IUKA BUSINESS DOWN 15% IN APRIL '57 COMPARED TO APRIL '56

Data showed that business activity in Iuka fell 15 per cent during April as compared with April 1956. Indicators showed the following changes: money orders issued, down 7 per cent; postal receipts, down 22 per cent; telephones in service, up 10 per cent; and city tax collections, down 29 per cent.

Business activity in Booneville fell 6 per cent during April as compared with April 1956. Indicators showed the following changes: telephones in service, up 5 per cent; and city sales tax collections, down 53 per cent.

Ripley reported an increase of 12 per cent in business activity during April as compared with April 1956. Indicators showed the following increases: money orders issued, up 11 per cent; postal receipts, 18 per cent; and telephones in service, up 7 per cent.

Senator Eastland Will Speak At Iuka's Centennial Celebration On July Fourth



THIS EMBLEM will be used extensively in print for the next few weeks to help publicize and focus attention on the forthcoming Iuka centennial celebration that is scheduled to take place on Thursday, July Fourth.

The emblem was designed by Mrs. Hallie Little and Editor Gene Holtsford and the art work was done by Miss Carlyn Crawford and Mrs. Bonnie Bullard. The Emblem tells the story of Iuka.

The wreath of pine cones and pine needles represent our forests that have forever been present in this part of the country, and they also represent a product that has meant much, since the coming of the white man and civilization, to the economy of the area. Even in the earliest beginning, settlers used pine logs to build their homes and to make rafts to float hides and furs, caught in the forests, to market. Our pine trees have continued to play an important part in our community, and even today wood and wood products employ a great number of our people. It is commendable that a number of residents are taking aggressive action in preserving our woods lands and in reseeded much land that has been in other types of agricultural use.

Inside the wreath is a scene of Mineral Springs Park. The springs, as our history tells us, were used by the Indians long before the coming of the white man. The healing abilities of the mineral waters were known far and wide amongst the Red men. With the coming of a settlement at Iuka, the springs took on another significance — that of a recreation area for the white man. The springs were famous in by-gone days. Many older residents today can relate of the times when every hotel was filled with tourists, and every spare room in private homes was taken. The springs

continue to be an integral part of the community's life. The Indian head at the upper left corner is a reminder to us of the fact that another kind, another race, of people enjoyed the fine climate that we have here; and that he, too, chose the site of the springs for his meeting place. The locomotive in the upper right corner represents the coming of the railroad and one of the main reasons for the establishment of Iuka as a community. Our history also tells us that, prior to the coming of the railroad, Eastport on the Tennessee river, was the site of business for the area for a hundred miles to the south and to the west. But when the old Memphis and Charleston railroad was completed in Iuka in 1856 transportation was made faster, therefore Iuka became more important as a business center. The railroad also contributed immensely to making the springs more attractive to tourists.

In the lower right corner, the plow share represents the agriculture of the area — the greatest single factor of the community's economy. Most of our finest citizens of today and in the past 100 years have followed the plow and tilled the soil. It is still the greatest employer of people in the area. Also, in the lower right corner, manufacturing and industry are depicted by the small plant with smoke spiraling from its stacks. Always, since the founding of the settlement at Iuka, a certain amount of industry has existed. One example was the gravel pits east of town that were once famous for thousands of miles for the fine gravel shipped out. Today, our industry is of a different type but nevertheless plays an important part in the community's economic and social life.

In the lower left corner, the highline electric tower represents the coming of TVA which has meant almost an entirely new life for many residents of the area. Homes that used to be lit with coal oil lamps and equipped with wood burning cook stoves now have electric lights and modern ranges, refrigerators and deep freezers. TVA, in addition to affording employment for many years to hundreds of our people, has been a boon to the area in creating recreation in the form of fishing and water sports on nearby Pickwick lake.

Forming the top of the wreath is the cap, crossed gun and sword of a Civil War soldier. On September 19, 1862, at a site nearby Iuka was fought a bloody battle in which between 1000 and 1500 soldiers were either killed or wounded. Homes in the town were turned into hospitals and the citizens of that day did as we would today — they cared for the wounded and assisted those in distress any way they could. The Civil War had a devastating effect upon the community. Just getting a good start when the war came along, Iuka was headed for prosperity. But the defeat of the South brought poverty to many and ruin, economically, to all.

