New Surface Water Law Requires Users To File Claim; Needed Information May Be Obtained From County Agent Hamilton And Other Agriculture Workers

The Mississippi Board of Water Commissioners met at State College, Miss., on Tuesday of this week with county agricultural agents to explain procedure for water users to establish water rights under the new water conservation law.

Applications in the series of meetings being held over the state by county agents, soil conservation technicians, farmers' administration supervisors, Cultural Stabilization Conservation personnel and vocational agricultural teachers.

The purpose of the meeting was to inform agricultural leaders on requirements of the new law in order that they may assist present and other users in establishing their surface water rights.

claims in writing in order to determine the availability of surface water for appropriation.

After April 1, 1958, any increased use by legal users or new users of surface water resources must obtain approval from the Board of Water Commissioners.

Applications will be numbered and given priority of filing by the Board in accordance with the date and time of their receipt. If the Board finds the proposed use to be reasonable and beneficial and not in conflict with the public interest, vested rights, or valid prior appropriations, it will approve the application and permit withdrawal of definite quantities of water at definite time and places.

There is no way to avoid conflicts in the use of water from many of the streams, unless the Board can have accurate records of the legal users on every stream. As soon as the county agricultural workers have had an opportunity to become familiar with the law and the procedures, they will be able to assist all persons, who have a right to establish with the Board of Water Commissioners.

Drug Stores To Cooperate In Closing Schedule

The two drug stores in Iuka—Curtis Bros. Walgreen Drugs and Rushing's Rexall Drugs—will begin, on Sunday, Feb. 3, a closing schedule whereby one of the stores will be closed on Sunday and Thursday afternoon while the other one is open, the closing schedule to be alternated weekly.

On Sunday, Feb. 3, Curtis Drugs will be closed while Rushing Drug store will be open. On Thursday afternoon, Feb. 7, and Sunday, Feb. 10, Curtis will be open while Rushing will be closed, and the following Thursday afternoon and Sunday Rushing will be open while Curtis is closed. This closing schedule is to alternate from week to week and will stay in effect indefinitely.

Also, the druggists have agreed to close their stores daily at 6:30 p.m., during the winter months and at 7 p.m. in the summer months, and the store that is to be open on Sunday will be closed from 11 a. m. to 1 p.m. for church services.

Either of the druggists will be subject to call during their time closed. If a customer has a prescription to be refilled at the drug store where he had it filled the first time is closed, then he is asked to call that druggist who will be happy to open up and refill the prescription. Your druggist is subject to call at any time.

The druggists of the town, in organizing this opening and closing schedule, are attempting to maintain adequate service for the area and at the same time give themselves a few hours of recreation each week.

Mississippi Rates Second In Marriage License Issuances

A total of 64,347 marriage licenses were issued in Mississippi last year, 2,076 less than in 1955, records of the Bureau of Vital Statistics in the State Board of Health reveal.

That record continues Mississippi as second in the nation in licenses issued—and first in the number issued to other than residents of the issuing state, an estimated 65 per cent of the total.

Ten border counties which in 1955 issued more than half the total licenses kept that record in 1956. They accounted for 38,528 of the 64,347 issued in the 82 counties.

DeSoto County, on the Tennessee border, continued its lead with 9,238, up 103 over 1955, while Alcorn County held to second place with 7,844, up 791.

Mississippi's marriage laws which require no waiting period or premarital medical examination and which spell out no hard-and-fast rule for determination of ages of the applicants, account for its large number of license issuances.

Tishomingo County dropped in the total number of license issued 1 last year, 298. In 1955 a total of 4,094 were issued and in 1956 only 3,796.

Issuance of Marriage license by surrounding counties, compared with 1955, are as follows: Alcorn, 7,053 in 1955, 7,844 in 1956; Itawamba, 1,269 in 1955, 1,283 in 1956; Prentiss, 462 in 1955, 458 in 1956.

