Extension Workers To Hold Fertilizer Demonstrations

On Thursday, April 25, the county extension workers will hold two complete liquid fertilizer application demonstrations. Fertilizer to be used is 10-10-10.

The demonstrations will be held on the T. C. Pounders and the Harvey Davis farms.

The first demonstration will get underway at 8:30 a.m. on the T. C. Pounders farm located near Dennis. Another will be held in the afternoon on the Harvey Davis farm near Burnsville.

These demonstrations will be the first field tests where complete liquid fertilizer in the form of nitrogen, phosphate, and potash are used.

The liquid N-P-K was developed by TVA at the fertilizer research plant in Muscle Shoals, Ala. Tests will be established using both granulated and liquid fertilizer.

State College agronomist that will help TVA officials and the County Agent are Dr. W. B. Andrews, L. E. Gholston, Red Anthony and L. A. Olson.

SENSING THE NEWS

THE FORGOTTEN FACTOR

The depreciating value of the dollar (inflation), extravagant and wasteful government spending, enormous and growing public debt are matters of serious concern to many people in this country. They should be matters of serious concern to everybody, especially to those among us whom we have elected to public office.

Right now there seems to be widespread clamor that government spending be drastically reduced. Senator Byrd, of Virginia, says there is more demand for economy in government than at any time he can remember during his twenty-four years in the Senate. In response to this popular demand, the House Appropriations Committee is taking slashes at the national budget here and there.

But there are some astute observers of how government operates sitting off on the side who are ready to bet you right now that this clamor for economy will soon die down, that the Senate will restore most of the cuts made by the House, that the pressure for spending in special instances will outweigh whatever cuts are made, that whereas the national budget should be cut ten billion dollars, we shall be lucky if we get it reduced by one or two billion dollars.

Why is it that this public outcry for economy in government can be ignored? Is it because bureaucracy is stronger than the popular will of the people? Are the people themselves too generally apathetic to pursue their cause to a successful conclusion? Are the people's representatives in Congress indifferent to the demands of their constituents or are they incapable of doing anything about them?

To some extent all of these questions could be answered in the affirmative. But these are not the real reasons why for many years we have been subjected, are being subjected, and for the foreseeable future will continue to be subjected to extravagance and waste, to big spending and big debt on the part of government.

The real reason is because the people—and that means the Congress—have lost control of the public purse strings. That control was lost in 1933 when this country went off the gold standard, when our government broke its solemn promise and violated sanctity of contract, when it robbed the people of forty percent of their savings, when it substituted a dishonest dollar for an honest dollar.

Since that date, we have operated under a system of irredeemable currency that always opens the gates to an orgy of spending by the Federal government, a system that is always the invariable companion of the socialist welfare state. Socialism and an irredeemable currency are natural companions just as a redeemable currency and socialism are natural enemies.

That is the factor that is now all but forgotten in all this talk we hear about inflation and extravagance in government and mounting public debt. The blunt truth is that it is probably entirely useless to expect an end to any of these things until we return once more to a redeemable currency. The sooner the people generally and their public officials in particular face up to this fact and do something about it, the better are our chances for avoiding ultimate disaster.

Under a redeemable currency, if the people are not satisfied with the spending policies of their government, with the increasing size of the national debt, with the very honesty of the government itself, they can present their paper dollars and demand gold, something of intrinsic value, in exchange. This very quicky brings a stop to any governmental spending spree of which the people do not approve.

Under an irredeemable currency, the people no longer have this control. All they can get when they present their paper dollars is more paper dollars—and there is nothing to stop the printing presses from rolling merrily on.

The Republicans, in their 1952 platform, seemed to recognize this 'forgotten factor' and promised to restore a redeemable currency under a gold standard as soon as it became 'feasible.' The Democrats made no mention of a gold standard in their platform; they had apparently fully accepted the doctrine of a managed currency. In their 1956 platforms, neither party mentioned the gold standard.

If we ever want to return to a sound economy, we must first return to an honest dollar.

