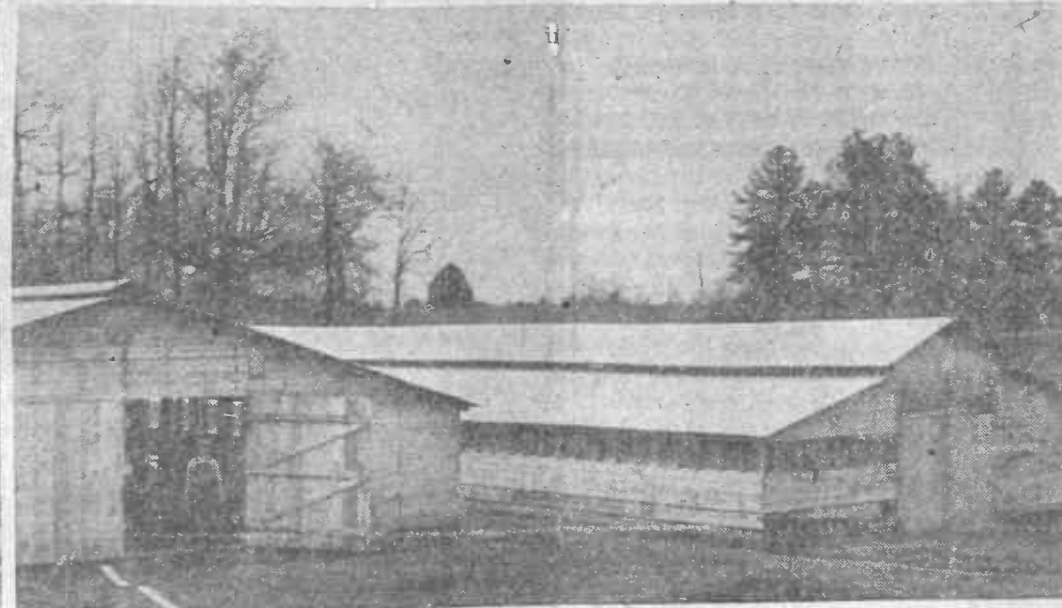


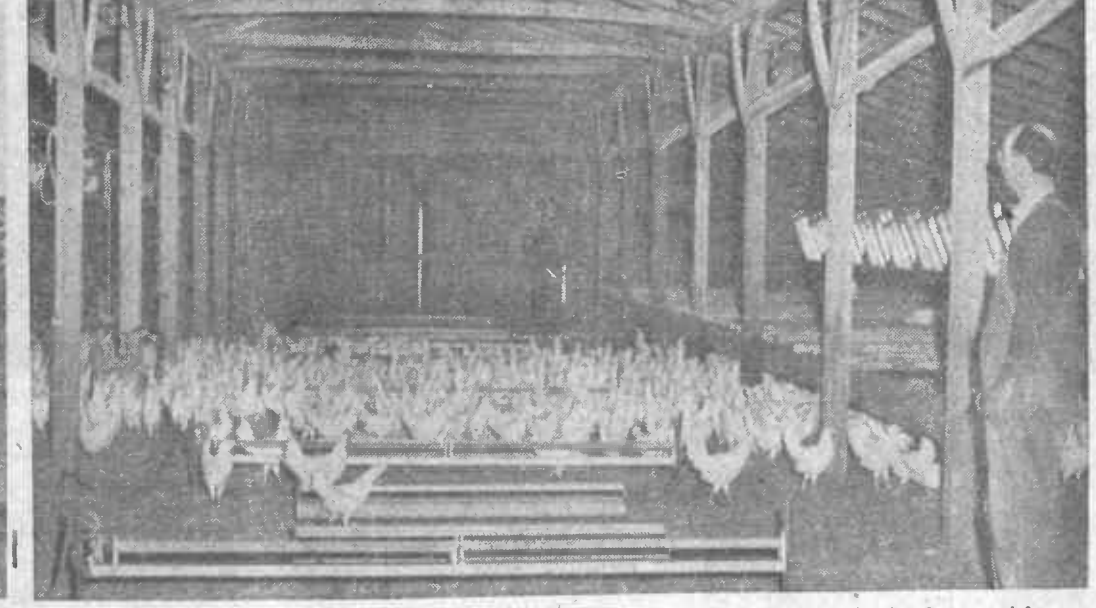
COUNTY FARMERS ARE PLANNING COMMERCIAL EGG PRODUCTION FOR MORE FARM INCOME

Tishomingo County farmers are planning commercial egg production for more farm income. A county-wide poultry program already involving around 25,000 layers is underway. At present, most producers are located in the Midway, Golden and Valley communities.

