McKINNEY CROSSING is becoming more famous week by week. Not from any good that may come from the place but because of the destruction that is being caused there in bodies maimed and lives lost. The sharp curve in the railroad tracks and the undergrowth and overhanging trees to east set a perfect trap for the traveling north from highway 72 to Eastport road. Tuesday afternoon the trap was set, covered with a downpour of rain, when two of as fine young fellows could be found anywhere came to the crossing. The approaching train snapped the trap shut and ended out precious lives that can never be replaced. . . . Mere words are far too inadequate to describe the horrible tragedy that happened. It is one of the saddest incidents that could have possibly taken place and the entire community is grieved by the loss.

OF ALL SAD WORDS of these two lads, the saddest are "It might have been". It might have been, had the railroad officials taken warning from previous accidents that happened at McKinney Crossing, the young men would still be with us. Had proper safety devices been installed the tragic horror of empty graves probably would not exist these two lads homes today. But alas, no safety devices were installed and we have to live with the oft-repeated sad words: "It might have been". . . . Shall we continue to be guilty of leaving a trap set to snuff out the lives of our people? Shouldn't we take matters to proper authorities and have something done about this death trap? . . . Famous McKinney crossing is a black mark on the community's safety record!

A GREAT STOREHOUSE of information exists at State College for the farmer. We paid that information a visit last Friday and were amazed at what we saw and heard. Little did we realize that the research and experimental work exists at that place. . . . Farmers of the county are urged to make use of this information as it is all gleaned especially for their benefit. . . . Woodall tower on Woodall mountain, stood 100 feet in height and was 908 feet above sea-level—the highest point in the state.

600 Scouts Enrolled For Summer Camp

Several scouts troops from Tishomingo District have registered for a week of camping at Camp Yocona, the Yocona Council's camp located in Pontotoc county. From all indication of registered units throughout the 12-county Council, this will be the largest camper season to date. The first 5 weeks are almost filled to capacity and a number of units have not sent in reservations. The lady winners in Tuesday's primary will be voted on again in the Town's general election that will be held on Tuesday, June 4.

A town marshal was not voted on in the primary election. Citizens of Tishomingo will again go to the polls on June 4 in a general election to vote on the candidates selected in Tuesday's primary.

2 IUKA YOUTHS LOSE LIVES IN TRAIN-AUTO CRASH TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Tragedy Occurred At McKinney Crossing; Was Second Serious Accident At This Place In 7 Weeks



Pvt. Bobbie J. Vess RA-14631181 recently completed a months training with Guided Missiles, NIKE, Camp Kilmer, New Jersey. Pvt. Vess completed his basic training at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas. He is presently serving with BTRY "B" 737th AAA MSL Bn. NIKE Franklin Lakes, New Jersey.

Two of Iuka's fine young men, Billy Pyle, 14, and Norman Curtin, 15, were killed instantly Tuesday afternoon when the auto in which they were riding was struck full in the side by a west bound passenger train. The tragedy occurred about 12:47 p.m. at McKinney's crossing, scene of many such accidents, though not as serious as this. Four people from Prentiss County on a fishing trip, were injured at this particular crossing on Tuesday, March 26. A curve in the railroad tracks partially obscures vision of oncoming trains at this particular point.

Billy and Norman were traveling north in an old 33-B Model Ford which had been purchased only a few hours earlier. The car was dragged approximately 330 feet from the crossing, the point of impact. Rescuers headed by Buster Marlar and W. J. Brinkley, appeared immediately on the scene and all attempts were made to save the youths, however death was instant and efforts were futile. The bodies were carried to Cosby clinic, then to the funeral home.

Young Pyle, son of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Pyle, member of Explorer Scout Post No. 26, had been chosen by the Yocona Council as a representative to attend the British Scout Jamboree in England which also included a tour of Europe. He was to have left next month. Scout honors bestowed upon Billy have been the Eagle Scout and the Order of the Arrow awards. He lacked accomplishing only one activity and that was attending Church camp to obtain his God and Country Award.

