

On bottom land that overflows it
is best not to cut stalks until near
planting time. If they are cut in
the fall, winter rains will wash
them away.

On hill land it is an excellent
soil and water conservation prac-
tice to cut your stalks now.

An ideal tool would be a bush-

hog which would shed the stalks
and leave them scattered over the
land as a partial mulch.

The Soil Conservation District
Commissioners and the local soil
conservation service personnel ur-
ge you to cut your stalks now for
your lands sake.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Romans 8
Devotional Reading: Psalm 27:1-10

In All Things, God

Lesson for December 9, 1956

THERE is far too much in the famous eighth chapter of Romans to think about in the small space of one column. So one sentence from it will be quite enough food for thought: "We know that in everything God works for good with those who love him." (Rom. 8:28.) Readers familiar with the old King James translation (made in 1611) will notice that the new translation is different. The old version read: "We know that all things work together for good to them that love God." . . . Which translation is right? The letter to the Romans was written in Greek, of course. We do not have the original letter, but we have discovered some Greek copies of it in manuscripts much earlier than any that were known back in 1611. The oldest and best of these have exactly what the Revised Standard Version accurately translates: Not things but God is the subject of the sentence—it is God who works for good in everything, it is not things that work for good.

Christians who take the Bible seriously do not believe in a far-away God. It is quite true, as the Psalm writer said, there is no getting away from God. The wildest dream of the most fanciful space-fiction writer might come true, but on the last lost planet God would still be there. God is in all space and in all time, too. However old the universe may be, God is older still. But the God revealed in the Bible is not one who set the universe going as a man winds a watch and then lets it run. God is in all things, and all things are in God. This is not so hard to believe. What does call for a rugged faith is the Bible belief that God is in things we find painful and bad, not in good things alone. If we do not believe this, then we are always haunted by the fear—What if the evil in the world is too much for God? What if eventually he is overwhelmed by a universe he cannot control? What if God's intentions are better than his abilities? Have no fear, God's Word assures us. God is not on vacation, he is at work in everything, small and great, in pain and in delight.

"God Works for Good"

The Bible writers never say that all things are good. Some things are good. Some things are bad, some things are just the opposite of what they ought to be. This raises a most difficult problem, the problem of evil. No one knows the answer to it; but the Bible never takes the short-cut of denying that evil exists. What the Bible does say is that even in evil things God is at work for good. Joseph, son of Jacob, as a boy was sold into Egypt as a slave by his criminal brothers. That was not a good thing. Years later, however, the man Joseph said to his brothers, "You meant it for evil, but God meant it for good." If it had not been for that wicked act (and some others besides) the family of Jacob would have perished of starvation. History is full of illustrations of the ways in which God brings good out of evil. Tyranny and cruelty are not good things; yet if George III had been a more enlightened and just king, the American colonists might never have thought of achieving freedom. The "World Wars" were terrible things; but they did rid the world of some tyrannies. Many events in our personal lives which were frustrating or tragic, have been part of God's wise plan. After all, what kind of God would our God be, if he could not bring good out of evil?

"With Those Who Love Him"

The new and better translation of this great sentence from St. Paul brings out another point which Paul's Greek suggests: God is at work with those who love him. He works for them, to be sure, but that is not the main point here. God's work is never a substitute for the work of those who love him. Loving God is no excuse for not serving him. Loving God is not mere sentiment, a sort of warm glow, a happy feeling about the "man upstairs." Love of God, like love of neighbor, is a serious thing. It calls for devotion, hard work, even sacrifice. To go back to the story of Joseph, God brought good out of evil; but suppose Joseph himself had been lazy, selfish and careless? God's work calls for many partners—not sidewalk superintendents, not slaves, but partners in the everlasting Love.

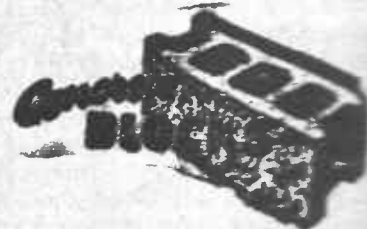

Business Activity In Mississippi Up Oct. 6% Above A Year Ago

College, Miss.—(Special)—Business activity in Mississippi for October registered 6 per cent higher than a year ago, according to the latest issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Council of the School of Business Administration at Mississippi State College.

Indicators except money income showed gains with the exception of 23 per cent, recorded in insurance sales. Non-agricultural employment reached an all-time high in mid-September of 1955. However, unemployment figures, as indicated by total unemployment claims, was higher in October 1955 or September 1956.

Construction awards were up 10 per cent from both the month and the same month of 1955. This was true in all lines of construction except highways and utilities construction where the total contracts awarded were up by both comparisons.

Tax collections of \$7,926,666, or 6 per cent higher than October 1955. Sales tax collections of \$4,597,886 were up 6 per cent from October 1955 and 10 per cent from the preceding month.

Tax collections of \$573,000, or 1 per cent higher than October 1955. Gas severance tax collections of \$118,291, or 27 per cent; and timber tax collections of \$62,000, or 81 per cent.

Of the state's sixteen counties, only two had more business activity in October than a year ago. Increases by districts were: Gulfport, 8 per cent; Hattiesburg, 5 per cent; Corinth, 4 per cent; Greenville, 4 per cent; Hattiesburg, 4 per cent; Jackson, 6 per cent; Meridian, 7 per cent; McComb, 7 per cent; Memphis, 10 per cent; Natchez, 7 per cent; Pascagoula, 10 per cent; Tupelo, 3 per cent; and Vicksburg, 13 per cent. Clarksdale showed a decline of 2 per cent. Natchez district a 1 per cent.