Assisting with the poultry project are County Agent W. C. Hamilton, and Associate County Agent T. K. Marlin. The egg production enterprise is a part of Balanced Farm and Home Planning. It is designed to provide supplemental cash farm income to take the place of lost cotton dollars.

Balanced Farm and Home Planning involves detailed planning, both on long range and short range, with the goal of increasing farm income and improving farm living conditions. The planning is done in close cooperation with county Agricultural Extension agents.

No great capital outlay is required of the farmers taking part in the new program. Some are going in individually, while others will be producing eggs on a sort of "partnership" arrangement.

Independents going into commercial egg production include

Travis Cain, a former broiler producer, who has been growing poultry since 1951. Mr. Cain is changing from meat birds to layers.

He will house some 4,500 high quality leghorn pullets and plans to sell his eggs in neighboring Red Bay, Alabama.

Other independents are Charles Patterson and Albert Hamilton, who will house some 1,600 birds each.

Tishomingo commercial egg producers will not put the birds in individual cages, but will use the floor plan type houses.

Beside these independents, L. E. Skinner, who works closely with Mr. Marlin in balanced farm and home planning, is working

out a program of "farming out his pullets."

As each farm will care for upwards of 1,000 birds, such a program can mean a substantial addition to this income. With reasonably good production, the farmer caring for the birds should realize as much as \$2,500 a year for his labor.

The eggs will be picked up daily and delivered to a central grading and marketing plant at Tupelo.

Farmers working with Mr. Skinner in the commercial egg program include Edward Credille, Chester Holcomb, Edward Wynn, Vester Howie, Rochelle Turner, Frank Dawson, Harmon Massengill, Herbert Enlow and Richard Cox.

FUTURE OF AGRICULTURE DISCUSSED

Park, Mass., May 9. Many write to me complaining the cost-price squeeze. They are discouraged because for them bottom seems to have fallen of the farm market. I sympathize with these people, but I suspect that many of them have come upon hard times because they are not farming as well as they know how. Also, many of them are not keeping abreast of new ideas and crops.

Is Toward More
enormous changes have taken in farming during my life. When I was a boy, horses furnished practically all power on farms. Even as late as 1910, there was almost

no mechanization on farms. In that year the total farm population was 32,076,960. By 1950, this had dwindled to 25,058,000, a decline of 21.9 per cent. Most observers estimate the present farm population to be only 20,000,000. Thus farmers and their families new account for only 11.8 per cent of our total population compared with 34.9 per cent in 1910.

I predict that machines will continue to displace men on American farms. Hence, the smaller commercial farms will be hard put to survive. However, I do not believe farmers should be despairing of the future. A good living can still be made on the farm by those who open their eyes to progress. Obviously, the trend is toward new crops and greater mechanization, and there is no sense in bucking that trend.

Over-Production Is A Temporary Problem

Right now farmers are the victims of their own unusual ability to coax record yields-per-acre from the soil. Better seed, improved fertilization and irrigation, and more efficient spreading, cultivating, and harvesting machinery have increased production. During the war our farmers rose magnificently to the challenge to provide food and feed for our allies, and now they are temporarily in trouble.

Future Of Agriculture

At present we are growing at least 5 per cent more farm products than we can sell. In an effort to keep our farm surpluses from becoming too burdensome, the government spends huge sums on price support programs, the soil bank, and foreign distribution schemes. All these measures have helped to some extent, but they are by no means cure-alls. I am disturbed by the fact that too many farmers take undue advantage of this government help by deliberately overproducing. However, I am firmly convinced that this overproduction is a temporary problem.

