Mr. Mabry gave us a breakdown on the money that has been or will be spent in each district.

District I: Iuka-Eastport Road section of the Mountain road cost \$81,386.33. In addition to that \$43,000.00 worth of work will be done during 1957 in that District.
District II: A portion of the Mt. Road has been completed. The majority of the Mountain road has been completed. The total of the work done in this district was \$144,840.00.
District III: The major portion of Mt. Gilead road lies in District III. \$71,402.40 was spent on road and, in addition, \$44,000.00 worth of work will be done in that District during 1957.
District IV: A major bridge was constructed across Bear Creek

at a cost of \$58,730.00. In addition, the Burnt Mill road was rebuilt including three bridges at a cost of \$32,899.18.

"District V: A major bridge was completed across Bear Creek east of Belmont at a cost of \$45,029.81. The Golden-Red Bay road was blacktopped at a cost of \$26,155.17 and bridges and approaches are under construction on the Red Bud road that will cost, when completed, over \$67,000.00."

In commenting on State and Federal aid for roads in the districts, Mr. Mabry has this to say: "Money for construction of various roads and bridges throughout the county is contributed by the state on a monthly basis depending on the amount of gas tax collected. A certain amount of Federal Aid funds is also available for this purpose. In order to complete a usable improvement, it is necessary to wait until sufficient funds have accumulated to start the project as all money must be available before work is initiated."

Mr. Mabry says that the districts of the county are taking the State and Federal aid money in rotation.

County's Oldest Citizen Passes Away
At Age Of 101; Was Resident Of Paden

Services for James (Jim) Thomas Butler, prominent landowner and one of the county's oldest citizens, were held at Jackson Camp church on January 5. Brother Gunthorpe, assisted by Bro. W. C. Hamilton, officiated with McMillian Funeral home in charge.

Mr. Butler, who was 101 years old on Christmas day, died Thursday at his home on the Country estate where he had lived for 99 years. His farm at one time contained 800 acres and has housed his family for five generations. Jackson Camp church and adjoining cemetery were donated by him to the community many, many years ago.

He was the oldest of eight children and survived all of them. Four of his seven children preceded him in death. His wife died November 18, 1934.

He leaves a daughter, Mrs. Madge Carroll, Tishomingo; two sons, Alvin and Sidney Butler, Paden; 19 grandchildren, 22 great-grandchildren, several great-great-grandchildren and a host of other relatives and friends.

Pallbearers included: Carlton Butler, Curtis Butler, Rex Butler, Robert Dean, Herman Shackelford and Johnnie Cosby.

Congress last year in separate actions:

1—Raised payroll taxes, effective Jan. 1, to finance the new disability insurance benefit which it added to the Social Security program. About nine out of 10 of the country's 65.3 million jobs are covered by Social Security and will be hit by tax boost.

2—Brought servicemen permanently into the Social Security program as part of a program of providing broader military survivor and retirement benefits.

Starting January 1, the government began collecting from workers 2 1/4 per cent of the first \$4200 of annual earnings, or a maximum of \$94.50 a year.

The rate was 2 per cent, or a maximum of \$84. Employers who must match contributions of their employees, will also have to pay the higher rates. Se will military personnel.

An estimated 7 million self-employed persons covered by the program will pay 3 3/8 per cent, or a maximum of \$157.50 annually. They now pay 3 per cent, or a maximum of \$126.

Employers who pay quarterly won't feel the higher tax until April. Self-employed persons who pay annually won't feel it until they file their income tax return for 1957 in April, 1958.

The new disability insurance won't go into operation until July. Then it will enable covered workers who are, or before, permanently and totally disabled to receive Social Security benefits at age 60 instead of waiting until they are 65.

Apply For
Homestead Before
April 1

Tishomingo County property owners who are entitled to homestead exemption on property taxes may make application for homestead exemptions any time between now and April 1st, at the office of Tax Assessor James H. Bishop.

Those who own homes and reside on the property themselves are entitled to homestead exemption on a large portion of their taxes. However, it is necessary to make the application each year. If this is the first time to apply for homestead exemption it will be helpful if you will carry your deed with you to the office of the Tax Assessor.

For those who live in the Iuka Separate School district it will be necessary to make application at the office of the City Clerk, in addition to making application at the office of the County Tax Assessor. The school taxes are paid through the office of the City Clerk and therefore for those home owners residing in the Iuka Separate School District it is necessary to make applications at both places. Occasionally home owners neglect to file applications for their homestead exemptions. If you do not file an application within the time limit required by law there is no way to obtain an exemption on the portion of your taxes to which you would otherwise be entitled. You can also give in your property for taxes at the same time that you file your homestead application.

Fay Nixon Constructs Diversion Terrace

Fay Nixon has constructed a mile-long diversion terrace on his farm just south of Holcut.

