THE BEST WAY to tell whether a man is having a good time at a party is to look at his wife's face.

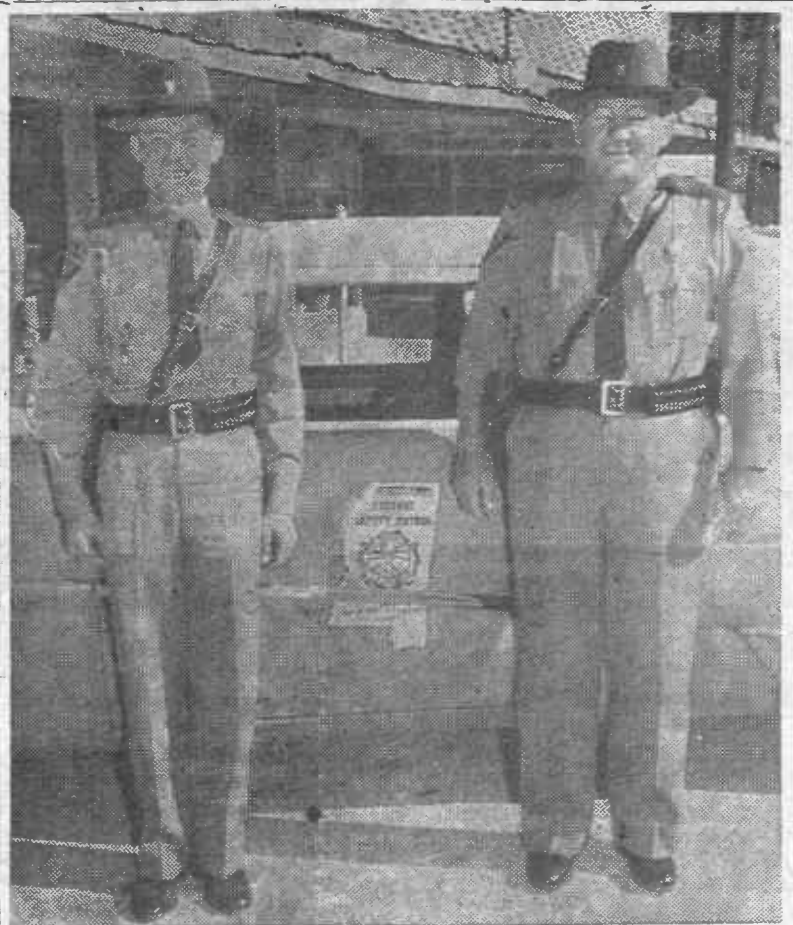
DON'T RISK SEEING STARS when you try to hang a star on the top of your Christmas tree. The danger comes from the National Safety Council, because accidents contributed to 4,000 deaths from home falls last year.

With the cotton quota controlled by the federal government farmers will be guaranteed 82½% of parity or a certain amount for their cotton grown on the allotted acres.

School Boards Meet, Order Creation Of Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District And County District

The Tishomingo County Board of Education, in a meeting held Tuesday morning of this week, unanimously agreed to an order creating the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District and the Tishomingo County School District.

The Trustees of the Iuka Separate School District, in a meeting held Monday night, also agreed to an order creating the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District.

Both orders are printed in their entirety on another page of this

newspaper. They set forth all the lands that are contained in each school district. With the Iuka school will go all the land within the boundaries of the First Supervisor's District. The Tishomingo County School District will have all taxable lands in the county with the exception of that within the First District. In addition the County System will have certain taxable lands lying within specific areas of Prentiss county.

Publication of the orders creating the two school districts in

the county is one of the steps necessary to reorganizing and reconstituting the schools in this county. These orders as they are published this week, will have to remain in the respective offices of the school boards for ten days. After that time an application will be made to the State Educational Finance Commission for the two systems to be put into operation as stated in the orders and as recommended by a survey made last year by Dr. J. D. Falls of State College.

es from an area having a scattering stand of pines, because the pines may be too far apart to properly prune themselves. Just cut the bush shading the pine seedling and leave the other hardwood sprouts and bushes to prune it, and cause it to grow tall and straight.