Research Holds The Answers

Research has performed wonders for all other industries. I forecast that it will also perform wonders for agriculture. Chemistry, industry, and agriculture, working together, gave us hybrid corn and varieties of the soybean which would grow in our country. This combination sponsored the research that produced a new dwarf variety of castorbean said to yield as much as 2,700 pounds per acre if the soil is properly irrigated and fertilized with nitrogen. Also, a new combine harvester-huller has been developed which will gather tall or short castorbeans without waste. I predict a profitable future for castorbeans, with output reaching as high as 350,000, crops acres.

A stimulating flow of new re-

arch ideas has emerged from the recent annual Chemurgic Conference of the Council for Agricultural and Chemurgic Research. This organization and others like it are facing up to the real farm problem, which is not over-production but underutilization and waste.

Industrial Uses For Farm Products

We should be proud of the progress agriculture has made in our country. But there is still much to learn about soils, irrigation, and weather. Crops such as castorbeans and sesame seed will become big business before long and I forecast that other big new cash crops are coming. But I want now to call special attention to the need for putting more farm products and residues to work in industry.

President Eisenhower is alert to this need. Some months ago, he appointed a Commission on Increased Industrial Use of Agricultural Products. Its report should be made public within the next month. I urge farmers to study it carefully and to follow it up with action. Over the long pull, I am bullish about farming in this country.

Pasture Management

All clover and ryegrass areas should be grazed heavily now to get the good from any heavy spring growth.

These crops will soon seed out and stop growing. So if you don't get the grazing off soon, it will die down anyway and you will have lost it. If cattle don't seem to want to graze off an area, use an electric fence to force them to eat it off.

Ryegrass and clover can be grazed much later in the year if they are eaten down closely and then given a rest.

Clovers and legumes growing with cereal or ryegrass will make good grass silage. If these are cut direct without wilting, a preservative should be used. Eight to 10 pounds of sodium bisulfite per ton of green material is pretty good insurance of good silage.

Wild barley is now seeding out and about the only way to get it off is to clip. Cows will not graze it in the seeding stage, and if left on the pastures, it interferes with the grazing.

Cotton

The cool weather during recent days has caused some cotton to "damp off". This damping off is due to a fungus on the cotton root and shank. Usually this situation clears up as the ground begins to warm.

If your cotton shows signs of dying from damping, here is what can be done to improve the situation. Use a rotary hoe or plow with scratchers close to cotton and poison for thrip at rate of 3 to 5 pounds per acre. Do not chop for a few days, wait until growth begins again.

Bangs Testing

The cattle testing program for Bangs is moving along fairly well. To date about one-half of the cattle have been tested. The rate of infec-

tion is very low, running 1 per cent. This means only one animal per hundred infested.

29 Persons Died In Miss. Highway Mishaps In April

Fatal Mississippi traffic accidents decreased again during April bringing the 1957 statewide highway death toll down 30 deaths below the number reported for the corresponding first four months of 1956.

According to Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough, 29 persons died as a result of April highway mishaps, as compared to 34 killed last April.

The '57 toll as of May 1 stands at 125 dead. One hundred fifty-five motorists died last year during the corresponding period.

Despite occasional verbal criticism hurled by an irate motorist ticketed for speeding by radar-working Highway Patrolmen, the Patrol is continuing the "strict enforcement" policy inaugurated by Commissioner Scarbrough. In fact, the Patrol is presently purchasing additional radar machines, credited nationwide by traffic law enforcement officials as one of the most effective deterrents to highway speeding, the recognized leading cause of traffic accidents.

The present drop in highway carnage is due to a large part of this tightening up on speed law violators, the Highway Patrol feels.

Only during February has an increase in the death toll been noted. Comparative '57 and '56 figures were given as: (1957 figure first) January 33-53; February 39-24; March 24-38; and April 29-34.

nourished grass offers very little protection to the land from pounding rain drops. Vigorous plants of cotton or corn, and thriving lush pasture plants, resulting from proper fertilization and management, break the force of rain drops and protect soil from erosion.

