County Farmers May Sign Cotton Acreage Agreements Beginning Jan. 25

All farmers in Tishomingo County have received their Rate Per Acre on the Post Card mailed on January 9. The figure on your card is the amount per acre for which you can rent your cotton land to the Government.

The A.S.C. Office will begin to sign Agreements on January 25, and will continue to sign agreements until the County Allocation is spent or March 1, whichever is earlier. Agreements will be signed on a First-Come First-Served basis.

The Maximum Limit of acres that can be rented on a farm will be 10.0 acres or 30% of the 1957 Cotton Allotment, whichever is larger. A farmer may rent more than this, provided there is still money in the County Allocation at the Closing Date for signing Agreements. For example: Farmer A has 15.0 acre cotton allotment, he signs to rent 10.0 acres then after March 1, (Dead-line for signing) there is still money left, Farmer A can sign the remaining 5.0 acres.

To Be eligible for participation in the Acreage Reserve Program the farmer must specifically designate and identify in the Agreement the fields of cropland that will be rented.

A farmer will be required to designate land of equal productivity on his farm to rent. For example: If cotton was planted in 1956 on your best land you will be expected to designate that same

The Tishomingo County Board of Education, in a meeting held Monday of this week in the County Superintendent's office, amended its original order creating the county school system. The amendment excludes all the area in Prentiss county that was intended to be used in forming the line school attendance center at Holcut, and includes all of Tishomingo county with the exception of the First District which will be the Iuka Municipal Separate School District.

Action of the board came as a result of a letter from James T. Kendall, attorney for the State Educational Finance Commission. In his letter to County Superintendent Scruggs Mr. Kendall said that the law would not permit areas in two counties being used in one unit and that it was necessary that only lands in one county be involved in a county unit system.

The original order of the board forming the county unit system for Tishomingo county involved approximately 36 square miles in Prentiss county.

Attorney Kendall also informed the county superintendent of education of Prentiss county what the law required, and in accordance the Prentiss County Board of Education met last Thursday night and amended its order to include that area formerly omitted by it and which was originally included in the Tishomingo county order. The Prentiss county amendment was immediately forwarded to the State Educational Finance Commission. Tishomingo county's amendment was sent in Monday following its adoption by the board.

Mrs. Guy Dicuss, home economics teacher, had five boys to enroll in her class with seventy girls at the beginning of the school term. "At first the girls resented having boys in the class but this was soon overcome in studying teenage problems and how young people should conduct themselves on various occasions," stated Mrs. Dicuss, "it proved very helpful to have the opinions of both."

The class is presently engaged in the study of child care. On Tuesday morning of last week, Mrs. Eugene C. Bonds brought her five weeks old baby, Cecilia, over and went through the process of bathing and dressing the

Former Citizen Tells Of Progress Made In The Field Of Aeronautics

In an article published recently in one of the area newspapers Dick Merrill, former citizen and nephew of Mrs. T. M. McDonald, reveals remarkable strides of progress in the field of aeronautics. The article in its entirety is given below:

Time certainly flies—and in the field of aeronautics it just gets up and skedaddles. Remember Dick Merrill?

He's the man from Iuka, Miss., who flew the Atlantic round-trip with his wings stuffed with ping-pong balls. Also his tail stabilizer. The idea was that they would keep him aloft if he had to plunk into the ocean.

Merrill, who is senior clerk pilot for Eastern Air Lines, expects in less than three years to be shoving jet transports thru the high, thin air at 550-600 miles an hour.

The remarkable thing is that this same man remembers the days of the early 1920's when he would be flying along in one of the deluxe crates of the time and look down to find himself actually going backward over the ground. Who says things haven't improved?

Losing Ground
"In those old days," he said, "lots of times I'd get over objects on the ground and—if there was a big wind—back up. In those days the cruising speed was about 60 miles an hour."

"To navigate, we'd follow the railroads and highways. Many times we'd see the trains and cars run off and leave us if we were bucking headwinds. This was true even as late as 1928, when I was

flying the mail." Merrill, a spry guy of 62, was en route here from New York on a plane carrying Eastern's 50,000,000th passenger. He has logged more than 30,000 hours in the air, and he figures that before the logging started he probably had 2500 hours more in barnstorming and mail carrying.

Merrill began flying in 1921 in an old Curtis Jenny. He and another young fellow started a flying circus and, as he says, "The things we did, people today would think it was Buck Rogers." Look, No Parachute

To get the crowds out on Sundays, they had one performer who went from plane to ground without benefit of parachute.

