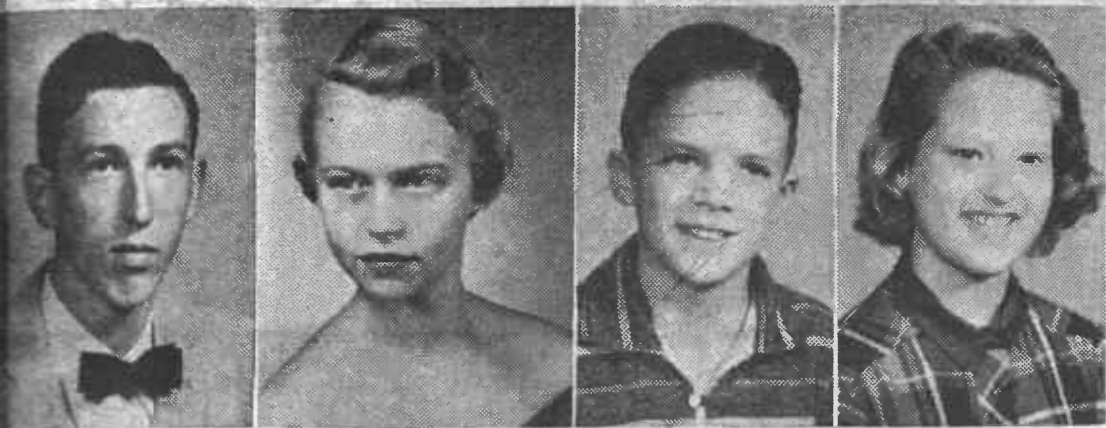

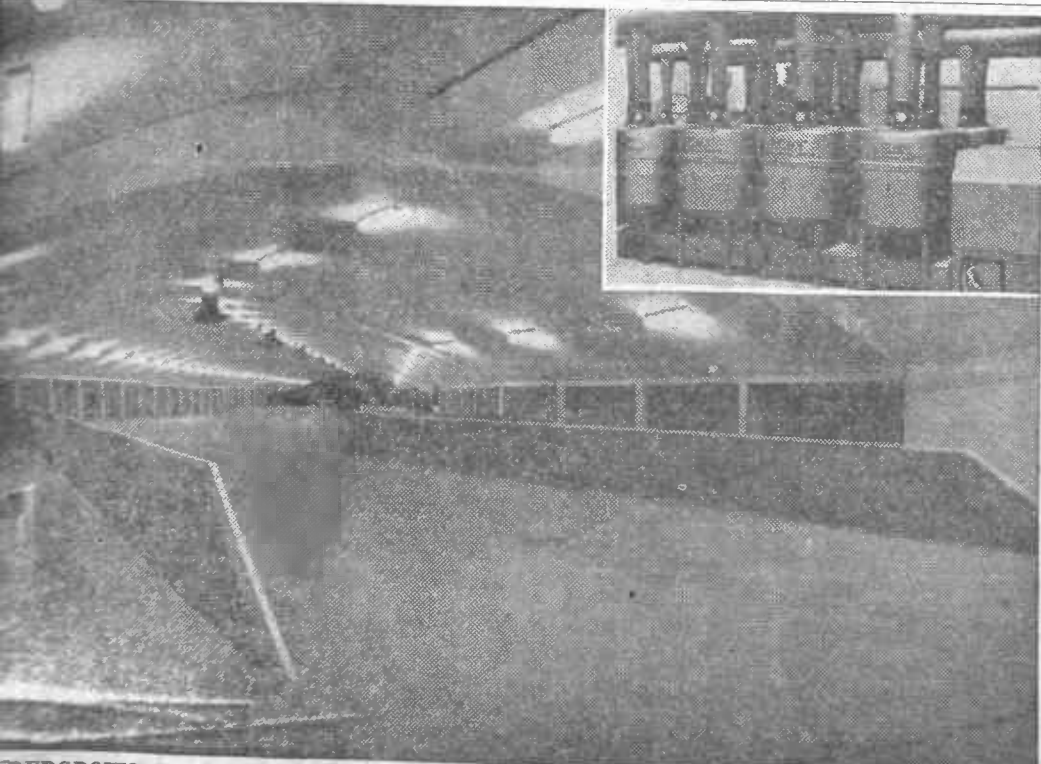
Third District MFWC Institute To Be Held Jan. 12

Tombigbee Tourney To Be January 4-5

The north Division of the Tombigbee Conference Basketball Tournament will be played in Booneville, with Iuka, Booneville, Kossuth, and Baldwin being represented.

The other six schools with basketball teams, which are Calhoun City, Ripley, Vardaman, Fulton, Nettleton, and Shannon, will play in the South Division of this tournament at Shannon on January 9, 10, 11, and 12.

