Tennessee-Tombigbee Canal Given Strong Endorsement At Meetings Held Last Week

The Tennessee-Tombigbee canal connecting the two rivers by that name, picked up strong endorsement at two important meetings held in the Southeast last Friday.

The 280 delegates attending the annual convention of the Tennessee Valley Public Power Association at Chattanooga, Tenn., endorsed the "rapid construction" of the proposed canal, that would tie the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers into the Gulf of Mexico through the Port of Mobile on the South and connect as well with all the nation's vast inland waterways system to the north, east and west.

The canal would, for example,

place many important cities in Tennessee 800 miles nearer the Gulf. It would be of equal advantage to Alabama and many other states in the great central section of the nation known as the Midwest, and would be of especial advantage to Tishomingo county and all Northeast Mississippi.

Meanwhile, at Tuscaloosa, Ala., last Friday, Governor James E. Folsom of that state headed a gathering which drummed up support for the proposed Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway. The session of legislators, Chamber of Commerce and civic officials authorized Governor Folsom to name a coordinator to work with river basin authorities of Alabama-Tennessee and Mississippi and other states.

"There's no question about it," Governor Folsom said, "We've got to build the canal. We've got to furnish the money and sell those fellows up in Washington on this river development. My Legislature is willing to bring this about."

Congress has authorized a study of economic feasibility of the waterway, which would cost an estimated 230 million dollars.

In addition to the support of Governors Coleman of Mississippi and Folsom of Alabama, the waterway project also bears the endorsement of Governor Frank Clement of Tennessee as well as that of most members of the Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee Congressional delegations and many other senators and congressmen in other parts of the country that would receive vast direct and indirect benefits from realization of the project.

Alabama State Senator E. W. Skidmore of Tuscaloosa, said at Friday's meeting that the project would make Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee "bloom like a rose."

The meeting, arranged at Governor Folsom's suggestion, brought together a group of Alabama state

lawmakers and members of an unofficial rivers development committee formed two months ago at a similar meeting in Sheffield.

The group authorized the Alabama Governor to appoint a temporary coordinator to work with authorities of the three state river basins, industrial development groups and the legislatures in coordinating the state effort. Governor Folsom announced he would make the appointment soon.

It was an enthusiastic meeting.

The Tennessee-Tombigbee canal, as envisioned, would extend from Yellow Creek on Pickwick Lake to the Gulf of Mexico at Mobile,

along Yellow Creek, Mackey's Creek, and the Tombigbee river.

Several locks would be involved since the elevation from Pickwick to the southernmost point is approximately 300 feet.

The United States Government would pick up the tab for over 90 percent of the cost with Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee paying the rest, and the waterway would open many states to river commerce heretofore never dreamed of.

Government Never Disciplines Itself

The story is told of Will Rogers being shown the beautiful new

state capitol building at Lincoln, Nebraska. They were standing in front of the building reading the inscription over the entrance, "The vigilance of the people is the salvation of the state."

Will Rogers read it, thought about it a moment, then scratched his head and said, "Why don't they put those things up, there in language the people can understand?"

One of his hosts asked, "What would you suggest?"

"Oh, something like this," replied Will, "You gotta watch them guys or they'll run away with the state capitol."

Actually, Will Rogers meant this as no reflection upon the State administration of Nebraska or upon the members of the Nebraska legislature as individual persons. He could have, and would have, made the same observation about any state in the nation or about the national government itself.

Will Rogers knew human nature, he knew politics and politicians, well enough to know that it is simply not in the nature of government to discipline itself—to "watch" itself.

This is true of government of any sort. It is generally recognized as true of a dictator government, of course, but it is not so generally recognized as true of government in a free nation. But it is—and the only way in which government can be limited is by the "vigilance", by the demand of the people.

We have seen this illustrated by the government in our own free nation for a number of years—and it has made no difference which political party was in power because, as we have said, that is simply the nature of government. We have seen bureaucracy feeding upon itself at an alarming rate—and unless people quit providing the money to support this bureaucracy, it will continue to do so.

One of the best illustrations we have of the fact that even our own government will not discipline itself, limit itself, control itself is evidenced by the fact that all the emergency measures instituted for the last two or three decades have

Science Fairs, Selecting Future Leaders, & Hi Schools Need Discussed

Babson Park, Fla., April 18. Let me first apologize to the millions of readers of my column for my criticism of High School Teachers.

I claimed that while they are urging higher pay and new buildings, their products are inferior to the products of forty years ago. My experience had been largely with girls

supposedly trained for secretarial work, but who cannot read intelligently, spell correctly, do fractions, typewrite efficiently, or use correct English.

A Newspaper Publisher's Experience

One day about a year ago, Mr. J. C. Council, Publisher of the Tampa Tribune, decided to make a practical test of the Hillsborough County High Schools. He explained to the teachers of these and other high schools what he was endeavoring to accomplish and how it should be done. He selected three dates, the last of March, and engaged one of the large Fair buildings having exhibit booths. Each high school class was asked to make an exhibit of some existing or future scientific problem. They could make a television set, or an electric burner, or an electric eye, or something else already existing. Or, these students could imagine and illustrate some new invention that may come in the future. Each class was assigned a booth with tables and electrical connections.