He was a member of the Iuka Methodist Church and the MYF of which he served as treasurer. Billy attended Iuka High School where he was a member of the school band and a member of the Pee Wee football squad.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon at the Iuka Methodist Church with Rev. R. E. Wasson assisted by Rev. Zelfred Smith of Corinth officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery. Surviving are his parents, and grandfather, Rev. J. H. Holder.

Services For Curtin To Be Held Today (Thursday)
Funeral services for Norman Curtin will be held this afternoon at 2:30 at the Iuka Baptist Church, Rev. Carmon Savell officiating. Burial will be at Snowdown.

Norman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Leonard Curtin. He also is a member of Explorer Scout Post No. 26. He had just completed his first year in high school, where he played with the Pee Wee football squad last fall. Norman is a member of the Baptist Church.

Surviving are his parents, grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Curtin and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Thorne, who reside in Alabama, and Mrs. Ella Daniel, great-grandmother. Pallbearers (serving at both funerals) were school mates of the two boys: Ellett Allen, Frank Brinkley, Earldene Enlow, Ben Kitchens, Richard Clark, Eddie Byrom, David Reynolds, and Trent Eubanks.

"This fact alone is enough to jar a community out of its state of apathy," stated Mrs. Trimm.

Recital Postponed

Mrs. T. W. Jones has postponed her dance recital, formerly scheduled to take place on Friday night of this week, until next week, date and time to be announced later.

The performance is postponed due to the accident which took place on Tuesday noon which claimed the lives of young Norman Curtin and Billy Pyle, Jr.

Steel Structure To Replace Old Woodall Tower

Collins M. Akin, area forester for Prentiss and Tishomingo counties, reported first of the week that old Woodall tower which had served Tishomingo and adjoining counties for years and years would be replaced in the near future with a new all steel structure. Work to raise the wooden structure was started on Tuesday of this week.

The old structure stood 100 feet in height and actually stood 908 feet above sea level, the highest point in the State of Mississippi. The new tower will be 54 feet.

The Forestry Commission feels that progress is being made by replacing the old tower which serves this county as well as parts of Tennessee and Alabama.

"It is another step toward helping the people of this county as well as moving the Forestry program forward to greater success," stated Mr. Akin.

Mr. Akin extends a cordial invitation to one and all to come to Woodall tower and see for yourself the progress that is underway to make Tishomingo county the most up-to-date county in the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

