Annual Red Cross Drive To Officially Open March 1; District Chmn. Named

District, regional, and local chairmen and other volunteer Red Cross workers have been busy during the past few weeks holding meetings all over the state for the purpose of organizing workers to help in the forthcoming campaign which officially opens on March 1.

The 1957 goal for Mississippi is \$563,000 with \$2,841.00 being allotted Tishomingo County. Local chapter expenditures last year amounted to \$1,050.00. By far the greater portion, Mr. Edmondson, Tishomingo County Chapter chairman, said, was spent on services to military personnel and their families.

Among the major items of expenditures sponsored by the Red Cross were paying the cost of Communications between Red Cross chapters and domestic military posts and hospitals, providing direct emergency financial assistance to servicemen and dependents.

In the two 1955 flood catastrophes the Red Cross gave emergency aid to 230,285 persons and post-emergency assistance to 25,303 families. Post-emergency aid includes, as required, rebuilding, re-

pairing and refurbishing homes, aid to small business, long-term medical and nursing care, and family maintenance.

One Killed, Three Injured In Saturday Night Auto Wreck

Zane Nunley, 28, was killed instantly Saturday night when the car he was driving rammed the rear end of a pickup truck. Injured were Odell Murphy, 49; his two-year-old grandson, Donnie Murphy; Charlie Tucker of near Burnsville, and his wife, Mrs. Letha Tucker.

The accident occurred between nine-thirty and 10 o'clock one mile north of North Crossroads on Highway 25.

Nunley was driving a 1955 Ford and his passengers were Mr. Murphy and his grandson. Tucker was driving a 1949 Ford pickup in which his wife was a passenger with him. Relatives of Nunley said Mrs. Nunley, being uneasy over her husband's overdue return home, went in search of him with members of the Murphy family. The group arrived at the scene of the accident shortly after it happened.

The Tuckers, it is reported, had attended church and had just left the building which is located on

a hill above the road near where the tragedy occurred.

Donnie Murphy, son of Billy Murphy and his estranged wife, Hilma Enlow Murphy, was taken to Methodist hospital in Memphis with internal injuries. Mr. Murphy and Mrs. Tucker received cuts and bruises, and Mr. Tucker suffered a broken left leg.

Services for Mr. Nunley were held Monday afternoon at two o'clock at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Nunley, Sr. Revs. Garland Knott and Wm. Appleby officiated. Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery.

In addition to his wife, Doris, Mr. Nunley is survived by 5-year-old twin sons, Roger and Rickey; a brother, Richard Nunley, Jr., of Iuka, and three sisters, Mrs. Gerald Vaughn and Mrs. R. K. Thorne both of Iuka, and Mrs. Russell Bonds of Detroit.

The public is invited to visit the Armory on the above named date to inspect the equipment and to obtain any information concerning the local unit which is currently, during the month of February, engaged in a recruiting drive.

Back in colonial days the able-bodied men in a village and surrounding countryside would gather once each year on the village green, armed with their muskets and powder horns. On these occasions, the local militia commander would stand by as his men answered roll call. This was the annual muster.

Times have changed and so have weapons. The musket has long been a collector's item. Wars are fought these days with weapons more deadly than ever imagined. But the principles and ideals for which the colonial militia fought have endured. And, fortunately, so has the determination of this nation to fight for the preservation of those principles—freedom and the dignity of man.

Despite the changes in weapons and the development of massive military forces, the militia concept, which George Washington championed as a means of preserving democracy, also remains. Today, there is just as great a need as ever for a force of citizen soldiers. This militia concept has been preserved by the National Guard, many units of which perpetuate the history and traditions of Revolutionary War units. The National Guard today bears little resemblance to the small militia companies of old. There is today both an Army National Guard and an Air National Guard. Their combined strength being nearly a half million men. On February 22, the National Guard in all of the states will observe annual Muster Day. Guardsmen will assemble at their armories and air bases and do honor to a man who once served as a lieutenant colonel in the Virginia Militia—George Washington.

