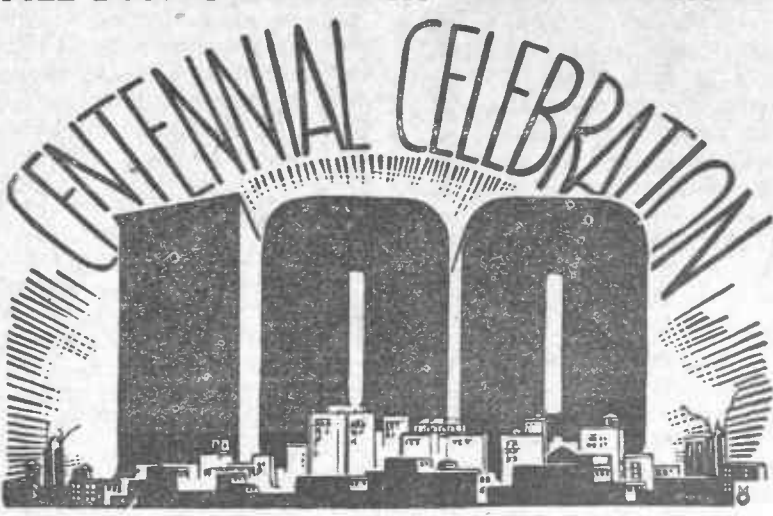

Iuka is 100 years old this year and to commemorate the passing of the century marker, a giant one-day celebration is being planned for Thursday, July Fourth when citizens of the Town and the entire surrounding area are expected to gather in Mineral Springs park for the event. Tishomingo Primary Favors Return of 4 Present Officials