Florida Climate, Real Estate, Industrial Sites & Citrus Discussed

As I leave for the North tomorrow, I will try to answer these questions in this week's column. My answer is "No," if you are hoping to get something for nothing; but "Yes," if you are 'retiring' and receive a pension check from the North each month or have sufficient income of your own.

Mild Climate Lures Thousands

Although lacking in a number of important natural resources, Florida has an abundance of sunshine, plenty of water, large amounts of phosphate, and sufficient limestone for cement. It can compete with California and other sections as a mecca for tourists, vacationists, and retired folk. I am told that more than 2,000 people come into Florida each week intending to settle here. Many live on pensions or annuities or income from investments, and therefore have no need to seek employment. Others do need jobs, but not all can find them today.

In my observation, it is rather difficult to get a job in Florida unless you have special skills which the state's few industries can use. However, efforts to get natural gas by pipeline from Texas are now on the verge of succeeding. I predict that parts of the state will have natural gas by the summer of 1958. When the supply of this fuel is assured, industry should move into Florida at a very rapid pace.

Florida is growing fast. Where good land in a settled community can now be bought cheap. I advise buying it; but I have a word of caution for those who are in the market anywhere for land for office buildings, factories, or apartments. Plan for much more parking space than you now feel you will ever need. The success of business ventures in any state will depend largely on ease of access and parking facilities. Provide ample parking for employees, customers, and suppliers. In less than twenty years, I predict that the present number of registered cars will be doubled.

After spending some thirty-five winters in Florida, I believe an experienced and hard-working citrus grower can do well. In recent years the citrus industry has prospered. It should do better in future years as new and less expensive for cultivating, picking, extracting, shipping, and preserving the flavor of fruit juices are discovered.

However, do not let citrus prosperity lure you to Florida to grow fruit unless you know something about the business or are prepared to have your interests cared for by an experienced co-operative citrus organization. Also be sure you invest in a frostproof grove that can furnish you a 20-year record. Don't buy new groves now. Look before you leap!

New Boom In Real Estate

Mild climate has always been an attraction to prospective buyers of land for homes or business. Now that atomic energy is to be an added attraction, I forecast an even further boom in Florida real estate. The present boom will be far different from the "boom and bust" of the 1920's when sellers and buyers alike went just plain crazy.

Sharp real estate operators, whose methods are questionable, cannot be eliminated entirely, but Florida does attempt to curb land and stock frauds.

I am bullish on well-located Fla. homes which are already built. I do not hesitate to advise those interested to buy a house, or a lot, in an already settled community. However, I urge prospective settlers in Florida or those anxious to buy land there for investment or speculation to proceed very cautiously. Before buying lots in a new subdivision, you should first see them. Florida offers plenty of opportunity to those who are alert to its possibilities and willing to work hard to get ahead. At this time it is not a good place in which to speculate.

Shopping For Industrial Sites

Florida's lack of oil, coal, and waterpower has been a serious handicap to the development of heavy industry. Actually, light industry has been moving into the state at an increasing rate. Many industrial concerns in the North and Middle West ask me how to go about buying land for industrial use in Florida. My first answer is to buy for cash only, and to use the same common sense they would use when buying land in their own home state. Second—buy something which they feel sure they could rent or sell promptly if they cannot use it themselves.

Florida is growing fast. Where good land in a settled community can now be bought cheap. I advise buying it; but I have a word of caution for those who are in the market anywhere for land for office buildings, factories, or apartments. Plan for much more parking space than you now feel you will ever need. The success of business ventures in any state will depend largely on ease of access and parking facilities. Provide ample parking for employees, customers, and suppliers. In less than twenty years, I predict that the present number of registered cars will be doubled.

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Weevil Resistance Studied In Tests At Delta Station

State College, Miss.—Adequate control of boll weevils was not obtained by many cotton growers in the south Delta area of Mississippi and in parts of Louisiana and Arkansas during the growing season of 1955.

Recommended insecticides most commonly used in that area failed to give satisfactory control where

in the past they had given excellent control.

At Stoneville tests were begun in late August 1955 and continued through October to determine whether or not resistance existed in this area. Tests were resumed with overwintered weevils in May 1956 and were carried on throughout that year. The tests included cage, field plot and laboratory studies. Other laboratory tests have been reported from State College.