Early Treatment Brings Control Of Bitterweeds

State College, Miss.—"Bitterweeds in Southern pastures no longer need to be taken for granted," says Vernon Harris, USDA authority on chemical weed control who conducts his research in cooperation with the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station.

Proper Management and the mowing machine have been the weapons used to fight bitterweed in the past. Experiment stations now recommend an amine salt of 2, 4-D to control the weed after it has emerged. This recommendation has proved to be a sound and practical one.

Research workers during the past year have come up with a different slant on the use of herbicides for bitterweed control—pre-emergence control.

Pre-emergence control of bitterweeds in permanent pastures offers good possibilities. The main advantage of pre-emergence application of 2, 4-D is that it can be applied before cotton comes up. The danger of injuring the cotton from using 2, 4-D would thus be minimized.

"No herbicide tested at the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station was superior to 2, 4-D in effectiveness or lack of injury to the forage plants. A pre-emergence application of an amine salt of 2, 4-D at 1 to 2 lb. per acre in late March or early April for bitterweed control would be worthy of trial although more experiments are necessary before a broad recommendation could be made," Mr. Harris said.

A complete report of Mr. Harris' experiment on control of bitterweed is published in the January issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.



How Trees Put The Rain To Work

For the past few weeks Mr. Clovis Crane, our Area Forester, has been one of the busiest men in this part of Mississippi. Mr. Crane and his helpers have worked, from early morning till late at night, at the job of enlarging, improving, and protecting the forests in Tishomingo County.

Planting the right trees, on the right land, at the right time; protecting them from fire, and releasing those that are being shaded so they can grow are a few of the jobs these, efficient, hard-working men are helping Tishomingo county landowners do. It is easy to see how it will pay a landowner to put his steeper slopes in pine trees, because timber and wood-products sell at relatively high prices today. However, it may not be quite so easy to understand other benefits that come to our country from well-managed forests. Some of these other benefits are: 1. Trees protect soil from erosion. 2. Trees protect and encourage the production of more wildlife. 3. Trees serve as wind-breaks, but the benefit of greatest importance is 4. TREES PUT THE RAIN TO WORK. We hear

much talk of water shortage today, springs and streams never known to go dry have dried-up during the past few summers. Some people have dug their wells deeper because they are failing to furnish as much water as they have in the past.

Trees will help put more rain-water in the ground. The insoak of rain is much greater on well-managed forest land than it is on bare or cultivated land having the same slope. This water that soaks into our forest-land becomes ground-water, that makes plants grow, causes streams and springs to keep flowing, and puts water in our wells. Water is needed on farms to produce crops, furnish water for livestock, and to meet the needs of all the people on the farm.

Our forest is the place where most of the rain begins its work. This is where more of it enters the ground and begins its journey back to the sea, but before it gets to the sea it takes time to serve you and me.

The local soil conservation service personnel and the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners appreciate the fine cooperation they have received from the Mississippi Forest service employees in their effort to get more steep slopes into profitable pine forest in Tishomingo county.

\$7,000,000 More Available For 1957 Rehabilitation

According to a breakdown of figures received by Travis McCharen, Director of Vocational Rehabilitation in Mississippi, the national budget includes an increase of about \$7,000,000 that will be made available to all states in 1957 for rehabilitation of the disabled. The total estimated for the entire country is \$43,610,000 for this calendar year.

Mr. McCharen stated that he is awaiting a state-by-state breakdown from the Atlanta regional office to see exactly what amount of federal money will be available to Mississippians on a matching basis. However, based on past years, he feels that at least \$1,750,000 can be gotten for use in our state during the next biennium if we will put up the matching state dollars.

Last year a record 66,273 handicapped persons were rehabilitated in the United States. Of this total only 841 were in Mississippi, because more state dollars were needed to secure matching federal funds.

During 1957 the goal for the number of persons rehabilitated is 76,000. Mississippi's quota is 2,000 to 2,500, but stated McCharen, "We know we cannot hope to put that many handicapped persons back to work, simply because we lack sufficient funds to meet our ever growing need."