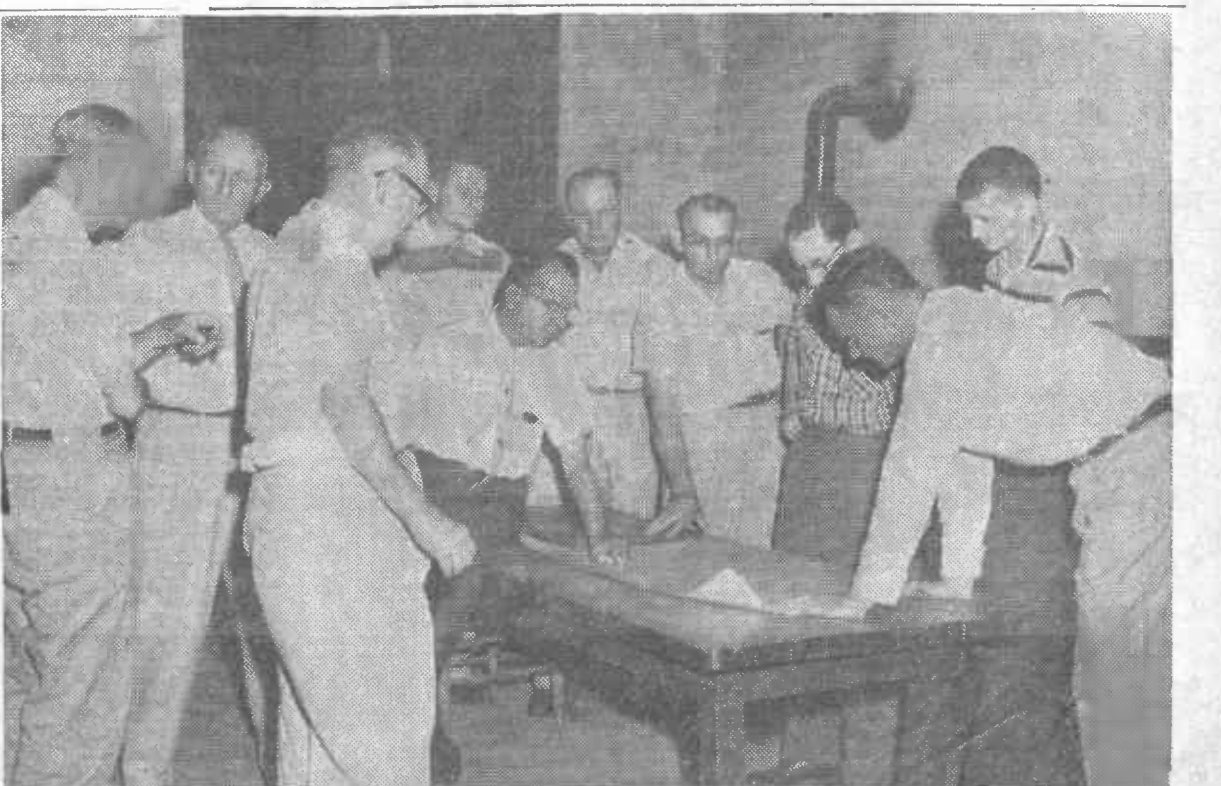

SENSING THE NEWS

"THE HORSE AND BUGGY AGE"

The story is told of the little boy who said to his grandfather, "I have to write an essay in school showing that the white man is smarter than the Indian. Will you help me?"

The grandfather replied, "Why, of course." But then he got to thinking, and he finally said to his grandson, "I don't know about that. Back in the days of the Indians there were no taxes, there was no national debt, there was plenty of hunting and fishing, and the

women did all the work. No, I'm sorry, but I can't help you write on the subject."

This, of course, is an extreme illustration, but it does serve to point up a fallacy in thinking that has permeated the country for at least the last twenty-five years; namely, that all past ways of doing things are necessarily wrong and are not applicable to present day living.

We saw this attitude crop out in the early days of the New Deal,

when the Government threw honesty to the winds by going off the gold standard and began trying to spend itself out of a depression. Those who led this movement said that those not in agreement therewith simply belonged to the "horse and buggy" age and were therefore not competent to pass judgment on this modern way of doing things. Instead of replying to honest criticism with facts, they simply said the critics were old-fashioned and out-of-date.

Many strange new theories were developed in those days—modern, up-to-date theories—such as "It makes no difference how much we owe so long as we owe it to ourselves" and "A large debt is a national blessing." Under the former philosophy, we have increased our national debt from \$19 billion to \$275 billion. Under the latter, we are apparently well on the road toward eternal bliss, as we have passed through some of the most prosperous years in our history increasing the debt instead of decreasing it and seem determined to pass it on to our children as if we were in no way responsible for it.

But those not in accord with these ideas and practices, say the proponents thereof, are just trying to "turn back the clock," they belong to "the horse and buggy age." Such comments are supposed to be devastating answers, but they are actually not answers at all; they just dodge the issue.

However, this philosophy has been promulgated among us so long by the intellectuals of "modern living" that it has pretty well permeated the thinking of many people and is going to be hard to shake off. Just recently, in answer to criticism of his record peacetime budget, the President observed that "In this day and time we cannot limit ourselves to the governmental processes that were applicable in 1890. We have got to

RETAILING & ADVERTISING DISCUSSED

Babson Park, Mass., May 30. One of the most helpful new movements today is a Club of One Thousand Members who have banded themselves together to help sell merchandise. They believe that the consumer is the ultimate determining factor in making business good or bad, and in regulating employment. Prosperity or depression depends not wholly on Washington or the nation's bankers, advertisers, or even manufacturers. The humble consumer of every city, town, and country crossroad also has the future of American business in his or her hands.

Results of Advertising Can be Multiplied 300 per cent

American manufacturers are today spending billions to advertise their products in magazines, newspapers, and through the radio and TV. These most attractive advertisements are read or heard by millions, usually in the evening or during week ends. The readers, and especially the followers of radio and TV, are not the nearest store where they can quickly see, feel, and buy the product advertised.

These One Thousand Club Members, most of them living in humble homes, and many disabled, have joined forces to tell consumers by telephone the name of the retailer they should immediately contact. They then report to the manufacturer or his representative the name of the prospect making the inquiry. These One Thousand Club Members in one thousand cities, covering eighty percent of the consumers in 10,000 communities, will operate under the name of United Information Service. This name will be listed in one thousand telephone directories.

adapt the great principles of the Constitution to the inescapable industrial and economic conditions of our times." In other words, the principles of 1890 belong to the "horse and buggy" age and do not apply now. Shades of Cleveland and McKinley!