It will not take a man long to cut 350 or 400 small bushes on an acre, but the job of cutting all the bushes (which should not be done) would be a long and hard job.

We who work for the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service believe spot releasing of pines will prove profitable on thousands of acres of woodland in Tishomingo County. There may be the answer to a serious problem.

You may have five or ten acres of woodland that is well covered, and not eroding away, but the trees growing on it are of little or no value. Check now and see if there are pine seedlings under the bushes, if there are pines, spot release them.

unless it gets direct sunlight. If a small bush is shading a little pine cut the bush down.

It is not necessary to clear an area completely of hardwood to release pine seedlings. All is needed is to cut only those bushes, or hardwoods, that are shading them. If a Soil Conservation District Cooperator has 350 or more pine seedlings scattered over an acre, it will be well-worth his time to spot release them.

The landowner Can Do Harm by destroying all the hardwood bush-

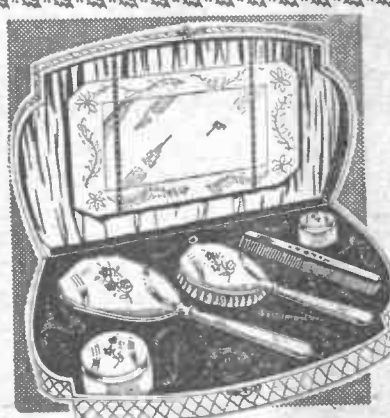

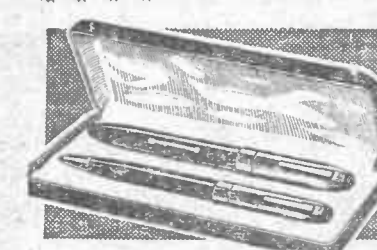

Hobson Believes Advance Appointments Unnecessary; One Call To Complete Transaction In Future

Iuka Park, Mass., Dec. 13. — Returning from Florida this morning, I felt I would like some reading glasses and called an optometrist. I was told that I did not get an appointment for an appointment, and then event finding a parking space, I had a half hour with him. Thereupon he gave me a prescription for the glasses, which caused me to go to the next village and hunt again for another parking space. Certainly this

time is coming when one call will complete such a transaction. Furthermore, there is no more reason why we should have to make an appointment in advance to have our eyes tested than to get a shampoo.
Advance Appointments Unnecessary
During the summer I had trouble with one of my ears. I again was required to wait a week for an appointment. Although the ear doctor felt that the trouble was perhaps due to low blood pressure, he would not take my blood pressure but sent me instead to a local doctor. Again I had to wait a week for an appointment to have

my blood pressure taken. I finally was advised to buy a hearing aid of some kind.
I am able to get a manicure without an appointment, but to have a corn cut I must get an advance appointment, and perhaps wait several days! The whole performance seems irrational to me. Doctors are now setting up offices in the same building, but this will not solve my problem. I want to be able to find all these simple personal services in one building, and some day I will be able to do it. And, furthermore, without advance appointment!

Experience With Dentists
For many years I have believed in the importance of having one's teeth cleaned every month, but this could not be done without an advance appointment. When talking to my associate workers of the importance of preventing decay by monthly cleaning, I found they were troubled by the same advance appointment difficulties. Thereupon, I decided to have a dental nurse in my own building to do this work, unattached to any dentist. To my great surprise I found this was against the law and I was obliged to go to the Massachusetts legislature to get a special

act to permit it. Yet we are allowed to teach our servants or members of our family to inoculate us with insulin.
Recently I bought a new home through a local real estate agent. Within a few days I had telephone calls from other agents stating that they could get the property for less money. It would seem that in a town the size of Wellesley there could be some central clearing house where all houses for sale could be listed. The difficulty seems to be that people dare not list the house, or even consult two or three agencies, for fear of getting into a conflict as to who should have the commission.

