Crusade

CANAL DESCRIBED AS A NECESSITY BY
GOV. COLEMAN AT TUPELO MEETING

"The Tombigbee-Tennessee River Canal has changed from something to be desired to an absolute necessity in our changing economy," Gov. J. P. Coleman declared at a meeting held Tuesday night in Tupelo.

Tuesday night's meeting was the third recent important meeting of the Tombigbee Authority that was created by the last session of the Mississippi Legislature.

Governor Coleman, principal speaker for the event, said "A giant revolution is now in process. It is not a violent one but nevertheless a very important one in that our economy is changing from agricultural to industrial. And it is a known fact," the governor continued "That heavy industry will not locate with out immediate access to a useable waterway. It's fairly simple to get light industry but to acquire heavy industry we must see that navigable waterways are made accessible."

The governor endorsed the project 100 percent and said that he was highly in favor of a compact between Mississippi and Alabama to construct the canal. According to the Governor, such a compact is legal under the federal constitution.

"But," Mr. Coleman said, "This project has its enemies. The Jackson dailies are already knocking it; saying that it'll cost too much money way off up there in North-

east Mississippi. And the folks on the Gulf coast are against it, too. It is an easy matter for some folks to point out why it can't be done. However, Tennessee has endorsed the project and Alabama is very anxious that it be constructed. We're for developing all of Mississippi and by constructing the Tombigbee Canal our inland waterways system will be on two sides of our state and they, tying in with the Gulf at two different places, will give us a much greater advantage in acquiring the heavy industry that our state so badly needs in its changing economy.

"The people of the state will have to forget their sectional and regional differences and work together or fall together."

"Governor Folsom of Alabama has said that he will present the compact proposition to his legislature that convenes in May. And next January, when the Mississippi legislature meets again, I will personally push for its ratification. I will cooperate to the nth degree in pushing this project forward. Of course, it is going to be a long drawn out process and it probably won't be built during this administration, but we are going to do everything in our power to get it on its way. This thing has already gained nationwide publicity therefore is of nationwide consequence."

MY FAVORITE PRAYER

Oh heavenly Father we thank you for the blessings that You have bestowed upon us. Help to make us worthy and deserving of the good things of life You have granted upon us in such abundance. Let us know our duties and help to discharge our responsibilities in a manner which will make us worthy of citizenship in this great nation.

CONGRATULATIONS, INDIANA!

The fundamental American principles of states' rights and individual freedom have been perhaps more traditional of, and most consistently upheld by, the states of the South. But the State of Indiana has demonstrated several times in recent years that it also is devoted to these principles, so much so that the Southern states could very well say, "Welcome, Indiana!"

Now Indiana has emphatically demonstrated again adherence to these principles—and at a point where it counts most heavily. The Indiana legislature has passed the "right to work" law, and the Governor has said he will not veto it—that this is the responsibility of the legislature, as representing the will of the people. He is to be commended for his integrity and political courage in making this decision.

The Governor's stand, of course, is not popular with the labor bosses of the Indiana State Federation of Labor. After the legislature had acted, they quickly organized a mass march upon the State Capitol, where they attempted to break down the door of the Governor's office, demanding his veto of the bill, and then threatened to go to the Governor's mansion when they found out he had left his office.

It is to be believed the labor bosses will find out very quickly that such action on the part of the unions is no more popular with the people of Indiana than was the action of the Governor with the labor bosses. If any group in America cannot win its case with reason and logic, there is certainly no place in our philosophy of doing things to attempt to gain our ends by force.

The main fact in connection with the "right to work" principle that the labor bosses seem never to have learned, or if they have learned it they have ignored it, is that they do not have right and logic on their side. This can also be said of a great many politicians in this country, who have let political ambition outweigh statesmanship and the threat of organized minorities outweigh the rights of all the people.

All the "right to work" law means is recognition of the right of a worker to join a union if he so desires but at the same time recognition of his right not to be forced to join a union against his will. All the storming and shouting of labor leaders will never obviate the clear abrogation of individual freedom when these rights are denied.

The closed shop, which forces a man to join a union before he can get a job and make a living for himself and his family, is outlawed by the Taft-Hartley Act, the labor law of the land. Unfortunately, however, this Act permits the union shop, which forces a man to join a union within a certain period of time after he gets a job in order to be able to hold that job. It is very clear to the American people in general, and even to many union members themselves, that this permits a union to go through the back door and get something it is not allowed to go through the front door and get. It is equally clear to both union and non-union workers that compulsory unionism gives labor bosses complete dictatorial power over their lives and fortunes—for which there is no room in a free nation.