The day I was there, teachers were present and the students came in fifty school busses. A few could not help pinching and exploding some balloons for weather forecasting. Otherwise, these several thousand students behaved excellently. With my further apology to the girls I found the grand prize was taken by a girl, Barbara Buerke. However, she was not trained to be a "secretary" but a commercial artist. Frankly, I was emotionally moved to see the great interest and intelligence that most of these students showed. I came home bullish on our youth if they are allowed to work on subjects in which they are interested under the "Core" teaching as advocated by Dr. Arthur Combs of the University of Florida.

Selecting Future Leaders

Of course, there were great differences among these boys and girls. Most of them followed the crowd and stopped only at booths surrounded by many people. Others were satisfied to collect free circulars and pictures. These were the boys who should be content to always do manual work and the girls who should aim to be good wives and mothers. Many of these youths, however, had brought notebooks and made drawings of certain exhibits—they were very serious. For some strange reason, the majority of them had red hair or were blond!

Each year the three Colleges which my family sponsors, Babson Institute for Men, Webber College for Women, and the Mid-West Institute, are visited by personnel directors of large corporations seeking the best graduates. They look first for graduates of good character who have done well in their extra-curricular work and have perhaps become officers of their classes. They want graduates with initiative rather than those content with making good marks. After my day with these Tampa youths I am sure that these personnel "scouts" should start by discovering such students when they are in High School, rather

than wait until they are about to graduate from College.

What High Schools Need

Truly this group of Tampa young people with whom I associated are a "gold mine." I could pick out the leaders of Tampa's future without looking at their examination papers or marks. I found, however, that some of the boys whom I would select were not popular with their teachers. Perhaps some of the students felt that their teachers are not too able and are interested only in their salary and not in their students. It is a common thing to know people who have a "green thumb" with flowers or a way with animals; they can get first prizes in flower shows and can easily train animals. This is not because they are better educated in horti-

culture or biology, but because they love flowers and love animals. The same principle may apply to teachers.

I wish that publishers in each of the 400 cities carrying my weekly column could follow the example of Mr. J. C. Council of the Tampa Tribune. I realize that a few other cities are already holding similar "Fairs," but would be a wonderful thing if such "Fairs" could take place once a year, or at least once in four years, in each of these 400 cities. The program would fill a great need in most communities. It would be greatly appreciated by teachers and graduates. It would help to hold these high school graduates within their own state for a college education, rather than lose

them to some other community.

ONE MORE THOUGHT: I believe more attention should be given to higher post-graduate work, two years following college. In order to secure appropriations, presidents of State Universities appear to feel that they must have as large an enrollment as possible. Naturally, the average native intelligence decreases as the number of students increases. This tends to reduce the standards for graduation. As a result, these more efficient students too often do not return to the cities which educated them. They take post-graduate work in some other state and then remain there. I am not ruling out a higher education for those fitted only for trades or manual work. I, however, am arguing that the fut-

ure of every city depends on having the most efficient and students. Cities brag too much about their population totals and their future really depends on character, initiative and efficiency of their High School graduates. We hold these young people in the cities which raised them.