The Legal Craft
In the little town of New Boston, N. H. there is no bank or lawyer, but a very intelligent woman has been helping local people in various ways, including providing forms for very simple wills. She has recently been notified by the attorney of the N. H. Lawyers Association that she will be prosecuted if she continues this. I personally went to see this attorney to plead for her and he said that the law applies not only to her but also to banks, real estate agents, brokers, and all others. I later found that my own local bank, which advertises for Trust Funds, must send you to a lawyer to make the Trust for you to use.
As a result of these experiences,

I forecast that simple professional and other special services will some day be obtainable at one central ground-floor "store" under the charge of competent nurses or other trained persons. Certain simple services which we can now get only from doctors, lawyers, optometrists, opticians, dental technicians, chiropodists, manicurists, and real estate agents we will then be able to secure without making an advance appointment & at fees of less than one dollar. When the nurse or her assistant locates any dangerous symptom, the "customer" will be urged to visit a doctor, dentist, lawyer, or other professional official at once and will make an appointment therefor. In the end, the public and all the professions will benefit from such a procedure.

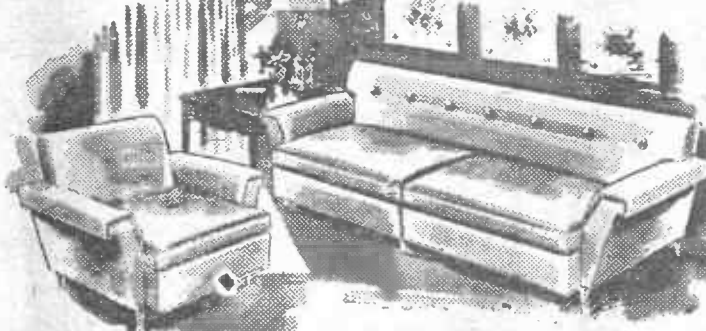

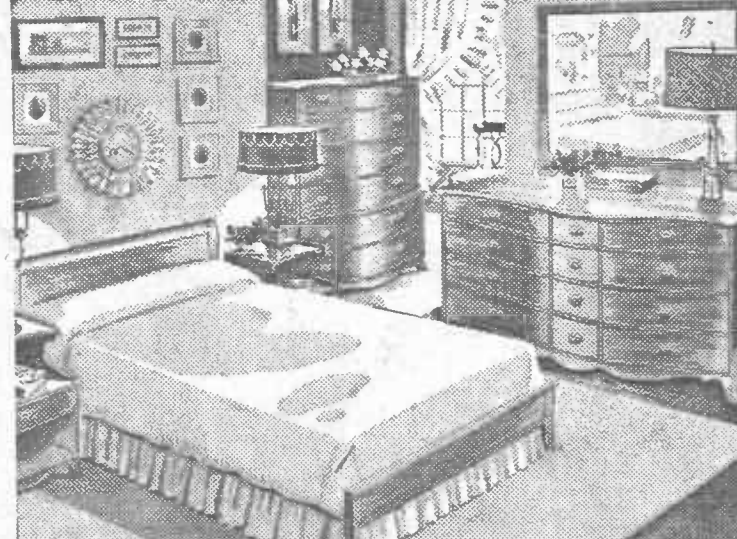

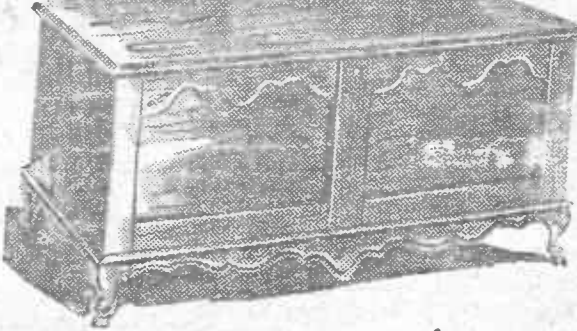

Iuka Business On Upward Trend; 6%

Business activity in the Corinth district rose 9 per cent during October above that for October 1955, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, publication of the Business Research station of the School of Business and industry at State College.