To the people of those states who staunchly adhere to the fundamental American principles of individual freedom, this means that the only recourse they have to avoid the strangulation of this freedom is for their states to pass "right to work" laws banning compulsory unionism in any of its forms. In other words, if the federal government will not protect the rights of the individual, then the state governments must do so.

This law is not in effect in all the states of the South with the exception of Louisiana—which has switched back and forth once or twice and will probably switch again—and in several Western states—17 states in all, Indiana will make it 18.

It is to be believed that as the people generally, including the rank and file of the union members, realize more and more that compulsory unionism in any form is a denial of individual rights inherent in our form of government, we shall see more states pass "right to work" laws. We can, in fact, hope—and work—for amendment of the National Labor Law to this effect.

Careful Shopping, Discount Houses and "Loss Leaders" Discussed

I have already given hints as to buying real estate. That is: (1) Determine in which direction your city is growing best, and with the best houses,—East, West, North, or South. (2) Then drive out the main road in that direction. Buy when you come to the first good land offered by the acre, —not by the foot.

Discount Houses & "Loss Leaders"
I forecast that Discount Houses will constantly become a greater factor in merchandising. They have lower overhead than the big department stores and are worthy of the attention of every sharp shopper. Like all else in this world, they have their advantages and disadvantages. They can usually give you lower prices on all articles. On good furniture, textiles, and other merchandise which does not need mechanical servicing I recommend that they be patronized. I, however, cannot now recommend them for electric appliances, such as stoves, television sets, and perhaps washing machines, which need servicing.

Sales of "loss leaders" should be carefully watched. These have an economic use in merchandising in order to get customers into a store. A merchant can well afford to advertise and sell one article below cost, to get you into the store in the hope that you will also buy something else upon which he will make a good profit. A couple shopping with patience who will study the advertisements can (during the year) secure most of their goods from these "loss leaders" for one half their regular retail prices.

Watch For Anniversary Sales
But here is perhaps my best tip: —when one of your reliable stores has an Anniversary Sale, make a note of it in your diary. If you don't need to buy anything at that time, write down when it will come next year. (It must always come the same week each year.) Every month some store is having an anniversary sale. Careful shoppers fill all their needs at these sales. Instead of forming the habit of trading at only their favorite store, they shop around at these different stores awaiting their Anniversary Sales.

There also are "White Sales."

(4) Freedom from strikes when the workers themselves are opposed to laying down their tools.

We hope that never again will American workers be required to duplicate their performance in World War II and in the Korean fiasco, but let's surround them with every protection against tyranny, just in case.

Give American workers the four freedoms as outlined above and we can face the future with confidence. Withhold those freedoms and we place in jeopardy every one of the freedoms now enjoyed by this nation as a whole.

when you can buy cheaply all needed linen, etc. There also are "Fur Sales" when you can get bargains. Most of these occur in the summer; but I am told that the real bargains come at the very end of the winter. There are special sales where manufacturers are overstocked or are about to change styles or models. Watch for them. Watch your newspaper advertisements for real opportunities.

Auction Sales
Auctions have existed for the past 3,000 years. They regularly took place in the great public market places at Athens, Rome, and Venice. Many jewelry stores hold daily auctions in most large cities today. Of course, all stock exchanges work on the auction system.

Until recently, however, I have hesitated to recommend that my readers buy at store auctions.

Certain cities, however, are now holding mammoth and reliable auctions publicized by television. That is, if you cannot be at the auction personally, you can watch it on television. Then, wherever you are, you have the privilege for one week of buying a duplicate of any article sold at the auction at the same price at which it was shown and sold at the auction. One of the most famous of these auctions is operated three times daily, except Sundays, Clearwater, Florida, under the name of "Howard the Trader." While good stores have but few regular customers, this auction will have from 5,000 to 10,000 people daily. It is amazing. Either these auctions can revolutionize retailing, or else they will flop. Only the future can tell. I now don't even guess.

Finally, I recommend to every housewife either the Consumer Reports from Mt. Vernon, New York, or the Consumers' Research Bulletin of Washington, New Jersey (non-profit monthlies). They make impartial reports as to the comparative quality of all nationally advertised products.

