MISSISSIPPI RANKS FOURTH IN PROPORTION OF WORKERS IN PULP, PAPER INDUSTRY

Jackson—Nine per cent of Mississippi's total manufacturing employment force is at work in the pulp, paper and paper products industry, placing the state fourth in the nation in this category, a forest industry spokesman said today.

Mississippi ranks directly behind Maine, Louisiana and Florida, said Warren Hood of Hood Manufacturing Co., Jackson, chairman of the Mississippi Forest Industries Committee. Mississippi was one of nine states in the nation which produced more than a million tons of wood pulp in 1955, latest year for complete statistics.

"These figures reflect the nation's increasing demand for paper and paper products," said Hood. "They reflect, in meeting this demand, a program of expansion and growth involving investments of approximately \$1.5 million a day in the three-year period of 1955-1958."

Light Vote Is Registered In Town Elections In County; Most Officials Re-Elected

Tuesday's municipal elections in the county registered a light vote in the four major towns with Iuka polling the greatest number—327.

An oddity of the elections is the fact that ten aldermen candidates in Tishomingo and Burnsville, all nominated in primary elections, polled the same number of votes—43.

Most officials that are now serving and who asked for the jobs again were returned to office. In Iuka, for mayor, John H. Allen got 199 votes to James J. Parker's 128. For Town marshal Chunky Chambers got 235 votes to Roy H. Bolton's 90. Elected as aldermen in Iuka were Sam Traylor with 265 votes; Elmus H. Curtis with 253; Shim Dean with 233; Bill Jones with 211; and R. K. (Diddler) Thorne with 174. Other

candidates for alderman, and their votes, were John Hubbard with 162; Elmo D. Davis with 142, and Felix Dugger with 136. Mr. Dugger is the only alderman of the present administration who sought re-election.

In Belmont where a grand total of 56 votes was cast, Mayor Noonan Deaton was re-elected without opposition, receiving 52 votes. Aldermen re-elected were Hershel Harris with 52 votes; B. E. Wright, Jr., with 51 votes; Lyman McAnally with 50 votes; Hubert Davis with 47 votes. New aldermen elected were Houston Ivy with 42 votes. A. B. Campbell, an alderman at present, came in on the bottom of the list of six candidates with 33 votes. T. J. Ozbirn, only candidate for town marshal, received 49 votes.

Also on the Ballot in Belmont was a franchise proposition to give the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association the right to give and maintain electric service in that town. The franchise proposition passed with 28 votes being cast for and 3 against.

Slight opposition was apparent in the Town of Tishomingo election, however, Mayor C. L. Trimm was re-elected over his opponent H. R. Bickerstaff who received 8 votes by write-ins. Mr. Trimm's vote was the same number as that cast for the five aldermen candidates—43. Aldermen elected were W. R. Nettles, Hastings Nichols, A. W. Dean, Henry Marlar and Carlos Ingram. In the election for town marshal—all candidates for this office were write-ins as there was no candidate listed on the ballot—W. W. Flurry got 22 votes; E. T. Gilley got 4; Albert Farris got 2, and W. R. Fugitt got 1.

In Burnsville where candidates were nominated in a primary election, Mrs. A. H. Montgomery received 44 votes and the five lady candidates for alderman received 43 votes each. The ladies elected as aldermen were Mrs. Ruth Floyd, Mrs. Dot Marlar, Mrs. Harry Rhine, Jr., Mrs. A. H. Tackett, and Mrs. J. C. Foote.

House Burns During Rain Storm

THE DICTATORSHIP OF LABOR UNIONS

Dave Beck has been getting all the headlines, publicity and attention lately. Walter Reuther's tactics had very little notice. Actually, what Walter Reuther has been doing is ten times worse than what Dave Beck has been doing, as reprehensible as have been the actions of the latter.

Dave Beck has simply been misappropriating the dues collected from the members of his own union. Actually, this is an internal matter on the part of the union. Walter Reuther has been violating all the rules of decency, fair play and individual freedom which are the very basis of our form of government and our way of life. This is a matter which affects the nation as a whole.

Possibly the reason Beck's actions have seemed so noteworthy is because, while it may have been suspected, it has never been brought out so glaringly before that labor union bosses have been appropriating unto themselves labor union funds on such a grandiose scale. It was generally known that labor union leaders lived in magnificent style, with large salaries and large expense accounts, and that the labor unions have in recent years built some of the finest buildings in Washington for

their union headquarters—but it was not known that in addition to these things, the labor leaders were in some outstanding instances using union dues for their own personal benefit.