These proponents of "modern living" seem to confuse principles with material progress. Our standard of living has increased greatly over the years, but our principles of living have not changed—and will not change. Thrift is just as much a virtue now as it ever was. Honesty is still the best policy. Living within your income is still something to be desired. Payment of debts is still to be commended. Just because all these principles belonged to the "horse and buggy" age does not mean that they are to be abandoned during this modern age.

Some day our own age will undoubtedly be known as "a horse and buggy age," but the moral and economic principles by which we should be living will not have changed, any more than they have changed down through the ages. The Ten Commandments were laid down during one "horse and buggy" age. The Sermon on the Mount was preached during another "horse and buggy" age. We should adhere to these fundamental principles, not depart from them. That "old time religion" which was good enough for our fathers and our mothers is not something to be ashamed of and abandoned.

Retail Clerks Must Wake Up

This humble group, however, is not satisfied with the work above described. They insist that consumers who read the advertisements and listen to the radio and especially TV, are entitled to better service at the stores. The Club Members have found that, after they get people into the stores, they do not get proper attention. Although their study has not been completed, yet they have some definite suggestions with which to start. First, they are convinced that the owner of the store and each clerk should have some distinctive coat of the same color. The owner could have a star on his sleeve, and the clerks could have bars to indicate their years of service. The One Thousand Club Members would like to get all store personnel to adopt a certain shade of orange or crimson to distinguish them quickly from customers. This would apply to stores with one clerk or many clerks.

A second "must" in the case of large stores—especially the leading "Dime Stores," and all others using self-service—there should be a number hanging over each counter, with a bell. This bell would be for customers to ring, so they could ask for help and direction to counters carrying the articles they desire to buy. The club members are certain that these bells would materially increase sales in all stores and that they will become a necessity in the new large stores being built in shopping centers.

Use Of Roller Skates

I will not blame this final thought on the Members of the One Thousand Club, but will take the responsibility for it myself. It is this—that clerks in large stores should wear roller skates. Soon after birth the baby has a ride in an automobile and uses it more every year until death. The entire nation is going to wheels. Most retail clerks come to the store where they work either in an automobile or on a bicycle. They know it saves time and is more efficient. Why then do they return to the "horse and buggy" era and depend upon walking as soon as they enter the retail store at which they work? I am convinced that roller skating is coming back into general use.

I forecast that not only will we see clerks on roller skates, but also a majority of pedestrians on roller skates on sidewalks. Expenses of retailers are constantly advancing. The continual marking up of retail prices ultimately retards business. Clerks must do more to help retailers make a fair profit, or the stores will close and they will be out of a job. This means that clerks must do more to promote sales, and especially speed up their travels about the store. The entire nation is going on wheels from babyhood through life. This movement must be capitalized by retailers. However, please do not blame this last suggestion on the Club of One Thousand.

The widespread practice of motorist signaling motorist regarding radar locations, Scarbrough confesses, first irritated Patrolmen, but they soon found that the signaling boomeranged in favor of the Patrol's safety program.

Now drivers passing through radar are still blinking their headlights 50 miles away from the scene, at other motorists who in most cases aren't going but to the next town.

But everyone slows up to a legal speed because they keep thinking the radar machine must be around the next bend.

One Patrolman reported that when he took a trip with his family to the Coast recently, "I blinked the lights on my personal car all the way to the Gulf and back—at every driver I thought may be driving a little too fast."

ed with all the commonly used insecticides applied in various ways, including ground equipment and airplanes. Insecticides are applied in the form of dusts, granules, and liquids. Various rates and times of application are being compared in a very complete study of the problem.

"One of the problems," according to Entomologists R. E. Hutchins and H. B. Green, "is that of finding a poison bait that is attractive to the ants. A large num-

ber of materials have been tested with little or no success. When a hill is broken into the ants boil out in tremendous numbers and sting viciously but so far as actually eating a poison bait, they do not seem interested.