"This boy," Merrill recalled, "would crawl down to the landing gear. We'd slow the plane down—get over a grass field, into the wind. He had a rope, seven or eight feet long, that he'd tie to the axle."

"He'd swing like a pendulum and let go at the end of a swing—drop seven or eight feet, roll over a couple of times, and jump up on his feet. Of course, those jenny planes landed at 40 or 45 miles an hour, and he maybe got off at slower than that."

There was no charge for this, nor for the aerobatics and wing-walking and parachuting. The idea was to get a crowd out and then after the show take up passengers—at \$10 a person.

But it was not big business. The plane's capacity was one passenger per flight.

Parallel Terraces Best On Gentle Slopes

Parallel terraces are ordinary terraces located the same distance apart from one end to the other.

There are no corners, and no short rows between parallel terraces. Every row is a long row and easy to cultivate with modern tractor equipment.

All this sounds so good to be true and it is too good to be true on many Tishomingo county farms where owners cultivate rather steep and irregular slopes. But on uniform gentle slopes parallel terraces will work fine.

It is evident that parallel terraces do not strictly follow the contour, and that there are engineer-

ing limitations which they are practical and Kenneth Mayhall has ed some parallel terraces just south of Iuka are there for anyone interested, to see. If you are interested in looking sure you are in the field where they are, the terraces he has built.

The Soil Conservation Commissions believe want fewer short rows is this true where terraced. Parallel terraces answer to this problem.

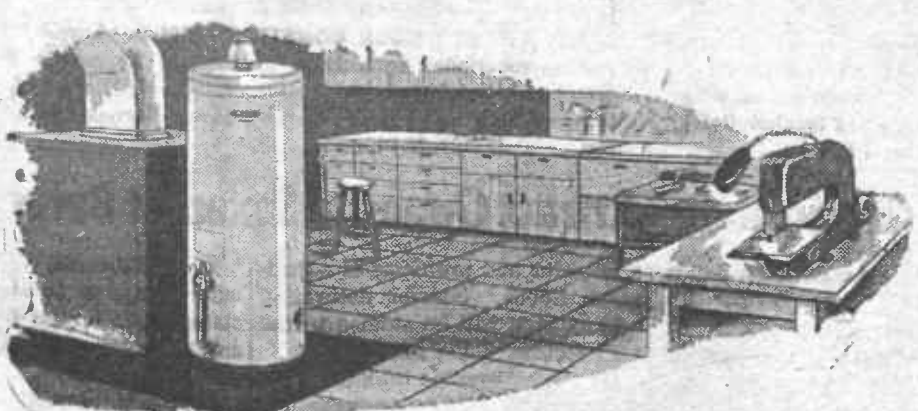

(2) Corporate Bonds, which—of the same company—are safer than the stock of the company, but their interest is taxable. (3) Revenue Bonds which are issued by your state, city, or town, but your interest payment depends upon the earnings of a state turnpike, or upon your local gas, water, or sewerage system. This interest, however, is not taxable.

TODAY'S PRICES FOR BONDS

Bonds are cheaper than they have been for over 20 years. Buy them today and you should have an excellent investment. But proper selection, with the help of an investment counselor, you will be sure to make money particularly by purchasing selected non-taxable bonds. Buying good non-taxable bonds is just like discovering gold in your own back yard. No reader of this column remembers my saying this since the panic of 1929-1932.

NON-TAXABLE BENEFITS

There is something else to remember. The income you get from U. S. stock, corporation bond, or even U. S. Government Bond, is taxable. Practically everyone must pay a Federal Tax of at least 20% of all dividends and interest received except from State, City and County Bonds, and special non-taxable authority issues which include the Turnpike Revenue Bonds.

Here is what this means to you. Whatever your income, you can save 20-25%. If, however, you are in a higher income tax bracket (say 40-45%) on any of the above bonds could net you the same as 8 percent on taxable stocks. If your income is \$50,000, then the interest on the 4% tax-free bonds equals 16% in taxable income; while those having incomes of \$80,000 get an equivalent yield of 25% on their money after all taxes. Seems too good to be true; but it is true!