Perhaps the reason Reuther's actions have been given only passing attention, at least by the "liberal" press, is because the public has become accustomed to the tactics of brutality and violence, of political pressure and economic boycott his union and other unions have used so many times in the past and are continuing to use.

This barefaced disregard by Walter Reuther and his union of all the rules of decency, fair play and individual freedom has been more brazenly brought to the surface in the case of the Kohler strike than in any other one instance.

Upon calling the strike in April, 1954, the U.A.W., in complete disregard of state and federal law, massed 2,500 pickets in front of Kohler's plant gates. All those who attempted to pass were beaten—kicked in the groin—manhandled—and thrown back. The small police force of the village of Kohler (population 1,800) was unable to cope with the situation and the sheriff did not even try.

When an injunction against

mass picketing was finally obtained after 54 days, there followed a reign of terror away from the plant—sneak attacks—under cover of darkness. Non-strikers' cars were dynamited; shotgun blasts were fired into their homes; individual workers were attacked and beaten. The homes of workers were picketed, their wives and children were terrorized and intimidated. The U.A.W. used the tactics of goons and gangsters, not those of decent, law-abiding citizens.

When Kohler was back in operation and the strike had failed, the U.A.W., in September, 1954, turned to the boycott of Kohler products in an effort to wreck the company. Referring to the national boycott called by the U.A.W., Don Rand, International Representative, openly stated, "That's what we're doing, wrecking the company." But the boycott, in nearly every instance, has backfired. All activities on the part of the U.A.W. have been recognized by the people generally for what they are—an effort to rule or ruin on the part of the union.

But the U.A.W. is continuing its efforts. The CIO has admitted in print, in fact has boasted, that it has spent over \$11 million on the strike so far. Emil Mazey, its secretary-treasurer, has stated, "If the more than 2,000 Kohler strikers paid dues to U.A.W. for 250 years it would not make up for the amount the union has spent at Kohler." These figures indicate as well as anything else what the U.A.W. has at stake, the extreme importance it attaches to its efforts to win out in the end.

Why have the union leaders been able to spend this much of the union funds on such a strike, a strike that many of the union members did not believe in in the first place? The answer is—because over 80 per cent of union members are captives of the union shop or more form of compulsory unionism, because they must pay dues whether they want to or not, because union bosses can spend union dues as they please, because union members operate under a labor dictatorship.

JUNE GRADUATES, NEW APPROACH TO WARFARE, CHARACTER DISCUSSED

Babson Park, Mass., June 6. Skyrocketing labor costs have forced employers to resort to unprecedented technological research. This research is teaching employers that they can get on without many routine workers. Even with the present high employment level, this should sound a warning note to high school and college graduates.

Push Buttons VS. Men

Out of electronics has come the basis for vast new developments in automation. A simple example of what I mean is the "electric eye" which opens doors at the proper moment without being actually touched by anybody. Another illustration is the record-changer and turntable on our phonographs, including the automatic stopping device. Of a more complicated nature are guided missiles that can chase and overtake an airplane without any human guidance.

This same principle of electronics is being applied today to operation of a manufacturing plant by a dozen employees, in contrast to the several hundred formerly needed. And remember that these can be women as well as men since their chief duty will be merely to press push buttons. Labor in general is not aware of the vast extent of the changes ahead. Employers, it is true, will always need human help, but not for a great many present-day jobs. Their requirements will turn more and more toward the intelligence and judgment of graduates with a high I.Q.

New Approach To Warfare

Russia has always thought in terms of massed armies to overrun Europe when the time seemed ripe for an attack. However, with the Free Nations of Europe learning to use nuclear weapons, wars are swiftly moving onto a push-button basis. The great masses of Russia, China, and the Moslem nations will be only a nuisance to clutter up a battlefield under such conditions. Premier Nehru recognizes this, and that is why he is so eager to remain neutral. Electronics and the atom will cause tremendous changes not only in warfare—but in education!

I envy our young people who are to graduate this month. They will have far more opportunities than we oldsters had. I wish the schools and colleges would wake up to these changes. Better pension off the professors who can teach only the orthodox old-fashioned courses, instead of forcing these courses on our young people so that they can get a degree.