"The number of disabled persons is annually increasing, even though medical science is doing

its part to save lives," continued McCharen, "and somehow we must become able to meet the increasing needs of the disabled."

The Mississippi Vocational Rehabilitation Division received an appropriation of \$400,000 for the present biennium instead of the budget request made for \$878,020. If the request had been met, disabled persons in Mississippi now be realizing every dollar that goes to them.

Eastland Fears For Nation If Bridges Continues Influence On Dock Workers

Washington, D. C.—Danger of Harry Bridges extending his influence to dock workers in East and Gulf Coast ports continues to exist to an alarming degree, Senator James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), Chairman of the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, declared today.

"Bridges now has the power, through his International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, to shut down ports at San Francisco and Honolulu at any given moment. If he succeeds in spreading his union to the East, he could paralyze the whole nation," Eastland said.

Eastland made the statement in releasing testimony of two Bridges' East Coast leaders, and three other waterfront figures, all of whom invoked the fifth amendment against self incrimination when asked if they were members of the Communist Party. The testimony is in Part 30 of "Scope of Soviet Activity in the United States," now available for public distribution.

Witnesses heard were Jeff Kibre, Washington representative of ILWU; and Irving Charles Velson, New York representative of ILWU; Abraham Bershad, Charles L. Keith, and Sam Madell, all New York Waterfront figures. There was also testimony from John Lautner, former Communist functionary in New York, and Victor Riesel, newspaper labor columnist.

Riesel told the subcommittee that Bridges does not control ports at New York or New Orleans, but is trying to extend his influence. "He has tried to extend this control and the reason he has failed has been due to the intelligence of the working longshoremen who have many times rejected Communism, who have helped in the boycott of Soviet imports, and who would fight whoever they could against infiltration by pro-Communist forces," Riesel told the subcommittee.

Riesel said it would "be unfortunate if this man were able to extend his influences to the Port of New York," because it "feeds our entire arc of bases from Thule up near the Arctic Circle all the way down to our Hydrogen base being built in Spain, to North Africa." Riesel's testimony was described as "unfounded allegations" by Jeff Kibre, most articulate of the ILWU witnesses.

John Lautner said that before he left the Communist Party in 1950, he helped draw up a detailed

survey of transportation in the New York area, and that information was passed on to higher leaders.

He said the survey not only included the waterfront, but all other forms of transportation.

Robert Morris, Chief Counsel for the Subcommittee, pointed out during the hearing that Lautner's testimony shows that Communists have "intimate details" on transportation in the United States, which presumably was transferred to the Soviet Union.

The published testimony is a preliminary to the later hearings held in Honolulu, which will be printed soon.

Stennis Urges Forest Loans

"The small forests could and should provide a very substantial part of the raw material needed for our growing forest industries," U. S. Senator John Stennis said in support of his bill which provides more adequate forest loans to small timber growers. He pointed out that small holdings of less than 500 acres comprise more than 61% of our total forest lands in private ownership. This land is owned by farmers, housewives, and professional and retired persons, and much of it can be greatly improved by reforestation.

"The major problem confronting these small landowners is that forest improvements are long-range investments and in many cases these owners do not have and cannot obtain money needed to finance timber stand improvements," Senator Stennis pointed out. "Too frequently the small forest landowner has to sell his timber while still immature and of small value. Too often his trees are clear-cut to obtain maximum immediate cash in order to pay medical, educational, and other pressing family bills."

Our Mississippi Senator said that his bill authorizes loans to forest owners of not more than 500 acres to be used for purchasing, planting, improving, and protection of their forest land. Loans carrying a three per cent interest rate would be made in amounts up to 80% of the fair market value of the property and could be repaid over a period of 5 to 50 years. The bill also reduces the borrower's obligation up to 50% of the loan in the event of partial or total destruction of the timber by a cause

beyond the control of the borrower.