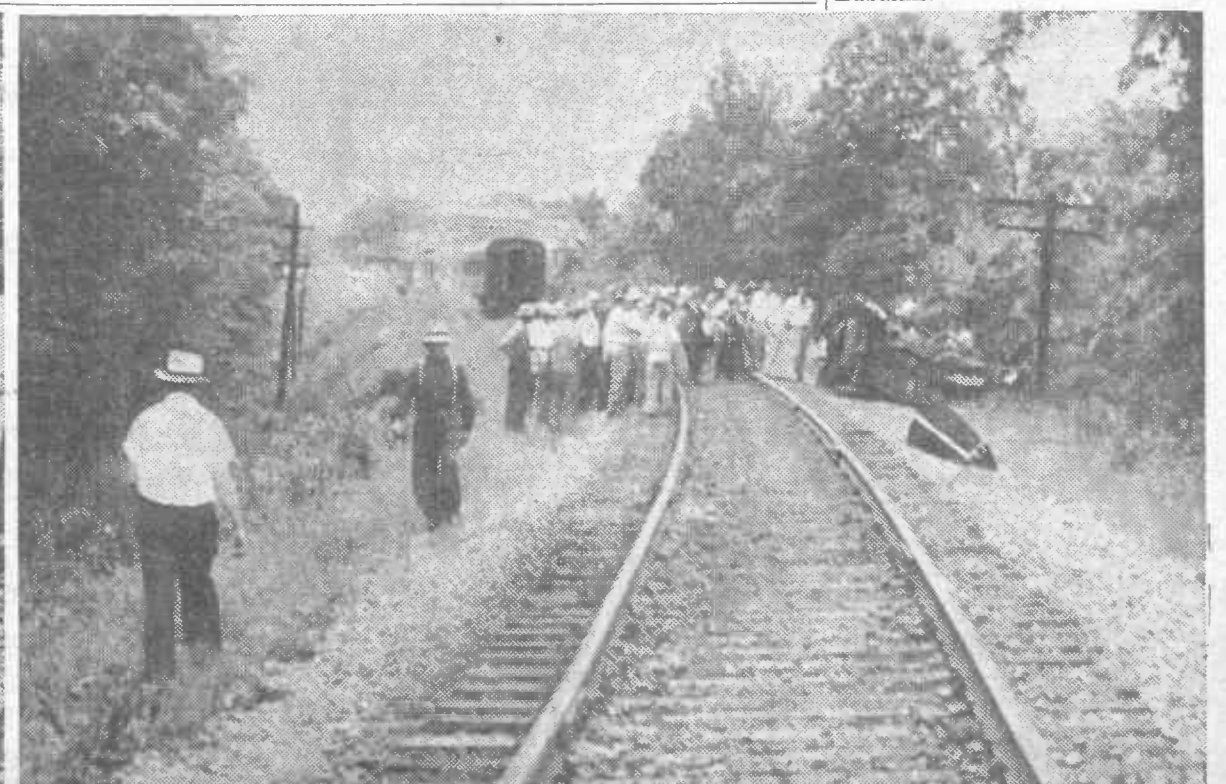

THE B-MODEL FORD in which Billy Pyle and Norman Curtin were riding when struck by west-bound train No. 35 Tuesday afternoon at McKinney's Crossing east of Iuka. The auto was purchased Tuesday morning just prior to the tragedy, and only minutes before, other boys—Ellett Allen and Frank Brinkley—had been riding with Billy and Norman. The fatal accident occurred during a heavy downpour of rain. Where the passenger train made impact on the auto is clearly noticeable by the curved indentation on the side that is up. A curve in the railroad track, along with overhanging and low bushes, east of the crossing makes visibility practically impossible when approaching from the south.



PARTS OF THE WRECKED AUTO were thrown along the railroad tracks. The car was dragged, rolled and pushed down the road bed approximately 330 feet before finally landing on its side as shown in the picture. Seven weeks to the day—on Tuesday, March 26—another serious accident occurred at this same crossing when a carload of Prentiss county citizens was struck by a west-bound freight train. That wreck was not as serious as Tuesday's, however, a number were hospitalized. Many other serious accidents have occurred at this crossing in years passed. H. L. SNEERING AT THE DANGERS OF INFLATION

A financial writer whose weekly column appears in many newspapers over the country takes occasion recently to sneer at the dangers of inflation. He says all this complaint about the 50-cent dollar is a hoax, and to prove his statements points out that all the world still wants it.

Well, of course all the world—all of us—still want it. In fact, we

probably want it twice as badly as we did when it was a 100-cent dollar!

His argument is actually no argument at all. It simply passes off the dangers of inflation with complete unconcern. The fact remains, however, that we do have inflation.

It is this unconcern on the part of so many of our people, especial-

ly our leaders—financial, political and otherwise—wherein lies our greatest danger. When people are unconcerned with inflation, then they will undoubtedly suffer the full effect of inflation—and if they will only look back at history, they will find that inflation ranks right along with war, famine and pestilence in producing suffering in the human race!

One of the great troubles with human beings, individuals and peoples, is that they refuse to learn by the mistakes of others. I read a quote in a London newspaper once that has always stuck with me. It read like this, "The Only lesson we learn from history is that we learn nothing from the lessons of history." Well, if you think about it a minute, that does seem to be the only lesson we learn, because so far in recorded history mankind continues to make the same mistakes over and over.

