MY FAVORITE PRAYER

THE FOOLISHNESS OF FOREIGN AID

It probably constitutes a certain amount of brashness to deny that foreign aid should be continued, when the Administration says it must be continued and when all the "official" committee reports to the White House and to Congress in effect say the same thing. Nevertheless, we do deny it—and we sincerely believe that if its continuance were put to a vote of the people, it would lose overwhelmingly. Sometimes the consensus of opinion of all the people contains more wisdom than the combined opinion of a comparatively small number of their so-called leaders—regardless of how difficult it may be for these "leaders" to swallow that fact.

There is only space here to mention a few of the reasons why it is to be believed that continuance of our foreign aid program is entirely foolish.

In the first place, there is the enormously heavy burden it has placed on our economy over the years and the very heavy drain it continues to constitute upon the American taxpayer's pocketbook.

This might be considered a selfish reason—but it is still quite true that the quickest way to destroy freedom in this country is by undermining our economy. And our economy can very easily be destroyed by continuously spreading thin our resources and by taxation so heavy that it destroys all incentive for growth and initiative.

Since the beginning of World War I, we have doled out in one form or another a total amount of \$115 billion in foreign aid. Of this amount, \$60 billion has been handed out since the end of World War II—and it is this amount which should receive the greatest attention, because it is this amount for which there was the least need. Even so, it is now proposed, and the Congress will vote on it before long, to continue this aid at the rate of about \$8 billion per year.

Of course, you cannot hand out \$60 billion without the people who receive it having been benefited for the time being. But that is the sad part about it—it is only for the "time being." Who can say that if stopped now—or stopped at any time—it will have benefited these people over the "long run"? Who can even say that this aid has not actually harmed these people more than it has helped them?

Actually, there are some serious underlying fallacies to the whole philosophy of foreign aid that doom it to failure.

In the first place, you cannot buy friends. They may seem friends so long as the gifts keep coming, but just let the gifts stop and the donor will soon find out how many friends he has.

This is one way of saying, of course, that money will not buy everything, even though we seem to have adopted that assumption in the depression of the 1930s and have labored under it ever since. We tried to buy prosperity in this country in those days with Government (taxpayers') money, but it failed miserably. Now we are trying to buy world security and prosperity with the same kind of money—and it simply can not succeed.

In the second place, doles and gifts weaken the recipient instead of making him strong. Such practice kept up long enough destroys his independence and self-reliance—and a weakness shielded long enough can very easily become a permanent weakness.

One of the best illustrations of these facts can be found in the case of Great Britain, which, of all nations, just about all of us would most like to see remain strong. Instead, Great Britain has been gradually crumbling. And who can say that we must not share a considerable amount of the blame?

Sound-thinking Britishers have said that our \$4 billion loan in 1946 helped establish their Socialist Government in power, that our Marshall Plan aid following helped keep this Government in power much longer than would otherwise have been the case. And anyone, with any knowledge of what has happened during these years, knows that the Labor Government of Great Britain is largely responsible for the crumbling of the Empire and for the extreme weakness of the British economy.

In other words, after giving Great Britain more aid than we have given any other nation, it is now weaker by far than when the aid was started!

Our foreign aid program cannot be supported by common sense—which leaves us at a loss to know what is the motivating force behind those who are proposing its continuance. If it is either fear or greed, then we ought to be ashamed of ourselves.

Ninety Per Cent Of Investments Are Made Haphazardly Says Columnist

Babson Park, Mass., March 28. Ninety per cent of investments are made haphazardly. Sometimes they are made on the advice of employees of brokerage firms. It, however, will usually be found that these men have been unable to make and keep any money for themselves.

Importance Of Patience, Hope, And Desire To Render Service

The selfish, shortsighted person seldom makes much money in the stock market, and keeps it only by sheer luck. Most of the real fortunes of today came from the fundamental desire to render service and give "for value received" help to: (1) a panicky market or (2) a new and useful industry. The first can be accomplished by anyone with patience and hope; the second sometimes fails because of poor judgment or because one is too early or too late.

Both of the above two methods of making money require courage, hope, and patience. It takes courage to sell stock and "store up" cash during a bull market when most people are very optimistic; and it takes courage to buy stocks again, one or two years later, when most people are bearish. Furthermore, the waiting period between these right times to sell and buy requires patience and hope. However, the person who follows either of the above methods renders an important service; namely, his selling helps make the boom less dangerous, and his buying helps check the panic. For this service an investor always receives a handsome reward.