A report on the research work done in the Delta has recently been published by R. E. Furr, E. P. Lloyd, and M. E. Merkl of the

Entomology Research Branch, U.S. D.A., in cooperation with the Delta Branch of the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station. They concluded:

1. There is a difference in kill with the same insecticide when weevils are obtained from different locations.
2. Mixtures of certain phosphorus and chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticides gave better kills than either alone in field tests.
3. There is a difference in kill with the same compound as the season progresses.
4. There is a difference in kill

with different chlorinated hydrocarbons and with different phosphorus insecticides.

5. Phosphorus compounds are more effective than chlorinated hydrocarbons by topical application. The complete report is published in the April issue of *Mississippi Farm Research*, available at the Experiment Station at State College or Stoneville.

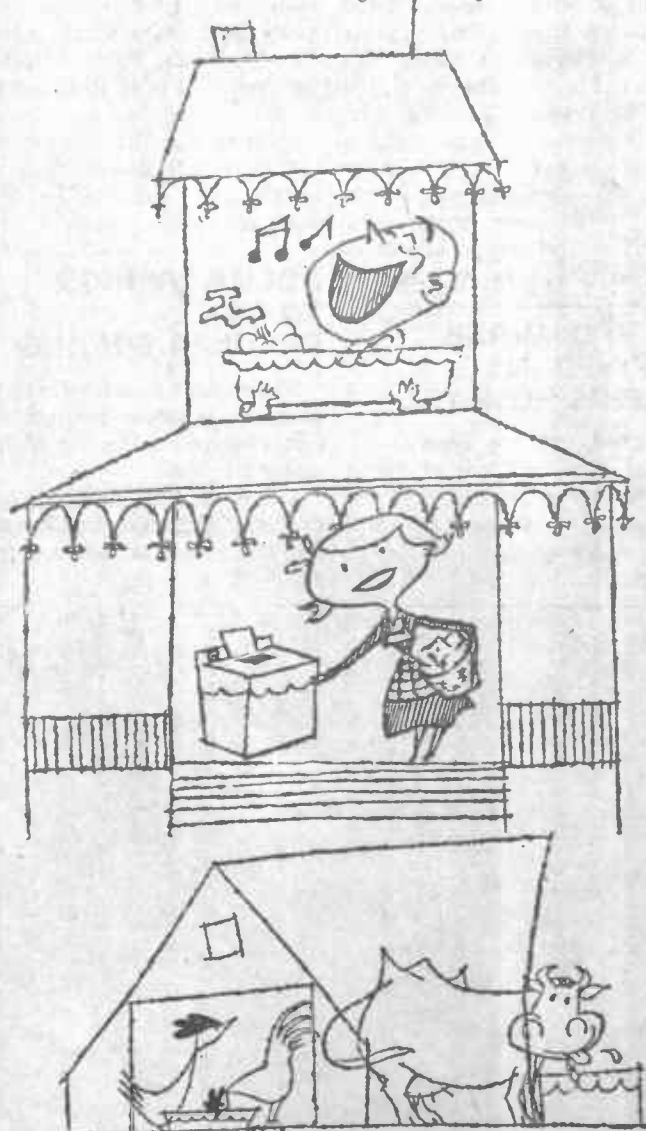

SOUTH EXPLORES POTENTIALS OF PEACEFUL ATOM; PUBLIC BEING INFORMED ON ATOMIC ENERGY

Atlanta, Ga.—As a Southerner, you are involved in a tremendously broad atomic energy project which reaches the people of 16 states and may benefit you directly—whether you farm, work in a factory, or work in a profession.

Hundreds of specialists through 16 states are busy gathering information on how the South can benefit from atomic energy through regional action. This information will be presented in a nationwide "Work Conference on Atomic Energy" to be held in Iuka at the request of the Southern Governors' Conference.

Your governor has appointed other delegates from your state to guide this development, which is assembling facts on a broad scale of atomic energy applications in all phases of the region's economy. Because nuclear energy has such wide and varied applications in

operation.