THE FLY IN THE OINTMENT

Why doesn't everyone with large incomes buy these bonds now? It may be that they are waiting for lower prices due to the fear that many new Turnpike Bonds are coming on the market. Or it may be due to the competition which these present turnpikes may have from new U. S. Government highways. Surely I do fear such competition. If you believe that automobile riding is going to be less and that automobile business is "going to pot," then don't buy these tax-free Turnpike Bonds. If you believe World War III is soon coming, when gas will be rationed, you are justified in being cautious. But I believe such fears are now foolish. Hence, I say, "Buy seasoned Non-taxable Turnpikes—and buy them today."

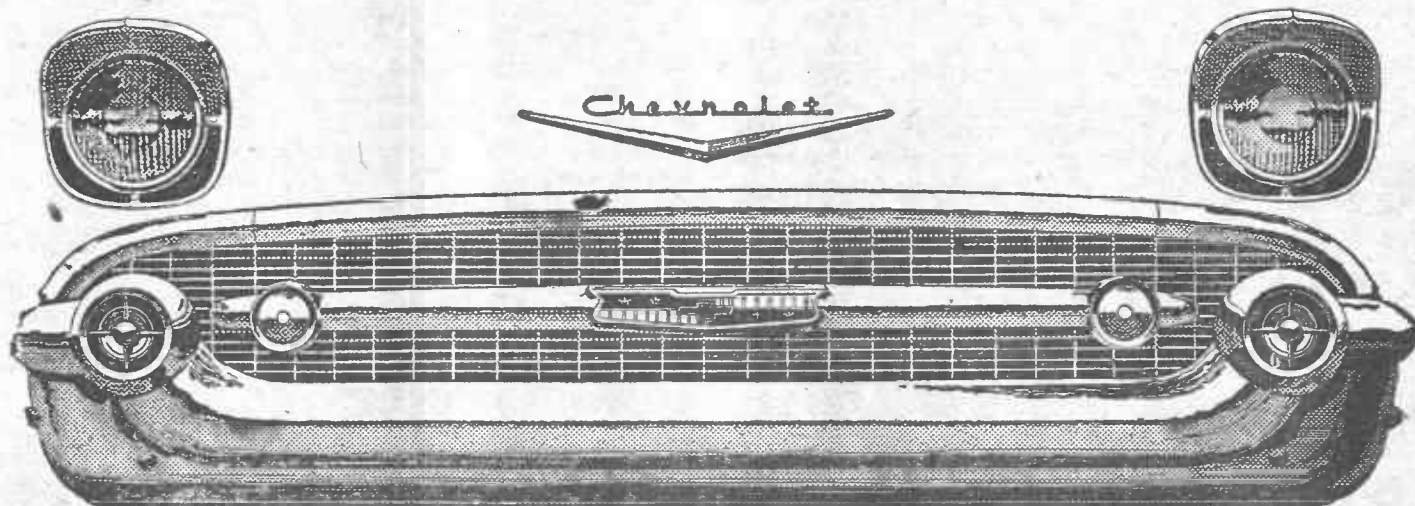

RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO MISSISSIPPI TO HAVE IMPOSED FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO UPON ALL PERSONS ENGAGED IN ANY BUSINESS TAXED BY SECTIONS 2-c, 2-d and 2-f, OF CHAPTER 119 OF MISSISSIPPI LAWS OF 1934, AS AMENDED, OR MAY HEREAFTER BE AMENDED, AN ADDITIONAL TAX OF ONE HALF OF ONE PER CENT (½ of 1%) RETAIL SALES OR GROSS INCOME.

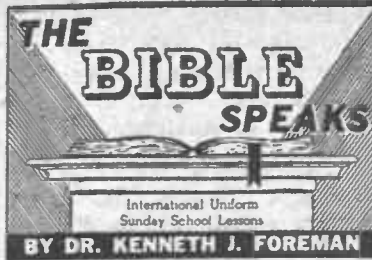

Health and Sin

Lesson for January 27, 1957

IT TAKES a long time for some ideas to sink in. Sometimes it happens that a father or mother will give a child a serious talk about something important, but all the child remembers is that there was a talk about it. Years later, as a grown man, the former child will suddenly exclaim: So that's what Father was trying to tell me! Much of Jesus' teaching was like that. He was always giving hints, or saying things straight out, which a few faithful minds remembered, but did not understand. Dr. Foreman



stand. For years the saying of Jesus would be read in the Bible, and scholars would puzzle over it . . . and then hundreds of years after Christ, people would discover what Jesus meant. He was long ahead of his time.