Wholesale Rate Increase Asked By Gas Company

Alabama-Tennessee Natural Gas Co., which supplies the Muscle Shoals area with natural gas, is asking the Federal Power Commission, Washington, D. C., for an increase in wholesale rates of \$184,100 or 7.9 per cent to affect 14 customers in Alabama, Mississippi, and Tennessee.

The increase is being asked, officials of Alabama-Tennessee company explain, solely to offset increased gas rates applied for by Tennessee Gas Transmission company, which supplies Alabama-Tennessee Company all of its natural gas supply.

Officials also explain that Alabama-Tennessee company is asking no increase in return on investment or depreciation and is absorbing increased operating costs, including wage increases.

Mr. Owens, who was prominent in the grocery and farming business in Burnsville for many years, was a member of the Baptist church. He was married to the former Alice Guber in 1902, who died. He was married ten years ago to the former Miss Dolly Marlar, who survives.

Other survivors include, four sons, Robert Owens, Loyal Owens, Hubert Owens and Lilbon Owens, all of Corinth and one daughter, six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

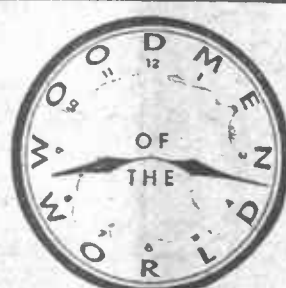

Babson Sees Change For Better Thru Long-Term Outlook For Farmers

Babson Park, Mass., Jan. 31. Recent developments in American agriculture lead me to believe that the longer-term outlook for our farmers is beginning to change for the better.



While I see nothing really dramatic in the shifting picture, I do forecast that the years immediately ahead will be somewhat happier ones for the "folks down on the farm."

Years Of Mounting Surpluses

The farmers', as well as the government's, present agricultural problem stems from years of mounting surpluses, particularly of cotton, wheat, and corn. War emergency measures were adopted by the government to stimulate farm production, and to safeguard farmers from price drops resulting from any excessive output. Finally these measures became such an integral part of the whole economic (and political) system that they were continued during the postwar years. By intensive cultivation, farmers have been producing bumper crops year after year, even on reduced acreage in some instances, with the surplus

being siphoned into government loans.

As of last June 30, Uncle Sam had around \$8,300,000,000 of the taxpayers' money tied up in loans on farm surpluses. Huge quantities of cotton and wheat have been piled up in recent years. Total carryover stocks of the white staple at the beginning of the current crop year last August 1 amounted to a record high of 14,500,000 bales—more than enough to cover a year's domestic consumption and exports at the 1956 rate of disappearance. Most of this mountainous reserve was in government hands. A similar situation prevails in wheat. The carryover last July 1 amounted to around 1,030,000,000 bushels, also mostly government held.

Recent Remedial Measures

The various acreage controls applied to some important crops in recent years have been stymied by sharp increases in per-acre yields. Thus, surpluses have continued to mount. The Soil Bank program, however, which was first applied in a more or less limited way last year, may well prove to be a major means of checking the build-up of farm surpluses in government hands over the next several years. Under this program, the government compensates growers for acreage of basic crops taken out of production. The program

will be in full swing this year and, if a large number of farmers sign up, as I expect, total 1957 planted acreage should be cut sharply.

More immediately effective, at least in the case of cotton, is the government's export assistance program, which permits exporters to buy cotton from the government hoard at cut-rate prices. Foreign buyers are finding these prices attractive. This is evidenced by the fact that U. S. cotton exports thus far this season are well above those of a year earlier, and may amount to between 6,500,000 and 7,000,000 bales for the full season. This would be nearly triple the 2,200,000 bales exported in 1955-1956, and the largest total in any season since 1933. If this prospect should be realized, the cotton carryover next August 1 may be reduced to the tune of some 2,400,000 bales—a major achievement.

Basic Remedies Or Expedients?