The playoff to determine the Tombigbee conference champion will be played on January 14, at a site which has not yet been announced.

The first game of the North Division will be played Friday afternoon at 12:30 between the Iuka and Booneville girls teams. The second game will be played immediately afterward with the Iuka and Booneville boys tangling. The second session of games will be played Friday night with the first starting at 6:30 between the Baldwin and Kossuth girls. The second game will start at approximately 8:00, with the Baldwin and Kossuth boys' squads tangling.

The finals of the tournament will be played Saturday night, with the first game starting at 7 o'clock.

Tishomingo To Impose 1/2% Additional Tax

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, at the regular meeting held Tuesday night of this week, adopted a resolution to impose an additional one-half of one percent sales tax on all gross retail sales or gross income on all persons engaged in any business in the Town of Tishomingo.

"We are badly in need of new revenue," Mayor C. L. Trimm said, "and we feel that this is the fairest and most just tax that we can use to increase our spendable money. All departments are low in funds and it is hoped that the additional revenue gained by the one-half of one per cent sales tax will put our treasury in good order."

The tax will go into effect on February 6th, 1957, unless a petition bearing the names of at least 20 per cent of the qualified voters of the Town asking for an election objecting to the sales tax is presented to the Board before that date. If the petition is presented then an election will be held to determine whether or not the tax shall become law.

Miss. Federal Patronage System Will Continue Under Direction Of State Citizens For Eisenhower Committee

Washington, Jan. 3.—The federal patronage system in Mississippi will continue as established four years ago, under direction of a state Citizens for Eisenhower committee and in cooperation with county committees throughout the state, according to E. O. Spencer, state Citizens for Eisenhower chairman and national committeeman for the Mississippi Republican party—the so-called "Lilly Whites".

And the first major appointment to be considered by the group is expected to be that of a successor to retiring U. S. Judge Allen Cox, of the North Mississippi district.

Spencer, a Jackson hotel executive said, however, that no formal consideration of a successor to Judge Cox would begin until the judge has filed with the Justice Department his application for retirement. The law permits federal judges to retire voluntarily with full pay when they reach 70. Spencer said he has received no notification from the Justice Department of plans of the judge, who several weeks ago announced he would retire.

Eleven Recommended Now

Some 25 North Mississippi Eisenhower leaders will be consulted, Spencer explained, at a meeting to be called to narrow a field of an expected dozen or more hopefuls. The Justice Department requires submission of at least three names, but will consider a choice from a list of five. He recalled the state committee submitted five recommendations when Judge Ben Cameron, Meridian, chosen to succeed retiring Judge Edwin R. Holmes, Yazoo City, on the Circuit Court of Appeals, at New Orleans.

Spencer revealed a list of 11 attorneys already recommended by friends for consideration by the state Republican patronage committee, in choosing the list of 3 to five to be sent to Washington. He said most of them supported the reelection of President Eisenhower, with possibly "one or two" having voted States Rights.

The 11 names revealed by Spencer include former Lieut. Gov. Sam Lumpkin, Tupelo; Brig. Gen. Albert Lake, Greenville; Chancellor William H. Inzer of Pontotoc; Circuit Judge Henry Lee Rogers, Philadelphia; Circuit Judge R. P. Sugg, Eupora; former Circuit Judge Claude Clayton, Tupelo; Charles Fair, Louisville; Glenn Fant, Jr., Holly Springs; Hardy Lott, Greenwood; and Semmes Luckett, Clarksdale.

Spencer added that any other qualified North Mississippi lawyers whose names are submitted will also be given "fair consideration". "No one knows at this time," he declared, "whose names will be in the list submitted to the Justice Department."

A former Democrat, now turned Republican leader, Spencer expects the major difference in the federal patronage system will be that demand from some in Washington for partial recognition of the so-called "Black and Tan" GOP faction, headed by the veteran, Perry Howard, will have virtually subsided.

"I feel," he said, "that officials of the Eisenhower administration are satisfied with the manner in which our committee is securing competent Mississippians for federal appointments in our state."

The GOP system for patronage in Mississippi, devised and organized by Spencer, provides for a state committee, to make final recommendations to Washington, and county committees, to screen applicants for federal positions in their respective counties. Spencer said county committees are now functioning in 77 counties, with organizations expected soon in the state's remaining five counties.

The state Citizens for Eisenhower leader said the Republican State Committee, headed by Wirt Yerr-

ger, Jr., Jackson, and Mrs. Balfour Miller, national committeewoman for the State Republican Party, would wield strong voices in Eisenhower administration affairs in Mississippi.