The magnolia blossom forming the bottom of the wreath signifies that Iuka is a portion of the Magnolia State and that the beautiful, sweet-smelling flower grows as profusely here as anywhere else in the Southland.

Senator James O. Eastland, Mississippi's senior United States Senator, will be the featured speaker at Iuka's Centennial Celebration that is to be held on Thursday, July 4th. Mr. Eastland accepted the invitation of J. C. Jourdan, Jr., to participate in the Town's 100th Anniversary festivities.

Mrs. Betty Ruth Brown and Mrs. Margaret McRae, who are in charge of the Centennial Beauty Revue, state that formal applications are being mailed to prospective contestants and that a number are expected to be entered by the end of the week. In order for a young lady to compete in the beauty contest she must be a resident of Iuka and between the ages of 15 and 25. She must be single. Out-of-town judges will be selected for this portion of the program.

Mrs. Ed Thomas and Mrs. Lucy Roane are making plans and shaping together a pageant that will relate the history of Iuka. This also is expected to be one of the highlights of the all-day program.

Greater portion of the 100th centennial celebration will be held in mineral springs park. The day will be started off with a giant parade through the business district and will terminate in the park. A full program will be presented in the afternoon and a dance will wind up the celebration that night at the high school auditorium. The beauty contestants will appear in bathing suits in the afternoon at the park and again that night at the dance in evening attire, at which time the queen will be selected and crowned.

SENSING THE NEWS

FOREIGN AID PHOBIA

It is estimated that by the end of this fiscal year, June 30th, we shall have poured out \$62 billion in foreign aid since the end of World War II. We shall also have at that time a balance of \$8 billion authorized for foreign aid but unspent. This amount, of course, will eventually be expended—who ever heard of a government bureau turning unexpended money back into the Treasury?—thus making certain a total expenditure for foreign aid of \$70 billion. On top of all this, the Administration is asking for \$4 billion more for the next fiscal year. That would make \$74 billion. And after that—on and on!

This nation of ours has become very similar to the punch-drunk fighter character of our favorite comedian. We hear birds flying over when there are no birds. We hear bells ringing when there are no bells. We live in continual fright when there is no reason to be afraid.

We are afraid communism will take over the world if we don't keep pouring out billions of dollars. We don't stop to think that communism is not stopped by dollars, it is stopped by ideas. We should do everything necessary for self-defense—but there is nothing in history to make us fearful that the ideology of communism will replace that of freedom.

The trouble is that we adopted a philosophy about twenty-five years ago that we could get any-

thing we wanted if we just spent enough money. We tried to spend ourselves out of the depression. This effort failed miserably. Now we are trying to spend ourselves into safety from socialism and communism. Any such effort is also doomed to failure.

Money just won't buy everything. In fact, in many cases the pure expenditure of money makes worse the conditions you are trying to cure.

As long as we keep doling out economic aid to other nations, these nations will do very little toward improving their own economic lot. As long as we keep pouring out military aid to other nations, these nations will do little toward defending themselves. As long as we keep giving nations billions of dollars because they threaten to go communist, they will continue the threat. In other words, as long as we are willing to keep passing out our billions, there will be no lack in the demand for them.

All this means that if we continue to look at our policy of foreign aid from the basis of fear and from the viewpoint of demand, then there will never be any end to it, because we can always find something to fear and there will always be those who will accept our dollars.

Who can say that our foreign aid program has produced any real and lasting benefit—to us or to the world? For sure, our own

national debt would be \$70 billion less if we had never started it. And just as certainly, those nations who believed in freedom would have maintained that belief, and would have regained a more real prosperity by attaining it by their own efforts in their own way.

We are not talking here about military alliances, about our participation in the United Nations, about trading with other countries—we are talking about trying to buy friends by giving them money. Has it worked? We helped Indonesia gain their independence and gave them millions of dollars. At their last election, they voted to go communist! Formosa owes its very existence to the U. S.—now they are rioting against us! The nations we have helped most—Great Britain and France—have now decided on full trade with Communist China against our expressed wishes! In many nations over the earth where we have given money are seen the signs, "Go home, Americans!" These are just a few of many illustrations of failure that could be cited.