If a soil has a dense vegetative cover it will erode very little. It is the raindrops hitting the ground like thousands of tiny hammers that loosens and separates the soil particles, throwing them into suspension and causing them to float away. If the force of these raindrops are broken by hitting plant leaves and then trickle down

to the ground to run off they will cause very little soil erosion. Therefore, it is easy to see that the more rapid cotton and corn plants grown and the sooner they cover the land the more they will protect it from erosion. The same thing is true concerning pastures. It is also important that pastures are not overgrazed and that sufficient vegetation is always left on the land to protect it from these fierce little raindrops that hammer and peck away the soil.

The USDA Soil Conservation technicians, who serve you, believe that the farmers who apply adequate amounts of fertilizer to

their crops, both row-crops and sod-crops, accomplish four things: 1. They will produce higher yields of row-crops, hay-crops and pasture. 2. They make more efficient use of the rains that come. 3. They protect their land from erosion. 4. They improve their land by increasing its organic content through erosion control and plant residue utilization.

One of the answers to our soil problem may be the use of more fertilizer of the right kind on the land. Try it on your farm and watch the results. *Fertilize According to Soil Test.*

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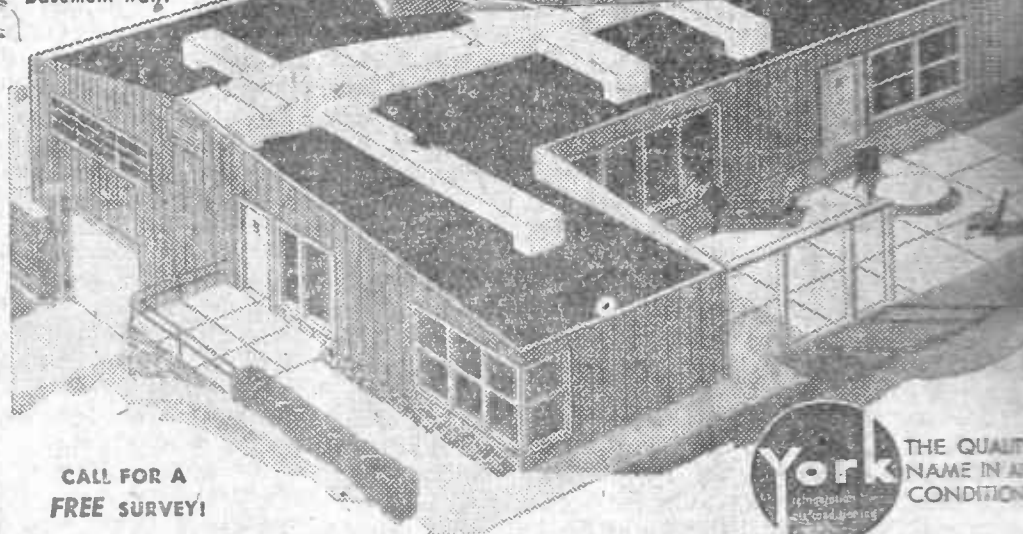