"Enactment of such a loan program for our small forest landowners would go a long way toward enabling them to continue to hold their land, and would permit them to lease their timber land to wood-producing industries on a long-term basis. In my opinion this would be a significant contribution to the development of our nation's forests and would provide increased yields and income for our small landowners," the Senator concluded.

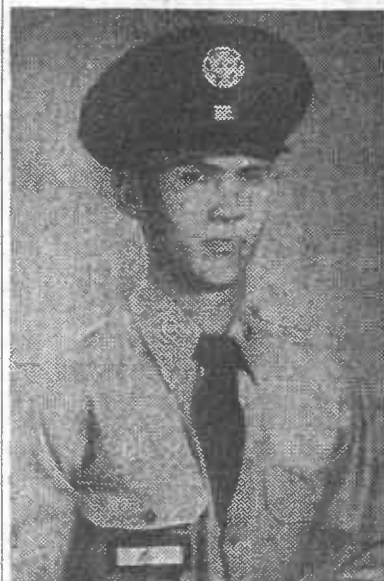

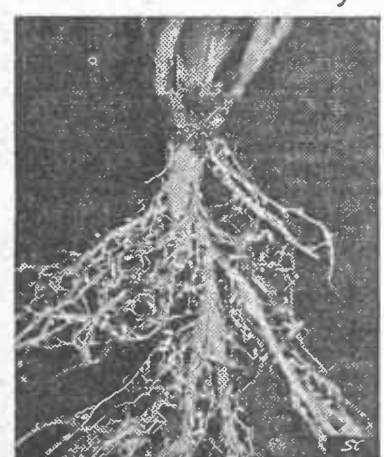

While at Lackland the new enlistee completes the transition from civilian to airman through a program which includes processing, aptitude testing, physical conditioning, survival and weapons training, and varied classroom studies ranging from citizenship to military customs and courtesies.

Like the USAF Officer Candidate and Pre-Flight schools, also located at Lackland, basic military training prepares graduates for specialized training and on-the-job assignment.

Insurance Stocks Discussed by Columnist

By Roger W. Babson
Babson Park, Mass., Feb. 21. I have recently been quoted as follows: "I believe if Jesus were here today, instead of being a carpenter, he would be an insurance agent." My explanation of this is that I believe the insurance business is a clear illustration of applied Christianity. If someone's home burns, the company does not usually use its capital to pay the unfortunate person. The insurance is paid from premiums contributed by the rest of us whose houses have not burned. If one of us dies and the wife receives insurance for \$20,000, the rest of us, through our premiums, pay the wife these much-needed funds. Let me now give you some ideas as to my thoughts on insurance in general.

Different Kinds Of Insurance
The simplest insurance is life insurance. On these life company stocks I was very bullish a few

years ago when they were cheap; but since then they have increased threefold in price and, hence, are not so attractive. The health, accident, and automobile company stocks have never appealed to me; but some are OK. The surety and bonding companies I know nothing about. The fire insurance companies I have studied for years and have invested considerable money therein.

Many Disagree With Me
The investment trusts have been doing considerable selling of insurance stocks, especially those of the fire insurance companies. They feel that the present "agency system" is becoming obsolete. There may be radical changes in the selling organizations of the fire insurance stock companies; but their executives do not now admit it.

Many investors also fear the mutual stock fire companies use a mutual system for premiums. They offer to save the buyer of insurance a good part of the commission now going to the agent. My own feeling is there will always be a field for both classes,

each one keeping the other on its toes.

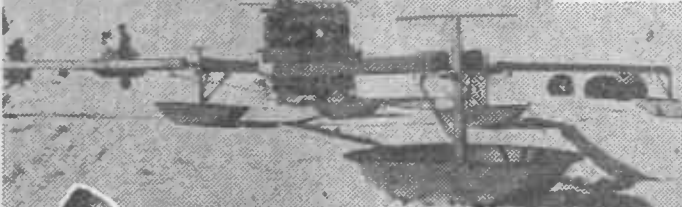
Diversification And Management
The sensible investor will classify fire insurance companies with the best investment trusts. By buying such fire insurance stocks an investor gets the advantage of the dividends and coupons paid on the securities held by the insurance business. This gives investors diversification of securities plus a cut in the fire insurance business. Can any mutual investment trust match this combination?