Does anyone think the world would go to the dogs—or to communism, that our own nation would be destroyed, if we stopped our foreign aid program today? The least Congress should do is announce to the world that as soon as the \$8 billion authorized but unspent foreign aid funds are gone, then the program is ended. The whole world would be better off.

Hot Weather Food Care

Foods call for special care, as well as special thought to tempt lagging appetites, during hot summer weather.

In the summer good refrigeration is essential for most foods. Look at the packages in which foods come, and follow the instructions carefully for opening, reclosing & storing.

Canned foods keep best at temperatures below 75 degrees to prevent loss of food value. You can keep food safely in opened tin cans—if you keep the food covered and cold.

To keep bread from molding and drying out, store it in the refrigerator. Keep the "extra loaf in the freezer until ready to use it. Keep

sandwiches in the refrigerator ready to serve.

Refrigerate eggs from the time they are laid until used, and keep covered. Unwrap meats as soon as you bring it home from market, wipe with a clean, damp cloth, wrap loosely with waxed paper and store in coldest part of the refrigerator.

Store fresh fruits and vegetables in the refrigerator in covered containers or in cellophane bags. Keep left-over cooked foods cold and covered and use promptly.

Grass Stains

If you know the fabric is washable, first try rubbing soap or synthetic detergent into grass, foliage or flower stain. Wash the garment.

Test an inside edge of a seam or other hidden spot by sponging with alcohol. If it doesn't affect the dye, sponge the stain with alcohol. Use alcohol diluted with water on acetate fabrics.

For stubborn stains, you can use sodium perborate bleach.

Sprinkle the moist stain with bleach, gently cover the garment with a solution made of 1 tablespoon of sodium perborate to each pint of water. Let it soak several hours or overnight.

Use cool water for wool, silk and dyes, and hot water for other

washable fabrics. Rinse well.

For stubborn stains, use strong sodium perborate on the stain and dip it into very hot or boiling water. Rinse well and repeat if necessary.

Columnist Discusses Commodities, Materials & Fuels; Gives Outlook On Foodstuffs, Grains, Livestock & Textiles

Babson Park, Mass., June 13. During recent years, I have discussed in this column a wide variety of subjects, and I hope that these discussions have been interesting and useful to my many readers. Lately, I have been studying supply-demand relationships prevailing in some of the major commodity groups, and give below some of the highlights, as I see them.

Building Materials And Fuels
Total volume of new construction put in place, on a dollar basis, hit a record high for the first 4 months of this year. However, the sharp drop in housing starts in 1957, compared with 1956, is curbing demand for Roger W. Babson some key items, particularly lumber, plumbing equipment, and other materials. I see no immediate major improvement in this adverse situation. Nevertheless, the total dollar volume of new construction will hold at a high level—a fact that will make for a still good total demand for building materials in coming months. Supplies, for the most part, will continue ample.

I see nothing to worry about in hard fuels. Production should continue in good balance with requirements. These will hold at satisfactory levels, allowing for the usual seasonal variations. Liquid fuels also will easily meet current and prospective needs. Gasoline stocks, though heavy, probably will not prove burdensome, now that the season of high consumption is close at hand. Large imports of petroleum and heavy fuel oil are causing concern in some quarters, and will be sharply curtailed, I forecast, either voluntarily or by government decree.

Outlook For Foodstuffs
The overall food outlook remains firm. Supplies of most major items will hold at relatively

high levels. Supplies of meats, however, may be somewhat smaller this summer than last, largely reflecting an expected drop in the supply of pork. With pastures all over the country in excellent condition, milk production, from now through the summer will hold at a high rate. This should result in larger commercial supplies of dairy products, but heavy CCC buying should help maintain prices.

Looking ahead a bit, I forecast that new food crops, even with only average weather conditions during the important growing period for most food products, both fresh and frozen, will continue at a high level, reflecting a continued high rate of national employment and disposable consumer income.

Foreign demand for U. S. food products may, however, be less aggressive than it was a year ago.

Grains And Livestock
Despite government efforts to reduce them, our grain and feed supplies in the aggregate are still large. Early indications point to another large supply of feed grains for 1957-1958; the total may not differ materially from last year's record. Carryover stocks into the new season will be sharply above those of a year ago. These large current and prospective supplies should militate against any sustained price advances.