\$130,001.61 Due Miss. Counties & Cities In Lieu Of Taxes From TVA; Tishomingo County Gains Approximately \$9,000.00

State Auditor E. Boyd Golding today announced increased and new allocations of funds to 28 Mississippi counties and cities in the amount of \$130,001.61, due them in lieu of taxes from the Tennessee Valley Authority at the close of the current fiscal year. Tishomingo County with gain approximately \$9,000.00.

This is an increase of \$89,387.03 in payments over the \$40,614.58 which only 17 counties and cities have previously received, and 11 new counties will now participate. Golding further announced that

prior to this year, a total of more than \$353,000.00 has been paid into the general fund of the state which should rightfully have gone to the counties.

He said that under new calculations, the added funds will now go to the counties and cities served by TVA in Mississippi every year and that as new lines are built and services added by TVA, the lieu payments will increase annually.

"It is no fault of the TVA that payments have not been made to the counties and cities as deserved,

instead of into the state's general fund," Mr. Golding said. "The money has been coming to the state but went into the general treasury."

Auditor Golding has recently returned from Knoxville, Tenn., where he conferred two days with TVA heads and cleared up the plans for annual payments under a new calculation.

Payments are based on TVA activities in various counties and cities of the state because taxes are not assessed and in lieu payments work as a substitute for taxes lost

to the counties and cities.

Distribution of payments to cities and counties has heretofore been made on a 1940-41 fiscal year calculation, and expansion of TVA have not been recognized by the state in disbursing TVA in lieu of taxes payments.

Under the new distribution system worked out after Golding discovered some counties were not getting full shares or no shares at all, every county eligible will now go on the pay list.

Eleven counties and cities entitled to payments but which have never received any funds at all, will, beginning this year under the new calculations, get payments as follows:

Benton county \$168.50; Calhoun county \$2,840.42; DeSoto \$12.04; Kemper \$2,082.17; Lafayette \$2,792.28; Leake \$914.71; Marshall \$2,527.49; Panola \$2,178.46; Pontotoc \$2,346.96; Tallahatchie \$48.14; Yalobusha \$1,107.28.

The 17 counties and cities which have in the past received shares and which now show increases for the most part are:

With the days clicking by toward Christmas, we all find ourselves in a bustle of gift making, selecting and wrapping, decorating and cooking and gatherings of family and friends. Time seems to fly, with more to do than we have time for, doesn't it?

This column will be a collection of odds and ends of Christmas time suggestions. Hope you find an idea that fits your needs. These will be some that even the younger children can have a part in helping you.

Sparkling Ornaments
For instance they can help with making sparkling Christmas ornaments. You will find spools and pine cones and other things around the house of interesting shapes for tree and mantel decorations.

Collect them, then mix one cup of sudsing-type detergent with 4 tablespoons of liquid plastic starch and whip one minute. Dip article in mixture and sprinkle with sparkle dust.

Old Christmas Cards

As you get out your left-over wrappings from last year and carefully saved tree and home decorations, you probably will find last year's Christmas cards. They are just too lovely, to throw away right after Christmas, aren't they?

Now look them over, and see if you don't find in them many decorations for this year's packages. Use them alone or combine with ribbons and bows to make packages different.

Select cards with a large Santa, reindeer, tree or other appropriate design. Cut out design from card, make paper strips one-half inch by 2 inches and pleat. Attach to package by gluing one end of strip to card and the other to package.

The cut-out designs will make good name tags for packages, also. **Be Careful**

Be sure the lights and all other electrical parts of your Christmas decorations are safe, all loose and frayed wires repaired or replaced. As an extra precaution, do not leave the tree lights or other decoration lights on when no one is home.

Do not leave the cord leading to the tree where it may be walked on or cause someone to trip over.

Gift Ideas

Make a pile of party napkins from gay scraps of materials; plaids, prints or plain, bright colors. Cut squares the size you want; fringe edges. Use narrow one-fourth inch fringe and they won't tangle up in your washing machine.