We Vanishing Americans

This brief editorial is addressed to the dwindling number of us who are not yet on the Federal, State or municipal payrolls. For the past several years, each passing day has found us fewer in number; fewer of us to carry on our backs an ever-increasing retinue of tax-eaters.

The Indian who so often has been referred to as the "Vanishing American" is about to lose claim to that title. You and I, who are still not on the public payroll, are on the verge of taking over full title. The late, beloved Will Rogers, described himself as a descendant of the first real Americans, pointing out that his ancestors met the Mayflower when it landed at Plymouth Rock with its boat load of Pilgrims. No one can deny the Indian's claim to having been the first to settle on these shores, but a growing army of government payrollers is divesting him of his "Vanishing American" appellation.

As governments have taken over more and more functions that constitutionally belong to private initiative and enterprise, it

has required more and more government employees to manage them. This has been accompanied by costly overlapping.

The Hoover Commission, after careful study, many months ago handed down definite recommendations as to how we can at least get partial relief from this unbearable situation. If you haven't already written your Congressman and your two U. S. Senators to bestir themselves toward legislating these recommendations into action, do so now before we "Vanishing Americans" become totally extinct.

1/2 cup beef gravy noodles
Pan fry the onions and celery in butter until transparent. Add beef and soy sauce. Stir and heat 2 minutes. Add peas and carrots, salt and gravy. Simmer 5 minutes. Serve hot with noodles. Yield: 2 to 3 servings for each.

Pork Chops and Rice

Dredge 6 1-inch-thick pork chops in 1/4 cup flour. Melt 2 tables-

poons shortening in large skillet. Brown chops on both sides.

Combine 3/4 cup uncooked rice, 3 cups tomato juice, 3 tablespoons chopped onion 1-1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Pour over chops.

Cover and simmer until rice is tender, about 60 minutes.

Mexican Scramble

1 cup chopped onion
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
3/4 teaspoon salt

dash pepper
3 beaten eggs
1 cup chopped green pepper
1 cup canned solid-pack tomatoes

1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/4 pound American process cheese, diced
4 slices buttered toast

Cook onion and green pepper in butter until tender but not brown. Add tomatoes & simmer 5 minutes. Add seasonings and cheese; stir to melt cheese. Stir small amount of hot mixture into eggs; return

to hot mixture. Cook (like scrambled eggs), stirring frequently in buttered toast. Makes 4 servings.

County Agent news

Pasture Pointers

All clover and legume pastures
 that have as much as four inches
 of growth should have livestock
 turned in for grazing. This is es-
 pecially true of crimson, wetch
 and white clovers get way ahead
 of the livestock.

You can control overgrazing of
 the clovers by moving stock from
 one pasture to another.

Winter peas interplanted in Ber-
 muda should be grazed heavily dur-
 ing March to keep them from sm-
 othering out the grass. All spring
 grazing areas should be kept grazed
 down. If animals begin to "spot"
 graze, run the clipper over the
 area so that the stock will graze
 more evenly.

If you want a grain crop from
 small grains, the stock should be
 removed now, and the cereal re-nit-
 rated. A good application rate for
 the nitrogen is 100 pounds of Am-
 monium Nitrate per acre.

If you have oats and vetch and
 plan to cut a hay crop from it, you
 can graze the area until late March.
 If you want extra hay production
 and extra good grazing from such
 areas, plan to top dress them with
 nitrogen.

Don't forget about bitterweed
 control. You can use amine 2,4-D
 this month and in April before
 cotton planting time. Tests show
 that you get good control with
 early spraying as no bitterweeds
 will come up in the sprayed area
 during the summer.

Control of these weeds is mighty
 important as some of the top sum-
 mer grazing crops—Dallis, Berm-
 uda and lespedeza do not seem to
 grow in bitterweed areas. After
 the bitterweeds are controlled, the
 grazing crops grow well.

Keep hogs out of your perman-
 ent areas. They do a lot of damage
 by rooting. Maybe sometimes you
 get too busy doing your spring
 plowing to pay much attention to
 the rooting hogs. If you don't keep
 out now, this summer when mowing
 or clipping time comes, you may
 be sorry.