Supplies of well-fed beef cattle are by no means heavy. Currently, price strength prevails in feeder cattle, which have been in good demand. I forecast a rather heavy run of grass fat cattle, including feeders, this fall, and lower prices. Marketings of the 1956 fall pig crop are now well out of the way—and will probably be followed by temporarily higher average prices; but prices could turn sharply downward as marketings of the large spring pig crop increase.

Industrial, Metals, And Textiles
Demand for industrial commodities should be well maintained at good levels, allowing for the usual summer letdown. Supplies, for

the most part, should suffice. Industrial prices may even strengthen moderately later in the year. Supply-demand ratios in the metals group lean more to the easy side than otherwise, but no shortages are indicated.

The domestic textile industry, by and large, has been in the doldrums for a long time. However, I forecast some improvement during the second half of this year. Cotton and wool perhaps will be the best performers, although I forecast nothing in the nature of a booming market. Supplies of the basic fibers are ample for the months immediately ahead.

Weed Control for Corn

With heavy rains hampering farming operations and giving weeds a head start in corn, think seriously about using chemical control measures.

Morning Glories and Cockleburbs can be effectively controlled by using Amine 2-4 D applied at the rate of 112 to 1 pound to 20 gallons water per acre. This chemical does not damage corn or sorghum if spray is not applied to the terminal bud. Spray nozzle size to use is the fan type 8003.

CAUTION: Do not use equipment that 2-4 D has been used in to spray cotton, and do not use 2-4 D near cotton fields. This chemical is very toxic to cotton and will kill it.

Cotton Insects

Boll weevil, flea hoppers and thrip are causing damage to some cotton fields. Dust with 5-10 lbs. per acre with Dieldrin or BHC or spray with one nozzle per row.

Electric Safety

Here are some rules for use of electricity in milking barns. By following these rules, you may save yourself some big losses.

The service entrance switch should have ample capacity and be properly grounded.

The "neutral leg" of the entrance switch should not be fused.

All electrical equipment, especially water heaters, milk collers, pipeline milking machines, and disconnect switches should be properly grounded. This is especially important on concrete floors that are sometimes wet.

Pipelines serving the milkers should be equipped with an insulating device in the horizontal section of the pipe between the cows and any possible contact with current carrying devices.

ally water heaters, milk coolers, should be on individual circuits and properly fused.

Lighting circuits should be properly fused. Lighting circuits should only be used for lights, radios and small fans.

Metal stanchions should be properly grounded, preferably at both ends. Metal roofs should be properly grounded.

 "There is no such thing as an incurable disease—and no one need die in pain . . . There is no such thing as an 'easy' or 'difficult' case of healing in Christ's name."
 These are the words of an eminent physician, Dr. Christopher Woodward, who is combining spiritual healing with his practice of medicine and producing spectacular results.
 My own work as a minister of the gospel, and as one who prays for the healing of the sick has brought me to the very same conclusion: No disease is hopeless—none is incurable.
 Mrs. D. H., from Denver, Colorado, related this story a few days ago before our television cameras. She was holding in her hand at that time, two X-rays made of her 11-year-old son who had been pronounced incurable with a strange bone disease.

Then sadly shaking his head he said, 'I'm very sorry to tell you before he is in his late teens he will be a hopeless cripple. The bone is wasting away, there is no cure for this disease.'
 "What shock and emotion tore through me! Then—I saw much pity mirrored in the physician for my child. Suddenly I felt a strange power rise up in me, and I said within myself, 'No! No, my son. You will never be a cripple! I won't let you. As long as there is a living God you will never be a cripple.'
 "Strange as it may seem, immediately all my fear and distress left me. I felt tremendously strong.
 "Daily I asked God to help. During those days, faith rose higher and higher in my heart.
 "One day I felt that I should have my son X-rayed again although, only four months had passed since the first X-ray. The doctor said, 'It is a little too soon to be able to tell much, but I will check for you.'

 "Yes, I answered, 'something has happened,' and I pointed toward the screen. 'Doctor, the Lord has healed my child.'

A recent report by Dr. Ross E. Hutchins and Carl Hunsucker published by the Mississippi Experiment Station says:

"Two years' records are now available and it appears that with a few more years of information, we will be able to determine: (1) insect populations at a given period, (2) time of insect emergence, (3) peaks of abundance, and (4) duration of insect activity.