In addition to diversification, investors in fire insurance stock have the advantage of excellent management. Fire insurance companies employ experts for the selection of their securities, which are also most carefully watched by an investment committee. The record of the investment holdings of these companies is very commendable.

The Premium Cycle
Over a period of years the income from fire insurance stocks has been excellent. There are cases, such as that of the Home Insurance Company, where this record extends over one hundred years. There is, however, a cycle in the industry which I should mention.

stantly at work installing fire alarms, sprinkler systems, and other means of fire protection. Legislatures are constantly passing laws forcing fireproof construction. Dangerous slums which are breeders of fires are being constantly torn down. All of this works to the advantage of the insurance companies, their policyholders, and their stockholders. Just now the industry is in a period of heavy losses and most fire insurance stocks can be bought for much less than their book value. Hence, this seems to be the right time to buy good fire insurance stocks.

4,500 Licenses Suspended Or Revoked In 1956

Motorists indicating a disrespect for Mississippi traffic laws are feeling the pinch of the State Highway Patrol's driver control program more and more.

Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough states that approximately 4,500 driver's licenses were suspended or revoked during 1956 by the Patrol's Driver License Division. This was possible, he explained, because more and more municipalities are reporting traffic convictions to the Department of Public Safety.

Section 8281 of the Mississippi Code of 1942 as amended requires: "Every magistrate or judge—and every clerk of a court of record—supply the Department with an abstract of the court record within 10 days after conviction

of a traffic law violator. When these are supplied, the public safety department can then deal with so-called "problem drivers" who indicate a disregard for the safety of other persons on the highways.

In October of '56, Commissioner Scarbrough issued an appeal to state municipalities to cooperate more fully in the program. Since that time, the number of abstracts forwarded to the Department has increased sharply.

Under paragraph four, subsection A of Section 8107 of 1956, the Commissioner of Public Safety is authorized to suspend a person's driver's license if he or she "has been convicted with such frequency of serious offenses against traffic regulations governing the movement of vehicles as to indicate a disrespect for traffic laws and a disregard for the safety of other persons on the highway."

The habitual traffic law violator and the accident-prone driver find themselves in hot water as a result of this provision.