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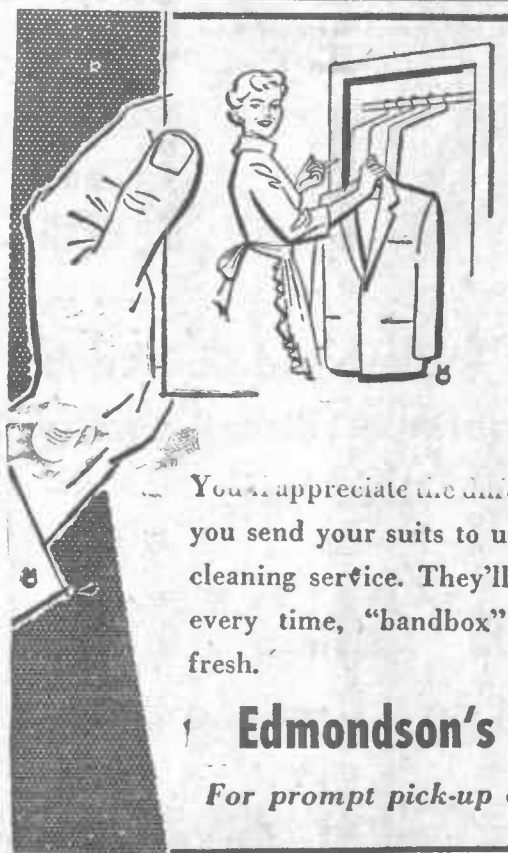

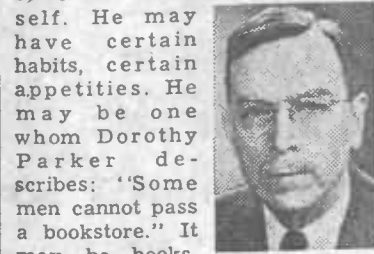
Background Scripture: Matthew 21:12-22:46

Highest Command

Lesson for March 17, 1957

WE ALL live by authority of some kind. When some one says, "Do this!" we do it—willingly or unwillingly, but we do it if we can. If a man says, "I wear no man's collar, I do as I please, I am my own authority," a close observer can often perceive that the man is fooling himself. He may have certain habits, certain appetites. He may be one whom Dorothy Parker describes: "Some men cannot pass a bookstore." It may be books, or liquor, or fishing tackle, or women—something says with compelling voice to this boastful man, "Come!" and he loses no time coming. Sometimes the man who brags most of his own freedom is the man who is the most willing slave.

Consider some of the many bosses of the human race. One authority whose voice is loud in the land is the "Voice of the People." Some politicians live by it. A politician will split the welkin telling the world what a low-grade rat his opponent is; but then the opponent beats him in the primary, and the politician sings another tune. "The people have spoken," he says; and turns around to support the very man who (he had just been saying) was hardly fit to be dog-catcher. Others again regard the law as the highest command. In their eyes, law can turn right into wrong or wrong into right. But the law is a human thing; any good lawyer will admit that there is a gap between what the law commands or permits, and what is morally right. Law tries to catch up with morals; it never creates right or wrong.

Who Is in Charge Here?

Others again find their highest authority in money. Some will admit it, some will not. But whenever you find a person making all his decisions in the light of the one question: What will make the most money? Or, What will cost the least? then you know that for that person the last word is with the cash account. One form of this authority is Business. If it's good for Business it's good for the country. In the name of this authority many practices are advocated which are definitely not good for the people who make up the country. For many other persons, the highest command is the voice of the one who is most loved. In times gone by, it might be the King's Favorite. In our more democratic era, individual citizens may take their wife's or husband's word as the last word. Or—to take one more type, for a vast number of persons the highest authority is their Church. Some people even think the church cannot make a mistake!

Jesus, Lord of All

For the Christian, however, his highest command is that of Jesus Christ. The vows taken when a person is confirmed, or joins the church, profess, sometimes in these very words, "I take Jesus Christ for my Lord and Savior." "For my Lord . . ." If the word means what it was intended to mean, it means that above all other authorities is His. All these other commands have their places; but his is supreme. In a great corporation there are many persons with authority; but only one President. No decision at lower levels is valid if it conflicts with a policy the President has laid down. So there are situations where the money question is decisive. There are other situations in which a political party's decision, slate or platform may be decisive for the party worker, — and so on. But if decisions on these lower levels come into conflict with what we may call the policy of Jesus, then those lower decisions must give way. In Jesus' lifetime He challenged every authority that confronted him. He was responsive to authority within proper bounds (as when He paid taxes or when placed on oath in a trial) but even over the church, even over the inspired Law, He claimed first right. The sensible Christian does not claim for Jesus what he did not claim for himself. He did not set up to be an authority on forms of government, financial affairs or farming. But He did lay down certain great principles founded in the will and nature of the heavenly Father.