At North Carolina State College, atomic energy was used to produce three revolutionary varieties of peanuts. One yields 30 per cent more to the acre than conventional strains, another has a shape tailor-made for mechanical harvesting machinery, and another resists leaf-spot disease.

What does atomic energy mean to you if you work in a factory? Your job can be made easier in a number of ways. In the tobacco industry, radioactive materials are used to insure uniform packing of cigarettes, and in other industries radioactive products are used to control the thickness of coatings, rolled metals, and other materials. In addition to making the job easier, these uses of atomic energy help improve the product quality and the creating more and more jobs all the time.

Human and animal health and the treatment of disease is a third broad field in which atomic energy plays an important role.

By now most people are familiar with some of the benefits which medicine has derived from the atom. But did you know that one

hospital in Atlanta alone routinely treats 190 patients a year with radioactive iodine for thyroid disorders? This story is duplicated in hospitals throughout the nation.

Such is the information now being gathered and translated into usable facts on which the governors of the Southern states might base regional and state atomic development efforts.

A report for the Southern Governors' Conference will come out of the August session which will for the first time give a clear, factual picture of atomic energy in the South—now and in the future.

Helping prepare for the work conference are a number of nationally known technical experts from throughout the United States who are presenting data from their special fields.

These experts include research workers in industry, government, and colleges; industrialists using atomic energy in one way or another in their enterprises; agricultural experts; and officials of the United States Atomic Energy Commission, educational institutions, and organized labor.

The basic group which guides the policies and activities of the planning are the appointed representatives of the governors of the Southern states. In many cases, these representatives are industrial development officials.

These official representatives of the governors have met twice and will convene at Aiken, South Carolina, for a third planning session, June 14-15.

Another participating group in the project is the Regional Industry Advisory Committee, made up of 14 leading Southern business and industrial executives appointed by Governor Collins.

able powder to 3 gallons of water. Apply while birds are on roost, using a small shoulder type sprayer. Approximately 3 gallons of spray will treat 100 hens.

Poultry mites are effectively controlled by spraying the house with .5 per cent lindane. This can be made by mixing 7 tablespoonfuls of a 20 per cent lindane emulsion per each gallon of water used (1 pint to 5 gallons of water). If you prefer, you may use a 25 per cent lindane wettable powder and mix at the rate of 3/4 pound wettable powder to 5 gallons of water.

A liberal amount of sulphur under roost poles, on planks and in litter will give satisfactory control. Use 2 pounds for each 100 square feet. Apply every 7 to 10 days.

County Agent news

By W. C. HAMILTON

With most gardens planted, now is the time to make plans to combat insects before they actually do a great amount of damage. Garden insects can easily be controlled by following these recommendations using the named insecticides:

Bean Beetles, Cabbage Worms, Potato Beetles, Cutworms, Flea Beetles, Cucumber Bugs, Horn or Tobacco Worms, and Pickle Worms use methoxychlor in either spray or dust. For spraying use 1/2 cup full of 50 per cent Methoxychlor wettable powder to 3 gallons of water. If dusting use a 5 per cent dust.

Harlequin Cabbage Bugs, Squash Bugs and Blister Beetles are best controlled by Sabadilla Dust.

Plant lice can be killed by using Malathion at the rate of 1/2 tablespoon of 50 per cent emulsion to 1 gallon of water, or by using Nicotine Sulphate.

Poultry Pest

To eradicate poultry lice, make a roost paint by mixing 3 cups of 20 per cent lindane emulsion to 2-1/2 gallons of water (5 tablespoonfuls to 1 quart.) If you use lindane wettable powder mix 1 pound of 25 per cent wettable powder to 2-1/2 gallons of water (3 level tablespoonfuls to 1 quart.) Also the flock may be sprayed with a 1 per cent DDT solution. Mix 1 pint jar of 50 per cent DDT wet-

What Organic Matter Does For The Soil

Organic matter gives the soil power to produce. Organic matter causes the phosphate, the potash, and other plant foods, farmers buy and apply to their land to be of greater value to the crops grown on it.

As organic matter diminishes crop yields are reduced. Continuous cropping, without adding barnyard manure, or turning under crop residues, or plowing under green manure crops, is almost certain to deplete a soil.