Fill red mesh sacks — the kind you get at the grocery store — with cones to perk up the holiday fire. Decorate bag with bits of ribbon, scraps of material.

Aunt Lou's Popcorn Cake

This popcorn cake can be used as a centerpiece. Place apples on sticks or colored lollipops in center hold decorate edges of cake with holly, evergreens or other things you will find suitable.

1 cup molasses
1 cup corn syrup
10 cups popped corn
1 cup chopped nuts
1 tablespoon vinegar
3 tablespoons butter
10 small sticks peppermint candy (chopped)

Combine molasses, corn syrup, vinegar and butter. Boil rapidly to hard ball stage (250 degrees

F.) Place popped corn in large bowl. Pour syrup slowly into the center of corn, stirring constantly. Gradually add the chopped candy and nuts, continuing to stir. When well coated pack firmly in a greased 10-inch tube cake pan or greased bread pans. Let cool. Remove from pan and slice as any other cake.

Way of Love

Lesson for December 16, 1956

THERE are many ways of living in this world. There is the way of ruthless pride, with the motto: "The world is my orange and I intend to squeeze it." There is the way of the fool, who never thinks beyond today and is always surprised to discover that what he sowed came up and what he didn't plant did not come up. There is the way of the lazy man who can be bothered, and who always takes the easiest way no matter what. There is even the way of hate, the way of bitterness and suspicion, going always downhill among dead trees without leaf or fruit. Everybody knows that these are none of them Christian ways. Even those who are not Christians know that the way of Christ is the way of love.

Other Ways of Love

But what is the Christian way of love? There are more ways than one to use the word "love." There are ways of love, so called, which are not the Christian way. For instance, there is something called love, which consists really of fondness for things or people that are lovable. For example, a young woman stands at an altar and promises to take a man "for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health." But she does not really hear the vow she makes. And if the man turns out to be poorer or worse than she thought, she looks up a divorce lawyer. The way of Christian love does not demand loveliness first; on the contrary, Christian love can make an unlovely and unloving person lovable. Some love is all for one's own benefit; "I love you" can mean no more than "I want you for my exclusive use." Christian love "does not insist on its own way." It does not ask, "What can I do for me?" but "What may I do for you?"

Blessing the Universe

Another way of love, sometimes mistaken for the Christian way, is no better than sheer sloppy sentimentality. Sometimes it consists in a vague feeling that everything is very nice in a very happy world. A minister once preached on the text, "Ye that love the Lord, hate evil." After the sermon a lady told him she didn't like that sermon at all. She had been brought up to believe that love was always right and hate always wrong. Love is always right, yes; but that does not mean we can feel free to love what is evil. If we love the good, we shall not love what destroys good. Sometimes this substitute for Christian love takes the form of a general feeling of good will toward the world in general. A well-known American writer shortly before his death, "I bless the universe." Now it is certainly better to bless the universe than to curse it. But blessing the universe seems a curious sort of thing to do. Are you really blessing all of it, sir? Cholera and polio, stars and atoms and typhoons and germs, criminal and judge, saints and sinners, miracles and murderers? We have to be careful that we don't love the universe in such a way that whatever happens seems exactly right!

The Christian Way

The Christian way of love is not totally different from these other ways; but it is vitally different. It is inspired by God in the first place and it mirrors his love. It goes beyond the lovable, it is more than an exchange of love. It even goes out to one's enemies. American history gives us two striking illustrations of the actual power of love, in two men on opposite sides of the American civil war. The two enemies, as they once were, are now honored more perhaps than any other two in that tragic conflict: Lincoln and Lee. Each was a man who could do nothing else but stand by his convictions and fight even when other men were ready to give up. Their love was not the child of indifference, selfishness or cowardice. But it was Lincoln who coined the phrase, "charity toward all and malice toward none." — and he meant every word of it. It was Lee who later as president of a college refused to let any one in his presence speak evil of his former enemies. It is not the men who are the best haters, but those who show what Christian love is, who have greatest power over the hearts of mankind.