"During the year it was possible to correlate insect catches made by the traps with insect populations made by other survey methods. The true armyworm, cotton bollworm and fall armyworm were some that were correlated.

"Weather definitely affected the number of insects collected at any one time. Temperature was doubtless the controlling factor; when the temperature climbed, the number of insects caught increased, while at temperatures below 50° few insects were taken.

Family Tension

Lesson for June 16, 1957

"THE family is a divine institution. That is to say, it was invented by God. He thought of the fore men did. He intended that the family should be a success. So it should be a success. The family is also a human institution—that is to say, homes are made up of human beings. Every home therefore suffers from the ailments that nag at all things human. A successful home succeeds in spite of all the human handicaps. A home that does not succeed, fails because these handicaps are too much.

Tensions
 A favorite modern phrase these stresses and strains in a home is "tensions." The word is new but the thing is old. Tension is what makes the heart scream, and her mother screaming, "I can't stand another minute!" Tension is what makes meal-times regular, grounds, what give us nervous prostration and peptic ulcers before what may make children remember their childhood with a shudder. Disabled Persons Helped Through Vocational Rehabilitation Division

Total of more than 60 disabled persons of the Corinth District have been helped to get into suitable jobs this fiscal year, it was stated today by R. L. Thompson, director, Vocational Rehabilitation Division.

Thompson said the persons

rehabilitated were placed in employment suited to their abilities as well as their limitations. However, he pointed out that the number who have been helped has not increased because the vocational rehabilitation program in Mississippi needs more funds in ord-

er to be able to serve more people. "The disabled in Mississippi could have a Vocational Rehabilitation program twice the size of the present one," continued Mr. Thompson, "if we had adequate state appropriation to obtain two federal dollars for each dollar our state sets aside to help the handicapped."

The Vocational Rehabilitation program in every state is administered only by the State agency, Mr. Thompson pointed out. He explained that although federal matching money is available on a matching basis, there are none of the usual "strings" attached to its use within the state, as so many people think at first.

"The State Board of Vocational Education is the governing board for the operation of the Mississippi Vocational Rehabilitation Division," Thompson stated. He also pointed out that it was largely through the efforts of persons in the field of education that a program of Vocational Rehabilitations for civilians was first made possible in 1920.

There are approximately 175 persons now receiving some rehabilitation service in the Corinth District which includes Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Prentiss, and Tishomingo Counties.



Manage Your Fish Pond By Fishing It

By Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist USDA-SCS
If you put Bass in your pond more than a year ago, your pond should be heavily fished this summer and fall.

Fertilize and fish pond heavily is a good rule to follow for those who completed the stocking of their ponds a year or more ago.

For those of you who received Bass for your pond this spring go slow on the fishing this summer.

It is possible that you can catch most of the Bass you put in your pond this past spring and there will be very few to reproduce next year. Should this happen the Bream will multiply enormously because there will be few Bass to eat them. Soon there will be too many Bream for your pond. They will multiply by the thousands and be so small and stunted, of lack of food, that is may take

a dozen or more of them to weigh a pound. Should this happen your pond is ruined, so far as good fishing is concerned.

The local U. S. D. A. Soil Conservation Service Technicians urge all District Cooperators who have stocked their farm ponds to make every effort to keep the bass and bream in balance about 100 bream to 10 bass is ideal.

After the first bass put in the pond have reached maturity and spawned, the recommended practice is to fish the pond heavy and keep all the fish caught regardless of size. The big danger in fish pond is, there may be too few bass to hold the bream in check. Good pond management is necessary before good fishing can be had.

It is possible that you can greatly improve your fish pond by fishing it, and have a lot of fun while doing it. If you haven't the time let your neighbors help you fish and share in the fun.