A long narrow field of bottom land cultivated by Mr. Nixon has for years been split down the middle by a big ugly ditch. The banks of this ditch were caving-in and it was becoming harder every year to use modern farm machinery in this field.

Instead of worrying about losing more of his valuable land Mr. Nixon decided to do something about it. This something was to construct a terrace to divert the water off his land, and to fill up the deep ugly ditch for half its length on the upper land.

This field can now be worked as one unit with little danger of erosion. The water will be walked around the foot of the slopes and into the ditch, as it should be, rather than rushing pell-mell down the center of the field washing away the land as it has been doing in the past.

The technicians of the USDA Soil

Conservation Service personnel will assist farmers who are interested in establishing diversion terraces on their farms. Our office is in the Farmers Cooperative building in Iuka.

W. Babson Discusses Congress; Lawyers, Suez Canal Rumpus, Contracts

W. Babson, Mass., Jan. 10. Now the Senators and Representatives have become organized, we are able to make a rough analysis of their ability and training.

Lawyers

It appears that about three per cent of both branches of Congress are lawyers. At first glance, it is reasonable, as their job is to make laws. This, however, should be the work of professional clerks. The Congressmen should confine their efforts to questions of policy. Lawyers, by their training, are in a position to determine basic legal questions, whether the defendant is right or wrong. The fact that there are two lawyers to each suit though, only

one party can win, and that both sides are represented by attorneys, is definite evidence that half of the attorneys are wrong! In the eyes of a statistician, this is a very poor record. If one half of the bridges built by engineers collapsed, something would be done about it.

Ninety per cent of the legislation today is economic. This applies to agriculture, to manufacturing, to general business, and even to pensions for individuals. There should be no gambling connected with such legislation. A table for Multiplication, Division, or Addition allows for no compromises. It is the same with policies; they are either right or wrong. They should not be settled out of court or in cloak rooms. All this means that three quarters of the Senators and Representatives should be nationally recognized economists. They should be qualified either to legislate according to economic principles or else not to legislate

at all. This principle should have been adopted when the nation was on the Gold Standard; but now that we are on the Political Standard, it is imperative. Some claim that more businessmen, bankers, manufacturers, and labor leaders should take the place of these lawyers. The real need, however, is for trained and practical economists and engineers who know what is best for the nation and have the courage to vote accordingly.

Suez Canal Rumpus

Probably the Suez difficulty is due to many causes, but it is primarily a matter of politics. President Nasser, of Egypt, was playing politics to get the good will of his people while raising money to build the great Aswan Dam. Prime Minister Eden was playing politics to hold his position and not be thrown out by the Labour Party. Other countries involved—possibly including the United States—were considering their heavy investments in oil. Basically, however, the Suez difficulty is an economic problem. It is not the votes involved which should be considered, but rather

the tankage, distances, freight rates and other important problems of international trade. Probably the final solution will reflect a mixture of politics, statistical facts, and world economics. This means that the solution of the problem will not be permanent, but will be a mere stopgap. This shows that courageous economists are needed in international affairs as well as in domestic affairs.

The custom of selecting our Ambassadors according to their wealth or their contributions to campaign funds is absolutely wicked. Such a policy may have been largely responsible for the fact that England and France acted without the knowledge of the United States or the United Nations. Ambassadors should be trained economists, which probably means career men. Representatives to the United Nations should be selected according to their knowledge of economics and their experience in deciding economic problems.

The Sanctity of Contracts

Individual, national, and international prosperity depends upon the recognition of the sanctity of

contracts. No individual, corporation, or nation can prosper in the long run without an earnest endeavor to carry out its contracts. This is a fundamental matter in connection with the oil companies using the Suez Canal. Furthermore, a man does not need legal training in order to recognize the Ten Commandments. Honesty is not only the best policy, but it is the only policy upon which a reputation, or a business, or a nation can prosper and survive.

No one nation should be allowed to interfere with the international trade vitally affecting all nations. A great need today is Confidence.

Of course, in discussing the sanctity of a contract, an individual, corporation, or nation is justified in knowing that the contract was not obtained dishonestly by misrepresentation, coercion, or bribery. It is possible that some contracts for drilling oil were obtained under rather unsavory conditions, but no such claims have been made in connection with the high-grade oil companies now suffering from the Suez dispute. Possibly it would have been better to have had the Suez Canal contract, when originally drawn, made subject to renegotiations similar to the renegotiations that the oil companies have already gone through. These Suez renegotiations could have been under the jurisdiction of a committee of accountants and economists approved by the World Court. The committee could employ an international and impartial lawyer, upon whom all parties would agree. Their decisions, however, should strengthen the importance of the sanctity of contracts and not undermine or impair same. In closing, let me say that my appeal in this column may not do any good but, as Congress is now organizing and as the Suez negotiations are in full operation, I do want my millions of

readers to be thinking over this message.

Important Notice To All Auto Repair Depts.