Method 1—Selling High And Buying Low

It is important that an investor decide in advance which of the above two methods he is to follow. It is difficult to mix the two methods. If you are to follow the first, of "selling high and buying low," it is usually best to confine your holdings to the active popular stocks, perhaps those known as the "blue chips," while the second method often requires buying stocks of new and smaller companies with inactive markets. All purchases should be confined to listed stocks. In either case, never buy on margin or borrowed money. For results with this first method, under the very best conditions—which no one could expect to duplicate—\$100 could increase to \$90,000 in 40 years, not considering either taxes or dividends. To show the great spread in price of some of the best single stocks, the following figures are most interesting:

For instance, General Electric, now quoted around 55, but selling due to stock splits at an equivalent of 165, sold for 9 during the thirties. Texas Company stock, now selling at an equivalent of 248, then sold at 10. Deere & Company, now selling at an equivalent of 180, then sold at 4. Du Pont, now selling at an equivalent of 720, then sold at 22. General Motors, now selling at an equivalent of 240, then sold at 8; while Radio Corporation, now selling at 33, then sold at 3.

Method 2—Buying Into New Industries

Howard N. Feist, Jr. of the Business Statistics Organization of Wellesley Hills, Mass. has made an analysis of what could have been accomplished by investing only \$1. in automobile stocks in 1915 and then making twenty-two successive switches into various industries, at the right time. This results in a most amazing figure of over two billion dollars!

As a practical matter, it would have been very difficult to have picked the right groups at the right time; but if you chose 90 per cent wrong and only 10 per cent right (provided all else was 100 per cent correct), the \$100 could have resulted in over \$200,000,000, disregarding both taxes and dividends. I also have a copy of what E. L. Quirin of Elm Street, Wellesley

Hills, Mass., who handles Trust Funds (minimum of \$50,000) has accomplished per \$1,000. In 17 years he has turned \$1,000 into \$7,256 for a local friend of mine. This means an annual rate of interest of from 25 per cent to 40 per cent. Of course, he had the general market in his favor much of the time; but it is another illustration of what intelligent, supervised investing can theoretically accomplish.

Set production for one and one-
half bales on every acre planted
this year. You know the more per
acre grown, the cheaper is the
cost of production and the more
profit is left for you.
Here is how to produce good

yields of cotton. Select the best
land on the farm. Prepare as deep
a seedbed as your top soil will
permit; subsoil if necessary. Place
your fertilizer deep at time of pre-
paration. Use 600 pounds of an 8-
8-8 mixed fertilizer, or its equal
in other analysis mixtures, then
side dress with nitrogen later.
Select the highest yielding var-

ity with the highest lint turn out
and be sure to select the variety
that a large majority of growers
in your neighborhood have proven
to be a high producer. These vari-
eties are DPL, DPL Fox, Delfos
9169 and Coker 100-W. Plant Mis-
sissippi Certified, mechanically de-
linted seed not more than three
years from the breeder.
If you have pure seed saved, and
it is not more than three years
from the breeder, have it delinted
and treated before planting. Plant
when the soil warms up. The sug-
gested planting date is April 25-
May 10.

Plant for a stand. Use 25 to 30
pounds of mechanically delinted
seed for hill dropping or 50 to 60
pounds drilled. As soon as a stand
is secured, chop out drilled cotton
leaving one to three stalks per hill
nine to 12 inches apart. For cross
planting, cross plow on 40-inch
centers leaving 10 inches of drill
for every hill.

Control insects throughout the
growing season. Check with your
county agent for the latest cotton
insect control recommendations.

Land Preparation

Do not make a mistake this year
when preparing land. It is better
to wait a day or two longer until
dry enough to plow than it is to
plow too wet. We all know the re-
sults of plowing when land is wet-
clods. This condition prevents the
securing of stands.

Helicopter Photography Tests To Be Made In Yellow Creek Watershed

New Orleans, March 25—The U. S. Forest Service, in cooperation with the Tennessee Valley Authority, will make a series of helicopter photography tests late this month in Yellow Creek Watershed, Tishomingo County, it was announced this week by P. A. Briegleb, Director of the Southern Forest Experiment Station at New Orleans, and Richard Kilbourne, Director of the TVA Division of Forestry Relations at Norris, Tenn.