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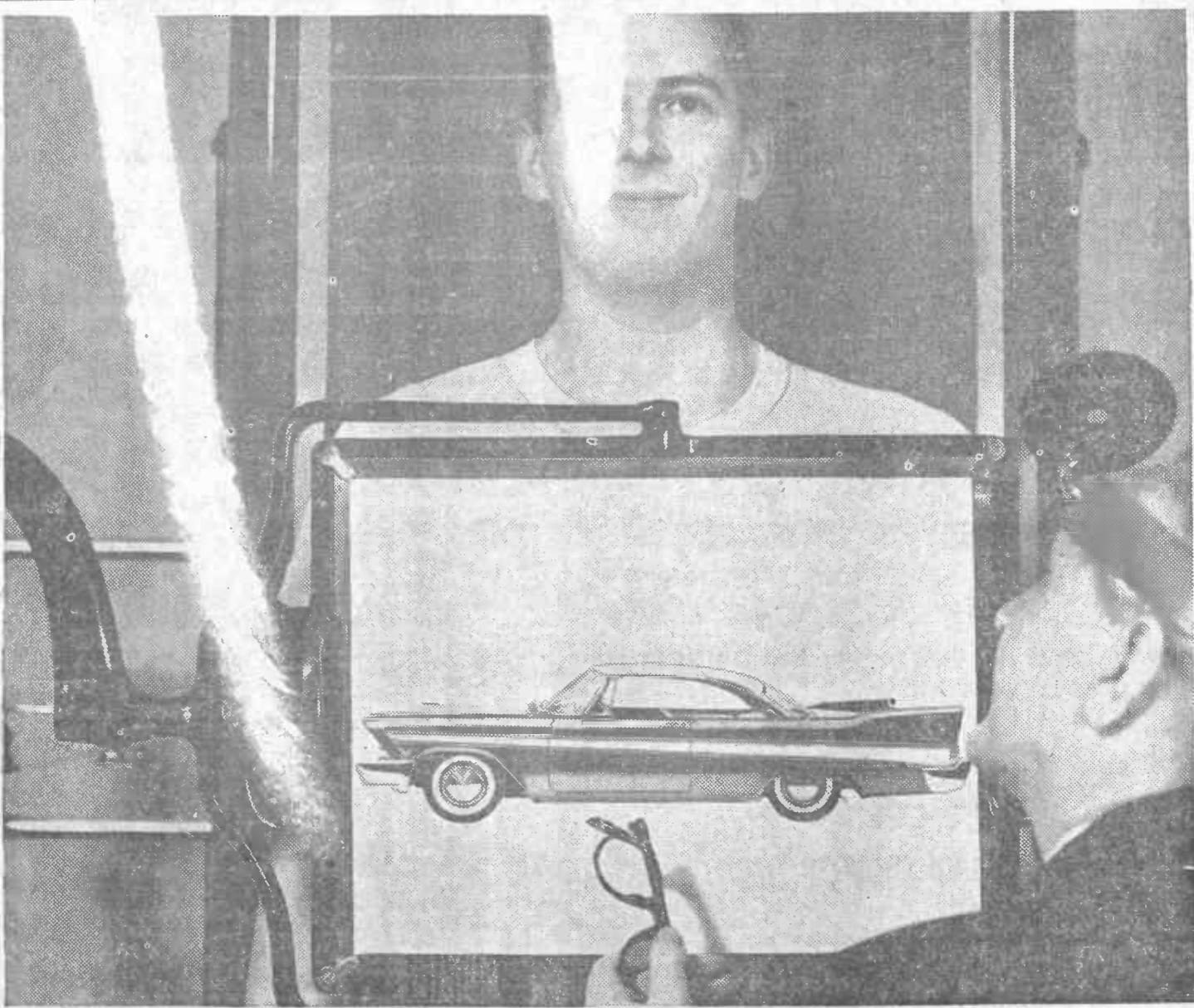
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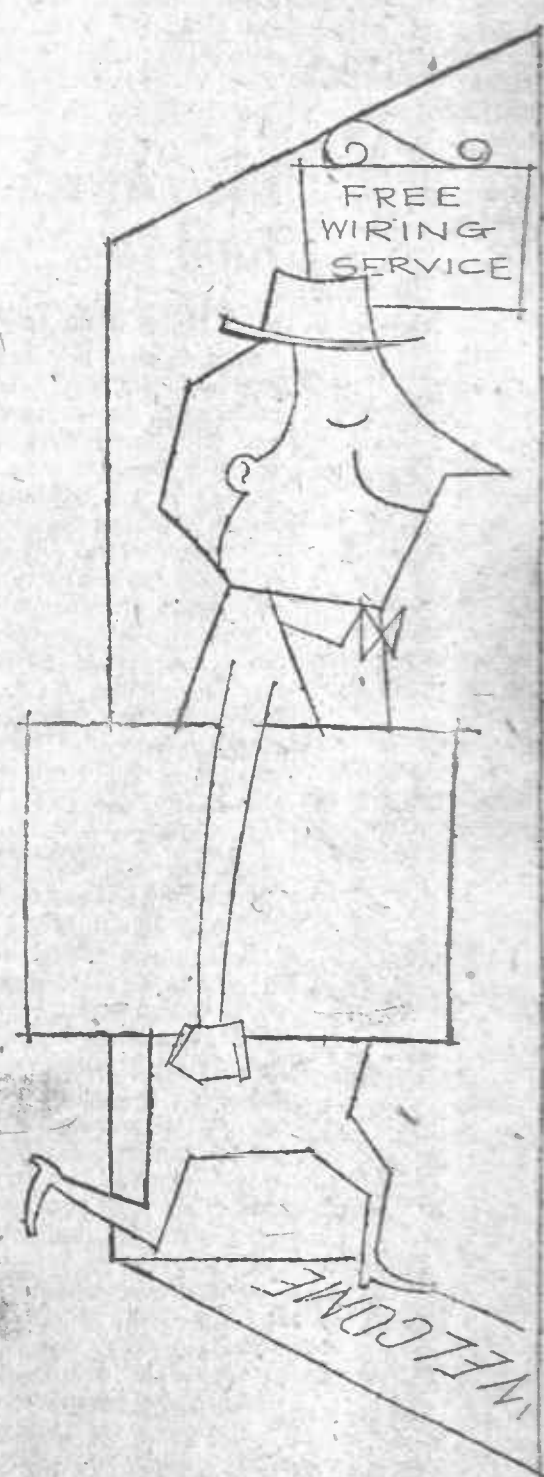