Due to recent complaints from repair shops in Mississippi, we think it advisable to notify all automobile repairmen that they should determine whether an insurance company is licensed to do business in Mississippi before releasing a repaired car on the strength of an unlicensed out-of-

state company's promise to pay a repair bill.

Within the past few months several auto repair shops have sought our assistance in collecting a repair bill on out-of-state cars insured by an unlicensed out-of-state company. The Insurance Department has no jurisdiction over a case of this kind, regardless of its merit, and can be of no assistance under any circumstances. In the event an out-of-state car is brought into your place for repair, we suggest that you collect your bill before releasing the automobile unless the matter is handled by a local adjuster, local agent, and the insurance is with a company licensed to do business in Mississippi.

We will be glad to answer any inquiries regarding the insurance angle before the repaired car is released.

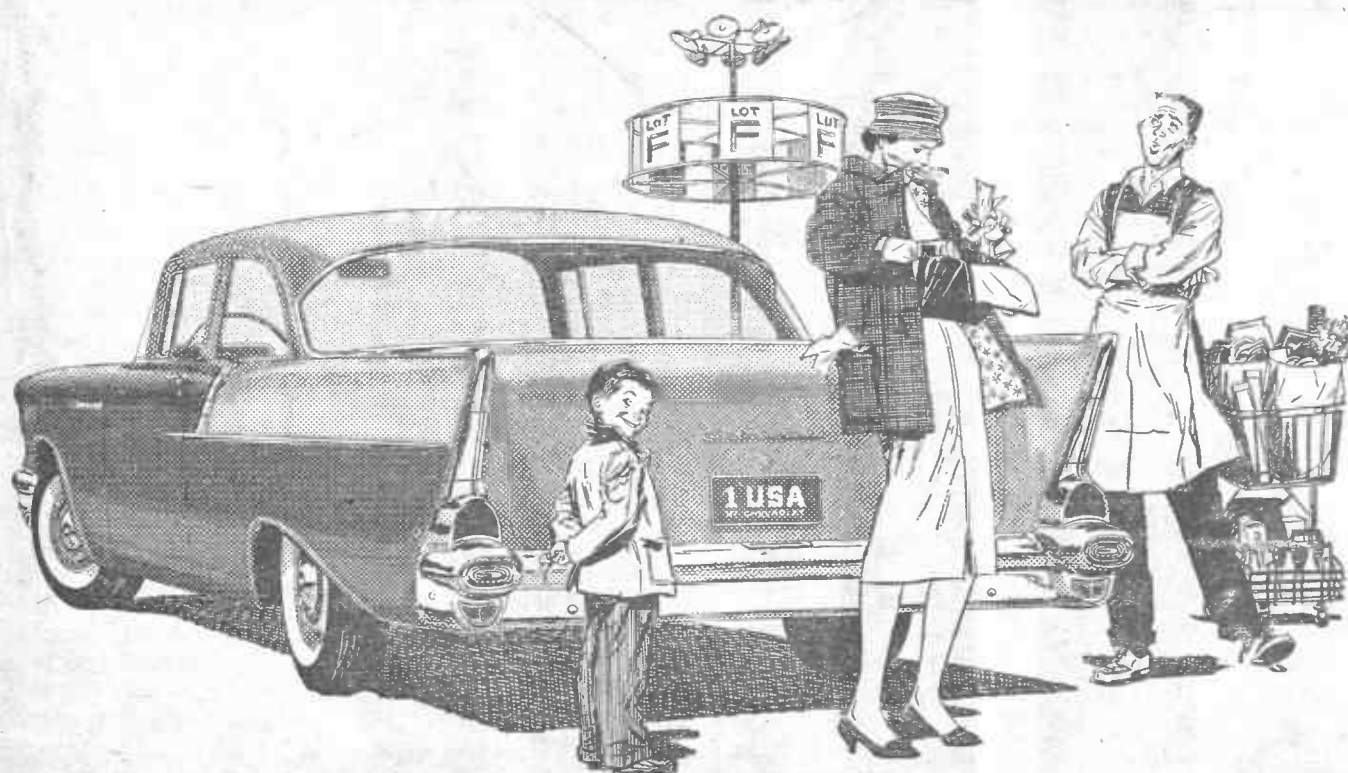

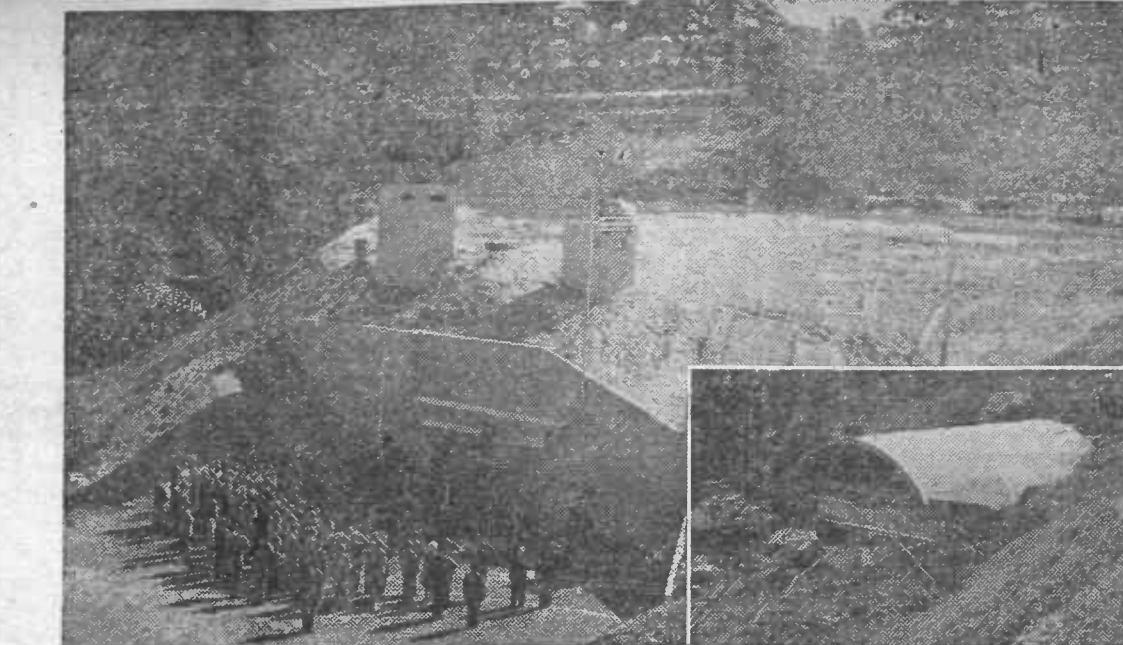

552 Highway Traffic Deaths Last Year

Mississippi traffic deaths increased during 1956 despite the state Highway Patrol's valiant last-ditch effort to curb the mounting slaughter.

On the very eve of the start of the new year, the bloody highway toll pushed slightly ahead: 552 deaths as compared to 548 for 1955.

Though the toll climbed only four deaths, Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough called the four lives lost—and the 548 other deaths recorded—"a needless wanton sacrifice."

The public safety commissioner had warned earlier, on December 21 at the start of the Christmas—New Year observance, that only sane driving would prevent an increase in traffic accident fatalities. His grim warning apparently fell on deaf ears.

Eighteen were killed in auto accidents during the long Christmas weekend. Twelve more deaths were counted before the start of the new year.

At the time Commissioner Scarbrough issued his appeal for sane driving, Mississippi was one of the few states in the nation boasting a reduction in traffic deaths.