Organic matter is the lighter more precious part of the soil. It is easily dislodged by pounding raindrops and because it is light it will float away in the run-off water. THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Mission
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FORE

Background Scripture: Genesis
Devotional Reading: Psalm 124
God Made Us Lay
Lesson for April 25, 1957

THE readers of this column will not read Genesis the same day. Some will take it literally, others will read the chapters in it as picture stories in half poetic form. Readers, it is hoped, can agree on one point: that whether these stories literally or as pictures, the meaning is the same in any case. We do not have to go grubbing in obscure corners for the meanings and messages of Genesis. The book was not written for people with complicated minds. The meanings it conveys are on the surface, or so that the simplest readers can understand them.

The Earth Is Man's Home

From the second story of creation which we find in Genesis chapter 2, the story which treats on man himself, we select some outstanding portions which the story makes no doubt was intended to teach. First of all, this earth is the home of man. That is its principle. Man came late to the planet, made us last. We did not make our appearance here till all was ready for us. Some thinkers have said of man as a sort of homeless creature, dropped into this earth, most by accident, fitting it nowhere. Quite the contrary, it might be lonely and restless some far galaxy, but not on this green earth. Man, furthermore, being at the top of the ladder of creation, is master of this planet. This does not mean he is master of the universe. It may be covered some day, as the fiction boys have already suggested, that men may find themselves on another planet as intruders, only to be out or destroyed. But on this planet, man has a right to live, to achieve mastery. In Genesis (where the horizon is wide in Gen. 2) man is told: "Subdue the earth and subdue it. In short, it is to work together with God in bringing order and completeness to the planet and his rightful home.

Top of Creation

Let us pursue that thought of the top of creation a little. This story in Genesis presents as made from dust, and all living things, both plants and beasts and birds, are sprung from the dust by the word of God. Man has a kind of superiority with all of life, and therefore Albert Schweitzer has said: "We have a reverence for life. We cannot give life to himself or to any other creature; and we are very slow about taking life away. Nevertheless it is nearer the truth to say that creation is made for man, that man is made for the creation. Not that God created everything in the world to be used by man. It is an interesting point that trees of Eden are not all good food; some of them are beautiful to see. The beauty of the world, sometimes its beauty (like a sunset) is in itself, just as its usefulness is in itself. Its unbecoming use is appreciated best by man. Only man can heat the earth and cool the tropics; only man can bring his foods from the earth.

"One Man Is No Man"

The Greeks had a slogan: "man is no man, meaning each need the help and companionship of others to live as human beings. The story of the first man as told in Genesis treats this in a moving way. It sees that this man is lonely though he is set in the great beauty and has a lonely mind and hands. So God creates the other animals. Only man can talk with them. So at last man is made. Before was only a man alone; now is a human race. This is a profound truth. Man is a community. Without it, he is the brute's level. In community man becomes human. As the only companionship is human, he has still his destiny. For man was made for fellowship, above all, with God. Only as friend of God can he become what God intends to be.

Experiments Show How To Control Beetles In Corn

State College, Miss.—The sugarcane beetle attacks corn in many parts of Mississippi. Severe damage is usually localized. Some infested fields have been replanted as many as three times in one season as a result of damage by this insect which is also the rough-headed cornstalk beetle.

4-H Scholarships Increased to \$400

Scholarships in the national 4-H awards program have been increased from \$300 to \$400, announced G. L. Noble, director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, Chicago.

Approximately 170 college scholarships of \$400 each will be awarded at the national level to 4-H Club members whose 1957 records of achievement in their chosen projects are judged best by the Cooperative Extension Service. The scholarships will be presented to the national champions next December during the 36th annual 4-H Club Congress, Noble said.

Among the 4-H activities offering awards of scholarships as well as trips to the Club Congress are the Boys' Agricultural, Poultry, Garden, and Electric programs. Donors of the awards respectively are: International Harvester, Sears-Roebuck Foundation, Allis-Chalmers, and the Westinghouse Educational Foundation. All have supported 4-H work for many years through programs arranged and announced by the National Committee and the Extension Service.