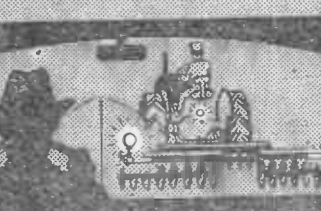

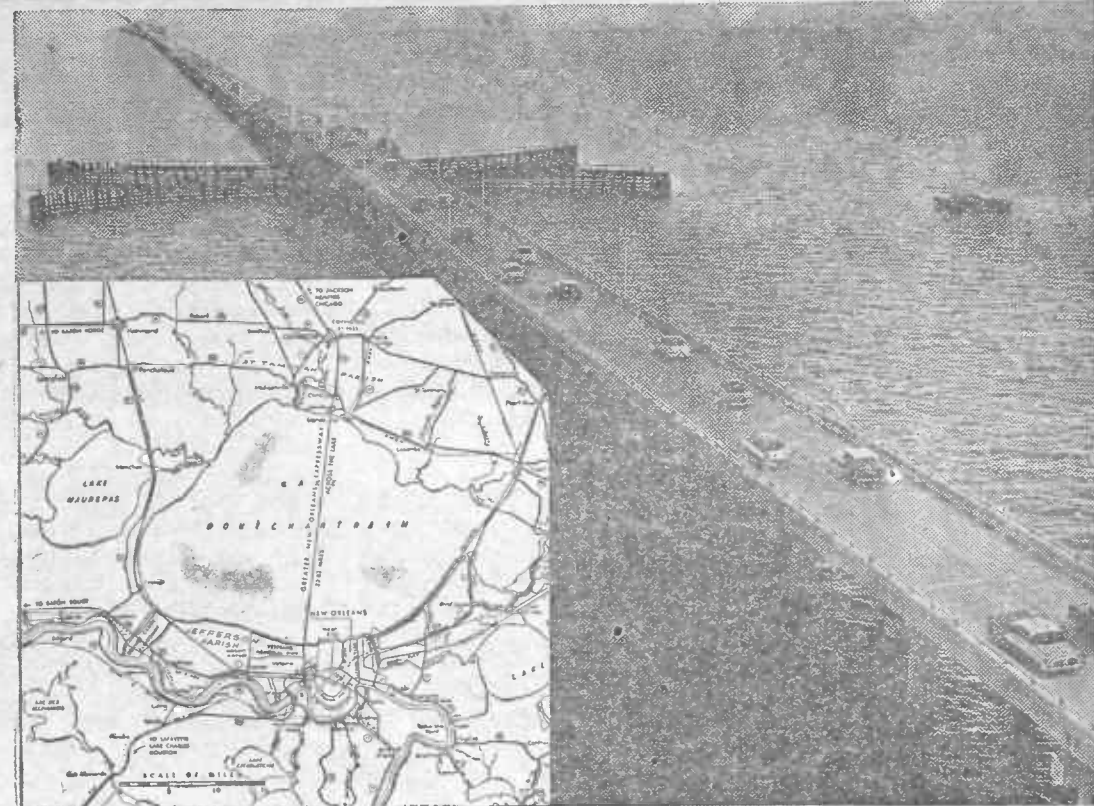

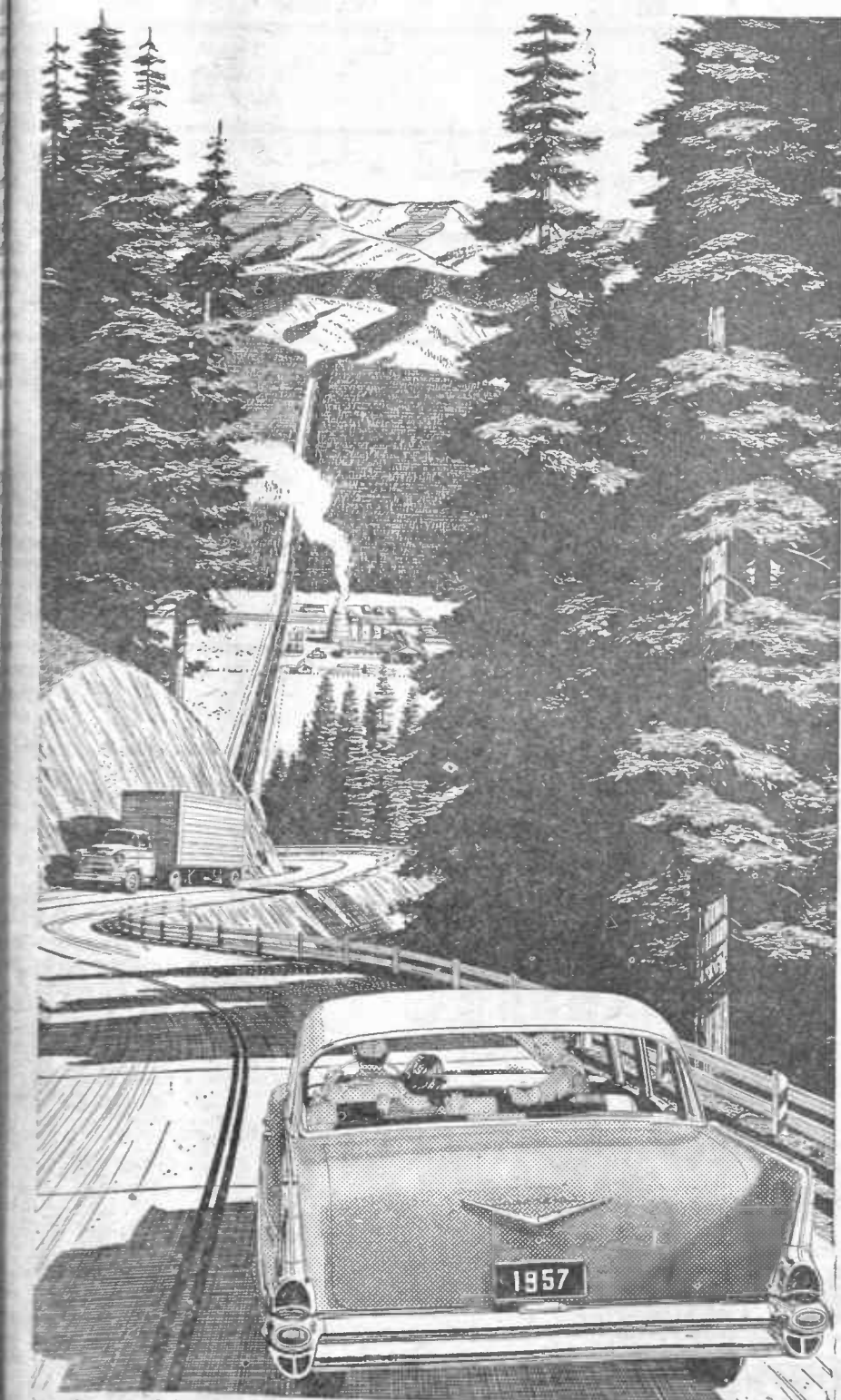

Timber In The South

"Foresters and forest landowners have long harvested wild trees as they found them, using the silvicultural practices best known to them," stated Mr. Akia.

"Too often the high quality forest trees have been removed from the stand & low quality or cull tree left to reproduce. Fortunately, increased economic values now demand that we take more interest in the quality as well as quantity of timber produced on each acre of our forests." According to Mr. Akia good silvicultural practices alone will not achieve our goal of high quality timber.

"The ultimate improvement of the quality and growth of forest trees also require the application of forest genetics and tree improvement. The application of genetic principles to our forest trees may well bring rich results comparable to those already achieved into the well-using of our country," the area forester stated.

"The nation's population is increasing rapidly. This, coupled with the constant development of new uses for wood, means a greater demand for Southern wood fiber to serve the south and other regions as well. Industries dependent on wood are continuing to expand. Our forests will be taxed to capacity to meet future needs. Of the annual production of 13 billion cubic feet of wood, the south grows nearly 1/2 of the estimated goal of 20 billion cubic feet within the next 15 to 20 years, the southern states are assigned the task of growing some 10 billion cubic feet. This means that the nation will look to the south for

about half of its future wood requirements. Manage your timber wisely—consult your forester," he further commented.

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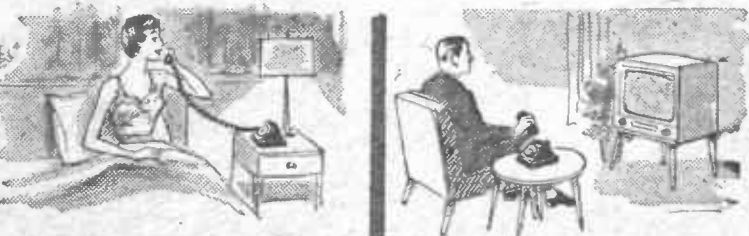
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