The state's traffic death toll might have climbed higher but for the Patrol's all-out selective enforcement program, "Operation—Attack". When wolfpack teams of Highway Patrolmen first began concentrating on high accident frequency areas early in October, the '56 highway slaughter had climbed 27 deaths above the toll for the corresponding '55 period.

Fatalities nosedived during the ensuing weeks, and a substantial reduction in deaths had been noted when the "Attacks" were halted in late November.

Commissioner Scarbrough called attention to the fact that had it been possible to have launched the concentrated enforcement program early in 1956, a reduction in the yearly death toll might have resulted.

"Year-round strict traffic law enforcement can be expected during 1957," he promised.

CONGRESSIONAL INVESTIGATION OF RACIAL MIXOLOGY IN WASHINGTON, D.C., SCHOOLS HAS HELPED TO CONVINCE MANY AMERICANS AGAINST SEGREGATION

Washington, Jan. 10.—That the congressional investigation of racial mixology in District of Columbia public schools has helped to convince many white Americans of the justice of the South's insistence upon segregation has become apparent as the new Congress gets under way.

A Dec. 28 majority report, resulting from September hearings by a House D.C. Subcommittee, recommended, among several proposed remedial measures, action to restore segregation in Washington schools. The subcommittee is headed by Rep. James C. Davis, Georgia. Mississippi's Rep. John Bell Williams authored and pushed through the resolution calling for the probe.

Reaction, "Shocking"

National reaction to sordid conditions caused by D.C. school integration has been reflected in an obvious, though quiet, change of attitude by some on Capitol Hill. In other words, several senators and congressmen who have been supporting mixology are now giving a more attentive ear to the contention by southern colleagues that white and negro citizens may live together more peacefully, happily, economically and successfully in a segregated society.

"Absolutely shocking" was the private response of one northern congressman, who admitted that facts aired by Washington teachers at the hearings had caused him to "do some thing" about the manner in which the District Board of Education ordered "sudden integration" of Washington schools only eight days after the May 1954 Black Monday decision of the U. S. Supreme Court.