"Black and Tan" Out

That the "Black and Tan" faction of the veteran Negro, Perry Howard, is "on the way out" became apparent with the prediction, immediately following the November election, by John Minor Wisdom, Louisiana's GOP national committeeman, that the Spencer group would be given "complete recognition" in the Magnolia state. Wisdom, chairman of a subcommittee on Republican problems in the South, said the Howard faction would be relegated to the "figurehead category".

The move to make recognition of the Spencer organization official is expected to see action at the Jan. 19 meeting of the Republican National Committee.

Consideration will come at an executive session, at which supporters of both Spencer and Howard will air their views. Howard, senior member of the national committee, has substantial support from some veteran committee members.

The generally satisfactory manner in which the Spencer group has handled Negro patronage, on recommendation of an all-Negro committee headed by Lawrence Jones, president of Piney Woods school, is expected to be a strong arguing point of Spencer's supporters for the "complete recognition" predicted by Wisdom for the "Lilly Whites".

Plan Inaugural Special

Mississippi leaders will hold prominent places of honor during the second term inaugural ceremonies for President Eisenhower, Spencer expects some 50 or more Mississippians from the state to attend the inauguration, Jan. 21, and the pre-inaugural festivities which begin Jan. 18.

He released a list of officials of the Mississippi Republican Party and Citizens for Eisenhower who were first to receive invitations, as follows:

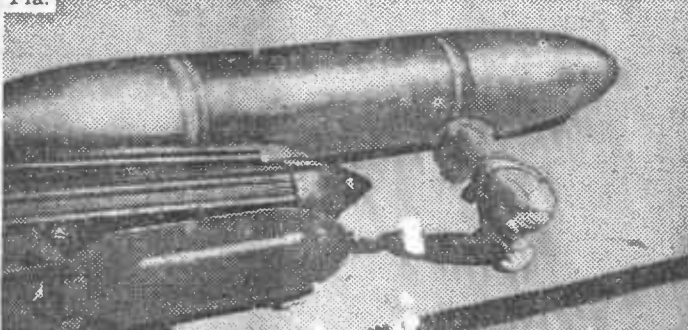

Medics Battle Arthritis and Anxiety



The farmer, factory worker or active housewife—prime of the great crippling, rheumatoid arthritis—often suffer from the anxiety and apprehension associated with the disease they do from the ailment itself.

The arthritic, partially immobilized by the disease, finds no longer carry the full load required of a parent and family. The sufferer often increases his burden by worrying about the crippling of an arm or leg, about the forced reduction in his daily workload and about the future.

Although scientists have not determined the cause of arthritis, nor found a cure, they have discovered that certain chemicals can relieve the symptoms of the disease. For many years aspirin was the only available drug which gave any help. Then it was found that certain hormones, cortisone and hydrocortisone, could produce dramatic relief of symptoms.

Only last year scientists discovered two new chemicals which provide as effective relief as the older compounds, but without the serious side effects which sometimes occur. One of these, prednisolone, was found to be three to five times more potent

than cortisone or hydrocortisone. Recently, prednisolone combined with the anxiety drug Atarax in a tablet designed to ease the symptoms of arthritic attendant anxiety apprehension.

With this combined treatment called Ataraxoid, there is hope for victims of arthritis—the most common of the rheumatic diseases. Scientists report that one out of four of the arthritic disabled up to 97 per cent of a past 60. Rheumatoid arthritis strikes most often when a man is most active in his work. The outlook for the patient is most promising, scientists declare, when treatment is begun early.

Babson Discusses Revolutionary Inventions; Electronics Explained

Babson Park, Mass., January 3—The greatest efforts will be made to develop a small safe reactor which will enable homes to use uranium for fuel instead of oil, or gas, or coal. Next there will be more use of electronics to take the place of workers in factories. This is known as automation.

The use of elec- Roger W. Babson tronics which interests me most is to have a machine into which I can talk and have writing come out the other end! There are now several successful dictaphone machines which transfer the voice onto "receivers" such as blank flat phonograph records, or the standard wax cylinders, or electronic magnetic tape. I am told that the Soundscribe Company is perhaps the most progressive, but all are doing good work as far as they go.

All dictating machines, however, now need a pretty girl to take the material from the wax cylinder, or the flat record, or the electronic tape, and transfer it into written words on a sheet of paper by use of a typewriter. Great efforts, however, are being made to eliminate the need for this typist so that a person can dictate directly into a machine and have something come out which anyone can read. This would not require a typist.

Returning to Phonetic Spelling

Some years ago there was a fine hotel at Lake Placid, New York, which promoted the Dewey Phonetic Spelling. Mr. Dewey wrote all his advertisements, circulars, letters, and even menus with phonetic spelling. Whether he did it to amuse the guests or to promote the phonetic idea, I do not know. One thing certain is that for any of these revolutionary dictating machines to succeed, all children must be taught phonetic spelling. At the present time, 3 large corporations are trying to develop these new machines. Let me explain their three different methods of approach.