Last year 4-H awards and leader training funds distributed through the National Committee amounted to \$469,397. A similar sum has been assured again this year from non-governmental sources, according to Mr. Noble.

Spring Days Spur 4-H'ers in Home, Yards Projects

In the spring a young homemaker's fancy turns to thoughts of a bright new look for house and yard. Right now 4-H Club members here are dreaming up ways and means to transform drab, out-of-date surroundings into cheerful modern areas that are functional as well as decorative.

To help make their dreams come true are two popular 4-H programs: Beautification of Home Grounds, and Home Improvement. Members may begin with a simple project like a small flower bed, and in a few years learn enough to landscape the entire grounds. Home interiors benefit from newly acquired skills that range from making pretty sofa pillows to redecorating several rooms.

Besides the satisfaction of having accomplished something that can be enjoyed by family and friends, the boys and girls have an opportunity to compete for valuable awards when their projects are completed. For outstanding accomplishment in beautification of home grounds, state winners will receive a 19-jewel wrist watch from Mrs. Charles E. Walgreen, Chicago, who has donated awards in this program for 20 years. Eight national champions will be her guests during the 4-H Club Congress next December.

State winners in home improvement will attend the Club Congress, while six national winners will each receive a \$400 college scholarship. The Sears-Roebuck Foundation provides these awards. Medals of honor are awarded four outstanding club members in each county in both programs.

Information regarding enrollment may be obtained from the local 4-H Club leader or the County Extension agent.

Injury to corn is caused only by the adults, which are rather stout, jetblack beetles about 1/2 to 2/3 inch long. The beetles attack the plants as soon as they appear above ground and until they are at least knee high. They chew into the outer wall of the stalk just below the surface of the ground, making large ragged openings. Young plants are usually killed; older plants are stunted severely or fail to develop because the tender growing part or heart of the plant has been destroyed.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, and the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station cooperating, have conducted experiments on the control of the beetle

with insecticides since 1943.

Results have shown that the beetles can be controlled with 1 pound of aldrin or heptachlor per acre in an emulsion spray or as granules. Detailed application methods are listed in the April issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available at the Experiment Station, State College. The report advises:

"Apply the spray or granules in a 6 to 8 inch band on top of the row at planting time or as soon as possible after the corn comes up. Do not apply the insecticide after the plants have reached a height of 6 inches. Experiments in 1956 indicate that covering insecticides with soil is not necessary. "Application of insecticides in

combination with a fertilizer has not given satisfactory control, nor has seed treatment with an insecticide.

"Aldrin and heptachlor are poisonous. Handle them with care. Follow all directions and heed all precautions on the label."