Here in the United States of America we like to think of ourselves as an enlightened people, as a free people, who will not be hoodwinked by false philosophies and who will not be misled by false leaders. It is time we sat down and studied history a while! Either the people must realize the dangers of inflation and demand an end to it, or their leaders must accept the responsibility that is theirs and bring an end to it. Otherwise, we shall undergo the same travail that has been undergone by all other nations of history that have disregarded inflation and its dangers.

Inflation is like cancer. Whether it is slow-acting or fast-acting, it results in eventual death unless it is cut out. Cutting out hurts, but it is better than dying! The

fact that inflation has been rather slow-acting in the United States has no doubt deluded many people. The fact that only the minority have thus far suffered from its effects no doubt accounts for the indifference of the majority.

One would think that of all people the financial leaders of our country, those who head up the institutions that are responsible for and should be most concerned with the soundness and stability of the dollar, would take the lead in the fight against inflation. Prominent among these groups, of course, are the banks and the insurance companies.

Since inflation started in 1933, however, when our Government took the completely immoral act of going off the gold standard, there have only been occasional individual instances of bankers and insurance company officials speaking out boldly against inflation. Only recently have the insurance companies as a group been undertaking a concerted drive against inflation—and of all institutions they should be most interested in seeing that the widow and children receive the value that they were expected to have when the policy was brought. Right now, they are receiving only half the value of policies bought 25 years ago! Banks, as a group, still seem to have no concern for the eventual value of the savings dollar which they urge depositors to place with them.

Our political leaders, generally speaking, take no stand against inflation, because under inflation they are able to promise the people anything and everything and fulfill these promises with printing press dollars—and thus get re-

ected. They don't want to destroy any system that provides such a nice set-up!

Inflation, as much as anything else, is a matter of morals. A full sense of moral responsibility

among the people, and especially among their leaders, would not permit inflation.

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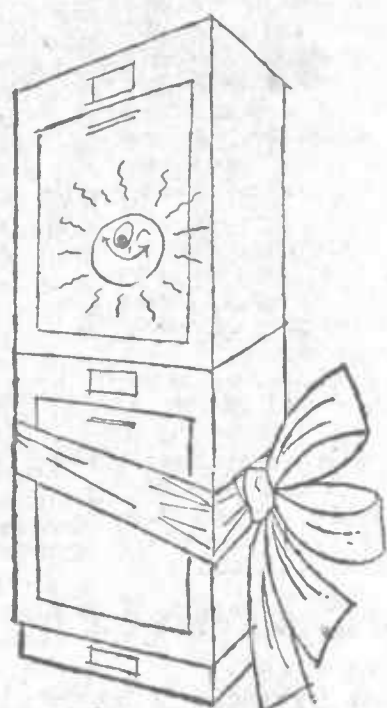

Speculative Trusts, Diversification Investing For Profits, Youth Importance Discussed By Columnist

Babson Park, Mass., May 16. I believe in Trust Funds, for both children and grandchildren. The ideal method is to leave one half of your money in trust, and one half outright. In the case of children or grandchildren, you save an inheritance tax by leaving the money in trust for them providing that your wife will have a life interest in the income.

There are three reasons for forming such trusts: (1) For the protection of your estate; (2) for the saving of inheritance taxes; and (3) to be sure your children and grandchildren get what you want them to have. All of this will be explained to you without charge by the trust officer of any bank.

What About Diversification?
A trust officer will properly diversify your holdings as to securities. This is also true of any money you put into Mutual Funds. Such Trust Funds, however, do not provide for diversification of management. My appeal this week is that you have several Trust Funds, each in a different bank so as to get diversification of management, as well as diversification of securities.

Trust officers are supposed to protect you against inflation. To do this they buy either convertible bonds or common stocks. Buying common stocks today, however, may be rather risky. This especially applies to the "Blue Chips," which trust officers like to buy

in order to protect their own reputations. This also applies to bankers and committees who are investing Pension Funds for corporations. Few of these trustees invest with the idea of making a profit for you or your heirs, but rather with the sole purpose of providing safety and protection against possible inflation.