North-east Miss. Will Receive Pine Seedlings From Bowaters Nursery

A site for a pine tree nursery growing seedlings to be planted in northeast Mississippi and north Alabama, has been acquired by the Bowaters Southern Paper Corporation of Calhoun, Tenn.

The announcement was made today by Paul Weekley, district foreman for the Hiwassee Land Company, Hiwassee is the woods division of Bowaters and a district of is located in Iuka.

Mr. Weekley said the nursery, located in East Tennessee, will have a capacity for growing 20 million seedlings annually. It is located on Rose Island in the Little Tennessee River. Sixty acres of the tract will be devoted to growing tree seedlings and another 40 acres will be used for producing seed from superior trees.

"This is considered an important step toward insuring an adequate pulpwood supply for the future," Mr. Weekley announced. "Although a small area will be seeded this spring, it will be several years before the nursery is fully developed."

Mr. Weekley explained seedlings had been purchased from state nurseries in the past, but unprecedented reforestation activities by farmers and other landowners are creating a demand in excess of supply.

"Production in state nurseries has been doubled and redoubled," Mr. Weekley said, "and we have made seed available and cooperated in other ways to help these nurseries enlarge their production. The increasing interest in tree planting is indeed encouraging and we are confident farmers and other landowners will take advantage of the additional trees to be available in the future from the state nurseries."

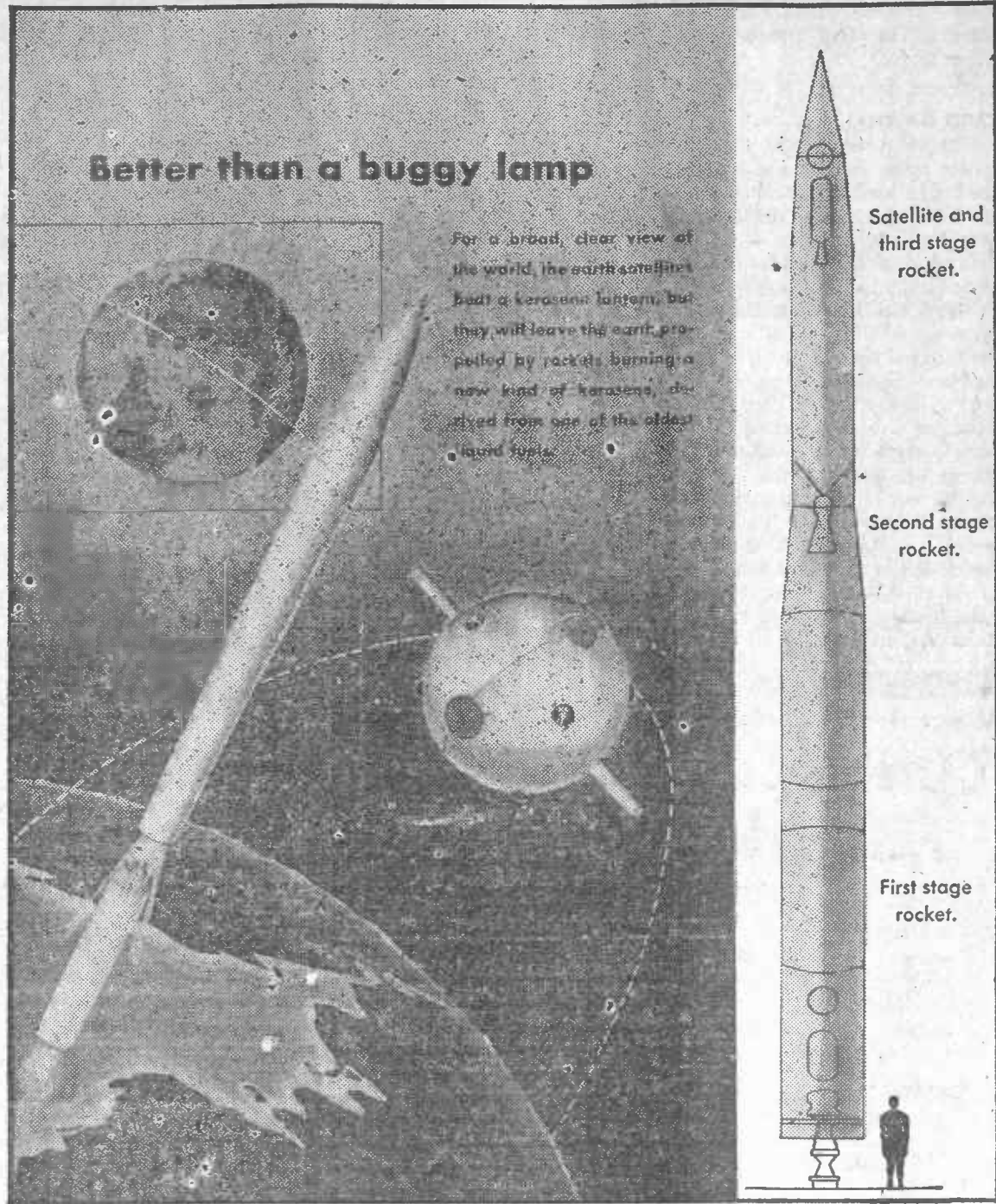
Mr. Weekley explained Bowaters purchased most of its pulpwood from farmers and other landowners. He said the company is interested in growing only enough wood to insure adequate supplies.