Friend of God

Lesson for May 12, 1957

COUNTED a saint by three religions, Abraham is unique among the great men of the world. The Mohammedan name for him is simply "The Friend," meaning Friend of God. His greatness is not in anything that is especially admired and paid highly for in America, so that his reputation among us is

not what he deserves. He was not a noted business man, executive, or popular novelist; no oil was ever discovered on his property. However, he might be introduced to an American audience as a successful cattleman. Even small boys might be interested to know that he was extra good as a deputy sheriff. But these facts were not the main point about him.

Faith That Works

The big fact about Abraham was his religious genius. To some persons God seems very dim. Even Abraham's father worshipped "other gods"—we have no idea how many. But Abraham, out of an idolatrous home, came forth a man for whom God was his closest and most real Friend. To use the Bible word, Abraham was a man of faith. In one book of the New Testament (Romans) Paul says that Abraham was "justified"—that is, God looked with approval on him—for his faith.

Belief

"Abraham believed God," it is said. No living man now knows how God spoke to Abraham. Long ago Saint Augustine debated, but did not decide, the question whether God spoke in tones that the ear could catch, or in a voice audible only in the soul. The point is that when Abraham knew it for God's direction, or God's promise, he believed that what God said was true. God made some pretty unlikely promises to him: that he would have a son at all was very unlikely; that this son's descendants would be more numerous than the stars was equally unlikely; that they would live in and own the countryside where Abraham was a landless nomad was still more improbable; but most incredible of all was that through Abraham's descendants the whole earth should be blessed. Yet we are told that Abraham believed all these things; and indeed they all came true.

Obedience

It is one thing to believe that what God says is true; it is another thing to set about living by that truth. Many a person will stand up for the proposition that the Bible is the inspired Word of God, but simply won't act and live in accordance with what the Bible plainly teaches. Such "faith" as James said is "vain"—but Abraham's faith was not vain. He took God at his word; when God said "Go," he went, and he went all the way. "Whatever my God ordains is right" is a song Abraham could well have sung.

Patience

Abraham's faith was shown also by his patience. Most of us are like small children, whose clocks show only two times, NOW and NEVER. If Father has promised a ride, or Mother a lollipop, the child wants it right this minute. If it's not to be had, tears fall and wails arise. If I can't have it now, I'll never get it! So we pray and expect an answer as if it were by return mail. We can't trust God to time his blessings. Abraham knew better. He was willing to wait. Indeed some of the promises God made to him he never lived to see. But he did not think that God had cheated him.

Sacrifice

The story of Abraham's sacrifice (or near-sacrifice) of Isaac shows the endless lengths to which Abraham's faith would go. Psychologically and morally impossible for a sane American today, the act of child-sacrifice was not so impossible for Abraham, living as he did among people for whom human sacrifices were all too common. But it is impossible to exaggerate the meaning of this sacrifice to Abraham. It meant cutting off, so far as he could see, all the promises of God. Indeed it may well have seemed to him that God had changed his mind and was taking back all he had promised for the future. All this added to the deep love Abraham had for this child of faith, the child for whom he had waited so many years, made the act seem especially terrible. But Abraham's faith went the last mile.