"It is probable that no insect in our history has sprung into notoriety as rapidly as the imported fire ant. It is believed that the sudden explosive abundance of colonies over Miss., has resulted from favorable colony-founding conditions.

itions. During the past year or so the colonies suddenly became large enough to see and to cause trouble."

Dr. Hutchins and Mr. Green have published an article describing the ants and listing current recommendations for their control. It appears in the May issue of Mississippi Farm Research and is available on request without cost at the Experiment Station, State College, Mississippi.

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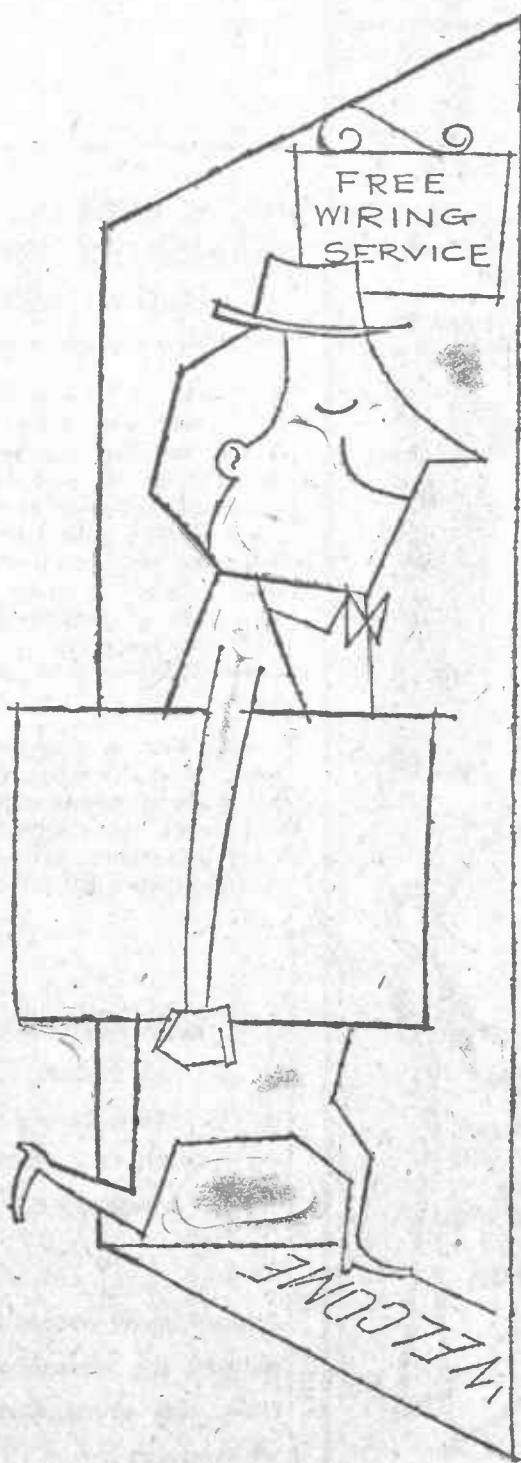

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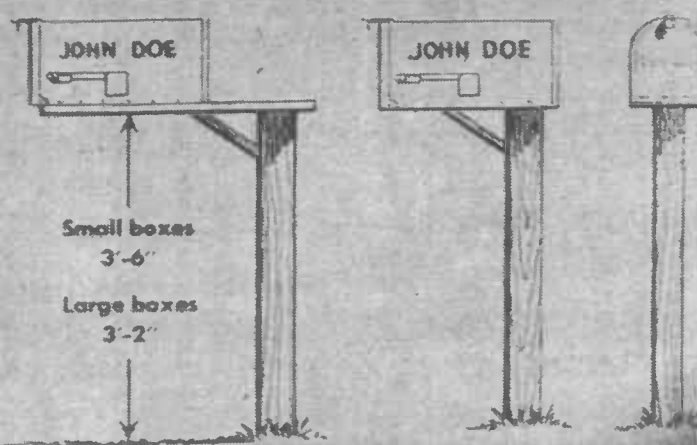
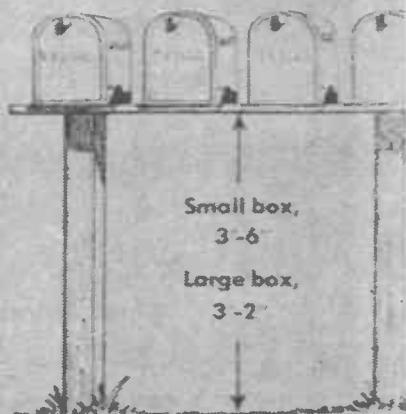
SUGGESTED WAY TO GROUP BOXES