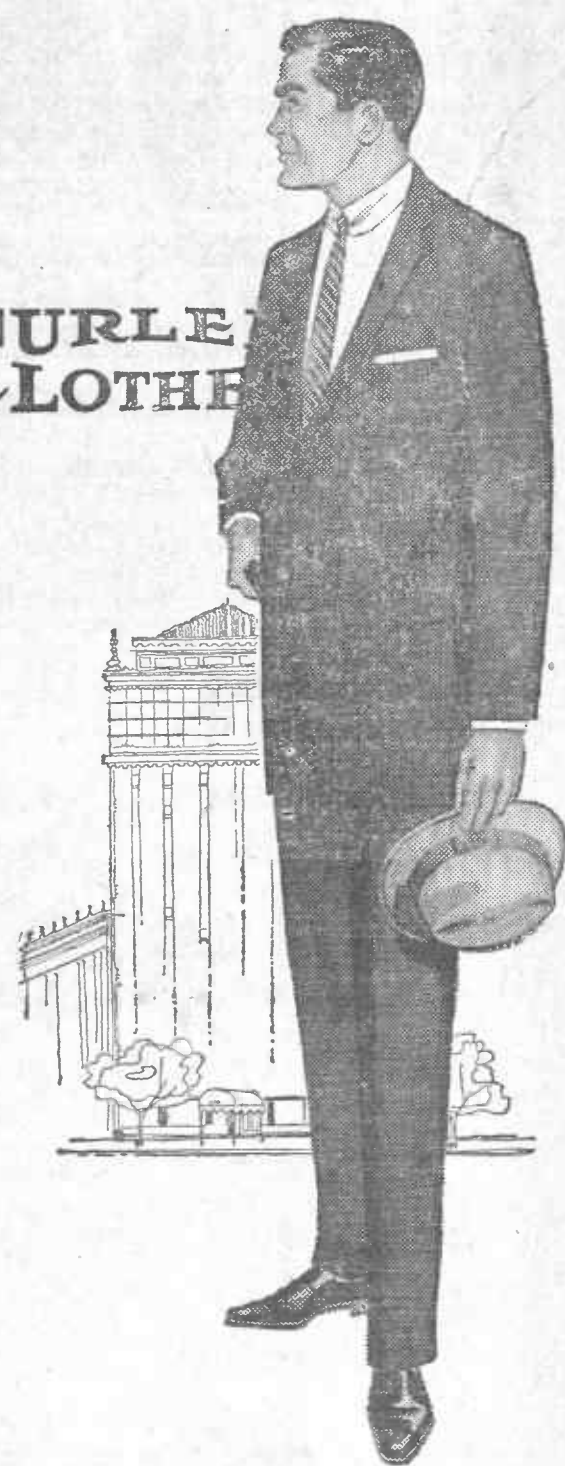

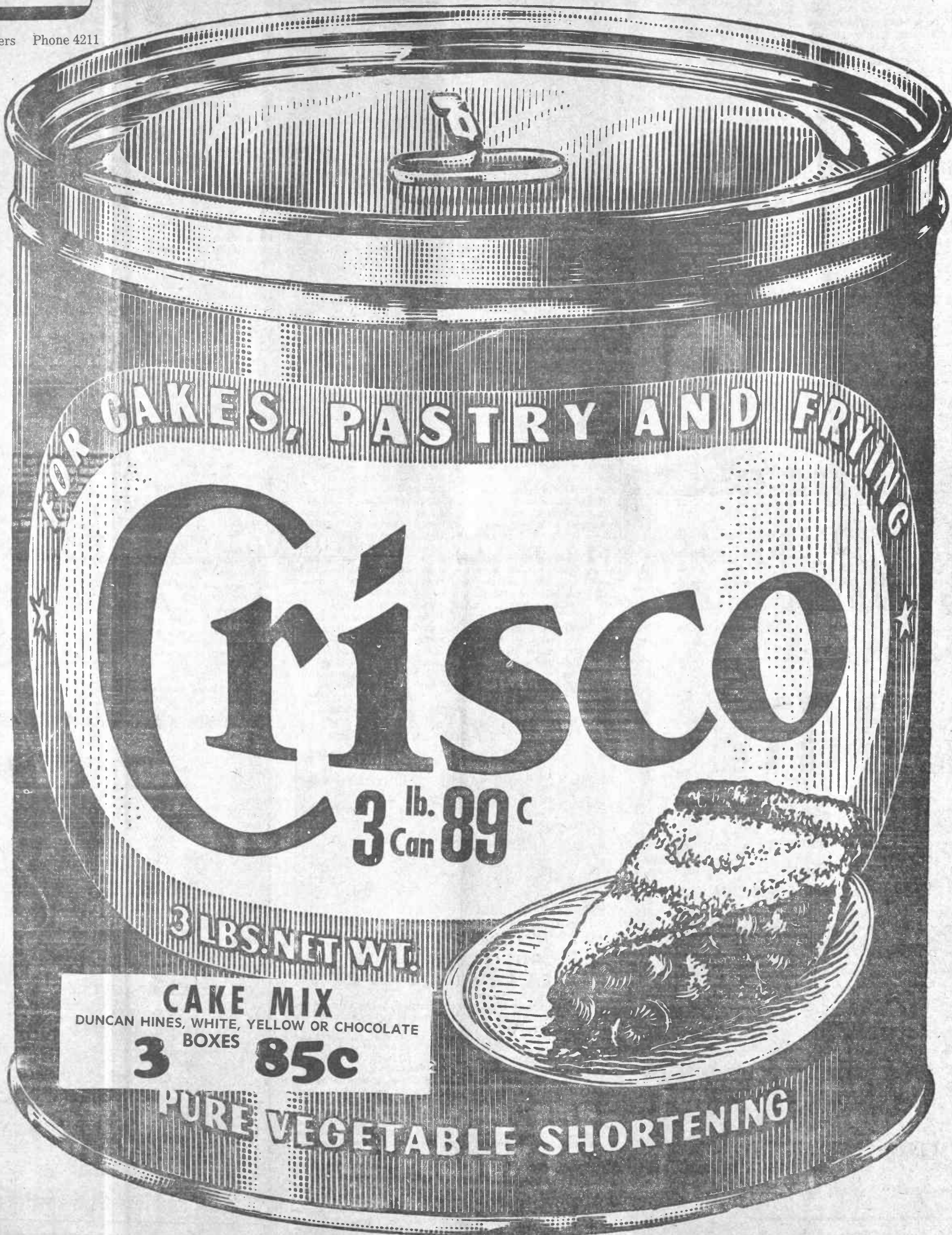

Next time you buy meat, beef,
veal, calf, lamb or mutton, look for
two kinds of stamps on it.

The long purple ribbonlike stamp
with the grade name enclosed in a
shield, as U.S.D.A. Good, indicates
the quality. The round stamp that
says "U.S. Insp'd and P'S'D" is the
symbol of Federal meat inspection
and indicates that the meat was
Federally inspected and passed as
wholesome food.

Look for both, but do not con-
fuse the stamps.

A U.S.D.A. booklet on U.S. Grades
of Beef is available for the asking
at your home demonstration
agent's office. It will give you more
facts on meat selection and use.
Ask for leaflet No. 310.

On The Grain

Good fit and hang in clothes
depend on grain perfection. "Grain
perfection" is keeping the length-
wise and the cross wise grain of
the fabric in balanced (at right
angles) at all times. Every step
in making a garment—preparing
the fabric, cutting, stitching and
pressing—has this important ob-
ject in view at all times.

The threads from which fabric
is made form what is called the
"grain" in woven fabric. No matter
what the weave or texture appears
to be, the threads always cross
each other at right angles.

The lengthwise threads (warp)
are parallel with the selvage. This
the lengthwise grain or "straight
of goods." The crosswise thread
(weft, woof, filling) running from
selvage to selvage, is known as the
crosswise grain.

When you use a pattern, you
will note a marking "straight of
goods." This mark must be placed
on a thread parallel with the sel-
vage (the lengthwise grain).

Draperies "Change" Window Size

You can often make a problem
window fit in with your decora-
tion scheme by using a curtain
style that makes it seem wider,
narrower, shorter or longer.

To make small windows look
larger, hang side draperies on the
wall so they just cover the frame.

If your windows are wider than
you want them, hang the draperies
to the inside so they cover the
frame and part of the pane.

The longer the curtains, the
longer the window seems. Straight-
line draperies that hang to the
floor make a window appear to
have greater length. Adding a val-
ance or cornice board that just
hides the window frame at the top,
covering part of the wall above
the window, will give greatest
height.

To make a long window look
shorter, use short draperies or tie-
back curtains. Curved lines of the
tie-back curtains detract from the
height of the opening.

Kitchen Hints

Common table salt added to the
water container section of a double
boiler will increase the tempera-
ture of the boiling water and so
lessen the time necessary to cook
the food in the inner container.

If a recipe calls for sour milk
and only sweet milk is available,
add two tablespoons of vinegar
to one cup of sweet milk. Let stand
a few minutes. Sour milk will re-
sult.