Investing For Profit
In previous weeks this column has shown how you can build \$10,000 up to \$1,000,000 in 25 years without borrowing any money or without buying anything on margin. This would be by investing in new industries before the brokers and the public woke up to their possibilities. To accomplish this I believe that the \$10,000 should be divided into four Trust Funds of \$2,500 each in order to get competition between the different Trustees. A bank does not wish to be bothered with such small Trust Funds. Hence, it will be practically impossible to get four banks to do this. This means that you must get four individuals to serve as Trustees.

These individuals should be young college instructors, one in physics, one in chemistry, one in biology, and one in business administration. If you have a son or daughter who is in college, have him or her pick out four bright, forward-looking instructors to serve as such trustees. Otherwise, write the United Information Service, 6 Maiden Lane, New York City, which will help you. These individuals should be paid a good commission for their services, based on the results which they secure for you. This will make them more interested in serving you.

Having a number of trustees will also create competition and rivalry between these four college instructors.

Importance Of Youth

I advise a selection of young college instructors, rather than older professors, because the older men are usually more interested in their own reputations and have more fear of making a mistake. The Trust Agreements will, however, provide that the Trustees will not be held responsible for any losses. It will be assumed that one or two of the four trustees will lose money; but your goal will be in the total result of the four. No one person can foresee in advance which of the four will "hit the jackpot." This is the principle upon which you must work if you

expect to turn \$10,000 into \$1,000,000 in 25 years.

I am interested in having young people as Trustees for these "speculative" funds for another reason. Older men are constantly looking backward rather than forward. They want to see the audits of companies for previous years. These audits are more like autopsies. They are useful in helping a person to save his money; but are of very little use in helping him make a fortune by investing in new industries. Youth looks forward; youth is willing to take a chance; and youth is the hope of America, especially as to new developments and new industries. I would also like to see one of these Trustees a young woman. The President of the well-known investment house, A. M. Kidder & Co., is a woman. In fact, the majority of our nation's stockholders are women.

Investing For Profits
This is especially important for people in high income brackets who are compelled to pay a tax of 5 per cent or more on general income but would need to pay only 25 per cent of profits from securities. Furthermore, I am not advising that all your Trust Funds be of a speculative nature specializing in new industries. If, however, you plan to leave \$50,000 to some grandchild in trust, I certainly advise that \$10,000 of this be left with four forward-looking trustees, leaving the remaining \$40,000 in a Trust Fund with a bank, to be operated in the usual orthodox manner.

Plan Your Farm, Farm Your Plan

Farming by a plan is not really complicated. It's just good land treatment and management applied to the soil. Our soil deserves good treatment and management, for it is the storehouse from which nearly all our food and most of our fiber for clothing comes, directly or indirectly. If the resources of the good earth are wasted or destroyed by foolish management we will all suffer.

Quoting from an article I recently read, "It's a short, short story with a long, long effect." Uncontrolled run-off of water simply carries away topsoil, organic mat-

ter seeds and fertilizers. Wherever these vital elements may be deposited they are last to the owner, once they leave his farm. Often these soil materials, transported by the runoff water, settle out on, low lying, productive bottom land, as layers of mud or sand, lowering its productivity or completely destroying its value for farming purposes. Or it may clog and fill ditches, causing them to overflow and drawn out existing crops.

The Soil Conservation Service Technicians who serve the farmers of Tishomingo county through soil conservation district commissioners urge farmers to cooperate with the SCS and have their farm planned. The bases of such a plan is to correctly use the land. Plan the correct use of the land according to its capability, also plan the treatment the land needs. After the plan is made follow it and farm the land according to the plan.