He referred to testimony by Washington school teachers—men and women of obvious refinement and good educational background—concerning the wide disparity between white and negro students in capacity to learn, appalling sex problems, which have alarmed white parents and sped their exodus to suburban Maryland and Virginia, where schools are still segregated; acts of nuisance by negro students, causing destruction, defacing and deterioration of buildings and other school property, and the breaking down of social activity in the schools, such as the discontinuing of school proms and picnics, because most white students are unwilling to attend mixed social functions, and most white parents will not countenance such association.

See "No Return"

Although the subcommittee majority—Chairman Davis, retired Rep. Woodrow Jones, North Carolina; Republican Joel T. Brayhill, Virginia, and Williams—recommended "that racially-separated public schools be re-established for

the education of white and negro pupils in the District of Columbia," there seems currently to be no hope for action by Congress any time soon to follow such a recommendation.

Congressman Williams feels, however, that the investigation "has and will continue to have a wholesome effect" in the campaign of southern leaders to convince citizens of other sections that Mixicrats, in seeking to achieve integration objectives in a tug-of-war between major political parties for minority group support, are "destroying the constitution, torpedoing the principles which have made our country great and paving the way for a totalitarian dictatorship in America."

Some of the results of the probe are outlined as follows:

1. It has brought serious consideration by an increasing number of senators and congressmen of measures calling for cutting of school boundary rules.
2. It has brought a psychological effect upon opponents of racial mixology, raising the morale of some of the more "timid" and providing hope that the American people may eventually be brought to a realization that the Black Monday decision was not based upon law.
3. It has brought to national attention, in a most dramatic manner, the contention of a number of recognized psychologists, who have found from scientific study and analysis that negroes are not mentally capable of learning as quickly as whites.

Coincidental with testimony by Washington teachers, showing that achievement tests given students have revealed the general level of achievement by negro students to be far below that of white students, Dr. F. C. J. McCurk, professor of psychology at Villa Nova University, issued an article carrying his findings that negroes are not capable of learning as quickly as white persons. The "sudden integration" plan of the Mixicrats, ordered by the D.C. Education Board eight days after the Supreme Court's Black Monday decision, arbitrarily fixes school zones, with public required to enroll at the school located in the zone in which they live, regardless of whether that school is predominantly white or predominantly negro.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO MISSISSIPPI TO HAVE IMPOSED FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO UPON ALL PERSONS ENGAGED IN ANY BUSINESS TAXED BY SECTIONS 2c, 2d and 2f, OF CHAPTER 119 OF MISSISSIPPI LAWS OF 1934, AS AMENDED, OR MAY HEREAFTER BE AMENDED, AN ADDITIONAL TAX OF ONE HALF OF ONE PER CENT (1/2 OF 1%) RETAIL SALES OR GROSS INCOME.

Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Matthew 24
Devotional Reading: Hebrews 3:1-14

Tempted We Are

Lesson for January 13, 1957

EVERYBODY is a sinner yet not everybody is tempted to the same sins. But being tempted is not a sign of sin. The church believes that the same Jesus who "in every respect has been tempted as we are" (Hebrews 4:15) nevertheless was tempted without sinning. It would be a mistake to suppose that in order to be tempted as we are, Jesus would have to have been tempted to all the sins there are. What this means is simply that the way he was tempted is the way we are tempted.

At Highest Moments

One thing we can learn from Christ's temptations is that it is not possible in this life to be guaranteed freedom from temptation. In the first place, it can be said that only serious-minded high-principled people know what real temptation is. Weak, flabby, frivolous persons feel no pull or push; they drop into sin like a stone into water. You can't feel temptation without resisting. Low-minded people do what they feel like doing without thinking. They aren't even aware they have sinned. They are like dirty little boys who can't see the sense in washing—they feel clean enough! It is the clearly person who is conscious of dirt on his hands or clothes. So only the person with real convictions and ideals can feel the tug of temptation. It is only people with consciences who can be tempted to go against their conscience. Now high-minded people, people who really want to please God, often wish they could reach a stage in life where they wouldn't have to struggle to be good and to do right. But the story of Jesus shows that this is a false hope. Jesus had just been baptized when his great temptations came. If ever there was a consecrated, holy person, conscious of God's approval, it was Jesus at that time. If ever there was a person filled with the Holy Spirit, it was he. Yet Matthew tells us that Jesus was led by the Spirit to be tempted! In life's highest and holiest moments one is tempted to say, Now I am safe. But that may be the very moment the great struggle begins.

Tempted to Do Good

Again, the story of Jesus shows that sin may not always be something evil in itself. The three temptations of Jesus illustrate three levels of temptation, three levels of sin. Falling down and worshipping Satan is obviously the sin of sins. Jumping off a temple roof isn't so much wicked as it is foolish; but playing the fool is still sin. (If the President of the United States rolled his Secretary of State down Pennsylvania Avenue in a wheel-barrel, it might not be wicked, but for him it would be very wrong indeed.) But turning stones into bread—? That would be a helpful thing in a country full of poor people. Nothing was said about Jesus using the bread for himself alone. And if he could turn stones into bread he could turn them into medicine, into meat, mansions! Not wicked, not foolish. But still wrong; because Jesus was commissioned to do something more profound, more radical than supplying people with bread. He came to change men from the inside, to feed their souls. So we, like the Master, are sometimes tempted to do what is good, when what is better is possible. "To choose a lesser good," said Prof. W. M. Urban, "in the presence of a greater, is the essence of wrong."