Hiwassee Land Company, which grows and produces pulpwood for Bowater, has planted 40 million trees to date.

The forest tree seedling at the new nursery will be grown at the rate of one million per acre. Approximately 150 pounds of loblolly pine seed are planted on each acre in nurseries. The soil is carefully prepared in advance of the seeding in the spring and the beds are mulched to retain moisture in the soil. Intensive irrigation is required, plus weeding and spraying for insect and disease control.

Trees are removed from the nursery beds in early winter when about eight to ten inches high. Bowaters foresters have developed refrigerated trailer trucks for moving the seedlings to planting sites in order to increase the survival rate.

Loblolly pine seedlings already

have been planted in the seed orchard at the nursery site. Tips of branches from superior trees will be grafted to the young pines next winter. Seed for producing superior trees are expected to be available in about five years.

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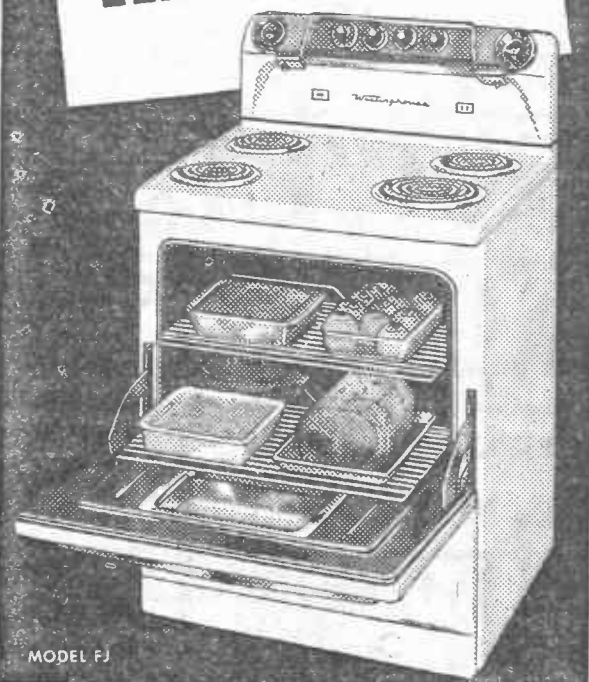

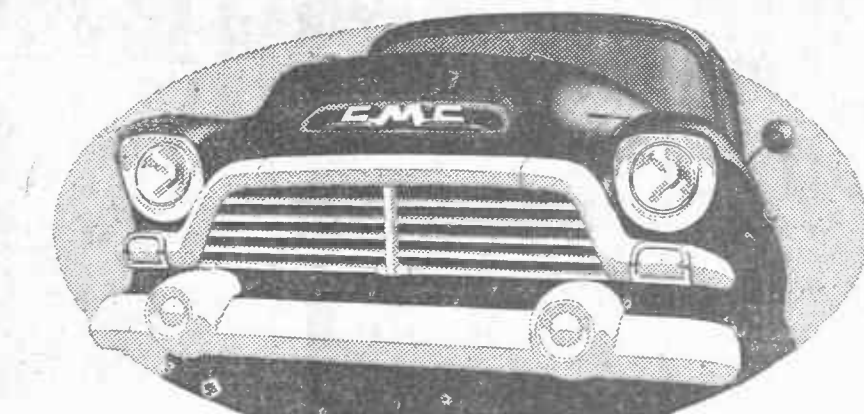