JUNE 3 THRU 15 DESIGNATED AS RURAL MAIL BOX IMPROVEMENT WEEK

Iuka Postmaster Isaac M. Jackson in connection with "Rural Mail Box Improvement Week, June 3-15, points out that a rural mail box can be a thing of beauty or an eyesore which detracts from all the efforts of a homeowner to improve his home and property.

In recognition of this small but important fact of a neat appearing mail box, the U. S. Post Office Department has set aside the period of June 3-15 as Rural Mail Box Improvement Week, and Post

master Jackson is appealing to his patrons to participate in the "fix up" program.

As visual proof of the postmaster's contention, printed here is a picture of how many rural mail boxes look. As a contrast, another picture shows the proper manner in which boxes should be erected.

Pointing out that cities are currently in the process of conducting "cleanup week's," Mr. Jackson said he did not think rural and suburban residents would

want to be outdone, and he thinks the mail box is a good place for a beginning.

For the benefit of patrons who will fall in line and participate with the program, the following list of specifications as set forth by the Post Office Department should be used as a guide.

SPECIFICATIONS

"There are three approved sizes of mail boxes for use on rural routes. Size 1 is approximately 19 inches long, 6½ inches wide, and

8½ inches high. Size 1-A is approximately 21 inches long, 8 inches wide, and 10½ inches high, with a letter slot in the door. Size 2 is approximately 23½ inches long, 11½ inches wide, and 13½ inches high. (Most hardware type stores handle Departmental approved mail boxes.)

"Painting and Identification: The Post Office Department prefers that all mail boxes, post and supports be painted either white or aluminum. However, other colors are permissible. The name of the owner of each box must be inscribed in neat letters not less than 1 inch high on the side of the box that is visible to the carrier as he regularly approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped as outlined here in the picture. Advertising on boxes or supports is prohibited by the Department. Name letters should be a dark, contrasting color, such as a black or red on white or aluminum box. Each rural box is assigned a number by the carrier. Though it is not required that the box number be painted on the box, the number

can be secured from the carrier. "Post Or Support: No special designs of posts supports have been adopted. The use of supports intended to represent figures or mechanical objects is prohibited. Post or other supports must be of neat design; may be of wood, metal, or concrete, of suitable strength and dimensions; and may be either round or square, plain or ornamental, with or without fixed or movable arm. A receptacle for newspapers, not restricted to any one paper, may be placed above or below the mail box if it will not obstruct the view of the flag or present a hazard to the carrier. The height of the post or support shall be between 40-48 inches above the ground as indicated in the picture.

"Location: Rural boxes must be placed so that they may be conveniently served by carriers without leaving their conveyances, and must be located on the right-hand side of the road in the direction of travel of the carriers in all cases. In no instance should a mail box be placed on the wrong side of the road. All boxes must be placed to conform with State laws and highway regulations."

Farmers Have 20 Days To Dispose Of Excess Cotton; Plow-Up Rules Noted

Mack Sanders, Chairman of Tishomingo County ASC Committee, announces that recent changes in the 1957 Acreage Allotment Regulations provide that farm operators of overplanted farms shall have 20 days to dispose of excess cotton acreage because of circumstances of overplanted farms will have 20 days from the date of the excess beyond the control of the operator. If the excess cotton acreage is not disposed of or an extension of time for disposing of excess cotton acreage is not requested and approved within 20 days from the date of the original notice, the farm will be considered as an overplanted farm for the purpose of the act.