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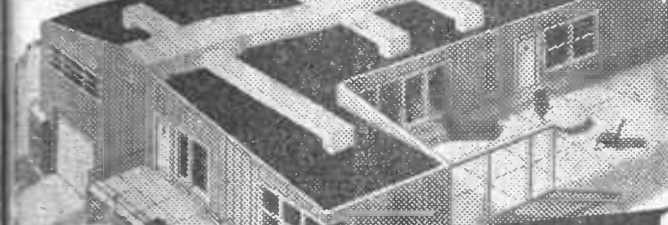

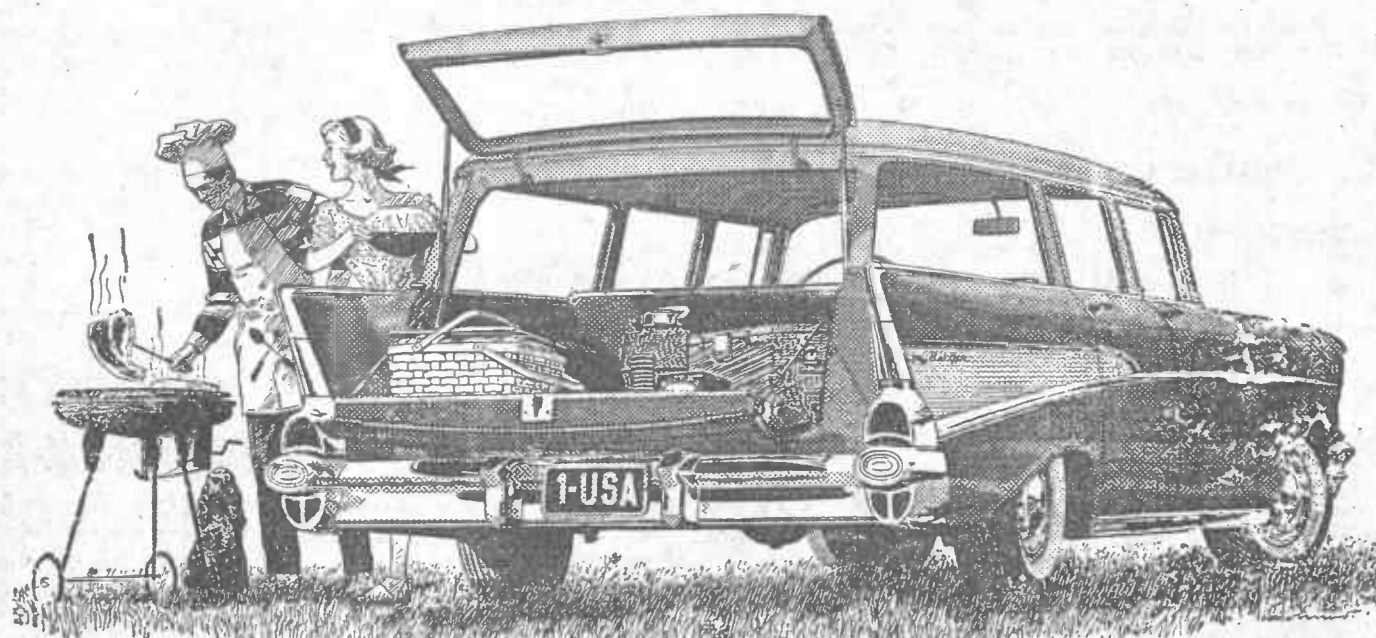

Agricultural Field Day Of Miss. Press Association Held On Friday

State College, Miss.—Members of the Mississippi Press Association attending an agricultural field day here May 10, were reminded that they are a vital cog in the machinery of getting information to the farm people of Mississippi.

In welcoming the group to the college, Dr. Ben Hilbun, president, told the visiting newsmen, "Lines of communication from Mississippi State College to all the city and country homes of Mississippi are kept open by your cooperation."

He also said that Mississippi State College information should reach every home in the state and until it does, the college falls short of its obligations, responsibilities and opportunities.

A feature of the day's activities was a panel discussion by members of the Pat Fulton family of near Louisville, who told their story of a successful cotton-dairy farming operation.

Speaking on the future of Mississippi agriculture, Dr. Clay Lyle, dean and director, Division of Agriculture, called attention to the loss of more than 50,000 farms in the state during the past five years. From this, Dr. Lyle predicted:

"The size of Mississippi farms will continue to increase resulting in more efficient operation. Production of livestock and poultry will continue to expand because of national advantages existing here; and acre yields of crops are certain to grow larger from year to year because of research in plant breeding, fertilizers, weed control, irrigation, cultivation, disease and insect control, and the farm application of this research through the efforts of the Extension Service and other agricultural agencies."