Why People Are in Hospitals

One of these ahead-of-time hints was about the relation between health and sin. In the famous story of the man who was paralyzed, brought in by four of his friends for Jesus to heal, it long seemed a puzzling thing that the first thing Jesus said to him did not appear to have anything to do with his case. "Your sins are forgiven," Jesus said. Perhaps the four friends found it odd. They did not bring the man there to have his soul looked into; they came to get him back on his feet again. It was his muscles, not his morals, that seemed to need help. But Jesus saw with certain eye that the root of the man's trouble was not in his body, it was in his soul. He saw there was no use sending the man back into activity, with an active body but a crippled soul. Jesus that day was probably the only living person who could see that. Today the truth has dawned on a great many persons. Dr. Russell Dicks of Duke University says

it has been learned that the majority of patients in hospitals would not be there if they were rid of what is eating into their minds.

Sins Against the Body

Psychiatrists, who are M.D.'s first, and who work hand in hand with surgeons, internal-medicine specialists and so on, are trained to probe for these non-physical causes of disease. The causes may be mental or spiritual, —if indeed they can be distinguished. A major cause they look for is the "guilt complex." One who hides within himself, perhaps at a deeper level than conscious memory, a sense of guilt, is a person who falls easy victim to disease, even to accidents. Case records are numerous in which it appears that the patient began to get well as soon as he began to "get right" in his attitude to God or man, or both. (Don't jump to extremes here! If you catch cold it's not necessarily because you've been stealing.) One of the most common sins, however, that many commit without being aware of it, is the whole class of sins against one's body, one's health,—against oneself. Eating and drinking unwisely, under-sleeping, overstrain or undernourishment,—in ways too many to be counted, men and women sin against themselves. If it is a sin to commit suicide, it is equally a sin to do anything or to form any habit which shortens life.

Can Jesus Help?

Jesus brought the paralyzed man back to health of soul and body. Can Jesus help today? Yes, in several strong ways. (1) As a living Spirit, he can bring assurance of God's forgiveness. With that assurance, the inner life can begin again, healed and strong. (2) As the unseen but constant Companion, Christ can be so real that in his presence temptation loses its power, and the desire to live as in his presence becomes a high motive of life. (3) Christ has so inspired many a man and woman that they have been his personal representatives; he has lived in them and worked through them. Today there are persons, in Alcoholics Anonymous, for example, who have been so touched by the Master that they no longer live for their own appetites, but literally are on call day and night wherever they may help others who are struggling with the same habit which once had dragged them down. Whatever a Christian does for another in the name of Christ is not only done for Him—He does it. So Christ today, through those bear his name, helps by cure, but better, by prevention. help you know where your sewing can really help the budget most, some tests have been made recently. They include making women's daytime dresses, children's dress-women's house dresses.

conclusions were that it was worthwhile budgetwise to women's daytime or street dresses when you consider both savings and time spent. The dresses rated second and women's house dresses

were still appreciable.

For the study of children's dresses, five ready-wear garments in size 8 were bought. They cost \$21.94. The dresses were copied by an experienced seamstress at a total cost of \$11.15. The average savings was \$2.16 for each dress.

Ready-to-wear women's street dresses bought at about \$10 could be made for about \$5, but house-dresses bought at about \$3.50 cost about \$2.25 to make at home.

Basting, pins or Needle?

Recent tests in home clothing construction research at the U. S. Department of Agriculture show that for the more difficult "put-together" jobs, thread-basting saves time and gives better results.

Stitching over pins takes longer because the machine often must be run slowly to avoid blunting or breaking the needle as well as to keep the stitching even and hold the fabric in place. In contrast, stitching over thread-basting is both fast and accurate.

In tests, using percale, pinning generally was faster, but, in every instance, the machine-stitching took longer on pin-basted than on thread-basted fabric. Except for applying a flat, shaped collar, results

were poorer.

The researchers comment that the advantage of thread-basting is likely to be even greater when you use slippery fabric and with a less experienced seamstress.

Transporting Food

The cost to travel is included in the price of foods you buy—and it's been rising.

Of every food dollar spent by consumers for food in 1955, 8 cents went for transportation. They paid less than 6 cents of their food dollar for transportation in 1945.

Watching Calories?

If you are trying to cut down on calories, don't be afraid of the potato. Boiled, baked or pressure-cooked, it need not interfere with weight-reduction. But do be wary of the fats or gravies usually served with it. Cut down on these trimmings, and you will find that you like the potato—for its own flavor—better than ever.

Flowers and Vegetables

The days are cold now, but don't forget spring, warmer days and gardening time is fast approaching. Ask at your home agent's office for a copy of "The Year-Round Home Garden" to help with

your garden planning. Better get a copy of "Control Garden Bugs," too, to be ready to keep insects under control.