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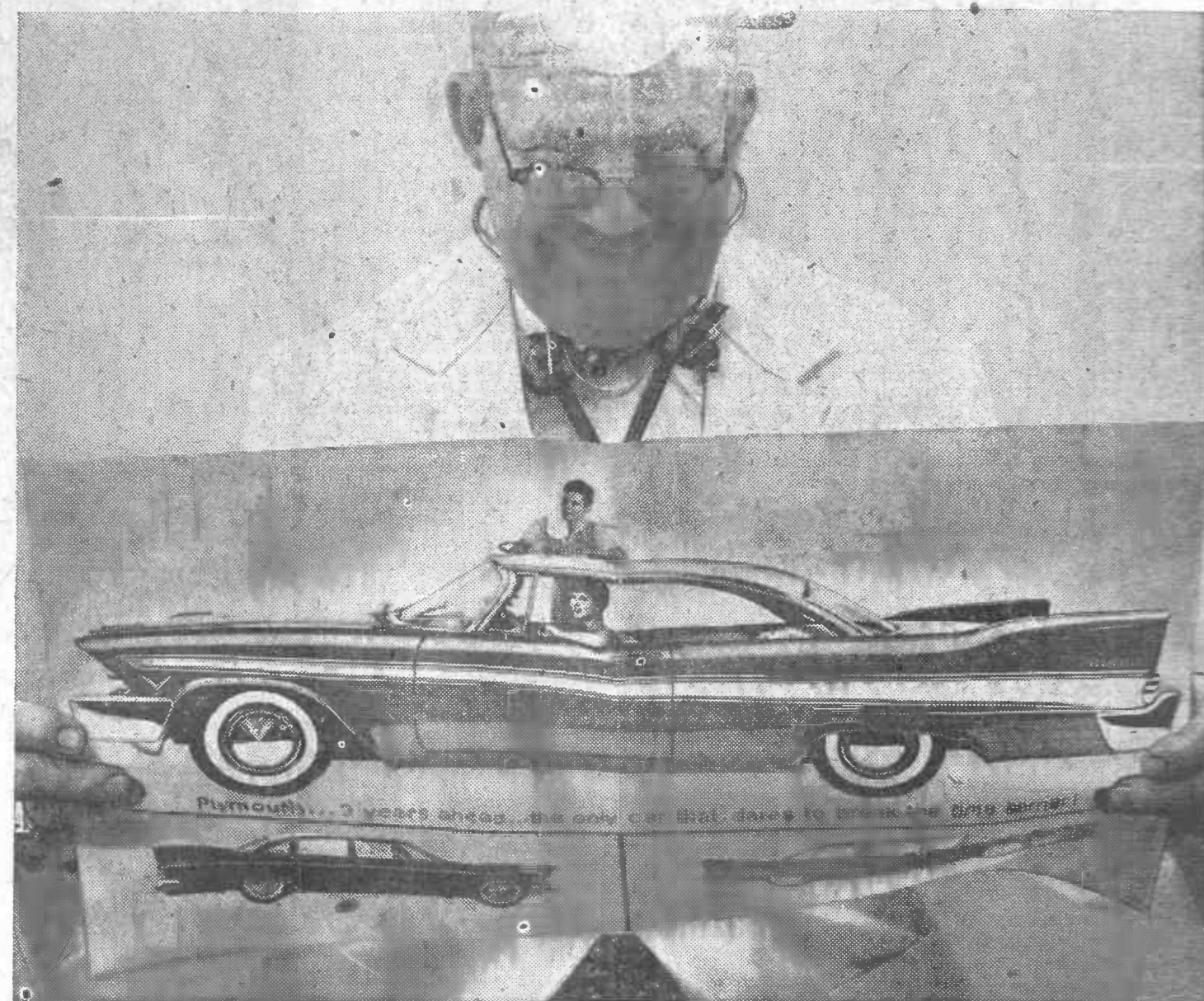

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The best way to protect your

land from erosion is to cover it with vegetation of some kind. This vegetation may be permanent, such as pine trees, or it may be perennial, as permanent pasture, or it can be annuals such as cotton or corn. It makes little difference what the vegetation is provided there is a dense cover of it.

Cotton and corn are not usually considered soil protecting crops. And these crops do not afford as much protection to the soil as will a heavy sod of grass. However, cotton and corn do offer some soil

protection against erosion. These crops afford the most soil protection when they grow rapidly and cover the ground quickly.

By applying the right amount and kind of fertilizer to cotton and corn quick growth can be obtained that will result in higher yields and greater soil protection. Applying inadequate amounts of the right kind of fertilizer or large amounts of the wrong kind of fertilizer will result in slow growth, lower crop yields, and less soil protection. The more land erodes the greater will be the amount of fertilizer needed to produce high crop yields.

It definitely pays any farmer to use recommended amounts of the proper kinds of fertilizer on his row crops. One of the many fine services your county agent offers the farmers of Tishomingo county is that of sending soil samples to the State Soil Testing Laboratory for farmers who want to know the kind and amount of commercial fertilizer to use on a given crop, as cotton, in a certain field.

The USDA Soil Conservation Service personnel urge farmers to take advantage of this program and have their soil tested, and follow the fertilizer recommendations made by Mississippi State College agronomists. By doing this farmers will protect their soil by feeding it properly.

Cotton Planting

A good seedbed with fertilizer placed four to five inches deep is mighty helpful for growing high cotton yields per acre. The seedbed should be allowed to settle before planting, so as to make that each seed is pressed against moist soil. Should weather fail to firm the seedbed, then a cultipacker should be used for firming.

Seeding rates are: Undelinted (fuzzy) cottonseed plant 25 to 30 pounds per acre. It will take about 10 to 14 days to come up. The excess linters tend to keep cotton from germinating uniformly. Mechanically delinted—plant 20 to 25 pounds per acre. It will take 8 to 14 days to come up, linters have been removed for more uniform germination and is easy to hill drop mechanically.

Chemically delinted seed—plant 7 to 12 pounds per acre. It will take 6 to 12 days to come up. Such seed has no linters to protect it

from cold, but when soil is warm, more uniform germination is obtained. Use this type seed especially for precision planting for a stand with no chopping.

Armyworms

Watch out for army worm damage. Where worms are found in damaging numbers, apply one of the recommended insecticides. These include toxaphene, dieldrin and DDT. Get your copy of the Kill-Field Crops Insects leaflet from your county agent.

Some precautions to follow in using insecticides for armyworms control are: Read and follow directions on label concerning use of treated fields for grazing, hay, silage or grain for feed. Do not poison if hay is to be cut in dough stage.

If DDT or toxaphene are used, do not feed straw to dairy animal or animals being finished for slaughter. The straw can be fed to range animals.

If dieldrin is used at rates not exceeding .25 pound per acre, straw after thrashing may be baled for hay provided at least 30 days have elapsed between the last application of poison and baling.

Colorful Flowers

Care Of Slide Fasteners