Word pictures of the inner-workings of the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Experiment Stations were given by M. S. Shaw, associate Extension director, and H. H. Leveck, associate director of the Experiment Station.

Both emphasized the value of local newspapers in getting improved farming and homemaking information to the general public. It was pointed out that county Extension workers and their local editors make an unbeatable team in getting information to farm people.

A tour of the experimental plots at State College showed visiting editors some of the work now underway toward building a better agriculture for Mississippi.

Louis P. Cashman, Jr., of Vicksburg, president, Mississippi Press Association, presided at the field day. A similar program will be held at the Stoneville Branch Experiment Station on May 24.

Press services of the Experiment Station and the Extension Service were outlined by Glenn Rutledge, Experiment Station editor, and Duane Rosenkrans, Extension editor.

County Agent W. C. Hamilton and Editor E. C. Holtsford from Tishomingo County Attended the field day last Friday.

Miss. Farmers Planting More Cotton Due To Stepped-Up Export Sales

Washington, D. C.—Mississippi farmers may be planting more acres in cotton during the 1958 crop year, largely due to stepped-up export sales under a program authorized by Mississippi's Senator James O. Eastland.

Agricultural experts say increased foreign consumption of American cotton will cut heavily into 1957 crop year cotton supply, already reduced by the soil bank program. In effect, a cotton shortage will be created which will require increased acreage to supply foreign buyers who want American cotton.

The practical result will be more cotton dollars in the pockets of Mississippi farmers.

Senator Eastland offered the export plan during the last session of Congress, and it was included in the Agriculture Act of 1956.

The year before that plan went into force—the 1955-56 marketing year—only 2.2 million bales of American cotton had been sold abroad, and surplus bales mounted up in warehouses.

But for the 1956-57 marketing year ending July 31, a total of 7.6 million bales have already been sold abroad, to be delivered before August 15.

In addition, eager foreign consumers have already purchased 2.5 million bales for forward delivery in the next marketing year and that amount should increase to 4.4 million by July 31—before the marketing year has even begun.

Thus, advance foreign sales for the 1957-58 marketing year are already higher than total foreign sales in the last year prior to the new Eastland Export Plan.

The total cotton supply for the 1956-57 marketing year ending July 31, 1957 amounted to 27.8 million bales. This included a 14.5 million bale carry-over from the previous marketing year, and a 13.3 million crop.

But this year's total supply will be an estimated 22.5 million bales—a reduction from last year of more than 5 million. That figure is based on a normal crop, reduced by participation in the soil bank, plus assistance of the export program.

Cotton exports figure that foreign sales should be such that an increase in cotton acreage for the 1958 crop will be needed to have adequate supplies in the 1958-59 marketing year.

Timber Losses Greater From Insects, Disease, Than From Woods Fires

Jackson (Special)—Insect and disease damage is annually cheating the nation of enough wood to build approximately 700,000 typical two-bedroom frame dwellings, nearly equal to the number of housing starts now being made.

Warren Hood, Jackson, chairman of the Mississippi Forest Industries Committee, said a two-pronged attack on the forests by insects and by diseases is doing about nine times the damage caused annually by forest fires.

"A new forestry publication, 'Our Growing Wood Supply,' released by American Forest Products Industries, Inc., Washington, D. C., reveals these & other important facts about our renewable forest resource," said Hood. "Still, we are each year growing more wood than we are cutting."

Hood's committee represents A-FPI in Mississippi.

"Fires, large or small, are spectacular and they overshadow insect and disease damage," the industry chairman said. "Fire takes a huge toll, but the other combination takes a far bigger toll than most people realize."

The Jackson lumberman, whose own forester is always on the alert for insect and disease damage on the company's lands, said facilities for combatting this menace are far better than they were even 10 years ago.