Sword of the Spirit

Another way in which the Christian can learn from Christ's temptations is by observing how he met them. He did not play around with them. He did not say, "Well, there is something in what you say." He did not debate what for him was not debatable. And he met each temptation with a word from God's Word. Each of the quotations he makes, ("It is written") came from the same book of the Old Testament, Deuteronomy. If Jesus could find help, in time of temptation, in his Bible, surely the Christian of today is cutting himself off from a major source of strength if when temptation comes the best he can think of is, "I am sure there is a verse in the Bible about this somewhere, but I can't think what it is." The best way to have the Bible ready for daily help is not to have it on a shelf, but to have it as a treasure in the mind.

When we come to the cold weather, with practically nothing in the garden, we look for ways to prepare the vegetables from pantry and freezer. In these recipes for vegetables you will find one you want to try out on your family.

Green Beans
Cooked green beans
1 cup diced onion
1 cup diced green pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup tomatoes

Saute the onions, pepper and cooked green beans in the butter until slightly brown. Mix the flour, salt and pepper with the tomatoes. Add tomato mixture to the beans and cook slowly together for 6 to 8 minutes. (serves 5)

Corn Fritters
2 cups corn, grated
2 eggs
1/4 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon baking powder
2 tablespoons cream
4 tablespoons fat
Add beaten eggs, flour, baking powder, salt and pepper to the grated corn. Mix thoroughly. Add the cream. Melt the fat in a frying pan and drop corn mixture by spoonfuls into the hot fat. Brown on both sides. (Makes 16 to 18 fritters)

Carrots a la Reynolds
12 large carrots, cooked and mashed
1/2 cup mayonnaise
4 tablespoons onions, chopped fine

2 to 4 tablespoons prepared horseradish
Mix together, put into baking dish. Sprinkle buttered bread crumbs on top and heat thoroughly. Serve at once.

Yield: 6 servings.

Foresters again answer, No. While normally the amount of sap is approximately the same, sometimes it is actually greater in the winter than in the spring. The difference is that the sap moves about in the spring and lies dormant in winter.

County Agent news

Country Ham
Try this method for curing old fashioned country ham.

Here is what to use: A ham, of course; salt, sugar and salt-peter. Eight pounds of salt, two pounds of sugar and two-ounces of salt-peter are the correct proportions to use.

Allow one and a quarter pound of this mixture for each pound the ham weighs. Rub on one-half the curing mixture—do not try to rub it into the ham, just rub it on good. But you should force some of the mixture into the hock end. About 48 hours later, rub on half the remaining mixture; then five days later, the rest of it.

Place hams skin side down in a box or on a work table to cure. Safest curing temperature is 38° to 45° F. It is easier to cure in dry weather than in damp weather. Allow the ham to cure for two days for each pound it weighs (for a 20 pound ham, 40 days.) During freezing weather, allow two weeks in the cure.

Remove the ham from the cure to ready it for smoking. Using a brush and water, scrub off any excess salt; then soak ham in water for an hour. Hams not to be smoked, should not be soaked. Hang meat in smoke house overnight to drip before applying smoke.

After smoking, age the ham six months to a year. This causes the ham to develop that tangy "Old flavor", characteristic of country hams. Best aging temperature is 70° to 80° F.

Protect ham from insects while in storage by wrapping with heavy brown paper and hanging it in a cloth sack. Melt paraffin and paint the sack to seal it.