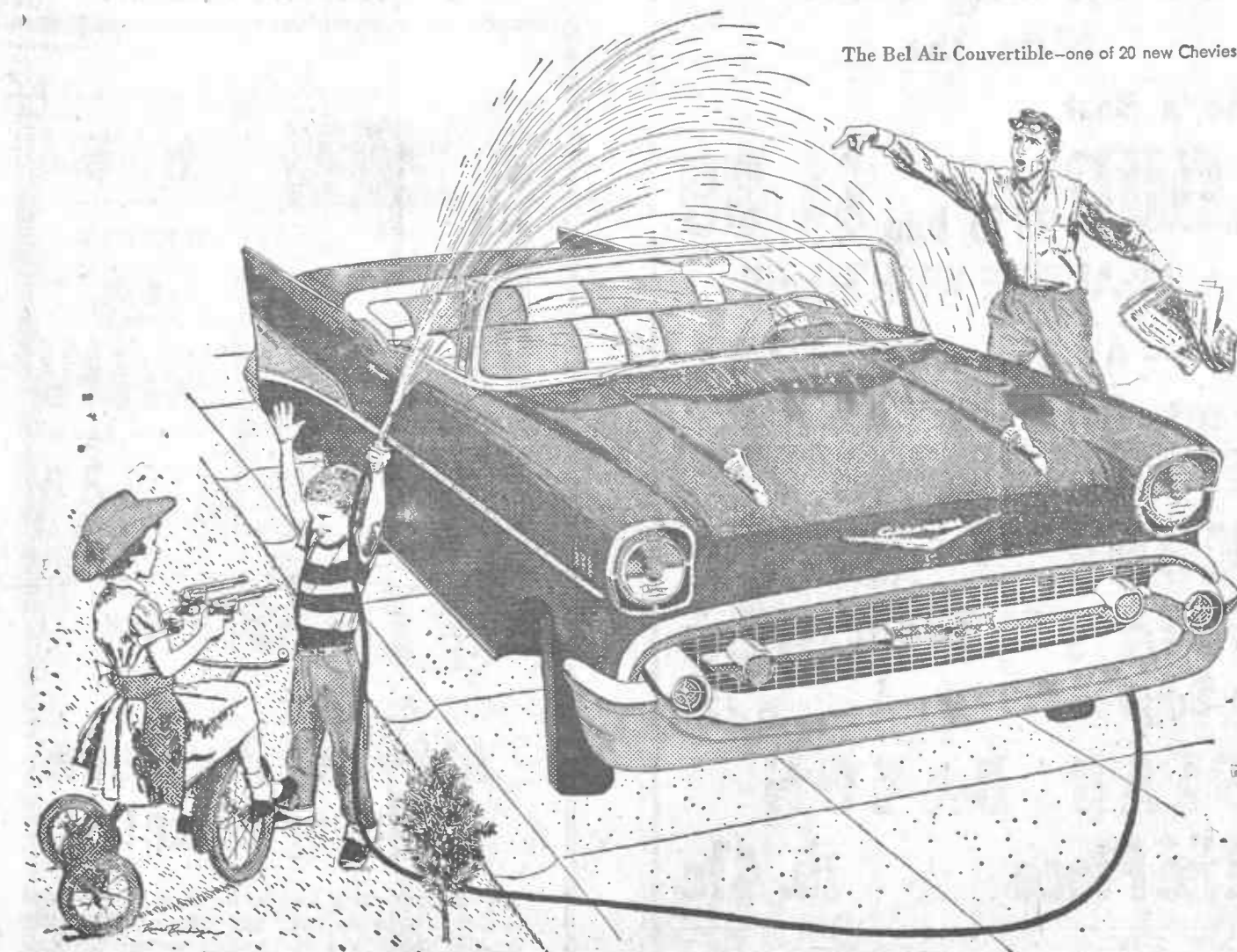

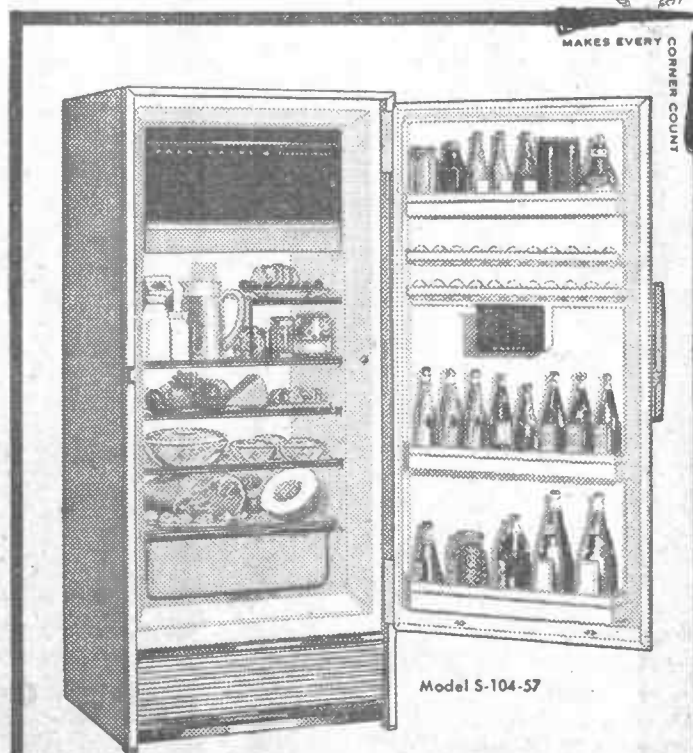