Indications are that the government will continue to make every possible effort to reduce its holdings of cotton, corn, and wheat. As to whether this program, along with the Soil Bank, will provide an adequate long-term solution to the farm problem, I do not know. Many farmers, and even some government officials, regard these various programs as only temporary expedients, rather than as basic remedial measures. However, I believe that they are steps in the right direction. We are turning the corner in agricultural surpluses. The government, however, will always be wise to have some supplies in case of war or famine.

The problem, of course, cannot be solved overnight. Years may be required to bring the over-all supply-demand ratio into reasonable balance. The Soil Bank program, which expires in 1959, probably

will need renewal. It may even become a more or less permanent part of the government's farm program, along with some form of federal price support.

New Farm Income Will Increase

U. S. farmers, by and large, are industrious and Godfearing. While they will continue to have their ups and downs, like the rest of us, during the years immediately ahead, they should average out very well. For this year, I forecast another moderate rise in net farm income.

Going Concern

Lesson for February 3, 1957

A "GOING concern" is one that prospers, does business and keeps growing. If the Christian church is not a going concern, maybe the reason is that it is not a going concern. That remark needs explaining; it is not meant as nonsense.

Concern?

The Quakers have a good word:

Concern, which has a deeper meaning than "firm" or business. It means warm, deep, even self-sacrificing interest in some one or some group or cause. Lincoln had a concern for the Union; St. Paul had a concern for Gentiles; mothers have a concern for their children. Now the church, if it is the true Body of Christ, ought to share his concerns. We know what it was that concerned him—people, the "multitudes," the masses as we now speak of them. The church ought to have—and to be—a living concern for all sorts and conditions of men.

A church without the human, humane concern which Jesus had, is not what Christ intended.

Going?

Furthermore, the church, so far as it is Christian, ought to be a going concern, not only a sitting one—not only a praying one either. Plenty of churches are (so to speak) sitting concerns. The preacher preaches about "lost" people but nobody gets out to hunt for them—perhaps the preacher doesn't look very hard himself. The members talk to one another about the dreadful state of the world, but they do nothing about it. Missions? What's that? The fact that their denomination is actually going into the ends of the earth, and begs them for help, does not get through to their minds. (Maybe the preacher's fault again?) They have a concern for the sad state of the world, but it's not a going concern, only a talking concern, a tut-tutting concern,—nothing alive. So the church dwindles and dies, it's not a going concern any longer because it isn't a going concern,—it has no real concern, and it never goes anywhere.

No Mission, No Church

The first Christian church was the twelve apostles. It was a 100% going concern. Jesus did not plan for any of them to remain behind. The directions he gave them are not now followed by any missionary society that has much success; circumstances alter Christian strategy. But all the same, suppose those twelve men had preferred not to go when Jesus sent them? He chose them for two purposes, we read: to be with him and to be sent out. There are always Christians who enjoy worship better than service. Ten people will be out for church, to one who will come out for volunteer service, of any sort. But there came a time when Jesus had to say (in effect) to his closest friends: You have been with me enough. You have heard all you need to learn—for now. Go out now and change people, change the world, in my name! If they had refused, if Jesus could have found no one willing to go, there never would have been a Christian church. And if the church ceases to be missionary today it will become a fossil, a relic, a curiosity, without life or usefulness.

"I Wouldn't Be Here if..."

Not everybody can become a foreign missionary. (Indeed the Twelve were sent out first to a region smaller than Vermont; their home country.) But there are various ways in which the church can go out, and send out. There is a man who has found his life's chief work and interest in developing the moral and spiritual atmosphere of the schools in his state. He said not long ago to a group of religious workers: "I wouldn't be here if my church didn't feed me." What he is doing is outside the church; he works through public agencies of the State. But his inspiration comes from the church. And his church would not have inspired him and "fed" him if it in turn had not been inspired and fed by the Living Bread. Where the church as an organization cannot go, its members, stirred and supported by the Spirit of God, must go, into life everywhere, in the name of Jesus.