Character Will Tell

I predict that the above changes will mean that young graduates will need good character more than ever before. Better training in homes, churches, & schools will be absolutely essential in this new electronic push-button age. Wise are the young people who take

If the people of this nation, through their representatives in government, do not bring an end to compulsory unionism in all its forms, then they will only bring upon themselves just what they deserve—a labor dictatorship over all the people.

evening courses now to prepare them for the better jobs ahead. The typical salesgirl is in the process of becoming obsolete. Before long she will be replaced 60 per cent by self-service counters, 15 per cent by push-button vending machines, and 25 per cent by highly paid, intelligent salesmen whose job will be to secure new customers. New qualifications are a must for the June graduates who hope to get good jobs. The field of advertising and selling is still in its infancy, and marvelous

opportunities exist for those willing to train properly for it.

What The Changes Mean

(1) Manual and routine labor will gradually become obsolete. (2) Those who cannot readily learn new skills will be kept on at reduced hours, but with the same take-home pay. This will boost the Do-it-yourself industries!

(3) Only the serious and intelligent employees will get raises. There will be no limit on salaries for those with the necessary character, brains, initiative, and loyalty.

(4) Our great problem will not be to raise crops, build homes, or manufacture goods—but to get

people to buy. Hence, instead of subsidizing farmers, we may eventually subsidize merchants and salesmen.