The Southern Station has the responsibility of making periodic forest inventories of seven states in the mid-South, including Mississippi. The third Forest Survey of this State is now under way, previous inventories having been completed in 1935 and 1948. Regular field work has already been completed in Tishomingo County through cooperative aid supplied by TVA's Division of Forestry Relations. This heli-photo project will constitute supplemental research in this area of the Tennessee Valley.

The tests are expected to show whether satisfactory large-scale, low altitude, stereo-photos can be obtained from a small helicopter. Several circular plots will be marked on the ground in varying forest and agricultural conditions and these will be photographed from several flight altitudes for later office interpretation. For comparison, trees on the forest plots will also be measured precisely on the ground.

Should the method prove feasible, it would make possible better and faster forest surveys of the southern states. By obtaining more

data from these special photographs, both TVA and Forest Survey personnel might be able to reduce the expensive and time-consuming measurement of ground plots.

The helicopter and pilot will be supplied by TVA from Wilson Dam, Alabama. Forest Service men will lay out the plots and take the aerial photographs. After the ground plots have been located, about three days will be required for photography.

Forest Service personnel expected to participate in the tests include George Judson and Gene Avery from New Orleans. TVA coordinator for the project is W. W. Jolly, Chief of TVA's Division of Forest Economics at Norris, Tennessee.

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Background Scripture: Matthew 24:25.
Devotional Reading: Matthew 24:32-44.

Last Judgment
Lesson for March 31, 1957

ALL human judgments are imperfect, and some of them highly unjust; because no man knows all the circumstances of any act, not even his own. We are notoriously poor judges of our own actions; but we are no juster to others. Judgments of ourselves are spoiled by pride; judgments about others are spoiled by prejudice. We never do really see any action in all its dimensions. We can never judge the consequences of an act because we know only a small fraction of them. We cannot well judge the motives of an act, because we mis-read (or read through rose-colored glasses) our own motives, and the motives of others we can do no more than guess at.

Final Judgment
Nevertheless, most of us are called on to pass judgment on others in various ways. And when we are honest we do try to come as near to God's viewpoint as we can. That is, we try to take everything into consideration. But try as we may, we must admit first and last that only God can be the final judge, for only he has all the facts. There are many pictures of the "Last Judgment" in the Bible and they do not agree in details, since they are pictures of what cannot really be imagined. But back of all the pictures, stern, compelling, chilling as some of them are, we discern some plain truths. One is that not only is God the final Judge of every man, but his judgment is final because he and only he has all the facts, and he does not render his judgment till all the facts are in. True, God's judgment is going on all the time, and we can read them in history. "I can read his righteous sentence by the dim and flaring lamps" as the poet says. This is true of men and nations, that the divine judgment is interwoven with their lives. God settles many of the affairs of this planet, on this planet. But in the ultimate future, and only then, will all the facts be in. No judgment before then, not even God's, is final.

The Great Separation
All sorts of efforts have been made to dull the force of Jesus' terrific picture of prophecy of the Last Judgment in the parable of the sheep and the goats. It has been said that this is a judgment of nations, not individual persons; but anyone who can read Greek can see that is not the case. The word "them" in Matt. 25:32 plainly does not refer to nations but to persons. (Furthermore, how do "nations" fit into the end of the story?) It has been said too that this is not a separation of the "saved" from the "unsaved." But the issues of the Trial, as Jesus pictures it, are eternal life and eternal death. The fact is, this is Jesus' picture of the Last Judgment of mankind, and there is no getting out of it. At least two points stand out, etched as it were by fire. One is that the final judgment against a man is not necessarily for what he has done but for what he didn't do; did not even think about doing. The other point is that the basis of judgment is a man's human relations. True, deeper than that is a man's relationship to Christ; but in this parable, Christ identifies himself completely with the troubled sufferers of the world. What we do, or do not do, about human misery, we do or fail to do for the Lord.

The Judgment Seat of Christ
Another strange thing appears in this overwhelming portrayal of judgment, vast and final. The Judge, the King, is the Son of Man, Jesus Christ himself. This fits in with other passages in the New Testament where sometimes Christ, and sometimes God, appears as the Judge of all. This is a tremendous claim on Jesus' part, to have the right to sit on the throne of the universe. No where is the deity of Christ more strikingly affirmed than right here. On the other hand, he is still the Son of Man. He is our Elder Brother, bone of our bone and flesh of our flesh, "made like his brethren in every respect" as Heb. 2:17 says. God in his final judgment, acts with and through his Son who was and ever shall be one with God and one with man. We cannot deceive him. He is one of us.