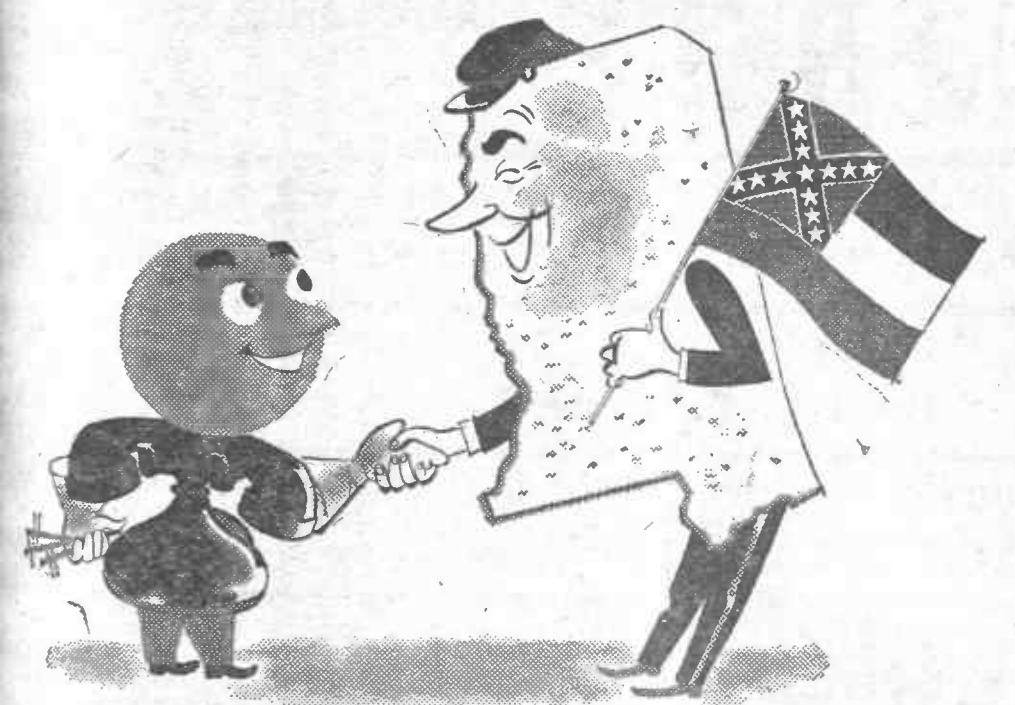

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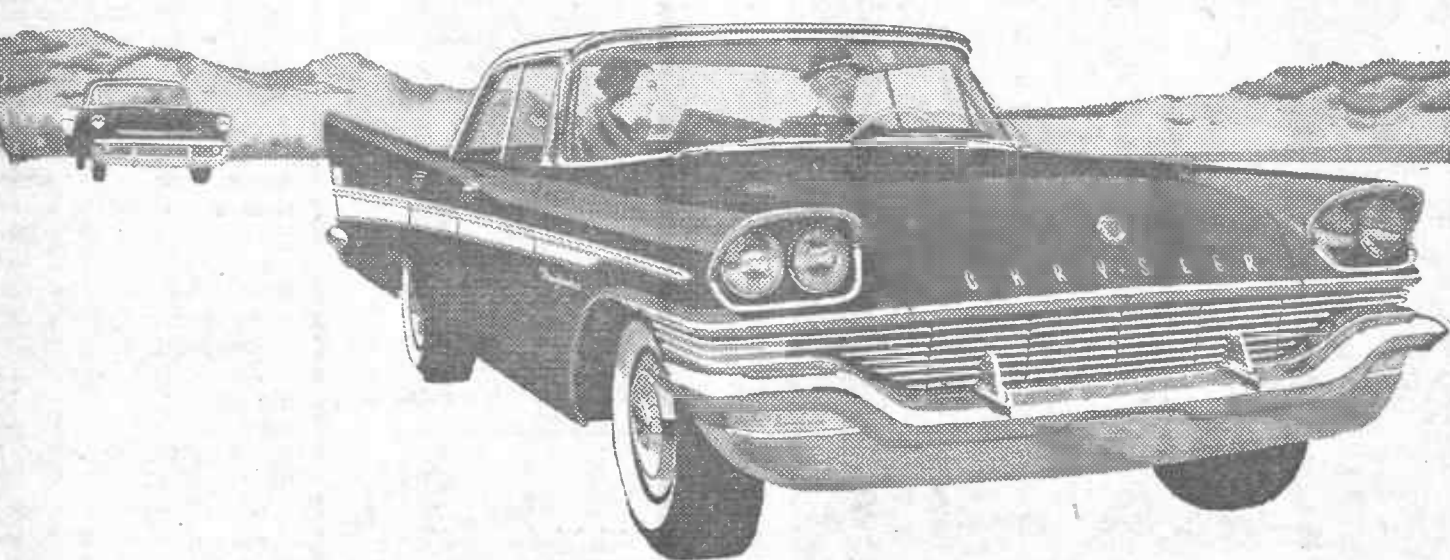

\$25,977,500.00 Allocated Mississippi In '57 Soil Bank Acreage Reserve Program; March 1 Deadline For Cotton Sign-Up

Mississippi has received a Total Allocation of \$25,977,500.00 for payments to farmers participating in the 1957 Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve Programs for Cotton, J. N. Lipscomb, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, announced today.

Mack Sanders said that County A.S.C. Committees are not expected to be ready to accept 1957. Acreage Reserve Agreements for spring crops before Mid-January.

Except that the acreage for any commodity placed in the Acreage Reserve for a farm shall not exceed the farm allotment for the commodity, the maximum acreages that may be originally entered for a farm are: For Cotton, 10.0 acres or 30 percent of the allotment, whichever is larger. There will be no minimum acreage limitations on the amount of land that may be entered in the program.