AN ORDER CREATING THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

Upon motion duly made by Mr. Kermit Rushing and seconded by Mr. Clyde Bingham and after full discussion by all members and all members voting "aye", the following order was unanimously adopted by the Board of Education of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, at a regular monthly meeting assembled on the 11th day of December, 1956:

Order Reorganizing, consolidating, reconstituting and Creating the School Districts of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, under the Provisions of Chapter 12, Laws of the Extraordinary Session of 1953

There came on this day for consideration by the Board of Education of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, the matter of reorganizing, consolidating, reconstituting and creating the school districts of said county pursuant to and as required by Chapter 12, Laws of the Extraordinary Session of 1953, and it appearing that a survey has been duly made of said county for the purpose of determining the educational needs of the schools and school districts as provided in Section 1, Chapter 12, Laws of the Extraordinary Session of 1953, and that such survey is on file with this Board, and is made a part hereof by express reference thereto; and the Board having maturely considered said survey and the plan contained therein, as well as all supporting data and information, and all other evidence, material and considerations bearing upon said matter presented to the Board, the said Board of Education of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, finds as follows:

1. That, as required by the rules and regulations of the State Educational Finance Commission, after the filing of the said survey with this Board, and prior to the adoption of this order a joint public meeting was called and held in Tishomingo County, Mississippi Courthouse after the requisite notice of the date, time and place of said meeting had been given as required by the rules and regulations of the Commission, as shown by the proof of publication on file with this Board; that at the said public meeting the contents of said survey and recommendations contained therein were fully explained, and all interested persons were given the opportunity to discuss said survey and make inquiries and submit recommendations relative thereto;

2. That all requirements of law and the rules and regulations of the State Educational Finance Commission have been met in the making of said survey, the holding of said public meeting, and the adoption of this order and in all matters precedent and preliminary thereto;

3. That the plan of reorganizing, consolidating and reconstituting the school district of this county as hereinafter set forth will promote and is deemed necessary by this Board to promote the physical, mental, moral, social and educational welfare of the children involved, the efficiency of the operation of the schools, and economic and social welfare of the various school areas;

4. That the plan hereinafter set forth constitutes, in the opinion of this Board, a satisfactory plan of equalization of facilities between the races;

5. That the Iuka Separate School District located in the First Judicial District of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, which existed on December 28, 1953, has applied for reconstitution with certain additional territory in the First Judicial District of more than 25% to be added thereto, and which according to Senate Bill 1640, Section 1 shall be known as Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, to which reconstitution with added territory this Board does hereby assent, ratify, confirm and approve, and a certified copy of said order shall be recorded on the minutes of this Board. That the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District as reconstituted with the additional territory embraces the following described realty in the First Judicial District of Tishomingo County to-wit:

East, all of Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 33, 34, 35, and 36 in Township 3 South, Range 10 East; all of Sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 33, 34, 35, and 36, and all of Sections 3 and 10 that lie South and East of center of Yellow Creek that runs through said sections, and all of Section 9 that lies South of center of Yellow Creek that runs through said section, all in Township 2 South, Range 10 East; all of Sections 23, 25, 26, and 36, and all of Section 35 that lies East of center of Yellow Creek that runs through said section, and all of Fractional Section 13 that lies in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and all of Fractional Section 14 that lies in Tishomingo County, Mississippi and that lies South and East of center of Yellow Creek that runs through said fractional section, and all of Fractional Section 15 that lies South and East of center of Yellow Creek that runs through said Fractional Section, and all of Section 22, 27, and 34 that lie East of center of Yellow Creek that runs through said section, all in Township 1 South, Range 10 East. The said land being all the territory that lies in the First Supervisor's District.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Education of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, that the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District be reorganized and reconstituted as hereinabove set forth, and that the territory of said county, exclusive of the territory lying and being in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District being all the land lying in the First Supervisor's District as described above be and is hereby consolidated and organized into the school district hereinafter set forth, and that such school district be hereby created and/or reconstituted by this order to-wit:

The Tishomingo County School District

1. The name of said school district shall be the Tishomingo County School District, and shall comprise all lands in Tishomingo County without the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District plus added territory of Prentiss County.