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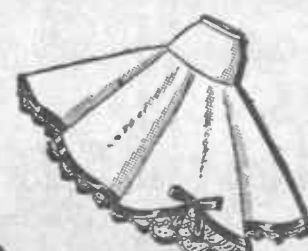

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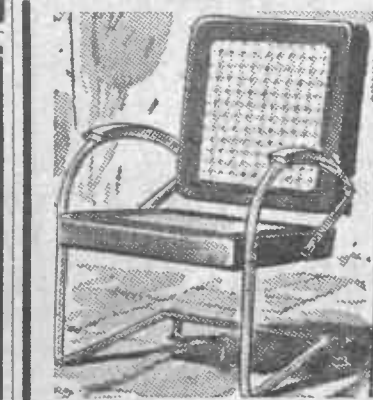

shows that plots cultivated four times made more cotton than plots cultivated nine times.
Cultivate as often as needed, but no more than necessary. Keep cultivations shallow.

Silage
Many farmers have tried Sudan or millet for silage and like it. These can be planted in June.

Where Sudan or millet are planted for silage, high fertilization should be used and the crop planted on good land. Where phosphate and potash are needed, 500 pounds of mixed fertilizer are recommended at planting time with a later top dressing of nitrogen.

If no phosphate or potash are needed, use 60 pounds of nitrogen at planting time. Then after the first cutting, put out 40 more lbs. of nitrogen as a side dressing.

Field Day
Experiment station findings on weed control in pastures, cotton,

corn soybeans and vegetables will be highlighted at a weed control conference at the Experiment Station at State College, June 5.

The field day activity will begin at 9 a.m. on the weed control plots at the South Agronomy Field. The use of herbicides for specific weeds will also be discussed.

Dairying

The wisest thing to do is to keep the small heifers in special pasture. Only when a special pasture is available and when some special precautions are taken should the heifers be allowed to graze.

Here are some of the special precautions: No mature animal should have been on the pasture for at least a year; even if a special pasture is available, the young heifers should have plenty of high quality hay and some grain.

A heifer fed on pasture altogether may have a full stomach but be under nourished at the same time.

You might get a little saving on the feed bill by letting the heifers rough it out on pasture, but it will likely be a costly practice later on. The heifers can become so stunted that breeding will have to be delayed several months, and you know that this can cost money.

Roots of Hatred

Lesson for June 2, 1957

If the hatred between Jacob and Esau today threatens the peace of the world, that is worse by the fact that it is going on for a long time. There is no hatred more bitter than that between brothers. The Bible tells that from ancient times, the implacable enemies of Israel, among those people closely related to them by race. Indeed, the stories in Genesis trace this intra-family feud to two brothers, Jacob and Esau. In the story of how these two brothers became enemies, we can see some of the same roots of hatred which have found anywhere in the world. One man or class or nation hates another.

Inherited Quarrels

As Jacob and Esau grew, hatred seemed to be all on one side. Jacob may have despised his brother, or feared him; but there is no evidence that Jacob hated Esau as Esau hated Jacob. It takes two to make a quarrel, but only one to hate. . . . Or is that quite true? The roots of hatred are not always the hater; they may be in the one who is hated, or they may be in either one. Part of the reason Jacob and Esau, though brothers, were not brotherly, was not fault at all. In their home and mother were at odds. Their father and Rebekah's mother had different, even opposing temperaments. The two being quite different from each other, their parents at once sides. The mother played Jacob's favorite, while old Isaac, best for the other brother, Esau. Can be said that humanly speaking coming up in a divided Jacob and Esau could never grown up in peace. They inherited quarrels never bitter—usually more so.