The International Business Machines Corporation is hoping to have its machine use the same alphabet we now use in letters. The Eastman Kodak Company may bring out a photographic method. Of course, the photography of still images was really a wonderful invention; then followed the photography of moving pictures. It is possible that these can be developed so that the spoken word will be photographed like a moving object. This is almost approached now by showing in television the expressions on people's faces; in fact, many listeners have the ability to read the lips of speakers. Photography experts will not be satisfied until they can photograph thoughts, as well as words.

The Electronic Methods of Writing "Shorthand"

Of the different systems, the electronic system interests me most although it requires forgetting the present alphabet and returning to the use of script writing. First came the telegraph with the dash and dot system; then came the telephone and TelAuto-graph; then followed the electronic-phonograph and the magnetic tape. Few persons realize the wonderful electronic machine, that is in their latest phonograph. When Thomas Edison invented the original phonographs, they were purely mechanical. Every spoken word made a wavy indentation on a wax cylinder, after which these wavy movements were exaggerated by levers which, at the other end, moved a thin metal diaphragm and faintly reproduced these spoken words. With a large horn the sound increased so that anyone, nearby, could hear them.

The modern phonographs, however, turn the waving motions which have been produced by the spoken words into electric waves which, through the use of tubes, are greatly magnified. Radio Corporation of America is already transferring these words into wavy lines which some experts can read. This would be the ideal system; but it would require the use of almost a new written script something like "shorthand" which could be taught to every child. Even this, however, is not so revolutionary when you think that the "score" of music is an entirely different "alphabet" which millions of young people of all nations have learned to read and enjoy.

Novel Egg Dispensing Device . . .

Helps Farmer Solve Production Problems

There are two good ways for farmers to sell agricultural produce. One is to deliver it to nearby stores and have it sold for them over the counter. The other way is to attract customers to the farm where they can deal directly with their buying public.

When one way doesn't work, the other might. At least that is how one New Jersey poultryman thought about his sales problem.

Eggs weren't going so well at neighboring stores and he decided to do

something about it. His answer was a road-side "egg-o-mat"—a small building, heated in the winter and air-conditioned in the summer, where customers can buy eggs when they want them.

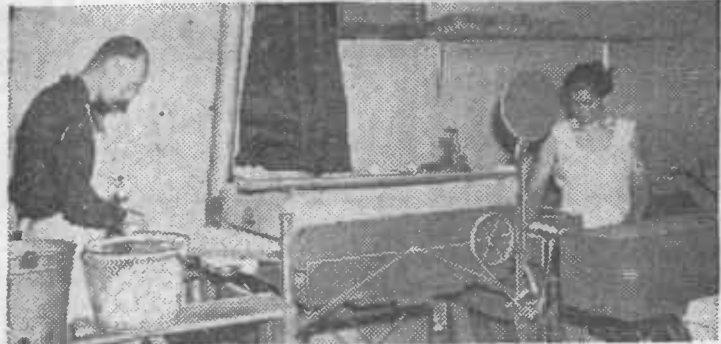
Medium, large and small sized eggs are stored by the dozen in cardboard boxes which fit snugly into the "egg-o-mat's" ceiling-high, square metal containers which look very much like narrow filing cabinets. Each time a customer puts the correct change in a slot in the proper cabinet, a door opens and out pops his box of eggs. The "egg-o-mat" even has an auto-

matic coin changer which enables customers to get out of each 50 cent piece inserted, the exact number of quarters, dimes and nickels needed for their respective purchases.

The "egg-o-mat" is located adjacent to this farmer's egg room. The egg processing building includes a room where the temperature and humidity are thermostatically con-

something about it. His answer was a road-side "egg-o-mat"—a small building, heated in the winter and air-conditioned in the summer, where customers can buy eggs when they want them.

Medium, large and small sized eggs are stored by the dozen in cardboard boxes which fit snugly into the "egg-o-mat's" ceiling-high, square metal containers which look very much like narrow filing cabinets. Each time a customer puts the correct change in a slot in the proper cabinet, a door opens and out pops his box of eggs. The "egg-o-mat" even has an auto-

trolled for the proper storage of newly gathered eggs and a "front-office" for candling, grading, cleaning and packing eggs.

The farmer and his wife work in the "front office," providing a novel and most interesting behind-the-scenes look at a poultry farmer's job—an idea which helps attract customers to the road-side store. An added sales touch is the fact that this farmer's poultry houses are located directly back of the "front office" so customers can watch fresh eggs being brought into the processing room on their way to the "egg-o-mat."