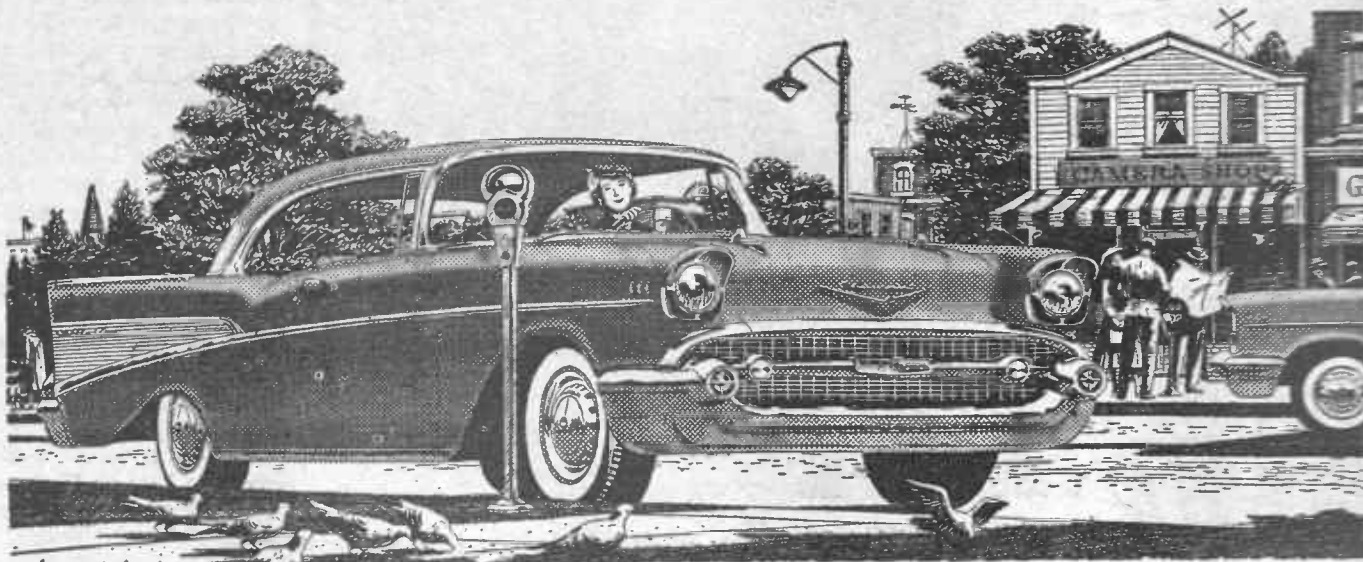

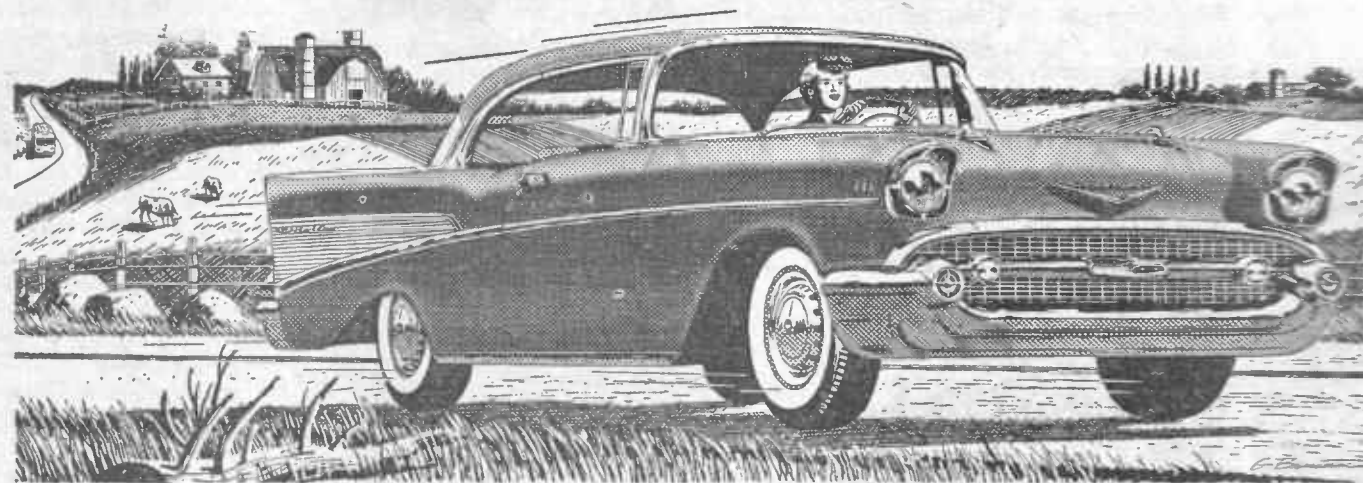

Baking Quality
Of Sweetpotato
Varieties Studied

State College, Miss.—The new varieties, Allgold and Goldrush, yield more than the long standard Porto Rico and produce greater profits for farmers, yet Porto Ricos are much in demand because of the desirable flavor of the baked roots.

Sweetpotatoes are often cured for about ten days in conditions of high temperature and high humidity before they are baked. During this curing period the starch content of the roots is partially changed to sugars. Also, in certain varieties the quality of the starch is changed, so that large amounts of dextrin and maltose are formed from the starch during the baking of the roots. This causes the flesh of the cooked roots to have a syrupy texture and somewhat of a molasses taste. This is evident in baked Porto Rico sweetpotatoes and to a lesser extent in such varieties as Allgold and Goldrush.

From tests conducted at the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station Dr. W. F. Jenkins found the following results:

"The Porto Rico roots baked contained more dextrin and maltose than Allgold. Porto Rico roots also contained more starch than Allgold when analyzed raw or baked; likewise, the dry matter content in Porto Rico was greater than in Allgold.

"The carotene (pro-vitamin A) content of the Allgold roots was three times that of Porto Rico. Both varieties were about equal in their ascorbic acid (vitamin C) content.

"From these results it might be concluded that Allgold is as nutritious as Porto Rico in most instances. If the natural flavors of the sweetpotatoes are to be altered with sugars, spices or flavorings as in candying or in making pies or puddings, then Allgold, or Goldrush would be just as good and possibly more attractive than Porto Rico roots for these purposes. If sweetpotatoes are to be baked and the natural flavors are to be enjoyed, then Porto Rico would remain the best variety for this purpose."

Grudging Tribute Paid Eastland By
Proponents Of Civil Rights Bill

Washington, D. C.—Senator James O. Eastland was paid grudging tribute by proponents of the civil rights bill in debate on the Senate floor last week, despite protestations by the Mississippi Democrat that such compliments were undeserved.

As Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Senator Eastland rose to the floor to counter remarks by Senator Paul Douglas (D-III.) that Southern Members of the Committee had engaged in filibustering and other tactics to delay consideration of the bill.

"I would like to make it clear that there is no filibuster in the Senate Judiciary Committee," Sen. Eastland said, pointing out that it is the duty of the Chairman to recognize the Committee member who first asks for the floor, and when a member says he does not want to be interrupted, except for questions, he has the right to proceed without interruption.

Senator Eastland described action on the civil rights bill as "effective deliberation."

"It is deliberate, but it is effective to persons on both sides of the issue," he said.

During his remarks, Senator Douglas referred to Southern efforts in opposition to the civil rights bill as an "acknowledged success", and as "nicely interlarded to delay and impede any effective vote on the civil rights measure."

Of Senator Eastland personally, the Illinois Democrat said, "The Senator from Mississippi is always courteous and gentlemanly in his manner and conciliatory in his approach."