Acreage Reserve agreements will be accepted on a "First Come, First Served" basis to the extent County Funds are available, Mr. Sanders stated. Farmers wishing to participate above the Maximum Acreage limits for a particular crop must indicate this in their original agreement. If additional funds are made available through reallocation after the Sign-Up has closed, the additional acres will be accepted to the extent funds permit.

All farmers in Tishomingo County will receive, through the mail, by the last of the week their per-acre rate of payment for their farm.

The Deadline for signing 1957 Acreage Reserve Agreements will be March 1, 1957 for cotton.

E. N. Allen of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office releases the following information on the Soil Bank Acreage Reserve regulations for 1957. It will be remembered that on December 26 Secretary Benson announced the provision

for the Acreage Reserve to be in effect during 1957. All farmers of the county will want to be filled in on the new regulations while making plans for this year's crops.

"The new regulations embody several important changes and additions to those in effect for the emergency Acreage Reserve Program of the past year," stated Mr. Allen. He further explained that the soil bank law became effective late in May 1956, after most crops had been planted. "However," he said, "the Department put the program in operation promptly and the farmers of the nation placed over 12 million acres of basic crops such as wheat, corn, cotton, rice, peanuts, and tobacco in the 1956 acreage reserve."

When asked if the acreage put in reserve in 1956 didn't bring about the desired reduction, Mr. Allen stated, "It did not. In spite of a relatively good start the 1956 program was not considered a fair trial of the surplus-reducing possibilities of the soil bank. A most successful program is anticipated for 1957. Most of the changes that have been made are to insure producers a fair and equitable opportunity to participate in the program."

Asked what the major provisions of the 1957 program were, Mr. Allen replied, "Funds available for the Acreage Reserve Program have been apportioned among the commodities to be covered—wheat, corn, tobacco, and rice. These funds have been allocated to producing states to be apportioned among counties within these states. Mississippi's allocation of funds for 1957 is \$26,355,600. Of this amount \$378,100 is for rice and the balance is for cotton." Continuing, Mr. Allen stated national allocations by commodities are as follows: Cotton, \$217.5 million; corn, \$217.5 million; rice \$14 million; tobacco, over \$34 million; and wheat, both winter and spring, \$267,630,000,

making a total of \$750,685,000. This is \$685,000 above the 750 million limit set by law, but it is to take care of what is called "Slippage." That's money that may be committed, but will not be used because not all agreements may be carried out or qualified for full payment.

A maximum is set on the amount of acreage that a particular farmer can put in the acreage reserve when he signs an agreement. At the time the original agreement is signed a farmer can indicate on that agreement the number of additional acres he would put in the reserve if additional funds are allocated the county.

When asked if payment money which is not obligated, after the sign-up for a crop has closed, would be reallocated to another county or another state, Mr. Allen replied, "That's correct, and additional acres applied for will be accepted to the extent that funds are available. In other words applications will be accepted by the county committee on a 'first come-first served' basis."

There will be no minimum acreage limitations on the amount of land that may be entered in the program. The acreage for any commodity placed in the acreage reserve by a farmer cannot exceed that farm's allotment for the commodity. The cotton limitation is 10 acres or 30 per cent of the allotment, whichever is larger.

Attention is called to the regulation that if a farmer puts the identical land in reserve for two successive years he receives a 10 per cent boost in his regular payment for the second year. Mr. Allen also emphasized that the rule in regard to the civil penalty is the same as in 1956. In other words, a farmer who signs an acreage reserve agreement and willfully grazes or crops the land in violation of his agreement will be liable to a civil penalty equal to half the payment which would otherwise

be made and in addition he will not get the payment.

Mr. Allen said that each crop in the acreage reserve had a sign-up deadline date, for cotton the date being March 1st.

Concluding his remarks, Mr. Allen stated that peanuts and extra long staple cotton was not included in the 1957 acreage reserve since there was no troublesome surplus of those two crops.

Miss. Congressman Gives Views On Integration

"The deplorable conditions existing in the Washington, D. C. public schools prove beyond question that racial integration is against the best interests of both whites and negroes," declared Mississippi's Congressman John Bell Williams. "Stealing, lying, cheating, fighting, vandalism, obscene language, and sex problems have increased in direct proportion to negro school enrollment in Washington schools. Teachers are unable to

conduct classes because so much of their time is required to maintain order." Williams said that are but a few of the shocking conditions a Subcommittee found in its recent investigation.

It was on motion of Williams that the Subcommittee was setup. He served as ranking Democrat on the group.

The Subcommittee report stated that school integration was causing white people to leave the Nation's Capital in such large numbers that "the District will become a predominantly negro community in the not too distant future."

As the first Congressional study of integration and its effects on community life, the Subcommittee

report was critical of every aspect of integration in the District of Columbia. The report said that public school standards have deteriorated to an alarming degree and recommended that racially separate schools be re-established.

Williams said the testimony during the hearings and the resultant report were dramatic proof of how a good public school system can be destroyed by forced integration of the races.