"There are more foresters at work in the nation's forests to recognize and report infestations immediately," he said. "There are more effective poisons and better facilities for actually fighting back. Better forest harvest methods allow quick salvage & removal of infested timber from areas where healthy trees remain."

Hood said that insect damage was worst in the older timber stands of the West and that fire damage was worst in the South.

"But we are losing dollars to both fire and insect damage in Mississippi," he added, "and we can't slow up one bit in the fight against them."

County Agent news

Silage

and ryegrass make excellent silage. If you have more oats or corn than cattle can graze, put in silo. If these plants are wilted before putting in silage, there is no need for a preservative. If harvested direct use 10 pounds of Sodium Bisulfite per ton of green material.

Sorghum

Each year there will be more sorghum planted for grain than in the past. This is one of the dry weather crops, and planted after oats or wheat

is harvested.

Use some amount of fertilizer for grain sorghum as you would for corn. I believe it would be better to apply all fertilizer at planting time, rather than risk a side dressing. This is especially true for any June plantings.

Planting rate is six pounds per acre drilled, and varieties for Tishomingo County are Texas 601, Texas 660 and Martin Milo.

Boll Weevil Survival

Boll weevil survival in the spring of 1957 is not as great as the past two years. Do not let this be misleading since weather conditions during June and July are the contributing factors to boll weevil population. Average boll

weevil survival for Northeast Mississippi, is 1,655 weevils per acre, and the State average is 2,091 per acre.

"I enjoyed my breakfast." That's what you want each member of your family to say, Mrs. Homemaker, as they leave for work and school. And you will want to echo it for yourself, too.

Chances are your whole day and that of your family will begin and move along smoother and happier when it gets off to a good start with a good breakfast.

Gulping a cup of coffee doesn't make a man feel equal to bringing

home the bacon at night, like eating a good breakfast does.

And do you think that breakfast makes you fat? That's just an idea that some folks have—it's nonsense, pure and simple.

Scientific studies prove that a good breakfast is vital to the success of any reducing plan. Just think now. If you eat a good breakfast, you don't feel hungry at mid-morning and are not tempted to nibble high-calorie snacks or to overeat at lunch time.

Think about this too: During the day's activities you use up calories from food eaten early in the day. But calories from food you eat later in the day are often not used up because as the day wears on your activities slow down.

Curtain Hints

The quickest way to get curtain hems even and straight is to adjust the hems as you would on a skirt. Hang the un-hemmed curtains in place. Use a yardstick to measure from the floor to the desired length, then mark the hem. After pinning, remove curtains from rod, turn up hem along the line of the marking, hem and press. Tie-back curtains will be the same height on each window if you pull your shade to the desired height and then adjust the tie-backs.

Children And Crayons

Give a child a crayon . . . and leave him in the room happily coloring a picture in a book. When you return maybe he'll still be coloring in the book . . . and maybe you'll find a vivid design on the wallpaper.

When this happens, don't try to remove the crayon stain with water or other liquid cleaner that may drive the stain deeper or spread it.

Instead, try one of these methods to remove the crayon marks:

1. Scrape off as much of the

crayon as possible with a table knife. Then sponge lightly with a cloth dampened with a fat-solvent such as carbon tetrachloride, acetone or denatural alcohol. Work with cleaning solvents in a well ventilated room and avoid breathing any of the fumes. Do not use where there is a flame.

2. Apply a blotter to the crayon

spots and press over the blotter with a warm iron.

3. If some grease stain remain, apply a thick layer of fuller's earth, cornmeal, cornstarch or talcum powder to the spots. After 24 hrs., lightly brush off the powder. Whatever way you use, test it first in an inconspicuous place.

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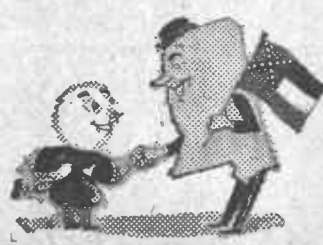