At one point in the discussion, when Senator Eastland asked Senator Douglas to yield the floor for a question, Douglas replied: "The Senator from Mississippi is

very seductive in his manner. I can well understand how he is always able to keep bills bottled up; because it is hard to refuse him. He may go ahead and I yield to him."

Minnesota's Senator Hubert Humphrey also had a respectful comment on the Southern opposition to the civil rights bill:

"The Senator (Eastland) and his colleagues are like the Spartans at the Pass of Thermopylae. They certainly 'mow 'em down.' All I ask them to do is to relax for a day or two, and give us an opportunity."

Senator Eastland told the Senate that careful deliberation of the bill is justified since it is a measure which "would change our form of government and deprive the American people of some of their most basic rights, and I think we should go very carefully into the questions involved and submit to the Senate a bill that will protect the liberties guaranteed to the American people in the Bill of Rights."

Later on in the remarks on the floor, Senator Douglas asked the Mississippian: "When does the Chairman think a bill will be reported from the Committee?"

Eastland replied: "The Chairman does not control the Committee. He is in a minority."

Then Douglas said: "For a person who does not control it he is exercising very great control."

Boll Weevils

Boll weevils are moving into seedling cotton from their hibernating areas. They are stinging the terminal buds of young cotton. These early weevils are more easily killed now than they will be later in the season. I suggest that one or two applications of poison be administered now for early season weevil control. Five pounds dust per acre or one nozzle per row is sufficient.

New Cotton Poisons

Phosphate cotton poisons will be on the market this year. These insecticides are dangerous if not used according to directions and with caution. Phosphate poison cannot be handled the way ordinary cotton poisons have been used in the past.

Weed Control

Pastures are becoming heavily infested with weeds. Now is the time to get rid of them. Where there is no danger of getting the material on cotton, you can spray the pasture weeds with 2,4-D. If your pastures are near cotton fields, clip for control.

Planting Silage

If sorghum for silage has not been planted, it can be planted in June. You are gambling when you plant corn in June. If moisture is plentiful and you plant a late growing variety of corn such as Laguna, you will make good silage. Fertilize late planted sorghum or corn just like you do early plantings.

Planting More Sudan Or Millet

June is an ideal month to make a second planting of Sudan or Millet, or if none has been planted, a planting for temporary grazing in July and August. Prepare a good seedbed and cultipack following planting, whether it is planted in rows or broadcast. Put the fertilizer down at planting time. If you wait to topdress, it may be too late to get the benefit of the nitrogen. Many farmers are out of grazing during July and August on permanent pastures and a tem-

Reconciled

Lesson for June 9, 1957

AT THE heart and beginning of the Christian life is not a theory, or a set of notions, but an experience, an experience which is called healing, for the issues of life are made whole. It is sometimes called reconciliation, literally a turning-around, so that the direction and course of life is changed. It is sometimes called forgiveness, so that the church is called the fellowship of the forgiven. But there is another word still which sums up and expresses this central experience: Reconciliation. What this can be seen in the story of a man who never really found peace as no one does—short of being reconciled both with God and man.

Peace With God
There are two meanings (more) of this word Reconciliation, and at the risk of some reader's intelligence, a difference between these meanings must be pointed out. In one use of the word, we say we are reconciled to something we help, as a cripple becomes reconciled to the loss of his leg; a man is reconciled to his God. Some people are "reconciled to God" only in this sense: they recognize his power and they love it—but they still don't like him; they do not love him. This is true reconciliation in the sense. True reconciliation is restoring a lost harmony, means meeting with God in a way that all the resentments, all the hostility and fear of hearts is burned away by Presence, and we feel at home with him. This happened, essentially, to Jacob the brook where he wrestled the mysterious stranger; ever we make of that story.

plain what Jacob thought. "I have seen the face of God said. Before that day, Jacob had only one center of his life himself. After that day, God's man. He was made again. He had been at odds with God, now he was reconciled. God's will was thinking correct thought. God is never enough. He personally meet him, yield to him, be personally reconciled.