Business districts showed an increase in activity over September. The increases varied from 1 per cent in the Laurel

Use zone numbers, and it's a good idea to include an extra label inside your packages. Parcel Post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the Post Office to buy stamps.

Speaking about stamps, the Postmaster said, "Use three cent postage on all Christmas cards. This way they will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelopes." First-Class postage on your Christmas Cards enables you to include handwritten messages, thus making your Christmas greetings more personal. By including your name and address on each Christmas card envelope, both you and your friends can keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

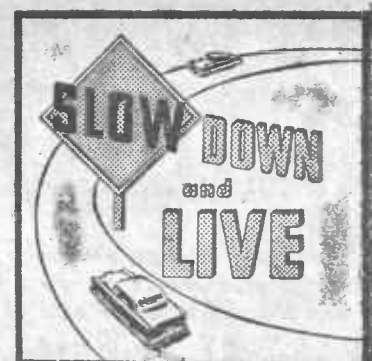

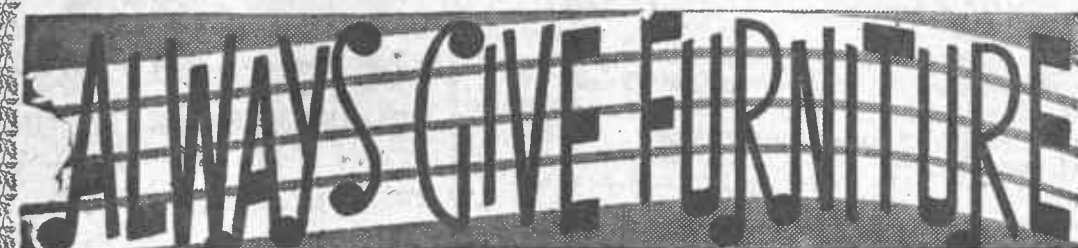

Research Studies New Methods Of Seed Separation
 State College, Miss.—A relatively new principle in seed separation is being studied at the Regional Seed Research Laboratory at State College and information obtained through this study is already being used in some of the larger processing plants in the country.
 The new method is based on the static electricity of seeds, and while the process has a great many

limitations research is revealing some of its possibilities.
 Processers normally separate seed mechanically by differences in size, weight, length, shape or surface texture. However, in some mixtures, like red clover and dock, the seed are so similar that they cannot be separated by conventional methods. Problems of this kind constantly push seed research into new fields of endeavor.
 The study at State College sought to determine the effects of certain factors on the electrostatic separation method and also to learn if the high voltage to which seed are exposed during the process affects their germination.
 Moisture and humidity were found to be important factors. Low moisture content of seed and medium relative humidity were found to give more efficient separation. The forces of electricity had no harmful effect on the ability of the seed to germinate.
 "This study has revealed some factors that must be controlled in electrostatic separation," said Dr. H. B. Bunch, of the seed laboratory. "Further tests will be aimed at determining which seed mixtures can be separated and the conditions under which the separation is effective."

How do you know when an apple is ripe? Experienced apple men have an answer to this question. They test an apple for maturity by condition by rubbing their thumb or hand firmly along the surface of the skin.

A good firm, mature apple "talks" by making a squeaky sound when the thumb moves across the skin. On an overripe apple the thumb piles up in little wrinkles in the skin of the thumb as it moves across the surface.

Overripe apples also easily yield to slight pressure and have no evidence of crispness. Remember as you buy apples, ripeness and maturity go hand in hand. Choose firm, sound, fully ripened fruit.

Allied Oil Terminal Co. Sells Terminal To Southland For \$500,000

Following the recent acquisition of the Delta Refining Company at Memphis, Tenn., by the Southland Company, announcement has been made of the purchase of a terminal adjacent of the Delta refinery. This terminal was purchased from the

Allied Oil Terminal Company of Chicago, Illinois at a cost of approximately \$500,000.00. Included in the purchase were three large storage tanks having a total capacity of 203,000 barrels, together with loading and unloading racks, pumps, pipe lines and other equipment. The plant site consists of approximately 34 1/2 acres of land. Much of the land is not presently being utilized and will afford sufficient room for planned future expansion as needed for various purposes, according to company officials. This terminal will be operated for the government by Southland storing aviation gasoline and jet fuels for air bases in the Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas area. Southland has for several

years furnished jet fuel through contract to the government. It manufactures jet fuel at both its Yazoo City and Sandersville refineries. Present quantity sold is approximately 15,000,000 gallons annually.

Though the Delta refinery at Memphis does not now manufacture jet fuel, the present expansion of the refinery will permit the manufacture of this product. Technical Naphthas such as are used in the manufacture of paints and used in laundries are also included in the expansion program. Delta Refining Company is in the process of building several large storage tanks to contain crude oil and various petroleum products. Other improvements are being made as rapidly as materials can be secured. A contract will be let shortly for the construction of an Alkylation Unit which will permit producing 100 plus octane gasoline. Thus Delta expects to be able to match the highest quality

products produced by anyone in the refining and marketing business.

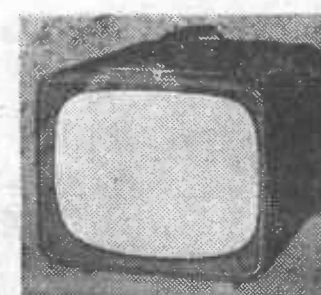