As you plan your flower beds, keep in mind the color scheme of your home. Choose flowers that will blend with or accent each room when they're out for arrangements. Remember to use tallest plants in the rear of beds, lower plants to the front.

Spring Weed Control

As 1957 has been designated "Weed Control Year," now is a good time to get your weed control program underway.

Dock and wild onions present an immediate problem. Dock can be controlled with amine 2, 4-D, which will not kill oats or wheat nor hurt dormant pasture sods.

Wild onions can be killed with maleic hydrazide, which kills all growing plants and should only be used on areas where nothing but the wild onions are growing. Where wild onions are growing in winter-grazing crops, you can use amine 2, 4-D to knock the onions down and out of the way of the grazing.

Another weed to look out for now is thistle. Many areas are solid with thistle. Thistles can also be controlled with amine 2, 4-D. May-weeds are other early pasture weeds that can be controlled with amine 2, 4-D.

If you intend to spray bitter weeds, you should get your equipment ready to use in March and early April before cotton comes up. Study the type equipment that fits your needs and use it only for spraying pastures, sorghum and corn. Do not use this same equipment in cotton.

1957 Cotton Insecticides

At the recent Mississippi Insect Control Conference it was announced that thimet, malathion and guthion have been added to the list of recommended insecticides for cotton insect control.

A summary of the insecticides recommended for use in Mississippi this year includes aldrin, BHC, calcium arsenate, dieldrin, endrin, guthion, heptachlor, malathion, methyl parathion and toxaphene all for boll weevil control.

Remember, insecticides, and especially the phosphate insecticides are extremely dangerous. They should be used with extreme caution. All directions for use and cautions should be followed to the letter.

Fertilizer Use

The use of fertilizer has more than doubled in the past 10 to 15 years. There must be a reason for this. Farmers have found it to be profitable. Research and farmer experience have proved that wise investment in fertilizer can be expected to pay high cash returns.

Sixteen plant food elements have been proven essential to crop growth. Most are supplied naturally by the soil. Only a few... those needed in largest amounts—nitrogen, phosphate, potash and calcium are found to be deficient. On some soils, magnesium and sulfur can be added to the deficient list.

Soils testing offers farmers the best method of determining the specific needs of the soil in these deficient elements. If a farmer guesses, he may guess too low and not apply enough, or he may go too high and apply more than the plants can profitably use. In either case he loses.

Success Of Garment Industries In South Is Threatened By Cheaply Manufactured Products Shipped In By The Japanese

An article appearing recently in the Southern Textile News points up to the fact that the garment industries are due to loose a large share of their business if the Japanese are permitted to continue shipping into this country cheaply made textile garments. The article says:

"Since this seems to be the season for agreements with the Japanese, Southern Textile News feels there is an industry closely related to textiles which deserves some consideration. That is the garment industry, the cutting and sewing plants which buy cloth and thread from our mills and manufacture it into end-products ready for department and other store counters.

"It seems to us that any agreement to limit imports of Japanese textile products should also include finished garments. Otherwise, the Japs, faced with the problem of limiting shipments of cloth, would simply keep the goods until they are made into garments and then send them to us in the form of blouses, shirts or dresses.

"In this way they would be hitting us with a double-edged sword, because both garment plants and textile mills would be losing orders to foreign competition. A garment plant that has lost a portion of its market to imports would surely be forced to curtail its purchases of cloth and thread.

"To show the seriousness of the import situation as related to garments, we have only to look at the statistics. In the entire year of 1953, for instance, 9,000 dozen men's and boys' shirts came into our country from Japan. During the 1st, eight months of 1956 some 900,000 dozen men's and boys' shirts, manufactured in Japan, found their way into our domestic markets.

In addition the Japs exported blouses to this country in the following amounts: 1953, 67,548 dozen; 1954, 189,000 dozen; 1955, 3,000,000 dozen, 1956, estimated 3,272,000 dozen.

"In other words, Japanese garments are new coming to us in quantities one hundred times greater than they were just three years ago. This is a volume large enough to seriously threaten the price structure of any market that may be left to our American producers.

"In order to get an idea of what Japanese competition can do to our prices, we have only to look at a few examples. Boys' flannel sport shirts are priced at \$5.50 a dozen and men's shirts of the same type \$8 a dozen. Cheaper grades of dress shirts are \$12 to