2. The sections or parts of sections comprising and constituting said school district are:

Rail oddities
 EARLY SPORTS EDITION
 On a November morning eighty seven years ago, a train steamed out of Princeton, N.J., carrying the first intercollegiate football game—Princeton vs Rutgers at New Brunswick, N.J. Nov. 6, 1869.
 The first intercollegiate rowing race—Harvard vs Yale—took place on Lake Winnepesaukee in New Hampshire in 1852, after the superintendent of the Boston, Concord & Montreal Railroad agreed to pay all the transportation costs of the crews and their equipment.
 In 1889 the Governor of Mississippi wanted to make the charter of the New Orleans & Northeastern Railroad because it carried a big crowd of fight fans to Richmond, Miss., to see a heavyweight bout between Sullivan and Jake Kilrain.



As a comparison of the figures in the above graph shows, footage drilled for the new well in Mississippi last year was almost double that of the national average drilling depth of feet, thus setting the average cost per well at approximately \$80,000. The number of deeper wells drilled in the state has steadily increased in the past several years as significant finds have been discovered in deeper sands.

DEVELOPING NEW OIL FIELDS IN THE STATE REQUIRES DEEPER DRILLING THAN EVER BEFORE

Oil, like gold, is where you find it, and in Mississippi the job of drilling and developing new oil fields is becoming increasingly more difficult. Expert oil men are pushing their search to lower levels than ever before in their exploration of deeper sands. Last year the average well drilled in the state almost doubled the national average drilling depth of 3,992 feet.
 Deeper drilling means higher operational costs. The significance of this was pointed out by E. D. (Doug) Kenna, executive vice president of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association in a recent interview.
 "Exploratory wells," said Kenna, "each year must go deeper and deeper in the search to locate oil fields in Mississippi which will develop into reservoirs of major production potential. Last year the average well drilled was 7,453 at a cost of some \$80,000 and, in the final analysis more than \$35,000,000 was spent in 1955 throughout Mississippi in drilling for oil and gas."
 During the first six months of this year, only one new producing oil or gas well was located in every ten wildcat wells drilled in the state. This means the producer must pay at least \$720,000 for the nine dry holes drilled to find it.
 The willingness of oil companies and independent oil men to invest larger sums of money and assume risks brought on by the necessity for deeper drilling required in Mississippi has resulted in recent important discoveries. These new finds include the Soso Field in Jones, Jasper and Smith Counties; the Bolton Field in Hinds County; and, six miles from the Mississippi state line in Alabama, the Citronelle Field. The Soso and Bolton Fields discoveries took place in the 1953-54 period, when drilling was extended to deep formations of lower cretaceous age.
 Probably the most significant development of 1955 was the Ansley Field discovery in Hancock County, which is also a lower cretaceous producer. This is one of the eleven new oil fields officially designated as discoveries last year. The others are South Kinston, Moss Grove, Cooper Hill and New Fields (Adams County), Hill, Mud Creek and Safford Fields (Wilkinson County), North Church Hill and Sunnyside Fields (Jefferson County), and Sandersville (Jones County). An 1955 gain was reflected in the discovery of a new oil field in the existing Pistol Field in the state at the neighboring states, the industry in Mississippi is under more adverse conditions due to strata formations, in turn requires the deepening activities. Last year the average drilling depth was 4,303 feet; in Louisiana 4,303, in Arkansas, 3,270; in Alabama, 4,878; in Oklahoma, 3,270; in Mississippi, the average drilled at 7,453 feet.
 However, the industry continues "on the job," and the 28 geophysical crews in the state at the end of June, and the more than 100 drilling rigs active during the costly exploration and gas in Mississippi.