Peace With Man
Right along with reconciliation with God comes reconciliation with man. In Jacob's case, as with persons, there was one person to whom he had to be reconciled—his brother Esau. This man is converted, there is some particular person with whom he needs to become reconciled. It is an interesting fact that Jacob knew this well his all-night meeting with Esau. But his idea of being reconciled with Esau was to buy him to be friendly. He was paying him to be friendly. He was buying him large presents of cattle. After Jacob met him, he somehow knew that was not the way. The only way to meet his brother in person happened between them. It happened in their hearts, nothing that could be done in money. 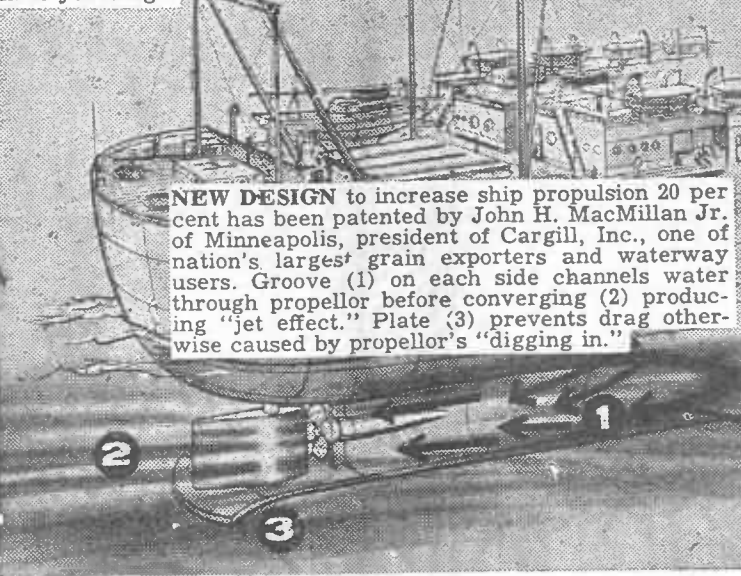

Pistol Team Of Highway Patrol To Fire At Fall Match In Biloxi

A five-man Mississippi Highway Patrol pistol team, with two alternate members, has been selected to represent the Patrol at Police Pistol matches.

High shooters—and subsequent team members—at elimination finals May 22 at Patrol Headquarters, Jackson, were:

Patrolmen Jimmy Warren, Holly Springs; D. E. Grubbs, Prentiss; W. P. (Bill) Kenny, Bay St. Louis; George A. (Jiggs) Martin, Jackson; Giles Crisler, Greenville; James Elder, McComb; and S. L. Green, Pickens.

Two representatives from each of the Highway Patrol's nine districts and headquarters had been selected in preliminary matches to "try out" for the team. All state patrolmen had been encouraged to compete.

Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough states that the primary purpose of selecting a team was to revive marksmanship competition within the Patrol ranks.

The team selected will fire at the forthcoming Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Pistol matches at Biloxi and at the Mississippi-Tennessee Peace Officers matches this fall.

Expansion Of Miss. Driver Licensing Program

The driver improvement phase of Mississippi's driver licensing program is being expanded, according to Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough, in an effort to further reduce state traffic fatalities.

Driver improvement is the watchdog over individual driver records, and motorists who repeatedly disregard traffic rules may feel the long arm of this program reaching for their licenses.

However, the primary purpose of driver improvement is to improve the standard of this so-called "problem driver," not suspend his or her driving privileges. The latter step is taken only in extreme cases.

Safety officials estimate that less than 15 per cent of all drivers should be considered incorrigible traffic law violators. Under the expanded Patrol driver improvement program these incorrigibles will be weeded out.

Processing cases of repeat law violators will be M. S. Willis, Mendenhall, and Maurice Laird, Jackson, two Patrol officers who recently attended a two-week school in driver improvement work conducted at Chattanooga, Tenn., under the sponsorship of the University of Tennessee and the American Association of Motor Vehicle Ad-

ministrators.

Patrolmen Laird and Willis are presently processing more than 500 cases where drivers have had three or more accidents or traffic

law convictions.

The Highway Patrol is presently receiving more than 150,000 conviction and accident records yearly. These records are placed in the permanent file of individual concerned, and are used as a basis for removing accident-prone or habitual violator from the highway.

Action taken by the Department of Public Safety can be: (1) a written warning letter, (2) a personal interview with the driver, (3) re-examination, (4) suspension.

State law requires that all traffic law convictions be forwarded to Highway Patrol headquarters, Jackson, and provides for the suspension of privileges of frequent repeaters.

remote control radio system, it enables the dispatcher to give better performance and enables repairs to be made quicker. Remote control radios are just one of many improvements having been made by the forestry program."

Akin also said that Woodall tower in the future will be one of Mississippi show places. A house will be built on the mountain in the future where the dispatcher and his family will reside. "We of the Mississippi Forestry Commission are proud of this new tower and the advancements being made in Tishomingo county, and the men in the county and out of Jackson deserve credit for working hard and long to complete the tower," Akin said.