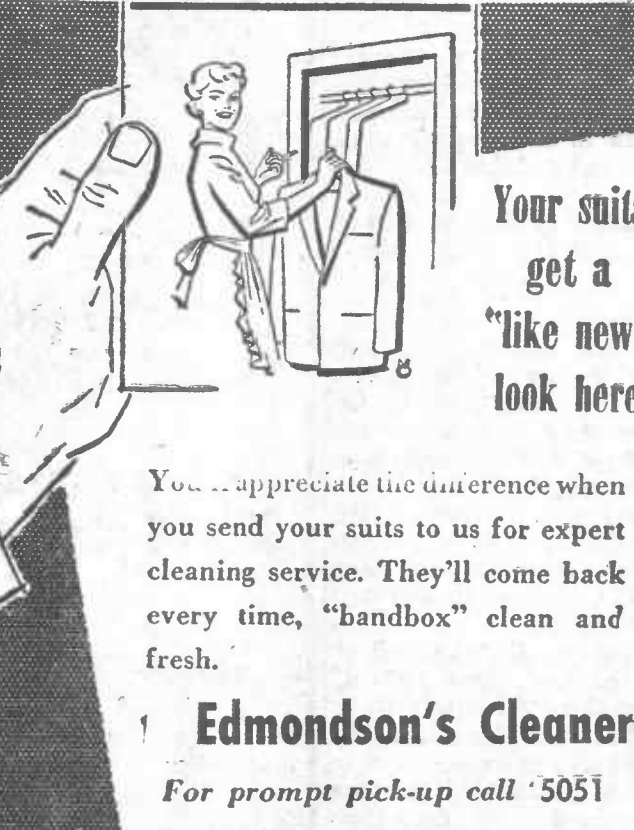

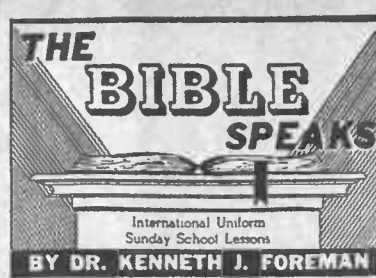

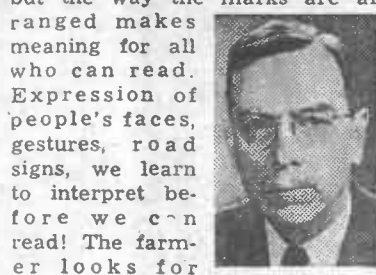

Reading Signs

Lesson for February 24, 1957

ALL human beings, civilized or
not, are used to reading
signs. Indeed all human commu-
nication and life goes by sign-
language. Words, printed or spoken,
are signs. No word on a page
looks like the thing it represents.
It is no more than a set of marks,
but the way the marks are ar-
ranged makes meaning for all
who can read.

Expression of people's faces,
gestures, road signs, we learn
to interpret before we can
read! The farmer looks for
weather signs, the fisherman and the hunter have
their own signs to look for. There
are few people so stupid that they
see only what they see.

When Jesus was teaching and
healing in Galilee, he was doing
so without any official authoriza-
tion from what we would call the
church. And yet he claimed to
speak and work with the authori-
ty of God. The church officials
did not take this easily. They kept
pestering him: "Show us a Sign!"
they said. How do we know you
are right? How do we know what
you say is from God? To this day
there are people who are not sat-
isfied with what God has shown
us. They want to know: How do
we know the Bible is true? How
do we know Jesus was the Son
of God? If the preacher would
let himself be bitten by rattle-
snakes, without getting hurt; if
the stars arranged themselves in
the sky so as to spell a personal

The goodness and the grace that
we see in the lives of men and
women speak of the creative
Goodness that made such per-
sons. Furthermore, God is at
work every day, transforming
lives. The great miracle is not
turning stones into bread but
sinners into saints. The great mir-
acle is men and women who live
above the rules and standard of
ordinary mankind, men and wom-
en who already in this noisy
world have found the melodies
of heaven. When you read in the
Bible, especially in Jesus' teach-
ing, an invitation and challenge
to high, pure, brave living, and
you think, "This is asking too
much, this is beyond human na-
ture," remember there are people
who actually do live "beyond hu-
man nature" as you say, because
they have been touched by the
Divine. Such men and women
are the living signs of God.