Low-down and Crooked

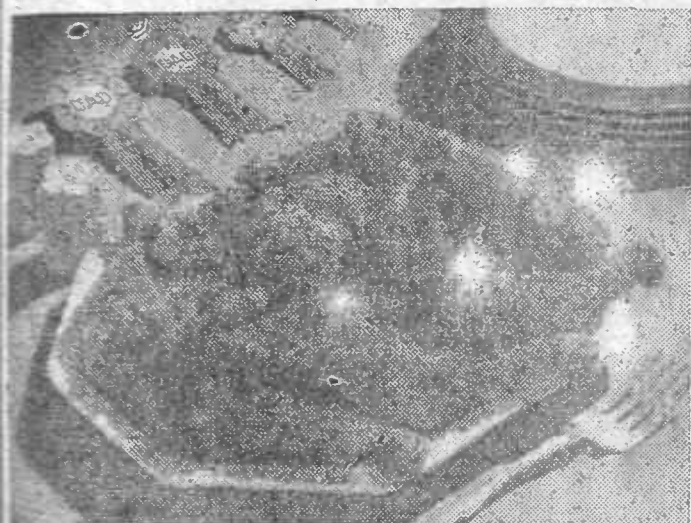
If one root of the hatred Esau bore to his brother was traced to their parents, certainly must be traced to himself. He was hated because he was hateful. As Billy Sunday said, Jacob in his young manhood was so low-down he had to hide a tree to look a snake in the eye and so crooked he could hide a corkscrew. The fact of the birthright has not decided fishy about it. So torians believe that Esau was legally (as laws were at that time) disposed of his birthright as inalienable. He was so much the hater that a bowl of food looked bigger and more than all the power and ability of a great birthright by no means as near said, and he had no right all the blame for the loss on his brother. But he did thing rankled in his heart, never, for years, forgot it. So hatred may be partly the of inherited quarrels, and partly rooted in a hatred on the part of the one who hates. But these other roots will in time unless they receive from the root that goes to the hater's soul. Confronted with jealousy, and nourished, brings forth then not even murder.

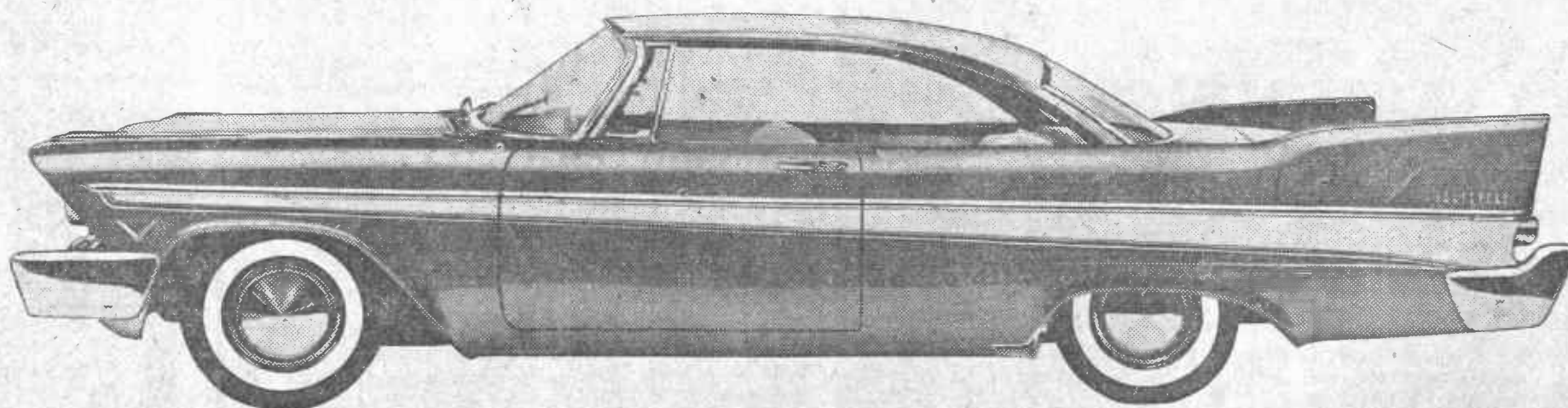
